NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion (-), Reinforced, 1st Force Service Regiment/Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific provided command, administration, communication, and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command/1st Force Service Regiment and other supporting services to Marine Division/Wing elements of the Third Marine Amphibious Force deployed in the I Corps Area, Republic of Vietnam as depicted in the mission, which included graves registration, fumigation, bath and laundry, air delivery, materials handling, mess, utilities and construction and other logistical services as required in executing additional tasks to include personnel/services, operational supervision and logistical support for two (2) Combined Action Platoons; personnel and sup-

porting services for the operation of the Third Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility; operational supervision and personnel for internal and perimeter security defense of Force Logistic Command units located at Camp Books, Red Beach Complex, Danang.

2. Administration

a. Normal Command administration prevailed.

b. Savings Bonds participation within the Battalion continued at more than 90%.

3. Intelligence

a. Information concerning the Viet Cong has not been volunteered by the Vietnamese populace. During this period the attitude of the local people has changed considerably. The people generally turn away from members of CAP, Echo-2, but relations with CAP, Echo-3 remain unchanged.

b. Thirteen (13) Detainees were picked up during this period and turned into District Headquarters. In most cases the detainees have been kept by the ARVN Forces for the purpose of serving with the ARVN.

c. There were two assassinations in the CAP, Echo-2 TAOR. The victims, both believed to have been assassinated by the Viet Cong, were PHAM TUE, a sub-hamlet chief from MIEU THACH SON on 13 July 1967 and GIAC TRAN, a hamlet chief from RUAN TIEU on 30 July 1967.

4. Training

a. During the month of June the Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Battalion, inspected the following Companies on the dates indicated:

5. Special Operations

a. On 4 and 17 July 1967, the Air Delivery Platoon participated with the 5th Special Forces Group "C" Team in parachute operations at Marble Mountain. Eighteen members of the Platoon jumped each day. On 24 July 1967 the Air Delivery Platoon rigged 4000 pounds of rations for the Air Force and participated in the drop. The Air drop was made to the Special Forces "Mike" at NCOCK GAO'VAAN.

b. During the month of July 1967, Truck Company participated in 11 convoys in support of combat operations with no casualties.

c. The Security Platoon continued to man the perimeter and conduct a minimum of three weekly daylight patrols within the TAOR, in areas adjacent to the Camp Boats Perimeter. As a result of these patrols, two detainees were picked up on 30 July 1967 and turned over to 5th CIT.

d. The defensive positions are continually maintained and improved by members of the Security Platoon.

e. During the month of July 1967, Combined Action Platoon's Echo-2 and 3 made no contact with the communist insurgent forces (Viet Cong).

f. Patrolling has been active during this period; there have been a total of 162 patrols conducted within the TAOR by CAP, Echo 2 and 3 and the Provisional Rifle Company.

6. Command Relations

a. Normal

b. During brief ceremonies at 1630 on 28 July 1967, Lieutenant Colonel W. F. KOENIGLEIN relieved Lieutenant Colonel K. D. SELBERT as Battalion Commander. (See pictures, Part IV)

c. Visitors to CAP Echo-2 and 3 were:

(1) 10 July 1967, Mike WINTERS, a reporter from "Collegiate Press", stayed overnight.

(3) 24 July 1967, Glenny's BELL from the Australian Broadcasting System; Richard BRENNER and Baldwin WALLACE from "Collegiate" Magazine.

d. Mrs. MILLER, recording and television star, brought her USO show to perform for FLC 14 July 1967.

7. Equipment

a. The Material Handling Equipment Platoon had an availability rating of 79% on all its heavy equipment for the past month.

b. Receipt and installation of fixed plant teletypewriter equipment and switchboard AN/TCC-7 has shortened teletypewriter circuit down time and improved telephone subscriber service.

c. The Electronics Maintenance Section repaired 101 items of equipment and answered 74 trouble calls for teletypewriter and other equipment. Installation of switchboard AN/TCC-7 was completed on 22 July 1967.

d. Continued emphasis on first echelon maintenance and quality second echelon maintenance has resulted in an average availability transportation rate of 92% during the month on all vehicles in Truck Company.

e. Maintenance Platoon processed a total of 246 Tactical Equipment Repair Orders during July 1967.

8. Logistics

a. Headquarters and Service Battalion hosted approximately 160 officers and men of the 5th 155 Gun Battalion from 19 July through 24 July 1967.

b. During the month of July, 6795 cubic meters of rock and gravel was delivered to the Battalion. The 7th Motor Transport Battalion truck park was completed. The open storage area of Organic Supply was filled with rock for better storage facilities in preparation for the coming monsoon season. The remainder of rock and gravel was distributed throughout the Battalion. Also, a stockpile of rock is being accumulated. When the current contract expires, sections will be furnished rock as needed.

