NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion, (-) (Rein), 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, provided command administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command and other supporting services to Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, material handling, mess, utilities and supporting services for the operation of the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility; operational supervision and personnel for internal and perimeter security of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books; Red Beach, ~~...~~, RVN.

1. PERSONNEL. During April 1969, the average enlisted strength of the Battalion increased from 1590 to 1607.

c. The 30 Day Guard and Security Platoon FAM-fired all weapons organic to the perimeter as part of their initial Guard School. Daily classes have been held for the Security Platoon and the 30 Day Guard throughout the month of April. The 81mm Mortar crew registered three additional targets during the month of April.

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d. Defensive Construction

(1) The defilade areas along the west side of the perimeter have been improved by removing sand and leveling areas.

(2) A band of CS gas has been laid around the perimeter outside the tactical wire.

(3) Forty-five E-8's have been placed for employment around the perimeter.

(4) Ten bunkers have been completely reconstructed.

(5) The COC bunker has been improved by re-sandbagging.

(6) Additional sand bags are also being emplaced around the ammo bunker.

5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted 105 night patrols (Ambush, Recon, Listening Post, and Combat) and 32 day patrols during the month of April.

b. During this period the patrols destroyed two booby-traps by blowing in place as well as five reinforced bunkers.

c. The Provisional Rifle Company had eleven self-initiated contacts with VCS while conducting night operations.

d. The Provisional Rifle Company working with 5th CIT detained eight VCS during the month of April.

e. On 4 April a Provisional Rifle Company patrol working in conjunction with 5th CIT captured two VCS. They were turned over to CIT for interrogation.

f. On 5 April a Provisional Rifle Company patrol discovered and blew in place one booby-trapped ChiCom grenade at AT 915 817 and one at AT 918 814.

g. On 7 April a Provisional Rifle Company cordon and search of Mieu Thach Son at AT 934 816 captured two VCS, who were turned over to 5th CIT for interrogation. They proved to be one VC, joined in 1964, and one VC supplier.

h. On 13 April a day patrol from Provisional Rifle Company discovered a reinforced bunker of bamboo and bricks at AT 921 821 which they destroyed.

i. On 21 April a platoon from Provisional Rifle Company working in conjunction with elements of 1/26 in the vicinity of Ap Thuy Tu at AT 905 830 discovered and blew in place a tunnel 7'x5'x4'. they also discovered several smaller holes, one containing a ChiCom grenade which they destroyed.

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j. On 24 April a fire team from Provisional Rifle Company working with 5th CTF captured one female VCS in Xuan Lam. The VCS was identified as a member of the Supply Cadre.

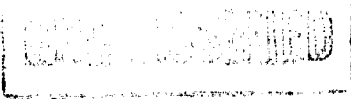
a. 7 April, Delivered carpenter, mason, garden, and sewing kits to Phu Loc Hamlet as part of the effort to generate home industry.

b. Equipment and/or operators were also provided for 120 patrols conducted by the Provisional Rifle Company, 148 convoys, Red Beach Sector Defense Net, Provisional Rifle Company Net, EOD Control Net, Northern Sector Rocket Alert Net. The Radio Platoon supported three company size operations during the month of April. There were 124 phone patches for the month of April on the FLC-Okinawa Common Net.

c. The Wire Platoon continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transit Facility, Army units in the Red Beach Area, and Camp Haskins. New Telephone service and additional extensions were provided for 25 subscribers. The automatic dial equipment completed 578,905 calls for subscribers and 28,400 operator assisted calls. The FCC tested and checked 164 lines and circuits. 15 Tandem Switch Circuits for direct dialing to distant exchanges were installed by Wire Platoon. Wire Platoon maintained and serviced all wire equipment in the Maintenance Battalion area. A warning bell system was installed by Wire Platoon between the GOC bunker and the LOC. Wire Platoon with the assistance of 5th Communication Battalion repaired five spans of cable on the 800 cable. Wire Platoon published and made distribution of the new FLC telephone directory. Wire Platoon started installation of two (2) 25 pair cables in the new FLSG Alfa area. There were 36 pieces of equipment turned in by Wire Platoon for 2nd echelon or higher repair. Wire Platoon set up and operated public address system for USO show.

