2. Administration

a. Normal Command administration prevailed.

b. Savings Bonds participation within the Battalion continued at more than 90%.

3. Intelligence

a. During the month of September intelligence information concerning the V. C. has not been volunteered in the CAP Echo-2 area of responsibility. The attitude towards CAP personnel of the local populace during the early part of the month of September was poor. This was primarily due to the elections, the arrival of a new Corpsman, and an increase in V. C. activity early in the month. The attitude of the local population had greatly improved by the end of the month.

b. There was one detainee apprehended during the month of September by CAP Echo-3. Eight detainees were apprehended by a patrol from the Provisional Rifle Company, and turned over to the 5th CIT. The results of the interrogation are unknown at this time. These detainees were picked up after a fire fight on the 28th of September in which a patrol from the Provisional Rifle Company had pursued the V. C. to the general vicinity of the house in which the people were apprehended.

4. Training

a. During the month of September the Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Battalion, inspected the following companies on the dates indicated:

Communication Company - 9 September 1967

These inspections consisted of personnel and billeting areas.

b. A total of 25 Marines fired the M-16 rifle for familiarization, bringing the Battalion percentage to above 96%.

5. Special Operations

a. On the morning of 2 September this base was attacked by V. C. rocket fire. Little damage was done to this battalion's area. That night and for three nights thereafter the perimeter defense was harrassed by sniper fire. Limited work was accomplished because of the harrassing fire and necessity to occupy the perimeter defense on a 24 hour basis.

8. Logistics. The Headquarters and Service Battalion hosted the 515th and 543rd Transportation Companies, United States Army, from 22 September through 28 September 1967. Meals, billeting, showers and Club facilities were provided. Space was made available for the staging of vehicles and technical assistance was rendered where required. Standard brochure "Welcome to Camp Books" was utilized in orienting all visiting Army personnel.

9. Community Relations

a. During the month the Civil Affairs Office continued its program of Self-Help, Med Cap and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people in our TAOR.

b. The following events took place:

(1) On 6-20 September, the people of Da Phuoc hamlet were relocated to the hamlets of Phoc Nghia and Phouc Quang.

(2) On 6-20 September, 36 families from the west perimeter of Red Beach compound were relocated.

(3) On 8 September, one (1) dam was completed in Xuen Thieu, which will benefit approximately 30 families. Work has been started on the repair of another dam.

(4) On 14 September, cash funds were distributed to Catholic refugees of the relocated Da Phuoc hamlet by Chaplain VOLZ.

(5) On 8 September, 6 toilets were completed in Trung Phuoc there are 6 toilets under construction at present.

(6) On 15 September, 27 General Walt Scholarships were distributed to needy children, having high scholastic standings. All hamlets under H&S Battalion area of responsibility were included

(7) On 18-19 September, candy and children's favors were distributed to all children in schools, under H&S Battalion area of responsibility in celebration of the Vietnamese Mid-Autumn Festival.

(8) On 20 September, 25 solatium payments were made to individuals whose homes were damaged by **friendly** fires during the period of 1-5 September.

(9) On 26 September, one (1) well was built and another repaired at Nam-O.

5. Special Operations

a. Since the rocket attack of 2 September 1967 the security section has discontinued its patrolling activities. Bunkers number 27 and 19A have been built, and wire is continued to be layed on the perimeter.

b. On 29 September 1967 a patrol from CAP Echo-2 observed 3 V.C. moving in the MIEU THACH SON area. Forty to fifty rounds of small arms was fired with negative results and there was no fire returned by the V.C. The area was also searched producing negative results.

c. During the month of September there was a total of 197 combat/ambush/reconnaissance and L.P. patrols conducted by CAP Echo-2 and CAP Echo-3 in Sub Sector "A" augmented by patrols from the Provisional Rifle Company from Camp Books.

Also, they are giving assistance to families who were displaced from the hamlet of DA PHOUC. Construction of the MEDCAP building next to the HOA KHANH (V) Headquarters has not been started as yet.

d. On 18 September 1967 Children's Day, Marines and P.F.'s from CAP Echo-2 and Echo-3 visited schools and homes in their areas of responsibility giving gifts to the children. GVN Armed Propaganda Teams (CHIEU HOI) have been working in CAP Echo-2 and Echo-3 areas.

e. No problems have been encountered in promoting Civic Action or pacification at this time.

f. To further Civic Action/pacification efforts, the respective CAP's have been holding village elders meetings. The technique used to further civic action activities gives the villagers a feeling of pride in their community and a desire to better themselves.