9. Community Relations

a. During the month of July, the Civil Affairs Office continued its program of Self-Help, MEDCAP, and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people in our TAOR. There were continuing occasions of food, clothing, soap and other supplies donated to all the hamlets located in the Headquarters and Service Battalion TAOR.

b. The following events took place in July:

7 July - Dedicated new hamlet of Da Phuoc consisting of thirty-five (35) brick houses.

11 July - Furnished Nam O with the materials for the construction of six (6) wells.

12 July - Nam O showed movies of a propaganda nature, - 700 people

12 July - Trung Phuoc, established hamlet police constabulary consisting of six (6) men. Their mission is to patrol the area during the hours of darkness keeping a watch for fire or any suspicious activities.

19 July - Xuan Thieu, completed one (1) well

20 July - Nam O, showed movies of a propaganda nature, - 700 people

20 July - Aid Station in Phuoc Nghia was completed and put into operation

21 July - Hoa Khanh Village, provided materials for the construction of the Hoa Khanh Village schoolmaster's home.

25 July - Kuan Thieu, plans completed and some materials were furnished for the construction of a dam on a dike. This dam would be beneficial to approximately sixty (60) farmers and one hundred (100) acres of rice land.

26 July - Nam O, materials were furnished to repair one (1) well

29 July - Nam O, materials were furnished for the repair of village headquarters.

30 July - Trung Phuoc, completed four (4) toilets.

31 July - Kuan Duong, materials delivered for the construction of one (1) well. There are six (6) wells programmed for this hamlet.

31 July Trung Phuoc, showed movies of a propaganda nature, - 500 people

10. Communications

a. Radio Platoon completed an outside antenna system for the Transportation and Embarkation Section. Whip antennas were installed at 15th Aerial Port and the Deep Water Pier. On 15 July 1967, a radio net operating twenty-four (24) hours daily was established with LSU, Hill 63. On 17 July 1967, one (1) Radio Operator with equipment was provided for LSU Hill 55 to enter the resupply net. Commencing 17 July 1967 daily contact with 3rd Force Service Regiment was attempted on a test basis with intermittent success utilizing Communications Control AN/TSC-15. Pending assignment of clear frequencies, it is anticipated this circuit will become operational during August. Formal instruction in operation of radio set AN/PRC-25 was presented to Supply Battalion and 7th Engineer Battalion. The Radio Platoon continued to provide Radio Operators in support of local security operations.

b. Wire Platoon installed an intercom system at FSA. The existing main frame was cut over to the new switchboard. Kit Carson Mike frame and switchboard were relocated. Nine (9) new circuits or cables were installed. Sixteen (16) extension telephones were removed to provide telephones for LSA. Four hundred (400) tests were made on various circuits and ninety (90) trouble calls answered. CAP Units were rewired and telephones relocated. One (1) extension was installed for the Red Cross. Circuit diagrams were updated and work commenced on the new telephone directory.

c. The Message Center continued operations with an extremely demanding message load. More than 23,000 messages were processed, an increase of 3000 over the previous month. Lack of adequate working space contributed toward unacceptable delay in message handling. Working conditions have been alleviated somewhat by an input of new personnel, increasing strength 20% over the previous month. Two (2) officers are now on board as Communication Watch Officers.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this report, Communication Company continued to provide support to the Red Beach Complex and other FLC Units not physically located at Red Beach.

2. Radio Platoon completed an outside antenna system for the Transportation and Embarkation Section. Whip antennas were installed at 15th Aerial Port and the Deep Water Pier. On 15 July 1967 a radio net operating twenty-four (24) hours daily was established with LSU Hill 63. On 17 July 1967 one (1) Radio Operator with equipment was provided for LSU Hill 55 to enter the resupply net. Commencing 17 July 1967 daily contact with 3rd Force Service Regiment was attempted on a test basis with intermittent success utilizing Communications Control AN/TSC-15. Pending assignment of clear frequencies it is anticipated this circuit will become operational during August. Formal instruction in operation of radio set AN/PNC-25 was presented to Supply Battalion and 7th Engineer Battalion. The Radio Platoon continued to provide Radio Operators in support of local security operations.

3. The Electronics Maintenance Section repaired 101 items of equipment and answered 74 trouble calls for teletypewriter and other equipment. Installation of switchboard AN/TCC-7 was completed on 22 July 1967.

4. Wire Platoon installed an intercom system at FSA. The existing main frame was cut over to the new switchboard. Kit Carson Mike frame and switchboard were relocated. Nine (9) new circuits of cables were installed. Sixteen (16) extension telephones were removed to provide telephones for LSA. Four hundred (400) tests were made on various circuits and ninety (90) trouble calls answered. CAP Units were rewired and telephones relocated. One (1) extension was installed for the Red Cross. Circuit diagrams were updated and work was commenced on the new telephone directory.

5. The Message Center continued operations with an extremely demanding message load. More than 23,000 messages were processed, and increase of 3,000 over the previous month. Lack of adequate working space contributes toward unacceptable delay in message handling. Working conditions have been alleviated somewhat by an influx of new personnel bringing strength up 20% over the previous month and two (2) officers are now on board as Communication Watch Officer.

Lack of proper air conditioning is injurious to equipment as evident by the trouble calls shown in paragraph (3) above. Mr. HAMAMOTO of NAVSECPAC visited the Message Center on 11 July 1967 to assist in establishing internal design of the proposed message center. An overload half-duplex covered circuit with DCS, Danang became operational on 1 July 1967 on an on-call basis. Extensive amounts of fixed plant teletypewriter equipment were received allowing phase-out of field type equipment.

6. Autodin Operations were uneventful except that some new equipment was installed.

No response to this request has been received as of this date. It is felt that timely response to school quota requests would contribute to planned training of communication personnel.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of July the Supply Battalion was visited by the FMFPac Supply Assistance Team for the purpose of evaluating the various methods of supply/accounting operations employed. This team was particularly helpful in the areas of computer run size, receiving/storing and issuing of material.

The month of July saw another substantial increase in the MILSTRIP/MILSTRAP transactions accomplished. Some 499,606 transactions were processed for a 6% increase over the month of June.

The implementation of the "Standard Warehouse Action Ticket" (SWAT) during this reporting period has greatly enhanced the efficiency of document control within the warehousing system.

The Rations Company Bakery increased fresh bread output by 9,675 pounds above the June production 382,053, for a total of 391,728 pounds.

Ammunition Company again surpassed the steadily increasing Class V received/issued tonnage for this year, the average short tons handled per day for the month of July was 1138 S/T.

Two new POL dispensing sites were put into operation during this reporting period, one located at LSA hill #63 and one at the 1st Engineer Battalion Camp.

The 7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company issued 18,865 gallons of drummed POL and 2,106,203 gallons of bulk products. In addition 388,420 pounds of packaged lubricants were handled.

The EOD Platoon made 210 calls, recovered 15,452 explosive items and destroyed 14,752 explosive items. Included were four Russian 122mm Rockets with fuses recovered from the site used in the July 15 attack on the DaNang Air Field.



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The FMFPac Supply Assistance Team has evaluated FSA's operations and methods. Numerous suggestions for decreasing the process time have been offered. A major change has been to restrict the size of a computer run to 30,000 cards. This will produce more runs per month and eliminate the backlog.

During the month of July the DPP was visited by ~~Rear~~^{Vice} Admiral ENSLEY; Rear Admiral SHIFFLEY; Rear Admiral SUTHERLING; BGenerals WALTERS and KENDERDINE.

Also during this month the cement pad and the conduit in front of the building received its first test due to the severe tropical rain storms. The cement pad was satisfactory but the conduit still needs some correction.

Some 499,606 MILSTRIP/MILSTRAP transactions were processed during the month of July.

Civil Affairs has succeeded in raising not only the living conditions of the village of Tiep Cu but also the morale of the villagers. "Self-pride has become a fact instead of fantasy, and the over-all condition of the village is on the upswing.

Also visits were made by the following IBM executives: Mr GILL, head of systems, West Coast and Overseas; Mr FITZPATRICK, head of systems, Far East; Mr WINN, Marketing Representative, Far East; Mr THOMPSON, Marketing Representative, RVN.
 - (2) Major WALKER FMFPac Force Data processing Officer along with Major WALL Data Processing Officer FMFPac (FWD) also visited during July. Areas discussed during the visit were changes in the GSA contract for in-country maintenance, personnel assignments and general rundowns on supply and personnel accounting.
 - (3) The cement pad in the front of the building along with drainage conduit was completed. This received its first real test during the month due to several severe rain storms. The pad appeared satisfactory, however, drainage was not. Water appeared to flow into both sides of the conduit instead of a one way flow. This caused much sand and silt to become entrapped in the conduit and also caused a great deal of undermining. The undermining was corrected by utilizing sand bags to shore the pad and banks of the unfinished portion of the culvert. At present work has again commenced to provide an adequate drainage system.
 - (4) The rain also exposed many other areas wherein water gains entrance into the building. These will require some type of waterproofing or revetment type work to preclude any chance of water damage to the interior of the

building and equipment. These are presently under study and should be corrected prior to the advent of the monsoon.

b. Improving health in the hamlets has been noted as a result of the weekly MEDCAP's. During the MEDCAP's soap is distributed to the people and they are strongly encouraged to use it daily.

c. Land improvement has been noted. People are taking more interest in "self-pride, and improved area clean-up is in evidence. Men have been hired to clean-up the public areas. Films have been shown in Phuoc Tan concerning the importance of sanitation.

d. The health of the animals in the hamlet of Tiep Cu is poor. About two-thirds of the original stock of pigs has died. A veterinarian has been

treating the pigs, but little improvement has been noted. At present it is still not known whether cholera is responsible. The Navy Preventive Medicine Team is setting traps in the village, and they are checking them daily

e. The progress in houses has progressed considerably. Ten more brick duplex houses have been completed, and 20 additional brick houses are presently under construction. Bricks are being made within the village of Tiep Cu. Construction of a public shower has been delayed by the lack of necessary material. However, pumps are on hand and pipes are being purchased so progress should resume shortly. Two more wells have been completed which brings the total number of usable wells to six.

f. Presently, two language classes are being conducted, one in each village. The classes last for one hour each night, Monday through Friday. They have an average attendance of 30 to 40 a night, and maximum interest and attention is rendered.

g. Plans for the future include:

(1) Emphasizing the importance of repairing the outdated heads in the hamlets. Arrangements have been made to flush out the present unsanitary fixtures with water pressure from a fire truck.

(2) Reminding the people of the impending monsoon season, and the delays to construction which it will cause.

h. The relations with the people varied at times during the month of July from fair to excellent, but the overall picture remains friendly and cooperative.

1. On 8 July 1967 the Fleet Marine Force Pacific Supply Operation Assistance Team arrived on board for the purpose of assisting the Command in the preparation for the upcoming General Accounting Officer visit. Working very closely with the Storage section for approximately three weeks, the Team proved extremely helpful in collecting and analyzing data, noting deficiencies and offering constructive criticism and suggestions in the improvement of operations.
2. During the month of July, the responsibility for the administration of the operating budget for Project 20 Funds (Medical Supply) was transferred from the Medical Supply Officer to Officer in Charge of the Central Control Point. This transfer coincided with the mechanization of the Medical Supply during July 1967.
3. The final collection of artifacts of Vietnamese culture for the combat villages at Camp Pendleton were packaged by the Preservation, Packaging and packing platoon during July 1967.
4. During July 1967, the security cage in warehouse #36 was completed. This allowed the release into the transportation system of thirty (30) Conexes which had been used for the storage of security-type items.
5. July 1967 witnessed the striking of all tents used to billet members of Supply Company. The completion of eight (8) tropical huts by the Seabees promised for the improved billeting conditions.
6. Office spaces were provided for Medical Supply with the erection of a new building during July 1967. Valuable storage area previously used for administration can now be returned to its intended function.
- 7.. On 16 July 1967, the Command sent Capt. R.A. COURTEMANCHE 080493, Executive Officer, Supply Company, and Officer in Charge Central Clothing Account, to the Containership Stuffing Conference held under the auspices of WAMTMS at Fort Mason, California. The Ammunition Company had its highest month in history in July averaging 1138 s/tons (2,300,000 lb) daily. ASP#1 received 25,531 s/tons and issued 9639 s/tons for a total of 35,170 s/tons. The dump level at ASP#1 increased 15,297 s/t from 21,970 s/t to 37,187 s/t a 79% increase, 270% over capacity

The EOD Platoon made 210 calls, recovered 15,452 explosive items and destroyed 14,752 explosive items. In addition it destroyed 103,325 rounds of small arms. The EOD Platoon supported Operations Pecos, Buffalo, Crockett, Hickory II Boulder and Stockton. They provided ten personnel for rough rider convoys and recovered four 122mm rockets with fuzes and inerted them.

The Class VA Platoon at the airfield handled 6041 s/t, a daily average of 195 s/tons. In addition they retrograded 200 s/tons of fin crates and bomb pallets.

Thirty one men have been positioned at ASP#2 to provide security for the construction site and string concertina around the perimeter.

The MAERU Team tested and sentenced all C704 (4.2" HE mortar ammunition) held by ASP#1. They determined that 96% of it should be reworked or disposed of by sea dump.
