NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Central Control Point processed sixteen daily updates with a total of 37,602 requisitions, 15,154 receipts, and 34,515 shipping documents produced. The total number of transactions processed for the month was 481,976. The fill rate for the month was 70% with the fill rate for RO items being 64%. In addition Automated Services Center processed 34,580 personnel changes during January for entry into the Personnel Accounting System. A total of 197,110 changes were processed during January for entry into the Man power Management System.

7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company continued normal Fuel Operations. 477,533 gallons of diesel fuel, 329,042 gallons of mogas and 2,110 drums of other POL products were issued. A slight improvement in the status of combat essential equipment and tables of equipment occurred. A complete inventory of all assets was held and the results posted to stock records.

Ammunition Company reported routine handling of Class V(W) and Class V(A) ammunition with a daily average for receipts and issues at 1,362 short tons.

Ration Company maintained normal production of Class I products. Bakery classes, initiated in December continued on an informal basis, graduating two classes.

Civil Affairs section reported the on board strength for Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion at 571. Contacts were made in Phuoc Xuan, Trung Phuoc, Cheiu Hoi #3, Phu Thuong Thon and Da Phuoc hamlets. 53 Med-Caps were held with a total of 2,742 patients being treated. At all Med-Caps, Psyops leaflets were distributed. English classes are being held regularly with a total of 696 students attending in January.

Supply Battalion was visited by several dignitaries including the Commandant of the Marine Corps, General CHAPMAN, and Lieutenant General BUSE. The new Retrograde Facility was the prime area of interest.

The tours and briefings were held in January for Supply Officers of 1st Marine Division to aquaint using activities with the internal working of the supply system.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Logistics

- a. 7th Separate Bulk Fuel Company issued 477,533 gallons of diesel fuel, 329,042 gallons of mogas and 2,110 drums of POL products. A slight improvement in the status of combat essential equipment and tables of equipment occurred. For the first time since all records and most of the equipment of this activity were destroyed by fire and blasts on 27 April 1969, sufficient meaningful usage data was accumulated to determine stockage levels for some expendable items.
- b. Ammunition Company handled 34,620 short tons of Class V(W) ammunition, 6,241 short tons of Class V(A) ammunition with a daily average for receipts and issues at 1,362 short tons.
- (1) The dump level at ASP #1 decreased to 15,266 short tons all of which are USMC assets, 10,286 short tons are Class V(W) and 4,980 short tons are Class V(A).
- (2) The Dump level at ASP #2 increased to 13,828 short tons of which 7,974 short tons are USMC assets, 4,512 short tons are U.S. Army assets, 4,426 short tons are U.S. Navy assets, 326 short tons are Project 972 and 150 short tons are Grade III.

- (3) EOD Platoon made 224 calls recovering 3,068 U.S. explosive items and 1,560 VC or ChiCom explosive items. The Platoon destroyed 18 tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1.
- (4) Control of the western protion of ASP #1 including nine magazines and ten cells was turned over to the ARVN.
- c. Ration Company bread production for the month was 670,896 pounds with a daily average of 21,642 pounds. Total doughnut production was at 83,550 dozen with a daily average of 3,094 dozen. Total Ice production was 106,000 pounds with a daily average of 3,419 pounds.

2. Civic Action

- a. At the beginning of this reporting period, the on board strength for Local National Civilians in Supply Battalion was 571. The total strength on board was reduced to 565 as a result of 2 resignations, 1 immediate removal, 3 separations or disqualifications, 1 death and 1 hired by the end of the month.

- c. 53 MedCaps were held with a total of 2,742 patients being treated.
- d. Psyops leaflets were distributed at all MedCaps held by Supply Battalion. Approximately 2,800 leaflets were distributed in this manner.
- e. 125 scheduled English Classes were held, with a total of 969 students attending.
- f. On 22 January, 1,250 people were inoculated against Plague in Chon Tom.
- g. On 29 January the Marine Detachment aboard the U.S.S. Constellation presented 23,600 \$VN to the Phu Thong Thon Orphanage. Major P. J. SEEP presented the money on behalf of all the men in his command.
- 3. <u>Personnel</u>. 10 Marine Officers and 183 Marine Enlisted were joined. 5 Marine Officers and 212 Marine Enlisted were dropped. No Navy personnel were joined or dropped. There were five career reenlistments during January. This command took pleasure in promoting 172 persons to their present rank as shown below:

5. Training

- a. Ration Company reported that Bakery Classes which were initiated last month to give instructional training on the baking of pasteries, using field expediency, to the young and inexperienced bakers, throughout the First Marine Division, continued on an informal basis awaiting formal approval from higher authority. Six bakers, from Force Logistic Command, 1st Marine Division, and 1st Marine Air Wing, graduated last month.
- b. Supply Battalion's Training Accomplished, for the month of January is listed on pages 8 and 9 of enclosure (1).

