NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided command, administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command. Other supporting services were provided Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, material handling, mess, utilities and supporting services for the operation of the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient Facility. In addition, operational supervision and personnel were provided for the internal and perimeter security as well as for the operation of the Provisional Rifle Company in support of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books, Red Beach, Danang, RVN.

c. During the initial Guard School, the 30 Day Guard and Security Platoon FAM-fired all weapons used by Security forces as part of the perimeter defense.

5. Special Operations

a. Defensive Construction

(1) During the month Seven new perimeter guard bunkers were constructed and Seven old bunkers were eradicated.

(2) Approximately 600 meters of additional concertina fences were constructed along critical areas of the camp's perimeter.

(3) A heavy layer of CS powder was dispensed along two miles of the camp's perimeter.

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(4) Numerous new fighting positions were prepared and improvements were made to many other perimeter defenses.

b. Patrol Activity

(1) During the month of August the Force Logistic Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted 141 night ambush patrols and 31 day patrols. ARVN Rangers, attached to the Combat Operation Center, conducted an additional 15 daylight patrols for the purpose of gathering local intelligence.

(2) A Quan Nam Provincial Reconnaissance Unit was attached to the Provisional Rifle Company during the period 1-11 August. During this association one VC suspect was apprehended at (AT955782) on the night of 5 August and a confirmed VC was captured at (AT 960778) on 11 August.

(3) On 9 August a day patrol from the Provisional Rifle Company discovered a hand illumination cannister improvised into a booby trap at (AT 919819). The device was disarmed and retrieved for further inspection.

(4) At 2030 on 15 August the southwestern perimeter of Camp Books came under heavy automatic weapons fire from an estimated VC/NVA platoon. The enemy fire was suppressed and they were forced to withdraw by intense fire from organic weapons, a Huey searchlight ship, and two Huey gunships. Two Marines were wounded and evacuated while enemy casualties were unknown.

(5) On 18 August a Provisional Rifle Company night ambush patrol detonated an M-26 grenade rigged as a booby trap at (AT 916818). Three Marines received shrapnel wounds and were evacuated.

(6) At 2100 on 20 August, a VC suspect was observed inside the tactical wire at the camp's southwestern corner. The suspect was taken under M-60 machinegun fire, wounded, apprehended, and hospitalized. The individual identified as a Vietnamese Regional Forces personnel, is being investigated.

(7) On 26 August, the point man of a Provisional Rifle Company night patrol detonated a land mine at (AT 924817). One Marine was seriously wounded and evacuated.

c. On 1 August a Vietnamese ARVN interpreter was assigned to the Combat Operations Center. This brought to two the number of interpreters so assigned, one for night work and one for use during the day.

9. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

a. During the month of August, the Civil Affairs Section continued its "Self Help" program which is designed to improve the paramilitary forces and make the Vietnamese people self-sustaining. Projects of a recurring nature include support of education and vocational training, English language lessons, rice security and delivery support of cottage industry and emergency relief.

b. The following projects were completed during the month of August or are in progress and have received continued material and technical assistance throughout the month:

(1) Nam-O Hamlet

(a) Construction of 400 meters of storm sewer completed.

(b) Construction of two wells in progress.

(2) Xuan Thieu Hamlet

(a) Irrigation dam 85% completed.

(b) Construction of three wells completed and two wells in progress.

(c) Experimental poultry project continues to progress with the first generation of ducks about one month from maturity.

(d) Road improvements completed including installation of culverts which will provide for all-weather use.

(3) Da Phuoc Hamlet. Construction started on a four room addition to Community Elementary School.

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(4) Phuoc Nghia Hamlet

(a) Construction started on a three room vocational school.

(b) A well ring factory employing six persons was established and is in operation.

(c) Construction of two wells completed.

(5) Phu Loc Hamlet

(a) Construction of ten toilets and two showers 90% completed.

(b) Remodeling of elementary school completed including paint, black boards and furniture.

