1. In accordance with reference (a), enclosures (1) through (3) are submitted as Command Chronology for the 1st Marine Regiment for the period 1-30 June 1966.

2. During this period the 1st Marines operated in both the CHU LAI and DANANG Combat sectors of I Corps RVN. Operations in CHU LAI were conducted during the period 1-3 June 1966. During this period the 1st Battalion and 2d Battalion, 5th Marines were under the command of the 1st Marines. At 031200H June 1966, the 5th Marine Regimental Headquarters assumed command of both the 5th Marine Battalions and relieved the 1st Marines of its assigned TAOR within the CHU LAI Combat Base. At 070130Z June 1966 the Commanding Officer, 1st Marines arrived in DANANG and reported for OPCON to the CG, 3d Marine Division in accordance with CG, 1st Marine Division message 270535Z May 1966. On 10 June 1966, the 1st Marines assumed command less OPCON of the 1st and 2d Battalions, 1st Marines. 3d Battalion, 1st Marines was under OPCON of 9th Marines during 1-14 June and a command group and 3 companies were chopped OPCON to CG, 1st Marine Division for period 16-20 June (see para 5). Commencing at 150800H the 1st Marines assumed OIFCON of the 1st and 3d Battalions, 1st Marines which up until that time were under the operational control of the 9th Marines. That portion of the 9th Marines TAOR to which these battalions were assigned was also assigned to the 1st Marines.

3. Upon arrival in DANANG on 3 June 1966 the Regimental Staff members conducted close liaison with the 9th Marines and the 3d Marine Division staff members. This liaison materially contributed to the preparation for assumption of responsibilities assigned to the 1st Marines by the CG, 3d Marine Division. Staff visits were exchanged with District Headquarters at HOA VANG, HIEU NHON and DIEN BAN and with the province Headquarters at HOI AN.

4. Throughout the month of June the 1st Marines continued aggressive day and night operations at both battalion and small unit level. Combined operations were conducted both within and beyond the assigned TAORs of CHU LAI and DANANG.

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Operations conducted with ARVN forces continued to foster the spirit of cooperation, coordination and understanding between Marine and Republic of of Viet Nam Armed Forces.

5. Operational highlight during June included two major operations. Operation LIBERTY (15-30 June), during which the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines conducted search and clear operations to the south of the 1st Marines TAOR. In addition, the 3d Battalion (-), 1st Marines was dropped to the Operational Control of the CG, 1st Marine Division for Operation KANSAS (16-26 June). These operations clearly demonstrated the combat effectiveness and readiness of the 1st Marine Regiment.

6. Further details in the command, organization and operation of the 1st Marine Regiment are contained in Enclosures (1) through (3).

6. Post Exchange. The Post Exchange is Mobile and is supplied by the 3d MarDiv Exchange located in Danang. Hours of the Post Exchange are 0900-1200 on Saturday only. This exchange provides such necessities as razor blades, tooth brushes, etc. The Army-Air Force supplies the 1st Marines Command Post with a "Refreshment Truck" daily between the hours of 1300-1500.

c. Protestant coverage for the 1st Marines is now provided by Lt D. J. CORY, Battalion Chaplain for 1/1.

d. Significant Events:

(1) With the 1st Marines move from Chu Lai to Marble Mountain on 11 June 1966 came a great improvement in the Chapel facilities. A semi-permanent structure existed in the new Camp. With repairs and leveling of the building and adding some decorative touches and the 1st Marines Chapel furniture the 1st Marines now have an attractive and adequate Chapel with spacious office included for the Regimental Chaplain.

(2) Chaplain HINDERER was transferred on 21 June 1966 to the 5th Marines. On 20 June 1966 Lt R. A. ROY, CHC, USNR, was joined to Headquarters Company, 1st Marines to give Catholic coverage to Regiment and 1/1 and 3/1.

(3) Chaplain ROY will spend at least 2 days in the field with the Companies of 1/1 every week. He has been asked to provide religious coverage to the Batteries of 1/11.

III. INTELLIGENCE

1. General

- a. Intelligence processing and dissemination for the period 1 through 3 June was in accordance with the 1st MarDiv SOP DivO P3800.1F. Intelligence processing and dissemination for the period 3 through 30 June was in accordance with the 3rd MarDiv SOP DivO P3800.1F. On 3 June 1966 1st Marines relinquished OpCon of 1/5 and 2/5 to the 5th Marines. 1st Marines assumed OpCon, AdCon of 1/1, OpCon 3/1 and AdCon 2/1 on 15 June 1966
- b. On 2 June the S-2 departed Chu Lai via LST with the Regimental Advance party and arrived at Danang 3 June. Liaison with the intelligence community in the Danang Area was affected 3 through 15 June. The main body Regimental Headquarters arrived in Danang 12 June.

c. Enemy contacts within the Chu Lai TAOR continued to be characterized by small unit actions designed to hinder friendly patrol activity. By comparison, Viet Cong elements in the Danang area apparently emphasize guerrilla activities of the harassment/sniper category. A marked increase in mining/bobytrapping incidents was also noted. The guerrillas in the Danang Area are obviously better supplied as indicated by the number of mortar/rifle grenades incidents occurring during the reporting period.

2. Administration and Reports

- a. The monthly report on Rewards Funds was submitted to Staff CI 3d MarDiv on 15 June 1966. 1st Marines had 3,000\$ Piasters which were allotted to 3/1 upon arrival Danang TAOR. On 19 June Staff CI 3d MarDiv forwarded this Command 3,500\$ Piasters of which 3,000 was allotted to 1/1. Reward leaflets were requested through the physcological warfare officer.
- b. An S-2 conference to publish policy was held with S-2's of 1/1 and 3/1 on 14 June 1966. The S-2 made a staff visit to 2/1 on 17 June.
- c. Regiment received excoellent service from PII/U III MAF. The section requested and received 4 mosaics to be utilized by Reg't and the Bn's in addition to trail, bridge and fortifications overlay of 1st Marines AOR.
- d. A New Moon Memorandum was published 16 June advising increased alert measures during period 16-26 June.

3. Other

- a. The S-2 briefed and escorted Col Carl Sachs, prospective G-2, III MAF, on 27 June.
- b. LCdr Burke USN DC, 1st MarDiv, held audit of Rewards Funds 29 June 1966.
- c. S-2 made Liaison trips to Province and District Headquarters.

4. Weather, Terrain and Climatology.

a. Weather. During June the Danang Base Area was under the influence of the southwest monsoon. The weather followed a regular daily pattern with showers occurring inland almost every day. Thunder showers actually within the 1st Marines AOR were intense but of short durations accompanied by sever surface winds. There were no operations delayed or postponed as a result of weather conditions.

b. Terrain. Intelligence information continued to be recorded on enemy fortifications. A file was established on bridge reconnaissance within and to the south, of the 1st Marines AOR.

(1) A reconnaissance party consisting of Regimental Headquarters' Staff Officers determined possible locations for the future Command Post.

(2) Trafficability within the 1st Marines AOR improved due to a lessening of mining incidents along the MSR.

c. Climatology. June was the beginning of the typhoon season in the western pacific, however, there were no typhoons, tropical depressions or gale warnings issued for the Vietnam area of operations. Temperature along the coast revealed maximums of 105°F; relative humidity averaged 85 percent. Total rainfall within the 1st Marines TAOR during June was 3.03 inches.

Section IV Operations and Training

I. MISSION

a. (1 - 3 June 1966) Establish and maintain a reconnaissance screen throughout assigned sector of TAOR; conduct unilateral offensive operations within assigned sector of TAOR; conduct coordinated unilateral and combined offensive operations in Division Area of Responsibility as directed; be prepared to participate in unilateral and/or coordinated offensive operations throughout ICTZ as directed; occupy and defend assigned sector of TAOR; be prepared to provide one battalion on twelve (12) hours notice as a reserve/reaction force prepared for operation throughout the ICTZ or commitment to COMUSMACV as a general reserve as directed; be prepared to provide a regimental headquarters and one or two battalion for release to COMUSMACV upon commitment of reserve/reaction battalion; be prepared to assist in the training of, and rendering support to, Regional and Popular Forces (RF/PF); be prepared to provide assistance to C.m Lai Defense Command as directed; be prepared to provide one battalion as Division Reserve as directed.

b. (4 - 14 June 1966) Preparation for movement and operations in the DANANG TAOR.

c. (15 - 30 June 1966) Establish and maintain a reconnaissance screen throughout assigned TAOR sector, and in operating areas (OA) when assigned; conduct unilateral offensive operations with assigned TAOR sector, and in OA as directed, conduct unilateral and or coordinated offensive operations in Division Area of Responsibility as directed; be prepared to conduct unilateral and/or coordinated offensive operations throughout CTZ as directed; occupy and defend assigned TAOR, establish a mutually supporting rear area defense within assigned TAOR sector coordinating the resources of all tenant activities therein; be prepared to deploy anywhere in RVN by the most expeditious means, within indicated time from first warning order; (a) one reinforced rifle company within four (4) hours, (b) one reinforced infantry battalion (less above company) within twelve (12) hours, one regimental command group within twelve (12) hours; be prepared to establish and operate a Task Force Headquarters by providing organic personnel and equipment augmented by Division Headquarters.

II. Operations

a. Throughout the month of June, the 1st Marines (-) (Rein) continued to accomplish its assigned mission as directed by the Commanding Generals of the 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions (Rein). The operations conducted in support of this mission included 1 battalion (-) size operation, 21 company size operations, 118 platoon size operations and 884 small unit operations. These operations were conducted by the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines and the 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines during the period the 1st Marines were at CHU LAI, RVN. Upon movement from CHU LAI the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines and the 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines conducted operations in the DANANG TAOR in accordance with the mission assigned to the 1st Marines by the Commanding General, 3rd Marine Division.

b. Combat patrols, ambushes and listening posts saturated the assigned TAORs in both CHU LAI and DANANG. Counter guerrilla operations were conducted which included clearing operations, security patrols, ambushes and search and destroy operations.

c. Within the CHU LAI TAOR 1st Marines maintained key defensive positions at Hill 69 complex (BT 468069), AN TAN Bridge (BT 497067), Hill 76 (BT 452039) and Hill 54 complex (BT 395145). Upon arrival in the DANANG TAOR, 1st Marines assumed control of key defensive positions located at Bridges AT 999705 and BT 072702 and the island at BT 0367272.

d. At 021600H, the advance party of Headquarters, 1st Marine Regiment departed for DANANG aboard the USS OUTAGAMIE County (LST 1073).

e. At 031200H, Fifth Marines (-) (Rein) assumed responsibilities for 1st Marines TAOR within the CHU LAI Enclave.

f. At 070130Z, First Marines reported for OPCON to the CG, Third MarDiv in accordance with CG, First MarDiv msg 270535Z May (NOTAL).

g. At 101430H, First Marines (Rear) departed CHU LAI aboard the USS SUMMIT County (LST 1146) for movement to DANANG.

h. At 111015H, First Marines (Rear) arrived DANANG and displaced to CP at BT 067716.

i. At 130915H, First Marines received CG, 3rd MarDiv msg 131237Z (Frag Order 400-66) assigning 1st Marines missions and portion of the DANANG TAOR.

j. At 150800H, First Marines assumed OPCON of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines and that portion of the DANANG TAOR assigned to each battalion.

k. At 151355H, First Marines received warning order to provide one company (less one rein platoon) as convoy escort for ROUGH RIDER, Company K, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines assigned mission.

l. At 151400H, the 2nd platoon 29 Civil Affairs Company was attached to the 1st Marines.

m. At 151525H, First Marines placed 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines (Command Group and three companies) on 6 hour alert for operations outside the DANANG TAOR in accordance with CG, Third MarDiv msg 151330Z.

n. At 160800H, First Marines assumed OPCON Company M, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines in accordance with CG, Third MarDiv msg 151330Z. Company M assigned OPCON of 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines.

o. At 161427H, First Marines received CG, 3rd MarDiv msg 160627Z directing 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines to depart for Operation KANSAS. Battalion departed at 161720H.

p. At 161800H, 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines chopped OPCON to CG, 1st MarDiv in accordance with CG, Third MarDiv msg 160627Z.

q. At 171200H, First Marines received CG, 3rd MarDiv msg 170314Z directing 1st Marines to provide one rifle company to participate with 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines in Operation KANSAS.

r. At 171350H, Company M, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines departed via motor convoy for Operation KANSAS.

s. At 171532H, Company M, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines chopped OPCON to CG, 1st MarDiv for Operation KANSAS.

t. At 171850H, 1st Marines received CG, 3rd MarDiv msg 170807Z directing 1st Marines to place Company M, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines on a 6 hour alert to chop OPCON to 3rd Marines on order.

u. At 181200H, Ninth Marines relieved First Marines of responsibility for Dien Ban check point (BT 055588).

v. At 201550H, First Marines received CG, 3rd MarDiv msg 200730Z directing the continuation of attack to Phase Line Green in accordance with 3rd MarDiv OpOrder 399-66 (LIBERTY).

w. At 221220H, Company M, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines alert status changed from 6 hours to 12 hours. Company to chop OPCON 3rd Marines on order.

x. At 230930H, A delegation of Political, Religious, Labor and Student Leaders presented token gifts of appreciation for the efforts of the 3rd MarDiv in the fight against the Viet Cong. First Marines received a picture depicting the Confucious Temple at HOI AN from the people of QUANG NAM Province.

y. At 241037H, Company K, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines returned from Operation KANSAS and was chop OPCON to 1st Battalion, 1st Marines.

z. 25 June, Colonel Carl SACHS perspective G-2, II: MAF spent one day visiting 1st Marines and subordinate units.

aa. At 261300H, elements of 3rd Battalion (-), 1st Marines commenced halo lift to the DA ANG Combat base. Lift was completed at 261550H. All units less one platoon, Company M for motor convoy escort was returned.

bb. At 261535H, First Marines assumed OPCON 3rd Battalion (FWD), 1st Marines.

cc. At 271300H, First Marines chopped OPCON Company M, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines to Commanding Officer, 3rd Marines.

dd. At 281315H, platoon from Company M, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines returned from Operation KANSAS. Platoon acted as convoy security for Btry K, 4th Battalion, 12th Marines.

ee. At 300900H, Maj General KYLE, Commanding General, 3rd Marine Division visited First Marines Command Post. General KYLE remained in conference with the Commanding Officer during his visit.

III. Training

- a. Training in all MOS's was primarily accomplished by OJT during the conduct of operations.
- b. Troop indoctrinations for newly arrived and departing personnel was conducted in accordance with RegtO 1510.1.
- c. Military training for this month was drastically curtailed due to the movement of the Regimental Headquarters from CHU Lai to DANANG and the Operational commitments of operating battalions.

Detailed Chronology of Events

2 June - First Marines advance party departed for DANANG TAOR.

3 June - Fifth Marines assumed responsibility of 1st Marines TAOR within CHU LAI area.

7 June - First Marines reported for OPCON to CG, 3rd MarDiv.

10 June - First Marines (Rear) departed CHU LAI for movement to DANANG.

11 June - First Marines (Rear) arrived DANANG TAOR.

15 June - First Marines assumed OPCON of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines and 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines and that portion of DANANG TAOR assigned to each battalion.

16 June - First Marines provided convoy escort for ROUGH RIDER to CHU LAI TAOR.

16 June - First Marines placed 3rd Battalion (-) 1st Marines on six (6) hour alert for operations outside DANANG TAOR.

16 June - First Marines assumed OPCON of Company M, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marines.

16 June - Third Battalion (-), First Marines chopped OPCON to CG, 1st Marine Division for Operation KANSAS.

17 June - Company M, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines departed DANANG for Operation KANSAS.

SECTION V - LOGISTICS

1. Logistics Summary.

b. This command dropped ADCON of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines and 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines on 3 June 1966, and assumed ADCON of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines on 15 June 1966.

c. Supply, transportation and maintenance were considered normal during this period.

d. The deadlined combat-essential list remains basically stable.

2. Problem Areas Determined from Logistical Status Report.

a. No problems of a significant nature have developed within the Headquarters Company, 1st Marines and 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines.

b. The 1st Battalion, 1st Marines have reported that there is not an adequate quantity of individual size bottles of insect repellent to meet demands. There is also a shortage of bulk malathion. Shortages of individual equipment have been reported to the Division Headquarters. Tropical utilities and jungle boots are short throughout the battalion. Valid requisitions have been submitted for these shortages.

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SECTION VI COMMUNICATIONS-ELECTRONICS

1. OPERATIONS

a. General

(1) On 2 June 1966, the advance party of communications platoon consisting of the Communication Officer, Communication Chief, and eighteen (18) men along with equipment for an initial C.P. installation, embarked aboard the Outagamie County (LST-1073) at Chu Lai. They disembarked the following day at DaNang, proceeded to Marble Mountain and began preparing the new C.P. site for the main body.

(2) Contact with the Third Marine Division was established by AN/MRC-62 and radio on 4 June while landlines were laid to adjacent units, MCB-6 and MAG-16 the following day.

(3) The C.P. at Chu Lai was closed out completely on 10 June and the main body arrived at DaNang the next day. Work continued in preparation for assuming OPCON of battalions.

(4) At 0800 on 15 June, the First Marines assumed OPCON of First Battalion and Third Battalion, First Marines and corresponding TAORS. Radio, Radio Relay, and Teletype communications up and working.

(5) In anticipation of a future move, the communications requirements for a new C.P. were submitted to the S-4 on 28 June and on 30 June the Communication Officer and a recon party checked out the proposed site. The date of movement has not been set, but there should be no difficulties from a communications standpoint.

b. Radio. In order to provide administrative channels to the First Marine Division, the AN/TSC-15 was set up for voice and teletype on 15 June. Initially operating 10 hours daily, this was reduced to voice only during morning hours.

c. Wire. An eight pair cable of WD-1/TF was laid from the Regimental C.P. to First Battalion, First Marines and First Battalion, Eleventh Marines. Work was completed 18 June and the Radio Relay set was placed in standby status.

2. EQUIPMENT

a. One AN/MRC-62 Radio Relay set was attached on 1 June from First Marine Division for use in DaNang area.

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SECTION VII FIRE SUPPORT COORDINATION

1. General. First Marines Fire Support Coordination Center continued normal TAOR operations during the month of June. At 031200H the First Marines passed control of their TAOR to the Fifth Marines and prepared to move to the DANANG area. Major C. SOLICH departed ~~THU~~ LAT 070930H as the FSCC advance party. The First Marines main body arrived in DANANG at 111130H and established the CP at coordinates BT 067714. On 150800H, First Marines assumed control of First Battalion, First Marines and Third Battalion, First Marines. First Battalion, Eleventh Marines, with Battery "A" and Mortar Battery, was assigned in DS of First Marines. Battery "C" arrived in DANANG on 28 June.

One DD was assigned for Operation CHEYENNE in DS of First Battalion, Fifth Marines and a DD was assigned in DS of First Battalion, First Marines during Operation LIBERTY. Because of a lack of suitable targets Naval Gunfire was not utilized in either operation.

All operations during the month of June were conducted from the main FSCC.

2. Problem Area. The firing of H & I's into densely populated areas. Artillery H & I's are not fired within 500 meters of inhabited areas. All H & I's are checked by Regimental S-2 on a recently taken photographic mosaic to ensure protection of local inhabitants.

Section VIII Air Support and Defense

1. General

a. Air Operations. Early in this reporting period the 1st Marine Regiment displaced northward to relocate in the DANANG Area. The only air support in conjunction with this CP displacement was flown on 7 June when the Regimental Commander and several members of his staff were transported by helicopter from CHU LAI to the Marble Mountain area.

b. ALO/FAC. The 1st Marines have been assigned two (2) new FAC's. All battalions except 2nd Bn, 1st Marines now are up to TO.

c. Helicopter Support. The most significant change in air operations is the procedure used for helicopter support of the battalions. At the present time two UH-34's are in D/S of the regiment, to be scheduled by the regiment for support throughout the regimental TAOR.

Air request from the battalions are received and a working schedule is made out for the following days operation. It is expected that the working birds will be used in a most economical manner.

d. Sparrow Hawk. The Sparrow Hawk procedure in the new TAOR remains virtually the same as in our previous TACK. In accordance with 3rd Marine Division Order 364-66 a new Regimental Order 364-66 is being published.

SECTION IX Medical and Dental

1. Camp Sanitation

a. Throughout the month, the sanitation of the messing facility was maintained at a high level.

b. The overall sanitation of the camp has improved daily.

2. Medical Civilian Aid Program

a. Orders for the usual medical supplies for this program were recapitulated and submitted to the civil affairs officer.

3. Medical Care Provided

a. Approximately ten patients were seen daily at this facility. There were two referrals to the Naval Support Activity Hospital. During the month one hundred and ninety eight immunizations were administered. No cases of urethritis were seen. Nine cases of foot ulcers were treated.

Section X - Civil Affairs

1. Significant Events.

a. An ARVN psychological warfare team visited the hamlet of Ly Tra, Ky Chanh Village on the first of the month to explain the Marines' presence there. Loudspeakers were used and leaflets were distributed to promote the benefits of cooperation with Marines. As a result of this program, villagers returned four hand held flares to a Marine patrol.

b. On 2 June Marines from 2/5 and an RF unit staged a combined operation during which RF corporals held MEDCAP, treating 250 Vietnamese civilians. The people were handled with courtesy and respect.

c. Mr. Truong Le Bui replaced Mr. Thanh as Assistant District Chief of Ly Tin District on 3 June. On the same date, 1st Marines were relieved of Civil Affairs responsibility in Chu Lai in order to move to the Da Nang Operation area.

d. The 1st Marines Civil Affairs Section arrived in Da Nang on 9 June and began preparation to assume Civil Affairs responsibility upon assumption of a TAOR.

e. On 15 June, 1st Marines became responsible for CIVIL Action within their TAOR in the southeastern portion of the Da Nang operation area. The area includes a portion of the three districts of Ha Van, Khou Nhon, and Dien Ban and encompasses 17 villages, 63 hamlets, and a population of approximately 81,920.

f. The 2d AA Platoon of the 29th Civil Affairs Company reported to the 1st Marine Regiment CO for duty in support of the civic action program of this command on 15 June.

g. The C4O accompanied by the 1st Marines ARVN Liaison Officer and the Platoon Leader of the Army Civil Affairs Team made an aerial reconnaissance of the 1st Marines CAAOR on 16 June.

h. A conference was held with the CO of the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines on 19 June to discuss a pacification plan to support the expansion of the unit's TAOR.

i. On June 20, the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines appointed Sergeant Major J. D. STALEY as their Civil Affairs Officer.

j. The 3rd Marine Division foreign claims officer briefed Civil Affairs Officers of the 1st Marines on methods of processing and policy governing foreign claims on 22 June.

k. On 23 June the CAO and Army CA Team Leader discussed agricultural projects and problems within the 1st Marines CAOR with the Quang Nam Agricultural Advisor.

l. A delegation from Quang Nam Province representing political, labor, religious, education, and business interest was hosted at 3rd Division Headquarters by the Executive Officer, 1st Marines.

m. On 26 June Mr. Munn, Director of the USAID program in Vietnam, visited the Ngu Lanh Son Campaign area.

n. Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Regiment initiated a Medical Civic Action Program on 28 June when a team under the leadership of Master Gunnery Sergeant B. P. Bland, Regimental S-2 Chief, treated patients in Hoa Long Village.

o. Six USAID windmills were transported from Hoi An to Tam Ky by Marine helicopter on 29 June.

4. MEDCAP Progress: During the reporting period 3523 Vietnamese were treated by MEDCAP teams from 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines (in Chu Lai) and 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines, and Headquarters Company, 1st Marines in Da Nang compared with 6,436 receiving medical assistance from subordinate units of the 1st Marines during the previous month.

5. Amplifying Information. The Civic Action activity during the month of June has been characterized by the orientation of the Civil Affairs Officer of the 5th Marines Regiment in preparation for the transfer of civic action responsibility to that unit in the Chu Lai area and the assumption by 1st Marines of a new area of responsibility in Da Nang. The traditional problems associated with attempting to establish a functional program in a new area, without a close relationship with the local government officials, will be resolved in time but for the present has slowed an effective pacification effort. The much larger area encompassed in the 1st Marine CAAOR in Da Nang has forced a less extensive coverage of critical areas and necessitated more reliance on the ability and skills of battalion civil affairs officers. The need for more extensive and continuing troop orientation covering such subjects as rules of engagements, relationships between Marines and the civilian population, and the requirement of military professionalism both in attitude and skill is again evident. The frequency with which public demonstrations occur points out the need for more effective and responsible local leadership. The presence of large numbers of regular government forces (ARVN, VN Marines and Rangers) is an interesting phenomenon considering the absence in this area of similar Viet Cong forces, but rather the extensive use of well organized Viet Cong guerrilla organizations which have close ties with the civilian population. Even presupposing local opposition to VC activities, regular force units which are required to move out continually to give proper coverage are relatively ineffective, it would soon, against these local organizations. The goals of the immediate future in much of the 1st Marines TAOR seems to be implementing the return of local officials to their areas of political responsibility, the use of military support to reinforce this new government control, and the establishment of population control methods in these areas. The quest for information about the areas committed to our charge goes on in earnest, and, with the intelligent direction and able assistance of the U. S. Army Civil Affairs Platoon, should produce valuable information upon which to base future tactical and psychological warfare plans and operations. In this information gathering process the assistance of the ARVN liaison officers has been invaluable.

28 June - The Dien Ban Sub Sector Advisor, Dien Ban District Chief, and the CAO review the facts surrounding the destruction of religious artifacts at the Thanh Minh pagoda on 27 February. This investigation was prompted by 3rd Marine Division Ltr 17/DFM/rle over 5800/B of 23 June 1966.

SECTION - XI PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS

1. During the reporting period the area of psychological operations for the 1st Marines changed from the Combat Base of CBU LAI to the Combat Base of DANANG. The 1st Marines were relieved of their tactical responsibilities at CBU LAI at 1200 on 3 June 1966. The 1st Marines relieved the 9th Marines of a portion of their TAOR and assumed operation control of the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines and 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines in the Southeastern Sector of the DANANG TAOR at 0800 on 15 June 1966.

a. On the 15th the 1st Marines Psychological Warfare Officer was briefed on the 1st Marines TAOR and the Psychological Warfare being conducted in it by the Psychological Warfare Officer of the 9th Marines; First Lt J. M. STONE.

b. On the 16th, 1st Marines Psychological Warfare Officer was briefed by 3rd Marine Division Psychological Warfare Officer, Major WALTON. Major WALTON covered leaflet requests and availability, and the use of the portable loud-speaker system which may be used both from a vehicle hook-up and a H-34 helo hook-up. Major WALTON emphasized the importance of Psychological Warfare in Counter Guerilla Warfare and explained in some detail the varied use that can be made of Psychological Warfare to assist the troops in tactical operations and the pacification program through Civil Affairs.

c. On the 17th, the Psychological Warfare Officer of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, First Lt. WILHELM was briefed on the concept of Psychological Warfare and the equipment and support available to the 1st Marines in the DANANG TAOR.

d. On the 23rd a request was received from the S-2, 1st Marines for 10,000 reward leaflets for enemy equipment. Third Division is having them printed and they will be supplied when available.

e. On 24 June a written request was submitted to 3rd Marine Division requesting use of Psychological Warfare Loud-speaker System for the period 2 - 4 July.

f. A leaflet request was sent to 3rd Marine Division on 25 June. The request was for ten (10) different leaflets to be used as a back-up stock at HQCO.

g. On 29 June a Liaison visit was made to the 244th Psychological Warfare Co., DANANG. Captain Joseph BARBOSA, USA conducted a tour of the facility and briefing on the capabilities of the unit to support the 1st Marines in conducting Psychological Warfare Operations in the DANANG TAOR.

h. On 30 June five (5) of the ten (10) leaflets ordered through 3rd Marine Division were received. The remaining five (5) leaflets will be delivered by 4 July.

"As lifeguard of the 1st Marines beach on 19 May 1966 your attention was gained by a swimmer calling for help. You quickly realized he was caught in a treacherous undertow and was unable to reach the shore. Immediately you and one other swimmer entered the water and swam through the dangerous current to the side of the distressed swimmer. Calmly placing him on a float you proceeded to make your way to shore. The treacherous currents however rendered this an arduous task and only after being towed in by a line were you able to bring the swimmer to safety.

Upon reaching shore the now saved Marine was so exhausted he was unable to stand, pointing to the fact that without your assistance he would not have survived.

Your quick and courageous response to a dangerous situation resulted in a life being saved. Such actions are in keeping with highest traditions of the United States Marine Corps and for this reason it gives me great pleasure in awarding you this meritorious mast."





Particular emphasis shall be placed upon the importance of conduct and appearance of individuals while on R&R. Personnel will be reminded that they are visitors to a foreign country and are considered an informal ambassador of goodwill for the United States.

5. Administrative Instructions

a. Allocation of R&R Quotas will be distributed by this Headquarters.

b. Orders for R&R will be issued by each Battalion in accordance with references (c).

c. Battalion Commanders will insure completion of enclosure (3) prior to issuance of R&R Orders. Enclosure (3) will be prepared in duplicate. The original will be held at Battalion Headquarters and the duplicate copy will be retained at unit level. Enclosure (3) will be reproduced by individual unit.

d. All personnel going on R&R will report to Da Nang R&R Center 48 hours prior to departure on R&R. Personnel will be billeted overnight at the Transient Facility.

e. MPC must be exchanged for U.S. currency prior to leaving Vietnam. Immediately upon return, U.S. currency will be exchanged for MPC. This service is available at the local disbursing office.

f. Priority for R&R will go to those individuals who have the longest time in Vietnam.

g. All R&R travel will be accomplished in scheduled aircraft. Personnel not returning on scheduled flights are subject to disciplinary action.

h. Standby R&R will be granted to units of this organization on a quota basis only. Individual units starting on S-1000 quotas will be instructed as to their space available status. Only those R&R Standby quotas allotted by this Headquarters to units of this organization will be valid.

6. Quota Utilization. This Headquarters will be notified a minimum of 5 days prior to the date of any quota allocation that cannot be filled by the organization to which it is assigned. This notification will be made by telephone or by priority message if telephone is impracticable. This Headquarters will reallocate quotas turned in by organizations. Quotas in the succeeding month will be adjusted to compensate for the reassigned allocations. Non-compliance without prior notification will result in a penalty being assessed against the culpable organization.

7. Commanders. Battalion Commanders will ensure that the instructions contained herein are complied with and that each individual authorized R&R is schooled in the contents of this and other applicable R&R Orders. The provisions of paragraph 5. above will be strictly complied with. R&R discrepancies can be avoided by proper indoctrination prior to departure on R&R.

MACV R&R PROGRAM

1. General. The MACV R&R program is an out-of-country program established for all U.S. personnel to include U.S. Government civilian employees, assigned duties in the Republic of Vietnam. The program utilizes administrative aircraft assigned for the purpose of transporting R&R passengers to Hong Kong and Bangkok, or other approved destinations on a space required basis. Except in unusual circumstances, trips are for a period of about five days.

2. Quotas. Quotas are received by this Headquarters from Headquarters, 1st Marine Division, near the end of the month prior to the month of the actual R&R. Quotas are allocated to subordinate units by bulletin from this Headquarters and are computed on a per capita basis.

3. Instructions. The following instructions are applicable to the MACV R&R program, and are in addition to the instructions contained in paragraph 4 of the basic order.

a. Cholera shots are required within the past six months prior to entry into Hong Kong, and within the past four months prior to entry in Bangkok, but must not have been administered during the previous six days before arrival in either city. Immunization records will be carried at all times.

b. Identification tags will be worn and identification cards carried while on R&R.

c. Each individual is authorized fifty-five pounds of personal baggage on R&R military aircraft to Hong Kong or Bangkok, and one hundred pounds on the return flight; however, footlockers, trunks, and comparable bulky parcels are prohibited. Final authority on all matters relating to passenger conduct, seating spaces, weight limitations and similar matters will rest with the Aircraft Commanders.

d. The uniform for travel on government aircraft to Bangkok and Hong Kong is Summer Service "A" or "B" with short sleeve shirts for Marine Officers. No member of this organization will travel to or from Bangkok or Hong Kong in the utility uniform. Except for travel to and from R&R locations, personnel are encouraged to wear civilian clothing at all times while on R&R.

e. All U.S. passengers are subject to undergo customs inspections in Bangkok and Hong Kong and additionally, upon return to U.S. Military terminals in Viet Nam.

f. WEAPONS OF ANY TYPE ARE PROHIBITED ON ALL R&R AIRCRAFT.

g. Personnel will have a minimum of \$150.00 in their possession prior to departing Viet Nam on R&R. It is strongly suggested that at least \$15.00 be carried by the individual for an extra nights accommodation and food should the scheduled return flight be delayed.

III MAF R&R PROGRAM

1. General. This program utilizes aircraft of the First Marine Aircraft Wing, FMF, which are based out-of-country, for the purpose of transporting R&R passengers to Okinawa or other destinations approved. Except for non-availability of aircraft for a return flight, or extremely inclement weather, periods of R&R will be for five days (four nights). R&R flights will originate daily at Futenma to Danang.

2. Quotas. Quotas are allocated to subordinate units by this Headquarters on a per capita basis, and are announced by separate bulletin at the end of the month prior to the month of the actual R&R.

3. Okinawa R&R CENTER. The Okinawa R&R Center has been established for the convenience of R&R personnel from units based in Viet Nam. Through courtesy of the Commanding Officer, Camp Butler, and with the approval of the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific/I Marine Amphibious Corps (Forward), a large billeting area has been set aside at Camp H.uge exclusively for R&R personnel. Messing is available immediately adjacent to the billeting area, and present plans call for a clothes pressing service to be established at the Center. The Center is operated by the Officer-in-Charge, WESTPAC Transient Facility. All personnel are required to turn in their orders at the R&R Center upon arrival on Okinawa and transportation will be provided from the aircraft to Camp H.uge for that purpose. Officer billeting is available at Futenma. R&R personnel are required to check in with the R&R Center. This requirement is admittedly an inconvenience, but necessary in the proper maintenance of discipline, law and order, and to pass emergency messages should the occasion arise.

4. Instructions.

a. Identification tags will be worn and identification cards carried while on R&R.

b. Each individual is authorized forty pounds of personal baggage on government aircraft; however, footlockers, trunks, and comparable bulky parcels are prohibited. Final authority on all matters relating to passenger conduct seating spaces, weight limitations and similar matters will rest with the Aircraft Commander.

c. The uniform for travel on government aircraft to Okinawa will be clean utilities, or Summer Service "A" or "B" with short sleeved shirt for enlisted Marines, or summer Service "C" with short-sleeved shirt for Officers.

d. All personnel on R&R to Okinawa are authorized and will wear civilian clothes while on R&R, regardless of rank.

e. Overnight liberty is authorized in Okinawa for all R&R personnel.

f. Personnel in need of medical treatment will not be allowed to proceed on R&R. Special attention should be given to this restriction in the case of skin disease.

(2) The 3d Marine Division maintains the capability to commit one reinforced squad (SPARROWHAWK SQUAD) by helicopter to destroy small VC forces within or adjacent to the T40R.

(3) MAG-16 maintains two (2) CH-46E's and one (1) UH-1E (gunship) for immediate use in the transportation of the reinforced rifle squad.

2. MISSION

The request contains sufficient information to allow simultaneous briefing of pilots at MAG-16 and the reinforced squad at the battalion. Helicopters pick up the squad at the Battalion LZ and proceed to designated LZ.

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c. Coordinating Instructions



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

- (9) Maintain liaison with HOA VANG District.

d. Regimental Reserve. Company _____, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines.

- (1) Conduct operations as directed by this Headquarters.
- (2) Maintain one platoon on a 30 minute alert status and the remainder of the company on a 2 hour alert status.
- (3) Be prepared to deploy anywhere within the 1st Marines TAOR as a reserve/reaction force.
- (4) Be prepared to execute Bald Eagle Operation on order.

e. Coordinating Instructions.

- (1) 1st Marines Operation Order 377-66 supports references (a), (b), (c).
- (2) Reference (d) is hereby cancelled and may be destroyed.
- (3) Contact right to left.
- (4) All units are responsible for their own local security.

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- (5) All units will enforce the civilian curfew within the 1st Marines TAOR between 2000H and 0600H daily.
- (6) Reports. Reference (c).
- (7) Infantry Battalions will conduct a vigorous Civil Affairs Program within assigned sector. Annex H (Civil Affairs).
- (8) Psychological Warfare Operations. Annex I (Psychological Warfare)
- (9) All matters relating to operations outside the RZ and TAOR and coordination/cooperation with I Corps advisory teams will be referred to this Headquarters.
- (10) Maximum use will be made of Vietnamese (VN) liaison personnel during the conduct of operations in order to provide identification of friendly forces and as a means of contact with and identification of civilians.
- (11) Operations and all associated activities will be conducted in such a manner as to minimize non-combatant casualties and damage to civilian property. Annex J (Minimizing non-combatant battle casualties and control disposition, and safeguarding of Vietnamese property and food supplies).
- (12) Mine fields will be established only with specific approval from this Headquarters.
- (13) RCA may be employed in accordance with reference (c).
- (14) Claymore weapons are authorized to be employed by units of the 1st Marines provided the following safety measures are followed:
 - (a) Unit Commanders will provide a 1:5,000 schematic and the coordinates of each weapon emplaced in a permanent or semi-permanent nature to reach this Headquarters (S-3) no later than seventy two (72) hours prior to emplacement.
 - (b) Patrols, ambushes, outposts, perimeters and CP positions do not have to report claymore weapons positions unless they are emplaced over twenty four (24) hours in duration.
 - (c) Claymore weapons will be disarmed during daylight hours unless attack is imminent.
 - (d) Claymore weapons will not be employed with any manner of uncontrolled trip devices.
 - (e) Claymore weapons will only be detonated by electrical means under positive control. However, to preclude spontaneous detonation during electrical storms, the mine will be prepared for non-electrical detonation when the tactical deployment is dangerous to friendly troops (Non-electrical method to be used as outlined in TM 9-1345-2001).

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(f) Claymore weapons will be employed near established defensive positions and under observation to prevent removal or turning around.

(15) Rules of Engagement

(a) Individual

1 Rounds will not be chambered in individual weapons unless contact with the enemy is imminent. The senior Marine present will determine if, in his judgement, this measure must be taken to preserve the lives of USMC personnel. Initiation of any offensive or defensive formation implies imminent contact with the enemy.

2 Magazines will not be inserted in weapons in a camp area during daylight hours unless under attack.

3 During the hours of darkness the sequence of engagement will be:

a Challenge.

b If the person challenged makes an overt attempt to avoid apprehension, opens fire or commits any other hostile act, and therefore endangers the life of the challenger, the challenger may fire.

c Unit Commanders may prescribe illumination prior to firing if local circumstances allow.

d The requirement for challenge may be waived by the local commander if required by the tactical situation and friendly forces are known to be not operating in the area.

(b) Unit

1 Supporting arms will not be fired into any populated area except when the infantry commander on the ground personnel determines the area to be hostile and that such action is necessary to save Marine lives, and that there is no alternative to such a course of action.

2 All supporting arms missions with the exception of barrages and pre-planned unobserved fires will be controlled by an airborne or ground FAC, forward observer NCO Spot Team or RVNAF observer. All observed and unobserved fires, except barrages will be positively approved at the appropriate FSCC level prior to the use of supporting arms.

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- 2 Hamlets or villages not associated with ground operations will not be attacked without prior warning (by leaflets and/or speaker systems or other appropriate means) even though light fire is received from them.
- 4 Hamlets and villages may be attacked without prior warning if the attack is in conjunction with a ground operation involving the movement of ground forces through the area, and if, in the judgement of the ground commander, his mission would be jeopardized by such warning.
- 5 None of the foregoing is intended to deny the application of force against the source of hostile fires. Enemy forces engaging friendly troops will be destroyed by utilization of any available means.

(16) This order is effective upon receipt.

1. MISSION

a. Basic Mission. 1st Marines (-) (Rein) occupies and defends assigned sector of the Danang Area to protect and defend the Danang vital areas in sector; conducts unilateral search and destroy operations within assigned sector; conduct combat/reconnaissance patrols and ambushes throughout assigned sector of the Danang Area; be prepared to conduct counterattacks to restore the integrity of the assigned sector of the Danang Area.

b. Purpose of this Estimate. To summarize available information on the enemy, weather and terrain that could affect the mission of this command.

2. CHARACTERISTICS OF THE AREA OF OPERATIONS

a. Weather

(1) General

(a) The climate of the Republic of Vietnam is monsoonal in nature, and is characterized by two major seasons, the southwest monsoon (May to October) and the northeast monsoon (November to May). Due to the differences in exposure and elevation, there are variances in the climatic elements throughout the country. For the purpose of this estimate the climate and weather as discussed pertains only to the Danang Area.

(b) The climate in the vicinity of Danang Area is classed as humid to excessively wet and the temperature is tropical in nature.

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(2) Temperatures. Danang has a high surface temperature the year round. The mean annual temperature is approximately 80 degrees Fahrenheit with a maximum high of 110° F and minimum low of 50° F. The general meteorological assumption in this area is that temperature decreases at an approximate rate of 3.3 degrees for every 1,000 feet increase in altitude.

(3) Humidity. A rather high relative humidity generally prevails in the area creating conditions favorable for mildew, corrosion, and decay of susceptible items. The annual variation is slight, maximum humidity averages 90 percent (November and December) and the average low humidity is 80 percent (July).

(4) Precipitation. The Danang area receives most of its rainfall (averages 85 inches) from September through December. Most of the precipitation in this area occurs in the form of showers and thunderstorms. Occasionally hailstones have been reported during thunderstorms with stones up to 2 inches in diameter.

(5) Clouds. Over the Danang area the autumn transition and the northeast monsoon are the cloudiest, however, the mean annual cloud cover is approximately 60 percent. A special weather phenomenon called the CRACHIN (a period of widespread fog and drizzle or light rain) affects the Danang area. It is characterized by ceilings from 300 to 1,000 feet with visibility of less than two miles. The CRACHIN appears in October and disappears in April. The CRACHIN usually lasts from two to five days but has been known to last for twenty-two consecutive days.

(6) Visibility. On the whole the Danang area has good visibility except during periods of CRACHIN.

b. TEPRAIN. Shores are predominantly sandy; coastal terrain consists of rice paddies, cultivated fields and unproductive sand plains. The 1st Marines AOR is laced with streams running NW and SE and numerous marshy areas. An unuseable meter-gage railroad is located six to ten miles inland, highway #1 is located four to six miles inland and highway #14 runs east to west along the southern portion of the 1st Marines AOR.

c. HYDROGRAPHY. The beaches along the 1st Marines AOR are predominantly sandy. The mean daily tides range from 2 to 6 feet. From October through April, currents flow south and southwest and are strongest from December through February when average speeds of up to 3 knots are recorded. By May currents are reversed and flow north and northwest.

d. POLITICS. See reference (b) and Special Intelligence Reports.

e. ECONOMICS. The majority of the population within the 1st Marines AOR derive their livelihood from agriculture and fishing. The average peasant holding is about 5 acres with the majority of the land under rice paddy cultivation. The most important animals are cattle, water buffalo and swine. Ducks are also grown by most farmers for eating as well as marketing. Commercial fishing operations are for the most part family enterprises.

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3. ENEMY SITUATION (See reference (b) and current Intelligence Summaries and Situation Reports).

a. Composition. Viet Cong military forces in South Vietnam are organized into four broad categories; Main Force Units, Local Force Units, Militia Units and Regular North Vietnamese Forces (NVA).

(1) Main Force Units (MF) are directly subordinate to the Central Office South Vietnam (COSVN) or to a Military Region (MR). Main Force Units are the best trained and equipped of the three irregular type forces.

(2) Local Forces (LF) are those directly subordinate to a district or province.

(3) Militia Units (MU) are subordinate to a village or hamlet.

(4) The regular armed forces of North Vietnam (NVA) are those forces from North Vietnam who have infiltrated into South Vietnam. The NVA forces are equipped with modern conventional weapons of Chicom and Soviet origin, as well as considerable quantities of older Japanese, German, French and U. S. armament. These forces are the most experienced and effective fighting force native to Southeast Asia.

b. Strength and Dispositions.

QUANG NAM PROVINCE

Militia Units (MU) (Irregulars)

Normally a platoon sized unit is subordinate to each village and a squad assigned to each hamlet. In Quang Nam (P) there are 149 villages (V) and 481 hamlets (H). Approximate strength of Militia Units in the province is 3200.

c. Arms and Armament. The VC supply of weapons and ammunition in Quang Nam (P) has been accumulated from several sources. World War II weapons infiltrated primarily from North Vietnam, captured weapons, and locally produced weapons.

The exact quantities of weapons and ammunition infiltrated from North Vietnam are unknown, it is evident that significant quantities of Communist Bloc weapons and Chicom copies of these weapons have been infiltrated into Quang Nam together with the required ammunition.

Crew served weapons have been introduced in sufficient quantity so that 81/82mm mortars are now found in the confirmed battalions within Quang Nam (P). 75mm recoilless rifles are believed to be in most main force battalions. This has enabled the VC to make considerable progress in distributing lighter weapons, such as the 60mm mortar and the 75mm RR, down to Company level within MF units.

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d. Enemy Capabilities.

(1) To continue his buildup of strength in Quang Nam (P) by limited drafting of South Vietnamese and continuing to introduce NVA elements into the province.

(2) Attack any target in the province with forces listed in paragraph b. above. This represents the maximum effort the VC could bring to bear on any target with forces committed in Quang Nam Province.

(3) Reinforce his forces within Quang Nam with forces from Quang Tin (P) (See reference (b)).

(4) With forces available continue to conduct small and occasional large scale attacks, terrorism, assassinations, sabotage, propaganda, population and resources control, and extension of the clandestine infrastructure, while preparing for large scale warfare, to destroy the remaining vestiges of confidence of the population in the GVN and to extend VC control.

(5) Restrict or completely deny the use of the LOCs through interdiction and sabotage.

e. Analysis of enemy capabilities.

(1) The enemy has the capability of replacing his losses or increasing his force, at an accelerated rate by infiltration of NVA and forced recruiting. Such strength increases could again reverse the ratio in favor of the VC.

(2) Enemy forces committed in the Quang Nam area number eleven battalions (one of which is unidentified). There are eight LF companies in the province, a SAPOR company and a transportation battalion which is located along the main infiltration corridor with the mission of manning infiltration stations along the route.

(3) NVA forces located in northern Quang Tin (P), two regiments and one MF regiment, has the capability of moving into Quang Nam (P) if they are inclined to do so.

(4) As amply demonstrated, the enemy has been implementing the capabilities described in (4) and (5) for some time. As a consequence of these actions, the economics and military resources of the GVN have been severely strained. Increased VC pressure has also resulted in a steady deterioration of the security situation in the province.

(5) The continued freedom on the part of the VC to interdict and sabotage routes of communication at night will eventually result in isolation of GVN forces and centers of influence from access to the rest of the population. VC terrorism, subversion, and psychological warfare activities applied to the population are destroying public confidence in the GVN and will result in further isolation of the GVN unless reduced.

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f. Enemy vulnerabilities.

(1) When the VC are operating away from their base areas they are dependent on the local population for food supplies and porter transportation. Reliance on these resources restricts movement of heavy weapons and large amounts of ammunition. The many varieties of VC weapons complicates their logistics because of the different types of small arms ammunition and repair parts.

(2) VC forces, when concentrated, are vulnerable to air attacks, and to counterattacks by friendly forces. The VC are also vulnerable to friendly artillery. VC base areas are vulnerable to air attack.

(3) VC forces are vulnerable to the use of chemical agents by friendly air and ground forces, to include defoliation efforts and food crop destruction.

(4) The VC are vulnerable to sustained combat and aggressive pursuit.

g. Conclusions.

(1) Based upon the analysis, the capabilities of the enemy most dangerous to our assigned mission are summarized in order of probability of adoption.

Capability 1

Continue the present tactics employing enemy forces presently available. This action is characterized by small scale attacks, terrorism, assassination, sabotage, propaganda, absolute population control, and re-positioning of forces in preparation for higher level of military operations. Occasional large scale attacks, coupled with ambushes of friendly reaction forces where there is a good assurance of success.

Capability 2

Concurrently with Capability 1, completely close all LOCs and launch a series of attacks in an attempt to destroy the remaining vestiges of GVN control outside of USMC influence.

Capability 3

Conduct isolated large scale attacks against districts or the province capitol, utilizing forces to ambush reaction force's routes of approach and likely LZs.

Capability 4

Unilaterally cease fire or standdown of activity so as to remove the excuse for further US buildup and bombing of North Vietnam.

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(2) Except for capability 4, no one capability will be adopted to the complete exclusion of any other since it is a principle of VC strategy to adapt their tactics to circumstances existing at a given time.

1. MISSION

Establish and maintain a reconnaissance screen throughout assigned TAOR sector, and in operating areas (OA) when assigned; conduct unilateral offensive operations within assigned TAOR sector, and in OA's as directed; conduct unilateral and/or coordinated offensive operations in Division Area of Responsibility as directed; be prepared to conduct unilateral and/or coordinated offensive operations throughout CTZ as directed; occupy and defend assigned TAOR sector coordinating the resources of all tenant activities therein; be prepared to deploy anywhere in RVN by the most expeditious means, within indicated time from first warning order:
(a) One reinforced rifle company within four (4) hours, (b) one reinforced infantry battalion (minus above company) within twelve (12) hours, (c) one regimental command group within twelve (12) hours; be prepared to establish and operate a Task Force Headquarters by providing organic personnel and equipment augmented as required by this Headquarters.

2. CONCEPT

- a. The 1st Marines will accomplish the above mission with two infantry battalions and a direct support artillery battalion.
- b. The infantry battalions will be assigned sectors in the 1st Marines TAOR. The battalions will establish required defensive positions, combat outposts and patrol bases within assigned sectors. Aggressive patrolling, search and destroy, clearing operations and ambushes will be conducted throughout the entire sector during daytime and nighttime with priority to the nighttime.
- c. Each battalion will be prepared to assume responsibility for another battalion's sector in the 1st Marines TAOR and be prepared for deployment as directed within twelve (12) hours of notice.
- d. The Regimental Reserve will maintain a readiness posture to be immediately employed as a helicopterborne force, a mobile strike force mounted on tracks or wheeled vehicles, or on foot capable of being employed anywhere within the 1st Marines TAOR.

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- e. All infantry battalions will be prepared to conduct unilateral and/or coordinated operations with GVN Armed Forces within and beyond the periphery of the DINING THOR as directed.
- f. The 1st Marines will conduct counterattacks employing all regimental resources. Normally, counterattack forces will consist of a reinforced rifle company capable of air or ground lift to the threatened area. Infantry battalions will contain penetrations in respective sectors and assist in the destruction of the penetrating force as required.
- g. In all offensive operations, the pursuit policy outlined in reference (b) will be executed. Unit Commanders conducting offensive operations will formulate plans for pursuit intentions and will inform the next higher headquarters as soon as possible in order to effect a coordinated plan to trap VC Forces.
- h. To provide effective coordination of operations with the GVN Armed Forces and to insure dissemination of operational and intelligence information between the 1st Marines and local Vietnamese Agencies, liaison will be maintained with the Province Headquarters at HOI AN and the District Headquarters at HIEU NHON, DIEN BIAU, HOI VONG.

- b. Friendly Forces. Operation Order 377-66.

2. MISSION

The 1st Marines Fire Support Coordination Center (FSCC) will exercise overall responsibility for planning and coordinating the conventional fires supporting the elements of the Regiment.

3. EXECUTION

Fire support coordination will be in accordance with references (b) and (c).

4. TARGET INFORMATION

a. Target List. The target list will be maintained by the Regimental Commander. Subordinate Unit Commanders will be prepared to maintain that portion of the list that applies to their areas of responsibility.

b. Restricted Targets

- (1) All supporting arms missions, with the exception of barrages, and preplanned unobserved fires will be controlled by an air-borne or ground FNC, forward observers, NGF Spot team or RVNF observer. All observed and unobserved fires, except barrages, will be positively approved at the appropriate FSCC level prior to use of supporting arms.
- (2) No supporting arms will be fired into any populated area except when the Infantry Commander on the ground personally determines that such action is necessary to save Marine lives, and that there is no alternative to such a course of action.

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- (3) Every effort will be made to preserve intact religious, cultural, medical and public installations from damage and destruction by any weapon or supporting arms.
- (4) Legitimate targets within a specific area of responsibility may be engaged at the discretion of the Commander of that TAOR, without further clearance. Missions, which might affect adjacent units, will be cleared by the next higher headquarters. Any target within 500 meters of a boundary or FCL must be cleared by the next higher headquarters prior to firing.
- (5) Legitimate targets outside the Regiment's TAOR will not be attacked until clearance to fire has been obtained from the Division FSCC or the Respective District Chief.

5. AIRCRAFT SAFETY

a. Air Sentries and Lookouts

- (1) Air Sentries will be posted at mortar and artillery firing units and on naval gunfire support ships, and will "check fire" when friendly aircraft are observed approaching danger areas.
- (2) Artillery forward observers and naval gunfire spotters will "check fire" when it appears that the trajectories of artillery and support ships will endanger friendly aircraft.
- (3) Unless special coordination measures are proscribed, fires on helicopter routes in use are restricted to observe fires where the observer is capable of insuring the safety of the helicopters using the route.
- (4) Information on all artillery and naval gunfire missions will be posted to all helicopter and fixed wing aircraft control agencies. For this purpose, a "SAVAPLANE" report will be used. This report will include the coordinates, of the firing units, the target coordinates, the time period involved (when known) and the maximum ordinate of the projectile.

EXAMPLE: SAVAPLANE (PHONETIC LETTER) XI-5404XB-4897XC-0900XD-1100XE-5000 Feet.

Individual Battalion FSCC's will be responsible for passing "SAVAPLANE" reports to the Regimental FSCC. The Regiment, in turn, will disseminate the reports to DASC and other air control agencies as required. DASC will assign the phonetic letter to all "SAVAPLANES".

- b. Restrictive Fire Plans. When the possibility of massed artillery and/or naval gunfire exists and when such massing may endanger a simultaneous air mission, a restrictive fire plan will be employed. The echelon requesting the air support mission will recommend the restrictive fire plan if and as required. The prompt and accurate

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dissemination of all "SAVAPLANE" reports by the responsible agencies and the careful observance of those reports by all helicopters and fixed wing aircraft, should reduce the requirements for a restrictive fire plan to the minimum.

6. SAFETY OF GROUND FORCES

The principles of the use of tactical areas of responsibility (TAOR) provide that all fires within, or into the TAOR must be under the positive control of the TACR Commander. Fires out of the TAOR must be cleared with higher headquarters in order to ensure safety of forces. The boundaries therefore, of the TAOR are in fact no fire lines and bomb lines. As such, they insure the necessary safety of ground forces.

- (6) There will be a continuing contact between units of the 1st Marine Regiment and the local inhabitants.

2. MIS. IN. The First Marine Regiment (-) (Reg), will through Civic Action efforts reinforce the established government of the Republic of Vietnam, develop the pride and self-respect of the populace, maintain a balanced social structure, meet the basic needs of the people, and improve the image of United States Military Forces.

3. EXECUTIVE

- a. Concept of Operations
 - (1) The Civic Action Areas of Responsibility within the 1st Marine TAOR are assigned by reference (b).
 - (2) Whenever possible the civilian population will be warned by leaflets and broadcasts of impending airstrikes or operations.
 - (3) Civic Action Programs initiated by subordinate units during the securing phase are to be those requested by the Vietnamese Government and are to be governed by the time available to complete the project, the need in the area, and policy and direction outlined in references (c) and (d) and (e).
 - (4) Civil Affairs Officers will conduct liaison with appropriate government echelons within their CAAOR's, assist the Vietnamese in population control, advise local government officials, and report Civic Action/Civil Affairs activity.
 - (5) Civic Action functions are to be transferred to the Government of Vietnam as soon as possible.
 - (6) Troop indoctrination should be performed on an continuing basis and in accordance with the direction found in reference (c) and (f).
 - (7) Incidents involving the civilian population will be reported in accordance with reference (h).
 - (8) Combat and non-combat claims will be processed as directed by reference (f).
 - (9) Vietnamese Nationals will be encouraged to remain within their homes or shelters during combat operations unless the military situation requires their removal.

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(10) Medical Evacuations

(a) Civilian casualties requiring hospitalization will be evacuated to the local hospital in Da Nang. Casualties of an emergency nature will be evacuated by helicopter to the U. S. Naval Hospital, Da Nang (BT 068718).

(b) A report of injury or death of civilians will be made by phone to the Regional Civil Affairs Officer (Battalion 46) and will include full name, sex, and age of the victim, his hamlet and village, and the type and extent of injuries.

(c) Captured Viet Cong caches of food, clothing, and medical supplies will be delivered to the Battalion CP and reported to the Regional Civil Affairs Officer who will make arrangements for distribution to GVN officials.

(d) Occasionally the combat situation prohibits the evacuation of food caches. In order to prevent the use of those food stuffs by the Viet Cong after the Marines leave the operational area, food may be destroyed after concurrence has been received from the highest GVN official in the area, usually the District Chief. If approval from the GVN is not forthcoming, the approval of the Regimental Commander must be obtained before destruction commences.

- (8) The 1st Marine Regiment will continue to assume responsibility for psychological operations within its sector of the TAOR.

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2. MISSION

- a. 1st Marines (-) (Rein) psychological operations are to be conducted in support of the Regimental mission by providing specific and direct support to tactical commanders.
- b. Objectives.
 - (1) To create, build and maintain the respect, confidence and loyalty of the people for the legally constituted government of South Vietnam.
 - (2) To insure the people of South Vietnam that the allied forces are here at the request of the legally constituted government and explain to the populace the presence of US Marines in the Republic of Vietnam.
 - (3) To establish and build a climate of national unity behind the war effort.
 - (4) To display a favorable image of the U.S. Marine Corps in support of the legally constituted government.
 - (5) To expose the true nature of the National Front for the Liberation of South Vietnam (NFLSVN) (VC) objectives.
 - (6) To lower morale and inspire dissatisfaction among the NFLSVN and its supporters.
 - (7) To encourage the defection of Vietnamese impressed into the VC.
 - (8) To reduce the fighting effectiveness of Viet Cong and NVF by conducting psychological operations in conjunction with tactical operations.

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Annex J (Minimizing Non-combatant Battle Casualties and Control, Disposition and Safeguarding of Vietnamese Property and Food Supplies)
to Operation Order 377-66

1. PURPOSE

This Annex prescribes policy and procedures designed to minimize non-combatant battle casualties and for the control, disposition and safeguarding of Vietnamese property and food supplies in accordance with reference (a) and (b).

2. MINIMIZING NON-COMBATANT CASUALTIES

a. General

- (1) The Government of Vietnam (GVN) is engaged in a fight for its survival against the Communist Viet Cong (VC) supported and reinforced by the forces of North Vietnam. It is the objective of the VC to seize control of the hamlets, villages and towns by a combination of military action, terrorism, political action and subversion. It is the objective of the GVN to resist this process and where it has occurred, to reverse it. This means that the battle for Vietnam flows backward and forward across the homes and fields of the helpless rice farmers and the small town inhabitants. Whether, at any one time, he lives in a VC or a GVN controlled hamlet depends to a large extent upon factors and forces beyond his control. Eventually, of course, the GVN plans to regain control over all of the hamlets and all of the people.
- (2) The use of unnecessary force leading to non-combatant battle casualties in areas temporarily controlled by the VC will embitter the population, drive them into the arms of the VC, and make the long range goal of pacification more difficult and more costly.
- (3) The circumstances described above call for the exercise of restraint not normally required of Marines on the battlefield. Commanders at all echelons must strike a balance between the force necessary to accomplish their missions with due regard to the safety of their commands and the high importance of reducing to a minimum the casualties inflicted on the non-combatant populace.

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(4) The VC exploit fully incidents of non-combatant casualties and destruction of property by RVNAF and US combat forces. Their objectives are to foster resentment against GVN and the United States, and to effect the permanent alienation of the people from the Government.

b. Action

- (1) Commanders will consider both the military and psychological objective of each operation. Prestrikes in populated areas, reconnaissance by fire into hamlets and poorly selected harassing and interdiction fires are examples of military measures which will be counterproductive in the long run.
- (2) Troop indoctrination briefings will be held before each operation to emphasize both the short and long range importance of minimizing non-combatant battle casualties.
- (3) The proper selection of landing zones, the careful planning and execution of air strikes and the proper employment of artillery and armed helicopters will avoid unnecessary damage to lives and property of non-combatants.
- (4) With due regard to security and success of the mission, whenever possible the people will be warned of impending air strikes or operations by leaflets and broadcasts. Blame for military action in the area should be shifted to the VC.
- (5) A civic action plan should be developed to support each operation even if the area has been controlled by the VC.
- (6) Free strike zones should be configured to eliminate populated areas except those in accepted VC Bases.
- (7) Operations should be planned in coordination with Province and District Chiefs with due regard to security of plans. A Liaison Officer from US Combat Forces conducting operations in a particular province should be positioned at the Sector Headquarters for coordination. The Sector Advisors must perform this function in the absence of liaison.
- (8) Use of assigned RVNAF Liaison Officers is essential and should be arranged for each significant operation. These Liaison Officers through their knowledge of the area of operation and the population can assist in identification of friend from foe and can help to insure close coordination with all Vietnamese Forces. In this connection, the participation of Vietnamese Forces in operations should be encouraged so that the war does not appear to be a US action against the Vietnamese people. Regional and Popular Force participation should be sought at battalion or even company level so that they may assist in the search of private dwellings, obtain information, and contribute to the desired effect of the cooperative war effort.

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- (9) Established rules of good military conduct and discipline must be enforced.
- (10) It is absolutely essential that US Forces establish the reputation of being able to move at will throughout SVN and to defeat any VC Force encountered. This reputation for invincibility will produce innumerable psychological benefits and hasten the end of the war. On the other hand, these same forces must constantly demonstrate their concern for the safety of non-combatants -- their compassion for the injured -- their willingness to aid and assist the sick, the hungry and the dispossessed.

3. CONTROL, DISPOSITION, AND SAFEGUARDING OF VIETNAMESE PROPERTY AND FOOD SUPPLIES

a. General

- (1) In carrying out search and destroy operations in VC controlled areas, Commanders must take all practicable measures to minimize the destruction of indigenous private property and to insure proper control, disposition, and safeguarding thereof. That people have lived under VC control does not make them irrevocably hostile, nor is it necessarily of their own choosing. To treat them as the enemy and deny them essential resources is incompatible with long-term Government of Vietnam (GVN) and US objectives.
- (2) Minimizing destruction of private property and supplies, coupled with proper control and disposition of excesses, requires continuous command emphasis. Plans must include procedures for the protection of private property and the reporting, securing, and disposition of excess supplies.

b. Action

- (1) Commanders should make every effort to minimize destruction of indigenous private property and to insure that captured supplies which are excess to local needs are used to enhance the GVN image. If extraction of these excess supplies is not possible, action will be taken in accordance with policies outlined below to deny permanently these supplies to the enemy.
- (2) MACV Sector Advisors will furnish liaison to accomplish coordination between tactical units and local GVN Officials.
- (3) Disposition of indigenous private property and food supplies is the responsibility of GVN Officials.
- (4) Civilian dwellings will not be burned, nor will private property, including livestock, be destroyed except as an unavoidable consequence of combat actions.

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- (5) The destruction of dwellings and livestock, as a denial measure is to be left to GVN Authorities or RVNAG Units. Requests by Vietnamese authorities for employment of units of the 1st Marines to destroy Vietnamese property will be referred to this Headquarters.
- (6) Large food caches, obviously over and above the needs of the local population as determined by local GVN Officials, will be extracted whenever possible and redistributed under supervision of Province and District Officials using Vietnamese resources and transportation to the extent practicable. For extractions, a receipt system should be utilized where private ownership is claimed. General security for extraction operations and the furnishing of packaging materials and transportation may be provided upon request from GVN Officials. Plan should provide for the availability of these resources.
- (7) The following measures, as a minimum, should be coordinated with local GVN Officials.
 - (a) Procedures for informing GVN Officials of locations and amounts of food supplies discovered.
 - (b) Procedures for provision of necessary labor, packaging materials, and transportation to permit extraction.
 - (c) Provision for GVN to furnish receipts for supplies extracted when private ownership is claimed.
 - (d) Procedures for use of Marine Units to furnish security elements during extraction operations.

1. SITUATION. Omitted.

2. MISSION

On designated dates and locales mutually agreeable to USMC and GVN military and civilian officials involved, 1st Marines provides infantry and limited medical and logistical support to COUNTY FAIR Operations.

3. CONCEPT

- a. COUNTY FAIR is a tactical search and clear operation in conjunction with GVN officials and USMC tactical units. This combined governmental civic and psychological operation is designed to reestablish GVN control over the populace and to flush from the area any VC from the community. Military actions, accompanied by a vigorous civic action and Psy-War program are conducted to demonstrate and convince the people that the government is interested in the well being of the people and victory over the Viet Cong is inevitable.
- b. USMC participation in COUNTY FAIR operations is that of coordination and cooperation. Marine tactical units surround a selected village or hamlet for the duration of the operation. Marine support elements provide limited medical and logistical assistance. The searching of the hamlets and villages is primarily performed by GVN military and paramilitary forces. This is paramount in the conduct of COUNTY FAIR Operations, primarily to restore the populace's confidence, trust and loyalty to the duly appointed GVN officials.
- c. Appendix 1 depicts the sequence through which the populace of a selected village or hamlet is processed.
 - (1) Collection and Assembly. GVN military and paramilitary authorities assemble the civilian population. The civilians will be temporarily relocated in an area adjacent to the selected target site.
 - (2) Civic Action and Psy-War. During this phase of the operation GVN officials strive to gain the trust, cooperation and confidence of the populace. Messing facilities provide needs for villagers to compensate for inconvenience caused by the administrative processing. An intensive Psy-War program is conducted during this waiting period by GVN officials.
 - (3) Searching and Identification. GVN administrators process the villagers in the selected area. During this process the following is accomplished.

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- (a) Census taken
- (b) ID Cards issued
- (c) Family background and the whereabouts of the family members are determined.
- (d) VC suspects are retained for ARVN interrogators and when required USMC IFT teams assist.

(4) Medical. A minimum of two corpsmen will provide medical assistance in conjunction with the MEDCAP program. If available a U. S. Navy physician accompanies the medical unit. GVN medical personnel are encouraged to participate.

(5) Entertainment. Whenever circumstances and facilities permit the populace should be provided with some form of entertainment. Movies and music from the Division Band and the Drum and Bugle Team have been enthusiastically received by the Vietnamese people.

- d. To achieve the maximum effect of these operations, the time between the initial planning and the conclusion of the execution must be kept to a minimum.
- e. COUNTY FAIRS by their very nature demand close coordination between Marine and GVN officials. The primary purpose of the operations is to introduce GVN officials and influence into a selected area. Therefore, USMC participation will not be such as to detract from the primary purpose.

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
