b. Meals, Billeting, showers and club facilities were provided for all visiting units. Space was made available for staging of vehicles and technical assistance was rendered when needed.

9. Community Relations.

a. During the month of November, the Civil Affairs Office, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued its program of SELF-HELP, MEDCAP, and other projects assigned to assist the Vietnamese people in our Tactical Area of Responsibility (TAOR).

b. The following events took place:

(1) On 1 November 1967, held an Independence Day celebration at the Hoa Khanh Village Compound. Civil Affairs distributed five (5) bags of rice, eleven (11) boxes of clothing and seventy (70) cans of cooking oil to thirty-five (35) needy families.

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(2) On 6 November 1967, conducted an Armed Propaganda Team Operation in Xuan Thieu and Mieu Thach Son. The team members contacted fifty-six (56) families considered to be Viet Cong Sympathizers, and distributed leaflets in the area.

(3) On 6 November 1967, repairs to two (2) wells in Xuan Thieu were completed.

(4) On 8 November 1967, dedicated the newly completed Hoa Hiep Village Headquarters Building.

(5) On 10 November 1967, distributed forty-eight (48) school kits to the children of Xuan Thieu Grade School.

(6) On 14 November 1967, the small foot-bridge was completed in Xuan Thieu. This bridge will allow easier and safer access to the Nam-O Market.

(7) On 15 November 1967, repairs were started on a hamlet well in Xuan Duong.

(8) On 16 November 1967, distributed ten (10) carpenter kits, four (4) garden kits and two (2) well pumps to the Xuan Thieu and Mieu Thach Son area.

(9) On 17 November 1967, completed and dedicated a new school at Da Phuoc (Gate # 14 Area). This school will service approximately seventy (70) students from this hamlet.

(10) On 17 November 1967, delivered 100 school kits to the children at the new Da Phuoc School.

(11) On 21 November 1967, began work on a pig farm located in Da Phuoc. This barn area will improve sanitation and aid the economy of the hamlet.

(12) On 21 November 1967, the Xuan Duong MED-CAP aid Station was completed. This all brick and cement structure will provide a sheltered area to conduct MED-CAP in.

(13) On 24 November 1967, completed Buddhist Shrine in Xuan Thieu.

(14) On 27 November 1967, ceased all work on Schoolmasters House in Hoa Khanh due to internal disagreement by the Vietnamese.

(15) During the month of November Civil Affairs hauled 1500 brick to the site of the new Children's Hospital.

(16) During the month of November, Civil Affairs distributed 120 cases of pig food and twenty (20) pounds of vegetable seed to the various hamlets in our TAOR

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this report, Communication Company continued to provide support for the Red Beach Complex and other FLC units not physically located at Red Beach.

2. RADIO PLATOON: During the month of November, the Radio Platoon provided operators and equipment for three(3) twenty-four (24) hour radio nets: the FLC Command Net, FLC Tactical Net, and the Logistics Net to the LSU at An Hoa. A detachment of men and equipment from this platoon is operating at the An Hoa LSU. During the month, radio communications were made daily to Okinawa via an AN/TSC 15 Van to provide telephone service for the FLC switchboard.

Communications Equipment was provided for the traffic control net at T&E, and for nets at Truck Company, HOD, Bulk Fuel, and three (3) CAP units. Radio Platoon provided operators and equipment for approximately sixty (60) patrols and ambushes and all truck convoys originating from H&S Battalion to Phu Bai/Dong Ha and An Hoa.

A dismounted MRC 109 (RT524 and R442) was installed in an M54 to provide better safety features for Convoy Commander and Communications on convoys to An Hoa.

In addition, operators were provided to the Provisional Rifle Company, Truck Company and the FLC NCO School to provide instruction in operation and first echelon preventative maintenance of the AN/PRC-25 and AN/PRC-10.

3. MAINTENANCE PLATOON: Recently redesignated from Tech Shop, a portion of Headquarters Section, all personnel with MOS's in occupational field 28 were grouped into the Maintenance Platoon. During the month, a total of 169 work orders were processed and 294 trouble calls answered.

4. WIRE PLATOON: During the month of November the Wire Platoon answered 152 local and 57 trunk trouble calls, and completed 18 requests for installation or relocation of service. A switchboard SB-22/PT was installed in Communication Company Operations. Also a 100 pr. telephone cable was terminated in the FLC headquarters and all cables from FLC headquarters to FLC frame with the exception of the one hundred pair are now being removed and salvaged. A general policing of the Camp Wire System continues.

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5. COMMUNICATION CENTER PLATOON: Twenty-four hour operation of both narrative teletype and data circuits continued. Traffic count for November follows:

Construction on the new Communication Center has been completed and interim work is in the process. Asphalt tile for the floor has been obtained and is awaiting completion of the interior painting. Acoustical tile (3000 Sq. ft.) has been requisitioned for the ceiling. Actual occupancy is expected 1 January 1968.

Engineers from NAVSEEAPAC have arrived in country and are upgrading the Alpha and Bravo Data Circuits from 10 cards per minute 066/068 to 100 cards per minute IBM 1013. At the same time, both circuits will be cleared for classified traffic, which they are not at the present. In conjunction with this, FLC will upgrade it's Nha Trang circuit using a UNIVAC 1004.

6. OPERATIONS SECTION: The concept of the Section has expanded with the writing of the new SOP. All operational commitments, supply matters, T/E, T/O, and training will be controlled here as well as acting as a facility control center for circuit restoration.

## PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During November, augmentation personnel from the Third Force Service Regiment, 9th MAB and FMFPac continued their efforts by completely rewarehousing and inventorying all assets on lots number 60 and 700. This effort resulted in an estimated inventory gain of 2500 line items and eliminated all unidentified items in these two lots. The TAD period of 9th MAB personnel ended on 15 November, 1967; their return to their parent command will cause a slowdown in the rewarehousing program.

