MARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided command, administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command. Other supporting services were provided Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, material handling, mess, utilities and supporting services for the operation of the III Marine Amphibicus Force Transient Facility. In addition, operational supervision and personnel were provided for the internal and perimeter security as well as for the operation of the Provisional Mifle Company in support of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books, Red Beach, Danang, RVM.

c. During the initial Guard School, the 30 Day Guard and Security Platoon FAM-fired all weapons used by Security forces as part of the perimeter defense.

5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

- a. Defense Construction
- (1) Highlighting defense construction during the month was the placement of a forty foot observation tower at the critical northwest corner of the Camp Book's perimeter. This greatly facilitated observation of a primary enemy avenue of approach to the Camp. Other significant defense construction included the eradication and reconstruction of three sentry posts.
- (2) A supplemental concertina barrier was installed across the lake and two new posts were constructed to cover the area. This made possible a consolidation of the Camp's perimeter, eliminating six old posts and reducing the guard requirement by twelve personnel nightly.

UNGLASSIFIED

- (3) Further strengthening of the Camp's perimeter, a third protective barrier of triple concertina approximately 1.9 miles long was erected along the Camp's Southern and Southwestern border. The protective wire across the lake was also reinforced.
- (4) Other perimeter improvements included refurbishing one post by the replacement of sandbags and the application of a protective asphalt coating.
- b. Combat Operations Center. Construction and improvements around the Combat Operations Center included the construction of a SEA Hut for permanent Provisional Rifle Company personnel and a Company Command Bunker. Other improvements included surfacing the roadway around the Combat Operations Center with base quartz.

c. Patrol Activity

- (1) During the month of September the Force Logistic Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a record of 240 night ambush and combat patrols and 39 day patrols in the Force Logistic Command's operational area. In addition, ARVN Rangers attached to the Combat Operations Center, supported by Marine radio operator, conducted 13 night ambush patrols and 8 daylight intelligence gathering patrols. Overall results of these efforts included the apprehension of five VC suspects, and the discovery of one cave and one surprise fire ing device. Significant incidents follow.
- (2) On 14 September at 2200 a Force Logistic Command patrol consisting of six ARVN Rangers and two Provisional Rifle Company Marines took two VC under fire at (AT 936812) liacent to a Buddhist Pagoda. The VC returned fire and withdrew. The Vietnamese discovered in the immediate area were apprehended for interrogation and later released.
- (3) At 2100 on the night of 24 September a Provisional Rifle Company fireteam located with a Popular Forces Plactoon at (AT 938822) spotted movement approximately 200 meters west of their position. The movement was taken under fire and the area was swept. Two partially filled rice collection bags were discovered in the area, but no personnel.
- (4) On 18 September a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol discovered a tunnel at (AT 921819) capable of housing several personnel. Several bloodstained bandages and some miscellaneous enemy equipment were found inside. The tunnel was destroyed.

- (5) At 0950 on 26 September a Provisional Rifle Company patrol discovered two booby trapped Chi-Com grenades at (AT 923817). The device was disarmed and returned to the Combat Operations Center for closer examination.
- (6) At 0330 on 29 September elements of the Provissional Rifle Company accompanying 5th Counter-Intelligence Team personnel were fired upon while attempting to apprehend a known WC at (AT 929817). The VC made good his escape under cover of darkness. An older woman found at the scene was apprehended for questioning and later released.
- d. Enemy Activity. During the month the Camp Books/Red Beach area received two enemy attacks by fire as follows:
- (1) At 0146 on 6 September two 122MM rockets landed in the vicinity of AT 943809, 500 meters east of Camp Books. Shortly thereafter, three additional 122MM rockets landed at (AT 938817), approximately 600 meters north of the camp. The rockets inflicted negative casualties or damage.
- (2) On 12 September at 0202 a post located on the Camp's southwestern perimeter came under attack by RPG fire. One round hit the post; two rounds hit the warehouse behind the post and two rounds landed in front of the post. On 14 September the body of one NVA soldier was discovered in a shallow grave approximately 100 meters west of the rocket firing site. The NVA had been killed during the 12 September attack by his own rocket backblast.
- e. Miscellaneous. On 6 September 61 prisoners were temporarily billeted within the Battalion Area because of extensive damage to the III MAF Brig due to an enemy mortar attack. The prisoners were effectively controlled and sustained until 20 September when the III MAF Brig was repaired and the prisoners returned.