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d. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and Telephone Technicians answered 12 trouble calls and processed 146 work orders. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians answered 346 trouble calls and processed 102 work orders. IBM Technicians answered 9 trouble calls. Training was primarily OJT except for scheduled GMS Training. On two separate occasions the Teletype/Crypto Technicians assisted personnel from FLSG Bravo in aligning their fixed plant Teletype equipment. On 11 April 1969 there were 17 pieces of rebuilt fixed plant Teletype equipment received from Japan, and on 23 April 1969 Maintenance Platoon shipped 15 pieces of fixed plant teletype equipment to Japan to be rebuilt. On 18 April 1969 the Teletype NGT with FLSG Alfa was secured.

e. During the Month of April 1969 the Communication Center Platoon continued to provide Teletypewriter/Digital data communication for Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. On April 24 1969, the FLC Communication Center was awarded the "Honorary Tributary Station" for the Month of March. This award is based on the least number of procedural errors on all traffic generated by this Communication Center in competition with all tributaries connected to the Automatic Switching Center at Nha Trang. Air Force personnel from the 1972nd Communication Squadron Danang RVN continued to receive "on the job training" in the operation of the IBM-360/20 and associated equipment. As of this date six personnel have received this training. On 18 April 1969 the teletype circuit to FLSG Alfa was deactivated. Work has commenced on the drainage system around the Communication Center, and the installation of the air conditioning ducts inside the Communication Center. The drainage system is about 85% completed and the air conditioning ducts about 50% completed. Emergency lights were installed throughout the Communication Center and Data Center. These lights automatically come on whenever there is a power failure. They were tested on 24 April 1969 with excellent results. The traffic count for the month is:



On or about 1100 27 April 1969 a grass fire which started from a Vietnamese trash dump spread across the road ignited munitions stored in the Grade III area. The resulting explosions set off a chain reaction resulting in the total destruction of ASP #1. The shock waves and shrapnel emanating from the ASP explosions also resulted in the collapse of all structures within Camp J. E. MONAHAN which contained all troop facilities for the men of ASP #1. At about 1900 on 27 April, the Ammunition Company C.P. shifted to the 4th Battalion, 11th Marines area within the 7th Communications Battalion compound. There were no injuries or deaths within Ammunition Company as a result of the ASP fire. The amount of Class V assets destroyed was estimated at 36,000 s/tons.

The EOD Platoon provided support in road sweeps and dump clearance of unexploded ordnance. Estimated time for clearance of ASP #1 is from 3 to 9 months. All Class V operations for Ammunition Company personnel were divided providing augmentation to ASP #2, supporting EOD Teams in dud clearance and salvage crews to Camp MONAHAN. Although the buildings within ASP #1 and Camp MONAHAN were crushed by concussion approximately 90 % of all company office records were recovered intact. Due to destruction by fire the Ammunition Company Sickbay and supply warehouse all records were lost.

Reconstruction of Camp MONAHAN commenced on 1 May 1969 with an estimated completion date of 1 June 1969. Tentative plans provide that Ammunition Company (Rear) will remain situated at 7th Communications Battalion area until able to relocate within Camp MONAHAN.

1. The hamlet of Tiep Cu is progressing rapidly on development of new housing units. Several structures are near completion and should be ready to be moved into in the near future.

The Civic Action team had dinner in the homes of the Vietnamese three times during the month. These dinners were in honor of members of the section who recently rotated home.

Due to a freeze on hiring by III MAF G-1, the battalion failed to reach its authorized strength in Local National Civilians. At the present time the Battalion has 491 on board.

2. The projects progress for each of the hamlets is as follows.

a. Phuoc Xuan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C965782

(1) The elementary school is near completion. The roof is the only part of the building left to be finished.

(2) Well Renovation - 76 well rings have been purchased with AIC Funds and delivered to the hamlet for construction of new water wells, 20 wells are planned, three (3) wells have been completed or about 15% of the project.

(3) Head Facilities - 5 cement toilet bowls have been purchased and delivered to PHUOC XUAN for construction of Head Facilities. To date none have been finished.

