c. The Thirty (30) Day Guard and the Security Platoon FAM-fired all weapons organic to the perimeter as part of their initial guard school. Guard School has been held daily for the Thirty (30) Day Guard and Security Platoon personnel. The 81 MM Mortar crew has fired registration on 3 islands to maintain readiness.

#### 5. Special Operations

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted 81 night patrols, (Ambush, Listening Post, Recon, and Combat) and 29 day patrols during the month of March. Killed 1 NVA and turned 19 VCS over to C.I.T.

b. On 7 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol detonated an unknown type Booby-trap at AT 923819 resulting in 1 USMC WIA (Evac.).

c. On 8 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol detonated an unknown type booby-trap at AT 917821 resulting in 1 USMC WIA (Evac.).

d. On 12 March, Provisional Rifle Company and 5th C.I.T. conducted a Cordon and Search of Kom Lang Hamlet at AT 936824. C.I.T. kept 7 VC's for Interrogation.

e. 13 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol and 5th C.I.T. were led by a VC prisoner to 2 Chicom grenades at AT 934818 and to a spider trap containing Food and Cigarettes at AT 932818. All were destroyed.

f. On 17 March, an NCO School patrol found a tunnel at AT 933817. Tunnel contained 1 Chicom grenade. Patrol destroyed both.

g. On 19 March, a Provisional Rifle Ambush fired on VC at AT 920817. VC were in the process of firing mortars on 58th T.C. Patrol called counter Mortar Fire and observed 1 secondary explosion.

h. On 24 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol discovered 1 M-26, 2 pieces of bamboo hollowed out, Medical supplies and rice at AT 917820. Patrol destroyed all of the above in place.

i. On 24 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol detonated an unknown type of booby-trap at AT 919819 resulting in 2 USMC WIA (Evac.).

j. On 25 March, a Provisional Rifle patrol spotted 1 VC at AT 936814. VC threw 1 chicom resulting in 1 USMC WIA (minor).

k. On 30 March, Provisional Rifle and 5th C.I.T. conducted a Cordon and Search of Xom Lang Hamlet at AT 936824. C.I.T. held 7 VCS for Interrogation and blew 1 chicom. One Prisoner revealed a tunnel at AT 934825. The tunnel was destroyed.

l. On 31 March, a Provisional Rifle ambush at AT 923821 spotted 2 VCS. Ambush fired small arms resulting in 1 NVA KIA. One AK-47 was captured. Later that night an ambush observed enemy firing mortars at AT 920820. Ambush fired on enemy. C.I.T. sources report 2 more NVA were killed in this action.

m. Provisional Rifle patrols have fired upon VCS on 14 occasion during the month.

n. The perimeter has reported incoming small arms on 10 occasions.

o. Provisional Rifle has turned 19 detainees over to C.I.T. during the month.

During the month of March the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued its program of Self-Help, MedCap and other projects designed to assist the Vietnamese people and directed Psychological Operations at the Viet Cong infrastructure.

a. 1 March - Delivered 30-cal. ammunition and flares to Hoa Hiep Village in connection with the Self-Defense Force.

b. 4 March - Delivered 250 eight-foot stakes to Hoa Hiep Village for the completion of the Nam-0 Hamlet perimeter. Completed construction of checkpoint at entrance to Village Headquarters.

c. 6 March - Conducted an airdrop of 150,000 leaflets to Trung Son, Xuan Thieu, Nam-0, and Xuan Duong Hamlets.



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period, Logistic Support Unit Three, Headquarters & Service Company, Supply Battalion, Force Logistic Command FMFPac, continues to provide the necessary Logistics Support for units within the Chu Lai Combat Base.

2. During the month of March 1969, the Aid Station treated two hundred and three (203) persons and administered seventy seven (77) immunizations.

The Civil Affairs Section treated seventeen (17) Vietnamese personnel.

3. MC200 has completed roll back to MC100 consisting of 413 pieces plus 53 conex boxes, total weight of 302.6 short tons. 14 walk thru requisitions were processed.

