PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of May 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, motor transport, communications, and general support to Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine and Allied Units. The Battalion Commander and his staff continued to function in a dual capacity as Camp Books Commander and staff and as such were responsible for the many common usage facilities and functions of Camp Books, i.e. sanitation, police, maintenance, fire protection, utilities, etc. The Battalion Commander also continued to perform duties as Commander, Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, and in this capacity the Battalion Commander and his staff coordinated the security and tactical operations of Force Logistic Command and specified adjacent units.

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and support services for the more than 800 members of the Company who functioned in some 30 different operational sections. The Company's average daily personnel strength rose to 871 during the month of May, an average increase of 19 personnel over the previous month. The Battalion's Industrial Relations Office, under the cognizance of the Battalion S-4, supervised the personnel and medical administration of 453 Local National Civilian (LNC) employees under three separate fundings. In an effort to improve the physical health of these employees the industrial relations staff completed an audit of all employee medical records during May, 1970. As a result of this thorough audit 85 employees were treated at the Camp Books Dispensary for minor ailments and immunizations. These Local National employees, working in virtually every operational section of the Battalion, i.e. food services, material handling, supply, sanitation, etc, received remuneration in the amount of 3,729,640 piasters (\$31,606 US) during May. The Command Fire Department, operating under the staff cognizance of the Battalion/Camp S-4, continued to operate fire stations at Freedom Hill and Camp Books with sub-stations at Ammunition Storage Points #1 and #2. The Fire Department fought 30 minor fires during the month of May, a high for any month thus far during 1970, and conducted five fire drills to maintain their proficiency. In the realm of sanitation, the Battalion/Camp Police Sergeant was responsible for the removal and disposal of 22,000 cubic meters of dry trash and 76,500 gallons of wet garbage from the confines of Camp Books. The Police Sergeant and his staff worked hundreds of hours in maintaining the facilities of Camp Books and in "beautifying" the vast expanses of the Camp. Contributing significantly to the habitability, safety, and security of the Camp Books complex, the Company's Engineer Platoon completed 62 work orders during the month.

The Platoon exerted a great deal of its effort during May to the sorely needed renovation of the Battalion's billeting and office spaces. This renovation work included rewiring billeting areas, repairing and replacing deteriorated portions of several buildings, rescreening buildings in preparation for the summer months and numerous other projects. The Heavy Equipment Section of the Engineer Platoon delivered 500 loads of sand and 200 loads of fill to various units in the Camp in support of several vital projects. The Battalion's Organic Supply Section processed 939 requisitions during May, a decrease of 249 requisitions from the previous month. The Section obligated a total of \$110,928 for the month. In support of the redeployment program Organic Supply retrograded 106 major T/E items during May. Over 120 members of Headquarters and Service Company were promoted to the next higher grade during the month.

Truck Company provided administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of Force Logistic Command, specified III Marine Amphibious Force Commands and 1st Marine Division Units during the month of May. The Company conducted daily "Rough Rider" convoys to Landing Zone Baldy and Fire Support Base Ross and frequently sent vehicle task units to An Hoa, Hoi An, Phu Bai, and Quang Tri. On 28 May 1970, Truck Company conducted a special convoy to Dong Ha Combat Base in support of the retrograde operation of Project #972 from Dong Ha to Red Beach, DaNang. The entire round trip operation, including loading, was accomplished in 33 hours, with 164 tons of cargo being retrograded to DaNang. During the month of May, Truck Company was involved in the off-loading of four LST loads of high priority ammunition at the Red Beach Causeway. Three of these LST loads of ammunition were transported to FLC's Ammunition Storage Point #2, a six mile round-trip, and the fourth load to Ammunition Storage Point #1, a 15 mile round-trip. The initial total estimated time of completion for the four operations was 103 hours, but through excellent resources management the four operations were completed in 51 hours. A total of 2,142 pallets of mortar and artillery ammunition were transported during these four operations without a vehicle accident, or mechanical failure. In support of local commitments Truck Company transported all classes of supplies for Supply Battalion's Bulk Fuel Company, Ammunition Company, Shipping and Receiving Section and Rations Company. The Company also conducted port clearance/retrograde operations at the DaNang Bridge Ramp and Deep Draft Pier, and the Naval Support Activity. Daily motor transport support was also rendered to the III MAF Transit Facility, DaNang Marine Air Freight, First and Third Military Police Battalions, First and Seventh Engineer Battalions, First Marine Regiment, and Fifth Marine Regiment. The Company's Maintenance Platoon provided second echelon support for over 500 pieces of organic motor transport equipment, of which over 300 were prime movers. The Platoon also provided second echelon support for specified III MAF units. Part IV contains Truck Company's operational and maintenance statistics for the month of May.

Communication Company's workload continued to increase during May. The Communication Center processed 32,803 messages compared to 28,000 during April and approximately 10,000 per month during the period prior to III MAF's relocation from Camp Horn to Camp Haskins. On 24 May 1970 the Communication Center assumed the Communication Guard for the 1st Battalion, 44th Artillery Group, United States Army, a mission which will further increase the support rendered by the Company. The Communication Center also rendered communication service to the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific during his visit to III MAF during the month. The Company's Wire Platoon, in providing telephone service to Camp Viking, Camp Haskins, Camp Love, Ammunition Storage Point #2, and Camp Books, processed 789,423 automatic dial telephone calls during May and 47,802 operator assisted calls. In a major effort to improve telephone service at Camp Viking, the Wire Platoon replaced an obsolete system of five, ten-pair rubber cables and a field wire distribution system with a fifty-pair polyethylene cable and a completely new distribution system of drop wires and station protectors. In addition, the Platoon responded to 128 telephone repair trouble calls and completed 50 telephone work orders. Communication Company's Maintenance Platoon answered 172 trouble calls from the Communication Center, Radio Platoon, and Wire Platoon during May. Maintenance Platoon completed 89 work orders during the month. The Company's Radio Platoon maintained nine full-time radio nets and provided communication support for all convoys and all tactical operations conducted by Force Logistic Command. Part IV contains Communication Company's Communication Center workload statistics for the period March through May 1970.

