CIVIL AFFAIRS MEMORANDUM 9-68

1. During the month of September our Civil Affairs Section continued the Battalion's policy of helping people of our Hamlet help themselves. Twelve truckloads of scrap lumber was given to villagers to be used for home improvements and repairs. Eighty-seven bags of surveyed cement and one hundred sheets of scrap tin were distributed to the Hamlet people that had the greatest need for the material. Sand and steel ~~boards~~ were delivered to the Hamlet Chief to be used in building a new classroom for the school. In addition to the materials distributed, five wells were repaired or improved by the Civil Affairs Team.
2. Movies were shown twice weekly, consisting of educational type films, health and sanitation, plus cartoons. A volleyball tournament was held between the Battalion Civil Affairs team and the young men with the winner to received a volleyball set as a prize. The winners--well, the Civil Affairs team lost.
3. During the month, four rice harvesting machines were obtained from the III MAF warehouse and delivered to the Hamlet Chief for distribution throughout the Hamlet. These machines decrease labor time almost in half, allowing the people to increase the amount of rice cultivated.
4. During the month, Engineers Welding Shop fabricated a large swing set and a set of monkey bars for donation to the China Beach Orphanage. Approximately 4800 loaves of bread was delivered to the Sacred Heart and China Beach Orphanages.
5. The doctor and his crew treated 161 villages through the MEDCAP program during the month.
6. Again, thanks to your generosity, over 2500 orphans enjoy a better life. Your contributions are used to help maintain two orphanages in the Danang area. The Sacred Heart (Catholic) and the United World Mission (Protestant). Our current money situation looks like this:







The MAERU team reworked 480 rounds of C706 - ctg. 4.2 illumination, 2700 rounds of C256 - ctg 81mm HE, 2768 rounds of C704 - ctg 4.2" HE, and 1080 rounds of C708 - ctg 4.2" WP. The MAERU team tested and evaluated 145 units of C222 81mm, 226 units of C704 4.2" HE, 1180 units of M8 propellant increments, 43 units of C708 4.2" WP, 160 units of C256 81mm HE and 50 units of C253 81mm. The MAERU team broke down for quality evaluation of components 345 units of C222 81mm HE, 134 units of C232 81mm, 192 units of C256 81mm HE, 50 units of C249 81mm and 38 units of C253 81mm.

A new First Aid Building is now in the process of being constructed by the Villagers of Phuoc Tan. Lumber is being provided for its construction as available.

A Children's Festival for all hamlets is to take place on 6 October 1968. Toys, candy, and cookies to be given to the children at the festival have already been obtained through III MAF and other allocated funds.

The Sewing School has been built at Phuoc Xuan and classes are held daily. Phuoc Xuan has 6 sewing machines for instructional purposes and for village needs. The Elementary School is still under construction, but classes are being held at the church until the school is finished.



Amount of tonnage shipped by Helo-Lift to various destinations was 382 s/tons.

The dump level at ASP #1 increased 2,668 s/tons to 36,487 s/tons of which 23,605 s/tons are Class V(W), 12,556 s/tons are Class V(A), and 326 s/tons are RMK stock.

The dump level at ASP #2 decreased 365 s/tons to 20,286 s/tons of which 11,451 s/tons are USMC assets and 8,835 s/tons are U. S. ARMY assets. ASP #2 had a decrease of 557 s/tons due to inventory loss.

The EOD Platoon made 259 calls, recovering 2,365 U. S. explosive items and 190 VC or Chi Com explosive items. The platoon destroyed 338.5 s/tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1 that was too dangerous for deep water disposal.

The MAERU team reworked 480 rounds of C706-ctg 4.2" illumination, 2700 rounds of C256-ctg 81mm HE, 2,768 rounds of C704-ctg 4.2" HE, and 1080 rounds of C708-ctg 4.2" W.P.. The MAERU team tested and evaluated 145 units of C222 81mm HE, 37 units of C256 81mm HE, 83 units of C253 81mm, 226 units of C704 4.2" HE, 1,180 units of M8 propellant increments, 43 units of C708 4.2" W.P., 160 units of C256 81mm HE, and 50 units of C253 81mm. The MAERU team broke down for quality evaluation of components 345 units of C222 81mm HE, 134 units of C232 81mm, 192 units of C256 81mm HE, 50 units of C249 81mm and 38 units of C253 81mm.

1. With the assistance of the 7th Psychological Operations Department, movies and loudspeaker broadcasts are utilized in all three hamlets once a week. In addition, leaflets and Vietnamese newspapers are distributed throughout the hamlets.

The MEDCAP team now visits Phuoc Xuan in the morning and Tiep Cu in the afternoon. The hamlet priest at Phuoc Tan has expressed a desire that no MEDCAP be held in his hamlet at the present time. A new first-aid building is now in the progress of being constructed by the villagers of Phuoc Tan.

Lumber for construction and burning purposes is being delivered to each of the hamlets as available.

A childrens' festival for all the hamlets is to take place on 6 October 1968. Toys, candy, and cookies to be given to the children at the festival have already been obtained through III IAF and other allocated funds.

2. The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows:

a. Phuoc Xuan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C965782.

(1) The elementary school is still under construction, but classes are being held at the church until the school is finished.

(2) A sewing school has been built at Phuoc Xuan and classes are being held every day. Phuoc Xuan has 6 sewing machines for instructional purposes and for village needs.

b. Phuoc Tan, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C953792.

(1) A Medical Aid Station is now in the process of being built in the village of Phuoc Tan. Lumber is being provided for its construction as available.