(c) Gifts and fresh fruit provided for wounded ARVN Rangers in Duy Tan Hospital.

e. In cooperation with the 1st ARVN Ranger Group a check point was established at Nam-O Bridge (AT 931 837). The check point will be manned by Vietnamese Rangers with the twofold mission of traffic control and stoppage of VC supplies.

d. Communications Company continued its active support of the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage including supplies, material for clothes and furniture.

e. The Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital had a total of 2,528 patient days and 1,116 persons were treated as out patients. MEDCAP II Program treated 4,011 persons in six hamlets and 247 received dental treatment.



a. The Radio Platoon continued to provide radio communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. Additionally radio equipment and personnel were provided in support of 232 combat patrols and operations that were conducted by the Provisional Rifle Company, the Non-Commissioned Officers School, and for 32 resupply convoys to An Hoa, Hoi An, LZ Baldy and Hill 63. On 3 August 1969 the Tactical Telephone Service to Okinawa was reestablished and has completed 40 phone patches during this period. b. The Wire Platoon has continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, III MAF Transit Facility, Army Units in the Red Beach Area and Camp Haskins. New telephone service and additional extensions were provided for 38 subscribers. The Dial Central personnel performed all echelons of maintenance on their equipment. The automatic dial equipment completed 578,254 calls for subscribers and 26,650 operator assisted calls. Wire Platoon trouble shooters repaired 136 cases of troubles during the month of August. Wire crews repaired the damage to the M-9 cable caused by small arms fire and shrapnel fragments. Wire Platoon also repaired the 800A cable which was damaged by digging equipment, this damage required four splices on the cable. There were 105 pieces of equipment turned in for 2nd echelon or higher repair.

c. The Maintenance Platoon Radio and Telephone Technicians answered nine trouble calls, and processed 191 work orders. The Teletype/Crypto Technicians answered 381 trouble calls, and processed 38 work orders. The Maintenance Platoon IBM/Data Technicians answered seven trouble calls. During the month of August three Technicians were provided to the Communication Electronics Office for the Commanding General's inspection of FLSG-Bravo. A four station inter-communication system was installed in the Headquarters and Service Battalion Command Post. The loan of a Lenkurt 26C Modem to the 1st Marine Air Wing for an indefinite period has been effected.

d. The Communication Center Platoon continued to provide Teletypewriter/Digital Data Communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command at Red Beach. During the month of August 1969 the communication Center sent two of its personnel to attend the Message Reject School at Nha Trang. The Communication Center had the message total hit an all time high of 1,731 on 31 July 1969, this was partially due to the Communication Centers handling of all route traffic for the First Marine Air Wing. MEMORANDUM 8-69

1. The policy of helping the Vietnamese people help themselves was continued for this month of August. The Civil Affairs Team was assigned to three new Hamlets this month. At the present no major projects have been started. As an appreciation for our services in our former Hamlet (Nghi-An) there were some twenty-five people, each day, that worked here on the Maintenance Battalion compound filling sand bags and building bunkers. Due to the fact that these people were not paid out of the Battalion's funds but through efforts made by the Civil Affairs Team, the Battalion saved approximately 219,150\$ VN for the month of August. The amount of material distributed in the Hamlets this month is as following; eleven truck loads of scrap wood, three loads of building material, one load of rebar, sixty-five bags of cement, one half dozen steel stakes, and four rolls of barbed wire.
2. The doctor and his staff treated some 129 Vietnamese patients this month. At the present Maintenance Battalion does not have a MedCAP set up in the three new Hamlets, but we do plan to start our program in the Hamlets during the month of September. There was approximately 3800 loaves of bread delivered to the China Beach and Sacred Heart Orphanages.
3. The Personal Response Program is now giving its weekly tours held each Saturday. It is asked that the companies would cooperate in supplying the men asked by the Civil Affairs Team for each tour. The tour consist of the following places; to one of the hamlets, to the Children's Hospital here at Camp Books, to a Buddha and Cao-Dai Temple in DaNang, and to the Orphanages.
4. We encourage any man that is interested in sponsoring an orphan to contact the Civil Affairs Office on each Thursday morning at 0800. A minimum of ten dollars per month per child is asked for the sponsoring of an orphan. In the past men have contacted their parents or relatives and asked that clothing or toys be sent to them and they upon receiving them joined the Civil Affairs Team in distributing them at the Orphanages or in the Hamlet.

During the month of August 7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company continued support of Marine units in the Danang TAOR and the Republic of Korea Marines with POL products. 
