5. Special Operations

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted fifty-two (52) night patrols ambushes, listening posts patrols.

(1) Twenty-six (26) day patrols were conducted resulting in the capture of three (3) draft dodgers who were turned over to 5th CIT.

(2) On the evening of 14 June 1968 FLC received five (5) rounds of 122 mm rocket fire. Resulting in one (1) KIA and a fire caused by a damaged fuel line.

(3) At 0528 on 15 June 1968 FLC received ten (10) rounds of 122mm rocket fire resulting in destruction of the H&S Battalion S-3/4 shop. There were no KIA's or WIA's.

b. Defensive Construction

(1) Five (5) U-shaped machine gun emplacements have been completed and are being used each night. Work continues to complete the rest of the machine gun position. Work has been completed on alining and filling barrels between post #2 and post #5 to make a defensive berm. Five 60mm mortar positions have been reworked. Aiming stakes, utilizing 8 ft. engineer stakes have been set out on each mortar positions plotting boards have been completed for each position are in use in the OOC.

(2) Rearangement of the OOC has been completed, and the first test of the new set up occurred on 14 and 15 June, with the resulting improvement in efficiency and operations.

(3) 2000 meters of triple concertina and 1000 meters of double apron barbed wire fence has been laid. Work will continue in July on the wire for the new perimeter.



- l. 16 June 1968- Completed repairs to one (1) well in Xuan Duong hamlet.
- m. 18 June 1968- Showed cartoons and propaganda movies for 2½ hours to approximately 400 people of Trung Phuoc hamlet.
- n. 19 June 1968- Started construction work on the Sergeant PREZIOZI memorial school in Xuan Duong hamlet. This school will be built by donations received from family and friends in East Paterson, New Jersey.
- o. 19 June 1968- Distributed 15 boxes (approximately 100 lbs) of clothing to the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage. Three (3) boxes of toys were included in the distribution.
- p. 27 June 1968- Started work on a well survey for all hamlets in our Civil Affairs area of responsibility. This survey will show the status of the present well system and where assistance is needed.
- q. 28 June 1968- Distributed approximately 300 lbs. of clothing to families of Phuoc Nghia hamlet.



5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

a. From 3 June to 5 June 1968, three (3) parachute riggers from Air Delivery Platoon were sent to the 5th Special Forces, Mobile Strike Force, Detachment B, to rig aircraft, hold parachute rigger checks, and to repack personnel parachutes for the Vietnamese Jump School. A total of 200 successful parachute jumps were made during this parachute qualification class.

b. From 7 June to 9 June 1968, a detail of eight (8) parachute riggers were sent to Hill #10 in support of the 26th Marines. During that time the personnel of this unit dropped a total of 2,614 pounds of supplies, vital to the success of operation Mame-luke Thrust.

c. On 13 June 1968, the 1st Air Delivery Platoon conducted a parachute proficiency jump at Red Beach. Thirty six personnel participated in the jump.

d. On 17 June 1968, the 1st Air Delivery Platoon presented a briefing and tour in the Air Delivery Area to Major J. S. KENDALL of the Australian Army, (Airborne)

e. On 24 June 1968, two (2) men from the 1st Air Delivery Platoon were sent as technical advisors to An Hoa to assist the 7th Marines in resupply missions.

Radio sites at ASP-1 and ASP-2 moved to new locations with the installation at ASP-1 being 40% complete. Communication with FLSG-Bravo continues to be sporadic while the LOC is being remodelled. Primary cause is the lack of an adequate antenna system.