6. Special Events

- a. Several dignitaries visited Supply Battalion's area during the reporting period, including General CHAPMAN, Commandant of the Marine Corps, Lieutenant General BUSE, Commanding General Fleet Marine Force Pacific, and Major General Robinson, QMG. The new Retrograde Facility was the prime attraction and technical briefings were given to our visiters on the operation and mission of the new area.







SAND RAG PRESERVATION

The investment of man-hours and materials represented by a sandbag bunker, like any other investment, is well worth protecting. Although sandbagging of structures will always be a continuing project, overall eff expended in this regard, particularly that of replacing worn-out sandbags, will be substantially reduced wherever the life of sandbags is increased by even a small amount. Plastic sandbags, already a step in this direction through their increased resistance to exposure over previous burlap sandbags, can achieve an even longer life through treatment with a coating of asphalt petroleum (PSN 5610-233-0026). Requisitioned through normal channels, the asphalt may be applied on the exposed surface of sandbags with any stiff bristled brush. ANOTHER CASE RECORD

19 November 1969 - Lanc Corporal Tyrone BOGAN, Headquarters and Service Company, 1st Battalion, was convicted by a General Court-lartial convened by the Commanding General, 1st Parine Division, of conspiring with others to impede Armed Porces Police in the discharge of their duty to keep a suspected criminal offender in custody by partially surrounding the Filitary Police Vehicle with loaded weapons held in a threatening manner and stating that the offender would not be arrested, of assault upon Military Policemen in the execution of their duties by shooting at them with a .45 calibre pistol, of disrespectful behaivior toward a superior commissioned officer, and of wrongful posession of merijuana. He was sentenced to a Bad Conduct Discharge, configment at Hard Labor for 2 years, total f. leitures and reduction to private.

SERGEAUT MAJOR'S CORNER

Extracts from Harine Corps & FLC Uniform Regulations states: No articles, such as pencils, pins, pens, watch chains, fobs, jewelry, handkerchief, combs, cigars, cigarettes, pipes or other similar items shall be worn or carried exposed upon the uniform. Further, sunglasses when worn shall be conservative in appearance and design. Sunglasses in formation is specifically prohibited. The carrying of cames, "short timer" sticks and similar items are prohibited.

"No Shaving Chits"

Personnel with a facial skin condition may be issued a "No shaving chit" by a medical Officer. Upon issue of a no shaving chit personnel will be prohibited from shaving any portion of their face until a release has been obtained from a medical officer. No shaving chits will be renewed every 30 days until such time as the skin condition is corrected. During the time that an individual is prohibited from shaving the regultant growth of hair on his face will be kept neatly and closely trimmed. At no time will the growth be allowed to exceed 1 inch.

CUTTING 55 GALLON DRUTES

Nost Larines are aware of the hazards involved in cutting 55 gallon drums with a torch; however, many do not realize that the same danger exists when cutting diesel or asphalt barrels. The heat generated inside the barrel during cutting raises the temperature of the residual diesel fuel or asphalt beyond the flash point, and may result in ignition and explosion. Inasmuch as diesel fuel and asphalt are considered relatively safe when at lower tempatures, this danger is not apparent. Fill all drums with water while cutting, thereby preventing any possibility of explosion.

FIC Order 1710.3F designates the FIC Special Service Officer as the R&R Coordinator for this Command.

Personnel desiring to go on R&R will be required to initiate an R&R request in duplicate. Subsequent to approval by the unit mander, the individual will proceed to the office of the R&R Coordinator for assignment of an R&R quota. The R&R Coordinator will assign the individual a quota and return the original of the R&R request to the individual's organizational commander so that appropriate orders may be prepared. When the quota assignment is made individuals will be given a 3x5 card stating the location, inclusive dates, flight number, and reporting date and time for his R&R.

All personnel going on R&R will report to the despensary not later than six days prior to the commencement of their R&R for a check of their immunization record and the receiving of such immunizations as may be required.

All personnel in pay grade E-4 and below will report to the Office of the RER Coordinator five days prior to the commencement date of their R&R with their immunization record, Ration Card, identification card, Forders and identification tags. These lass will be checked for correctness and necessary action initiated to correct any discrepancies which would prevent the individual from going on R&R.

All personnel pay grade E-5 and below will report to the Camp Books gymnasium at the date and time designated for final briefing and transportation to the III MAF R&R Processing Center. Personnel in pay grade E-6 and above may attend this briefing and utilize the provided transportation. If they do not, it is their individual responsibility to ensure that they make the stated check-in time at the R&R Processing Center. Check-in times at the Camp Books gymnasium (en to the individual at the time of his quota assignment will also be given in the R&R bulletin rublishing availability of R&R quotas.

M151 SAFETY

Although safe driving practices may not vary greatly from one vehicle to another, vehicle drivers are making a big mistake if they feel the practices which apply to one vehicle apply without change to all the This consideration, true largely as a result of the differing handling characteristics of various vehicles, is particularly true of the M151. Considerably more powerful and possessing more responsive steering than previous utility vehicles, the M151 has its own unique safe driving requirements. A great concern is that its quick steering and speed-producing power are not the only factors considered by drivers. Another feature of the vehicle, that of its independent suspension, is deserving of equal or greater attention. This independent suspension produces an excellent load-carrying and riding capability, but it has a tendency to flip or go out of control upon encountering a pot hole or making a full right or left turn at speeds above 20 miles an hour.

This handling characteristic requires an extra degree of driver attention and caution. Drivers who are unaware of it, or ignore warnings, are obviously going to be in trouble if they let the M151's responsiveness to the wheel and the accelerator lull them into the belief it has sports car capabilities. Remember, the M151 is a cross-country utility truck and not one of the "hot ones."



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. Electronic Maintenance Company continues its standard mission of support to customers in the Danang TAOR and fourth echelon assistance for the I Corps Area of Vietnam.
- 2. Ninety three point six percent of the personnel have allotments registered for the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds. In addition, thirteen point seven percent of the Company are active participants in the Ten Percent Savings Program. The overall percentage for savings (bonds or savings deposits) is ninety four point six percent. This is the tenth consecutive month in which savings participation here exceeded ninety percent.
- 3. During the month, one man was promoted to Sergeant and one to Lance Corporal.
- 4. There were four Office Hours held during the month. All were completed at Company level with no appeals.
- 5. Voluntary contributions to charities supported by the Battalion from Company personnel amounted to \$72.50.
- 6. One man extended his enlistment for eighteen months.
- 7. The Company displaced from its location at Danang Air Base and rejoined the Battalion in new facilities at Camp Books. Maintenance was curtailed during the move (13 16 January). The move was accomplished without loss of equipment or injury to personnel.

1. The month of January has been a productive one for the Vietnamese who have worked hard helping their Hamlets and themselves. The aupplies that Maintenance Battalion has donated for the use of Hamlet improvement have been put to good use by the people of our Hamlets (Phuoc Nghia and Phuoc Ha).

There have been 35 truckloads of scrap lumber taken to these hamlets along with 305 sheets of tin, and six loads of dirt for use in the hamlet office. The Hamlet of Phuoc Nghia has used the above items for repairing homes damaged by fire and the hamlet offices. Camp Phuoc Ha has used some of their supplies for a two room school which is being built through the GVN. Our Civil Affairs Team also helped Phuoc Nghia haul 124, 700 Lbs of rice and foodstuff from Snang.

China Beach Orphanage and Sacred Heart Orphanage have been the recipients of 8,160 Lbs of bread this month, through the efforts of the FLC bakery and the Civil Affairs Team.

- 2. The MedCap Team has treated a total of 666 Vietnamese in the Hamlets of Phuoc Ha, Phuoc Nghia, and Hoa My. Hm3 Reagan has done an outstanding job giving aide to these people. Again, our thanks go to Lt. Bruins, USN for his interest and help.
- 3. The Personal Response Tours will be starting again in March, and anyone interested in seeing some of the culture and customs of the Vietnamese people, grab your camera and join us on these coming tours. Your company offices will be given the full details at a later date.

PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of January 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, motor transport, communications, and general support to Force Logastic Command and numerous other Marine and Allied Units.

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and support services for nine hundred forty (940) members of the Company who functioned in some thirty (30) different sections, throughout Force Logistic Command. The Company's Engineer Platoon contributed significantly to the habitability, safety and security of Camp Books in completing one hundred twenty six (126) formal work requests during the month. Of particular note is the work of the Engineer Platoon in the construction of containers for utilization in the redeployment of Force Logistic Command materials and equipment. The Force Logistic Command Fire Department, under the administrative cognizance of the Company and the operational cognizance of the Battalion S-4, answered thirty (30) fire calls during the month. The Fire Department also conducted eleven (11) fire drills with particular emphasis on Ammunition Storage Point fire protection.

During the month of January 1970, Truck Company continued to previde administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of Force Logistic Command, specified Third Marine Amphibious Force Commands, and First Marine Division Units. The Company conducted thirty one "Rough Rider" convoys to Hill 55 in support of the Seventh Marine Regiment, and several convoys to Fire Support Base Ross in support of the Seventh Marine Regiment. Small vehicle serials were utilized to support Marine and Allied Units located at An Hoa, Chu Lai, and Hoi An. Part IV contains Truck Company's operational and maintenance statistics for the month of January.

Communications Company continued to provide Communications Center services to all Marine, Army, and Naval Cemmands in the Red Beach Complex. The Cempany remeived two thousand one hundred ninety-two (2,192) messages for Naval Cemmands auring the month and transmitted seven hundred seventy (770) messages for the same Cemmands. On behalf of Army Commands the Cempany received two hundred forty four (244) messages and transmitted one hundred forty four (144) messages. During the same period members of the Company completed the installation of a new fire respecting phone system at Ammunition Storage Point #2. The Radio Plateen activated the Camp Books Tactical Command Net during the month in support of a repidly developing Camp Defense Plan. During the month 841,798 telephone calls were processed by the Company. Part IV contains Communication Company's operational and maintenance attitics for January.

Support Company continued to perform many diversified services for the Force Legistic Command and other Marine and Allied Forces during the month. In operating the III MAF Transient Facility and R&R Processing Center, members of Support Company processed 17,877 personnel, billeted 15,602 personnel, and messed over 30,000 transient personnel during the month. The Company's 1st Air Delivery Platoen, in conjuction with VMGR-152, dropped 4,742 flares and flew 346.9 man hours during January in apport of the 1st Marine Division and the Army's Americal and 101st Airborne Divisions. The Laundry Platoon, in support of Marine units throughout Quang Nam Province cleaned 98,680 pounds of laundry during the month. Support Company's Graves Registration Platoon processed eighty five remains during the period.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. <u>CIVIC ACTION</u>. The Battalion Civil Affairs Section supported agricultural, refugee relief, and educational activities in seven hamlets during the month of January, 1970. Within the spectrum of refugee relief the section supplied materials for, and assisted in the construction of, twelve homes for refugee families who immigrated to the hamlet of Trung Son (AT 921807) in early January, 1970. Members of the Battalion served as English language instructors for one hundred and twenty-five Vietnamese elementary school children at Hoa Khanh village (AT 954 790) on a weekly basis in a constantly improving program. The Civil Affairs Section Medical Teams rendered medical assistance to over five thousand (5000) Vietnamese nationals during the month.

2. SECURITY. During the period covered by this chronelegy members of the Command Security Force constructed a fortified command post complex atep Hill 48 at Ammunitien Storage Point #2 (AT 950774). This complex includes a 60MM mertar position, a 106 receiless rifle position, and a Combat Operations Center bunker. In an effort to further enhance the security of the Command's area of responsibility the Provisional Rifle Company strengh was increased to include a fourth platoon. This fourth platoon was activated on 25 January 1970 and immediately commenced a comprehensive ten (10) day training cycle. Training for all security personnel during the month included night marksmanship, forward observer and radio procedure training. The Provisional Rifle Company participated in four hundred twelve (412) security activities during the month. These activities resulted in the apprehension of nine (9) Viet Cong suspects.
