

PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion (-), Reinforced, 1st Force Service Regiment/Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific provided command, administration, communication, and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command/1st Force Service Regiment and other supporting services to Marine Division/Wing elements of the Third Marine Amphibious Force deployed in the I Corps Area, Republic of Vietnam as depicted in the mission, which included graves registration, fumigation, bath and laundry, air delivery, materials handling, mess, utilities and construction and other logistical services as required in executing additional tasks to include personnel/services, operational supervision and logistical support for two (2) Combined Action Platoons; personnel and supporting services for the operation of the Third Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility; operational supervision and personnel for internal and perimeter security defense of Force Logistic Command units located at Camp Books, Red Beach Complex, Danang.

2. Administration

- a. Normal Command administration prevailed.
- b. Savings Bonds participation within the Battalion continued at more than 90%.

3. Intelligence

a. CAP, Echo-2 has not received information concerning the Viet Cong. The local populace continues with the attitude of turning away from U. S. personnel. The situation at CAP, Echo-3 is different as there is a degree of friendliness between the Marines and the local populace primarily because most of the Vietnamese in these hamlets are refugees.

b. Four detainees were apprehended during the month of August. One of these detainees, a 17 year old boy, admitted to being a Viet Cong when interrogated.

c. An attempt to assassinate the Village Chief of Nam O was made at 2030 on 11 August 1967. An unknown person fired one round and tossed a grenade into a room where the Village Chief and family were located,

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critically wounding the Village Chief, PHAM MAU. He and a soldier were MEDEVAC'd to the hospital ship. His daughter and baby were taken to the Children's Hospital at Camp Books. Mr. MAU is recovering.

d. An assassination attempt was made against the formerly elected village chief of Nam O, LE KAHN, by an unknown person or persons at 2200 on 24 August 1967. A Soviet Czech defensive grenade, type F-1, was thrown but did not explode.

4. Training

a. During the month of August the Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Battalion, inspected the following companies on the dates indicated:

b. A total of 115 Marines fired the M-16 rifle for familiarization, bringing the Battalion percentage to above 95%.

c. Separate schools for staff noncommissioned officers and officers of this Battalion were held dealing with the M-16 rifle.

5. Special Operations

a. On two instances, 7 and 22 August, CAP, Echo-2 found and disarmed M-26 fragmentation grenades rigged as booby traps in the vicinity of MIEU THANG NONG temple.

b. On 7 August 1967 CAP, Echo-2 received SA/AW fire from three (3) different positions by an estimated 8-15 Viet Cong at approximately the same time the Nam O Village Chief was engaged in a fire fight with an estimated squad of Viet Cong who were trying to put up large propaganda banners and distributing leaflets. This resulted in one (1) Viet Cong confirmed KIA and one (1) probable. Four banners were captured, as well as a large amount of Viet Cong propaganda leaflets.

c. On 18 August 1967 a CAP, Echo-2 patrol was taken under fire by an unauthorized Popular Forces ambush positioned in Sub-sector "A" TAOR which resulted in the loss of one sentry dog.

d. There was a total of 138 combat, ambush, reconnaissance and LP type patrols conducted by CAP, Echo-2 and CAP, Echo-3 in Sub-sector "A". Twenty-five additional patrols were conducted by the Camp Books Security Platoon/Provisional Rifle Company.

e. On 24 August, the Aerial Delivery Platoon dropped a rigged weight of 12,720 pounds of ammunition to the Special Forces at Long Vay.

f. On 26 August the Platoon rigged and dropped 23,380 pounds of cargo to the 1st Battalion, 26th Marines. On the same day nine men from the platoon left for Hill 55 to make air drops to the 7th Marines from CH-46 helicopters.

g. On 28 August, the Platoon rigged and dropped a total weight of 60,640 pounds to 1/26.

h. On 29 August, the Platoon rigged and dropped 71,640 pounds to 1/26.

i. On 30 August, the Platoon dropped 95,520 pounds to 1/26.

j. On 31 August, the Platoon dropped 71,640 pounds to 1/26

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k. On 26, 28, and 29 August, a three man recovery team jumped into Khe Sanh to recover all parachutes and platforms used in supporting 1/26.

c. General Wallace M. GREENE Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, visited on 10 August 1967.

d. General Omar BRADLEY, U. S. Army, visited on 22 August 1967.

e. On 25 August 1967 the Fleet Marine Force Inspection Team inspected this Battalion.

