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5. Special Operations

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a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted seventy-five night patrols (ambush, recon and combat) and twenty five day patrols during the month of February.

b. On 2 February 1969, a Marine on a Provisional Rifle Company patrol detonated an unknown type booby trap resulting in one Marine KIA. Patrol searched this area, AT 924818, and found one other booby trap which they blew in place.

c. A Provisional Rifle Company night patrol on 4 February 1969, found a booby trap at AT 934798. They marked its position and left it in place. The following morning EOD personnel were sent to destroy it. They searched the entire area but were unable to find the booby trap.

d. At coordinates AT 925817 on 5 February 1969, a Provisional Rifle patrol found two booby traps which they blew in place.

e. On 15 February 1969, one fire team led by the Provisional Rifle Company Commanding Officer crawled into their ambush sight at AT 918812. They spotted eight Viet Cong moving toward the fire team. On command the fire team threw M-26 grenades and fired small arms and then left from the area.

f. On 17 February 1969, a Provisional Rifle Company patrol worked in conjunction with 5th CIT. A POW led them to a cave at AT 910829. They extracted numerous clothing and equipment from this cave and then blew it.

g. On 19 February 1969, a patrol again working with 5th CIT was led by a POW to a cave at AT 935821. As members of the patrol approached the cave entrance they were fired on and grenades were thrown from inside the cave. The results were nine WIA (5 Medevacuated) and two VC POW's taken from the cave.

h. On 20 February 1969, a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol found one tunnel and blew it in place. This tunnel was located at AT 928813.

i. A day patrol on 27 February 1969, found a tunnel at AT 934816. They searched it with negative results and then blew it.

During the month of February the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion continued its program of self-help, MedCap and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people and directed PsyOps at the Viet Cong Infrastructure.

- b. 5 February 1969- Conducted an air-drop of 100,000 PsyOps leaflets into Xuan Thieu, Nam-O, Xuan Duong and Kim Lien Hamlets.
- c. 6 February 1969- Delivered school supplies to Phuoc Ngnia School for completion of school year.
- d. 7 February 1969- Delivered 1,000 pounds of TET gifts to Phuoc Ngnia Hamlet including food, candy, fresh fruit, school supplies and health items.

Rifle, 89 convoys, Red Beach Sector Defense Net, Provisional Rifle Company Net, EOD Control Net, Northern Sector Rocket Alert Net. Radio Platoon supported 1 Company size operation during the month. There were 61 phone patches on the FLC-Okinawa Common Net

b. The Wire Platoon continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transient Facility, Army units in the Red Beach area, and Camp Haskins. New telephone service and additional extensions were provided for 40 subscribers. 156 cases of local trouble calls were answered and 145 tests were made on various trunk lines and circuits. Installed "buried-cable" markers for underground cables, hung "Caution Low Cable" sign on cables all over Camp Books. Installed new terminal at FLC Headquarters, opened new 900 cable, Serviced and maintained all security lines at ASP #2. Installed eight telephones for new positions on the perimeter in preparation for TET. Discontinued services to Quebec 4, Quebec 6, and Foxtrot 2 as these units were disbanded.

c. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and Telephone Technicians answered 20 trouble calls and processed 189 work orders. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians answered 373 trouble calls and processed 67 work orders. IEM Technicians answered 10 trouble calls. On two occasions the Teletype/Crypto Technicians supervised and assisted personnel from Chu Lai in repairing/aligning fixed plant teletype equipment. The test bench and facilities in the Teletype/Crypto section were used by FLSG-Bravo Technicians in repairing/aligning three pieces of their fixed plant teletype equipment.

1. In the past month the Psychological Operations Section of the S-5 has distributed over 1300 pamphlets on health throughout the hamlets. Vietnamese newspapers have also been distributed. At this time movies are not being shown in the hamlets. However, the hamlet of Phuoc Xuan is in the process of building an outdoor movie theatre for their enjoyment.

During the Tet Holidays, the Civil Affairs Team had the honor of being the first to enter a Vietnamese home on New Years Day. The section was also invited out to dinner three times. Tet gifts were also given to the children of Phuoc Xuan, Phuoc Tan, and Tiep Cu. 750 bags of fruit and candies plus over 3,000 Tet envelopes, each containing 5 piasters, were distributed. The money was contributed by the companies of Supply Battalion.

A supervisors meeting was held at Messhall #300 at the beginning of the month, the topics being timesheets, promotions and administrative procedures.

The hiring of additional Vietnamese continues, but at a slow pace due to the sudden influx of hire request sent to Industrial Relations Department, Danang by units in the Danang area. Additionally, there is not a sufficient number of men available to fill the needs of the requesting units.

Personal Response classes are being held each month by the SMO's in each company. Hamlet visitation forms are being issued out to the individuals that are invited into the homes of the employees.