- a. During the month of September, the Civil Affairs Section continued its "Self Help" program which is designed to improve local para-military forces and make the Vietnamese people self-sustaining. Projects of a recurring nature include support of education and vocational training, English language lessons, rice security and delivery, support of cottage industry and emergency relief. A vigorous program was instituted which involves combat patrols from the Proveisional Rifle Company in Civic Action projects training programs. Initial feedback indicates that this program is haveing a very successful impact on Vietnamese-American relation-ship.
- b. The following projects were completed during the month of September or are in progress and have received continued material and technical assistance throughout the month.
- (1) Nam 0 Hamlet. Construction of one well completed and one in progress.
 - (2) Xuan Thieu Hamlet
- (a) Marines from the Provisional Rifle Company continued to furnish assistance to the reconstruction of the Popular Forces Compound, which is approximately 80% completed.
 - (b) Irrigation dam/dike completed.
- (c) Construction of a second dam/dike started and about 90% completed.
- (d) Experimental poultry project completed first stage with sixty marketable ducks.
- (e) Experiments with American vegetable seeds started in two demonstration plots.
- (f) Introduction of rice threshing machines enjoyed great success. Estimates indicate that they are ten times faster than conventional hand methods.
 - (g) Construction of two wells completed.
 - (3) Trung Son Hamlet
 - (a) Construction of a small dike completed.
- (b) Construction of a community well started with assistance from Force Logistic Command Provisional Rifle Company.

- (a) Construction of a four room community school approximately 80% completed.
- (b) A Headquarters bunker for the Peoples Defense Force completed with assistance from the Provisional Rifle Company.
- (c) Construction of a community Medical Aid Station started with assistance from the Provisional Rifle Company.
 - (5) Phuoc Nghia Hamlet
- (a) Wellring factory has increased production to approximately ten rings per day.
- (b) Construction of a two room Vocational School approximately 10% completed.
- (6) Phu Loc Hamlet. Construction of ten toilets, two showers, and one well completed.
- c. Thirteen schools in our TAOR received gifts of eardy and cookies for the Mid-Autumn Children's festival. Thirty-five students were recipients of General Walt Scholarship.
- d. Communication Company continued its active support of the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage including construction of swine breeding facilities. Members of the Company also provided English lessons to 100 students of An Sang School.
- e. The Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital had a total of 2306 patient days and 895 persons were treated as out patients. MEDCAP II program treated 4768 persons in seven hamlets and 169 received dental treatment.

MEMORANDUM 9-69

- The policy of helping the Vietnamese people help themselves was continued for the month of September. Maint. Bn. Civil Affairs is presently assigned to three hamlets. The names of these hamlets are Hoa My, Phuoc Ha, and Trung Phuoc. On 30 September 1969, the dedication ceremonies for the school in Nghi-An hamlet were held. The men in the Civil Affairs Team received certificates of appreciation from the GVN for their services in the construction of the school. The school was named after L/CPL C.R. Grant, a former member of the Civil Affairs Team, who was killed on March 13, 1969. The amount of material distributed in the hamlets for the month of Sept. is as follows; 50 sheets of used plywood, 2 truck loads of 2kh's, 3000 bricks, 20 loads of fire wood, 4 rolls of wire, 160 bags of cement, 126 sheets of new tin, 17 boxes of ceramic tile, and 20 gals of paint.
- 2. The doctor and his crew treated about 60 Vietnamese patients on the base for the month of September. HM2 Jim Kachur, the corpsman from our sick bay, along with the Civil Affair personnel treated approximately 390 patients in the hamlets. The MedCAP was discontinued after 6 days due to the fact that there was a shortage of personnel at the sick bay thus making it impossible for the corpsman to go out. We do plan to start the MedCAP again as soon as possible. We here in the S-5 office would like to thank HM2 Kachur for his help and concern in our MedCAP's. We also thank HM3 J.G. Cox, who has since been transfered, for his help in getting us started in our MedCAP in the new hamlets.
- 3. The Personal Response Program is now giving its tours of the Da Nang area twice a month. The tours will be held on the second and fourth Saturday of each month and it is requested that each company supply a minimum of two men per tour. The tours will consist of visiting the following places, the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital, a Buddha or Cao Dai Tomple in Da Nang city, one of the three hamlets, and the Sacred Heart and China Beach Orphanages.