7. Equipment

a. The Material Handling Equipment Platoon had an availability rating of over 70% on all heavy equipment for the past month.

b. Continued emphasis on first echelon maintenance and quality second echelon maintenance has resulted in an average availability transportation rating of 91% during the month.

c. Maintenance Platoon processed a total of 420 Tactical Equipment Repair Orders during August 1967.

d. The Electronics Maintenance Section completed 133 work orders and answered 178 trouble calls. A radio receiver, R-388, was installed in the LOC and all equipment in LOC and the Technical Shop was grounded. The section rewired and finished installing all fixed plant teletype equipment in the Communication Center. Technicians were sent to FLSG-A and FLSG-B to help install full duplex teletype circuits.

e. The Wire Platoon answered 114 local trouble reports and completed ten work orders for various telephone services. Sixty-two new 500 type telephones were installed on existing locals and a TOM-10 intercom system was installed in the Danang Press Center. The public address system at Transient Center was relocated and the TOM-20 intercom system in the Force Logistic Command Headquarters was rewired. A new telephone directory was completed and distributed.

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8. Logistics

a. Headquarters and Service Battalion hosted the 8th Battalion, 4th Artillery Regiment, United States Army, from 10 August 1967 to 17 August 1967. Meals, billeting, showers and club facilities were provided. Space was made available for the staging of vehicles and technical assistance was rendered when needed. (See attached brochure "Welcome to Camp Books").

9. Community Relations

a. During the month of August, the Civil Affairs Office, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued its program of SELF-HELP, MEDCAP, and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people in our TAOR. There were continuing donations of food, clothing, soap and other supplies to all the hamlets located in the Headquarters and Service Battalion TAOR.

b. The following events took place in August:

- (1) 5 August - Started construction of Headquarters building for the Popular Forces (HOA KHANH).
- (2) 5 August - Installed one water pump, gas operated (XUAN THIEU).
- (3) 6 August - Installed one water pump, hand operated (NAM O).
- (4) 7 August - Installed three water pumps, gas operated (XUAN THIEU).
- (5) 9 August - Conducted APT operations in XUAN THIEU.
- (6) 12 August - Issued clothing (500 lbs) and school supplies (XUAN THIEU and PHUOC NGHIA).
- (7) 18 August - Spoke to approximately 20 families about CHIEU HOI Return Program.
- (8) 25 August - Issued to hamlets located within Headquarters and Service Battalion TAOR:
 - 300 School Kits
 - 50 Garden Sets
 - 40 Mason Sets
 - Assorted recreation equipment
- (9) 28 August - Movies shown to residents of TRUNG PHUOC - 900 persons present.
- (10) 30 August - Movies shown to residents of XUAN THIEU - 60 persons present.

a. Radio Platoon continued to supply operators for four separate LSA's at AN HOA, Operation Cumberland, Hill 55, and Hill 63. During August the Radio Platoon maintained four separate 24 hour radio nets at Camp Books. During August the Radio Platoon furnished men and equipment for 36 patrols. Communication requirements for visits to the Force Logistic Command by the Commandant of the Marine Corps and General Omar BRADLEY, U. S. Army Retired were fulfilled. Antenna sites were improved at the Force Logistic Command Headquarters by installing three 60 foot poles with mounted antennas. A 55 foot pole with an antenna was installed at Supply Battalion to improve communications on the resupply net. Formal instruction on the AN/PRC-25 radio was given by the Radio Platoon to approximately 80 officers and staff noncommissioned officers of Supply Battalion.

b. The Message Center Platoon continued 24 hour operations with an extremely heavy message load. Approximately 19,000 messages were processed, a slight decrease over the previous month due to a minimized condition imposed during the last week of August. Working conditions were alleviated somewhat by the transfer on 1 August of the reproduction and distribution responsibilities to the adjutant section. This released more space and personnel for Communication Center use.

