The Marine tried by general court-martial was found guility of violation of Article 99, UCMJ, and sentenced to confinement at hard labor for two years, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, reduction to the rank of Private, and to be discharged from the service with a Bad Conduct Discharge. Of the two Marines tried by special court-martial one was charged with violation of Article 134, UCMJ and the other Marine was charged with violation of Article 99, UCMJ. Both Marines were acquitted.

g. Morale and Welfare. The morale of the unit continues to be high and special services equipment available to all hands. Quotas for both out of country and in country Rest and Recuperation (R&R) are effectively being utillized. The following is a breakdown of the R&R within this command:

(3) Five parties are held at a different CAP each week consisting of a cook-out, beer and soda. Each CAP sends a man into the rear on a staggered schedule to allow him to relax and enjoy club and beach facilities, and the USO facilities.



h. Career Planning. The career planning program continues to be stressed at all levels of command. USAFI GED testing is constantly being stressed to all personnel who have not completed high school. During October 1969 this command will send two Staff NCO's to the Career Planners School in Okinawa. During the month of August there was one career regulistment and one first term extension of enlistment effected. The Marine who applied for a commission in the Marine Corps Reserve under the enlisted commissioning program was selected and will report to Quantico during the month of September 1969.



k. Hospital Visits. Hospital visits are made daily by the Hospital Corpsman representative, the Casualty NCO and the Mail Orderly who delivers mail to the patients located in hospitals at Chu Lai. Frequent visits are also made by the Commanding Officer, Executive Officer, the Adjutant, and the First Sergeant. Normally, the Commanding Officer or his representative, having been notified by Dustoff Control Chu Lai, of the destination of the individual medevaced from the field, are waiting at the hospital when the casualty arrives. The dead are identified within hours of arrival at Chu Lai.






- a. General. The month began with a moderate increase in enemy initiated activity in quang Tin Frovince, and a light increase in Quang Mgai Province. Intelligence sources pointed to an upcoming offensive entitled "August of Gallantry". Reports on energy locations and movements stated that enemy units were moving back into the mountains to regroup and retrain their men in the use of sapper techniques. In Quang Tin, two light observation helicopters were shot down within three hours and within 400 meters of each other. This section attested to the persistence and intensity of the enemy antiaircraft effort in this province. Aurthor south in Quang Mgai Frovince, CACO 1-4 continued to benefit from Operations "Brave Armada" and "Nantucket Beach", as they collected a total of 17 Chieu Hoi's before the 6th day of the month. Operation Brave Armada terminated on 7 August. This operation accounted for eleven enemy killed. Operation Non tucket Beach, still in progress has accounted for thirtyseven energy killed. The events of the mid-month period were dominated by the commencement of the NVA "Summer-Autumn" campaign. During the early hours of 12 August, the "August of Gallantry" offensive became reality, as 1st CAG Hq and surrounding units in the Chu Lai area received 12 rounds of incoming 122mm rockets and 14 rounds of 62mm mortar, as part of a coordinated attack in I Corps. Enemy soldiers in CAF 1-1-7's TAOC in Quang Tin Province threatened an attack, and the CAP reported hearing bugles blowing and sighting a large size enomy force, but an actual ground assault did not take place. In Quang Ngai Province amidst numerous ground assaults on surrounding fire bases and landing zones, CAPs in the 3rd Company received a heavy increase in enemy contact and suffered the lose of 6 Marines from three CAN's. Although the offensive in Quang Mgai continued throughout the week, the CAP units in this area returned to a poriod relatively light enemy contact for the remainder of this period.
- (1) By the 23rd of the month the August Campaign had, for the most part, ground to a halt. Once again the enemy's capabilities could not equal his intentions, as the August of Gallentry offensive did not accomplish its proposed goals. Contact for the remainder of the mouth was limited to attacks by fire.
- (2) The VC/NVA increased their efforts to down friendly aircraft, as there was an increase in AA fire received in the two provinces. Intelligence sources reported a program on the part of the VC/NVA to give rewards for downed aircraft.
- (3) Propaganda and proselyting activity remained at a higher level than usual. Available information, on these aspects, indicate that the primary emphasis of the VCI remains on penetrating GVM agencies and GVM forces, increasing its influence over the contlation, and concurrently weakening the RVN government, military, and pacification structures. The propaganda found by 1st DOD DIR 5200.10

b. Intelligence Chain


(1) The most timely intelligence of immediate tactical value comes from the populace. Of six reports drawn from local Vietnamese villagers, three pro-



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duced worthwhile results. One report resulted in one (1) VC KIA, and one (1) weapon captured, the remainder resulted in information and ordance acquired under the VIP program.

