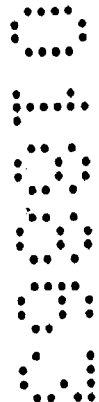

PART II

Narrative Summary

Throughout the month of July 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion continued to provide administrative, motor transport, communication, and general support to the Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine, Army, Navy and ROK units. As Camp Commander for Camp J. K. Books the Battalion Commander and his staff (See Part IV TAB-A for Headquarters and Service Battalion Staff and Officer Photograph) continued to exercise control over the many and varying common usage facilities found aboard the camp, viz sanitation, police, maintenance, fire protection, security and utilities. The Battalion Commander continued to perform the duties as Commander Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, whereby he was responsible for the coordination and execution of tactical operations throughout the entire area of responsibility.

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and support services to over 800 personnel on a daily basis. These personnel are found in 30 different operational sections indicating the vastness and complexity of the Headquarters and Service Company operation.

During the month of July 1970 the company's average daily personnel strength dropped to 811, a decrease of 49 from the 860 reported for the month of June 1970. The Battalion's Industrial Relations Office, under the staff cognizance of the Battalion S-4 Officer, supervised the personnel and medical administration of 422 local national civilians. Total wages paid was in the amount of 2,815,955 piasters (\$23,863 U.S.). This was a reduction of 913,684 piasters (\$7,743.00 U.S.) from the previous reporting period. In the area of Battalion/Camp Police on the 14th of July, a new Army trash contract was let. The new trash contractor, Phan Van Phuoc, removed 22,550 gallons of wet garbage and 10,757 cubic meters of dry trash during the remaining 17 days of the reporting period. The command Fire Department, under the staff cognizance of Battalion/Camp S-4, operated the fire stations at Freedom Hill, Camp Books and Sub-Stations at Ammunition Storage Points #1 and #2. During the month of July 1970, 26 minor fires were encountered and extinguished. The special feature contained on page III-4 of this report tells the Fire Department's story. Continuing to beautify and increase the safety and habitability of Camp Books, the Engineer Platoon completed a total of 133 work requests for an increase of 73 over the previous period. The projects included construction of 1,036 feet of boardwalk, the construction of a Sea Hut for 5th CIT, modification of the Camp Books Disbursing Office, distribution of 200 loads of sand, 50 loads of rock, 30 loads of dirt and numerous smaller projects, i.e. repairing water mains, installation of electrical fixtures and sockets. The Battalion's Organic Supply Section processed 1,190 requisitions, an increase of 251 over the preceding month. This amounted to a total monetary obligation of \$72,657. The organic supply section assumed supply support of "A" Company, 7th Engineer Battalion on 26 July 1970. A total of 360 line items of T/E equipment were picked up on the Headquarters and Service Battalion account. The value of the formal account has been increased approximately three

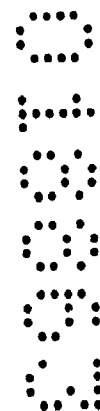
million dollars by this acquisition. The Organic Supply Section also picked up approximately 8,000 line items of repair parts and other classes of materiel. An issue point is being established in the "A" Company area. Stock control for the issue point is being provided by Battalion Supply. With the addition of the Organic Supply account from 7th Engineers the number of accounts that the Headquarters and Service Battalion was responsible for administering increased to 38.

The Communication Company continued to provide support to the Marine, Army and Navy units located within the Camp Pooks/Red Beach area. The Maintenance Platoon provided 24 hour communications and electronics support to all the platoons of the company, responding to a total of 368 trouble calls. The Radio Platoon manned an average of nine radio nets during July 1970. The AN/TSC-15 Van was moved from near the Battalion Supply building to its present location near the Staff NCO Club and camp power was provided. The Wire Platoon continued to provide dial telephone service to Camp Pooks, Camp Haskins, Camp Viking and Camp Love. Field phone service was provided to Camp Monahan, ASP-1, ASP-2, Camp Pooks Combat Operations Center and to the perimeter defensive positions. On 13 July 1970, in the vicinity of the Ranger Check point, coordinates 777965, the M-8 cable, a 100-pr cable that connects the FLC Frame to the 31 Test Station at Danang Air Base and carries 65 circuits which are tied to the FIC Telephone Exchange, was hit by small arms fire damaging almost all of the circuits. The cable was repaired and all circuits restored within 5 hours. The change of Sergeants Major of the Force Logistic Command, the Commandant and Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps' visit required the Wire Platoon to install 4 public address systems during the reporting period. On 29 July 1970, four trunk lines to tandem switch, which is our access to the Danang switch to allow entry into the South East Asia Automatic Telephone System, were changed from the M-8 cable to the Army UHF site located in the communication compound. The Communication Platoon noted a net reduction of 3,005 messages processed for July 1970. This is the second month that the total net traffic has decreased. Over the last two months the volume has decreased by 6,803 messages. Current thought is that the downgrading of the III MAF Command Sphere of responsibility is the significant cause of the message decrease. Communication guard was assumed during the month of July 1970 for the Commandant of the Marine Corps and the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific. Part IV TAB-B contains the Communication Center's workload statistics for the period June through July 1970.

Support Company performed many services during the month in support of the Force Logistic Command, FVMAF, and other Marine units. The Laundry Platoon in support of Marine units throughout the Danang area processed 121,140 pounds of laundry during July, an average of 4,025 pounds per day, for an increase of 341 pounds per day, over last month. The 1st Marine Regiment, Force Logistic Command and the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital were the principal users of the laundry's services. In the operation of the III MAF Transient Facility during July 1970, members of the Support Company processed and billeted 16,695 personnel and messaged 52,654 persons. The Air Delivery Platoon made proficiency jumps on 2, 9 and 29 July 1970. The Material Handling Equipment Platoon licensed 45 equipment operators during the month. Of this total, 35 drivers received licenses for the RKF 6,000 pound forklift; 6 for the CYF 4,000 pound forklift; 2 for the M-63 crane and 2 for the warehouse tractor. The platoon's equipment repair shop completed 125 work orders during July 1970. From 23 June

1970 to 23 July 1970, 899,342 tons of supplies have been moved utilizing Material Handling Equipment. During July 1970 the Graves Registration Team #1 processed 73 remains, the Danang Team processed 4 and 72 remains were processed by other teams. The combined total being 149 for the month of July 1970 and a total of 1820 for the year. Part IV TAB-C contains the supporting statistics.

Truck Company continued to provide administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of the Force Logistic Command, specified III Marine Amphibious Force units, and conducted "Rough Rider" convoys in support of the 1st Marine Division units. "Rough Rider" convoys rolled in continuous support of Landing Zone Baldy and conducted "shuttle runs" with aviation fuel to support operation "pickens forest" which began on 16 July 1970. The addition of shuttled fuel was necessitated due to fuel bladder damage at Landing Zone Baldy. Daily fuel runs were made to An Hoa under the operational control of 11th Motor Transport Battalion. Small vehicle serials were also sent to the 2nd Combined Action Group near Hoi An and north to Phu Bai and Quang Tri. Local commitments included transporting all classes of supplies for battalions and attached units within the Force Logistic Command and the 1st Marine Division Headquarters area. Extensive daily support was also rendered to the 5th Aerial Delivery Platoon, Marine Air Freight, Purchasing and Contracting Office in Danang and the XXIV Corp R&R Center/Transit Facility. Part IV TAB-D contains the significant operational statistics for July 1970. Truck Company's Maintenance Platoon continued to provide second echelon support for over 500 pieces of equipment, of which over 300 are powered prime movers, plus providing second echelon support for specified III MAF units. Part IV TAB-E contains the significant maintenance statistics for July 1970. The Company continued to conduct driver training, instruction and licensing of the M-151 vehicle operators for the Battalion. Forty U. S. Government Motor Vehicle Operator's Permits were issued during July 1970 while 82 personnel attended the one hour Republic of Vietnam Driver Orientation Lecture



PART III

Sequential Listing of Significant Events

1. Security. Tasked by the Commanding General, First Marine Division with the mission of coordinating all security activities within Sub-Sector "A", Northern Sector Defense Command, the Battalion continued the planning and implementation of tactical operations and programs which would enhance security within the Sub-Sector. During July 1970, the Battalion's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a total of 698 security operations.

On 9 July 1970, reacting to intelligence provided by the 5th Counterintelligence Team, Provisional Rifle Company conducted a cordon and search of approximately one grid square of rice paddies (AT 9382) near the village of Nam O. The operation commenced early in the morning in an attempt to apprehend VCI/VC making liaison with villagers. Approximately 50 personnel were screened with negative results.

On 10 July 1970, Provisional Rifle Company participated in a joint cordon and search operation with three Popular Forces Platoons and one National Police Field Force Platoon. The operation was conducted on a portion of the Hoa Khanh village, (AT 964785) and was based on intelligence received by Hoa Vang District Officials that small VC sapper elements reportedly were located in the village. This was the largest joint operation that Provisional Rifle Company has participated in to date in the continuing effort to work closely with Vietnamese officials and military personnel. Provisional Rifle Company was utilized as a blocking force while the RVN forces conducted the search and clear operation. Approximately 1,000 personnel were screened. Twelve persons were detained.

On 28 July 1970, while conducting a squad size night ambush the First Platoon, Provisional Rifle Company sighted one VC/NVA at (AT 928825) and took him under fire. The enemy returned fire and attempted to flee from the area. Following pre-arranged procedures, the squad swept the area under illumination finding one VC/NVA killed, one AK-47 rifle, and a pack containing food, clothing, ammunition, and 700 piasters. A further search at dawn revealed a small notebook indentified as belonging to a known local VC.

In a continuing effort to improve and test all aspects of Sub-Sector "A" security, a Sub-Sector wide alert drill was held on 30 July 1970. Camp Hooks, Camp Haskins, Camp Viking, Camp Love and Ammunition Supply Point #2 participated in the drill. The Force Logistic Command Chief of Staff, Colonel G. K. STURDEVAN, was present and briefed in all aspects of the drill. The drill tested contingency plans and enabled commanders at all levels to evaluate the readiness of their respective units and the overall readiness of Sub-Sector "A".

The Provisional Rifle Company Continued to receive training in aspects of operations during the month of July 1970. Twenty newly joined personnel attended a seven day training cycle designed to familiarize them with small unit infantry operations, emphasizing techniques used in the Provisional Rifle Company's area of operation. On 23 July 1970, all squad leaders participated in a Artillery Forward Observer School taught by personnel of the 11th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division (Rein) FME. Each individual was afforded the opportunity to call in and adjust 105mm and 155mm artillery fire.

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The chart included in Part IV TAB-F depicts the tactical security activities for July 1970.

2. Civic Action. The Battalion Civil Affairs Section supported agricultural, refugee relief, education, medical and self help programs in eight hamlets during the month of July 1970.

In continuing to assist and improve agricultural production, the section provided two 100 pound bags of fertilizer each to the hamlets of Trung Son (AT 919805) and Thach Son (AT 928815) and Thuy Tu (AT 906836). Also in continuing to support the two experimental hog farms in Trung Son and Thach Son, two 100 pound bags of corn were donated to the animal growth.

In self-help programs, the section in a joint operation with the International Relief Commission, embarked on a program to relocate 70 refugee families from the hamlet of Da Phuoc (AT 948787) to a less densely populated area within the perimeter of that hamlet. The International Relief Commission, with assistance from this section is providing the building materials for the homes. This section is providing well rings and cement to construct five planned water wells for the new settlement and two have been completed. Families are scheduled to be moved into the new homes as they are completed. This program will provide much needed relief to the overpopulated refugee hamlet of Da Phuoc.

The section also coordinated with 10th PSYOPS Battalion for the showing of a psychological film, "Rally To Your Government" in the Hoa Hiep Village, (AT 922860). There were approximately 450 people present for the showing. Signs with anti-VC slogans were constructed and painted by residents of Xuan Duong (AT 936836). These signs were mounted above the entrances of their homes. Materials were provided from this section at the request of the hamlet chief.

Total cost of materials expended to support the hamlets in this Battalion's area was 131,300 piasters (\$1,113.00 U. S.).

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3. Medical. During the month of July 1970, the 318 III MAF personnel for which FLC was tasked for medical support during the last reporting period were placed on the computerized shot list.

The Headquarters and Service Battalion Aid Station during the month of July 1970, treated 1998 patients; filled 1751 prescriptions; processed 655 X-rays; performed 1649 laboratory tests and gave 2354 immunizations.

In addition to providing four hospital corpsmen to the Provisional Rifle Company on a full time basis, corpsman participated in 61 additional field operations during the month of July 1970, including familiarization firing details, rough rider convoys, NCO School patrols, rifle range, and proficiency parachute jumps.

4. Commandant of the Marine Corps Visit. The Commandant visited the Force Logistic Command on 17, 18, 19 July 1970. Security required for his visit was provided by the Force Logistic Command Security Section, of Headquarters and Service Battalion. Included in this visit was a motor tour of the battalions on 18 July 1970.

The tour was concluded by a talk with all company grade officers at the Camp Books Officers' Mess. On 19 July, the Commandant was hosted by the Force Logistic Command Sergeant Major at a breakfast in the Headquarters and Service Battalion Messhall #200. After breakfast the Commandant visited and talked with over 100 selected Staff NCO's representing all units of the Force Logistic Command (See part IV TAB-G for pictorial representation), and attended religious services in the Camp Books Chapel.

5. Administration. The battalion's performance in the Manpower Management System for the month of July continued to improve. The total items reported were 2,858. The error rate was reduced to .2%. The following table outlines unit performance by Company:

Communication Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command received a letter from the Commanding General citing its exceptional performance in Manpower Management Reporting. A copy of the performance letter is contained in Part IV TAB-H.

6. FLC Fire Department Story. COMNAVSUPPACT DANANG Instruction 11320.3 assigns to FLC the responsibility for Areas 5 and 6 in the DANANG Military Complex, (See Part IV TAB-I). Contained in area 5 is the Camp Books Complex, ASP-2, Camp Haskins, Camp Viking, Northern Artillery Cantonment, 7th Engineer Camp and extends North to include the ESSO storage facility at the base of HAI VAN pass. All of these areas are provided fire protection from the FLC Main Fire Station located at Camp Books.

Area 6 is covered by the station at Freedom Hill. Contained within area 6 is the Freedom Hill complex; the 1st Marine Division Headquarters area; ASP-1 and the III MAF Correctional Facility. Fire protection for all of the area North and East of the airfield complex is the responsibility of the FLC Fire Department. This represents an area of 62 square miles. To provide fire protection we have on hand:

The real workhorse of the Fire Department is the M530B Fire Truck. These are tactical vehicles with all wheel drive; holds 400 gallons of water and 40 gallons of foam. Their real value in Vietnam is the ability to move off hard surface roads, and through the sandy soil commonly encountered in the Danang area.

The second type of pumper on hand is the International Fire Truck. It carries 400 gallons of water and 40 gallons of foam; however they have only rear wheel drive and have little off road capability. These trucks are on loan to FLC from the Naval Support Facility DANANG. The Fire Station also has four M-50 water tankers, each with a 1,000 gallon capacity to provide backup water for the pumpers. Two of the tankers have been equipped with 250 GPM pumps and can be used for small brush fire type operations. Also on loan from the Naval Support Facility is a 5,000 gallon truck tractor tanker. The FLC Fire Department is operated by a combined force of Marines and Vietnamese Firemen (See Part IV TAB-J). The FLC Fire Department is organized in 3 crews. After the loss of ASP-1 last year, one of the recommendations of the investigating board was that a full time dedicated fire force be established in each ASP. This recommendation was accepted and FMFPAC directed its implementation.

The order that assigns FLC Areas 5 and 6 also establishes several other functions to be performed. Among these functions the Fire Department is tasked to provide a 24 hour a day force to make initial response to all fire calls. This is accomplished by establishing two duty crews, on a 12 hour shift basis. Once the duty crew leaves the station in response to a fire call, a standby crew comes to alert status.

The Fire Department is also charged with the requirement to coordinate with units in and adjacent to our area which maintain fire fighting equipment. The only unit within FLC's area which maintains a fire fighting capability is NMCP-5 located in the Camp Haskins complex. They are equipped with a commercial pumper as part of their T/E. Should the Camp Books Fire Department be required to respond to a fire with the two trucks from the Camp Books station, the pumper from Camp Haskins will deploy and standby in the Camp Books Fire Station.

The Fire Department is also required to maintain a 24 hour radio watch on the DANANG vital complex fire net, (Bingo Net). In order to accomplish this task all fire trucks and the two command vehicles of FLC Fire Department are equipped with commercial two way radios. All stations and most of the pumpers in the DANANG complex are similarly equipped. Therefore, the Fire Chief at the scene has the ability to call whatever additional help he needs not only from his own assets, but also from the assets of every Fire Station in the DANANG area. Additional equipment available from other Stations includes: the MB-5's of the MW3G-17 Station; 5,000 gallon tankers with backup water and two Fireboats in addition to all the other pumpers in the DANANG complex. The Fire Department is tasked to participate in the I Corps Fire Fighting Training Program. This program includes providing instructors to the other stations in the DANANG area. The most recent training was a four day fire extinguisher school for all Vietnamese who work in the supply storage area, Camp Books.

A Fire Prevention Inspection program is conducted by two NCO's one from each station who on a 30 day cycle inspect each activity in their respective areas. Written reports are submitted to each unit inspected noting discrepancies to be corrected.

In April 1967, a mutual aid agreement was signed with the other fire departments in the DANANG complex. Out of that agreement and under the I Corps Fire Coordinator's direction, a system of automatic backup has

evolved. For example, a fire call is received from ASP-1 or 2, the Camp Books Station responds with a pumper and a tanker; which provides two pumpers and a tanker in addition to the force already located at the ASP. When the Fire Chief arrives on the scene, he determines if additional help is required; if so, he sounds the second alarm by radio. Automatically Freedom Hill sends 2 pumpers and 1 tanker, while at the same time MWSC-17 deploys a pumper to the Freedom Hill station to provide backup. Should the fire continue to spread the 3rd or general alarm is sounded; when this occurs the pumper from Freedom Hill is dispatched and MWSC-17 also deploys a pumper and a tanker to the fire. Station #2 downtown DANANG, also deploys a pumper and a tanker to the fire and a pumper to station #7, at MWSC-17. With this procedure a total of 7 pumpers and 4 tankers can respond to any fire. If additional equipment is still required, it would be summoned specifically by radio.

When the Marine redeployment from DANANG is completed, the Vietnamese who serve on the FLC Fire Department will have had at least 2 years experience with the Fire Department. They are today the most highly trained and competent Vietnamese Firemen in the DANANG area. These men are fully qualified and together with the Marines make up the crews in the Fire Department. This team work will give the Vietnamese Firemen the experience and technical expertise to operate their own stations upon the redeployment of U. S. Military units from the DANANG area.

7. Commanding General's Semi Annual Inspection. During the period 7 through 9 July 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion underwent the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command Semi Annual Inspection. The evaluation of the overall condition of those functions inspected and reported on was satisfactory with Minor Discrepancies. The following items were considered to be noteworthy and reflect favorably upon the personnel and units of this command:

a. The organization of Battalion Legal Office. The legal files and directives. The command utilization of senior Staff NCO's as investigators on appropriate occasions.

b. The overall appearance of the troop billeting area.

c. The knowledge, enthusiasm and interest displayed by the S-4 MARES clerk.

d. The storage and maintenance of NBC clothing and protective equipment.

e. Embarkation section of Communication Company.

f. The Battalion indoctrination program. Well balanced, objective and satisfactory attendance.

g. The motivation of the Career Planners and their neat attractive and eye catching offices.

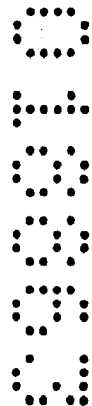
h. The Training Program and Driver Training Program of Truck Company.

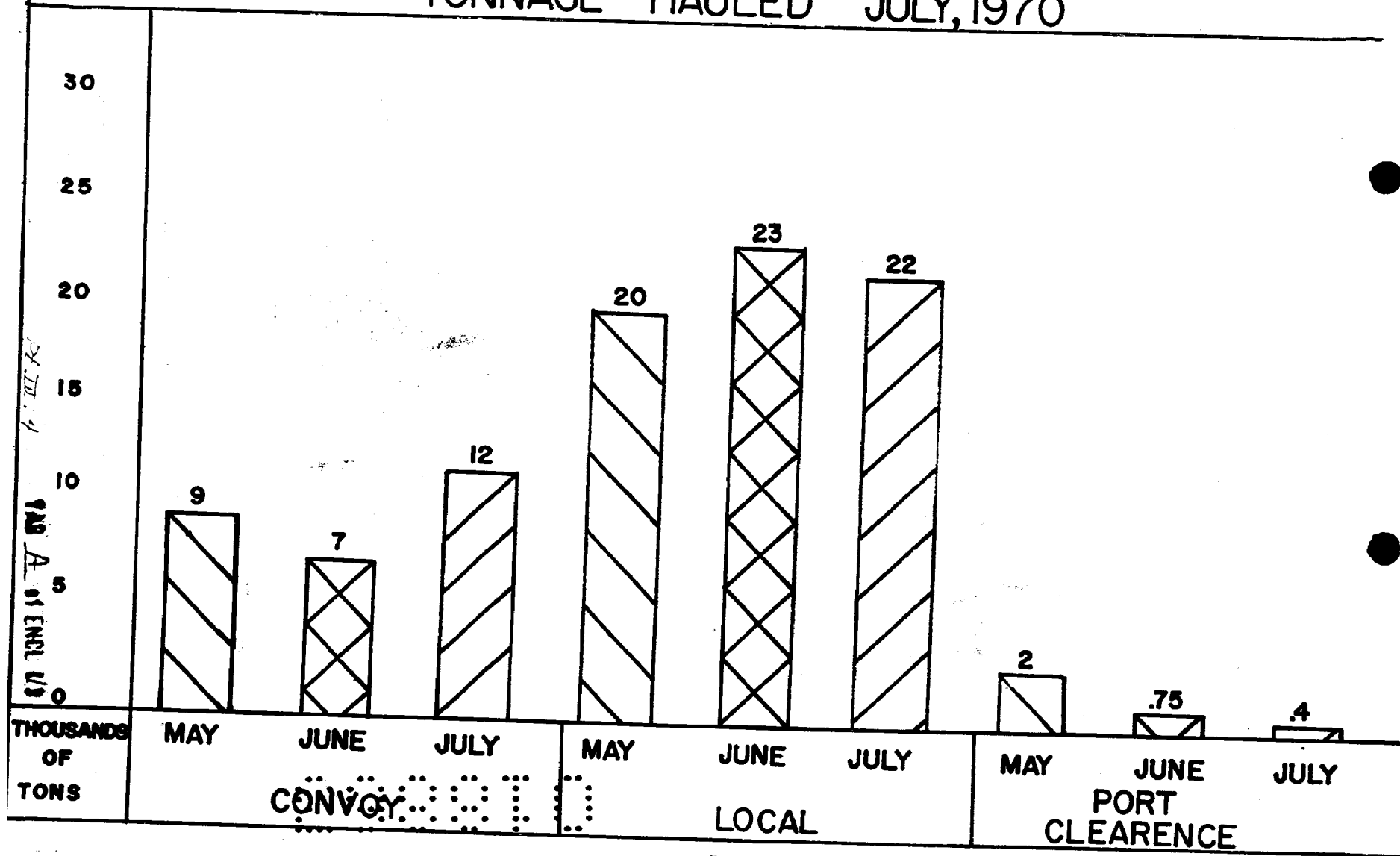
TRUCK COMPANY OPERATIONS

TONNAGE HAULED JULY, 1970

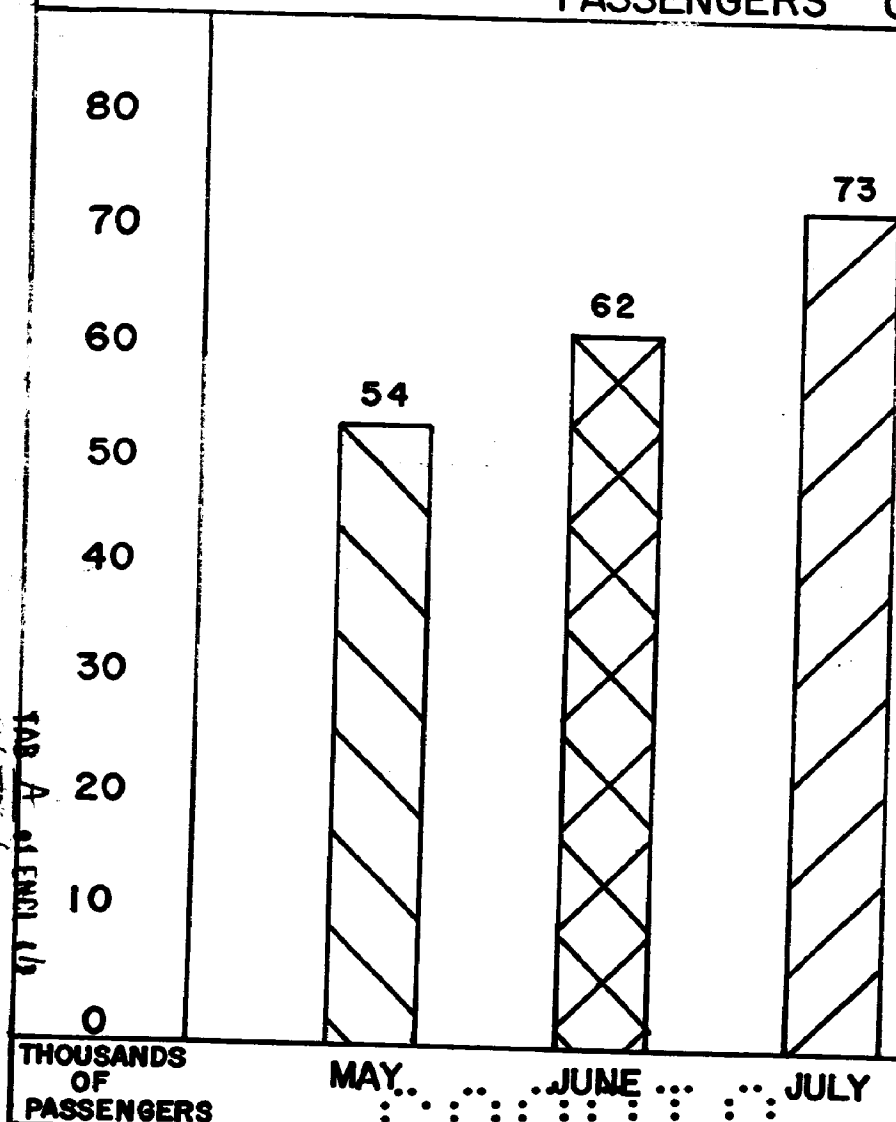

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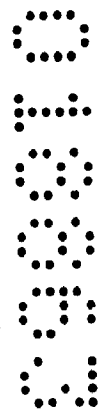

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Central Control Point processed fifteen daily updates during the month of July with a total of 28,340 requisitions, 9,547 receipts and 15,742 shipping mats produced. The total number of transactions processed for the month was 322,935. The fill rate this month was 45% with the rate for R/O items being 47%. The Automated Services Center processed 50,930 personnel changes for entry into the Personnel Accounting System. A total of 276,186 changes were processed during July for entry into the Mappower Management System.

Bulk Fuel Company continued to support U. S. and Korean Marine Corps units in I Corps with POL products. During this period the company issued 548,953 gallons of diesel, 256,751 gallons of mogas and 759 drums of POL products. Two major changes were effected during this period; the fuel site on Hill 37 was expanded for mogas service and relocated within the cantonement. The storage capacity at An Hoa was decreased by half. In addition to its normal mission the Company has provided nine (9) 350 GPM fuel pumps for water points on a continuing basis and twelve (12) 350 GPM's for wash down facilities.

During the month of July, Ammunition Company handled 27,687 short tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 5,847 short tons of Class V(A) ammunition. The daily average for receipts and issues was 785 short tons. EOD Platoon made 135 calls recovering 3,702 US explosive items and 109 VC or ChiCom explosive items. The Platoon destroyed 8 tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1.

Civil Affairs Section reported the average on board strength of Local National Civilians at 531. During this reporting period, approximately 26,000\$VN was expanded from military resources for Civic Action Projects. During the reporting period, the following major Civic Action Projects were completed, a Flag Pole was put up at Chieu Hoi #3, a Well Construction at Phuoc Xuan, Home Constructions at Chom Tam and Guard Stations at Phuoc Quang. Psyops leaflets were distributed at all MedCaps held by Supply Battalion. Approximately 4,500 leaflets were distributed in this manner. During this reporting period, approximately 55 MedCaps were held. A total of 4,567 patients were treated.

Supply Company continued to provide support for the Marine units in the I Corps Tactical Zone. Support centered on units primarily within the DaNang area, but did extend South to Chu Lai, An Hoa and LZ Baldy and to several Combined Action Group units in the Phu Bai area. Support was also provided to 2nd ROK Marine Brigade units in the Hoi An area. Receipts and issues for July 1970 were 9,406 and 23,393 respectively.

Ration Company continued normal production of Class I products.

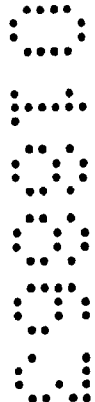

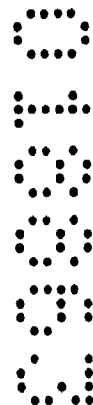

PART II
NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of July 1970, Supply Company continued its mission to provide support for Marine Corps units in I Corps Tactical Zone. Support centered on units primarily within the DaNang area but did extend South to Chu Lai, An Hoa and LZ Baldy and to several Combined Action Group units in the Phu Bai area. Support was also provided to 2dROK Marine Brigade units in the Hoi An area.

The normal, workload for the receipt, storage and issue of Class II, limited III, IV, VII, VIII and IX supplies has slowed appreciably over prior months. Receipts and issues for July 1970 were 9,406 and 23,393 respectively. Increased emphasis on a continuing care-in-storage program, conducted by the Storage Platoon and supported by all other Platoons in the Company, more than compensated for the below normal customer support required. The Traffic Management Officer experienced a definite drop for incoming cargo but, due to the redistribution of equipment, shipment of excess materiel from MC100 stocks and redeployment of various units there was a notable increase in outgoing cargo. The outgoing cargo short tons figure of 4015.3 does not actually reflect the amount of materiel processed, as the TMO was faced with a shortage of adequate shipping and had to pre-stage for shipment much of the cargo prepared during the month.

The PP&P section section functioned under an extremely heavy workload during the month due to the requests levied by redeploying units for mount-out containers, requests from Storage for new containers for their care-in-storage program and the repacking of excesses being shipped out of country. The Shop Stores, Clothing and Medical Platoon receipts and issues remained at the normal, relative high level. The Clothing Account (M2410) completed.... the annual trial Balance Program with MCSA, Philadelphia as well as its monthly physical inventory and preparation of a stores return. The annual price change in clothing, as announced by MGBul 10120 of 27 March 1970, was..... posted to the records effective 1 July 1970 and resulted in a \$5,000.00 increase to the value of the account.

The Shop Stores Platoon was inspected by a team from Field Supply Analysis Office-Three during the period 13-18 July 70 to determine compliance with procedures outlined in MCO P4400.29B and to suggest additional procedures to enable Shop Stores to operate more efficiently and effectively in support of Maintenance Battalion. Of the seventeen recommendations by the team, all but five were instituted during the month with the remainder scheduled for completion by 15 August 1970.

The Medical Section began a re-warehousing project, with the assistance of the Storage Officer, to obtain better space utilization. An additional Butler building was made available to the Medical Section providing 8,000 square feet of covered storage so that all medical supplies will be under covered storage prior to the approaching monsoon season.

The Salvage Platoon/Retrograde Facility functioned under extremely heavy workload mainly attributed to the MC100 excess program for material destined for disposal and turn in of excess equipment by units, which in some cases was a complete turn-in of all organic equipment due to deactivation. An additional responsibility was also levied on the Retrograde Platoon when they were assigned the mission of rehabilitating jungle utilities which formerly had been the responsibility of GSMCo, Maintenance Battalion. The new mission assignment entailed modification of an existing contract with a Vietnamese vendor for repair of the utilities, preparing an SOP for the operation of this section and establishment of detailed accounting procedures. In addition to servicing local customers in the repair of jungle utilities the Third Force Service Regiment will also be shipping an additional 2,000 pieces of unserviceable, reparable, utilities to MC114 each month for rehabilitation. The Operations Section functions during the past month mainly concerned itself with establishing tighter controls on all equipment utilized by this Company, attempting to obtain more transportation to meet the ever increasing demands from the sections, and began collecting and recording statistics on all transportation aspects.

All Sections of Supply Company functioned with adequate officer supervision and a continuing draw-down on available Staff NCO's. With a large turnover of lower ranking enlisted personnel, many experienced personnel were transferred during the month and required accelerated on-the-job training of newly joined personnel.

Highlighting the list of VIPs visiting Supply Company during the month of July 1970 was a visit by the Commandant of the Marine Corps on 18 July 1970. The Commandant visited and inspected the Retrograde Facility, PP&P facility (Shops number 3 and 4) and received a briefing from the Officer-in-Charge of each section.

As vividly portrayed above, the emphasis within the Supply Company area during the past month was first support all customers, secondly prepare for the monsoon season by rewarehousing to obtain the maximum covered storage for all items and thirdly to maintain a stable posture which would be conducive to a massive roll back effort should the move be instituted. The Company is in the final stages of preparing for the impending Commanding General's inspection scheduled for early August.

PART III

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. Significant Operations Conducted.

a. The Traffic Management Officer received 728.3 short tons and shipped 4,015.3 short tons of material.

b. Storage Platoon

(1) The Storage Platoon completed their portion of the Federal Group 84 project by moving all materiel to PP&P Shop 4 for a serviceability inspection, repackaging and reboxing.

(2) Storage continued on the vigorous serviceability program by inspecting material that had been in outside storage as evidenced by the fact that 26 short tons of non-burnable and 34.7 short tons of burnable items were classified as code "H" and delivered to the Salvage Platoon for disposal.

(3) The location consolidation program was continued by Storage and will provide more covered storage space for items now stored outside. This consolidation in connection with shipping of excess materiel should place most materiel in covered storage prior to the monsoon season.

(4) The Storage Platoon issued and prepared for shipment 49,000 board feet of lumber. This lumber was marked for MR100, Okinawa.

(5) Due to the number of special projects undertaken by Storage and the availability of an officer, the second shift was assigned an OIC which is proving to be invaluable.

(6) The "K" lot (open storage for FGS4 was enlarged by 14,000 square feet to handle the increased volume of material being repacked by PP&P.

(7) On 2 July 1970 the Storage Platoon received 1,465 pull-all MRU's for shipment of material to CONUS and in two days had processed these documents which accounted for 100 short tons and 500 measured tons of materiel.

(8) Roll-back of Class IV from various units was notable during the month with 633 short tons and 1160 measured tons received. Over 65% of all Class IV received had to be repalletized prior to storage.

c. The Control Unit processed 23,393 MRU's for pulling of material by Storage Section and 9406 receipts were processed by the Receipts Unit. The Issue Pad processed 458 documents to local customers during the month in addition to packing 56 CONEX and palletizing 39 pallets of excess materiel destined for disposal.

d. PP&P Platoon

(1) In addition to the normal function of care-in-storage and preparation for shipment of all material from MC100, PP&P was deluged with work requests from units preparing to mount out and from units shipping excess

organic equipment. Supply Battalion units levied requirements on PP&P, such as 600 deep water dump boxes fabricated for Ammunition Company.

(2) The inspection for serviceability, repacking and reboxing of Federal Group 84 was nearing completion with accumulated monetary inductions of \$4,008,603 and a total disposal of only \$143,416. These figures indicate that this project paid for itself.

(3) A compressor was obtained and set up in Shop number 3 to spray engines with preservative, prior to packing.

(4) The Commandant of the Marine Corps visited Shop number 3 and 4 of PP&P on 18 July 1970 and was briefed on the shops functions and capabilities.

e. Retrograde Platoon

(1) A total of 64 pieces of rolling stock was placed aboard 4 commercial ships during the month of July 1970.

(2) The 4th Combined Action Group turned in all property to the Retrograde Facility prior to deactivation on 25 July 1970.

(3) The 1st Combined Action Group commenced turn in of their organic equipment on 25 July 1970.

(4) The Commandant of the Marine Corps visited the Retrograde Facility on 18 July 1970 and was briefed on internal procedures.

(5) The responsibility for administration of the contract for light weight jungle utility rehabilitation program was assumed by the Retrograde Platoon.

(6) Due to enumerable problems encountered in processing Communications and Electronic gear a test van was placed in the Retrograde Facility Compound to facilitate testing and processing the Limited Technical Inspections required.

(7) Three hundred seventy six pieces of communications equipment, 250 pieces of motor transport, 81 pieces of engineer, and 400 weapons were LTI'd for a total of 1107 pieces, of which most were non-RIR equipment. A total of 39 RIR's were submitted.

(8) A total of 381 pieces of equipment were returned to stock via the Direct Exchange Section.

(9) There were a total of 73 pieces of rolling stock received and 61 pieces shipped, in addition to 154 that were sent to disposal.

f. Medical Supply

(1) During the month in addition to processing 3903 MRO's for local customers a large volume of material was processed to out of country units which represented 20,240 pounds of gear.

(2) The Medical Section obtained an additional warehouse which will give an additional 8,000 feet of covered storage. All bulk materiel and slow moving items will be relocated to the newly acquired storage area.

(3) To ensure maximum utilization of available storage space a complete rewarehousing project was undertaken by this section which will indicate utilization of bin boxes, new storage aids and use of additional cube. This project with the additional warehouse should place all Medical Supplies under covered storage.

g. During the month of July 1970, the Retail Clothing Outlet received and issued individual clothing to Marine, Seabee, and ROKMC units within the Danang TAOR. Due to the reduction in forces during the past few months there has been a decrease in the number of requisitions being processed. A recomputation of RO was completed and established the fact that there were many RO items with large excesses. After liaison with the units supported, to establish projected usage data, a firm excess figure was established and those items are being shipped to CONUS as required by MCO P4400.76.

h. Shop Stores

(1) 5,058 transactions with a fill rate of 63.8% for all items and 75.4% for RO items.

(2) Five, 175 mm, M113E1, Gun tubes were received and 2 were issued during the month leaving 5 on hand.

(3) There were 5058 transactions accomplished by Shop Stores with an overall fill rate of 63.8 for all items and a 75.4 fill rate for RO Items.

(4) One 8 inch Cannon Assembly was received and 2 were issued which left one on hand.

(5) The field Supply Analysis Office reviewed the Shop Stores procedures during the period 13 July to 18 July 1970.

9. Administration

a. Maximum effort was made to complete all preparation for the Commanding Generals inspection scheduled for early August.

b. The on board average strength for the month was 500 which was a decrease of 11 over last month.

c. Initiated a new check in system to ensure all personnel are thoroughly indoctrinated and all administrative details are complete prior to their assignment to a section/platoon.

d. The disciplinary rate continued the downward trend experienced since May when it was 44 to the present low of 31. There are presently 15 cases awaiting some type of investigation or administrative action.

e. There were 4 administrative discharges effected this month.

10. Training

a. General Military Subjects showed a 300% increase in July; 1634 man-hours as compared to 530 man-hours in June.

b. Technical Training increased nearly 15% in July; 885 man-hours as compared to 772 man-hours in June.

During the month of July Bulk Fuel Company continued to support U. S. and Korean Marine Corps units in I Corps with POL products. During this period the Company issued 548,953 gallons of diesel, 256, 751 gallons of mogas and 759 drums of POL products. Two major changes were effected during this period; the fuel site on Hill 37 was expanded for mogas service and relocated within the cantonement. The storage capacity at An Hoa was decreased by half. In addition to its normal mission the Company has provided nine (9) 350 GPM fuel pumps for water points on a continuing basis and twelve (12) 350 GPM's for wash down facilities.

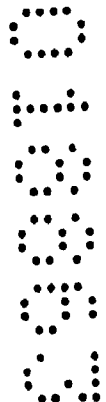
1. The primary mission of Maintenance Battalion remained unchanged during the month of July 1970.

- a. General Military Subjects, technical training, shop safety, weapons safety, drivers safety, individual responsibility, personal response program and race relations education were stressed during the month.

b. FAM fire, gas chamber and reactionary drill exercises were held during the month.

Our Civic Action team has hauled over 60,000 pounds of rice from DANANG to the hamlets of PHUOC HA and PHUOC NGHIA.

b. Scrap wood was taken to PHUOC NGHIA vocational school for use in building benches and tables for children. Scrap wood was also given to PHUOC HA schools for the same purpose.

CIVIC ACTION MEMORANDUM 7-70

1. The Civic Action team has been working in the hamlet of PHUOC HA, Supplying the people scrap building material, used for the construction of fifteen new houses and repairs to innumerable others. The International Rescue Committee has allotted PHUOC HA milk, bulgar, and cooking oil for the fifteen families building homes, utilizing our civic action trucks. Our Civic Action team has hauled over 60,000 pounds of rice from DANANG to the hamlets of PHUOC NGHIA and PHUOC HA.
2. The Civic Action team distributed approximately 8,000 PsyOps posters and literature. About 500 bars of soap were distributed, wrapped in a leaflet concerning sanitation and hygiene.
3. During the month of July MEDCAP teams with civic Action team members treated 520 people. One child was treated by civic action team members for second degree burns of the face and chest one elderly man was taken to the hospital ship for treatment of throat cancer.
4. Scrap wood was taken to PHUOC NGHIA vocational school for use in building benches and tables for children. Scrap wood was also given to PHUOC HA Schools for the same Purpose.
5. Populace force troops in Hoa My recieved instruction on use of flare and illumination. Bunker construction is progressing with 2 bunkers completed. Hamlet security projects are progressing with approximately 50,000 meters of wire strung.
6. Working relations with local Officials have been good for the month, due to repeated meetings and contacts. The Officials are starting to put forth ideas of their own for community improvement. All work is being done with civic action team members letting GVN Officials show the initiative so as to allow full support of the GVN.
7. It is requested that personnel of Maintenance Bn Do Not give scrap materials to workers. As our involvement in civic action deepens, we are dealing with more and more homeless people. The LNC's working for Maintenance Bn have homes. The homeless people have to show progress at each stage of house building or they do not get additional material. By giving scrap to people, one control of all material is destroyed.

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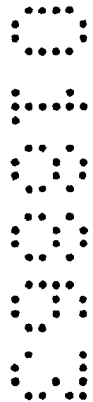