- a. The MARS Station completed 886 phone patches and sent 282 MARSGRAMS.
- b. The laundry processed 73,390 pounds of clothing.
- c. The Transient Facility billeted 33,133 personnel during the month and a total of 62,521 meals were served during the same period.
- d. The Transient Facility processed a 369 man Surface Draft on 1 and 2 August. Shots were given, baggage was inspected and all persons requiring 604 forms were issued them.
- e. The Graves Registration Platoon received and processed a total of 363 remains.

The situation at CAP Echo-3 area is different and there is a degree of friendliness between the Marines and the local populace primarily because most of the Vietnamese in these hamlets are refugees.

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b. Four (4) detainees apprehended during the month of August. One of these detainees a 17 year old boy admitted being a VC when interrogated by C.I.

c. Assassination attempt was made against formerly elected (V) Chief of NAM O "Le CAHN" by an unknown person or persons on 242200 H August 1967. Attempt was made with a grenade that turned out to be a dud of the Soviet 1 Czech defensive grenade type F-1.

4. Training

a. Periodic barracks inspections were conducted during this period, and a detailed barracks inspection was conducted by the Battalion Commander on 19 August 1967.

d. There was a total of 138 combat, ambush, reconnaissance, and LP type patrols conducted by CAP E-2 and CAP E-3 in Sub Sector "A". And additional patrols were conducted by the Camp Books Security/Provisional Rifle Company which amounted to 25 additional patrols.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this report, Communication Company continued to provide support to the Red Beach Complex and other FLC Units not physically located at Red Beach.

2. Radio Platoon continued to supply operators for four (4) separate LSA's: An Hoa, Operation Cumberland, Hill 55, and Hill 63. During August the Radio Platoon maintained four (4) separate 24 hour radio nets at Camp Books. During August, the Radio Platoon furnished men and equipment for 36 patrols. Communication requirements for visits to FLC by CMC and Gen. Omar BRADLEY, W. S. A. (RET) were fulfilled. Antenna sites were improved at FLC Headquarters by installing three 60 ft poles with mounted antennas. A 55 ft pole with an antenna was installed at Supply Bn. to improve communications on the resupply net. Formal instruction on the AN/PRC-25 Radio was given by the Radio Platoon to approximately 80 Officers and SNCO's of Supply Bn.

3. The Electronics Maintenance Section completed 133 work orders and answered 178 trouble calls. A Radio Receiver R-388 was installed in the LOC and all equipment in the LOC and the Tech Shop was grounded. The section re-wire and finished installing all Fixed-Plant Teletype Equipment in the Comm Center. Technicians were sent to FLSG-B and FLSG-A to help install full Duplex Teletype Circuits.

4. The Wire Platoon answered 114 local trouble reports and completed 10 work orders for various telephone service. Sixty-two new 500 type telephone were installed on existing locals and a TOM-10 intercomm system was installed in the Danang Press Center. The Public Address System at the Transient Center was relocated and the TOM-20 intercomm system in FLC Headquarters was re-wired. A new Telephone Directory was completed and distributed.

5. The Message Center Platoon continued 24 hour operations with an extremely heavy message load. Approximately 19,000 messages were processed, a slight decrease over the previous month due to a minimize condition imposed during the last week of August. Working conditions were alleviated somewhat by the transfer on 1 August of the reproduction and distribution responsibilities to the adjutant section. This released more space and personnel for Comm Center use.





NARRATIVE SUMMARY

General Wallace M. GREENE, Commandant of the Marine Corps and General Omar BRADLEY, U. S. Army (Retired) visited Supply Battalion during the month of August on an inspection tour of Vietnam based units.

A substantial increase, a total of 655,571 MILSTRIP/MILSTRAP transactions, were processed during this reporting period. Since conversion to this system in May 1967, the output per month has increased an average of 6.5% per month.

On 15 August 1967 the operational control of the Central Control Point MC100 was transferred to the jurisdiction of Commanding General, Force Logistic Command. Administrative responsibilities remain with the Commanding Officer, Supply Battalion.

The Preservation, Packaging and Packing Platoon prepared a record 19,500 items for shipment, assembled 3,900 shipping containers and redesigned the standard 16, 27 and 50 cubic foot shipping containers to reduce the amount of offal materials to a minimum.

