b. Equipment and/or operators were provided for 225 patrols conducted by the Provisional Rifle Company and the FLC Non-Commissioned Officers School, 49 convoys, Red Beach Sector Defense Net, Provisional Rifle Company Net, EOD Control Net, Northern Sector Rocket Alert Net. The Radio Platoon also supported two company sized operations during the month of June. There were 107 phone patches on the FLC-Okinawa Common Net for the month of June 1969.

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c. The Wire Platoon continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transit Facility, Army units in the Red Beach Area, and Camp Haskins. New Telephone and additional extensions were provided for 36 subscribers. The Automatic Dial equipment completed 548,367 calls for subscribers and 33,409 operator assisted calls. The FGC tested and checked 147 lines and circuits. The Wire Platoon also installed four terminals in the Maintenance Battalion Area. Also the Wire Platoon terminated the 800-A cable in the FLSG-Alfa area and repaired a 50 pair cable damaged by construction crews also in the FLSG-Alfa area. Serviced and maintained all wire communications in the Maintenance Battalion and Camp Monahan area.

d. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and Telephone Technicians answered 17 trouble calls and processed 166 work orders. The Teletype/Cryptic Technicians answered 272 trouble calls and processed 24 work orders. The Maintenance Platoon IBM/Data Technicians answered 8 trouble calls. The Teletype Repair Section received seven pieces of fixed plant teletype equipment from the Naval Support Activity at Camp Tienshau for future evacuation to NSD Yokosoka, Japan on a rebuild program. The Data Section prepared and released a 1013 IBM machine for overseas shipment to NSD Oakland, California. The Radio Section assisted the Officers club in rewiring speakers for the movie system.

e. During the Month of June 1969 the Communication Center Platoon continued to provide Teletypewriter/Digital data communication for Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. The IBM 360/20 Program became fully operational during the month of June, enabling the Communication Center to fully serve all addresses with a Magnetic Tape transmit and receive capability.

MEMORANDUM 6-69

1. During the month of June the policy of helping the people of our hamlet (Nghi-An) to help themselves was continued. The reconstruction of the school which was started about one and a half months ago is being carried forward into this month. An effort to remove trash from the roadsides of our hamlet was started this month. This project, however, was not completed due to civilian construction on the road itself. There were 2 truck loads of building material, 13 loads of sand for the school, 30 sheets of used tin, 3 rolls of rebar, and 185 bags of cement delivered to our hamlet this month. There were 40 old racks given to the China Beach Orphanage and 55 given to the Uson hospital in DaNang city. Both of these places were very badly in need of these racks.
2. The doctor and his crew treated 7 Vietnamese patients this month. The reason behind the decrease in the number of people being treated as compared to last month's report is that we are awaiting supplies for our MedCAP. The Civil Affairs team would like to take this opportunity to thank the men that work in the Line Shack for keeping our phones working in the hamlet. They have always responded when we needed their assistance.
3. The bread truck delivered about 3800 loaves of bread to the China Beach and Sacred Heart Orphanages.
4. Due to the fact that the battalion is in the process of moving to Red Beach and the men are needed in this capacity, there will not be any Personal Response or DaNang Culture tours. The tours will start back on their regular schedules in approximately one month. We still encourage men that are interested in sponsoring an orphan to contact the civil affairs office. A minimum of ten dollars per month is asked for sponsoring a needy family or orphan. Some of the personnel in the battalion have contacted their families back home and requested that clothing be sent to them, thus the clothing was distributed in the hamlet and the orphanages.
