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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided command, administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command. Other supporting services were provided Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, and material handling services. In addition the messing, facilities and other supporting services for the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient and R&R facilities were provided. Further operational supervision and personnel were provided to the internal and perimeter security as well as for the operation of the Provisional Rifle Company in support of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books, Red Beach, Danang, RVN.

c. During the month of November, all personnel assigned to the camp perimeter guard fired their T/O and guard weapons as a part of their monthly orientation training.

5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

a. Defense Construction

(1) Perimeter

(a) During the month, the Camp Books perimeter was significantly strengthened by the construction of five new perimeter guard bunkers and the reconstruction of three others. This enabled the eradication of six unserviceable posts. A new rear gate for the camp was also installed, replacing one recently damaged.

(b) The appearance of and observation around the perimeter was greatly enhanced by the police of debris around and within the camp's perimeter wire.

(2) Combat Operations Center. Significant face lifting of the interior of the Combat Operations Center was conducted which improved both the appearance and the efficiency of the center.

b. Special Operations. The Force Logistic Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a total of 238 night ambush and combat patrols and 35 day patrols within the command's operational area. ARVN Rangers attached to the Provisional Rifle Company, supported by Marine radio operators, conducted an additional eight night ambush patrols and 15 daylight intelligence gathering operations. These efforts netted two booby traps, three VC, and three detainees in addition to providing highly effective security for the Force Logistic Command and surrounding area. The significant activities during this month were as follows:

(1) At 2340 on 1 November, a Provisional Rifle Company night ambush patrol received incoming small arms fire from an estimated 4 VC at (AT939825). The enemy's fire was returned with M-16 and M-79 fire and the enemy was forced to flee the area.

(2) At 0622 on 9 November, a Provisional Rifle Company combat patrol located a booby trap at (AT934809). This booby trap consisted of c-rations cans packed with C-3 and set up with a trip wire and triggering device. The device was blown in place.

(3) At 0310 on 14 November, a Provisional Rifle Company night ambush patrol observed 3 VCs moving approximately 250 meters to their northwest at (AT920805). The patrol opened fire and received an estimated 10 rounds of enemy fire in return. The enemy departed the area under heavy fire.

(4) At 2030 on 16 November, a Provisional Rifle Company combat patrol found one booby trapped chi-com grenade at (AT924817). The device was blown in place.

(5) At 2130 on 22 November, a Provisional Rifle Company patrol spotted movement in a treeline approximately 50 meters to their south at (AT934818). While moving toward the movement, the patrol received small arms fire from an estimated 3 VC. The patrol returned fire and the VC quickly withdrew to the northwest.

(6) At 2030 on 24 November, a Provisional Rifle Company combat patrol observed two VCs in the rice paddies at (AT935820). The patrol opened fire and the VCs were observed to run to the northeast into Nam-C. A sweep of the area disclosed a blood trail and footprints.

c. Miscellaneous. During the month, the Provisional Rifle Company conducted two cordon and search operations in the Force Logistic Command operational area, resulting in the apprehension of three VC suspects. All three suspects were confirmed to be VC by the 5th Counter Intelligence Team and were subsequently turned over to the Hoa Vang District Headquarters.

8. LOGISTICS. Nothing significant to report.

9. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

a. During the month of November, the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued its "Self Help" program which is designed to improve para-military forces and make the Vietnamese

people self sustaining. Projects of a reoccurring nature include support of educational and vocational training, English Language lessons, rice security/delivery of cottage industry, and emergency relief. Combat patrols from the Provisional Rifle Company continued to support pacification efforts, working with both civilians and para-military units.

b. The following projects were completed during the month of November or are in progress and have received continued material and technical assistance throughout the month:

(1) Nam-O Hamlet

(a) Construction of one well has been completed; two other wells are approximately 35% completed.

(b) Rations, tactical wire, and stakes were provided in support of two popular force platoons.

(c) Material is being provided for the construction of a Self Defense Headquarters/bunk house which is approximately 75% completed.

(d) Plywood and 2 x 4's were provided to assist in the construction of one private school.

(2) Thuy Tu Hamlet

(a) A seven horsepower pump, pipe connections, and hose have been provided for the construction of an irrigation system. Technical assistance for the operation and maintenance of the pump is also being provided. The irrigation system is approximately 85% completed.

(b) A program of refugee relief to the Hamlet of Thuy Tu is being continued by providing scrap lumber and building material to the Hamlet. Also, commodities provided by I.R.C., in the form of corn meal, rolled oats, powdered milk, and salad oil, are being distributed in support of this program.

(c) An agricultural assistance program has recently been started in Thuy Tu. Seeds and some fertilizers are being provided to residents of the Hamlet. An agricultural expert from I.R.C. is primarily responsible for the technical assistance to the farmers.

(3) Xuan Thieu Hamlet

(a) Building material is being provided for the construction of a dam/dike at AT938828. This dam/dike will control the flow of water from the mountains to the surrounding rice farms. This project is 75% completed. Construction has been slowed due to bad weather and high water.

(b) Materials have been provided for the construction of three drinking water wells. Each well will serve fifteen to twenty families. This project is 85% completed.

(c) Cement and tin have been provided for the repair of a Buddhist Pagoda that was partially destroyed in a fire fight about two and a half months ago. Repair work is 60% completed.

(d) Technical assistance on a rice improvement project employing IR-8 rice is continuing to be provided.

(e) Materials are being provided for the repair of the floor of a Buddhist Pagoda in Tach Son, a sub-Hamlet of Xuan Thieu. The floor was damaged by a Marine patrol approximately one month ago. The repair work is 95% completed.

(4) Trung Son Hamlet

(a) Building materials were provided for the construction of a community shower. This project is now completed.

(b) Building materials and technical assistance are being provided for the construction of a MedCap Station. This project has just recently been started, and it is presently 10% completed.

(c) An agricultural assistance program has recently been instituted in Trung Son. Seeds, fertilizer, and technical assistance are being provided for this program.

(5) Da Phouc Hamlet

(a) Building materials and some technical assistance are being provided for the building of furniture for four school classrooms. Forty tables and benches are being built. The construction is 35% completed.

(b) Sand and rocks are being hauled to build up the ground of the Hoa Khanh market. Prior to these efforts, the village shoppers were having to walk around in a half knee-deep mud in order to do their shopping. This project has done much toward improving our relationship with the people in this area. Work is approximately 60% completed.

(6) Phuoc Nghia Hamlet. Building materials are being provided for the construction of a vocational school. This project is about 75% completed. Sewing and carpentry will be the subjects taught once the school begins operating. Two sewing machines and numerous carpentry kits have been purchased for use in the school.

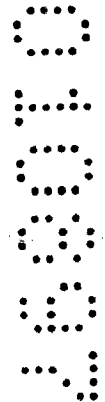

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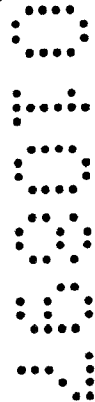

a. The Radio Platoon continued to provide radio communications for the Headquarters, Force Logistic Command. Additional radio equipment and personnel were provided in support of 296 combat patrols and operations that were conducted by the Provisional Rifle Company, the Non-Commissioned Officers School and for 66 resupply convoys to LZ Baldy and An Hoi. The Tactical Telephone Service to Okinawa completed a total of 137 phone patches during the month. The following radio nets continued to be maintained by the Radio Platoon.

b. The Wire Platoon has continued to provide telephone service to Camp Books, Maintenance Battalion, Camp Monahan, Army units in the Red Beach area, and Camp Haskins. New telephone service was provided for 12 new subscribers. Ter. telephone extensions were installed on previous working numbers. In addition, 33 telephones were relocated. The automatic dial equipment completed 750,762 calls for subscribers and 95,750 operator assisted calls. Wire crews completed installation of fire reporting phone system at ASP #1. Added 11 field telephones on perimeter of ASP #2. Wire Platoon Trouble Shooters answered 166 calls and completed necessary repair during the month of November. Twenty two pieces of equipment were turned into 2nd echelon maintenance.

c. The Maintenance Platoon answered 227 trouble calls and processed 142 work orders.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Bread production was ^{57,104}~~574~~ pounds. Average daily production was 19,037 pounds. Donut production was 58,000 dozen with an average daily production of 2,320 dozen. Ice Plant produced 716,800 pounds of ice, NSA produced 41,000 pounds, Bakery produced 164,000 pounds giving a total ice production of 921,800 pounds.

Automated Services Center processed nineteen supply updates with a total of 404,521 transactions, 31,966 issue documents and 126 hours and 15 minutes run time. 67,184 personnel changes were processed for entry into the Personnel Accounting System.

Central Control Point processed eighteen daily updates, including three special updates and a total of 34,078 requisitions, 15,121 receipts and 33,412 shipping documents produced. The total number of transactions processed was 401,000. The fill rate was 56% with fill rate for R/O Items being 65%.

At Shop Stores an automatic Requisition Follow-up Program has been developed in coordination with Automated Services Center to follow-up all R/O and non R/O requisitions with status over 20 days old. All requisitions were pre-viewed either manually before the automatic program was operational, or through the automatic program with the following results: ACI (Cancellations) 541, AFI (Follow-up when status has been previously received) 1,282, and ATI (Follow-up when status has not been previously received) 2,510. This automatic Follow-up is expected to increase the fill rate on R/O items and reduce shop down time while awaiting parts, from faster delivery of non R/O items. Wall to wall inventory was conducted in the MT MC131 Issue Point and Engineer MC134 Issue Point on about 3,400 items with an Inventory Gain on about 30% and Inventory Loss on about 30% with 160 non R/O items found in stock rolled back to MC100. Monthly average fill rate for all Issue Points was 82.4%

Ammunition Company handled 27,175 s/tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 2,680 s/tons of Class V(A) ammunition.

7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company continued support of United States and Korean Marine units in the Danang TAOR with POL products. The company remained in a reduced readiness category due to supplies and equipment not on hand as a result of combat losses and from the Ammunition Supply Point One explosion. The company is capable of maintaining current commitments.

Total on board strength for Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion is 576.

The notable increase of Supply Battalion personnel shown in Part I is influenced by the relocation of 91 from FLSC-B.

2. Civic Action

a. At the beginning of this period the on board strength for Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion was 584. The total strength at the end of the period was reduced to 576 as a result of 2 resignations, 4 immediate removals and 2 separations and disqualifications.

b. On the 45 MedCaps held a total of 2,648 patients were treated. 11 children and 3 adults were evacuated to the Hoa Khang Children's Hospital or the USAID Hospital in Danang. Approximately 2,700 Psyops leaflets were distributed at the MedCaps.

The hamlet of Phuoc Tan was reassigned from Supply Battalion's responsibility. No order has come from AC/S G-5 designating what unit is responsible for the hamlet at the present time.

e. The new school in Phuoc Xuan was finished and classes are now being held in it. The school has three classrooms and accommodates approximately 130 students.

Additionally they baked 150 separate small cakes for Marine patients in 1st MedBn hospital. A total of 41 cakes were delivered by helicopter to LZ Baldy, Hill 55, An Hoa, and Hoi An. This project produced in excess of 15,000 pounds of cake and completion required a total of approximately 1,832 man hours.

6. Special Events. Supply Company was toured by the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps, General Lewis W. WALT. Brigadier General PADALINO, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, received on site detailed briefings and tours of all Companies, sections and areas of Supply Battalion. 27 1st MARDIV Supply/S-4 Officers and Enlisted were briefed and toured Supply Battalion areas and sections.



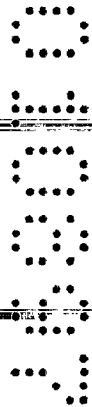

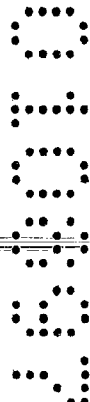

1. During the month of November the policy of helping themselves was continued. In the hamlets of Phuoc Ha, Hoa My, and Trung Phuoc the amount of materials distributed to the people was, 40 bags of cement, 92 sheets of plywood, 17 truck-loads of firewood, 14 trucks of sand for road improvement, 43 oil drums for trash barrels. In the hamlet of Phuoc Ha the playground for the children is near completion. We have installed two swing sets, volleyball net, and a baseball field. The teeter-totters are in progress of being installed. The Psychological Operation section of IEO has distributed leaflets on personal hygiene and sanitation. During the month of December we have plans of using a broadcasting system for our Psychological Operations.
2. The BAS MedCap Team treated 931 Vietnamese this month. The MedCap Team evacuated one man to the German Hospital ship in Da Nang. The Battalion Surgeon Lt. Bruins, USN, attended several of the MedCaps, we would like to express our thanks to Lt. Bruins. There was a total amount of 7,052 lbs. of bread taken to the Sacred Heart and China Beach Orphanages along with 5 boxes of clothes, 5 boxes of Christmas decorations, and 7 cases of assorted fruit.
3. The Personal Response tours have ceased, we hope that it is only temporary. Personal Response classes will be held within the Battalion in the future. Personal Response is one of the most important roles played in obtaining peace here in South Vietnam or any other country. If, and when the Personal Response tours are permitted to continue, word will be passed to the companies.