The backlog Issue Mat Assistance Teams (BLIMAT) terminated their TAD on 19 November 1967, after successfully aiding the Supply Company in reducing the number of backlogged issue mats to approximately 7,000. It is estimated that the backlog of issue mats would have been in the range of 40,000 to 45,000 had BLIMATS not been implemented.

A receipts section was formed in Supply Company to perform the mission of receipting for all incoming shipments through a central control point where they would be RPR'd and then moved to a location. This action has resulted in a more positive control of incoming shipments. The receipts section presently consists of one (1) officer and forty-one (41) enlisted Marines with an anticipated T/O of one (1) officer and sixty (60) enlisted Marines.

On November 11th project "Excess" commenced full operations. Project "Excess" was instituted within Supply Company to identify, tag and locate by proper location, certain unidentifiable items of supply, consisting of Motor Transport, Ordnance, Communication-Electronics, Engineer and General Supply items previously unidentified or improperly located. Project "Excess" was staffed by twenty-four (24) technical research personnel TAD from III MAF units and supplemented by eight (8) marines of the receipt section and one (1) marine from PP&P's surveillance team. With the aid of gasoline lanterns and a flood light unit along with the availability of one of the new warehouses, this "Excess" crew has worked 24 hours a day to identify, separate by commodity and locate 11,725 items. The processed items were returned to stock and many have since been issued to units in the field.

During the month of November 1967, ten convoys, termed "Rough Riders", departed Supply Battalion as follows:

3 November 1967 - 66 trucks bound for Phu Bai and Dong Ha with 316,000 lbs. of cargo.

6 November 1967 - 84 trucks bound for Phu Bai with 644,000 lbs. of cargo.

7 November 1967 - 30 trucks bound for Dong Ha with 128,000 lbs. of cargo.

10 November 1967 - 50 trucks bound for Phu Bai and Dong Ha with 397,989 lbs. of cargo.

13 November 1967 - 61 trucks bound for Dong Ha with 185,475 lbs. of cargo.

15 November 1967 - 69 trucks bound for Phu Bai with 392,921 lbs. of cargo.

19 November 1967 - 50 trucks bound for Phu Bai with 190,000 lbs. of cargo.

20 November 1967 - 4 trucks bound for An Hoa with 15,000 lbs. of cargo.

24 November 1967 - 52 trucks bound for Phu Bai and Khe Sanh with 444,448 lbs. of cargo.

29 November 1967 - 52 trucks bound for Phu Bai and Dong Ha with 145,585 lbs. of cargo.

Two new pieces of machinery were added to the Supply Battalion inventory and a key punch machine relocated during this period which has materially assisted in increasing our productivity. At PP&P, a vapor degreaser was installed to be utilized in the cleaning phase of preservation and packing. A gravity roller system was installed to connect the cleaning line to the packing area. A key punch machine was installed in the Shipping & Receiving Section to consolidate proof of shipment reports. Due to the relocation of the machine the backlog of Z7A cards (Proof of Shipment) has decreased.

The Rations Company Bakery averaged a daily production of 13,778 pounds of bread for the month of November, which is a slight reduction from last month.

Ammunition Company received and issued 27,494 S/T in November averaging 917 S/T daily. ASP #1 received 14,251 S/T and issued 13,243 S/T. During the first eleven (11) months of 1967 ASP #1 shipped and received 271,642 S/T compared to 76,560 S/T handled during the same period of 1966. The dump level at ASP #1 decreased 1,530 S/T from 17,815 S/T to 16,258 S/T of which 15,836 S/T are USMC assets and 449 S/T are U. S. Army assets.

Narrative Summary

1. During the month of November 1967, this command was visited by the WestPac G-4 Officer, Colonel M. M. BLUE.
2. One (1) vapor degreaser was installed in the Preservation, Packaging, and Packing Plant. This item is of the utmost importance in the cleaning phase in preservation and packing.
3. A gravity roller system was installed in PP&P also, and this new system has formed a solid "S" shaped connection from the cleaning line to the packing area.
4. The Receipts section was formed on 1 Nov 1967 by extracting personnel assigned to the Receiving Section of the Storage Section, Supply Company. The Receipts Section consists of one (1) officer and forty one (41) enlisted Marines, with an anticipated attainment of one (1) officer and sixty (60) enlisted Marines.
5. A key punch machine was installed in the Shipping & Receiving Section to consolidate proof of shipment reports. Due to the relocation of the machine a backlog of Z7A cards (proof of shipment) has steadily decreased.
6. Project-"Excess" was in full operation on 11 November due to the arrival of the technical research personnel taken from various units within the III MAF.
7. This project was instituted due to an excess rollback accumulation of five (5) months material coming in from the using units in the field.
8. Twenty four members formed the nucleus of the program and were supplemented by eight members of Supply Company's Receipt Section and one member of PP&P's Surveillance Team.
9. With the aid of gasoline lanterns and a flood light unit along with the availability of one of the new warehouses this "Excess" crew worked day and night to identify, separate by commodity and locate items.
10. During November, 11,725 items were processed from an estimated 16,000 line items. These processed items were returned to the supply system and many have since been issued to units in the field.

11. The Korean Fork Lift contract was renewed for a 6 month period on a month to month basis.

12. During the month of November 1967 ten convoys of "Rough Riders" departed this complex as follows:



Also 5,000 \$VN was donated to the ister of the Orphanage. This party was sponsored and paid for by several Marines from Force Logistic Command.

(8) On 23 December 1967, completed arrangements with local Officials to move 12 graves from new M. C. B. construction site.
