PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of October 1970, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, motor transport, communications, and general support to Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine and Allied Units. The Battalion Commander and his staff continued to function in a dual capacity as Camp Books Commander and staff and as such were responsible for the many common usage facilities and functions of Camp Books, i. e. sanitation, police, maintenance, fire protection, utilities, etc.

1. Administration. The battalion's performance in the Manpower Management System for the month of October continued to be better than Marine Corps Standards. The total items reported were 2095. The error rate was 0.0%. The following table outlines unit performance by Company:

The Combat Action Ribbon was awarded to two officers and 28 enlisted personnel during the month of October.

2. Civil Affairs. The Battalion Civil Affairs Section supported agriculture, refugee relief, medical and self-help programs in the ten hamlets during the month of October 1970.

a. The two experimental hog farms in Trung Son and Thach Son Hamlets sold the hogs that were raised, realizing a profit that will be used to continue the operation of each farm without aid from the Battalion Civil Affairs Section.

b. In the realm of self-help programs, the section, in a joint operation with the International Relief Commission, has embarked on a program to relocate 70 refugee families from the Hamlet of Da Phuoc (948787) to a less densely populated area within the perimeter of that hamlet. This relocation required the providing of building materials from both the International Relief Commission and the Civil Affairs Section. This section alone was responsible for the construction of five water wells which were completed during October 1970. Due to the number of persons now residing at the new location, plans are being made to construct 5 additional water wells.

c. Total cost of materials expended to support the hamlets in the battalion area of responsibility was 29,990\$VN.

3. MEDICAL. The Headquarters and Service Battalion Aid Station, for the month of October, rendered medical and emergency services to Marines from both Headquarters and Service Battalion and Supply Battalion, and to Vietnamese LNC's employed at Camp Peckel, RVN. The total visits for the month were 2,362 Marines, 16 Navy personnel and 184 LNC's. These figures broken down further, show 185 Marines from Headquarters and Service Battalion, 675 from Supply Battalion and 154 LNC personnel. In addition to sick call, 220 complete physical examinations were conducted, 678 physicals for personnel going on R&R, assigned mass duty and returning to CONUS. Laboratory examinations totaled 1,015, XRAYS totaled 511, 1699 prescriptions were filled and 943 immunizations were administered and recorded. Hospital Companies were assigned 121 additional functions such as, but not limited to, field operations with the NCO School, convoy duty, classroom instruction and MED CAPS.

4. LOGISTICS. The Force Logistic Command Fire Department, operating the Camp Books Fire Department Complex, the Freedom Hill Fire Department Complex, and substations at both BSC #1 and #2 is under the direction of Captain G. W. SMITH, Force Logistic Command Fire Marshal and Staff Sergeant A. L. LAWLESS, Force Logistic Fire Chief. During the month of October, a total of 11 fires were responded to. Six of these were electrical fires, one vehicle fire, one human excreta fire, one SEA hut fire, one trash fire and one outdoor commode fire. Three fire drills were conducted during the month. The Battalion Supply Section, an integral unit of the Headquarters and Service Company, processed 1,273 requisitions, an increase of three over the preceding month. This amounted to a total monetary obligation of \$129,626.71. The Engineer Platoon made 23 separate issues of material for various self-help projects. Seventy electrical repairs and minor installations were performed. Eighty bags of sand and gravel were hauled. Five grading jobs were done. One hundred and

fifty-five feet of boardwalk were fabricated. Three vehicle bridges over culverts were constructed and installed. Nineteen jobs requiring carpentry construction were completed. Nine carpentry repairs were made. Twenty-three plumbing repairs and adjustments were made. Nine hot water repairs were made. Forty various boxes were built to specifications. On 25 October, First Lieutenant S. R. TAYLOR was assigned as Platoon Commander, Engineer Platoon.

5. Activations, deactivations

a. Security Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion was activated on 26 October 1970 to fulfill the security requirements of the Camp Commander of Camp Jay K. Books. These include the perimeter security of Camp Books, Retrograde Facility and ASP #2.

b. Communication Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion was deactivated on 16 October and the Communication requirements of Headquarters and Service Battalion are now fulfilled by a newly designated Communication Platoon of Support Company.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and service support to over 488 members of the company who functioned in 28 different operational sections. This decrease in personnel strength is attributed to the implementation of the new Manning Level and reorganization of Headquarters and Service Battalion. The following sections were picked up; III MAF Garrison Property and 48 men TAD from the III MAF Transient Facility. NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Truck Company continued to provide administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of Force Logistic Command, specified III Marine Amphibious Force units, continued operational

control of MTCC and conducted "Rough Rider" convoys in support of 1st Marine Division units.

Truck Company gained many new assignments and temporary duties during the month of October. Vehicles moved bulk fuel daily from Camp Monohan to Red Beach throughout the month of October. While a heavy water pump was being installed in the Headquarters and Service Battalion water point during the period of 5 October 1970 to 24 October 1970, five refuelers hauled water day and night from Tango water point. On 11 October 1970 eleven Sea Land vans were delivered to MAG 13 at Chu Lai for redeployment. On 13 October 1970 vehicles hauled 125 tons of cargo while moving the Aerial Delivery Platoon of Support Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion from ~~VMGR~~ 152 to Red Beach, RVN. A Truck Company convoy moved the remaining Marines from Chu Lai to Supply Battalion on 21 October 1970.

Local commitments included transporting all classes of supplies for battalions and attached units within the Force Logistic Command and 1st Marine Division Headquarters area. Extensive daily support was rendered to the Marine Air Freight, Purchasing and Contracting office in Danang and the XXIV Corps R and R Center/Transit Facility. Before disbandment of the Aerial Delivery Platoon of Support Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, daily support was rendered to that area.

"Rough Rider" convoys rolled in continuous support of Landing Zone Baldy and Fire Support Base Ross from the beginning of the month through 17 October 1970, after which time 11th Motor Transport Battalion ran convoys to those areas. Under the OpCon of 11th Motor Transport Battalion daily fuel runs were continued to Landing Zone Baldy as were fuel runs to Fire Support Base Ross and An Hoa.

Added documents contain significant operational statistics for the month of October 1970.

Truck Company's Maintenance Platoon continued to provide second echelon support for over 500 pieces of equipment, over 300 of which are prime movers, and also provided second echelon support for specified III MAF units. Maintenance is continuing its program of supplying two mechanics daily for the first echelon inspection station. Wreckers have been discontinued from convoys, although a wrecker driver is provided nightly to the retrograde facility. Truck Company has sent 59 vehicles to MTM, Maintenance Battalion for third echelon repair, with 47 of these were for repairs, 6 accident investigation LTI's, and 6 condition code LTI's. Maintenance had 205 TERO's opened during the month of October and has completed 178.





Total Mileage = 108,489



T.E.R.O.'S PROCESSED* 205



PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of October 1970, Support Company performed many diversified services for the Force Logistic Command, FWMAF, and other Marine units. The Laundry Section of Service Platoon in support of Marine units throughout the Danang area, processed 107,700 pounds of laundry, an average of 3,474 pounds per day. The 1st Medical Battalion and the Hoa Khanh Children's Hospital were the principal users of the Service Platoon's service.

The Company's Material Handling Equipment Platoon licensed 43 equipment operators during the month. Of this total 13 operators received licenses for the CYF 4000 pound forklift, 6 for the Warehouse Tractor, 2 for the Hyster 15,000 pound forklift, 3 for the M-63 Crane, and 1 for the 150T46 Bay City Crane. The Platoon's equipment repair shop completed 141 work orders during the month of October. To date, 37,440 tons of supplies have been moved utilizing Material Handling Equipment.

On 16 October 1970, Communication Company was redesignated Communication Platoon, Support Company. During October communication support was provided to all Marine Corps, Army, and Navy units in the Danang North - Red Beach area.

The Communication Center processed a total of 23,792 messages during October. This represents a decrease of 3,556 messages from the September total. As part of a continuing program to improve circuit reliability, the AUTODIN terminal was rerouted from Nha Trang to Phu Lom. The Dial Central Exchange (AN/TTC-28) processed 846,950 outgoing telephone calls and provided operator assist on 68,143 other calls.

During the month of October 1970, the Wire Section received 195 trouble calls. Additionally 24 new phones were installed and 25 extensions were put into service. The Maintenance Section completed 178 work orders and answered 244 trouble calls in support of the communication mission.

The Communication Platoon conducted operational briefings for seven visitors during October.



During the period 1-14 October Bulk Fuel Company issued 76,676 gallons of Mogas, 131,352 gallons of Diesel Fuel and 181,524 gallons of JP4. On 14 October 1970, Bulk Fuel Company was reduced to zero strength and all personnel were assigned to Support Company, Supply Battalion. During the period 15-31 October Bulk Fuel Platoon, Support Company, 58,370 gallons of Mogas, 85,228 gallons of Diesel Fuel and 112,174 gallons of JP4. The total issues for the month of October are 135,046 gallons of Mogas, 216,580 gallons of Diesel Fuel, and 293,698 gallons of JP4.

The only two critical supply support areas during the month were a shortage of batteries, BA-386 and/or BA-4386, and green undershirts, both of which were quickly removed from the critical list as MC100 received air shipments of these items.

The Clothing Outlet completed it's recomputation of the R/O and processed large quantities of excess material to CONUS utilizing Sea Land Vans as shipping containers.

The Storage and PP&P Platoons were faced with the task of preparing barb wire and stakes to 3d FSR, this required pulling the barb wire from location, washing each piece with high pressure water hoses, delivery to a staging area, and repalletizing and capping each pallet. The barb wire alone will account for the physical washing and hauling of approximately 40,000 pieces. The TMO ended the month with little shipping and receiving activity due mainly to the effects of the storm. On 31 October there was approximately 95,000 cube of general cargo staged for various destinations as well as 55 pieces of rolling stock ready for fleet shipping.





NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The month of October 1970 found Supply Company concentrating efforts on consolidating materiel in stock to provide covered storage for all materiel not compatible with outside storage, care-in-storage programs and preparing materiel for and shipping of retrograde stock. The supply support dwindled to approximately one half the efforts of the previous month. As combat troops condensed their areas of operations the logistical supply lines shorten with less requirement for materiel as they remained in a static posture. The only two critical supply support areas during the month were a shortage of batteries, BA-386 or BA-4386, and green undershirts both of which were quickly removed from the critical list as MC100 received air shipments of these items.

The coast of Vietnam was plagued throughout the month with threats of typhoons, torrential rains which inundated several villages around Red Beach and three typhoons/tropical storms, JOAN, KATE, and LOUISE. Considerable damage was done to structures in the Force Logistic Command area but no injury or loss of life resulted from the typhoons. Progress through self help programs have restored most of the structures with minor damage. The engineers and public works personnel are repairing those structures that sustained major damage.

The Clothing Outlet completed it's recomputation of the R/O and processed large quantities of excess materiel to CONUS utilizing Sea Land Vans as shipping containers. During the month the Clothing Cutlet reviewed all internal control and accounting procedures, forwarded a revised clothing order to Force Logistic Command for review/approval, consolidated/verified warehouse locations and in general prepared the stores account for the supply review scheduled to be held by the Field Supply Analysis Office early in November.

Medical Supply continued their normal support mission with the highlight of the month being Navy Day.

Efforts of the Retrograde Facility were confined to preparing retrograde items for exportation and staging of these items for fleet shipping. Work was done on a proposed check list for all retrograde items to ensure they are ordnance free and meet all of the agriculture prerequisites. These check lists were completed and forwarded to Headquarters, Force Logistic Command for review and if approved for inclusion in current directives.

The Storage and PR&P Platoons were faced with the arduous task of preparing barb wire and stakes for shipment to 3d FSR. This required pulling the barb wire from location, washing each piece with high pressure water hoses, delivery to a staging lot and repalletizing and capping each pallet. The barb wire will alone account for the physical washing and hauling of approximately 40,000 pieces.

The TMO ended the month with little shipping and receiving activity due mainly to the effects of the storm. On 31 October there was approximately 95,000 cube of general cargo staged for various destinations as well as 55 pieces of rolling stock ready for fleet shipping.

Visits by VIP's were in evidence during the month as Brigadier General R. MULBERRY JR., USMCR Deputy Commanding General, FMFPac, the Commanding General Force Logistic Command and Brigadier General S. C. MEYER, USA, XXIV Corps Artillery Commander toured Supply Companies industrial area.

The month of October also saw Supply Company personnel involved in the Change of Command Ceremony for the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, as Brigadier General M. J. PADALINO was relieved by Brigadier General J. R. JONES.

Once again static displays of MC100 excess ordnance items were placed on display for the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN). These ordnance items were inspected by representatives of ARVN and those which they desired were invoiced to them.

Due to the problems in obtaining sufficient Materiel Handling Equipment (MHE) to support all functional areas a MHE pool was established. This pool is under the cognizance of the Supply Battalion S-4 and very simply makes MHE readily available to a requesting section in a minimum amount of time. This process increases the utilization of each piece of equipment while providing the over all MHE support to complete the mission.

An additional task was assumed by Supply Company when the TMO began picking up materiel from the U. S. Army Depot, DaNang. This had previously been accomplished by personnel from the CCP when it was on a walk through basis but it grew to such volume that they could not support this additional task.

As the month ended Supply Company was preparing its area's for the anticipated visit of the Assistant Commandant of The Marine Corps visit schedule for 2 November 1970.

1. On 1 Oct Brigadier General S. C. MEYER, USA, XXIV Corps Artillery Commander toured the Supply Company industrial area.
2. MPC conversion day was accomplished on 7 October. Little productivity resulted as all Local National Civilians were kept outside and all Marines inside, the Force Logistic Command compound.
3. The Clothing Outlet completed the R/O recomputation and found they held considerable excesses. Preparations began to retrograde excess items to CONUS.
4. The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command toured Supply Company on 13 Oct. Major items of interest were the new lumber yard and the consolidation process in the covered storage areas.
5. On 14 Oct Brigadier General MULBERRY JR. USMCR Deputy Commanding General, FFPac toured the Supply Company industrial area.
6. PR&P completed the processing of a shipment of batteries to CONUS which totaled 5,480 cube.
7. On 13 Oct the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited Deep Water Pier DaNang and on 14 Oct toured the Supply Company area.
8. On 15 October a Narcotic Inventory was held by the Supply Battalion Narcotic Inventory Board. No discrepancies were noted in the Medical Supply Section.
9. On 18 Oct the 15th A.P. DaNang was closed for outgoing cargo due to the backlog of cargo awaiting air lift and remained closed for 4 days.
10. Personnel from Supply Company were the first members of this command to take a cultural tour of DaNang. This is a guided tour and will accommodate 28 individuals per trip. Scheduled as a weekly excursion Supply Company personnel will be taking this trip every 3d week.
11. The Storage Platoon prepared the MC100 excesses display of ordnance for the ARVN. Inspection of the items began on 19 Oct and continued for three days.
12. The TMC began picking up materiel from the U.S. Army Depot, DaNang and delivering it to Receipts Section for induction in to MC100 stocks.
13. On 22 Oct Brigadier General J. R. JONES visited the PR&P Facility and the Storage area.
14. 25 Oct was a total loss production wise as the entire camp buttoned up for Typhoon HATE.

15. Excess clothing from the Retail Clothing Outlet was loaded aboard Sea Land Vans ready for shipment to CONUS. The clothing filled 3½ vans and was shipped on 167 documents with the total value shipped being \$113,496.71.

16. The Materiel Handling Equipment Pool for Supply Battalion officially began to function on 26 Oct 1970.

17. The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command toured the storage area on 30 Oct 1970.