- (2) Intelligence reported by the companies to 1st C.G is passed to the Americal Division and local interested commands as applicable. Feedback from VC suspects captured and sent to the various district headquarters by CAPs remains slow in most cases. This problem receives continuing attention from 1st CAG headquarters and subordinate companies.
- c. RVN Liaison Officer/Interpreters. The group employed one liaison officer and three interpreters through this period, all of whom contributed to the success of coordination among the CAPs and Vietnamese forces.










3. Operations

a. Gomeral

- (1) The 1st Combined Action Group continued to conduct operations in accordance with its assigned mission of village/hanlet security and the Accelerated Pacification Program. In heaving with the aforementation program, three now CAPs were established during the month, one in Tam Ky District and two in Son Win District. The success experienced by the CAP's in the 1st CAG has made all parties concerned, Vietnamese, US Advisors and US Army extremely receptive to the establishment of additional CAP's as forces became available.
- (2) During the month the Americal Division continued heavy saturation of the Chu Lei area with small unit activities (company and smaller) with occasional battalion size and larger operations. The support provided by the Division and the subordinate units, especially the 198th Light Infantry Brigade, was outstanding in all respects and greatly enhanced the effectiveness of the Combined Action Flatoons.

b. Activities

- (1) During the period there were fourteen combined CAR-District RF/PF operations and one operation with a company from the 5th Battalion, 46th Infantry, USA. In addition to these preplemed operations many of the CARs continue to conduct daily patrols and sweeps with the Regional Force units in their respective areas. The preponderance of the 1st CAGs activities continues to be night ambushes which coincide with the enemy's prime movement time. The tactic of dropping off a portion of a patrol (stay behind ambush) to establish an ambush in an area that the CAP's are passing through has proven very effective.
- (a) Operation Brave Armade conducted by Special Landing Force Alpha (2nd Bm, 26th Marines) in conjunction with the 198th LIB and the CAP's in the area, ended August 7. The operation accounted for eleven enemy killed. Operation Nantucket Boach continued throughout the month.
- (2) CACO 1-1 conducted normal scouting and patrolling activities in all seven CAP areas. The number of contacts made by the Company was relatively small, as all decrease in enemy movement and activity was apparent. CACO 1-1 conducted eleven combined operations with Rugional Forces and Popular Forces other than those normally assigned to the CAP's. The Company had fourteen significant contacts during the period resulting in fifteen enemy KIA and had one onemy turn himself in under the Chieu Hoi Program. The Company established one new CAP (1-1-5) when MIT 1-1 was deactivated.
- (3) CACO 1-2 had very few significant contacts during the period; a total of five resulting in one (1) enemy KTA. The lack of enemy activity enabled the Company to devote maximum effort to conducting classes and training the Popular Forces. The enemy continues to avoid CACO 1-2's TACC which is tangible evidence of the success of the CAP's in that area.



- (14) GACO 1-3 experienced the greatest amount of many activity of the fourty-eight significant contacts. The enemy continues to use the Song Tra Dong River and surrounding valley as a primary infiltration route into Quang Ngai Province. The enemy usually tries to navigate around the areas controlled by the CAP's but due to aggressive patrolling and ambushing he is frequency intercepted. The Popular Forces are gaining self confidence by successfully engaging the enemy with the CAP's.
- (5) CAGO 1-h established two new CAP's during the period; CAP 1-h-5 and CAP 1-h-6 seven kilometers south of the Catangan Penninsula. Based on the number of enemy sighting in the area, it appears that these new CAP's will be very productive in the coming months. Contact was relatively light in CACO 1-h's area with only seven significant contacts for the period. The Company received two Noi Chambs, captured eight VCS during the month and accounted for one (1) enemy EIA.



c. Training

- (1) General. Formal training covered the subjects of General Military Subjects, Leadership, Small Unit Tactics, Infantry Weapons and Supporting Arms. Fersonal Response and Vietnamese Language was included for USIC personnel only.
- (2) CAI Training. The individual CAP's conducted daily classes as directed by the Group training schedule which is promulgated weekly for the coming week. Each CAP locater returns the schedule at the completion of the training







and indicates the number of hours accomplished. Thirty-four hours of scheduled training was completed by each CAP and in addition, many hours of impromptuinstruction was given as the CAP leader deemed necessary.

(3) Other Training

- (a) Five Marines completed the Vietnamese Lenguage Course in Da Mang.
- (b) Four Marines attended the Artillery School conducted by the Americal Division.
- (c) A one day indoctrination course was conducted for all newly joined personnel prior to their as ingment to the field.
- d. Inspections. Each CACO and CAT was inspected during the month particular emphasis given to condition of weapons and 782 gear. To significant discrepancies were noted.
- (1) The S-3 Section continued the practice of taking new CAP Leaders on as many inspection trips as possible prior to their being assigned to the field. This enabled the new leaders to meet and talk with seasoned CAP Leaders and become aware of problems that are common to many CAP's and the various solutions tried in the field.
- e. Fire Support. The USA artillery units supporting the Americal Alvision as well as ARVI and USAC units, when available during special operations. provided excellent fire support during the month. Fewer fire missions were called than in provious months as a result of the drecrease in enemy activity. The response time on the missions called was very good and preplained M&I fires were utilized whenever practicable.

f. Air Support

- (1) Tactical air support was utilized twenty-nine times during the month. The CAP's requests for air support were met with both fixed wing and helicopter gunships. Ten of these missions were strike missions and nineteen were visual recon or liaison.
- (2) The aforementioned figures do not include the time or missions flown for logistical resupply of the Cal's as this time is allotted by the proximite battalions on a daily basis and these missions are not requested or controlled by the CAG.
- company with an additional team avaivable to one company for a portion of the month. The teams tend to boast morale an confidence of both Marines and FF's and are well received whenever available.

h. Psychological Operations

(1) During the month of August the 1st CAG, in conjunction with and



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


supported by the Americal Division, diropped over ten million leaflets and an additional fifteen million were distributed by CAP's and propaganda terms. The leaflets were augmented by thirteen hours of aerial broadcasts and eight hours of movies. The subjects covered were: Chicu Hoi, Anti-VC, and Pro-GVN.

- (2) Enemy PsyOps, consisted of leaflets being distributed in some villages. The leaflets varied very little from those found in previous months with the main theme being American invaders and Saigon puppets; a new overtone appeared, warning the people to stay away from the market places and not to go out after dark.
- i. Rit Carson Scouts. The KCS continue to contribute to the effectiveness of the CAP's and work well with the units with a few minor exceptions.
- j. Volunteer Informant Program. 108,200\$VN were spent during the month under the VIF program. The amount was less than last month in keeping with the guidence of paying the minimum reward instead of the maximum. The bulk of the ordnance turned in continued to be mortar and artillery rounds. The benefit to Free World Forces in lives saved under this program is well worth the money invested and the additional benefit of good will created by the financial bonus to the local populace add to the reasons for maintaining this program. During the month of August, 1st CAG units received one hundred twenty-three pieces of ordnance and four individual weapons under the VIF.

k. Communications

- (1) During the reporting period the Combined Action Program Communications Officer, Major AUST INFALD, visited the 1st Combined Action Group for a period of two days. During the first day Major AUSTINETED was given a communications bridfing by the 1st CAC Communication Chief. The briefing consisted of communication capabilities and limitations provided by the communication equipment employed by the 1st CAG, logistical and maintenance support problems unique to the 1st CAG with possible solutions to these problems. An immediate solution to maintenance problems the Communication Officer noted probably was in the area of an Inter-Service Support Agreement (ISSA) with a local Army Service Unit. The Communication Chief suggested that the 588th Maintenance Company, which has a maintenance capability up to and including 3rd echelon for communication equipment, was probably the most logical choice due to their proximity to the 1st CAG and t eir level of maintenance. Since then Liaison has been made with the 588th Maintenance Company by the Communication Chief with favorable results, in that, the 588th Maintenance Company representatives stated they could support the 1st CAG with communication equipment maintenance. Upon being advised of this, Major AUSTINFELD stated he would go to work on an Inter-Service Support agreement between 1st CAC and the 588th Maintenance Company. Euring the second day of Major AUSTINFIED's visit he was provided with a helicopter and ground reconnaissance of CACO 1-3 and CACO 1-4 TAOC conducted by Major ETTERT, 1st CAG, S-3.
- (2) During the reporting eriod a Combined Action Program Administrative Voice Radio Notwork was established with 1st CAG as a subordinate station. This net will operate between the hours of 1500-1600 daily, or as required, ad consists



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of PRC-47 radio equipment. To provide reliable, long-range communications to support this net, the 1st CAG Communication Chief erected a 'long-wire', modified inverted 'L' type, antenna of one-half wave length. Communication has been satisfactory with Net Control (CAP Director) and satisfactory to marginal with the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th CAG's. No problems are foreseen in the employment of this particular radio circuit except that a back-up PRC-47 should be provided to each CAG in case of malfunction.

a. Significant Events.

- (1) Informal inspection conducted by Group Commander in S-4, Supply, Motor Transport functions and Group facilities.
- (2) Supply inventory and warehouse location verification conducted during August.
 - (3) Combat losses during the month was one AN/PRC-25 radio.

b. Supply.

- (1) Supply support received during the month of August was excellent. Back-order releases from FLC and response to Group requisitions enhanced the asset posture.
- (2) T/E deficiencies effect the overall readiness category of the Group, however, due to the mobile concept, operations are not hampered. In addition, the deficiency of one M151 truck and one M37 truck may resolved soon since shipping status is held on both vehicles.
- (3) During the month liaison was made with the NSAD Detachment, Chu Lai to provide supply support for certain Class II, III and IV items, in addition to the Class I support currently received.

c. Maintenance.


(1) Currently maintenance support has declined in the area of Communications and Ordnance items, particularly, the AN/PRC-25 (10) and M-60 machine gun (13). Turn-around time on the above mentioned items has resulted in downtime up to 40 days on these items. It appears lack of parts and the asset posture of the DX program are contributing factors.


d. Motor Transport.


- (1) During the reporting period Group Motor Transport logged 23,514 miles.

- (3) Completion of a new transient quarters occurred during August.










- f. Medical. The following information was received during the Senior Corpsman's mostling held at 3rd CAG, Phu Bai on 26 August 1969:
- (1) All personnel, expecially corpsmen, should be on the alert for neuropsychiatric cases. The things to look for were described as emotional stress and passive aggressive reactions.
- (2) All corpsmen are to keep an up to date Emergency Data Page (601-2) in their service records. This will ensure that the SGLI insurance companies have the complete name, relationship and address of next of kin if needed.
- (3) All corpsmen are to be on the alert for hepatitis and hemorragic fever. A bulletin has been sent to all corpsmen concerning this problem.

(4) Techniques

(a) The senior medical representative visited seven CAPs during the month. During his visit he held sanitation inspections and observed and advised the CAP corpsmen conducting daily MEDCAPS.



MTT 1-1. Detained 6 VN civilians at BT 305167. One of the detaines, a 19 year old female, was discovered to be a VC. The VC POW and the 5 VCS were taken to District Headquarters for further interrogation. RESULTS: 1 VC POW and 5 VCS.

CAP 1-3-8. Received SAF from an USEF at BT 582926. The CAP returned organic weapons fire and grenades causing the enemy to flee to the S. One PF was WIA(M) in the contact. A sweep of the area produced negative results RESULTS: 1 PF WIA(M).

CAP 1-4-3. 1 Hoi Chanh turned himself in to CAP at BS 767832. Initial interrogation revealed the Hoi Chanh was 19 years old and a platoon leader. He revealed his unit to be located in the vicinity of BS 779838, with a strength of 3 platoons totaling 40 men. RESULTS: 1 Hoi Chanh

CAP 1-4-1. While participating in a joint operation with PF's and RF's, CAP detained 8 VCS after SAF was exchanged with an USEF at BS 592802. RESULTS: 8 VCS.

CAF 1-3-8. The CP element initiated organic weapons fire on movement spotted at BS 593926. An estimated 10 to 20 enemy returned SAF and an artillery mission was fired on the enemy position by the CAF. The enemy broke contact and withdrew E. A sweep found 1 NVA KIA, 1 M-16 rifle, and 1 grenade (NFI). RESULTS: 1 NVA KIA, 1 INC.

CAP 1-4-2. VN civilians informed CAP that 1 company of VC was located at BS 789859. A 107mm mortar mission was fired on the suspected grids and a first light sweep found an unspecified number of bunkers, several of which had been destroyed by the fire. The remaining bunkers were destroyed by the CAP. RESULTS: Bunkers destroyed. (NFI).

MTT 1-1. An ambush spotted and engaged approx 15 VC at BS 590917. The enemy returned AW and SAF and withdrew NE. A second ambush element was moving into a blocking position when it made contact with same enemy force. The VC again







broke contact and withdrew NW. Both elements linked up and conducted a sweep with negative further contact. 1 Marine was KIA in the first contact; two were KIA in the second. RESULTS: 3 USMC KIA.

12 Aug

CAP 1-1-6. While conducting a sweep of the 120245H contact area, a PF tripped a booby trap that wounded the CAP corpsman. Emergency medevac was completed to 95th Evac at 120935H. The sweep was continued finding 2 VC KIA. RESULTS: 1 USN WIAE, 2 VC KIA.

CAF 1-3-5. A patrol spotted and called artillery on 5 VC at BS 69914. A sweep of the area following the artillery mission found 1 VC KIA. Continuing on the patrol, the CAF received 30 to 40 rounds of SAF from an USEF located to their S. The patrol returned fire and the enemy broke contact and fled S. RESULTS: 1 VC KIA.

CAP 1-3-7. An ambush initiated organic weapons fire on 10-15 VC at BS 613941. VC returned SAF and 1 chicom grenade before breaking contact. There were 1 USMC KIA and 1 USMC WIAE. A sweep of thearea produced negative results. RESULTS: 1 USMC KIA, 1 USMC WIAE.

13 Aug

CAP 1-4-4. A patrol dispatched as a reaction force to assist RF and PF units in contact at BS 760819, was ambushed by an USEF. Two USMC were KIA: 2 M-16s and 1 AN/PRC-25 were conbat losses. At approx the same time, the CAP CP group and the surrounding village received about 50 incoming 82mm mortar rounds, killing 10 civilians and 3 PSDF members and wounding 10 civilians, 4 RF, and 2 RD who were evacuated. Counter mortars was fired on suspected enemy mortar positions. Following the mortar attack, a second CAP element was dispatched as a reaction for the ambushed element and the KLAs were evacuated. A sweep of the contact area produced negative further results. RESULTS: 2 USMC KIA, 10 civilians KIA, 3 PSDF KIA, 10 civilians WIAE, and 2 RD WIAE. 2 M-16s and 1 AN/PRC-25 radio were combat losses.





15 Aug

CAP 1-3-3. A patrol dispatched to investigate rifle shots, received sniper fire as it approached a village at BS 668975. Fire could not be returned due to the proximity of civilians. 1 VN civilian was discovered WIAE and was medavaced. A CAP sweep produced negative results. RESULTS: 1 WN civilian WIAE.

CAP 1-1-4. In a joint operation with 2 platoons of PF's, CAP called an artillery mission on 10 VC spotted at BT 262194, and repuested airstrikes on an USEF at 250201. A sweep found 4 VC KBA. One VC was KIA by the CAP as he attempted to flee the area. One of the PF platoons participating in the operation was ambushed by an USEF at BT 26220 resulting in 14 PF KIA and 14 weapons lost. Later the CAP relayed a request for an airstrike on an enemy force in contact with the two PF platoons at BT 275215. A PF sweep following the airstrikes found 28 VC KBA, h AK-47's, 1 M-16, 1 M-1 carbine, and 1 M-3 SMG. RESULTS: 14 PF KIA (Not CAP), 33 VC KIA (5 credited to CAP), 4 IWC, 1 M-16 and 1 M-1 carbine recovered.

CAP 1-1-3. Ambush initiated organis weapons fire on an estimated NVA platoon at BT 348165. The enemy returned SAF and RPG's. The CAP called an artillery mission causing the enemy to break contact. 1 PF was KIA and 1 PF was WIAE. A sweep of the area found 1 NVA KIA, 1 AK-47, and 3 chicom grenades. RESUL TS: 1 PF KIA, 1 PF WIAE, 1 NVA KIA, 1 IWC and 3 chicom grenades captured.

CAP 1-3-5. CP received AWF and 1 RPG at BS 712973. The CP returned organic weapons fire and called an artillery mission on 5-6 VC causing them to flee S. A sweep of the area produced negative results. RESULTS: Negative.



RESULTS: 2 bunkers destroyed.