Radio Nets maintained include the FLC Command and Tactical Nets (24 hours a day), Alternate CG Bunker Net (10 hours), Supply Battalion Net (15 hours), FLC/Okinawa Net (13 hours), the Red Beach Sector Defense Net (24 hours), the Landing Zone Common Net. Operators and equipment were supplied for 75 patrols, 30 augmentation guard call outs and 58 convoys.

b. During June, the Maintenance Platoon continued to provide a repair point and give technical assistance for Communication Company. Radio, telephone, teletype/crypto, and IBM technicians completed 388 trouble calls and processed 250 work orders. Telephone technicians connected and activated two telephone dial lines to the Chu Lai Dial Central Office and one dial line to Maintenance Battalion. IBM technicians assisted the IBM Customer Engineers in the installation and activation of the IBM 360/20 data comm system within the Comm Center.

MGYSGT QUEEN - OPERATIONS MAINTENANCE CHIEF

Master Gunnery Sergeant Alvie J. Queen was born in Duquoin, Ill., on 22 September 1917. He worked as a farmer, coal miner and auto mechanic in Pinkneyville, Ill., before joining the Marine Corps in August 1940.

He received his recruit training at MCRD, San Diego, Calif., and upon completion he was assigned to Marine Guard Co., Bremerton Navy Yard, in Washington State. He travelled from Long Beach to Bremerton on the Battleship Arizona, which was later sunk in Pearl Harbor during the Japanese attack there.

His next duty station was Camp Linda Vista, Calif., where he joined an engineer battalion, and sailed with it to New Caledonia in October 1942. He subsequently participated in the battles for Guadalcanal, Guam and Iwo Jima.

After World War II he served at Camp Perry, Va., Camp Lejeune, N.C., and Puerto Rico.

In 1948 he returned to Guam and was assigned to the Third Battalion, Fifth Marines. He returned with that outfit to Camp Pendleton, where he became the Battalion Motor Transport Chief. The Battalion sailed with the First Marine Brigade to Korea when the war broke out there.

"We were in combat quite often and on the move continuously." MGySgt. Queen recalled. Upon leaving Korea he was presented a Letter of Appreciation with a Combat "V."

He subsequently served in Hawaii, Camp Lejeune, Quantico, Okinawa and El Toro.

Sgt. Queen arrived in country on 26 April 1967, and reenlisted and extended his tour here. He became the Operations Maintenance Chief on 15 September 1967.

He is married to the former Miss Vallie Smith of Parkinsburg, W.Va. They have one son, Randy, 21.

So again, our deep felt thanks go out to these courageous young women who make our lives brighter by working in our clubs.


IT CAN DEVELOP INTO A BAD SITUATION

CIVIL AFFAIRS INFORMATION MEMORANDUM 6-68

1. On 17 May 1968, 27 homes in our hamlet burned down. By 31 May, nine homes had been rebuilt. During the month of June the remaining 18 were finished. All the fire victims now have homes, and much better ones than they had before. This Battalion's Civil Affairs Section furnished the people tools to work with and the material to build with. An estimated 50,000 board feet of lumber, including plywood and 650 sheets of tin were procured and given to the Vietnamese people for this project. In addition, clothing and food-stuff were distributed to the victims immediately after the fire. Now that everyone has a home and seems relatively happy, the Civil Affairs Section has moved on to other projects. The hamlet school is being repaired and enlarged for the new school term which will begin shortly. Of course, all the material and half the labor are being furnished by this Battalion's Marines.

2. In conjunction with the MEDCAP program, our doctor and his crew administered outpatient medical care to 272 villagers during the month of June. In addition, a little girl who is partially blind was discovered in the Hamlet. She was taken to the Children's Hospital at Red Beach for observation and further transferred to the Hospital Ship REPOSE for evaluation. The medical authorities will do everything possible to restore her eyesight.

3. Our bread truck continued to roll during June, with 4,320 loaves of bread being delivered to the Sacred Heart and the China Beach Orphanages.

