



9. Mission Assigned. 1st Bn, 1st Marines conducts aggressive patrolling and ambushing within its TAOR, to locate, fix, and destroy enemy forces and material in the area; and conducts unilateral and/or combined operations with US and/or RVN forces beyond the boundaries of the TAOR. Concurrently, the battalion conducts operations in a manner to strengthen support of the civilian population for Marine and GVN efforts.

10. Background.

- a. On 1 March, the battalion (-) was placed in 3d Marine Division reserve. Its area of routine operation was limited to that immediately surrounding DA NANG (MARBLE MOUNTAIN) cantonment area which housed it, with the anticipation that the battalion would be maintained in a high state of readiness for rapid employment as directed by the Commanding General, 3d Marine Division One rifle company was detached and placed under OFCON of the Commanding Officer, 3d Marines, for employment in a similar fashion.
- b. Within four hours of its assumption of this status, deployment of the battalion begon. Within two days, elements of the battalion were committed in both the HUE-PRU BAI and CHU TAI enclaves.
- c. By mid-month, the battalion (still minus the rifle company OPCON 3d Marines) had reassembled at FHU BAI, and commenced daily operations within an assigned TAOR. Since the battalion was not directly involved in the defense of a vital installation, its units were called upon, on several occasions during the remainder of the month, to demonstrate readiness for rapid employment outside of the assigned TAOR. Only one rifle company was actually committed to a combat operation outside the TAOR during this period, although two rifle companies and a battalion command group, on another occasion, moved to the PHU BAI airfield to stand by for airlift to CHU LAI.
- d. For approximately ten days, while Co K, 3d Bn, 3d Marined was placed under CPCON of the battalion, the TAOR was divided into four company-sized areas of responsibility. It was re-divided into three AOR's when Co K was returned to its parent organization in the PA NANG enclave. All "semi-permanent" facilities work maintained in the vicinity of the battalion command post,

to permit maximum freedom of movement for each company within its assigned area. Companies were rotated within the TAOR periodically, to increase overall familiarity with the terrain and to equalize use of the facilities located at the battalion command post.

Intelligence.

Enemy situation at the beginning of the period. Upon arrival at the PHU BAI enclave, the 2d Battalion, 1st Marines was engaged with the 810th Viet Cong Battalion in the PHU THU District, northeast of the PHU BAI perimeter. The action resulted in 122 confirmed VC KIA and over seventy (70) individual and crew-served weapons captured. Periodic reports were received by G-2, 1st ARVN Division, indicating that VC Main Force units were deploying to the edge of the jungle area adjacent to the rice growing lowlands. Such a move indicates that the VC are preparing to conduct operations in the lowland area to procure a major part of the forthcoming rice harvest. A rallier report received during early March related that the 95th Regiment of the 325th North Vietnamese Division participated in the attack on ASHAU Special Forces Camp (Y0494834). The presence of the 95th Rogiment of the 325th Division in the 11th DTA has not been confirmed. The possible presence of the 95th Regiment increases the number of regimental units to three. (2) Enemy activity within the TaOR centered on the VI DA - VO M. Harlet area located in GS's (YD/811) and (YD7810). These hamlets have long been known to be way-station areas for troops and supplies pessing between the jungle area of NiM HOA District and the rice lands of HUONG THUY and PHU THU Districts to the northeast. The VC warning system in the village has enabled them to avoid contact with friendly forces operating in the area. Viet Cong suspects apprehended in the village have given extensive information concerning VC activity but to date this information has been of little use because of limited contact. In an attempt to discourage friendly troops from operating in the VI DA - VO XA area, the VC have utilized mines and booby traps. The VC in this area have not shown the sophistication in this type warfare that was common to VC forces in the DANAIG enclave. This fact has enabled friendly forces to detect a greater number of mines/booby traps than in previous months. The following table compares mining incidents of February and March:

- (3) 2 March 1966, ARVN and Marine forces engaged the 810th VC Battalion in PHU THU District, northeast of the PHU BAI Critical area. This action resulted in over 120 VC KIA and in excess of 70 individual and crew-served weapons captured. After sustaining heavy easualties the 810th Battalion withdrew southeast to the vicinity of BACH NA Mountain (ZC619250)
- (4) 9 March 1966, 1st LRVN Division reports that ASHAU Special Forces Camp (YC494834) was under nortar and ground attack by an estimated (2) VC Battalions. (2) North Vietnamese soldiers who rallied to the camp several days prior to the attack stated that the participating VC forces were elements of the 325th NVA Division, specifically the 95th Regiment. This report is unconfirmed. After three days of continual attack the camp was abandoned. The Viet Cong employed extensive anti-aircraft weapons along all approaches to the area in preparation to engage airborne reinforcements.
- (5) 122003H, A Company ambush vicinity (MD790103) fired on (2) armed VC resulting in (1) possible WIA. During a search of the killing zone fire was exchanged with (3) additional VC with negative results. When the ambush pursued the fleeing VC, (1) VC was sighted and taken, under fire on a foot bridge vicinity (YD791105). The search of the area continued and 4-5 VC were engaged in a hut vicinity (YD791105).

fled when fired on, leaving a NLS-36 rifle, (4) ChiCom grenades, (1) M-26 grenade, argumition and clothing behind. A search of the area revealed blood indicating 3-4 VC WIA.

- (6) 131630H, a mine sweep team discovered (1) AT mine with a booster charge of 10 pounds of TNT at (YD815169). During the next two days (2) additional AT mines were found in the same area.
- (7) 151915H, C Company observed (3) rounds incoming 60mm mortar fire at (YD794113). Charlie-6 believes the rounds came from the West and were directed at Charlie Company's old CP site.
- (8) 211005H, A Marine 6X6 truck detenated an .T mine at (YD807-106) causing extensive damage to the right front of the vehicle. No casualties resulted from the incident.
- (9) 22 March, 1st ARVN Division reports (1) VC Battelion dispersed at the following coordinates: (YD756068), (YD754064) and (YD753068). (C-3 rating).
- (10) 231915H, Charlie 2 ambush patrol received 8-10 rounds automatic carbine fire from (YD790099). Fire was returned with negative results.
- (11) 282330H, Charlie 3 patrol returning to its patrol base at (YD793107) surprised an estimated 15-20 VC. The patrol sighted the VG when it gave a prearranged signal to enter the base area. The VC reacted by throwing TNT charges at the Marines. The Marines returned fire and pursued the VC into a heavily vegetated area south of the base camp prior to losing contact. One USAC KIA and one WIA resulted. Blood and bandages found in the area of the incident revealed that the VC suffered an estimated one KIA and four WIA. The following equipment and weapons were captured: (1) HAT-49 SAG; (3) 30 round magazines; (2) Chi-Con grenades; (13) 1 pound blocks of TMT with fuzes; (1) ChiCon mine and 87 rounds of 9mm ammunition.

- d. Significant trends noted during the period. Reports of enemy movements indicated that the Main Force VC units have deployed to the eastern edge of the jungle area. This move was anticipated because of the forthcoming rice hervest and the VC need for an abundance of rice to support present forces. The effectiveness of the VO XA.—.VI DA area as a way-station has been lost due to the continual operation of triendly forces in the area. To avoid contact with friendly forces the WO have withdrawn across the SONG TA TRUCH River to the DINH HON area GS (YD7811).

o. Enany situation at the end of the period. During the latter part of the month VC forces avoided significant contact with friendly forces within the Thior. The VC have relied on harassing fire and the employment of explosive devices to inflict equalities on friendly units. Contact was made with a VC Battalion in HUCNG DIEN District of THUL THIEN Province on 20 March. Interrogation of VCC revealed the VC unit to be the K-500 Battalion (unconfirmed) and the K-105 Company (confirmed Main Perce). Another report stated that a VC Company had entered PHU THU District of THUL THIEN Province to receiver weapons hidden by the SLOth Battalion after it was engaged by ARVN and USAC units in early March. This is highly probable as few large caliber weapons, Slam morters and 57 recibles rifles, were captured by friendly forces. Analysis of the prosent deployment of VC forces and reports indicate that Main Force VC units will enter the rice growing lowlands of THUL THIEN and QUANG THI to prove ours rice.

4. Againing. A combination of factors—the great amount of field time" logged in by rifle companies within their respective AOR's and the unusually large amount of time spent by the battalion in deploying units or preparing for their deployment outside the TAOR—precluded formal training during the month. While they were in an "alert" status, rifle companies conducted informal classes in the general military subjects, with emphasis on map reading, compass work, and subjects most appllicable to the current situation. Companies conducted "fam-firing" exercises for organic weapons within their AOR's when conditions permitted. Newly joined personnel continued to receive thorough indoctrination in those matters pertinent to combat in Vietnam—as they were processed through their respective company administrative echelons prior to joining their units in the field.

b. Significant Events

- (1) 1 March At 1100H, the battalion closed its command post at (AT 953723) and reverted to 3d Marine Division Reserve. Simultaneously, Co D was chopped to 3d Marines for employment in the 1st Bn, 3d Marines area. 2d Bn, 3d Marines assumed responsibility for the TAOR formaly belonging to 1st Bn, 1st Marines. 1st Bn, 1st Marines reopened its command post at 1525H at (BT 068712). At 1730H, Co A (Rein) commenced an airlift to PHU BAI, chopping to 3d Marines upon arrival. During this period, in conjunction with perimeter security of its new command post site, the battalion manned one roadblock and three 24-hour observation/listening.posts.
- (2) 2 March At 0700H, Co C and battalion command group A departed for airlift to PHU BAI and participation in Operation TROY (See After-Action Report-Operation TROY; Part III-Supporting Documents). Co B and H&S Co (_) continued to man one roadblock and three 24-hour observation/listening posts in conjumction with perimeter security of the command post site.
- (3) 3 March At 1900H, Operation TROY was sedured. Co A, Co C, and battalion command group A, together with Co K 3d Bn, 3d Marines, remained under OPCON of Task Croup FOXTROT at PHU BAI. At the DA NANG command past site, Co B commenced squad-sized security patrols (one day and one night) outside the perimeter, in addition to the roadblock and observation posts already manned by Co B and Exes Co (-).

- (4) 4 March No change in situation.
- (5) 5 March At 0830H, Co B (Rein) departed the DA NAKG command post site for airlift to CHU LAI.
 Co C and Co K each provided four rifle squads for duty with the Combined Action Company, 2d Bn, 1st Marines within the PHU BAI TAOR. H&S Co (-) continued to man the roadblock and observation/listening posts at the DA NANG command post site.
 - (6) 6 March No change in situation.
- (7) 7 March At 1330H, Co C was placed under OPCON of 2d Bn, 1st Marines, assuming responsibility for a portion of the 2d Bn, 1st Marines perimeter at PHU BAL. EES Co (-) conducted squad-sized security patrols (day and night) outside the DA NANG command post perimeter, in addition to manning the roadblock and observation/listening posts previously established.
- (8) <u>8 March</u> At 1030H, Co B was airlifted from CHU LAI, and returned to OPCON of 1st Bn, 1st Marines. Co K, 3d Bn, 3d Merines, was chopped to OPCON 2d Bn, 1st Marines effective 2000H. H&S Co (-) maintained its schodule. of security patrols, roadblock, and observation/listening posts in securing the DA NANG command post perimeter.
- (9) 9 March Co C, returned to OPCON of 1st Bn, 1st Marines, moved to establish a patrol base vicinity (YD 808161); commenced patrolling and ambushing in the area. Co A commenced a move to vicinity (YD 790113) in preparation for a daylight search and destroy operation on 10 March. Co K, 3d Bn, 3d Marines was returned to OPCON of 1st Bn, 1st Marines. H&S Co (_) continued its scheduled security patrols, roadblocks, and observation/listening posts in defense of the DA NANG command post perimeter.
- (10) 10 March At 1130 H, Co A completed its search and destroy operation in the village vicinity (YD 790105). Results: Spotted two VC in green uniforms and took them under fire. VO run toward the river vicinity (YD 790104). Co A swept the immediate area and found numerous caves (In one cave found a sack with one green uniform, one "black pajama" type uniform, and documents). The company also found 15 man traps, 10 panji traps, and numerous panji stakes, which were destroyed in place.

aechtea Engroadhea (11) TOS HARE

The only villagers found in the area were two old men, seven women, and three children. They were questioned, but had no information of value. Co C continued patrolling and ambushing in its area. So B assumed responsibility for a portion of the 2d Bn, 1st Marines perimeter. During this period, the battalion conducted a total of: three platconsized search and destroy operations; three squad-sized daylight patrols; four squad-sized night patrols; and four squad-sized ambushes.

- 11 March H&S Co (-) closed the DA NANG command (11)post at 0330 H and moved by motor convoy to PHO BAI (YD 808165); commenced preparation for displacement of the 1st Bn, 1st Marines command group to that site the following day. A 40 man security detail from H&S Co, augmented by the 3d Bn, 9th Marines, was left behind to guard the DA NAMC command post cantonment area. Co A conducted another search and destroy operation, which was completed at 1545H. Results: approximately one thousand pounds of rice husks found in an old abandoned house vicinity (YD 795097); one sniper platform, one 60mm mortar case, five 50-foot ropes, one rope ladder, and 60 rounds of 7.62 ammunition --- found vicinity (YD 797098); in the same area, the company located and destroyed one tunnel approximately 25 feet long and three one-man fighting holes. During the sweep, one dud M16 (Bounding Betty) mine (U.S. manufacture) was tripped at (YD 790104). The mine was new and appeared to have been recently emplaced. Nine VCS were apprehended and forwarded to ITT for questioning. At 1835H, a squad-sized patrol from Go A located one U.S.-manufactured AT mine (M1A1), with eight pounds of TNT booster charge on a trail vicinity (YD 798108). In same location, one CHICOM AP mine (with trip wire previously broken) was found. Engineers removed the mines and forwarded them through intelligence channels for study. During this period, elements of the battalion conducted a total of five day patrols; five night patrols; and seven squad-sized ambushes.
- (12) 12 March = At 1500H, the 1st Bn, 1st Marines command post opened at (YD 870156). At 0830H, a squad-sized patrol from Co A apprehended one VCS vicinity (YD 792099). The VCS, who was found sleeping in an otherwise abandoned but, was sent to ITT for questioning. At 1650H, a squad-sized patrol from Co A found and destroyed two grenade-type booby traps vicinity (YD 787,118). At 1710H, the same patrol tripped a CHICOM grenade rigged with trip wire. Three Marines were wounded by fragments from the explosion and evacuated from the scene by helicopter. At 2003H, Cale squad-sized patrol ambushed two VC vicinity (YD 790163).

As the squad searched the killing zone, they exchanged fire with an estimated three additional VC, armed with carbines, in the same area. No friendly casualties. Enemy casualties unknown. The VC broke contact, and the Marines were unable to regain it. During this period, elements of the battakion conducted four day patrols; three night patrols; and four squad-sized ambushes.

(13) 13 March - At 0100H, a squad-sized patrol from Co A fired on one VC near a foot bridge at (YD 791108). The VC fled south, dropping a K-50 magazine and a CHICOM grenade on the trail. The patrol continued pursuit, and surrounded a hut vicinity (YD 791105) -- opening fire on an estimated four to five VO who ran from the but. A subsequent search of the area revealed blood inside and outside the but and abandoned weapons and equipment, indicating that the VC inside had been hit by Marine fire. Found were: one MAS-36 rifle; four CHICOM grenades; one M26 grenade; 17 rounds of 7.62 ammunition; eight sets of black pajamas; one khaki uniform; one set of utilites; four pairs of sandals; one pair of binoculars; one bag of medical supplies; two cartridge belts; 100 pounds of rice and assorted grains; flashlight batteries; toilet articles; and one plastic rain cape. It is probable that three to four VC were wounded in the encounter. At 1630H, a road sweeping team found an anti-vehicular mine (U.S. manufacture--WWII type) in a shallow hole (the top of the ming was approximately & inch below the surface of the road) at (YD 815169). The mine contained approximately six pounds of TNT. The firing pin was cocked but a small percussion cap was missing from the firing mechanism -- preventing the mine from being armed. The mine was removed and forwarded to Co A, 3d Engineer Bn, for study. During this period, the battalion conducted five day patrols; 10 sauga-sized night patrols; and eight squad-sized ambushes.

(14) 14 March - In a three-way switch of rifle company areas of responsibility (See Frag Order -66; Part III-Supporting Documents) Co A opened its command post vicinity (YD 810156); Co C opened its command post vicinity (YD 794119); and Co K opened its command post vicinity (YD 849085). The Go B command post remained in position vicinity (YD 811060), At 1550H; a road sweeping detail found an anti-vehicular mine (U. S. manufacture--WWII type) at (YD 815169). A three -pound booster charge (TNT) had been in place for a long time. The dirt which compared the mine was loose, however-indicating that someone and checked recently to verify the placement of the mine. The mine

ENCLOSURE (1) SECRET was recovered and forward to Co A, 3d Engineer Battalion, for study. During this period, the battalion conducted two platoon-sized daylight search and destroy operations, nine squad-sized night patrols, and six squad-sized ambushes.

- (15) 15 March = At 1950H, Co C received three to five incoming 60mm mortar rounds at (YD 794113). No casualties. The fire appeared to have come from west of the SONG TATRACH river, but the source could not be pinpointed. Artillery H&I fire in the area of the suspected mortar position was increased. During this period, the battalion conducted one platoon-sized daylight search and destroy operation; nine squad-sized daylight patrols, nine squad-sized night patrols; and ten squad-sized ambushes.
- (16) 16 March At 1330H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C found 200 panji stakes (in two traps), 15 Malayan Whips, one Bouncing Betty mine, and two CHICOM grenades bucby trapped with trip wire vicinity (YD 789179). The traps were destroyed in place by an engineer team. At 1340H, another patrol (squad-sized) from Co C tripped a booby trapped grenade vicinity (YD 792104). Two Marines wounded by the explosion were evacuated by helicopter from the scene. During the MEDEVAC, the patrol received 30 to 50 rounds of small arms fire from the west. The patrol returned fire with 50-60 rounds of small arms fire and swept the east bank of the SONG TA TRICH river with negative results. One Marine was wounded in the exchange of fire and subsequently evacuated by helicopter. At 2220H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C fired on a VC rearing a helmet, vicinity (YD 784134). The VC appeared to be hit as he attempted to run, for he fell to the ground and began to crawl toward a but in the area. When the patrol arrived at the hut, they apprehended a 40 year-old male, who was breathing heavily, as though he had been running. The VCS, who was not believed to be the man originally taken under fire, was sent to ITT for interrogation. During this period, the battalica conducted 11 squad-sized daylight patrols, nine squad-sized night patrols, and 14 saund-sized ambushes.
- (17) 17 March In a two-company switch of areas of responsibility, (See Frag Order 2-66), the Co A command post opened at (YD 81060) and the Co B command post opened at (YD 810156). At C840H, a platoon from Co C, engaged in a search and destroy operation, tripped one CHICCM grenade rigged with trip wire vicinity (YD 790102).

The grenade was hidden in brush. One Marine was wounded by fragments, but not seriously enough to require evacuation. At 1115H, the same platoon discovered and disarmed one booby trap during the search and destroy operation at (YD 791112). The trap was bowl shaped, three inches in diameter, and buried four inches deep. The trap had a pressure-type firing device. No ensualties. During this period, the battalian conducted three platoon-sized daylight search and destroy operations; five squad-sized daylight patrols; it squad sized night patrols; eight squad-sized ambushes; and one continuous (day and night) squad-sized reconnaises sance patrol.

- (18) 18 Morch During this period, the battalion conducted 11 squad-sized daylight patrols; eight squad-sized night patrols; 13 squad-sized ambushes; and one continuous (day and night) squad-sized reconnaissance patrol, with negative contact.
- (19) 19 March At 0230H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C tripped a grande-sized booby trap at (YB 909717). The device detonated approximately 25 meters to the rear of the last man in the patrol. The delay was believed to be caused by a slow burning fuze. No casualties. During this period, the battalion conducted 10 squad-sized daylight patrols; 11 squad-sized night patrols; seven squad-sized ambushes; and established four fire team-sized listening posts.
- (20) 20 March At 1205H, a Co C observation post spotted a Vietnamese wearing a khaki uniform, with a green "Tke" jacket (no headgear) vicinity (Y: 790102). The man fired two rounds of small arms fire at the observation post from a range of 100 meters. The Marines returned fire and searched the area. Fresh blood and a homemade, friction type mine (cast iron cylinder with fuze on top) were found. The VC was apparently in the process of planting the mine when he was discovered. No friendly casualties. One VC VIA (probable). During this period the battalion conducted 10 squad-sized daylight patrols; 11 squad-sized night patrols; 11 squad-sized ambushes; and seven fire team sized observation/listening posts.

(21) 21 March - At 1005H, a USIN 21 ton (6x6) truck, moving south vicinity (YD 807160), moved to the right side of the road in order to allow another vehicle to pass. The right front wheel of the truck detonated an antivehicular mine. The crater was three feet in diameter and 12 feet deep. Two Vietnamese females were spotted running from the scene, and were apprehended and sent to ITT for interrogation. A search of the area produced a fuzing device, approximately 25 meters of wire running north from the scene of the explosion, and four BA-30 batteries, with a metal plate on top-about 50 meters away from the crater. The right front of the truck was damaged, but no personnel casualties resulted. During this period, the battalion conducted nine squad-sized daylight patrols; 11 sauad-sized " night patrols; six squad-sized ambushes; and established three fire team-sized listening posts. Co C returned to the battalion command post from its area of operations, in response to an increased alert condition.

(22) 22 March - At 1100H, Co C and battalion command group A departed the battalion command post for the PHU BAI airfield, in response to a one-hour alert condition. Co K was helilifted from its area of operations to the airfield. Two platoons from Co B, 3d Reconnaissance Bn, reported to battalion command group B to conduct patrols and establish observation posts within the 1st Bn, 1st Marines area of responsibility. The alert status was relaxed and Co C, Co K, and command group A returned to the battalion area at 1500H. During this period, the battalion conducted seven daylight squad-sized patrols; twelve squad-sized night patrols; nine squad-sized anbushes; and established three fire team-sized listening posts.

(23) 23 March - At 1915H, a squad from Co C, enroute to an ambush site, received eight to ten rounds of automatic earbine fire vicinity (YD 793098). The squad returned fire with small arms and two M79 rounds. The area was searched with negative results. No casualties. During this period, the battalion conducted five squad-sized daylight patrols; six squad-sized night patrols; two platoon-sized daylight reconnaissance patrols, which established a total of five observation posts during the day; and five squad-sized night ambushes.

ENCAPOSURE (1)

(24) 24 March - At 1400H, Co K, 3d Bn, 3d Marines departed the 1st Bn, 1st Marines area to revert eventually to OPCON of its parent organization. At 1215H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C found one CHICON grenade, rigged with trip wire, on a trail vicinity (YD 793097). A marker, consisting of three pieces of bamboo formed into a triangle, was discovered by the patrol approximately 100 meters before it found the trap. The grenade was disarmed without incident. During this period, the battalion conducted nine squad-sized daylight patrols; nine squad-sized night patrols; and six squad-sized

ambushes.

(25) 25 March - At 0415H, A squad-sized patrol from Co B was returning from an ambush site when the patrol leader heard a tapping noise in some brush. A searching fire team briefly glimpsed a fleeing figure at a distance of 20 yards. Two grenades were thrown by the patrol. The area was checked with negative results. During this period, the battalion conducted eight squad-sized daylight

patrols; 17 saund-sized night patrols; 22 squad-sized

ambushes; and established seven fire team-sized observation /Listening posts.

- (26) 26 March During this period, the battalion conducted eight squad-sized daylight patrols; nine squad-sized night patrols; 19 squad-sized ambushes; and establisted seven fire team-sized observation/listening posts with negative energy contact.
- (27) 27 March Co A and Co B exhanged areas of responsibility with a series of helilifts commencing at 1400H. During this period, the battalion conducted three squad-sized daylight patrols; 13 squad-sized night patrols; one squad-sized night reconnaissance patrol; 20 squad-sized ambushes; and established seven fire team-sized observation/listening posts with negative enemy contact.
- (28) 28 March At 2330H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C was hit with 12 explosions, initially thought to be mortar fire, but later determined to be one-pound THT changes at (YD 793107). Patrol opened fire on VC revealed by the light of the initial explosions. The VC withdrew under fire, without returning fire. An estimated 15-20 VC was involved. Contact was not regained The explosions caused one USMO KIA; one USMC WIA. A search of the area revealed pieces of human flesh, trails of blood leading from the area, and bloody bandages.



Estimated one VC KIA, four VC WIA. Captured material included one French MAT-49 SMG; one MAT-49 magazine; two K-50 magazines; 13 one-pound blocks of TNT with fuzes; two CHICOM grenades; one CHICOM mine; and 87 rounds of 9mm ammunition. During this period the battalion conducted six daylight squad-sized patrols; 1/ squad-sozed night security patrols; one squad-sized night reconnaissance patrol; three squad-sized daylight ambushes; and 24 squad-sozed night ambushes. In addition,

the battalion established 10 fire team-sized listening posts.

- (29) 29 March At 0730H, a reconnaissance patrol from the battalion S-2 section (OPCON Co B) sighted two VC on an OP vicinity (YD 809043). An artillery fire mission was called with good effect on target. Estimated two VC KIA. During this period, the battalion conducted five squad-sized daylight patrols; 11 squad-sized night security patrols; one squad-sized reconnaissance patrol; 16 squad-sized ambushes; and established 10 fire team-sized listening posts. In addition, Co A provided a two-platoon blooking force for a sweep operation conducted by an ARVM training battalion within the 1st Bn, 1st Marines TADR.
- (30) 30 March During this period, the battalion conducted six squad-sized daylight patrols; 15 squad-lized night security patrols; one squad-sized reconnaissance patrol; 23 squad-sized ambushes; and established 10 fire team-sized listening posts, with negative enemy contact.
- (31) 31 March At 1607H, a squad-sized patrol from Co C fround one homemade booby trap on a trail at (YD 798098). The trap had a TNT filler in a light metal container, with a fuze device which appeared similar to a blasting cap. The device was rigged with a trip wire, stretched across the trail. The booby trap was destroyed in place by the patrol, with negative casualties. During this period, the battalion conducted six squad-sized daylight patrols; 13 squad-sized night security patrols; one squad-sized reconnaissance patrol; 19 squad-sized ambushes; and established 10 fire team-sized listening posts.



• FIRE SUPPORT AND FIRE SUPPORT COORDINATION

- a. On 16 March 1966, a liaison team and three FOteams from "C" Battery, 1st Battalion, 12th Marines relieved the present teams assigned to 1st Battalion, 1st Marines. There have been no difficulties in meeting operational requirements of the battalion.
- (1) 81mm Mortar Platoon fired 387 harrassing and interdiction missions.
- (2) Artillery fired a total of 719 harrassing and interdiction missions.
- (3) During the month, 3 illumination missions were fired by artillery.
- (4) One HE mission was fired during the month by artillery in support of battalion operations.

11. LOGISTICS

a. Supply

- (1) Large scale HST operations have been accomplished throughout the month with all companies dependent upon helicopter resupply.
- (2) A tent repair contact team evaluated and repaired two GP tents inveiced to this unit by 3d Battalion, 9th Marines. The team Coded X 32 GP tents.
- (3) An office machine repair contact team made on the spot repairs to those typewriters requiring maintenance.
- (4) All of the Battalion's 81mm Mortar mounts have been retightened this month. Ordnance equipment in general has required little maintenance with the exception of the M-79 grenade launcher. Eight grenade launchers have been evacuated to third echelon repair facilities within the reporting period. Two M-79 grenade launchers have been returned.
- (5) Four hundred sets of tropical utilities have been received during the month of March, but requirements still exist for eight hundred sets. Jungle boots have been received in sufficient quantity to outfit over 90% of the Battalion.
- (6) Ration Supplement Sundry Packs have also been issued to units qualifying under the established criteria.

b. Maintenance

- (1) M-274 (Mechanical Mule) D/L Rate 6% (2 of 30)
- (2) M-422 (Mighty Mite) D/L Rate 0% (0 of 20)*
- * This unit received 14 new M-422Al's this month as replacements for the M-422 Mighty Mite.

c. Food Service

- (1) At present, this unit operates one battalion mess.
- (2) Ration supplements such as dehydrated soups, coffee, sugar, bread, etc. are supplied to the companies in the field.
- d. <u>Cantonment and Camp Facilities</u>. At present this unit has no cantonment. Cantonment requirements are being prepared for submission to Division.

- e. <u>Transportation</u>. Fifteen, 6X6 trucks from "A" Company, 3d Motor Transport Battalion were allocated to this unit upon arrival at Hue/Phu Bai. To date an average of six trucks per day have been utilized for logistic support of this unit, with the remaining trucks being utilized for support of other units in the Hue/Phu Bai area.
 - f. Water. The 3d Engineer Battalion established a water point within the new battalion CP, providing 6000 gallons of potable water per day. A shower point was also established.
 - g. CP Displacement. The month of March was one of two displacements for this unit.
 - (1) The first move began the morning of 27 February 1966 and was completed on 2 March. Problems encountered were:
 - (a) The bridge between DaNang and DaNang East was closed for repair requiring use of the ferry.
 - (b) 3/9 occupied the new 1/1 CP location until 1 furch 1966 requiring all equipment to be staged outdoors.
 - (c) Condition of the cantonment vacated by 3/9 was as follows:
 - 1. Screening ripped and missing from several strongbacks.
 - 2. Electrical wiring missing.
 - 3. Police of the area was very poor.
 - 4. Novirous strongbacks were in a poor state of maintenance.
 - (2) On 9 March 1966, the battalion received orders to move to the Hue/Phu B i area. Division directed that all GP tents would be taken off the strongbacks. Forty-One trucks were provided by Division Motor Transport for displacement. Hampered by darkness and rainfall, loading commenced at approximately 2000, on 10 March 1966 and was completed at 0130, 11 March 1966. This convoy staged on Highway 1 in the 1st Battalion, 3d Marines area and departed for Hue/Phu Bai at 0630 on 11 March 1966 arriving at 1ts destination at 1330, 11 March 1966.
 - (3) Upon arrival at Hue/Phu Bai the battalion immediately moved into position and set up GP tents for H&S Billeting, storage and operating spaces for B ttalion Staff and support sections. The CP was completely set up within four hours after arrival at the new location.



13. COMBAT AIR SUPPORT

- a. During the month of March the battalion was extensively supported by the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. The battalion (-) was air lifted by both fixed wing and belicopter from the DA NANG complex to the PHU BAI complex. Upon arrival in the PHU BAI TAOR the battalion participated in operation TROY. Two companies were helilifted into the operational area (See After Action Report 4-66). Ather support during the operation consisted of medevacs and resupply along with area reconnaissance missions since the battalion has been assigned to its present TAOR.
- b. Marine aviation has supported the battalion with six medevacs, 35 resupply, four tree plifts, and three unit commander missions. Helicopters proved to be the only efficient means to move troops deep into the TAOR. Nearly all resupply to the companies operating withing their assigned AOR's has been accomplished by helicopters due to the lack of roads, and the distance involved.
- c. Army aviation supported the battalion with four E.E. missions during the reporting period.

- b. Significant Events: The BAS was established and routine sick call commenced on 1 March 66 at the new CP site at Marble Mountain, Da Nang. Advance party left CP for Phu Bai on 2 March and the BAS and rear echelon followed on 11 March. The BAS was established at the new CP site on 11 March and has functioned well for the remainder of the month.
- c. Medical Trends: There has been no specific trend in the area of infectious disease. Several cases of anebic dysentary were encountered this month, a disease not seen before in the battalion. The number of cases of venereal disease was 23
- d. <u>Number of Combat Sasualties Treated:</u> The number of minor combat casualties treated at the BAS was 4. The majority of the casualties were evacuated by helicopters to medical companies of the 3rd Medical Battalion. The total number of combat casualties for the month of March was 10 WIA'S and 2 KIA'S.
- e. <u>Number of Non-Battle Casualties Treated: 744</u> treatments were administered to the men of this battalion for minor injuries and illnesses during the month of March.
- f. <u>Preventative Medicine and Sanitation</u>: Malaria prophylaxis was obtained by the administration of one (1) Chloroquine-Primaquine tablet per man per week. Sanitation inspection was held weekly and action on discrepencies was avidly urged.
- g. Civil Action Medical Support Rendered: Due to the mobility of the battalion this month and the absence of friendly villages in our present TACR only 3 Vietnamese civilians were treated. A program is underway to establish a dispensary in a nearby village.
- h. Schooling Conducted: Eight (8) one hour lectures on venereal disease were presented with total attendance of approximately 140 men.
- i. Problem Area: The only problems encountered this month are the fact that approximately 40% of the medical supplies have not been received as of 31 March since our move to Phu Bai. Supplies for field sanitation are still lacking and the normal logistic support channels in this area are not adequate.



V. Intelligence.

- a. Operation TROY was initiated to locate and destroy elements of the 810th VC Battalion, which had exfiltrated from PHU THU District subsequent to engagement by USMC and ARVN forces on 1-2 March 1966. Elements of the Combined Action Company (2d Bn, 1st Marines) engaged an unknown number of VC during the early hours of 2 March in the vicinity of YD 9407, indicative of possible exfiltration attempts by elements of the 810th Battalion.
- b. Since no contact was made with VC forces during Operation TROY, it is believed that any remnants from the 810th Battalion which had moved through the area had made good their escape into the jungled highlands to the north.
- c. Because of the fast movement of the sweep forces and the short duration of the operation, no Civil Affairs/Psy War operations were planned or conducted. Although the inhabitants of the area exhibited fear of VC units which have operated in their vicinity, their attitude toward Marines was helpful and friendly in many respects.

CONTEMPLIT

Mission. 1st Battalion, 1st Marines conducts ecarch and destroy operations within assigned area to capture and/or destroy enemy personnel, equipment, and fortifications.

9. Concept of Operation. (See enclosure (1) (Operation Overlay)). Companies A and E (-), designated initially as sweep companies, were helilifted into position to commence the operation. Co F, designated initially as the blocking force, was moved by truck to positions along the road leading northwest from TROY BRIDGE (YD 967062). One platoon from Co E, located at TROY BRIDGE at the commencement of the operation, continued its previously assigned mission of providing bridge security. On the second day of operations, Co A continued to sweep the western portion of the assigned area; Co F assumed the sweep mission in the eastern portion; and Co E reverted to Battalion reserve, occupying positions in the vicinity of (YD 960062).

10. Execution.

- a. See enclosure (2) (Sequence of Events).
- b. A verbal operation order was received at 021100H. The operation commenced at 021230H with the helilift of two rifle companies.
- c. There were no contacts with enemy forces during this operation.

11. Results.

- a. Nogetive friendly or enemy casualties.

12. Administrative Matters.

- g. Bocause of the brief planning phase, no administrative plan or order was published.
- b. At the beginning of the operation, each Morine carried a basic load of ammunition and two meals, combat, individual. Resumply was accomplished by helicopter.
- o. Motor transportation was provided by FISU 2. One rifle company and H&S Company (-) were positioned by truck convoy at the beginning of the operation. All units were returned to PHU BAI by truck at the close of the operation.



\$13. Special Equipment and Techniques. None.

14. Commander's Analysis. Because of the brief planning phase of the operation, all orders were issued verbally. An uncomplicated scheme of maneuver and adherence to standard procedures compensated for the lack of time to brief unit commanders. No significant difficulties were encountered.