Support Company performed many diversified services for the Force Logistic Command and other Marine and FWMAF during the month. The Company's Laundry Platoon, in support of Marine units throughout the DaNang area, processed 105,620 pounds of laundry during May, an average of 3,407 pounds per day. 1st Marine Regiment, Force Logistic Command, First Medical Battalion, and Hoa Khanh Childrens Hospital were the principal users of the laundry's services. As a part of a Korean Marine/U.S. Marine training program, the Laundry Platoon instructed Korean Marines concerning the operation and maintenance of field laundry units. In operating the III MAF Transit Facility and R & R Processing Center, members of Support Company processed and billeted 11,531 personnel and messed 28,926 personnel during May. The Company's Materiel Handling Equipment Platoon licensed 16 equipment operators during the month. Of this total, ten drivers received licenses for the RKF-6000 pound forklift, two for the M63 crane, and four for warehouse forklifts. The Platoon's equipment repair shops completed 66 work orders during May. Operating for 2219 hours, the Platoon's RKF-6000 pound forklifts moved 55,475 tons of supplies during May, while the CYF-4000 pound forklifts moved 17,809 tons of supplies in 2,378 hours of operation. First Air Delivery Platoon, in addition to their normal support missions, made several proficiency jumps during the month. Support Company's Graves Registration Platoon processed 60 remains during the month of May.

PART III

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. SECURITY. Tasked by the Commanding General, First Marine Division with the responsibility for coordination of all security activities within Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, the Battalion continued the planning and implementation of tactical operations and programs which would enhance the security within the Sub-Sector. During May, the Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a total of 768 security activities, the largest number conducted in one month since the conception of the Company.

On 1 May 1970, the Provisional Rifle Company, in conjunction with two infantry companies from Third Battalion, First Marine Regiment, and the Fifth Counterintelligence Team, conducted a unique "Kingfisher Operation" (AT 9282). The units mentioned above were prepositioned before dawn in blocking positions in the area while simultaneously a Chieu Hoi was voluntarily embarked on a U.S. Army helicopter. At first light the helicopter flew to the previously cordoned area and with the assistance of the Chieu Hoi attempted to identify and apprehend any VC/NVA, or members of the Viet Cong Infrastructure that might be in the area. A total of 30 persons were screened during this operation with negative results, but the technique will be utilized on a continuing basis in an effort to suppress infiltration into Sub-Sector "A".

Provisional Rifle Company conducted two company-size cordon and search operations during the month. On 21 May 1970 the Company cordoned and searched the hamlet of Xom Gon (AT 933817) and screened 126 persons with negative results. On 31 May 1970 the Company conducted a similar operation in the hamlet of Thanh Vinh (AT 928796) and screened 121 persons with negative results. Each of these operations was conducted with the assistance of the Vietnamese National Police Field Force, the Fifth Counterintelligence Team, and the Battalion Civil Affairs Section.

While conducting a squad-size, night combat patrol on 31 May 1970 the Second Platoon, Provisional Rifle Company made contact with two VC/NVA (AT 932795) and took them under fire. The enemy returned fire with small arms and attempted to flee the area. An immediate search of the area revealed one VC/NVA killed and one AK-47 rifle recovered. The VC/NVA killed was subsequently identified by Hoi Chanhs as a Platoon Commander from the C-1, NVA Company. A further search of the area by the First Platoon, Provisional Rifle Company revealed two VC/NVA packs each weighing approximately 30 pounds and containing food, clothing and ammunition. Each pack contained a complete NVA uniform as well as a Popular Forces uniform.

Throughout the month of May the Battalion's Security Forces continued to stress the Vietnamization program. Of particular significance was the technical assistance and materiel rendered to the Popular Forces Platoon stationed in the hamlet of Xuan Thieu (AT 928821). This project included the complete renovation of the Popular Forces Compound's defensive barrier system and the refurbishing of many defensive positions. The compound's present state of readiness has been enhanced greatly through this project.

The Security Forces continued to receive training in virtually all aspects of infantry operations during May, with particular emphasis being placed on the weapons training and forward observer programs. The chart included at the conclusion of Part III depicts in detail the Security Activities for May 1970.

2. CIVIC ACTION. The Battalion Civil Affairs Section supported agricultural, refugee relief, educational, medical, and self-help programs in eight (8) hamlets during the month of May, 1970. In an effort to improve agricultural production in the hamlet of Thach Son (AT 927813), the section assisted in the construction of an irrigation dam to be utilized in controlling the water-level in the rice fields. Also in the agricultural vein the Section continued to support two experimental hog farms in the hamlets of Thach Son and Trung Son (AT 918813).

In the realm of self-help programs the section assisted the residents of the hamlet of Da Phuoc (AT 913787) in constructing a house for the hamlet's school caretaker. Continuing a long-term water well construction program, the Civil Affairs Marines assisted the populace of the hamlet of Phu Loc (AT 963793) in constructing four wells and installing two pumps. This program has contributed significantly to the health and sanitation of the Vietnamese residing in the hamlet of Phu Loc.

The Civil Affairs Section participated in two Provisional Rifle Company cordon and search operations during May. Throughout each of these operations the Section rendered medical assistance to the local populace, provided food and cold beverages to the children and distributed psychological operations literature to the adults. The Section also coordinated the air dropping of 300,000 psychological operations leaflets within the Hoa Vang District.

During the month the Section renovated the MEDCAP II Aid Station in Hoa An (AT 987768) and thereby greatly enhanced the medical program in the hamlet. The table on page III-4 outlines in detail the medical assistance rendered the local populace during the month.

3. MEDICAL. The Battalion/Camp Books Dispensary tended to the needs of over 2,300 Marines during May 1970. The medical staff consisted of three medical officers and 25 hospital corpsman. In a continuing effort to improve records management 1,200 health records were verified and updated. The dispensary staff treated 2,395 patients during the month, filled 1,223 prescriptions, processed 1,856 X-Rays and completed 1,787 laboratory tests. Immunizations continued to be of major importance and 3,094 inoculations were given during the month. In accordance with recently disseminated policy 96 separation physicals were completed during May. In addition to the fixed aid station functions, the medical staff also provided an average of eight corpsman daily for convoys and tactical operations. An increase of skin diseases and heat rash disorders were noted throughout this period.

4. ADMINISTRATION. The Battalion's performance in the Manpower Management System for the month of May was particularly impressive. The total items reported increased from 1,566 during April to 2,334 during May while the error percentage remained the same and the late entry percentage dropped one per cent. The following table outlines by Company the performance for the month:




TRUCK COMPANY OPERATIONS



PASSENGERS CARRIED MAY, 1970







During the month of June 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, motor transport, communications, and general support to Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine and Allied Units. The Battalion Commander and his staff continued to function in a dual capacity as Camp Books Commander and staff and as such were responsible for the many common usage facilities and functions of Camp Books, i.e. sanitation, police, maintenance, fire protection, utilities, etc. The Battalion Commander also continued to perform duties as Commander, Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, and in this capacity the Battalion Commander and his staff coordinated the security and tactical operations of Force Logistic Command and specified adjacent units.

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and support services for the more than 800 members of the Company who functioned in some 30 different operational sections. The Company's average daily personnel strength decreased to 860 during the month of June, a decrease of 11 personnel over the previous period. The Battalion's Industrial Relations Office, under the cognizance of the Battalion S-4, supervised the personnel and medical administration of 422 Local National Civilian (LNC) employees. Remuneration was made to these employees in the amount of 3,729,640 piasters (\$31,260 U.S.). This was a decrease of 40,000 piasters due to a reduction in overtime hours. In the realm of sanitation, the Battalion/Camp Police Sergeant was responsible for the removal and disposal of 21,890 cubic meters of dry trash, and 78,675 gallons of wet garbage from the confines of Camp Books. The Command Fire Department, operating under the staff cognizance of the Battalion/Camp S-4, continued to operate fire stations at Freedom Hill and Camp Books with sub-stations at Ammunition Storage Points #1 and #2. The Fire Department fought 14 fires during the month of June, a decrease of 16 over the previous period. Contributing significantly to the habitability, safety, and security of the Camp Books complex, the Company's Engineer Platoon completed 63 work orders during the month. Major jobs performed during the period were the construction of the new reefer pad at Mess Hall #200 and the extension to the Preventive Medicine complex which is to be utilized as a laboratory area. Many minor tasks were accomplished such as repainting of many organizational signs, rescreening heads, rewiring huts, constructing cabinets, and building boardwalks and boxes. Also during the period, the Heavy Equipment Section constructed a flammable storage lot near Gate #2, in the Supply Battalion area. The Battalion's Organic Supply Section processed 507 requisitions during the month of June of which 60 were priority 02. These requisitions totaled \$92,578.83 in obligated funds. Also during the period ten pieces of major T/E equipment were retrograded to various in and out of country units.

Communication Company for the first time in several months experienced a decrease in messages processed through the Communication Center with 29,006 messages being processed by the Communication Center Platoon during June as compared to 32,803 in May. This reduction can be attributed to reduced supply transactions at the end of the fiscal year and a reduction in the number of intelligence messages being processed for III Marine Amphibious Force. Despite a rapid loss of trained personnel with few replacements, Communication Company maintained past levels of production and work loads in areas other than the Communication Center. During 26 and 27 June the Company assumed the communication guard for the Secretary of the Navy during his visit to the III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters. The Maintenance Platoon continued to provide 24 hour support to all platoons of Communication Company while responding to 165 trouble calls on telephone teletype, telephone, and data processing equipment, and completing 141 work orders during the month. The Wire Platoon in addition to providing telephone service to Camp Viking, Camp Haskins, Camp Books, Camp Love, and Ammunition Storage Point #2, processed 55,410 operator assisted calls and 718,345 automatic dial calls. The platoon also completed the distribution cable and drop wire in Camp Viking, the installation of a 100 pair cable from the FLC to the Army GRC-29 site, and a 12 pair cable from the FLC to FCC-19 in the Communications Center. On 14 June the regrading of the DaNang North Dial Telephone Exchange was completed. In addition a total of 162 trouble calls were processed by the Wire Platoon. Radio Platoon maintained nine full-time radio nets including four tactical nets while providing communication support for all Truck Company convoys and tactical operations conducted by Force Logistic Command. The platoon also handled 51 phone patches between FLC and Okinawa during the month. Part IV contains Communication Center workload statistics for the period May through June 1970.

Support Company performed many diversified services for the Force Logistic Command and other Marine and FMAF during the month. The Laundry Platoon, in support of Marine units throughout the DaNang area, processed 110,540 pounds of laundry during June, an average of 3,685 pounds per day. The 1st Marine Regiment, Force Logistic Command, and Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital were the principal users of the laundry's services. In operating the III MAF Transit Facility and the R&R Processing Center, members of Support Company processed and billeted 16,292 personnel and messed 37,804 personnel during June. The Material Handling and Equipment Platoon licensed 37 equipment operators during the month. Of this total, 28 drivers received licenses for the RKF 6000 pound forklift, 3 for the CYF 4000 pound forklift, 3 for the M-63 crane, and 3 for the warehouse tractor. The platoon's equipment repair shop completed 133 work orders during June. To date 148,167 tons of supplies have been moved utilizing Material Handling Equipment. The 1st Air Delivery Platoon personnel made 32 proficiency parachute jumps during the month while continuing the repack cycle on T-10 personnel parachutes. The platoon is also working with 1st Reconnaissance Battalion in the development of an extraction harness to be used by reconnaissance personnel during emergency extractions.

Truck Company, despite the lowest on hand strength figures since 4 October 1969 and increased overall commitments in operations, maintenance, cargo, fuel, water, and passengers, continued to provide extensive tactical and administrative motor transport support to all elements of the Force Logistic Command and specified III Marine Amphibious Force and 1st Marine Division Units. "Rough Rider" convoys rolled on a daily basis in support of Landing Zone Baldy and Fire Support Base Ross while smaller vehicular "task units" were dispatched to support the Second Combined Action Group Headquarters located near Hoa An 17 miles to the south and to units located as far as 100 miles to the north at Dong Ha. In addition, vehicle task units composed of 5000 gallon M131 refueler tankers were regularly assigned under the operational control of 11th Motor Transport Battalion for "Rough Rider" convoys to An Hoa in support of air and ground operations there. In support of local commitments Truck Company transported all classes of supplies for organic/attached units of the Force Logistic Command including Headquarters and Service Battalion and Ammunition Company, Ration Platoon, Rolling Stock, Shipping and Receiving, and 7th Bulk Fuel Company of Supply Battalion. Port clearance/retrograde operations at Bridge Ramp, Deep Water Pier, and Red Beach Causeway were conducted as well as extensive daily support to Force Logistic Command Retrograde Facility, 15th Aerial Delivery Platoon, III Marine Amphibious Force Transit Facility and R&R Center, 1st Military Police Battalion, Camp Books Post Exchange, and 1st and 7th Engineer Battalions. The Company's Maintenance Platoon provided second echelon automotive support for over 500 pieces of equipment, 300 of which were designated as engine powered prime movers. The platoon also provided second echelon support for 74 III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters vehicles and all vehicles organic to the 2nd Combined Action Force Headquarters. The Company continued to conduct driver training, instruction, and licensing of the M151 vehicle for the Battalion. 34 U.S. Government Motor Vehicle Operator's Permits were issued during June while 102 personnel attended a one hour Republic of Vietnam Driver Orientation Lecture. This lecture familiarizes personnel with Vietnamese traffic signs and traffic laws. Part IV contains Truck Company's operational and maintenance statistics for the month of June.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. SECURITY. Tasked by the Commanding General, First Marine Division with the responsibility for coordination of all security activities within Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, the Battalion continued the planning and implementation of tactical operations and programs which would enhance the security within the Sub-Sector. During June 1970, the Command's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a total of 760 security operations.

While conducting a squad-size day combat patrol on 7 June 1970, the Third Platoon, Provisional Rifle Company, uncovered a small cache containing eight 60 MM mortar rounds (U. S. markings). The rounds were packed in metal buckets and concealed in heavy brush alongside a small stream.

On 9 June 1970, the First Platoon, Provisional Rifle Company, in conjunction with Hoa Khanh Village Self Defense Forces conducted a joint Cordon and Search Operation of a portion of Hoa Khanh Village (AT954789). Approximately 1,000 personnel were screened for proper identification in an attempt to locate VCI, VCS, illegal residents, etc. The operation concluded with negative results.

On 25 June 1970, the Provisional Rifle Company conducted a "County Fair" type operation in the hamlet of Trung Son (AT918813). The purpose of the operation was to distribute children's clothing, foodstuffs, soap, etc. to the local populace. The Hamlet Chief and interpreters from Headquarters and Service Battalion S-4 and S-5 were utilized to help distribute the material. Headquarters and Service Battalion S-5 conducted a MEDCAP and served cold drinks and donuts. Approximately 150 small children were given clothing and toys. The material was donated by Operation Morale, Rochester, New York.

Reacting to intelligence provided by the 5th Counterintelligence Team, elements of Provisional Rifle Company on 29 June conducted a Cordon and Search Operation in Thach Son Hamlet (AT928813). The 5th Counterintelligence Team had reported that several hard core VC were in Thach Son attempting to re-establish a new infrastructure. A cordon was placed on the hamlet and a house to house search conducted with National Police Field Forces checking and screening indentifications cards. Approximately 50 homes and 120 personnel were checked with negative results.

The members of Provisional Rifle Company continued to receive training in virtually all aspects of infantry operations. Thirty-two newly joined personnel attended a seven day training cycle while other personnel in the Company attended Radio Operators School, Forward Observer School, a 30 day Combined Action Forces Vietnamese Language School, and FLC Non-Commissioned Officers Leadership School. The charts included on pages III-5 and III-6 depict in detail the security activities for June 1970 and the results of security operations conducted by Provisional Rifle Company from January through June 1970.

2. S-3. In conjunction with a Maintenance Training Program coordinated through III MAF Headquarters and the Second Marine Brigade, Republic of Korea Marines Corps, three Korean Marines received 1st/2nd echelon maintenance training in their occupational fields. This training included 1st/2nd echelon electronics maintenance from Communication Company, 1st/2nd echelon motor transport maintenance from Truck Company and 1st/2nd echelon small arms repair from Headquarters and Service Battalion Armory. The cooperation and performance of the Korean Marines was outstanding.

3. CIVIC ACTION. The Battalion Civil Affairs section supported agricultural, refugee relief, educational, medical, and self help programs in eight hamlets during the month of June 1970. In a continuing effort to improve livestock, the section is supporting two hog farms in the hamlets of Thach Son (AT 928813) and Trung Son (AT 918813). After several months of work, the long term water well construction program in the hamlet of Phu Loc (AT 963793) was completed with the construction of the last five water wells. Working in conjunction with the International Relief Commission, the section is helping to relocate 70 refugee families in DaPhuoc Hamlet (AT 948787) as well as assisting in providing materials for the construction of five planned water wells. In an attempt to improve the sanitary conditions of a maternity hospital located in Xuan Thieu (AT 935825) the hospital is also being completely repainted.

Assistance was rendered to the refugee hamlet of Thuy Tu (AT 928838) in obtaining construction materials (cement and tin) that had been requisitioned from Hoa Vang District Headquarters. This material will be used to construct homes for refugee families. 2000 English-Vietnamese school books were distributed by the section to various schools located in the Battalion area of responsibility.

During the month, the Navy Hospital Corpsman assigned to the section treated 3,429 Vietnamese patients in seven hamlets and two sub-hamlets. The section was also instrumental in planning a lecture which was delivered to all Hamlet Chief's of Hoa Heip Village. The title of the lecture was "Village Self Development" and was intended to educate the Hamlet Chief about funds and material available to them through the government of RVN. The lecture was held on 10 June 1970 at the Hoa Heip Village Headquarters (AT 935833). The presentation was given by a Vietnamese Army Captain.

4. MEDICAL. During the month of June the Battalion/Camp Books Dispensary changed from the manual cardex system of immunization to an automated computerized system. Over 2,500 personnel directly supported by the Battalion Aid Station, Headquarters and Service Battalion were phased into the system. In addition, the VDRL follow-up program was added to the system. The system is being utilized and has proven to be effective, accurate, time saving, and efficient. A special section was set up to conduct physicals for personnel returning to CONUS for separation. During the first full month of operation of this section, 223 personnel were given detachment physicals.

The Headquarters and Service Battalion Aid Station assumed medical support for 318 III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters personnel. This increases the number of personnel for direct medical support at the Battalion Aid Station to over 2,600. The Battalion Aid Station continued to furnish indirect medical support to approximately 1,000 personnel in Maintenance Battalion and Force Logistic Support Group/Bravo.

A comprehensive quarterly health verification was accomplished on 1,200 health records in the custody of the Battalion Aid Station. A total of over 2,500 health records have been verified.

In addition to providing four Hospital Corpsman for Provisional Rifle Company on a full time basis, corpsman participated in 63 field operations during the month, including familiarization firing details, convoys, NCO School patrols, and proficiency parachute jumps.

In addition to the new programs which were established and made operational during this period, the following routine services were rendered: The dispensary staff treated 2,376 patients; 1,352 prescriptions filled; processed 1,452 X-Rays and completed 1,651 laboratory tests.

5. ADMINISTRATION. The Battalion's performance in the Manpower Management System for the month of June continued to improve. The total items reported 2,319. The error rate remained the same and the late entry percentage was reduced by .5%. The following table outlines unit performance by Company:

6. SAFETY. During the first 6 months of 1970 the Battalion Safety Record reflected the increased emphasis placed on all aspects of safety within the Battalion. Compared with the first six months of 1969 there was a marked reduction in vehicle accidents, miscellaneous accidents, and accidental discharges. These decreases were effected despite an increased average onboard Battalion strength. The charts as page III-7, III-8, and III-9 contain comparative safety charts for the first six months of 1969 and 1970.

7. HOA KHANH CHILDRENS HOSPITAL. During a formal ceremony held 30 June 1970, operational and administrative control of the Hoa Khan Children's Hospital was transferred from the U. S. Marine Corps to the World Relief Commission. This ceremony marked the termination of almost five years of direct support of the hospital by Headquarters and Service Battalion. Personnel of Headquarters and Service Battalion have rendered numerous services and manhours to the development, support, and maintenance of the hospital. Many of these services will continue to be provided until the hospital is completely self sufficient. Doctors and Corpsman of the Camp Books Dispensary have provided medical and dental services to the hospital on a regular and voluntary basis. The Battalion mess hall has provided food for patients and staff of the hospital. In preparation for the turnover of the hospital to the World Relief Commission, the Battalion completed the construction, renovation and furnishing of several billeting facilities for World Relief Commission staff personnel, in addition to landscaping the hospital grounds. The years of hard work and effort put into the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital by Marines of Camp Books and FLC have seen the accomplishment of their goal-free medical care on a continuous basis for the Vietnamese children in the Red Beach area. Part IV contains a pictorial account of the change-over ceremony conducted on 30 June 1970.

TEROS PROCESSED JUNE, 1970



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


MILES TRAVELED JUNE, 1970



Don't let curiosity overcome your common sense. The life you save may be your own ... or the lives of the men you're responsible for!"

DRUG ABUSE. President NIXON designated the week of May 24 through May 30 as Drug Abuse Prevention Week. The urgency of fast, positive attention to this increasing problem necessitates thorough education of all personnel concerning the inherent dangers involved with drug abuse. Due to the efforts of LCDR P. C. OLIVER, Chaplain, USN, Lt S. C. BRUEINS, Medical Corps, USN, Captain T. W. JARRETT, USMC of the SJA office and Gunnery Sergeant B. D. SMITH, USMC of III MAF CID, the personnel of this Battalion received instructions concerning drug abuse.

The instructions, presented at the Camp Books NCO Club on May 26, 27, 28 and 29, covered the moral, medical, legal and enforcement aspects of drug abuse.

PET CONTROL. During Calendar Year 1969, there were 115 men treated for rabies at Camp Books. Currently, two personnel are undergoing treatment at the BAS for rabies. Pet control is mandatory. Rabies is a viral disease of the central nervous system, which produces an acute viral encephalitis that, if not recognized and treated in time, is fatal. Camp Order 6400.1 contains instructions concerning animal and rabies control. All animals must be registered and caged or leashed at all times. Pets must have proper immunization prior to being registered. There will be no dogs under three months old or unleashed/uncaged on Camp Books. Any person having knowledge of the whereabouts of unregistered animals contact the H&SBn/Camp Books S-4 (Telephone 2516). If you have a pet, ensure that it is under control.

USE OF SPECIAL SERVICE BEACH. The FLC beach is located at Camp Haskins, RVN. Personnel of the command are authorized to use the facilities there. FLC Special Services Section handles all scheduling of the beach. Personnel are cautioned to conduct themselves in a proper manner while enroute to and from the beach and while attending parties there. It's an excellent facility, let's keep it open for all to enjoy.



SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS NEEDED

It is essential that Marine Dependents know their sponsor's social security number, since many Air Force and Army facilities require that number in order to gain admission. Marine Corps identification cards do not carry the social security number, but it is incumbent on all dependents to have this number should they be asked for it on either Army or Air Force facilities.

GI BILL INCREASES

GI Bill educational benefits have been raised by up to 34.6%. The new increase which is retroactive to 1 Feb 70, will raise Government benefits up to \$175 per month for fulltime unmarried students, and up to \$230 per month for those with a wife and one child. An increase of \$13 per month will go to students for each additional child. Active duty, Marines going to school part-time will get an appropriate fraction of the above amounts. Full-time students, such as Marines in the College Degree and Associate Degree programs, will receive the full amount.

OFFICER EARLY RELEASE

Reserve Officers (less those in OF 44 and OF 75) with initial expiration of obligated service between 1 April 1970 and 31 December 1970 who have served an unaccompanied tour in WestPac may be eligible for release up to 6 months prior to normal expiration of obligated service. MCO 1910.28 gives complete details.

RECRUITERS, DI'S NEEDED

There is a continuing need for experienced Marines who are interested in returning to recruiting and/or the drill field. MCO 1300.9E outlines the procedures for Marines to apply. A successful tour of duty in either field is highly regarded by Marine Corps Promotion Boards, and qualified Marines should be counseled accordingly.

NEED FOR OFFICER PERSONNEL IN SUPPLY FIELD

Recent information received from Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps has indicated that there is a definite need for officer personnel, ranks from Second Lieutenant to Lieutenant Colonel, in the supply field. Retraining applications are encouraged and the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command desires to talk to any officer who is interested.

1. The security project in the Hamlet of Hoa My is now finished and there are gates to all entrances of the Hamlet. There is to be control over all persons that use these gates going in and out of Hoa My. Popular Forces will man these gates as soon as there is some sort of protection for them such as bunkers which have not been built yet.

2. The MedCap building was finished this month in Phuoc Nghia and the Civic Action Team from this Battalion and Colonel and Major were invited to join the grand opening of the building. There was food served and then there was talk of future projects of what will come next. All hands were recieved well by the people of the Hamlet.

3. The housing project of this hamlet is going well and there are about 16 houses finished as of now, however, this project will be continued for as long as it is necessary or until Civic Action is cut off. Also included in this Hamlet is house improvement which is going on at the same time as the others project.

4. There are many plans that are too long range for this office to take so they have been sent the GVN route for assistance. This is the start of a big program to get the Government to assist the people more and govern themself more.

5. There is also a large Refugee program going on and this will include all Civic Action Teams in zone 5. There is a large number of refugees coming into the area of Hoa Khanh and is creating a problem on space and housing. All teams are combining together and trying to come up with a plan to house these people in some area. There are problems with the area that they are suppose to give these people to live in and they as individuals do not want to go to that specific area. The area being out side the side of FLCgate and 7th Engineer compound. This problem will be long fought because of Deeds and papers to the land can not be found and the land cannot be secured to build on until all of it is cleared by deeds and papers.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Central Control Point processed twelve daily updates during the month of May with a total of 29,803 requisitions, 7,304 receipts, and 18,222 shipping mats produced. The total number of transactions processed for the month was 382,261. The fill rate this month was 46% with the fill rate for R/O items being 53%. The Automated Services Center processed 61,976 personnel changes for entry into the Personnel Accounting System.

Bulk Fuel Company continued to support U.S. and Korean Marine Corps units in I Corps with POL products during the month of May. During this period the company issued 532,179 gallons of diesel fuel, 285,003 gallons of mogas, and 3029 drums of POL products. In addition to its normal mission the company provided pumps for water supply points and wash down facilities. Work continues on preparing four fuel systems for shipment and on the evening of 31 May commenced transporting the fuel systems to embarkation staging points at Deep Water Pier, Ferry Landing and Bridge.Ramp.

During the month of May Ammunition Company handled 31,121 s/tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 5,281 s/tons of Class V(A) ammunition. The daily average for receipts and issues was 731 s/tons. EOD Platoon made 226 calls recovering 1,993 U. S. explosive items and 328 VC or ChiCom explosive items. The platoon destroyed 3 tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1.

Civil Affairs Section reported the average on board strength of Local National Civilians at 542 for the month of May. During the reporting period, approximately 25,000\$VN was expended from military resources for Civic Action Projects. 53 General Walt Scholarships were distributed in the Battalion Civic Action Area of Responsibility. All scholarships were in the amount of 500\$VN and were for primary education. This is an increase of 23 scholarships from the last reporting period. Major Civic Action Projects completed during May were 175 Kitchen Repair units at Trung Phuoc, a Meeting Hall at Chieu Hoi III, a Hamlet Gate at Phuoc Xuan and Rubbish Control at Chieu Hoi III. Psyops leaflets were distributed at all MedCaps held by Supply Battalion, approximately 3,000 leaflets were distributed in this manner. A total of 2,928 patients were treated.

Supply Company continued to provide support for the remaining I Corps Marine and ROC Marine units. Receipt and issue business has about stabilized for the last 2 months. Intensive Care-in-Store programs have been underway during this period to identify unserviceable materiel in stock. The repacking line, working in conjunction with the Care-in-Store inspection program, has been moved from the K lot to the old III MAF G5 warehouse right next to the K lot. Major personnel shifts took place in TLO, Salvage and Clothing with a new OIC in each area. Maximum administrative efforts are being made to ensure that all publications and directives are in order for the CG's reinspection on 7 June. The Retail Clothing Outlet (M2410) received and issued individual clothing to Marine, Seabee and ROKMC units within the DaNang TAOR. Rewarehousing of residual clothing after several large excess shipments has resulted in no outside locations remaining. All individual clothing is either in COMEX's or inside the warehouse.

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Shop Stores continued its Class IX support mission to the Maintenance shops of Maint Bn and FISC-B. With increased emphasis on clearing out all 1969 backorders and TERO's. The mechanized follow-up program was refined further in an effort to improve the reliability of status updating. A two day cycle of the program from receipt of status to input of follow-up was accomplished through cooperative efforts of the CCP and ASC with Shop Stores. Last efforts of checking the Location Catalog on items backordered are being made prior to evacuation of end items by Maintenance Bn to 3rd DSR.

Ration Company continued normal production of Class I products.





PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

Supply Company has continued to provide support for the Marine units in the ICTZ, Danang Area, south to Chu Lai, An Hoa and LZ Baldy and north to several CAG units in the Phu Bai area, and ROK Marine units in the Hoi An area. Receipt and issue business has about stabilized for the last 2 months. Though there have been no major troop withdrawals the influx of retrograde vehicles has continued very high. These are combinations of return of unserviceable for the R & E Program, disposal of H Code unrepairables, and serviceable excesses and redistribution of excesses to other units with T/E shortages. Intensive Care-in-Store programs have been underway during this period to identify unserviceable materiel in stock. Since many outside storage items had been there over a year considerable unserviceable was found which added to the Salvage Section workload in processing to the Army Property Disposal Office. Every effort is made to prepare delivery paperwork to the APDO while the material is still on the inbound truck then diverting the truck directly to APDO thereby eliminating the extra handling. Continued shortage of qualified salvage personnel has dictated that every shortcut possible be taken, but efforts of both the customer and salvage personnel are necessary to ensure the live ordnance is not shipped out inside of equipment.

The repacking line, working in conjunction with the Care-in-Store inspection program, has been moved from the K lot to the old III MAF G5 warehouse right next to the K lot. The Federal Group 84 clothing items have all been finished.

Major personnel shifts took place in TMO, Salvage and Clothing with a new OIC in each area. These were the result of 2 rotations, 1 new arrival and 2 interbattalion transfers. Over a hundred of the 455 troops of the Company added a stripe during the month and the ranks were happily thinned by the departure of 7 personnel with Undesireable type Administrative Discharges or sentences to be completed in CONUS.

Shop Stores continued its Class IX support mission to the Maintenance shops of Maint Bn and FLSG B, With increased emphasis on clearing out all 1969 backorders and TERO's. The mechanized follow-up program was refined further in an effort to reduce time traps with MC100 and improve the reliability of status up-dating. A two day cycle of the program from receipt of status to input of follow-up was accomplished through cooperative efforts of the CCP and ASC with Shop Stores. Last efforts of checking the Location Catalog on items backordered are being made prior to evacuation of end items by Maintenance Bn to 3d FSR.

Maximum administrative efforts are being made to ensure that all publications and directives are in order for the CG's reinspection on 7 June. Other administrative areas are expected to improve with better customer support provided due to assignment of a qualified SSgt O141 as administrative chief.

The Retail Clothing Outlet (M2410) received and issued individual clothing to Marine, Seabee and ROKMC units within the DaNang TAOR. Rewarehousing of residual clothing after several large excess shipments has resulted in no outside locations remaining. All individual clothing is either in CONEX's or inside the warehouse.

a. Expired shelf life batteries numbering 78,379 were disposed of this month. This represented 373,679 lbs and 8,875 Cu. ft. of materiel.

b. Other items disposed of this month consist of burnable and Non-burnable code "H" items representing 73,273 lbs and 6,494 cu. ft.

c. The Storage Platoon received authority to dissolve the PP&P protective block. The material will be integrated into the general account.

d. The Storage Platoon conducted a consolidation program in "A" Warehouse (Bin). 28,000 locations were checked resulting in 14,830 locations deleted (YLD).

e. A considerable amount of space has been consolidated. The most noticeable areas are in "A" warehouse and "R" - Lot with net space gained of 15,600 sq ft. and 72,000 sq ft. respectively.

f. The following are shipments made by storage which are worth noting:

(1) Shipment to MR100 of 8 different lines of class IV materiel ("L" form) weighing 476,320 lbs with 13,950 cu. ft.

(2) Shipment to VNN Dependents' Shelter Program, Saigon, RVN, of 1,183 pieces of 6 ft cast iron sewage pipe weighing 78,600 lbs with 2,989 cu. ft.

(3) Shipment to MSA02 of 500 reels of WD-1/TT wire weighing 44,585 lbs. with 211 cu. ft.

(4) Shipment to various other areas in the Pacific of 24 in. culverts weighing 170,563 lbs. with 3,285 cu. ft.

g. PP&P built 411 special boxes for Bulk Fuel and 68 for MACS-4.

h. PP&P Shop IV was moved from "K" - Lot into the old III MAF G-5 warehouse. One day workers are being used here with a good amount of success.

i. During the month, 3,824 incoming documents were processed consisting of 4,749 measured tons of materiel arriving on 99 USMC, 171 USN, 10 Sea-Land and 6 Ro-Ro trucks.

j. Document Control processed over 19,500 MRO's.

k. Approximately 276 boxes were completed on the Pole Line Construction Project.

l. The formal Accounting System was initiated at the Retrograde Facility on 1 May. Two informal inventories have been conducted since then.

m. Seven (7) ships proposed manifests were completed during the month of May. Processed were the Seatrain Colorado, SS Green Lake, SS Blue Grass State, USS Pendleton, USS Wild Ranger, MARMADRACO, and one (1) LST Fleet Shipping.

n. Medical Supply shipped medical supplies to Taiwan, Japan, and Korea for the PURA Project. This represents 154 cu. ft. and 1,664 lbs.

o. The Clothing Section deleted all outside storage. These items were transferred to inside locations or put in Conex containers.

p. TMO handled 1,526.0 short tons of incoming cargo and 1,276.4 short tons of outgoing cargo.

q. Shop Stores had approximately 5,650 transactions with an overall fill rate of 68.6% for all items and 80.3% R/O Items.

2. Casualties inflicted on the enemy through 8 Civic Action. No data to report.

9. Administration

a. A reinspection of the Files and Publications is scheduled for 7 June 1970, therefore a maximum effort is being made to ensure that all past discrepancies have been eliminated. Personnel have been assigned and trained with the assistance of the Bn Adjutant, Administrative Chief and File Clerk. Assignment of a SSgt O141 to Supply Company as Admin Chief has already made a noticeable improvement, not only in the files area but all office procedures.

b. Major personnel changes were:

Maj A. D. MARTIN reported in from the States and took over TMO Platoon.
 Maj D. FULLEM transferred from TMO Platoon to Salvage Platoon.
 Capt M. J. SARIN rotated from Salvage Platoon to CONUS.
 1stLt C. R. LANE rotated from Clothing Platoon to CONUS.
 1stLt C. M. DEVERE transferred from H&SCo, SupBn to Clothing Platoon
 SSgt J. W. STEPHENS reported in from the States and took over as Admin Chief.
 GySgt G. A. MANSELL transferred from TMO Chief to Bn S-3.

c. Average on board strength for the month was 455 which was a decrease of 10 personnel from the previous month. The actual on board strength as of 31 May was 464 which is 46 men below the manning level of 510. Current

replacements are just not quite holding their own against the rotations, the difference being primarily in the administrative discharge actions occurring prior to normal RTD's. However, we are glad to get rid of these undesirable characters who waste more of the good Marines time than they ever contributed.

d. The personnel living areas have been reorganized and all personnel moved into blocks of huts for each separate section/platoon. Better control of all personnel has been achieved, not only by this consolidation of living areas, but also through written appointments of Hut Commanders and Assistant Hut Commanders and publication of detailed instructions on their duties and responsibilities. All huts have had sand bag blast walls built around them and all condemned-as-unsafe bunkers torn down. A problem has developed through insufficient dump trucks to haul in sand to fill the large holes left from the sandbag filling operation. All Sgts have been taken out of huts occupied by Cpls and below. The average load per SEA Hut is: 4 SNCO's per hut, 6 Sgts per hut and 8 Cpl and below per hut. A rescreening project is making the huts more habitable with mosquitos not being a problem, despite the proximity of the swamp.

e. The disciplinary rate rose slightly from 40 offenses during April to 44 in May with 20 others awaiting some type investigative or administrative action.

10. Training.

a. General Military Subjects attendance increased a little over last months report. During the month of May there were 612 man-hours recorded.

b. Technical Training has increased almost twice the amount of man-hours recorded over last month. The man-hours of attendance recorded this months is 962.