Augmentation personnel from the Ninth Marine Amphibious Brigade are assisting in moving and relocating the open storage materiel. The lots, once cleared, will be hard-topped by the Seabees. Additionally two new butler type building complexes will be erected for covered storage.

The Ration Company Bakery reached an all time high in the production (437,389 pounds) of fresh bread. During the month of August this is an increase of 45,661 pounds over the July production and 55,336 over the month of June.

The Ammunition Company moved 35,028 S/T in August, averaging 1130 S/Tons (2,260,000 lbs) daily. ASP #1 received 14,678 S/Tons and issued 20,350 S/Tons. In addition 77 S/Tons were moved from ASP #1 to ASP #2. During the first eight months of 1967, ASP #1 handled 190,232 S/Tons of Class V compared with 48,513 S/Tons handled in the first eight months of 1966, a 292% increase.

The EOD platoon made 194 calls, recovered 2,995 explosive items in addition to the recovery of 208 short tons of explosive items from the Phu Bai incident; all were destroyed by EOD.

904,723 round of small arms ammunition also were destroyed. EOD supported operations Pecos and Stockton during August and provided four men for Rough Rider Convoy duty for a period of two days. Two EOD personnel were wounded in action (WIA) on 21 August while working in the First Marines TAOR. Master Sergeant Peter BUCCOLIERO who was treated at the NSA Hospital and returned to duty on 24 August, was subsequently awarded the Purple Heart Medal by the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command on 27 August 1967. Gunnery Sergeant Russell W. CURTIS was MEDEVAC to USNH Oakland California for traumatic amputation of both arms suffered under heroic circumstances.

A new bulk fuel site, located at hill number 10, became operative during the month of August. This new site has a capacity of 10,000 gallons mogas and 10,000 diesel. Products received/issued during this reporting period are as follows:

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The Ammunition Company moved 35,028 s/T in August averaging 1130 s/tons (2,260,000 lbs) daily. ASP #1 received 14,678 s/tons and issued 20,350 s/tons. In addition 77 s/tons were moved from ASP #1 to ASP #2. During the first eight months of 1967, ASP #1 handled 190,232 s/tons of Class V compared with 48,513 s/tons handled in the first eight months of 1966, a 292% increase. The dump level at ASP #1 decreased 5,672 s/tons from 37,187 to 31,515 s/tons, a 15% decrease. However the dump remains 215% over capacity.

The EOD platoon made 194 calls, recovered 2,995 explosive items in addition to the recovery of 208 short tons of explosive items from the Phu Bai incident. Explosive items destroyed, 2,995 in addition to the destruction of the 208 tons from Phu Bai. 904,723 rounds of small arms were destroyed during the reporting period. EOD supported Operations Pecos and Stockton during August and provided four (4) men for Rough Rider convoy duty for a period of two (2) days. Two EOD personnel were WIA on 21 August, in the 1st Marines TAOR. Master Sergeant Peter A. BUGCOLIERO who was treated at NSA Hospital and returned to duty on 24 August and subsequently awarded the Purple Heart Medal by CG, FLC on 27 August 1967. Gunnery Sergeant Russell W. CURTIS was MedEvaced to USNE, Oakland, California for traumatic amputation of both arms.

The Class VA platoon at the airfield handled 9,848 s/tons, a daily average of 318 s/tons. In addition they retrograded 116 s/tons of fin crates and bomb pallets.

Twenty two men are positioned as ASP #2 to provide security for the 77 s/tons of Class V stored there, the construction site and string concertina around the perimeter.

The MAERU team tested and sentenced 81mm HE and WP finding 15 lots serviceable and 9 unserviceable; 60mm HE, WP, ILLUM finding 3 serviceable and 13 unserviceable;

90mm HE-T, 9 lots serviceable; 105mm EE, ILLUM, 11 lots serviceable, 3 unserviceable. Ammunition reconditioned by MAERU; 4.2" HE C704-480 rds. Reconditioning consists of replacement of booster and complete ignition system, removal of rust; repainting and restenciling, and repacking. MAERU prepared 45.6 s/tons of ammunition for Deep Water Dump. Sixteen (16) Marines and one 6000 lb R forklift with driver are assigned to MAERU operations on a permanent basis from ASP #1.