4. Shop Stores Section has shipped 200 empty storage aid boxes to MC135, Danang. Twenty-two (22) items were shipped to MC100 for turn in. One hundred and fifty-one (151) requisitions were processed for the month of March. We received approximately fifteen (15) items from Shop Stores MC135, Danang for stock.

j. Community Relations:

1. The Civil Affairs Section presently employs 86 Vietnamese civilians on Organizational funds and 8 non-appropriated funds.

k. Communications:

1. Maintenance Section: During the past month the Maintenance Section received a total of 38 new work orders; 21 from 1st CAG, and 17 from Comm. 12 were sent to the next higher echelon of repair. 33 work orders were completed; 18 from 1st CAG, 3 from Comm., 8 from the next higher echelon of repair, and 4 were cancelled. There is a total of 21 work orders still open; 7 being from 1st CAG, 3 from Comm., and 13 from the next higher echelon of repair. Other than this, the Maint. Shop has been involved in regular PM's and has worked on disbanding all teletype gear and preparing it for shipment north. Also, work has been done on installing antennas to improve communications with Supply Battalion in Danang.

2. Radio Section: The Radio Section during the month of March manned or provided radios for the following nets:

1. Sub Sector II Net	1730-0700 daily
2. Chu Lai Defense Net	1730-0700 daily
3. Sub Sector IV Net	1730-0700 daily
4. CLDC Tower Net	24 Hours per day
5. FLC Command Net	1100 and 1600 traffic checks and or as needed
6. Reactionary Platoon	As needed

The power supply PP-388 to the FLC Command Net is still down. The Net is still in operation by the use of a PP-2953 received on temporary loan for a short period of time. An RC-292 antenna was set up to improve communications with Danang/FLC. The Long Periodic Antenna was changed from a vertical to horizontal plane in order to improve communications also.

3. Message Center. The LSU-3 Message Center is currently providing communications for the unit, although the circuit is no longer operational. The MAG-13 Communications Center is guarding for traffic addressed to this unit and providing duplicating facilities for messages received. The LSU-3 Message Center is maintained on 24 hour watch with frequent and regular runs to MAG-13 to pick up traffic. The traffic is then distributed in the same manner as it was when the circuit was operational, except that the First Combined Action Group handles it's own messages also through MAG-13. The Communications gear formerly necessary to maintain the circuit with Danang (KSW-1), has been turned into the appropriate activities. Communications publications are being held by this unit until the final disposition of the Message Center is settled. Cryptographic gear and associated materials have been prepared for transfer. The message files, both classified and unclassified, are being maintained by the message center personnel until the moment of final transfer. They will be turned over to the designated section who will have responsibility for message traffic. Current plans call for the transfer of all message centermen (2542) and related technicians (2815) to other FLC units, according to need.

4. Wire Section. During the months the Wire Section completed all PMs were completed. New lines were laid to the ASP, and lines to other surrounding units were relain due to construction work between COC and their Units. The COC Switthboard is being manned on a twenty-four (24) hour basis.



Radio Platoon supported one Company size operation during the month. There were 63 phone patches on the FLC-Okinawa Common Net.

b. The Wire Platoon continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transit Facility, Army units in the Red Beach Area, and Camp Haskins. New telephone service and additional extensions were provided for 50 subscribers. The Automatic dial equipment completed 336,329 subscribers calls and 33,633 operator assisted calls. Terminated services at old Transit Center and returned all wire personnel TAD. Turned in 72 pieces of equipment for 2nd echelon or higher repair.

c. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and telephone Technicians answered five trouble calls and processed 123 work orders. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians answered 305 trouble calls. Maintenance Platoon secured the Teletype Net with ChiLai 19 March 1969 and received 13 pieces of equipment from them. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians assisted FLSG-Bravo in repairing/aligning two pieces of their fixed plant teletype equipment. As of 11 Mar 1969 the Communication Center was operating from emergency power from 0700 to 1900 daily to relieve load on camp power.