Narrative Summary

At 0100 on 2 September the FLC Complex at Red Beach came under a rocket attack by enemy forces. The majority of twenty-five 122mm and 140mm rocket hits in the Camp Books area impacted within the confines of the Supply Battalion area.

Considering the number of rounds fired the results were most effective as evidenced by the following damage assessment:

a. Rations Warehouse (Butler): Holed by direct hit requiring replacement of overhead beams and top sheeting of one quarter section of one Butler Building.

b. Personnel Office (Quonset): End caved in requiring considerable straightening and refurbishing.

c. Three SEA Huts (Quarters): Ends and/or siding torn up requiring replacement.

d. Class II Warehouse (Butler): Six side panels blown off requiring replacement.

e. Fire in the Class II, IV open storage lot. See enclosure (7).

f. Casualties sustained by Supply Battalion were one KIA and fifty-six WIA.

Lieutenant General Victor H. KRULAK, CG, FMFPac visited the Force Logistic Command on 3 September 1967.

The Self-Service Store facility at Red Beach ceased operations on 23 September as a result of an Inter-Service Supply Support Agreement with the Naval Support Activity, DaNang. All units of III MAF will utilize the NSA Serv-Mart to procure selected consumable items of supply. The Operations Officer of Supply Company, Supply Battalion has been designated as the Force Logistic Command Coordinator for matters pertaining to Marine Corps of the Serv-Mart. In addition to the one Officer, Supply Company provides one Staff NCO and one NCO to act as liaison personnel.

The Rations Company Bakery increased the production of fresh bread during this reporting period to an all time high of 500,052 lbs. This represents an increase of 62,663 lbs above the August production and 108,324 lbs over the July figures. This accomplishment was in response to the requirement for Supply Battalion's Bakery to provide support to

FLSU-ONE's bakery which was destroyed by fire during an enemy artillery attack on Dong Ha in August. The Supply Battalion Bakery went to a twenty-four hour, three shift work day to meet this increased work load and is presently working on this same schedule.

Supply Battalion's Ammunition Company handled 30,070 s/t of munitions during September averaging 1,002 s/t (2,004,000 lbs) daily. ASP #1 received 9,568 s/t and issued 20,502 s/t to using units. In addition, 95 s/t were moved from ASP #1 to new storage facilities at ASP #2 raising the total tonnage of ammunition stored at ASP #2 to 172 s/t. Records for the first nine months of 1967 reveal the Ammunition Company's records reflect 58,823 s/t moved, an increase of over 160,000 s/t.

The EOD Platoon made 183 calls, recovering 1,984 explosive items and in addition, destroyed 1,211 individual hazardous items. As a result of enemy artillery activities which destroyed the ASP at Dong Ha, the EOD Platoon personnel destroyed 276 s/t of Grade III ammunition there. 5,121 small arms rounds were destroyed as well as rendering safe four 140mm rockets for III MAF. EOD personnel participated in operations Cumberland, Swift, Ballistic Shot, Kingfisher, and four men were provided for rough rider convoy duty. Five EOD personnel were WIA at Dong Ha during September.

During September the 7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company Conducted normal receiving, dispensing and shuttling operations for Bulk fuel products. Due to combat loss of the bulk fuel system at Dong Ha, one Amphibious Assault Fuel System was repositioned there to replace it. One man from Bulk Fuel Company was WIA while participating as a patrol member at Red Beach.



b. Due to the posting of a bunker watch it has been necessary to establish a Company Duty NCO watch. This watch is two fold. It insures that the bunker watches are awake and alert. It also provides security for the Company Office and has a responsible person to receive frost calls etc. The Duty NCO's tour of duty is from 1700 until 0800 daily. His duties consist of holding taps at 2230 and from then until 0500 he checks the bunker watch every hour on the hour.

c. At the present time H&S Company has only one person filling the MOS billet of 0141. There is a requirement for Two (2) 0141 and 3041 to act as Company Clerks, one Corporal for Company Training NCO and a Gunnery Sergeant for Company Gunny.

