b. Equipment and/or operators were provided for 238 patrols conducted by the Provisional Rifle Company and the Non-Commissioned Officers School, 42 convoys, Red Beach Sector Defense Net, Provisional Rifle Company Net, EOD Control Net, Northern Sector Rocket Alert Net. The Radio Platoon supported one company sized operation during the month of July 1969. There were no phone patches for the month of July on the FLC-Okina, a Common Net this being due to a bad SB-1248 in the 3rd FSR's AN/TSC-15 Van.

c. The Wire Platoon continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transit Facility, Army Units in the Red Beach Area and Camp Haskins. New telephone service and additional extensions were provided for 60 subscribers. The automatic dial equipment completed 549,161 calls for subscribers and 30,147 operator assisted calls. The FCC tested and checked 248 lines and circuits. The Wire Platoon installed a new Public Address System at III MAF Transit Facility. Also the Wire Platoon has installed ten new lines from the FLC frame to the Radio Relay site at the water tower in the Supply Battalion area. Also Upgrading of the Headquarters and Service Battalion area has begun new poles have been set and new cable consisting of 100 pair, 25 pair 12 pair and 6 pair are at the present time being installed by the 7th Communication Battalion. The Wire Platoon installed and provided telephone service for units as they move into the new Maintenance Battalion area. There were 103 pieces of equipment turned in for 2nd echelon or higher repair.

d. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and Telephone Technicians answered 19 trouble calls and processed 202 work orders. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians answered 306 trouble calls and processed 42 work orders. The Maintenance Platoon IBM/Data Technicians answered 7 trouble calls. In the month of July 1969 there were seven (7) pieces of fixed plant Teletype equipment accompanied by a Communication Company Courier to be rebuilt at New Yokosuka, Japan. This is the third increment of the rebuild program. Maintenance Platoon sent one man to FLCG-Bravo at Quang Tri to assist the IBM/Data Section with a key punch of a 1015 IBM machine. The Maintenance Platoon repaired the FLC chapel public address system and relocated speakers for better sound coverage of the chapel.

e. During the month of July 1969, the Communication Center Plateau continued to provide Teletypewriter/Digital Data communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. The Communication Center for the month of July 1969 recorded an error percentage of 2.4% this is the lowest ever recorded on the Autodin Circuit. The traffic count for the month is:



During the month of June, 7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company continued support of Marine units in the Danang TAOR and the Republic of Korea Marines with POL products. There has been no significant changes in usage during the month. Support of operation "Pipestone Canyon" was completed on 25 July 1969. A high rate of combat losses of equipment was experienced on the operation. The company remained in a reduced readiness category due to supplies and equipment not on hand as a result of combat losses and losses from the Ammunition Supply Point One explosion. Response from the supply system is slow in spite of priority O2 requisitions and MARES GA cards. The company is capable of maintaining current commitments, but is unable to handle any significant increase in fuel handling commitments.

The dump level at ASP #2 decreased to 19,686 s/tons of which 15,819 s/tons are USMC assets, 3,528 s/tons are U. S. Army assets, 339 s/tons are U. S. Navy assets, 451 s/tons are Project 972 and 185 s/tons are Grade III.





MEMORANDUM 7-69

1. During the month of July the policy of helping the Vietnamese people of our Hamlet (Nghĩ-An) help themselves was continued. The school is still under construction this month. The amount of material distributed in the Hamlet is as the following: 7 truck loads of sand, 1 load of building lumber, 10 loads of scrap lumber, 120 bags of cement, 2 boxes of clothing, and 3 boxes of ceramic tile. There was 25 bags of cement given to the United World Mission to be used on a lepracy colony. There were 30 mattresses given to the Uson hospital in DaNang and 26 given to the China Beach orphanage. The Psychological Operations section of the IRO distributed pamphlets in the Hamlet this month which dealt with Peace Talks and Hygiene & Sanitation.
2. The doctor and his staff treated some 52 Vietnamese patients this month. Our MedCAP was not used extensively in the Hamlet this month. The GVN has a nurse working in Hamlet to treat those in need of medical care. There was approximately 3600 loaves of bread delivered to the China Beach and Sacred Heart Orphanages.
3. Now that the Battalion has moved into this area, here at Red Beach, the Personal Response Program, that is the tours and the classes, will be resumed. The companies are asked to submit a list to the IRO as to the date(s) they wish their men to receive these classes and a list of men that wish to go on the tours. It is also asked that this list be turned in at the companies earliest convenience.
4. There is an opening for personnel in the Industrial Relations Office. If any man is interested in being a part of the Civil Affairs Team, contact your company First Sergeant.
5. A number of the Vietnamese people from our Hamlet, Nghĩ-An, have offered their services in helping us here in Maintenance Battalion fill sandbags and building bunkers. This service is free of charge by the people to show their appreciation for what Maintenance Battalion has done for them and their Hamlet. This service is to be rendered the first part of August.

