NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of March 1971, Headquarters and Service Battalion provided administrative, motor transport, communications, and general support to Force Logistic Command and numerous other Marine and Allied Units. The Battalion Commander and Staff continued to function in a dual capacity as Camp BOOKS Commander and Staff and as such were responsible for the many common usage facilities and functions of Camp BOOKS, i. e. sanitation, police, maintenance, fire protection and utilities. Headquarters and Service Battalion continued during March the active program to identify and prepare material excesses for retrograde. Change of Commands for Headquarters and Service Company, Support Company, and Security Company were accomplished during the month of March. Truck Company provided substantial motor transport assistance to the redeployment of the 5th Marine Regiment and retrograding of equipment for Supply Battalion, 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command. Headquarters and Service Company transferred the FLC Disbursing Section to Support Company. The transfer of the Camp BOOKS Fire Department to the U. S. Army was completed during the month. Support Company provided heavy lift capability to the Khe Sanh Combat Base. Security Company conducted combat patrols within the buffer zone of Camp BOOKS perimeter to provide additional external security. On March 29th, contact was made with 3-5 enemy in the vicinity of ASP #2.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of March 1971, Headquarters and Service Company provided administrative and service support to over 529 members of the company, to include attached personnel, in 28 different operational sections. Transfer of two sections was effected during the month of March. Disbursing section was transferred to Support Company and the Fire Department was turned over to the United States Army. The company's personnel strength dropped from the previous month by 55. The number of personnel joined and dropped during the month of March averaged 87. 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During the month of March 1971, Truck Company continued to provide both administrative and tactical motor transport support to all elements of Force Logistic Command and specified III Marine Amphibious Force Units. The Motor Transport Coordination Center provided operational assistance to the 11th Motor Transport Battalion in support of 1st Marine Division Units.

Truck Company assumed a daily convoy commitment from the 11th Motor Transport Battalion to replenish rations and ammo at Hills 37 and 65. In addition, motor transport assistance was provided for redeployment of the 5th Marine Regiment and retrograding for Supply Battalion, 1st Force Service Regiment, Force Logistic Command.

Truck Company's Maintenance Platoon consisting of 1 officer and 77 enlisted is responsible for the second echelon repair of 481 pieces of Motor Transport equipment. During the month of March, Maintenance Platoon opened 284 second echelon TERO's and completed 220. 113 vehicles were sent to Motor Transport Maintenance Company, Maintenance Battalion; 38 were for repairs, 6 were for accident investigation LTI's, 26 were for condition code LTI's, and 43 were for LTI's for excess. Maintenance platoon is continuing its duty wrecker driver nightly and supplying wreckers for convoys and retrograde facility. Maintenance platoon is also supplying personnel for the reactionary platoon for Truck Company. During the month of March the Maintenance platoon reduced the deadline to the lowest it has been in the past year. As of 31 March there were only 48 pieces of Motor Transport Equipment deadlined out of the 481 pieces that they maintain.



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



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Change of Command of Support Company was accomplished on 8 March 1971. Major T. A. STUMPF 074993/0302 USMC relieved Major D. O. CLOUGH 079632/2502 USMC as Commanding Officer of Support Company.

During the reporting period the Laundry Section, Service Platoon processed a total of 83,980 pounds of laundry for an average of 2,709 pounds per day. This is an increase of 13,00 pounds over the month of February 1971. Principle users of laundry services were the 1st Marine Division, Force Logistic Command, 1st Medical Battalion, Children's Hospital and Marine Transient Center. Field Service was also provided to the 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines. The Material Handling Equipment Platoon handled 63,034 tons of supplies during March 1971, this was an increase of 9,902 pounds over the previous month. The Communication Platoon processed a total of 23,533 messages during March 1971, this was an increase of 4,498 over the month of February 1971. The Wire Section processed 719,231 calls through the Dial Central Exchange of which 35,149 calls were operator assigned. There were 63 telephone work orders filled and 154 telephone troubles cleared. On 29 March 1971, a Disbursing Section joined Support Company from Headquarters and Service Company. The Disbursing Section consisted of three (3) officers and twenty-nine (29) enlisted.

1. Security Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion continued to provide perimeter security and complete internal defense of Camp Books, ASP #2 and the FLC Retrograde Facility. Combat patrols were conducted 1500 meters from the Camp Books perimeter and ASP #2 as of 15 March on a daily basis to provide additional external security. No additional posts were added this month and Security Company continued to maintain 81mm and 60mm illumination capabilities.

On 29 March 1971, at approximately 1615, as the ASP #2 patrol crossed Engineer Ridge the enemy initiated an ambush and the patrol took approximately 25 rounds of small arms fire causing two minor WIAs. At that time two to four VC/NVA were seen retreating to the West, they were all carrying weapons. Fire was returned until the VC/NVA were out of sight. At this time the patrol swept the area with negative results.



During the month of March, Bulk Fuel manned and operated six (6) fuel sites (LZ Baldy, Hoi An, Hill #57, Hill #34, 1st Motors, and Camp Books) dispensing 112,148 gallons of bulk motor gasoline and 151,121 gallons of bulk diesel fuel to Marine, Army, and ROK forces. On March 4th, the operations of the fuel site at LZ Baldy were discontinued and all equipment was brought back to Platoon Headquarters. Also during March 1971, 320 drums of fuel and 1,345 gallons of assorted POL packaged products were issued.

During the month of March 1971 Ammunition Platoon handled 3,643 s/tons of Class V(W) ammunition and 5,665 s/tons of Class V(A) ammunition.

During the month of March 1971 issues of "A" rations totaled 1,750,000 pounds of meat, fish, butter and produce. Issues of "B" rations and MBI's for the month of March totaled 6,000,000 pounds of MBI's and canned goods.

Logistic Support Unit #3 was located at LZ Baldy. The LSU provided Class I, III, and V supply support, 3rd echelon maintenance in engineer, motor transport, ordnance and electronic commodity areas. Forklift, laundry, RUC line and ice machine services were also provided to the supported units. On 4 March 1971 LSU #3 was officially closed down.

# TMO Work Increases As Marines Pull Out

DA NANG — There was a time when FLC's Transportation Management Office (TMO) received vast quantities of gear to supply Marines throughout South Vietnam's Military Region I.

That was at the peak of the Vietnam conflict when the demand for supplies was so enormous that new gear was spoken for before it ever arrived in country.

Now, with the de-escalation of the conflict, TMO ships much more gear out of Vietnam than it receives, according to Maj. A. D. Martin, OIC of TMO, a section of Supply Co., Supply Bn.

"We ship all classes of cargo except food and fuel," said Maj. Martin. Gear that has been used, but is no longer needed in Vietnam, and is still in good condition is taken to FLC's Retrograde Facility. From there it is taken to Da Nang deep water pier to be shipped out.

Unused gear no longer needed is taken from stock and loaded aboard a truck at the TMO warehouse at Camp Jay K. Books, eight miles northwest of here. Then it is taken either to a deep water pier or a local air terminal to be transported to the commands.

"It is our responsibility to account for where and when all Marine gear leaving Vietnam is shipped," said Maj. Martin. "We ship gear by rail and charter - aircraft, by commercial ships and vessels of the U.S. Navy's Seventh Fleet."

Although not on the same scale as several years ago, TMO still receives equipment that comes into Vietnam marked for use by the Marine Corps such as food, fuel and ammunition.

A Personal Effects Section of TMO ships gear of Marines who have been wounded in action and evacuated from Vietnam.

"After the wounded Marine's gear has been inventoried by a Marine in the same unit above the rank of sergeant, the gear is brought to us and we ship it to the Personal Effects Section of 3rd Force Service Regiment on Okinawa," said Sergeant Philip J. Gonzalez, who is in charge of shipping personal effects.

Items such as rings, bracelets and watches are shipped by mail, according to Sgt. Gonzalez.

If a Marine, having received orders for Vietnam, ships his gear from the U.S., "We receive it here and notify the man it is ready to be picked up," said Sgt. Gonzalez.

# Five Years of Logistical Support

DA NANG—In early 1966 one headquarters was established to coordinate all Marine support activities within Military Region 1, known then as 1 Corps.

Formed from the nucleus of Force Logistic Support Groups Alpha and Bravo, the headquarters unit was named Force Logistic Command. March 7, 1971, marks FLC's fifth birthday.

In its five years of operation, FLC has been comprised of many units. In the past year, following redeployments and deactivations, only four battalions; Supply, Maintenance, Headquarters and Service and 1st Military Police; remain as the active units within FLC.

When the first Marine forces of the 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB) landed near Da Nang in March, 1965, they were supported by elements of the 3d MarDiv's service, medical, and headquarters battalions. The supporting element was later redesignated a Force Logistic Support Group (FLSG) as additional 3d MarDiv troops arrived.



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## PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The month of March saw the beginning of a CG directed program to retrograde or dispose of all bulk FLC stock by the end of the month. This was accomplished in record time to include actual loading aboard Fleet Shipping of most of these bulk stocks.

The Retrograde Facility, as a result of the increased redeployment of Marine units turning in retrograde material has, as anticipated, produced a huge workload which is expected to continue for some time until all units standing down have reduced their excess's as directed.

The TMO has also been extremely busy with so many units standing down turning in vast quantities of material for shipment to out of country units as well as the continued receipt of cargo for the support of forces remaining in Vietnam.

Storage Section activity during the month of March has involved tremendous movement of various materials. "T" lot was cleared, "F" warehouse was emptied and disassembled to be shipped out of country. All of the warehouses in the Bravo area were also emptied of stocks and disassembled. Voluminous material was turned over to PP&P for preparation for shipping as the Storage Platoon pulled all material from bulk locations for shipment or disposal.

PP&P workload was very heavy this month. Not only did they prepare all of the bulk FLC assets for shipment but they supplied large quantities of boxes for using units that were deploying.

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PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. On 1 March 1971, the Storage Platoon provided the CCP with a list of 100 FSN's from T-Lot and 100 FSN's from H warehouse. The listings also included location, nomenclature and quantity. These listings will be provided daily for T-Lot and H warehouse until further notice; also lists of 50 FSN's for B-2, B-4 and B-5 warehouses will be submitted to CCP daily. The emphasis will remain on 50 new items daily from these three warehouses.
2. On 3 March 1971 all of the Bravo warehouses were cleared of materials.
3. On 4 March 1971, Storage Platoon received 6887 documents from the Special West Pac MO-MOA screen.
4. The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command accompanied by the Commanding Officer, Supply Battalion visited the Storage Platoon on 5 March 1971.
5. Major Sutton from Wing Supply toured the PR&P shops to observe the progress being made in the training of the Air Wing personnel in the PR&P field on 11 March 1971.
6. Storage Platoon had a section party on the afternoon of 14 March 1971 and the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited with the Storage personnel for approximately an hour at the Supply Company Recreation field.
7. On 16 March 1971, Storage Platoon began making runs to USAD at night in addition to the daily runs. A large volume of lumber was just released to MC100 which will demand continuous hauling in order to get the material to FLC.
8. At approximately 1000 on the 20th of March 1971 one of the trucks making a run to USAD was involved in an accident with a Vietnamese motorcyclist. Pvt LUCAS, who was the Storage Platoon Shotgun on the truck reported that the Vietnamese girl on the cycle was killed. The MP's were at the scene and gathered all necessary information.
9. On 22 March 1971 the warehouse chiefs were taken to the T & R Pad to look at a container of mustard gas which was discovered by T & R personnel. The warehouse chiefs were instructed to perform a physical search of their warehouses for any other containers. A negative report was received from all sections.
10. The material on Operation 'Big Cube' which has been issued to AFDO and staged in "R" lot was screened by the ROKMC. The ROKMC desired to have some of these items and the CCP authorized issue to them. The same MRO was utilized, no signatures required. The ROK also desired all of the insect powder and rodent bait located in F-50 warehouse. Arrangements were made with the CCP to issue this material on 23 March 1971

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11. Four thousand cubic feet of material was left at Deep Water Pier by the USS Denver on 25 March 1971.
12. The Commanding General III MAF and Commanding General, Force Logistic Command visited the Storage Platoon on 26 March 1971.
13. On 27 March 1971 documents were received on all pieces of equipment in the MC100 rolling stock lot. The equipment was prepared and moved to Retrograde.
14. Army personnel arrived on 28 March 1971 to LTI Conex Boxes, did approximately 140 and returned on 29 March and completed the job.
15. On 29 March 1971 the engineers began tearing down "F" warehouse.
16. On 31 March 1971 relocation of the Retail Clothing Outlet into B-6 warehouse was begun. "F" warehouse building #631, disassembly was completed.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this month there were 177 items procured from a source other than Shop Stores. There were 127 demands with 57 fills for a 44.9% fill rate. Backlog at the beginning of the period was 60 TERO's, with 651 opened, and 696 completed leaving a backlog of 18 at the end of the period.
2. Seventy six contact teams were dispatched during the month utilizing one thousand forty man hours.
3. This unit transferred twenty-one enlisted Marines and one officer; and joined thirteen enlisted Marines.
4. During this period 39 end items were excessed from MFAG-3 and 7 from Organic, all of which were turned into MC114.