(2) Area clean-up shows little improvement in the last month. Additional workers are hired to keep sanitation improvements.

(3) Vietnamese scholarships were distributed during September. Fifteen individuals received 500VN\$ each to continue their education. Funds have been received for October and are ready for distribution again.

e. Problem areas.

(1) Storage. Over 20 bags of rolled oats were ruined, due to bad storage area. Each bag is valued at approximately \$7.00. Cooking oil is left in open storage, and as a result we suspect, due to losses, the free-samples are being taken by indigenous personnel. Sixty bags of cement were stolen along with some good lumber from the temporary warehouse in Tiep Cu.

(2) Attitudes of People. Approaching the end of the month, the attitude of the people has changed considerably. The sense of fear is noticed in the people by Civic Action personnel. Reports have been heard regarding VC activity in the area. On 29 September 1967 one man was apprehended by the PF Company Commander, with the assistance of the Civil Affairs team, and was taken to District Headquarters for confinement.

1. During the period covered by this report, Communication Company continued to provide support to the Red Beach complex and other FLC units not physically located at Red Beach.
2. Radio Platoon supplied operators for three (3) ISA's and a temporary LSA. During September, the Radio Platoon maintained eight (8) radio nets. The platoon furnished operators and equipment for 40 patrols. Communication requirements for a visit to FLC by LtGen. KRULAK were fulfilled. A program was initiated to improve grounds on antennas in Camp Books. A Radio bunker was constructed by Radio Platoon. Formal instruction on the PRC-25 radio was given by the Radio Platoon to members of the Bulk Fuel Co. Radio Platoon provided an NCO School to Supply Battalion for instruction on the PRC-6, 10, and 25 radios.
3. The Electronics Maintenance Section completed 58 work orders and answered 185 trouble calls during September. Technicians replaced 60 bad cord circuits on the AN/TCC-7 Switchboard and completed rewiring of the Message Center. Three (3) pieces of teletype equipment were sent to Third Marine Division on temporary loan. Technicians were sent to FLSG-A and FLSG-B to assist in teletype and autodin repair.
4. During the month of September, the Wire Platoon repaired all cables in Camp Books damaged by the rocket attack on 2 Sep. Approximately 85% of all communications cables in Camp Books were damaged in the attack. 125 local troubles were repaired. Installation began on a 20 party intercomm system for H&S Bn, 11 new subscribers were added to the Pitchblend board. Five (5) telephones were relocated. Eight (8) new communication circuits were added and three (3) deactivated. A new telephone directory was prepared for 1 Oct distribution.

The dump level at ASP#1 decreased 8475 s/tons from 31,515 to 23,040 s/tons, a 26% decrease. However the dump remains 130% over capacity.

On 11 September this Company suffered three (3) personnel killed and seven (7) wounded as a result of detonating two anti-personnel mines in the security minefield on the perimeter of ASP#1. Three personnel entered the minefield at approximately 1940, 11 September 1967, for unknown reasons, detonating a M-16 anti personnel mine wounding two (TRAVIS, TOMLINSON) seriously with minor wounds to the third (GILSTRAP). As the Rescue Party attempted to remove the last man from the minefield, seven additional personnel were wounded, two fatally (TRAVIS, SWANHART), four with serious wounds (GILSTRAP, SOJO, BISHOP, FLOURNOY) and three with minor wounds. (DRENNAN, SADLER, SEARLES). A formal investigation is being conducted into the possible misconduct of the original three (TRAVIS, TOMLINSON, GILSTRAP) men who entered the minefield resulting in the deaths of (TRAVIS, TOMLINSON, and SWANHART) and the wounding of (SOJO, BISHOP, FLOURNOY, GILSTRAP, DRENNAN, SEARLES, and SADLER).

The EOD Platoon made 183 calls, recovering 1964 explosive items and destroying 1211 items plus another 276 s/tons as a result of the Dong Ha incident. 5121 rounds of small arms were destroyed during the reporting period. EOD supported operations