4. We did very well on our donations this month. Thanks to your generosity over 2,500 human beings will enjoy a better life. Our money situation looks like this:



The dump level at ASP# 1 increased 8,056 S/T from 18,261 S/T to 26,317 S/T. The dump level at ASP# 2 increased 594 S/T from 20,144 S/T to 20,738 S/T of which 15,887 S/T are USMC assets and 4,851 S/T are U.S. Army assets. The tonnage at the Bomb Dump, Class V(A) increased 596 S/T from 6,308 S/T to 7,904 S/T. The EOD Platoon made 561 calls, recovering 4,688 U.S. explosive items and 2,960 VC or Chi Com explosive items. The platoon destroyed 357 S/T of unserviceable ammunition from ASP# 1 that was too dangerous for deep water disposal. The MAERU team reworked 12,259 rounds of C704-ctg 4.2" mortars along with evaluating 762 various items.

Phuoc Tan hamlet now comes under the MEDCAP program and is visited regularly for treatment and diagnostic purposes. A sewing school is planned for this village so that a minor industry can be established. Six sewing machines have been acquired through CARE and will be utilized for both the school and the subsequent industry. On 9 June 1968, a village festival was held. The orphanage planned to accommodate 200 orphan children has been delayed until a permanent structure can be completed.

Phuoc Xuan neared the end of construction of their new bakery. Additional brick insulation is needed around the oven and the roof construction must be complete prior to opening the industry. The tents previously used to house some of the residents have been replaced by temporary homes made of wood and cardboard. A school is planned for Phuoc Xuan with completion scheduled for July. Various members of Supply Company are assisting the local residents in their efforts.

Tiep Cu has started a new housing program to date completing 22 dwellings. The well casings have been received and put to use by constructing two new wells in Tiep Cu II. Tiep Cu I has the casings ordered but they remain undelivered.



1. Tiep Cu Hamlet has been split into two separate hamlets, Tiep Cu I and Tiep Cu II. This separation was made because the hamlet, was too large, 7000 people, to function effectively. Tiep Cu II is planned as the more permanent hamlet, whereby Tiep Cu I is operating on a more temporary basis. Permanent structures are being built in Tiep Cu II.

With reference to BnO 5080.2, the Supply Battalion Hamlets are assigned as indicated below to companies located at Camp Books.

PHUOC TAN	- Rations Company
TIEP CU	- H&S Company
PHUOC XUAN	- Supply Company

The MEDCAP team now visits Phuoc Tan Hamlet as well as Tiep Cu and Phuoc Xuan. Before this, the MEDCAP team was only going to Phuoc Xuan and Tiep Cu

Lumber for construction and burning purposes is being delivered to each of the hamlets as available.

2. The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows:

a. Phuoc Tan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C953795

1) A sewing school is planned for Phuoc Tan. This school is to teach the people of Phuoc Tan proper sewing methods and in turn create a minor industry for this hamlet. Six sewing machines have been acquired through CARE and will be used for this class.

2) A festival was held at Phuoc Tan on 9 June 1968. During this festival, the people of Phuoc Tan were shown how to prepare American Cereal products in such a manner as to make them palatable to their taste.

3) The orphanage planned for Phuoc Tan has been temporarily delayed until a permanent structure can be arranged for.

b. Phuoc Xuan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C965782.

1) The bakery under construction is almost completed. Bricks have been made and built up around the oven for use as insulation. A roof structure to cover the bakery is under construction.

2) A church and community house has been built. This is a wood structure used for religious and community meetings.

3) The tents used to house the population of Phuoc Xuan have been replaced with temporary houses made of wood and cardboard. These temporary houses, approximately 390 in number, house the complete population of Phuoc Xuan.

4) A school is planned for Phuoc Xuan Hamlet. Supply Company, Supply Battalion, has volunteered to help with the construction of this school. Construction has with scheduled completion during July.

c. Tiep Cu Hamlet I and II, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C965782

1) The housing project in Tiep Cu II has been started. As of this date, there have been 22 new houses completed in this hamlet.

2) The well renovation project has also begun. Well casings have been purchased and delivered to Tiep Cu II. Two (2) wells have been dug and completed to date.

3) Tiep Cu I has also received well casings. They are waiting for cement to begin this project.