1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion, (-)(Rein), 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, provided command, administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command. Other Supporting services were provided Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, material handling, mess, utilities and supporting services for the operation of the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility. In addition operational supervision and personnel were provided for internal and perimeter security as well as for the operation of the Provisional Rifle Company in support of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books, Red Beach, Danang, RVN.

b. The 30 Day Guard and Security Platoon FAM-fired all weapons organic to the perimeter as part of their initial Guard School.

5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted 130 night patrols (Ambush, Recon, Listening Posts and Combat) and 31 day patrols during the month of July.

In July, two Kit Carson Scouts were attached to Provisional Rifle Company. These scouts have accompanied the Marines on the patrols and night activities and assisted them in the accomplishment of their mission.

b. On 4 July 1969, a day patrol discovered a Booby-Trap made with an unknown type of explosive at AT 922 820. Booby-Trap was blown in place.

c. On 11 July 1969, a night ambush observed 7-10 enemy moving North from AT 931 815. Enemy taken under fire with M-16's, M-79, and M-60. Enemy returned fire with small arms and broke contact, retreating toward North.

d. On 12 July 1969, a night ambush observed two enemy at AT 922 807. Enemy taken under fire with small arms and fled into tree-line. A later contact by the same ambush resulted in 1 USMC WIA Evac.

e. On 16 July 1969, an ambush spotted two enemy at AT 928 808. Enemy taken under fire with small arms. Area swept with negative results.

f. On 17 July 1969, a night ambush spotted two enemy at AT 921 809. Enemy taken under fire with small arms. Area swept with negative results.

g. On 29 July 1969, a patrol enroute to ambush site observed one enemy at AT 929 799. Enemy was taken under fire with M-16's. Enemy threw one hand grenade and fled into ville, Ap Thanh Vinh. Grenade resulted in one USMC WIA Evac.

6. COMMAND RELATIONS. Nothing significant to report.

7. EQUIPMENT. See paragraph ~~of this report~~ Company, Communications Company, and Truck Company, Chronologies.

8. LOGISTICS. Nothing significant to report.

9. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

a. During the month of July the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued it's "Self Help" program which is designed to improve its para-military forces. Projects of a recurring nature include support of education and vocational training, rice security and delivery, support of cottage industry and emergency relief.

b. The following projects were completed during the month of July or are in process and have received continued material and technical assistance throughout the month.

(a) Construction of one 12 foot bridge completed.

(b) Experimental poultry project started with 250 ducklings.

(c) Construction of three wells completed and three in progress.

(d) Rice pilot project using IR-8 in progress.

(3) Phu Loc Hamlet

(a) A vocational school for widows of ARVN Rangers established with six sewing machines donated by 7th PSYOPS Battalion.

(b) Pig donated by Communications Company used to establish a scholarship fund for orphans in the elementary school.

(c) Construction of two wells completed.

(d) Gifts and fresh fruit provided for wounded ARVN Rangers in DUY TAN Hospital.

(4) Trung Phuoc Hamlet; one well completed.

(5) Da Phuoc Hamlet

(a) Emergency relief granted to nine families in the form of food and building materials.

(b) One well in progress

c. On 21 July, 250,000 leaflets were air dropped on Hoa Hiep and Hoa Khanh Villages. All leaflets stressed progress of the Government of Vietnam.

d. The Hoa Khanh Childrens Hospital had a total of 2557 patient days and 975 persons were treated as out patients. MEDCAP II program treated 7,733 persons in six hamlets and 200 persons received dental treatment.
