During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion, (-)(Rein), 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, provided command administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command and other supporting services to Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which included graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, material handling, mess, utilities and supporting services for the operation of the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility; operational supervision and personnel for internal and perimeter security of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books; Red Beach Complex, Danang, RVN.

5. Special Operations

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted 44 night patrols, (ambush and combat) and 22 day patrols during the month of January. Two platoon size operations were conducted on 10-11 January and 18-19 January.

b. On 8 January, one man on a Provisional Rifle day patrol detonated a Chi Com grenade rigged as a booby trap at AT 919812. He received superficial wounds and was treated at the BAS and released. The patrol found a second Chi Com grenade in the same area and they blew it in place.

c. On 10 January, a platoon operation found 3 Chi Com grenades rigged as booby traps at AT 922818. All three grenades were blown in place.

d. A day patrol on 15 January apprehended two VC suspects and they were turned over to 5th CIT who confined them as VC. One was apprehended at coordinate AT 918818 and the other at AT 932814.

e. At 0040 on 18 January, an enemy sapper element entered Cam Books by cutting through the chain link fence between Posts 10 and 11. The size of the sapper unit is unknown. The sappers entered the MHE lot and destroyed a paint locker and damaged two forklifts, one grader, one crane, one warehouse and a water tank. EOD personnel later found 20 Chi Com grenades in that area and one RPG round which had not been fired.

f. At 2315 hours on 25 January, a Provisional Rifle patrol sighted six VC moving northeast. The patrol fired at the VC and then searched the area. Only blood trails were found. The patrol then moved to their ambush site at AT 922815 and spotted approximately 22VC. They fired at the VC and swept the area, finding two enemy KIA and several blood trails leading towards Nam O.

g. On 30 January, a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol apprehended six VC suspects and turned them over to 5th CIT. Results of the interrogation by CIT are not yet available.

During the month of January the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion continued its program of self-help, MedCap and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people and directed PsyOps at the Viet Cong Infrastructure.

a. 3 January 1969 - Corporal T.G. BUCK was assigned as advisor to the Vietnamese National Police for an operation in Hoa Hiep Village.

b. 3 January 1968 - Delivered playground equipment to an elementary school in Ham-O.

c. 8 January 1969 - The new Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital was occupied for the first time. The move to the new building and demolition of the old structure was completed by the following afternoon.

d. 13 January 1969 - Completed delivery of materials to Xuan Thieu for construction of a Hamlet Office on a self-help basis.

e. 13 January 1969 - Completed delivery of materials to Hoa Hiep Village for the repair of the Hoa Hiep High School.

f. 14 January 1969 - Delivered 2230 school kits, 21 blackboards and 27 athletic kits to 12 schools in Hoa Khanh and Hoa Hiep Village.

g. 14 January 1969 - Completed reconstruction of the Da Phuoc MedCap Station.

h. 19 January 1969 - Lieutenant General Hoang Xuan LAM, Major General Carl A. YOUNGDALE and Brigadier General James A. FEELEY, Jr., dedicated the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital.

i. 20 January 1969 - Distributed CARE kits to the Phuoc Nghia Vocational School including 15 garden kits, 11 carpentry kits and 100 sewing kits.

p. Started delivery of material to Nam-0 for construction of an elementary school. Materials included 5000 lbs. of cement and 9 pallets of bricks.

q. During the month of January the Hoa Khanh Childrens' Hospital had a total of 3,320 patient days, 577 Vietnamese were treated as out-patients, 3,850 were treated under the MedCap II Program in five hamlets and 100 received dental treatment under the DentCap Program.

r. Six construction projects were in progress with the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital receiving approximately 80% of the total effort. A total of 43 truckloads of material was removed from the Hospital. Of these, 25 were scrap lumber and were delivered to other construction sites. Other civic action projects required 32 truck-loads of materials. A total of 3,096 lbs. of commodities were paid to Vietnamese civilians for Civic Action labor.

New telephone service or additional extentions were provided for 28 subscribers. 174 cases of local trouble calls were answered and 187 tests were made on various trunk lines. First echelon maintenance was performed on all organic equipment in Wire Platoon. New cable termination was completed in Communication Compound. Completed undergrounding and terminating 900 cable at FIC Headquarters. Dial Central Office performed all echelons of maintenance on its equipment. The automatic dial quipment completed 467,200 subscriber calls and 43,450 operator assisted calls.

The Maintenance Platoon answered 429 trouble calls involving radio, teletype, crypto, and IBM equipment also completed 325 work orders during the month of January. The Radio Technicians reinstalled the command radio equipment in the GOC bunker. The Teletype/Crypto technicians rebuilt/repared 2 teletype printers from Chu Lai.

The FLC Command net is not manned continuously because the power supply PP 388 is down; the only power available is the MRC 109 which cannot be operated continuously. The Supply Bn. HF sideband net with Supply Battalion is down for unknown reasons, however at this time we are monitoring Supply Battalion FM net on a continuous basis and are able to relay messages to Supply Battalion through Potatoe Head Bravo. A radio communications plan with check points and a radio operator was provided for the LSU-3 convoy to Da Nang. In order to improve communications with Da Nang, eight (8) different experimental high gain antennas were constructed and tried. Work is continuing in and attempt to open the Supply Bn. HF net.

3. Message Center: During the month of January, the Message Center passed the following traffic: 569 incoming, 168 outgoing for a total of 737 messages. Down time for the month amounted to 03 hours and 45 minutes due to normal PM and maintenance.

4. Wire Section: The Wire Section in the past month installed an SB-22 switch board in the Ammo Office to provide improved and simplified land line communications for internal use in the ASP and surrounding units. The SB-22 COC switch was manned on a 24 hour basis averaging 70 security and administrative calls a day. Two new subscriber phones were added to the COC switch and two were eliminated. The preventative maintenance of the wire lines and equipment of LSU-3 and subsector II was performed as normal. A new Security line was laid for bunker Communications on the Southern Sub-Sector IV perimeter. The hot line to Da Nang KYX-8 was removed from the FSA office and reterminated in the LSU-3 S-3 office providing direct land line communications to Supply Battalion S-3.



CIVIL AFFAIRS MEMORANDUM 1-69

1. During the month of January, the policy of helping the people of our Hamlet help themselves was continued. Tables and benches were completed for the two room addition of the Hamlet school. Plans have been made for obtaining the necessary teachers to begin classes in the very near future. Materials obtained and distributed during the month were scrap wood 32 truck loads, 5 truck loads of sand, 34 bags of cement, and cement was traded for 1000 bricks that were needed for various jobs.
2. Our doctor and his crew treated 520 villagers in the MEDCAP Program. Operating on a Monday, Wednesday and Friday schedule has increased the number of people being treated.
3. The Ole Bread Truck got back into action by delivering 3280 loaves of bread to the Sacred Heart and China Beach Orphanages. This compared with only 1800 loaves the month before.
4. During the month of January the Hamlet's local self defense force personnel had a rigorous training program, that included FAM firing of their weapons. They required transportation to the ARVN rifle range and the Battalion Organic Motor Transport was able to transport them on two different dates.
5. As a result of the tours that go to our Hamlet and the two orphanages each week, more personnel from the Battalion are made aware of the needs of the people. The results are that at least 5 Marines have made arrangements to sponsor an orphan during their tour in Vietnam and a number of them are in the process of sponsoring others. If anyone is interested in sponsoring an orphan or a needy family a minimum of \$10.00 per month is required and arrangements can be made by contacting the Civil Affairs Team. In addition personnel have contacted their families back home and asked for clothing that has been distributed in the Hamlet.
6. The two orphanages that the Battalion has been voluntarily helping to support in the Danang area; Worldwide Evangelization Crusade (China Beach) and Sacred Heart Orphanages got a boost in support during the month from your cash donations. As indicated in the breakdown by units, the contributions more than doubled from the previous month. Since there is a total of approximately 500 orphans involved we should at least try to maintain this level each month or even



Due to the fact that the 7th Psychological Operations Battalion has been transferred, movies and loudspeaker broadcasts are not being held in the hamlets at the present time. However, leaflets and Vietnamese newspapers are distributed as received.

In the past month there have been 1,460 rolls of tarpaper delivered throughout the hamlets. Trep Cu II received the majority of this tarpaper which is to be utilized in their new village site.

At this time the IRO Section has received a new ceiling from III MAF. The new ceiling has been established at 520 civilians. Since the Battalion IRO Office has been notified of this increase, papers have been submitted for 66 civilians to be brought on board as soon as possible. Thus far 16 have been hired and are now working in the Battalion.

Personnel Response Classes are being held each month by the Staff NCO's of each company. Hamlet visitation forms are being issued out to individuals that are invited into the homes of the Vietnamese.

The Civic Action Mecap Team has recently discovered a possible epidemic of Cholera in the hamlet of Phuoc Xuan. Preparations are being made at this time to inoculate all Vietnamese in this hamlet in order to stop any further spread of this disease.

The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows:

Phuoc Xuan is nearing the completion of their new church. The entire structure has been completed and the only work remaining is the painting of the exterior and the seating arrangements inside the church. The new site has been located for the elementary school and the ground has been leveled for the foundation.

The people of Phuoc Xuan are still in the process of building a new addition on their sewing school. Phuoc Xuan now has a total of 12 sewing machines for instructional purposes and for village needs.

A First Aid Station is also in the planning stages at Phuoc Xuan.

Phuoc Tan has been provided with lumber to build a First Aid Station in the hamlet.

Tiep Cu is in the process of moving and merging with another Buddhist hamlet. The families are moving one at a time and they are setting up dwellings as they move.

- d. 12,126 transactions were identified for which billing should be requested by Fiscal.
- e. 2,500 transactions outstanding on Fiscal/ICP records were identified for loading to the FLC EMR.

Subj: Command Chronology

1. Due to the fact that the 7th Psychological Operations Battalion has been transferred, movies and loudspeaker broadcasts are not being held in the hamlets at the present time. However, leaflets and Vietnamese newspapers are distributed as received.

In the past month there have been 1,460 rolls of tarpaper delivered throughout the hamlets. Tiep Cu II received the majority of this tarpaper which is to be utilized in their new village site.

At this time the IRO Section has received a new ceiling from III MAF. The new ceiling has been established at 520 civilians. Since the Battalion IRO Office has been notified of this increase, papers have been submitted for 66 civilians to be brought on board as soon as possible. Thus far 16 have been hired and are now working in the Battalion.

Personal Response Classes are being held each month by the Staff NCO'S in each company. Hamlet visitation forms are being issued out to individuals that are invited into the homes of the Vietnamese.

The Civic Action Medcap Team has recently discovered a possible epidemic of Cholera in the hamlet of Phuoc Xuan. Preparations are being made at this time to inoculate all Vietnamese in this hamlet in order to stop any further spread of this disease.

2. The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows:

a. Phuoc Xuan hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C95782

(1) The new church as of this date is nearing completion. The entire structure has been completed and the only work remaining is the painting of the exterior and the seating arrangements inside the church. Due to the fact that the elementary school is located next to the church, a new site has been located and the ground has been leveled for the foundation of the new school.

(2) The people of Phuoc Xuan are still in the process of building a new addition on their sewing school. Phuoc Xuan now has a total of 12 sewing machines for instructional purposes and for village needs.

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(3) A First Aid Station is also in the planning stages at Phuoc Xuan.

b. Phuoc Tan, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C954792

(1) Lumber has been provided for a First Aid Station in the hamlet of Phuoc Tan.

c. Tiep Cu, Hoa Khanh Village, C953792

(1) The hamlet of Tiep Cu is in the process of moving and merging with another Buddhist hamlet. The families are moving one at a time and they are setting up dwellings as they move.