(1) Well Renovation - 20 well rings have been delivered to TIEP CU for construction of new wells there. At the present time none have been finished.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Electronic Maintenance Company continued its standard mission of support to customers in the Danang TAOR.
2. Eighty three per cent of the personnel have allotments out for the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds.
3. Eighteen of the personnel are participating in the 10% Savings Program.
4. Nine men were promoted to Sergeant. One being a Meritorious Promotion.
5. One Non-Judicial Punishment was held.
6. Maintenance and supply support problems were resolved by conferences and various meetings with personnel of higher echelon.
7. An ammunition explosion created major destruction to the building and facilities causing a loss of approximately two days operation.
8. Telephones and lines are being installed at the new Maintenance Facility at Camp Books.
9. A new policy of accepting items from the "DX" program was initiated to conform to current directives.
10. Many problems exist with CVC helmets. Parts cannot be obtained through the Marine Corps Supply System.

Subj: Damage sustained during Ammunition explosions on
27 April 1969

1. On Sunday, 27 April 1969 the Ammunition Supply Point about 1 mile distance caught fire at approximately 0900. During the day there occurred numerous large explosions that damaged much of the facility. These explosions continued until about 2300 hours. All operations ceased at 1230 on 27 April and resumed at 0700 on 28 April 1969. The following is a resume of the damages.

- a. Living Quarters. Moderate damage 30% to 60%.
- (1) Three huts had extensive damage in excess of 60%.
 - (2) Seven hut had moderate damage amounting to 30% to 60%.
 - (3) Three huts had slight damage. Less than 30%.
 - (4) The damages consisted of cracked ceiling rafters, cracked wall studs, damaged roofing, screens torn out.
 - (5) Repairs were made to the huts by personnel living in them. Through this self help program the shelters were livable for the night of 28 April 1969.
 - (6) The troop personnel were not permitted to sleep in the huts during the night of 27 April 1969.
- b. Calibration Facility. Extensive damage in excess of 60%.
- (1) The entire ceiling in the Test Equipment repair and quality control point came down. Approximately 8-2 by 6's were cracked to splinters.
 - (2) The Calibration Section worked on this themselves. By replacing the 2 by 6's they replaced the ceiling and insulation and reinstalled the ceiling lights.
 - (3) Actually, the Calibration Facility produced it's first piece of outgoing equipment at 0930 on 28 April 1969. All that was utilized were the AN/TSM-60 calibration complex. Full operation was realized on 30 April 1969.

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(4) On April 30, 1969 three Calibrators were sent TAD from Okinawa to assist in lowering the back log of Calibration.

c. Shipping and Receiving Section- Slight damages less than 30%.

(1) This section sustained the least amount of damage. The walls that separate the Facility from Shop Stores were blown down. These were repaired by S&R personnel.

(2) The S&R Section was in full operation by 0920 on 28 April and could have received incoming equipment earlier but no customers arrived.

d. Office Space- Moderate damage 30% to 60%.

(1) The Shop Office ceiling collapsed. This was replaced and was completed by 29 April.

(2) Company Office ceiling was partially collapsed. The walls were slightly displaced.

(a) Two new lights were installed and the walls and ceiling were repaired to a usable condition by 29 April.

e. Shop Area

(1) Main Building- Extensive damage in excess of 60%.

(2) At approximately 1230 on 27 April a large explosion from the Ammunition caused a slight damage to the main building. At this time the building was evacuated.

(3) During the remainder of the day the explosions initiated more damage to the building. The final outcome was that:

(a) The roof beams were and are bent.

(b) Side wall beams were and are bent.

(c) Exterior sheeting was pulled away from the side beams.

(d) 30% of the roof sheeting is pulled away from the roof beams.

(e) 40% of the lighting was knocked down.

(f) 50% of the interior paneling was knocked down.

(g) 3 of 7 stacks of book cases were blown over causing damage to most of the cases.

(4) The following action was taken.

(a) A volunteer crew of six men was established at 2000 on 27 April. These individuals swept the floor and policed the large rough items.

(b) 0700 on 28 April actual renovations began and was fairly well completed by 1600 of that date.

(c) All work was done by personnel of the Shop without outside help.

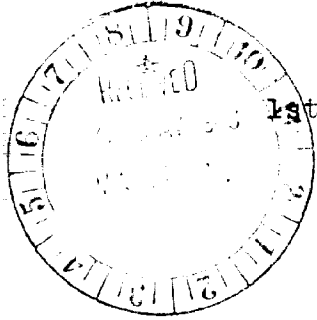
