1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion (-), Reinforced, 1st Force Service Regiment/Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific provided command, administration, communication, and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command/1st Force Service Regiment and other supporting services to Marine Division/Wing elements of the Third Marine Amphibious Force deployed in the I Corps Area, Republic of Vietnam as depicted in the mission, which included graves registration, fumigation, bath and laundry, air delivery, materials handling, mess, utilities and construction and other logistical services as required in executing additional tasks, to include personnel/services, operational supervision and logistical support for two (2) Combined Action Platoons; personnel and supporting services for the operation of the Third Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility; operational supervision and personnel for internal and perimeter security defense of Force Logistic Command units located at Camp Books, Red Beach Complex, Danang.

3. Intelligence

a. The pacification of the local populace continued at a steady pace. Vietnamese officials continued to volunteer information dealing with Viet Cong activities. Difficulty is encountered in connection with acting on this type of information due to lack of timeliness and completeness.

b. GAP-E-2 received information stating that Corporal PHAM DINH NNON was allegedly living at (962778) along with Major TANG TON PHUONG HOA MINH (V). It is supposed that the Major occasionally travels with the Corporal in this area. This intelligence was processed through the 5th CIT and found to be valid. No other action has been taken by this Command.

c. During this month a total of fourteen (14) detainees were apprehended through the daily patrols conducted in this TAOR.

5. Special Operations

a. The Security Platoon continued to man the perimeter. In addition there are three daylight reconnaissance patrols now operating each week within the TAOR in areas adjacent to the Camp Books perimeter.

b. The number of night patrols in the TAOR adjacent to the Camp Books perimeter was significantly increased during the month of June by members of the Provisional Rifle Company due to receipt of intelligence indicating a possible attack.

c. During the period 14 through 16 June the Air Delivery Platoon supported the Army Special Forces' detachment at Marble Mountain in a jump exercise; the goal was to qualify 120 Montagnards as parachutists. The platoon packed and maintained an average of 200 parachutes a day for a three day period. All members of the platoon managed to make three jumps with the Vietnamese troops and have been nominated for the awarding of the Vietnamese Parachutist's Insignia.

d. On 18 June 1967 a CAP E-3 patrol and the CAP Compound itself made contact with an unknown number of insurgent communist (Viet Cong) forces, resulting in two Marines wounded in action.

e. On 28 June 1967 a patrol from CAP E-2 engaged in a fire fight with an unknown size VC unit in the vicinity of MIEU TACH SON resulting in one (confirmed) KIA and the capture of one North Vietnamese submachine gun, Type 50.

6. Commend Relations

a. Normal.

b. On 28 June 1967 Lieutenant General V. H. KRULAK, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific visited the Graves Registration Platoon Headquarters. (See attached itinerary).

c. From 7 through 9 June 1967 CAP E-2 was visited by reporters from Life Magazine gathering information for an editorial on GAC progress in Vietnam.

d. On 18 June 1967 Miss JUATO KAZACKAIS, a free lance reporter, visited CAP E-2 and went on a MEDCAP Patrol.

e. On 20 June 1967 the Childrens' Hospital was visited by the Reverened H. H. FELDMAN of South Carolina.

f. On 23 June 1967 the Childrens' Hospital and CAP E-2 were visited by Dr. Orel ROBERTS.

g. On 30 June 1967 the Battalion hosted a Personnel Accounting Seminar conducted by a team from Headquarters, Marine Corps. (See attached supporting document).

#### 7. Equipment

a. Continued emphasis on first echelon maintenance and quality second echelon maintenance has resulted in an average availability transportation rate of 92% during the month.

b. Maintenance Platoon of Truck Company processed a total of 255 Tactical Equipment Repair Orders during the month.

c. The Material Handling Equipment Platoon maintained an availability rating of 90% on all its heavy equipment for the month.

d. The vehicles rated by the Combined Action Company were placed on requisition 26 June 1967. Issue is expected during July.

e. On 18 June 1967 the 7th Motor Transport Battalion assumed co-ordinating responsibility for external commitments of all Truck Company vehicles.

f. On 21 June 1967 the 7th Motor Transport Battalion assumed co-ordinating responsibility for all external commitments of the Material Handling Equipment Platoon. No difficulties were encountered in these transfers of responsibility.