2. The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows:

a. Phuoc Xuan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C965782

(1) The church as of this date is completed. The exterior has been completely painted and all seating arrangements inside of the church have been aligned and sectioned off.

(2) The new school is now under construction in this hamlet. The ground has been leveled and the people are now preparing to lay the foundation.

b. Tiep Cu Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C953792

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(1) The hamlet of Tiep Cu is still in the process of moving. They will locate their new home site near the Buddhist Hamlet of Chon Tam. They are moving one family at a time and are setting up dwellings as they move.

1. Maintenance Section: During the month the Maintenance Section received a total of 39 new work orders. 19 work orders were repaired and returned to the using sections. 3 work orders were cancelled and 6 were sent to a higher echelon of repair.

The Maintenance shop has offered technical help to the 1st CAG radio section and maintains a 24 hours a day maintenance with COC and the Message Center.

2. Radio Section. The radio section during the month of February manned or provided radios for the following nets:

The power supply PP-388 to the FLC Command Net is still down. The Net is still in operation by the use of a PP-2953 received on temporary loan for a short period of time. The Supply Battalion HF single side-band net with Supply Battalion is now with FLSG "A". A radio communications plan with check points and radio operator was provided for the LSU-3 last month and will be able to handle any future convoy.

3. Message Center. During the month of February the message center processed a total of 550 messages; 424 incoming and 126 outgoing. The circuit was down for a total of 445 hours; 12 hours and 22 minutes were due to power failure. The rest of the time was due to bad teletype and crypto equipment. At this time the circuit is still down, but the Technical Section is working 24 hours a day to bring the circuit back up. All traffic was passed through the MAG-13 Communication Center and by daily courier runs to the Force Logistic Command Communications Center in DaNang.

4. Wire Section. During the past week the wire section completely revamped the LSU-3 supplemental telephone system eliminating dead lines, unnecessary test stations and other bottlenecks. The line for the S-3 hot line to DaNang was rerouted, completely isolating this circuit from other lines. COC line 16 to Staff quarters was completed. Two new lines have been installed; one from Americal Support, Sub Sector Command and a line from the 6th, 56th Artillery. In the ASP a line was installed in the OIC's bunker. A new line to the 9th Support from COC and a cable installed underground at the ASP to prevent further trouble with the line in the area.

The switchboard in the COC bunker has been manned on a twenty-four hour basis handling on the average of about 80 calls per day. Normal PM's of all phones and of the switchboard has been carried out within the past month.

The section has repaired all lines and cables of this Unit that were down due to enemy action. (22nd and 23rd of February 1969.)



CIVIL AFFAIRS MEMORANDUM 2-69

1. During the month of February, the policy of helping the people of our Hamlet help themselves was continued, although somewhat limited because of TET and enemy activity in the general area. Material obtained and distributed during the month was 12 truck loads of scrap wood and 5 truck loads of sand for building bunkers within the Hamlet. Twelve bags of rolled wheat, 6 bags of cornmeal and 48 gallons of salad oil were obtained from the Catholic Relief Services for the purpose of paying the carpenters for the work performed on the school which was completed during the month of January.
2. On 7 February 1969, a dedication ceremony, followed by refreshments, was held for the opening of the new addition to the Hamlet school. The dedication was attended by the Village Chief, the Hamlet Chief and the elders of the Hamlet. From Maintenance Battalion, the Battalion Commander, the Sergeant Major and the personnel of the Civil Affairs Teams were present. Certificates of Appreciation from the District Chief were presented to two members of the Civil Affairs Teams. The remainder of the Team had previously been awarded certificates.
3. Our doctor and his crew treated 215 villagers in the MEDCAP program. This was somewhat less than the number treated the previous month again due to "TET" and enemy activity in the area.
4. The Old Bread Truck was able to deliver 3,000 loaves of bread to the Sacred Heart and China Beach Orphanages. Though 3,000 loaves of bread aren't a large quantity of bread for 500 orphans, it adds essential vitamins and minerals to their diet they would otherwise not get.
5. As mentioned last month in the Civil Affairs Memorandum, there are a number of personnel within the Battalion that are sponsoring an orphan from one or the other of the orphanages. Additional personnel have accepted this responsibility during the past month to an orphan of their choice. If we have anyone interested in this program, contact Sergeant DAHL at the IRO Office for information.
6. Our support for the two orphanages that the Battalion has been voluntarily helping to support in the Danang area continues to be outstanding. The tours each Saturday of the two orphanages possibly account for some of this support since you are able to see first hand the needs that exist. The Directors of both Orphanages extend their

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appreciation to the Battalion for this effort and state that out of all the units that furnish some type of support, Maintenance Battalion is the only one that does so with any regularity. Our current money situation looks like this:
