



PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of September 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, communication, motor transport and general support to the Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine and allied units.

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and support services to over 726 members of the company who functioned in 30 different operational sections. The company's personnel strength decreased from the previous month by 53, for a total strength of 726 during the month of September 1970. This decrease in personnel strength is attributed to the preparation for the implementation of the forthcoming Manning Level changes. The Battalion's Industrial Relations Office under the cognizance of the Battalion S-4 supervised the personnel and administration of 486 Vietnamese National Employees under three separate fundings. These consisted of 255 appropriated, 166 non-appropriated funded and 65 housemaids. This was an increase of six employees over the previous month. Promotions for 30 appropriated workers were processed during the month of September. Renumeration for these appropriated workers during the September pay period amounted to 3,116,868 Piasters (\$26,414.14 U. S.), a pay increase of 26,411 piasters over the previous month's payroll. This was due primarily to the personnel increase and promotions. During the month of September, 165 Vietnamese workers received shots or physicals as required under the LNC Health Program. The Battalion/Camp Police Shed was responsible for the correction of all Camp discrepancies in the BAS Weekly Sanitation Inspection. Urinoils were prepared for the monsoons by installation of sand mounds around the Urinoils to compensate for the rising water table. In addition, all military and Vietnamese heads were prepared for the monsoons by tacking protective plastic covering over the screens. In the realm of sanitation/trash removal, 16,775 gallons of wet garbage and 8,313.21 cubic meters of dry garbage were removed from the confines of Camp Books. The Organic Supply Section, an integral part of Headquarters and Service Company, processed 2092 requisitions, an increase of 822 over the preceding month. This amounted to a total monetary obligation of \$91,233.35. In addition, cancellation requests were submitted for 777 requisitions and 2823 follow-ups on outstanding documents. The Force Logistic Command Fire Department, operating the Camp Books Fire Department Complex, the Freedom Hill Fire Department Complex, and substations at ASP#1 and 2 was turned over to Captain G. W. SMITH, the new OIC, and Staff Sergeant A. L. LAWLESS, the NCOIC. A total of 16 fires were fought in the following classes; ten (10) class A, four (4) class B, one (1) class C and two (2) class D. The Engineer Platoon, in preparation for the monsoons constructed seven (7) vehicle bridges and laid 1,000 additional feet of culvert. New construction included the Sea Hut for the Commanding General's messmen, two (2) partitions, six (6) mount out boxes and the laying of three (3) concrete pads. The Heavy Equipment Shop loaded out one hundred (100) dump truck loads of sand, fifty (50) loads of rock, and ten (10) loads of dirt to job sites including the Direct Exchange and the "S" lot. The Carpenter Shop constructed seven (7) vehicle bridges to cover the culvert that has been lain throughout Camp Books. Many buildings were rescreened to keep up with the policy of Camp Books Maintenance.

Also, twelve (12) new heads were built to replace less adequate ones. New construction included the Sea Hut for the Commanding General's messmen. Three concrete pads were laid; one for generators at Children's Hospital and two (2) for the new Officers' Club. In addition most of the Officers' Club was rebuilt by the Engineer Platoon. Many other construction jobs were completed including six (6) foot bridges, two (2) partitions and six (6) mount out boxes. The sign shop constructed and painted forty five signs for various sections within Headquarters and Service Battalion. The Electrical Shop continued to keep its commitment of keeping all wiring within Headquarters and Service Battalion safe. The rewiring of the hand-ball courts was completed along with the installation of new fixtures in the main exchange.

Communication Company provided communication support to all Marine Corps, Army and Navy units located in the Camp Books/Red Beach area. Communication Center Platoon noted a net reduction of 3,054 messages processed for September. This is the 5th consecutive month that the total traffic has decreased. This large reduction in messages can be contributed directly to Keystone Robin redeployments in that communication guard for some Army, Navy and Marine Corps units has shifted from the Force Logistic Command Communication Center to other communication centers. Preparations for the monsoon season have been completed on the communication center and in the platoon's billeting area. Maintenance Platoon continued to provide communication/electronic support to all platoons of the Company on a 24 hour basis. During the past month the Platoon responded to a total of 292 trouble calls of various types. Since the Naval Support Activity in Danang has downgraded its operation, the procurement of teletype parts had become a problem. This problem was rectified when liaison was established with Naval Supply Depot, Yokosuka, Japan. The requisition of needed parts can now be accomplished by messages to that activity. Wire Platoon continued to provide dial telephone service to Camp Books, Camp Haskins, Camp Viking and Camp Love. Field Telephone service was provided for Camp Monohan, ASR#1, ASR#2, Camp Books COC and perimeter. The Wire Platoon was called upon five (5) times during the month of September 1970 to provide a public address system. On 1 September the system was provided to Truck Company for a change of command. On 15 September the system was provided to FLSG-Bravo for their deactivation ceremony. In addition, on 15 September the system was installed for use at the Vietnamese Children's Festival held at Camp Books. On 21 September the system was provided for a USO show and on 22 September the system was provided for the Navy Unit Commendation presentation ceremonies. During the month the Automated Dial System handled 719,772 calls. Also, a total of 60,160 operator assisted calls were handled. There were 18 new installations, 3 of which were class-A, the remainder being class-C. There were 27 extensions added. The platoon completed 71 work orders and cleared 159 trouble calls. Radio Platoon maintained an average of ten (10) radio nets during September. Replacements for the two (2) AN/MRC-109's which were Code H'd out of country have yet to be received. The deadline rate for the remaining eight AN/MRC-109's was 50% for the past month. A renovation and maintenance program for RC-292 antennas was initiated and two antennas have been renovated. Replacement factor for antenna elements was 90%. During the month, 29 radio operators and one radio chief were transferred to the First Military Police Battalion.

Support Company performed many diversified services for the Force Logistic Command, FWMF, and other Marine units. The Laundry Platoon in support of Marine units throughout the Danang area processed 124,980 pounds of laundry during the month of September, an average of 4,166 pounds per day. The III MAF Transient Facility and the 1st Medical Battalion were the principal users of the Laundry Platoon's service. In operating the III MAF Transient Facility members of Support Company processed and billeted 10,729 personnel and messed 55,447 personnel during September. The company's Material Handling Equipment Platoon licensed 73 equipment operators during the month. Of this total 38 drivers received licenses for the RKF 6000 pound forklift, 21 for the CYF 4000 pound forklift, 6 for the warehouse tractor, 1 for the H150G 15000 pound forklift, and 7 for the M-63 crane. The platoon's equipment repair shop completed 136 work orders during September. To date, 44,464 tons of supplies have been moved utilizing Material Handling Equipment. During the month of September the 1st Air Delivery Platoon made a proficiency jump on the 13th. Members of this platoon held rigger type inspections for members of the 1st Reconnaissance Battalion on the 16th.

Truck Company continued to provide administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of Force Logistic Command, specified III Marine Amphibious Force units, and conducted "Rough Rider" convoys in support of 1st Marine Division units. Truck Company has gained many new assignments and duties during the month of September. On 14 September 1970, Truck Company began the task of transporting 5th Communications Battalion from Marble Mountain to Camp Haskins. On 15 September 1970, Truck Company took over operational control of MTCG. Local commitments included transporting all classes of supplies for battalions and attached units within the Force Logistic Command and 1st Marine Division Headquarters area. Extensive daily support was also rendered to the Fifteenth Aerial Delivery Platoon, Marine Air Freight, Purchasing and Contracting office in Danang and XXIV Corps R and R Center/Transit Facility. "Rough Rider" convoys rolled in continuous support of Landing Zone Baldy and Fire Support Base Ross. Daily fuel runs were made to An Hoa under OpCon of 11th Motor Transport Battalion. Weekly convoys to Chu Lai were conducted. Small vehicle serials were also sent to the 2nd Combined Action Group near Hoi An and north to Phu Bai and Quang Tri. Tab B contains significant operational statistics for the month of September 1970. Maintenance Platoon underwent numerous changes during the month of September. The tire repair shop was dropped while the wrecker section was picked up as Maintenance provided wrecker service for convoys and local support throughout the month and is also providing a wrecker nightly to the retrograde facility. Although all mechanics were moved from the platoons to Maintenance in August with the change of policy concerning motor stables, beginning 12 September 1970 two (2) mechanics are being supplied to Operations Section for the 1st echelon inspection station. On 14 September 1970, a night crew was initiated, but had to be dissolved one week later due to a shortage of personnel. Maintenance Platoon continued to provide second echelon support for over 500 pieces of equipment, over 300 of which are powered prime movers, and also provided second echelon support for specified III MAF units. Tab C contains significant maintenance statistics for the month of September 1970.

PART III

Sequential Listing of Significant Events

1. Security. During the month of September 1970 the Battalion's Provisional Rifle Company conducted a total of 539 security operations in the area of operations assigned to Headquarters and Service Battalion, 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command. These operations were comprised of daylight patrols, night ambushes, listening posts, village security, and special operations to include a cordon and search of Khanh Son. In addition Provisional Rifle Company provided liaison teams to aid units from the 3rd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment and 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment to familiarize them with the area of operations for eventual turn over of control.

On 8 September 1970, the 2nd, 3rd and 4th platoons participated in a cordon and search of the hamlet of Khanh Son (AT 953766) in conjunction with 5th Counter-Intelligence Team personnel and Hoa Khanh village officials. In the pre-dawn hours, the 2nd and 3rd platoons moved into cordon-ing positions sealing all avenues of exit from the hamlet. At first light the 3rd squad of the 4th platoon provided security for the sweeping force which moved all the villagers to a "County fair" area where donuts and kool-aid were provided for the children and Headquarters and Service Battalion S-5 conducted a MEDCAP. The operation was well executed, but was secured with negative results.

On the 14th of September 1970, a squad from the 4th platoon, occupying a night ambush position to the north of Camp Books in the vicinity of Ap Nam O (AT 927825) observed on VC/NVA moving across a rice paddy to the west of their ambush site. The squad initiated small arms fire and illuminated the area. An immediate sweep of the area resulted in the capture of one package of rice dropped by the fleeing enemy. A further search at dawn failed to produce any additional results.

On 23 September 1970, Provisional Rifle Company turned over control of the northern and western portions of the area of operations from coordinates (AT 940828) to (AT 924806) to (AT 940790) to 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines as the first step in a gradual stand down procedure which will climax with the deactivation of Provisional Rifle Company on the 1st of October 1970. During the period of the 23rd through the 25th, the 3rd platoon provided guides to Mike Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines who physically occupied the above area. The charts included in part 4, Tab E depicts the tactical security activities for the month of September 1970.

2. Civic Action. The Battalion Civil Affairs section supported agriculture, refugee relief, medical and self-help programs in eight hamlets during the month of September 1970.

a. In continuing to support the two experimental hog farms in Trung Son and Tach Son Hamlets ten 100 pound bags of corn were donated to further stimulate the animal growth. Both hog farms are scheduled to sell all hogs during the first week of October 1970.

b. In the realm of self-help programs, this section in a joint operation with International Relief Commission, has embarked on a program to

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relocate seventy (70) refugee families from the hamlet of Da Phuoc (AT948787) to a less densely populated area within the perimeter of that hamlet. International Relief Commission, with some measure of assistance from this section also provided the building materials for the homes. This section alone has provided well rings and cement to construct five (5) wells for the new relocation area of which all have been completed. Five (5) wells are planned and construction of the wells will begin during October 1970.

c. Total cost of materials expended to support the hamlets in the Battalion area was 100,870 Piasters.

3. MEDICAL. The Headquarters and Service Battalion Aid Station for the month of September 1970 rendered routine medical and emergency services to Marines from Headquarters and Service Battalion, Supply Battalion, and III Marine Amphibious Force personnel in addition to 1000 Vietnamese LNC's employed in the Camp. This total approximately 4000 persons receiving out-patient care at this facility. The total visits for the month were 3909 Marines, 78 Navy personnel and 511 LNC's. These figures broken down further show 513 Marines from Headquarters and Service Battalion at Sick Call, 574 from Supply Battalion, 45 from III Marine Amphibious Force and 300 LNC's for a grand total of 1432 sick call visits. In addition to sick call, 200 complete physical examinations were conducted, 565 physicals for personnel going on R&R, assigned to mess duty and returning to CONUS. Laboratory examinations totaled 1309, X-rays 478 and over 800 prescriptions were filled. A total of 3551 immunizations were administered and recorded. Specialized treatment was sought and obtained from 1st Medical Battalion and 95th Army Evacuation Hospital for 143 personnel. Hospital Corpsmen were assigned additional functions, such as; field operations with Provisional Rifle Company, Convoy Duty, classroom instruction to both Headquarters and Service Battalion and Supply Battalion personnel and one Corpsman permanently assigned to S-5 for MEDCAPS.

4. Tet Trung Thu or the "Mid Autumn Festival" was celebrated in the Headquarters and Service Battalion area as part of the 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command's children's day on 15 September 1970. Children of the Battalion's LNC employees and children from the Phuoc Thanh Orphanage were invited aboard to participate in the festive activities arranged for their benefit. Approximately 150 children took part in the festivities, the emphasis of which was on traditional Vietnamese games and methods of celebration. Along with Vietnamese games a sing along was conducted, field telephones were installed for the children to use, Vietnamese cartoons were shown and a dragon costume and dancers as well as gifts were provided. The Battalion Engineer Platoon "camouflaged" a warehouse tractor and trailer to look like a train. Several Marines dressed as clowns circulated among the children, and a Marine escort was provided for every two (2) children. The children and the Marines thoroughly enjoyed themselves and it was a very worthwhile endeavor. Tab F depicts a pictorial account of the Tet Trung Thu (Children's Tet Day, Mid-Autumn Festival) Program.

5. Administration. The battalion's performance in the Manpower Management System for the month of September continued to be below Marine Corps standards. The total items reported were 1863. The error rate was .3%. The following table outlines unit performance by Company:





TRUCK COMPANY OPERATIONS


FUEL AND WATER HAULED-SEPTEMBER 1970





TONNAGE HAULED - SEPTEMBER 1970




TRUCK COMPANY OPERATIONS

PASSENGERS CARRIED - SEPTEMBER 1970







PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of September, Bulk Fuel Company continued to support U. S. and Korean units in I-Corps with bulk and packaged fuels and lubricants. During this period the Company issued 414,908 gallons of Diesel and 293,067 gallons of Mogas. In addition 468 drums of packaged fuels and 415 drums of packaged lubricants were issued. With the redeployment of 1st Marine Division units, Bulk Fuel Company adjusted its support accordingly. On 5 September the An Hoa fuelsite was closed and a temporary installation left at An Hoa. On 25 September the Camp Love (7th Engineers) fuelsite was closed. On 30 September the Hill 10 fuelsite was closed. A request for disposition instructions on serviceable excess gear was forwarded to Organic Supply during the month. This equipment was first declared a serviceable excess by this command on 1 April 1970. Throughout the month the Company continued to provide embarkation washdown for 1st Marine Division units and Force Logistic Command. The Company currently has 10 of its 350 GPM pumps on loan for water points in the Danang TAOR. On 16 September Camp Monahan's source of water was cut off and Bulk Fuel Company personnel worked at the 504th M.P. Battalion to re-establish a water point. The water supply was re-established by 25 September.

During the month of September, Ammunition Company handled 29,106 s/tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 6297 s/tons of Class V(A) ammunition. The daily average for receipts and issues was 825 s/tons.

During this period approximately 31,000\$VN was expended from military resources for Civic Action Projects. Marines of Supply Battalion contributed \$241.00 used to purchase candy and toys for the Mid-Autumn festival. During this period the following Civic Action Projects were completed; 3 new Wells and 5 repaired Wells were constructed at Chanh Huong. 2 Wells were constructed at Chieu Hoi #3. A Hamlet Office was constructed at Phuoc Xuan. A Hamlet Office, MedCap Station, and a Meeting Hall was constructed at Phuoc Thanh. During this period approximately 56 MedCaps were held, making a total of 4,854 patients that were treated.

LSU #1 is located approximately 42 road miles south-south-west of Red Beach. The LSU provides Class I and Class V supply support as well as forklift and laundry service. On 21 September in accordance with the redeploying of the 5th Marines the LSU was disbanded. LSU #3 is located to the south-southeast of Red Beach approximately 27 road miles. The LSU provides Class I and V supply support, 3rd Echelon Maintenance in the engineer, motor transport, ordnance and communications-electronics maintenance commodity areas. Forklift, laundry, RUC line and icemaking services are also provided the supported units. During this reporting period the 7th Marines and their supporting units stood down, their mission was assumed by the 5th Marines.

LSU #4 is located at Chu Lai Combat Base where it provided Class V supply support to MAG-13 and served as an alternate storage site for ASP #2. On 12 September MAG-13 ceased combat operations from the Chu Lai Combat Base. Since the LSU #4 has been transferring its stocks in preparation for turning the ASP over to the U. S. Army and disbanding the LSU.

In view of the lack of significant events there is no Narrative Summary for the month of September for Ration Company.

During the month of September 1970 the Supply Company saw their supply support mission slowly being reduced as tactical units continued their stand down operations. Supply support was still in evidence as Supply Company continued to support Marine Units in Military Region 1 South to Chu Lai, An Hoa and LZ Baldy. Support provided to units to the Phu Bai area was negligible. High points of activity during the month were the combined efforts of all platoons within the company assembly and preparing materiel for retrograde shipment of excess materiel held in MC100 stocks, preparation of PURA shipments, and materiel excess to the needs of the Armed Services shipped to disposal. Maximum effort was exerted to prepare 51,000 cube and 25,000 square of retrograde materiel, destined for CONUS, for fleet shipping.

The Storage Platoon instituted several aggressive programs with the ultimate goal of ensuring all materiel received the maximum protection possible from the impending monsoon rains. All clothing and textiles were moved to covered storage either within the Supply Company industrial area or to the newly acquired storage area in the Bravo cantonment. September saw the implementation of lumber inspection for infected/unserviceable lumber and the establishment of a new lumber yard in a more suitable area. The unserviceable lumber is being utilized in the civic action programs and is proving to be a valuable resource well worth the time and effort and money which is expended. The consolidation of locations is continuing and several open storage areas have been relocated into covered storage or if compatible with outside storage have been consolidated in the outside locations. An accurate measure of the work accomplished by the Storage Platoon in pulling retrograde shipments and the consolidation of locations is that the number of locations on 3 September was 101,358 and the number on 30 September was 81,078, a reduction of 20,280. PP&P and the Retrograde Facility again received the brunt of the work load as they were faced with not only the retrograde shipments generated by MC100 but also were tasked with preparing materiel for embarkation from all units redeploying and the processing of all excess materiel from units preparing for stand down although not scheduled for redeployment in the near future. Due to the tremendous workload at PP&P the care-in-storage program has been somewhat curtailed during the month and this is expected to continue well into the month of October when it is anticipated that the care-in-storage program will be revitalized. The Clothing and Medical Sections continued their normal support missions with the only special projects being Clothings recomputation of their R/O and preparation for shipment of the excesses generated to CONUS. The Medical Section issued large amounts of supplies and equipment to units throughout the Pacific and to CONUS under the PURA program.

293067 (2) During the month of September Bulk Fuel Company continued to support U.S. and Korean units in I-Corps with bulk and packaged fuels and lubricants. During this period the Company issued ~~269,504~~ ^{414,908} gallons of Diesel and ~~189,799~~ gallons of Mogas. In addition 468 drums of packaged fuels and 415 drums of packaged lubricants were issued. With the redeployment of 1st Marine Division units, Bulk Fuel Company adjusted its support accordingly. On 5 September the An Hoa fuelsite was closed and a temporary installation left at An Hoa. On 25 September the Camp Love (7th Engineers) fuelsite was closed. On 30 September the Hill 10 fuelsite was closed. A request for disposition instructions on serviceable excess gear was forwarded to Organic Supply during the month. This equipment was first declared a serviceable excess by this command on 1 April 1970. Throughout the month the Company continued to provide embarkation washdown for 1st Marine Division units and Force Logistic Command. The Company currently has 10 of its 350 GPM pumps on loan for water points in the Danang TAOR. On 16 September Camp MONAHAN's source of water was cut off and Bulk Fuel Company personnel worked at the 504th M.P. Battalion to reestablish a water point. The water supply was reestablished by 25 September.

LSU #1 is located approximately 42 road miles south-south-west of Red Beach. The LSU provides Class I and Class V supply support as well as forklift and laundry service. On 21 September in accordance with the redeployment of the 7th Marines the LSU was disbanded.

LSU #3 is located to the south-southeast of Red Beach approximately 27 road miles. The LSU provides Class I and V supply support, 3rd Echelon Maintenance in the engineer, motor transport, ordnance and communications-electronics maintenance commodity areas. Forklift, laundry, RUC line and ice making services are also provided the supported units. During this reporting period the 7th Marines and their supporting units stood down, their mission was assumed by the 5th Marines.

LSU #4 is located at Chu Lai Combat Base where it provided Class V supply support to MAG-13 and served as an alternate storage site for ASP #2. On 12 September MAG-13 ceased combat operations from the Chu Lai Combat Base. Since the LSU #4 has been transferring its stocks in preparation for turning the ASP over to the U. S. Army and disbanding the LSU.

LSU #1, An Hoa supports the 2nd Bn., 5th Marines and Echo Btry, 2nd Bn., 11th Marines, for Class I material they received 2,688 items and issued 17,587, for Class V material they received 921.5 short tons and issued 1050 short tons, they also processed 9300 lbs of laundry.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of September 1970 the Supply Company saw their supply support mission slowly being reduced as tactical units continued their stand down operations. Supply support was still in evidence as Supply Company continued to support Marine Units in Military Region 1 South to Chu Lai, An Hoa and LZ Baldy. Support provided to units to the in the Phu Bai area was negligible.

High points of activity during the month were the combined efforts of all platoons within the company assembling and preparing materiel for retrograde shipment of excess materiel held in MC100 stocks, preparation of PURA shipments, and materiel excess to the needs of the Armed Services shipped to disposal. Maximum effort was exerted to prepare 51,000 cube and 25,000 square of retrograde materiel, destined for CONUS, for fleet shipping.

The Storage Platoon instituted several aggressive programs with the ultimate goal of ensuring all materiel received the maximum protection possible from the impending monsoon rains. All clothing and textiles were moved to covered storage either within the Supply Company industrial area or to the newly acquired storage area in the Bravo cantonment. September saw the implementation of lumber inspection for infected/unserviceable lumber and the establishment of a new lumber yard in a more suitable area. The unserviceable lumber is being utilized in the civic action programs and is proving to be a valuable resource well worth the time and effort expended. The consolidation of locations is continuing and several open storage areas have been relocated into covered storage or if compatible with outside storage have been consolidated in the outside locations. An accurate measure of the work accomplished by the Storage Platoon in pulling retrograde shipments and the consolidation of locations is that the number of locations on 3 September was 101,358 and the number on 30 September was 81,078, a reduction of 20,280.

PP&P and the Retrograde Facility again received the brunt of the work load as they were faced with not only the retrograde shipments generated by MC100 but also were tasked with preparing materiel for embarkation from all units redeploying and the processing of all excess materiel from units preparing for stand down although not scheduled for redeployment in the near future. Due to the tremendous workload at PP&P the care-in-storage program has been somewhat curtailed during the month and this is expected to continue well into the month of October when it is anticipated that the care-in-storage program will be revitalized.

The Clothing and Medical Sections continued their normal support missions with the only special projects being Clothings recomputation of their R/O and preparation for shipment of the excesses generated to CONUS. The Medical Section issued large amounts of supplies and equipment to units throughout the Pacific and to CONUS under the PURA program.

The TMO Section mainly concerned itself with preparing the retro-grade shipments for embarkation as incoming materiel remained relatively low.

The company as a whole began preparing itself for an austere period relative to incoming and on board personnel. The manning level of the company has been appreciably reduced which resulted in the loss of 35 personnel through reassignments to other units in WestPac and an anticipated further reduction in the near future. To compound this unexpected loss of personnel it was learned during the latter part of the month that all enlisted personnel rotating on a normal RTD during the month of October would all leave prior to 15 October. Improvement in the area of Staff NCO supervisors has been noted during the month as a result of input from FLSG Bravo's deactivation and from other units which had to reduce manning levels. The input from newly arrived personnel from CONUS has been extremely low.

During the month of September the Officers on board dropped from a high of 18 to the current level of 14. The most noted shortage of Officers is in Captain and Majors with little relief in sight during the forthcoming month.

The organizational structure of the company changed as a unit was deleted from the company T/O and two other platoons were combined. The Shop Stores Platoon was transferred to H&S Company, Supply Battalion on 30 September and the Control Platoon consisting of the Receipts Unit, Document Control Unit and the Issue Unit was placed under the operational control of the Storage Platoon.

Training received additional emphasis during the month as it was brought under company control and direction with a training program oriented towards progressive training. Two evenings a week were set aside to accomplish the current training syllabus, Tuesday for Technical Training and Thursday reserved for GMSP and other training. Instruction in subjects considered extremely important such as race relations, personal response, etc., has been assigned to Officers and senior Staff NCO's. There have been five warehouses designated as class rooms with areas set aside in each one to provide the best conditions available for instructions.

1. The Traffic Management Officer, accompanied the Chief of Staff, Force Logistic Command on an inspection tour of Deep Water Pier and Bridge Ramp on 2 September 1970.
2. The Clothing Platoon received instructions on 2 September 1970 from the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, (CG, FLC ltr 3S/LAB/rhw 10120 dtd 27 Aug 70) regarding the assembling of a ceremonial clothing package for Keystone Bluejay redeploying units.
3. Major FULLEM the OIC, Retrograde Platoon was med-evaced on 3 Sept 1970 because of a broken ankle sustained while running on a board walk during a rain storm.
4. On 4 September 1970 Lt General W. K. JONES, Commanding General, FMFPac visited the PP&P Platoon Shop #4 and the Retrograde Facility. The Commanding General, FMFPac toured the facilities and received a briefing on current activities within the respective areas.
5. Lt FOSTER was assigned as OIC Retrograde Facility on 4 Sept 1970.
6. LtCol SOLZE, Force Logistic Command Safety Inspector held a safety inspection in Shop #1 of PP&P on 5 September 1970. There was only one discrepancy noted which was immediately corrected.
7. The Engineers completed the resurfacing of a portion of "S" Lot, open storage area, and will return when the material is relocated to complete the lot. This is the area where the new lumber yard will be established.
8. The Receipts Section received 5000LL (25,000 ea) of the 1970 voting ballot requests on 6 Sept which had been air shipped to FLC. They were held by the Receipts Unit and issued with walk-thru requests to all units.
9. PP&P personnel visited Camp Monohan regarding packing of bulk fuel components on 7 September 1970. The Commanding Officer, Bulk Fuel Company had requested technical assistance from PP&P.
10. On 8 September 1970 a packet of confidential papers were found by Retrograde Personnel in a communication van turned in by 5th Communication Battalion. The papers were turned over to the Supply Battalion S&C Officer.
11. The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited Deep Water Pier on 9 September accompanied by the Commanding Officer, Supply Battalion and the Traffic Management Officer.
12. The RO/RO ship TRANSGLOBE arrived at the DaNang Deep Water Pier on 9 September and was carrying to 2 Reefer Vans and a RO/RO trailer with 1 1/4" banding. Both of these items were immediately put to use, the Reefer Vans by Rations Company and the banding by units in Supply Battalion.

13. On 10 September the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited Supply Battalion. In Supply Company the Commanding General toured and was briefed by the Officer in Charge of Shop Stores, Storage (Bravo Warehouses 916 & 918) PP&P (Shops #1 & #3) and the Retrograde Facility.

14. Relocation of the TMO Rolling Stock lot was begun on 12 September. This lot was integrated into the MC100 Rolling Stock lot for reasons of security and ease of control.

15. A Steam Jenny valued at \$1,495.00 was stolen from the Retrograde Facility on 14 September. Reports of the stolen government property made in accordance with current directives.

16. Selected MC100 excesses were placed on display in "A" warehouse and in the Rolling Stock Lot so that personnel from the RVN Marine Corps could inspect the materiel prior to initiating requisitions (CG, FLC ltr 35/REL/rhw, 4400 dtd 10 Sept 70). On 14 September the RVN Marine Corps representatives selected items they desired, a representative from the CCP prepared a walk-thru requisition immediately and the items were issued.

17. On 14 September while moving baggage from FLC to the 15th Air Port DaNang 6 pieces of Personnel Effects, WIA Baggage, were stolen off the truck transporting the baggage.

18. A Narcotic's Inventory was held on 15 September by the Supply Battalion Narcotic Inventory Board at the Medical Supply Warehouse. No discrepancies were noted.

19. Excess equipment were displayed for representatives of the ARVN on 15 September. The procedure described in paragraph 16 above was followed in issuing this excess materiel to the RVN Army.

20. On 16 September the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited Deep Water Pier, DaNang accompanied by the Commanding Officer, Supply Battalion and the Traffic Management Officer.

21. The PP&P Platoon received an additional 7 Vietnamese labores from FLSG-Bravo as a result of FLSG-Bravo phase out on 16 September 1970.

22. Retrograde Platoon received four of the six LVT's scheduled for transshipment on 16 September.

23. Personnel of Supply Company received the annual Influenza Immunization Shots on 17 Sept (BnBul 6000, 12 Sept 70).

24. A large quantity of code "H" 782 equipment, boots and related items were invoiced to representatives of the Chinese Marine Corps by the Salvage Platoon on 18 Sept (CG, FLC ltr 3S/GNL/rhw, dtd 8 Sept 70).

25. The Retrograde Platoon received the last two of the 6 LVT's being retrograded out of country on 18 September 1970.

26. On 21 Sept PP&P received 52 pallets of entrenching tools from the Storage Platoon for preparation of the materiel for shipment to MSAO2.
27. Col. WOODS G-4 III MAF, Col. WILLIS G-6 III MAF, LtCol SLAVITER Assistant G-6 III MAF and Major BAKER CO 5th Comm. Bn. visited the Retrograde Facility on 21 Sept to view communication vans turned in as a result of redeployment.
28. Building 901 in the Bravo cantonment was turned over to the ROKLL team for storage of some communication equipment while awaiting receipt of the collateral equipment.
29. The Storage Platoon assumed operational control of the Control Platoon on 22 September.
30. The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited Shop Stores on 22 Sept.
31. Supply Company ^{Lost} 35 Marines on 23 Sept. as a result of a reduction in manning level.
32. The Storage Platoon prepared storage space to receive and store dog food, a new commodity to warehouses in RVN (24 Sept 70).
33. Col. WILLIS, G-6 III MAF visited the Retrograde Facility to check the progress on the 5th Comm. Bn. equipment being prepared for embarkation on 24 Sept 70.
34. Col. M. SCHACHER, CMC Representative of the Marine Corps Reserve Officers Association toured the Supply Company industrial facilities/warehouses and drove through the open storage lots on 28 Sept.
35. The Chief of Staff, Force Logistic Command received a briefing and tour of Clothing, B-6 Security warehouse and drove through "S" lot on 30 Sept.
36. The Shop Stores Platoon was deleted from the Supply Company T/O on 30 Sept and joined H&S Company of this Battalion.
37. During the month of September the Retrograde Facility transshipped 319 vehicles, submitted 227 RIR's and processed 1,896 pieces of equipment requiring L.T.I.'s.
38. Training accomplished for the month of Sept 1970.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Headquarters and Service Company continues it's primary mission of providing the Battalion Commander with facilities for Command and Control. To provide administration, Organic Supply, Light Motor Transport, Maintenance and Service Supply of the Battalion.