#### 8. Logistics

a. The 7th Motor Transport Battalion was relocated to Camp Books creating an urgent need for billeting, administrative and shop space. The Engineer Platoon responded with the construction of a 240 man temporary billeting area including electricity, head and shower facilities. This project was completed in three (3) days.

b. Logistic support in the construction of bunkers, installation of floodlights, and the erection of a field expedient shower was provided for the CAC at KIM LIEN, sponsored by 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines.

c. The complete filtering system at the camp water point was revamped. This improvement, in connection with existing expeditionary equipment, has boosted the production capability to 110,000 gallons of water per day. This capability for production exceeds the capacity of our present three wells.

## 9. Community Relations

a. During the month of June, the Civil Affairs Office continued its program of Self-Help, MEDCAP and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people in our TAOR. There were continuing occasions of food, clothing, soap and other supplies donated to all the hamlets located in the Headquarters and Service Battalion TAOR.

b. The following events took place in June:

4 June - The Hat Factory in PHUOC NGHIA was completed and dedicated

7 June - Donated material for one well to be constructed on GO DAU Island.

10 June - Construction of 14 houses was completed during the month at N DA PHUOC. This is a continuing project which, upon completion, will consist of 40 houses. There are three duplexes also to be completed.

14 June - One well in XUAN DUONG was completed and construction of six additional wells was initiated.

18 June - Showed movies in TRUNG PHUOC of a propaganda nature; attendance estimated at 500-600.

19 June - Showed movies of a propaganda nature in NAM O; attendance estimated at 700.

20 June - Rendered assistance to XUAN THIEU Hamlet concerning blight which was infecting crops. DDT spray and spray guns were donated. Also, one well was completed and construction of a second well was undertaken.

## 10. Communications

a. Radio Platoon provided extensive radio linkage to the Saigon area in support of base development. It provided operators in support of the Provisional Rifle Company conducting local ground security operations in this TAOR.

b. The electronics maintenance section repaired 156 items of equipment and answered 52 trouble calls for teletypewriter and associated equipment repair. Fixed plant type teletypewriter equipment was installed in the Communication Center.

c. The Wire Platoon relocated one (1) dial telephone, one (1) TOM-20 intercom set and six (6) local telephones. A PA system was installed for the Supply Battalion field meet. One (1) MCF-1 alert phone terminal was installed. Change #1 to the telephone directory was distributed to subscribers. 122 trouble calls were answered for Camp Books and 525 tests were made on various teletypewriter trunk, AUTODIN and dial lines. A space was constructed, painted, tiled and air-conditioned in preparation for

the installation of a telephone control office set, An/TTC-7, a switchboard installation providing service for 200 local subscribers. This set is a replacement for the three switchboards (SB-86's) presently providing service to all of Camp Bocks. It is anticipated that the new switchboard will be placed in full service during July without interruption to service to subscribers.

d. The Message Center Platoon continued operations with a burdening message load demanding the utmost of men and equipment. During the month of June in excess of 20,000 messages were processed. Actual electrical transmissions would number many thousands more. A new duplex circuit was activated with the III MAF on 17 June 1967. This additional equipment has severely strained the present small physical plant. All possible efforts have been made to efficiently utilize existing space. On 24 June a new data communications circuit was activated with FLSG-A.

11. Redesignations

a. No redesignations were made.

12. Miscellaneous Service

a. The MANS Station (N/EFL) processed 182 messages and 1242 phone patches. Service at this station reverted from every other day to daily service.

b. The Laundry processed 54,150 pounds of clothing during the month of June 1967.

c. The Transient Facility billeted 23,761 personnel during the month and a total of 48,765 meals were served.

d. The Graves Registration Platoon processed a total of 328 remains during June 1967.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this report, Communication Company continued to provide support to the Red Beach Complex and other units of FLC not physically located at Red Beach.

2. Radio Platoon provided extensive radio links to Saigon area in support of base development: provided operators in support of the Provisional Company conducting local ground security operations in addition, a 4-man team with equipment were assigned to an LSU in support of FLSU-A and a 2-man team assigned to a southern LSU.

3. The electronics maintenance section repaired 156 items of equipment and answered 52 trouble calls for teletypewriter and associated equipment. Fixed Plant type teletypewriter equipment was installed in the Communication Center. Two (2) technicians attended short courses of training at other commands and one (1) technician was TAD to FLSG-A to assist that unit in operation of Autodin equipment.

4. The Wire Platoon relocated one (1) dial telephone, one (1) TOM-20 intercom set, and six (6) local telephones. PA system was installed for the supply Battalion field meet. One (1) MCT-1 alert phone terminal was installed change #1 to the telephone directory was distributed to subscribers, 122 trouble calls were answered for Camp Books and 525 tests were made on various teletypewriter trunk, autodin and dial lines. A space was constructed painted, tiled and air-conditioned in preparation for installation of telephone central office set, AN/TTC-7, a switchboard installation providing service for 200 local subscribers. This set is a replacement for the three (3) switchboards SB-86 presently providing service to all of Camp Books. It is anticipated that the new switchboard will be placed into full service during July without interruption to subscribers.

5. The Message Center Platoon continued operations with a message load demanding the utmost of men and equipment. During the month of June an excess of 20,000 messages were processed. Actual electrical transmissions would number many thousands more. The limited amount of space available for message files was alleviated greatly on receipt of permission to retain three (3) months message files. Plans were drawn and approved for a new physical plant for the communication center proving for future circuits and increased message handling capability. A new duplex circuit was activated with III MAF on 17 June 1967. This additional equipment has severely strained the present small physical plant. All possible efforts have been made to efficiently utilize existing space. On 24 June a new data communications circuit was activated with FLSG-A.

6. On 30 June a new T/O was submitted to H&S Bn, requesting 5 officer and 139 enlisted in excess of the present T/O of 8 officers and 247 enlisted. This is in contrast to the monthly average on board strength 2 officers and 125 enlisted. It is not unrealistic to state that the mission of this company is to provide communications for a command which has rapidly grown from a Force Service Regiment and that the capability of a Communication Company, Force Service Regiment is rapidly falling behind the communication requirements of the Force Logistic Command.



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The MILSTRIP/MILSTRAP System is progressing at full tilt with a voluminous 469,004 transactions processed during the month of June. A few minor mechanical problems continued to crop up throughout the month but were corrected with a minimal amount of down time. An internal education program has been incorporated into the weekly routine of the Central Control Point to afford all personnel employed by the system a thorough working knowledge of all phases of the program.

A mobile clothing store commenced operation on 19 June with a weekly schedule to visit eighteen (18) sites throughout the DaNang TAOR. The use of the mobile clothing store by personnel not authorized in-kind replacement of individual clothing is expected to save the command many man hours by precluding the necessity to travel to the central clothing store for cash sales.

Rations Company finished the month with a production schedule that produced 382,053 pounds of bread, 9,377 dozen doughnuts, 714 gallons of ice cream and 799,800 pounds of ice.

Ammunition Company hit an all time high in receiving/issuing 31,417 short tons of Class V material during the month, an 18% increase over the input/output for the month of May and a 270% increase over June 1966. The dump level at ASP #1 now stands at 21,970 short tons.

EOD Platoon members made 279 calls, recovered 16,586 explosive items and destroyed 24,500 pounds of smokeless powder by burning.

Bulk Fuel Company accomplished routine receiving, pumping, dispensing and shuttling operations throughout the month of June.

On 1 June 1967 the Key Punch Section of the CCP started with a backlog of 21,000 transactions to be punched. Transactions received by the Key Punch Section totaled 113,387 for the month. 118,000 transactions were punched for this period and the CCP ended the month with a backlog of 17,000. Two key punch machines are being used by the Data Processing Installation to help eliminate the Key Punch backlog.

During the month the Data Processing Platoon was visited on three separate occasions by BGen HERBOLD, USMC. The Key Punch Section punched 118,000 transactions and ended the month with a backlog of 17,000.

Two Key Punch machines are now being used within the Data Processing Installation to help eliminate the Key Punch backlog.

When a Receipt is received by the CCP, the corresponding card is pulled and placed in the next Update Run. This will save valuable time in that the Stock Management Section will not have to manually prepare a DD 1348N for the Receipt and the Key Punch Section will not have to punch the card.

If the quantity on the Receipt is different from that punched in the EMR card, then that field will be changed.

(3) An internal school has been established to train all personnel, within the CCP, on the functions and problems of each Section. The School is for one hour a week and key personnel from each section are utilized as Instructors.

(6) New equipment installed. On 8 June 1967 a 6 part high speed decollator was installed. This will expedite the bursting and binding of reports thus eliminating some of the problems always encountered in the output area.

Dental treatment is still in effect. An average of 25 people attend these dental clinics every week.

The Ammunition Company had its highest month in history in June receiving and issuing 31,417 s/t, an 18% increase from May and a 270% increase over June 1966. The daily average for June was 1047 s/t meaning that over 2,000,000 lbs of ammunition were handled daily on the average by ASP#1. During the first six months of 1967 Ammunition Company handled 120,034 s/t compared with 36,002 s/t handled during the first six months of 1966, a 235% increase. Of the 13,205 s/t issued the following units received the below listed amounts:




