

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the period covered by this Chronology, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided command, administration, communications and transportation support for the Force Logistic Command. Other supporting services were provided Marine Division/Wing elements of the III Marine Amphibious Force which include graves registration, bath and laundry, air delivery, and material handling services. In addition the messing, utilities and other supporting services for the III Marine Amphibious Force Transient and R&R facilities were provided. Further operational supervision and personnel were provided to the internal and perimeter security as well as for the operation of the Provisional Rifle Company in support of Force Logistic Command organizations located at Camp Books, Red Beach, Danang, RVN.

c. During the month of December, all personnel assigned to the camp perimeter guard fired their T/0 and guard weapons for familiarization as part of their guard orientation training. FAM firing also was conducted for all new personnel assigned to the Camp Security Platoon.

5. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

a. Security Responsibility. With construction of a new Force Logistic Command Retrograde Facility nearing completion 600 meters east of Camp Books, security responsibility for the new facility was assigned to the Camp Books Security Platoon on 14 December. The added responsibility increased the camp perimeter guard personnel requirement by 21 men.

b. Defense Construction

(1) around Camp Books (ASP#2). During the month of December, defense construction emphasis was shifted from Camp Books to ASP#2 due to completion of security responsibility for that facility in November. In the concentrated ASP#2 effort during the month, construction was centered on twelve defensive bunkers, including fighting positions, and three guard posts. A 1000-meter fence was ninety percent completed. Additionally, a strategically situated observation/command bunker was finished atop Hill 43 within the ASP#2 compound for observation and defense control. Further construction included the building of new gate sentry posts for both Gates #1 and #2 and the refurbishment of the ASP#2 Security Section command storage bunker.

(2) Camp Books

(a) Perimeter. Defense construction of the Camp Books perimeter continued during December, but at a reduced rate. Accomplishments included resandbagging two perimeter posts and the facelifting of Gates #1 and #2.

(b) Combat Operations Center. Remodeling of the Combat Operations Center continued both inside and out during the month. Inside, work included painting and partitioning which added much to the facility's utility and appearance. Additional sandbags were emplaced outside the bunker and one of the two entrances was remodeled, thus further enhancing the structure overall.

c. Special Operations. During the month, Camp Books security forces continued to provide high, effective security for the camp and the surrounding area. In this effort, the Provisional Rifle Company conducted a record 235 night ambush and combat patrols and 58 day patrols in the Force Logistic Company's operational area. ARVN Rangers, working with the Provisional Rifle Company and supported by Marine radio operators, conducted an additional fifteen night ambush patrols and eleven daylight intelligence gathering operations. These combined efforts netted three VC KIA, one VC wounded captured, and an additional six confirmed VC apprehended. The latter one captured during the period included two AK-47 and two M-14 automatic rifles, four K-54 9MM pistols, and several Chi Com grenades. Small quantity of VC/NVA documents, medical supplies, and equipment were captured. Significant activities during this month were as follows:

(1) At 0900 on 1 December, Provisional Rifle Company patrol 2A1, accompanied by a local Vietnamese intelligence agent, apprehended one confirmed VC in the Phu Nhieu District at (APN28812). The VC was turned over to the 5th Counter Intelligence Team for interrogation.

(2) At 1800 on 1 December, the confirmed VC captured earlier in the day led a confirmed Provisional Rifle Company/5th Counter Intelligence Team patrol to a house at (APN26213) where several VC were reported to

the building. Upon nearing the house, two VC were observed to bolt from the building toward the northeast. These persons were placed under fire and, although one was wounded in the leg, both made good their escape. Following this incident, the patrol immediately surrounded the house and received small arms fire from within. The fire was returned and the enemy was ordered out. Two persons responded and were apprehended. One of these persons was later determined to be a VC. Upon attempting to enter the house, the patrol again received fire. This fire was suppressed and the house was entered. Two wounded VC were found inside and were apprehended, and one VC died soon after of wounds. Two K-54 pistols also were captured.

(3) At 0745 on 2 December, Provisional Rifle Company patrol 202, dispatched to search the site of the previous day's activity, discovered a tunnel inside the house in question. The tunnel contained one AK-50 rifle, one AK-47 rifle, one ChiCom grenade, one M-26 grenade, eight AK magazines (fully loaded), assorted web gear, one first aid kit, and several enemy documents. The weapons and equipment were retrieved and the tunnel was destroyed.

(4) At 2200 on 2 December, Provisional Rifle Company combat patrol 20, working with Popular Forces personnel near Nam-O, approached a house at (AT937823) where VC were believed to be harbored. Before the patrol could surround the house, two VC made good their escape from the rear. However, one female VC who was in the house was apprehended and one AK-47 rifle, one AK-50 rifle, one surgical kit, and some documents were captured.

(5) At 0845 on 4 December, Provisional Rifle Company patrol 16, operating with a Popular Forces platoon on Hill 12 at (AT917813), encountered five armed VC in a house. In the ensuing action, two VC were killed and another was captured. The other two VC made good their escape into Quan Nam #1 Hamlet at (AT913817). Friendly casualties included one member of the Popular Forces platoon who was shot in the leg by a VC and two Marines who received minor shrapnel wounds from a ChiCom grenade. All three friendly casualties were medevaced. Total results of the action included two VC killed, one VC apprehended, and two K-54 pistols, three ChiCom grenades, and miscellaneous enemy equipment captured.

(6) At 2145 on 7 December, Provisional Rifle Company ambush patrol 102 observed three VC moving 200 meters to their northeast while setting in their ambush just west of the Camp Books perimeter. The patrol placed the enemy under fire with small arms and M-79 HE and received return fire. Concentrated friendly M-79 fire was placed on the enemy's position and he was forced to withdraw. A sweep of the area at first light produced negative results.

(7) At 2220 on 16 December, Provisional Rifle Company patrol 3A received small arms fire and enemy ChiCom grenades from a location

approximately 35 meters to their southwest at (AT918813). The patrol returned fire and the enemy broke contact and fled to the west.

(8) At 2045 on 18 December, fire was received by Provisional Rifle Company ambush patrol 3H1 launched at (AT91797). The nearby Camp Books perimeter also took fire from an estimated six VC/NVA. M-72 HE fire was returned and the patrol was moved to the north approximately 500 meters. Sixty MM mortar HE fire was then brought to bear on the enemy who quickly withdrew to the west. The area was cordoned and then swept at first light the following morning with negative results.

d. MISCELLANEOUS. During the month of December, the Provisional Rifle Company conducted one Cordon and Search operation in the Force Logistic Command's operational area. The effort resulted in the apprehension of two confirmed VC and the capture of one ChiCom grenade. The VC were turned over to the H'a Vang District Headquarters for interrogation and detention.

9. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

a. During the month of December, the Civil Affairs Section, Headquarters and Service Battalion, continued its "Self Help" program which is designed to improve para-military forces as well as assisting the Vietnamese people in becoming more self-sustaining. English language lessons, rice security, delivery support of village and/or hamlet

industry, and emergency refugee relief are among the more important programs conducted or supervised by this section during the month of December. Finally, combat patrols from the Provisional Rifle Company continued to support pacification efforts working both with civilians and para-military units.

b. The following projects were either completed during the month of December, or they are currently in progress and are receiving continued material and technical assistance.

(1) Nam-O Hamlet

(a) The construction of the Self-Defense Headquarters/Bunk House was completed on 26 December and the dedication ceremonies were held on 1 January 1970. This headquarters is intended to assist the Peoples' Self Defense forces in becoming better organized and therefore more efficient in their work.

(b) This section is currently providing assistance to two Popular Force platoons operating in Hoa Hiep Village in helping them with the construction of two large bunkers near their headquarters.

(2) Thuy Tu Hamlet

(a) During the month of December, a program of refugee relief in the form of commodities and building material for homes to this hamlet was continued.

(b) Construction of the furniture for the one room school has been completed and classes are scheduled to begin about 10 January 1970.

(3) Xuan Thien Hamlet

(a) Assistance is being given in the establishment of a duck farm capable of raising approximately 250 small ducks. The duck pens were completed this month and the ducks will be purchased on 10 January 1970.

(b) A project has been instituted to repair two temples that were partially destroyed during the TET Offensive of 1968. All the labor is being paid for by a group of village elders with assistance being given in the form of some cement and tin.

(c) Three drinking wells were completed during the month that will provide drinking water to three family groups consisting of approximately fifteen families each.

(4) Trung Son Hamlet. The construction of a MedCap station that will be used twice each week by a MedCap team was completed. Roughly 220 Vietnamese are treated each week in this hamlet.

(5) Da Phuoc Hamlet. The furniture for four classrooms was completed this month and it is currently in use in the Da Phuoc Primary School.

c. The Hoa Khanh Childrens' Hospital had a total of 2817 patient days and 880 persons were treated as outpatients. The MedCap II program from this section treated 3477 persons in six hamlets during the month, and 234 Vietnamese received dental treatment.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Supply Company continued to process roll back material. Incoming cargo amounted to 3,123 short tons with 20,762 documents processed, 250 items of rolling stock were received and 248 items were processed. Medical Supplies shipped consisted of 3/4 short ton. A Control Section with three sub-sections was established.

Ammunition Company handled 20,192 short tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 1,622 short tons of Class V(A) ammunition. The daily average for receipts and issues was 1,024 short tons.

On 23 December RADM ADAMSON, Supply Corps, visited the Automated Services Center.

Automated Services Center reported seventeen supply updates, including two specials, were processed during December with a total of 389,602 transactions and 26,926 issue mats. Total run time was 114.7 hours. There were 49,400 personnel changes processed for entry into the Personnel Accounting System.

Central Control Point processed seventeen daily updates, including two special updates and a total of 36,231 requisitions, 18,621 receipts, and 26,834 shipping documents processed. The total number of transactions processed for the month was 389,602. The fill rate for December was 61% with the fill rate for RO items being 69%.

7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company continued support of United States and Korean Marine units in the Danang TAOR with POL products. The company issued 262,063 gallons of diesel fuel, 171,351 gallons of mogas and 3,041 drums of POL products.

At the beginning of this reporting period, the on board strength of Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion was 576, which was reduced to 571 by the end of the month.

The first instructional training on the baking of pastries, using field expediency, was initiated.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. Logistics

a. Rolling stock in the amount of 248 items were processed to complete the seven call forwards on retrograde during December.

b. Ammunition Company reported the dump level at ASP #1 decreased to 5,272 short tons all of which are USMC assets, 4,185 short tons are Class V(W) and 1,087 short tons are Class V(A). The dump level at ASP #2 increased to 12,276 short tons of which 8,023 short tons are USMC assets, 3,458 short tons are U.S. Army, 417 short tons are U.S. Navy, 326 short tons are Project 972 and 52 short tons are Grade III. A total of 5,891 short tons were issued to various units as shown in Ammunition Company's Command Chronology.

EOD Platoon made 141 calls recovering 2,922 U.S. explosive items and 231 VC or ChiCom explosive items. The platoon destroyed 3.75 tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1.

7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company effected improvement in the equipment and supplies on hand and improvement in the readiness of equipment. Three of the fuel systems, amphibious assault, M64, which had been deadlined since 27 April 1969, were removed from deadline by the receipt of sufficient hose, 4" x 50', to support these systems. Nine of the sixteen systems remain deadlined for lack of sufficient hose and/or pumps to support this equipment.

2. New Program. The establishment of a Control Section comprised of three sub-sections, Document Control, Receipts, and Issue Sections promises increased quality assurance in the processing of material.

3. Training

a. On 18 December the first instructional training on the baking of pastries, using field expediency, was initiated. Utilizing trained instructors this school is designed to give the young and inexperienced bakers, throughout the First Marine Division, the knowledge of baking pastries under combat conditions. This instruction lasted through 28 December and was found to be highly successful with plans under way to continue this school in January, 1970.

b. Supply Battalion's Training Accomplished, for the month of December is listed on pages 8 and 9 of enclosure (1).

5. Civic Action

a. The Christmas Spirit prevailed during the month and several parties were held by different Sections in the Battalion for their Vietnamese workers and their families. Christmas Parties were also held for the villages of Phuoc Xuan, Trung Phuoc and the Phu Thuong Thon Orphanage. There were 300 children brought to Supply Battalion Area for these parties.

b. At the beginning of the period the on board strength of Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion was 576. During this period, the total strength on board was reduced to 571 as a result of 2 resignations, 1 immediate removal and 2 separations/disqualifications.

c. A total of 323 contacts were made, distributed between Phuoc Xuan, Trung Phuoc, Chieu Hoi #3 and Phu Thuong Thon. 84 MedCaps were held with a total of 2,948 patients being treated. Psyops leaflets were distributed at all MedCaps held by Supply Battalion and the total number of leaflets distributed was approximately 2,990.

d. 106 scheduled English Classes were held with a total of 730 students present.

e. Two manual pumps were installed at Phu Thuong Thon Orphanage finishing the project.

f. The hamlet of Da Phuoc asked for assistance from Supply Battalion for materials to build a two room primary school. The materials were delivered and as of 31 December this school was 93% completed.

g. Assistance was given to the building of a new hamlet called Chieu Hoi #3 and the first 200 families have already arrived at the Hamlet site to help with the building. There has been 47 loads of scrap lumber delivered to the new site. Forty folding beds were delivered, made available by the Assistant Chief of Staff (G-5).

Supply Company continued to process roll back material during this reporting period. Incoming cargo amounted to 608, 870 cubic feet at 3123 short tons with 20,762 documents processed and 250 items of rolling stock received. Cargo shipped was up from previous months with 269,240 cubic feet at 2960 short tons. Rolling Stock in the amount of 248 items were processed to complete the seven call forwards on retrograde during December.

Work on the new retrograde facility continues with plans calling for completion early in January. General Padalino was briefed on the facility during an inspection tour on the 11th of December.



NOT-Scoop

Christmas rotation policy - consistent with transportation scheduling, all Marines with a departure date in December will depart Vietnam prior to 10 December. This rotation dynamic was created in Vietnam prior to 6 January and will be gone before 19 December. Personnel who are eligible for discharge or release from active duty must arrive in the United States by 15 December while those returning for early release to attend college will depart Vietnam on their currently scheduled date.

VC COMMUNICATIONS

"The VC have a central communication center which is normally the battalion headquarters. The battalion headquarters area has a switch board, radio receivers and transmitters, as well as the message center. During a battle, the VC rely solely upon runners and field phones. They do not use radios for fear of giving their position away. The VC organize their sition on the basis of interior lines, and the elimination of a headquarters element would just about eliminate all possibilities of command and control."

FROM YOUR AMMUNITION - NOTES ABOUT MAIL
CALL

As the holiday season draws near, it seems to be a good time to discuss mail. We all sit around waiting for that letter or Christmas card from home. But there have been some indications that many Marines do not understand all they should about their mail service. In this issue of the SCUTTLEBUTT, we'll talk about:

*****FIRST CLASS INCOMING*****

First class mail ("first class" means letter mail) is delivered from all points in the U.S. to San Francisco, where it is sorted at the Fleet Post Office (FPO). How well the FPO is able to serve us depends to a great deal on how we keep our address "unscrewed". The FPO sorts mail using the **SECOND LINE** of your address. The second line should show the MAIL ROOM where you receive your mail. For everyone in the Battalion, the second line should read: "SUPPLY BATTALION, 1st FSR/FLC". When the mail sorters at FPO see this second line, the letter goes in a mail sack marked for our Battalion and it is not looked at again until your friendly mail orderly sorts it out right here in the Battalion area. The third line is for the Battalion mail orderly. It should tell him what company and section you're in. This will speed your mail up too. Examples: "Supply Co, Salvage Section" "Ammo Co, EOD Platoon"

The fourth line of your address is "FPO San Francisco 96602". This line gets your Sugar Report to Frisco in the first place. And that ZIP code (96602) is very important. Remember, the fewer times your letter has to be looked at, the faster it is going to reach you. So keep your address squared away.

Another thing about delivery. How does your letter get here? All letter mail, whether it is marked "Air Mail" or not,

crosses the Pacific by air, either CAFS or commercial. So if your Honey is near the West coast, tell her she can save a few cents by sending your letters regular mail. They'll get here just as fast. And all of us can remember the old civilian routine when the mailman came around every morning and filled up the family mailbox. Over here it's a little different. Mail can arrive at Danang Air Base at any time of the day or night. When it does, the Postal Clerks at the 1st Marine Division Post Office turn to and break down the shipment. As soon as the mail is ready for pick-up, a phone call gets the FLC Postal Clerks on the road. The FLC Post Office further sorts, and the mail is delivered to Battalion. When the Battalion mail room is ready to issue mail, the Company and Section mail orderlies are notified. Your letter is actually delivered to you by these gents. You might wonder why your letters reach you out of sequence sometimes. A typhoon at Midway or a faulty engine at Anchorage, Alaska can hold up a whole airplane full of mail. Additionally, this time of year is a nightmare for the postal types. They're working at capacity, and the postal channels can sometimes get saturated. You can rest assured that they're doing their best. A mail man who doesn't care can't stay in the mail business very long. Your Battalion mail room is inspected every week by the Postal Officer and monthly by the First Division inspectors. A careful and thorough scrutiny of all mail on hand is made during these inspections. In later issues of the SCUTTLEBUTT, we'll discuss packages and outgoing mail. The last word of wisdom:

- * Be alert to security.
- * Pay respects to GVN officials (provinces, district, hamlet chiefs, RVNAF officers) by saluting and addressing them as "Sir".
- * Observe these simple actions when speaking with Vietnamese Elders:
 - ** Stand on slightly lower ground.
 - ** Stand close to the person being addressed.
 - ** Speak softly.
 - ** Smile.
 - ** Fold your arms or keep them at your side. Hands on hips means you are about to strike the person.

DON'T

- * Display wealth and privilege; this separates you from the people.
- * Consume alcohol with or around the Vietnamese. It is an invitation to trouble.
- * Attract attention by rude, loud, or unusual behavior.
- * Be impatient. Vietnamese habitually exercise caution and this process often takes more time than Americans are accustomed to.
- * Exhibit intolerance or anger; these are all attitudes of the person who has no real understanding.
- * Pay more than the agreed maximum price for services.

UNIFORMS

It has been noted that many individuals are altering the tropical utility uniform. This practice is not authorized and those altering these uniforms may be required to pay for them. They remain government property on loan to you.

Mention should also be made in relation to wearing hats. Many men have been going around the area without hats or with the rain hat on when the sun is shining. When there's rain, wear the rain hat otherwise wear the utility cap. The hats that may be purchased at the PX are NOT authorized for wear with our uniforms here in RVN. We are still Marines so keep the covers on and make it the right one.

ADJUTANT'S TES - EARLY RELEASE PROGRAM

Last week, the Commandant of the Marine Corps sent out AIMAR 100 (an AIMAR is a message sent to all Marine units), which will be of interest to many Marines rotating during January, February and March. This AIMAR provides for early separation of certain RVN rotators. Whether a Marine qualifies for early release depends upon his EDS and normal release date. In some cases, Marines can be released up to one year early.

The release program announced in AIMAR 100 is in addition to the "60 Day" program, whereby a Marine returning to CONUS with less than 60 days left on his enlistment can be released early. This "60 Day" program continues in effect and is not connected to AIMAR 100.

There are many "IF's" in the new release program. As mentioned earlier, the program is limited to certain EDS's, applies to January - March rotators only and is further limited by original normal release date. Also, only personnel on their first enlistment and who request separation are eligible. Additionally, CM has emphasized that the program is subject to frequent change, and that no one should base their plans on early separation. The final decision as to whether a Marine is eligible will be made at the separation center.

On the local level, we have screened all January, February and March rotators to identify those who may be eligible for early separation. If you're curious and think this program may apply to you, your company office should be able to let you know how you stand.

A CHANGE

Materials that are of extensive value are not liable to the Marine Corps if lost, stolen or damaged. Most equipment such as cameras, refrigerators, etc. can be bought at the Military PX aboard base. So Marines are authorized to own them.

When leaving a combat zone these items can be shipped on orders.

Once the government accepts articles to be shipped by orders, they are fully responsible at depreciated costs.

Fragile items such as pottery, porcelain etc. if damaged in shipment will be paid for by list price not replaceable price.

During recent inspections of outgoing U.S. Mail in I Corps, a large quantity of government property and war trophies were recovered. The items confiscated have been forwarded to the appropriate CO for disciplinary action in accordance with existing regulations. The names of the OFFICERS and STAFF NCO's certifying that there were no unauthorized items contained therein, have been submitted too.

Regulations state that it is the responsibility of the MAILER to insure compliance with the law regarding non-mailable matter. Ignorance is no defense, since the mailer is expected to determine this fact prior to mailing. Violation of a lawful general order or regulation can be punishable by a DD and confinement at hard labor for two years.

Inspections are conducted at various points in Vietnam and CONUS. Such inspections will be on a continuing basis.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars are spent each year to replace individual equipment. Although much of that replaced is worn out in service or lost incident to combat, a almost equal amount is lost through carelessness or laziness. Items which appear too bulky to carry, or for which there is no immediate requirement, are dropped or the trail or left behind when a unit leaves a position. Marines who do this might regard such individual action as inconsequential, but taken as a whole it represents a considerable addition to the already staggering cost of the war. Just as important, the same actions result in the enemy being supplied, and may mean that some items are not available when they are needed.

Combat exigencies do not require that any of the following practices be adhered to:

- * Operating vehicles at excessive speeds.
- * Operating starter for more than 10 seconds at a time or not waiting 15 to 20 seconds between attempts to start the vehicle.
- * Running the engine at excessive speeds before normal operating temperatures are reached.
- * Failure to perform scheduled preventive maintenance.

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

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Headquarters and Service Company continues it's primary mission of providing the Battalion Commander with facilities for command and control. To provide administration, organic supply, light motor transport, maintenance and service support of the Battalion.
2. Eighty nine percent of the personnel have allotments registered for the purpose of U. S. Savings Bonds. In addition, twelve members of the Company are active participants in the Ten Percent Savings Program. The overall percentage for savings (bonds and savings deposits) is Ninety-Two point two percent.
3. Two enlisted men were promoted to Sergeant, three enlisted men to Corporal, eleven enlisted men to Lance Corporal and four enlisted men to Private First Class. The Company has three Staff Sergeants selected for Gunnery Sergeant.

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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Electronic Maintenance Company continues its standard mission of support to customers in the Danang TAOR and fourth echelon assistance for the I Corps Area of Vietnam.
2. Ninety point five percent of the personnel have allotments registered for the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds. In addition, twenty members of the Company are active participants in the Ten Percent Savings Program. The overall percentage for savings (bonds or savings deposits) is ninety two point four percent. This is the ninth consecutive month that this figure has exceeded ninety percent.
3. During the month three men were promoted to Corporal, one of them meritoriously, and twenty-one men were promoted to Sergeant.
4. There were no Office Hours held during the month.
5. Voluntary contributions to charities supported by the Battalion from Company personnel amounted to \$56.30.
6. The Company Choral group of about 30 men sang at the China Beach Orphanage, the Sacred Heart Orphanage, and the Maintenance Battalion Chapel dedication.
7. The Battalion Commander's Inspection took place on 26 - 27 December and was generally satisfactory with minor discrepancies.
8. One man extended his enlistment for 36 months.
9. Repair of fixed plant teletype equipment at the NSA Sea Anchor facility was continued by Company and attached personnel.
10. Planning took place for the initiation of an intermediate cryptographic repair facility in the Company for Nestor equipment.
11. The new Company maintenance facility at Camp Books neared completion and a tentative movement date of 10 January 1970 was established.
12. The Maintenance Shop received 4448 items during the month and completed 4451 items.

MEMORANDUM CIVIL AFFAIRS 12 1969

1. During the month of December the policy of the Vietnamese helping themselves was continued. In the hamlets of Phuoc Nghia, and Hoa My the amount of materials dis-tributed to the people was, 42 truck loads of sand and rock, 415 bags of rice, 225 bags of rolled barley, 175 bags of corn meal, 14 trucks of lumber and firewood, 120 sheets of tin. The MEDCAP building in Phuoc Nghia is now under construction and should be completed by 20 January 1970. The Psychological Operation section of our Civil Affairs Team has visited many of the families of our hamlets to see if their are receiving the materials they need, and to find out if they have any ideas as to how we can help them with projects that would benefit the entire community. The answer we received almost every time was that of "home improvement". A lot of these people live in what we refer to as a "paper house", consisting of bamboo, cardboard, thatch, and a dirt floor. We would like to sincerely thank the various companies of this Battalion who have supplied wood for this use.
2. The Maintenance Battalion MEDCAP team has treated 949 Vietnamese this month. They have evacuated a one year old baby to Childrens Hospital for treatment of a high fever and anemia. We would like to express our deepest appreciation to Lt. Bruins, USN, Battalion Surgeon, who has taken the time out of his busy schedule to supervise several of our MEDCAP. We are also grateful to Chaplin Awes and the 40 men of Electronics Company for singing Christmas Carols at our Orphanages, they did a most outstanding job, and the children really enjoyed it. A special thankyou goes to our men at GSM Company for the wonderful christmas party they gave the 63 orphans, they raised over \$400.00 for food, toys, and refreshments for the occasion.
3. The Personal Response tours have ceased, we hope that it is only temporary. Personnel aboard this base should be aware of the importance of Personal Response in obtaining peace in Vietnam as well as all over the world.