The Medcap team of the Battalion, composed of one Corpsman and two Vietnamese nurses conducted 48 Medcaps and treated 3,318 patients during the month.

Phu Thuong Thon, C907756, screening project of the dormitory is estimated 90% completed.

The Civic Action Officer has been appointed the Village Coordinator for Hoa Khanh Village. His principal functions will be to: (1) monitor the Village Self-Development Program, (2) advise and assist the Village Chief when it is deemed appropriate or requested and (3) maintain informal records and monitor the projects submitted under the Village Self-Development Program.

In the Well-Renovation Program 19 wells have been completed. Wells are built as well rings are provided

ASP #2, Ammunition Company was hit by two sapper attacks with RPG rounds. Results were: Marine: 1 Killed in Action, 2 Wounded in action; VC: 3 Killed in action, and 1 Prisoner of War; 1 Sea Hut and 1 Rough Terrain Forklift damaged.

Intelligence

6 September - CO10 Sergeant OGBOURNE investigated noise in fence and was wounded by a VC hand grenade thrown by sapper inside fence. While being helped up the bank by another Sergeant, Sergeant OGBOURNE was shot in the back through his flak jacket with an AK-47 and subsequently died. The VC had cut a 3 foot hole in the cyclone fence and several were inside with grenades and RPG's. When the first grenade exploded an RPG attack started on one of the guard towers on the other side of the Administrative Headquarters area. The 3 RPG's put some holes through one of the SEA huts and splintered some wood on the tower. PFC ANDERSON was wounded when the tower he was guarding was hit. The areas where the attackers were hiding in the bushes along the fence were brought under fire and in the light of the morning three bodies were found with 3 AK-47's, grenades, and RPG rounds. Total VC force estimated to be 7 or 8.

10 September - 0015 an estimated 3 VC sappers came under perimeter fence and fired an RPG into the Forklift maintenance SEA hut, a grenade damaged a forklift and a booby trap (but dud grenade) was found on another one. The area was taken under fire by the guards and the next morning one POW was captured where he was pinned down by random fire through the night at the many brushy areas in the nearby rice paddy (which can not be cleared since it is Vietnamese property).

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

Defense Construction

(1) Perimeter

- (a) Highlighting defense construction during the month was the placement of a fifty foot observation tower on the critical western perimeter of Camp Books. Other significant defense construction included the construction of six new perimeter guard bunkers.
- (b) Between Gates #1 and #3 approximately 1500 meters of triple concerting wire was installed to further strengthen the Camp's southern perimeter.
- (c) Other perimeter improvements included refurnishing two old perimeter guard posts and eradicating two other posts.
- (2) Combat Operations Center. Improvements around the Combat Operation Center included the import of ten tons of grushed bock and two hundred truck-loads of sand to enhance drainage.
- b. SPECIAL OPERATIONS. During the month the Force Logistic 'Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted 250 night ambushes and combat patrols and 41 day patrols in the Force Logistic Command's operational area. ARVN Rangers attached to the Combat Operations Center, supported by Marine radio operations, conducted an additional 10 night ambush patrols and 25 icance during the month was as follows: :
 - (1) At 2250 on 5 October perimeter sentries and an FLC patrol sighted movement 200 meters outside the camp's western perimeter. The movement was taken under Mol6 and Mol79 fire and enemy return fire was received. The area was swept with negative results following a heavy concentration of fire on the enemy's position.
 - (2) At 2304 on 7 October a Provisional Rifle Company night ambush patrol spotted one VCS at (AT 935824), and opened fire. A subsequent sweep of the area failed to locate the individual.
 - (3) At 0703 on 16 October a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol located and searched a bunker located in Xuan Thieu Hamlet (AT 926812). Ten AK-47 rounds, a VC Medical Kit, and two I.D. cards containing names of VC black list personalities were discovered and turned over to the 5th Counterintel-

ligence Team. The patrol also apprehended a VC suspect at the location who was brought in for interrogation and provided useful intelligence.

- (4) On 17 October a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol apprehended a VC suspect in the vicinity of Nam-O (AT 934826). The suspect was confirmed to be a VC by the 5th Counterintelligence Team.
- (5) On 18 October a Provisional Rifle Company night patrol observed four VC at (AT 917807) and took them under fire. The VC fled to the north and made good their escape.
- (6) On 20 October a Provisional Rifle Company ambush spotted six people digging in a rice paddy at (AT 925797), 300 meters to their north. The enemy were fired upon and the area was swept. The hole and numerous foot prints were discovered at the enemy's location but the personnel escaped.
- c. Enemy Activity. At 1630 on 15 October a Provisional Rifle Company day patrol at (AT 934814) was approached by a Vietnamese Regional Forces soldier who reported that two VC had just assassinated another Regional Forces soldier at his home at (AT 934816). The VC escaped to the north just prior to the patrol's arrival. The 5th Counterintelligence Team was called to the scene and a thorough investigation of the incident was conducted.
- d. Miscellaneous. During the month of October the Provisional Rifle Company conducted three cordon and search operations in the Force Logistic Command's operational area, resulting in the apprehension of two Vietnamese draft dodgers and two VC suspects. All were turned over to Hoa Vang District Headquarters.

- a. 4 October 1969, Brigadier General Richard R. TAYLOR US Medical Corps, United States Army.
- b. 4 October 1969, Commander Wendell A. JOHNSON, 7th Fleet Medical Officer, United States Navy.
- c. 15 October 1969, Brigadier General James A. FEELEY, Commanding General, of the Force Logistic Command, United States Marine Corps
- d. 29 October 1969, Rear Admiral John N. ALBRITTEN, US Medical Corps, United States Navy, Deputy Surgeon General.

10. COMMUNICATIONS

a. The Radio Platoon continued to provide radio communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. Additional radio equipment and personnel were provided in support of 326 combat patrols and operations that were conducted by the Provisional Hifle Company, the Non-Commissioned Officers School and for 57 resupply convoys to An Hoi, LZ Baldy and Hill 55. The tactical telephone service to Okinawa completed a total of 95 phone patches during the month. The following radio nets continued to be maintained by the Radio Platoon.

- b. The Wire Platoon has continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, Army units in the Red Beach area and Camp Haskins. New telephone service was provided for 11 subscribers. Fifteen (15) telephones were relocated. In addition, 16 extensions were installed on previous working numbers. The automatic dial equipment completed 659,030 calls for subscribers and 44,850 operator assisted calls. Wire Platoon Trouble Shooters answered and repaired 232 cases of troubles during the month of October 1969. Wire crews installed two (2) twenty five (25) pair cables from the FIC frame to the Department of Public Works building, approximate distance of one half mile. Seventy three pieces of equipment were turned into 2nd echelon maintenance.
- c. The Maintenance Platoon answered 218 trouble calls, and processed 220 work orders.
- d. The Communication Center Platoon continued to proved teletype-writer/Digital Data Communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command, 58th T.C. Battalion and 3rd NMCB. The traffic count for October 1969 was:
