2. INTELLIGENCE

a. There was a total of 17,350 piasters expended during July 1970 in support of the Volunteer Informant Program (VIP). This was a decrease of 7,442 piasters over those monies expended in June 1970. All payments were made in exchange for ordnance.

b. Close coordination and exchange of intelligence information was effected with the Hieu Duc District Intelligence Operational Coordinating Center, Reconnaissance Battalion S-2, 1st Marines S-2, VMO-2 S-2, 3rd ITT and 3rd CIT.

c. Operations in the Charlie Ridge area around Hill 419 (AT 867627), concluded on 28 July 1970 with confirmation of recent enemy movement on the east-west trail networks in that immediate area. Several rest areas and caves were found with two of them containing small arms ammunition and personal effects. A team from the Reconnaissance Battalion (Moon Dash) inserted with the unit ("D" Company) from this organization reported seeing five (5) enemy in this area over a period of two (2) days. One of the sightings occurred less than two (2) hours after "D" Company was extracted from the area. Denial operations using C/S crystals were conducted in caves and harbour sites.

d. The Battalion Scouts were assigned various intelligence information gathering tasks. Among these were support of a company size operation in the Charlie Ridge area, patrols along the Tuy Loan River and surveillance of the Battalion's TAOR.

e. Sensor Maintenance was conducted on the Danang Anti-infiltration System by units of the division SCAMP. Continuing work on the BPS system has improved the total readout for normal daily operation. A request for consolidation of all BPS readout assets has been made due to the proposed abandoning of Hill 41 complex which presently contains a portion of these readout assets.

f. The PPS-6 Ground Surveillance Radars were effectively utilized on Hill 10 as back up sensors for the EPS system, training is now being conducted for members of "D" Company so that they can effectively utilize the PPS-6 on Hill 41.

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g. County Fair Operations were conducted utilizing Hieu Duc District forces and "C" Company (Rein). Intelligence assets consisted of attachments of S-2 personnel, 3rd ITT and 3rd CIT. Screening of 557 Vietnamese detainees was conducted with 15 Vietnamese being held for further interrogation to determine their legal residency. One individual was identified as being a villager who was forced by the local VC to use his home for a propaganda meeting.

h. As a result of Battalion patrol activities, forty-nine (49) Vietnamese were detained for various reasons. As a result of screening and interrogation by intelligence personnel, four (4), young, Vietnamese boys were identified as being members of a VC organized terrorist unit with the mission of placing booby traps in the vicinity of friendly forces. All other personnel detained were released as innocent civilians.

i. Aerial photo coverage of the Charlie Ridge area was requested and provided in the form of Aerial Observer handheld photographs of predetermined HLZ's and terrain features. These photos were used in the company operation in this area on 28 July 1970.

j. Support of the Battalion training program continued with classes being provided for newly assigned personnel. Indoctrination consisted of classes on enemy units, tactics and weapons. Heavy emphasis was placed on enemy booby trap emplacement techniques. Assistance to S-2 instructors was provided by the Battalion's Kit Carson Scouts. Captured enemy weapons were used as training aids.

k. A total of ten (10) special area intelligence studies were provided for use in planning proposed operations in the Battalion TAOR.

3. OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

A. OPERATIONS

(1) MISSION. From 1-31 July 1970, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, was assigned the mission to:

(a) Conduct unilateral and combined offensive operations within the assigned TAOR to locate and destroy enemy forces and logistical installations, with primary emphasis on those forces and bases which pose the greatest threat to GVN control of important population centers and to the security of friendly installations.

(2) TASKS. From 1-31 July 1970, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines was assigned the following tasks:

- (a) Occupy and defend Hill 10, vicinity AT924690.
- (b) Provide security for OP's located on Hill 270, vic. AT865681, and OP REMO, vic. AT884746.
- (c) Occupy and defend Hill 41, vic. AT934663.
- (d) Provide security for engineer projects within the TAOR to include daily mine sweeps along lines of communication.
- (e) Operate, maintain and defend that portion of the Danang Anti-Infiltration System (DAIS) within the TAOR.
- (f) Be prepared to employ vertical assault company for platoon size operations.

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(g) Be prepared to provide a reaction force for relief of the Hieu Duc District Headquarters and/or Combined Action Company 2-1 (CACO 2-1) or elements thereof (CAP).

B. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

(1) 1-28 July 1970, Company "A" occupied and defended Hill 41, conducted rocket and mortar launch site denial operations and interdiction of known infiltration routes within the company area of operations.

(2) 1 July 1970, Company "B" at "Stack Arms".

(3) 1 July 1970, Company "C" provided mobile reaction forces for Hieu Duc District Headquarters, conducted rocket and mortar launch site denial operations by actively patrolling within Company Area of Operation.

(4) 28 July 1970, Company "B" provided security for OP's located on Hill 270 and BENO. Company "B" conducted rocket and mortar launch site denial operations by active patrolling known infiltration routes.

(5) 1-4 July 1970, Company "C" at Stack Arms.

(6) 1-4 July 1970, Company "D" assumed missions and tasks of companies "B" and "C" during their respective absences to attend "Stack Arms".

(7) 5-28 July 1970, Company "C" provided mobile reaction forces for Hieu Duc District Headquarters, conducted rocket and mortar denial operations by active patrolling within Company Area of Operations.

(8) 5-26 July 1970, Company "D" resumed rocket and mortar launch site denial operations within Company Area of Operations.

(9) 16 July 1970, Company "C" in coordination/cooperation with Regional Forces from Hieu Duc District and CACO 2-1 conducted "County Fair" operation in village of BO BAN, vic. AT9569, (Ref. Frag Order 017-70, Tab A to Encl. (1)).

(10) 20 July 1970, Company "A" conducted a helicopter-borne operation into "Charlie Ridge" area vic. AT860642 and conducted reconnaissance in force to locate, close with and destroy enemy personnel, caches and base camps, (Ref. Frag Order 019-70, Tab B, to Encl. (1)).

(11) 27 July 1970 Company "D" conducted helicopter-borne operation into "Charlie Ridge" area, vic. AT865627 and conducted reconnaissance in force to locate and destroy the enemy, his caches, base camps and to gather intelligence relating to possible troop movements through area. (Ref. Frag 020-70, Tab C, to Encl (1)).

(12) 29-31 July 1970, H&S Company was assigned the responsibility of occupying and defending Hill 10, vic AT924690.

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(13) 29-31 July 1970, Company "A" was assigned responsibility of denying the enemy access to possible rocket/mortar launch sites in the BO BAN Area, vic. AT955665. (Ref. Opn. Overlay Tab D to Encl (1)).

(14) 29-31 July 1970, Company "B" was assigned responsibility of denying the enemy access to possible rocket/mortar launching sites in "Mortar Valley" vic. AT875675 and "Sherwood Forest", vic. AT882685. (Ref. Opn. Overlay Tab D to Encl.(1)).

(15) 29-31 July 1970, Company "C" was assigned responsibility of denying the enemy access to rocket/mortar launch sites in the TAN AN PHONG Area, vic. AT862735. (Ref. Opn. Overlay Tab D to Encl. (1)).

(16) 29-31 July 1970, Company "D" was assigned the responsibility of occupying, defending, and maintaining the fixed positions located at Hill 41, vic. AT934663, and Hill 270, vic. AT865681, defend the DAIS roadout station at Hill 41, and provide a reaction force for Hieu Duc District Headquarters, CACO 2-1 and elements thereof (CAP). (Ref. Opn. Overlay Tab D to Encl. (1)).

4. AIR SUPPORT

a. During the month of July, 39 flights of fixed wing from MAG 11, 12, and 13 were flown in support of the Battalion. The aircraft expended a total of 313,850 lbs. of bombs, 25,500 lbs. of napalm, 4 pods of 2.75" rockets and 8,500 rds. of 20mm ammunition. The damage assessment was as follows: 1,650 meters of tree line, 3 secondary fires and 300m. of trenchline network destroyed.

b. OV10A Bronco aircraft from VMO-02 amassed 7 hrs. of flight time in aerial observation, artillery spotting missions and close air support. The aircraft expended 6 pods of rockets and 2000 rds. of 7.62 ammunition.

c. In support of combat operations in the TAOR, a total of 28 sorties for 15 emergency, 18 priority, and 9 routine medevacs were flown. Also 5 sorties were flown by CH-46D and CH-53, lifting and extracting 742 troops. A total of 2 hrs flight time was flown by "Cobra" gunships. They expended 8 rocket pods and 2,680 rds of 7.62 ammunition. Twenty-four visual reconnaissance missions were flown with a total of 25 hrs, 47 minutes flight time, four administrative runs totalled 5 hrs. Fifteen resupply missions were flown with a total weight of 573,091 lbs.

5. ARTILLERY

a. During the month of July 1970, Battery "A", 1st Battalion, 11th Marines continued to give priority of fires in support of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines. Battery "C", 1st Battalion, 11th Marines, Batteries "D" and "F", 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines provided reinforcing fires for 1st Battalion, 1st Marines. Battery "W", 1st Battalion, 11th Marines, Battery "L", 4th Battalion, 11th Marines, and "C" platoons of 1st S" fired in general support of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines.

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b. Forward observers in the field requested 54 missions for a total of 396 rounds. The sensor readout station on Hill 41 requested 1 mission for a total of 35 rounds. On 5 July, IOD claimed 1 enemy kill and on 18 July claimed 7 enemy killed. There were 1,077 unobserved targets fired during the month for a total round expenditure of 8,144. Unobserved fire missions consisted of pre-emptive targets, intelligence targets, and anti-rocket targets.

7. LOGISTICS

a. During the month of July, continuing emphasis has been placed on upgrading the unit's embarkation readiness status. Particular attention was given to Battalion Supply. Special attention has been given to returning of excess property and modification of Special Allowances.

b. Emphasis has been placed on bringing the Battalion to a state of readiness for the monsoon season. On Hill 10, drainage systems are being repaired and placed, and extensive work is being done on the perimeter road in preparation for heavy rains. Work continues to progress on drainage systems for Hill 270 and OP RENO.

c. The messhall on Hill 41 was closed and assets were consolidated at the battalion mess on Hill 10. Closing of the mess was based upon redeployment of the rifle companies within the Battalion TAOR and the simultaneous decrease in the number of men living on Hill 41. One hot meal a day is being supplied to the men on Hill 41 from the Hill 10 mess. The battalion messhall has planned and commenced execution on improvements in the physical structure and method of service by utilizing a two-line serving system and altering the interior configuration of the mess to support the new serving system.

d. Total weight of supplies lifted by helicopter to support subordinate units was 573,091 lbs.

8. COMMUNICATIONS AND ELECTRONICS

During the month of July all sections in the Communications Platoon functioned normally and efficiently with the following highlights for each section:

(1) RADIO

(a) The radio section during the month of July supported the Battalion with 100% reliable communications on all functional nets.

1 During this period 527 incoming messages and 353 outgoing messages were processed through the COC.

2 During the month of July the new battery BA-4386 was introduced into the Battalion. Up to three to five times the battery life of the BA-386 has been achieved thus far. The requirement to vent this battery hourly is a problem under study at this time. First impressions are that during the wet season the requirement for water proofing communications equipment and the need to vent batteries will come in sharp conflict.

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(b) Maintain support from higher echelon continues to be excel-
lent with the exception of the RT-695/PRC-41. Periods of from three to four
weeks are sometimes required at DX to obtain a turnaround on this particular
piece of gear. Discussion with the DX officer at FSR and the Division CEO
officer have determined that this is a well-known problem and that the Division
is doing what it can to alleviate the problem. All other items at DX received
almost immediate turnaround.

(3) WIRE

(a) During the month of July, the wire section continued to main-
tain a high state of wire communications for the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines.
Major work projects during the month include the following:

- 1 Partially replaced the line between Hill 41 and CACO 2-1
after it was destroyed by fire.
- 2 Completely reworked the wire system on Hill 41 by replacing
old lines, cabling lines into central terminal boxes, and replacing the switch-
board.
- 3 On Hill 10, work concentrated on the lines on the south-
ern part of the hill, as well as continuing to replace old lines throughout
the hill.

(b) Two additional common user lines to Regiment were obtained,
enabling calls to Regiment to be completed faster.

(c) The switchboard again handled between 15,000-18,000 calls
during the month of July.

d. HEALTH

(1) The Battalion treated 834 civilians at our Battalion Med-Cap. Five (5) Mobile Med-Caps were held at various points within our CAAOR treating 625 civilians and one Dent-Cap treating 30 Vietnamese civilians.

e. AGRICULTURE

(1) This Battalion replaced a damaged water pump at BO BAN (1) (AT965-691).

f. Provided transportation for six (6) civilians to various area hospitals.

g. SECURITY

(1) A three (3) man HB Team promoting ordnance turn-in was employed at La Chau (4) (AT951671), and Phu Son (1) (AT943651).

(2) An APT Platoon was used for 10 days in the La Chau area (AT943671) and Phu Son area (AT943651).

(3) A POLMAR Team was used for five days in the La Chau area (AT951671).

e. PERSONAL RESPONSE

(1) Gave three (3) classes on Personal Response to three (3) orientation groups.

i. SOLATIUM PAYMENTS

(1) No solatium payments were made during this reporting period.

10. MEDICAL

a. PERSONNEL. 1 Medical Officer; 1 Chaplain; 49 Hospital Corpsman (22 HM's assigned to BAS, 27 HM's assigned to line companies). During the month of July the following changes in personnel were effected; received 1 Medical Officer, 1 Chaplain Losses; 1 Medical Officer, 1 Chaplain, received 13 Enlisted from CONUS, received 0 from other commands in RVN, losses to CONUS (5), other units (7), promotions 1, hospitalizations (5).

b. FACILITIES. The Battalion Aid Station consists of 7 buildings, which are utilized for storage, sleeping quarters, sickcall, administrative and supply purposes.

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c. DAILY ACTIVITIES. Sickcall is held from 0800 to 0900 and 1300 to 1400 daily. Emergencies are seen anytime.

(1) A total of 662 patients were seen during the month of July. Ailments are broken down as follows: FUO-20, URI-36, Skin Disorders-131, VD-32, Malaria-8, Lacerations-59, Consultations-104, Diarrhea-41, GGI-36, Misc.-60, Physicals-135.

(2) Transportation was provided for the patients referred to other medical facilities. The BAS ambulance was utilized for emergencies as required. Medical evacuation by Helicopter was used when time in transporting the patient was vital.

(3) A total of 868 immunizations were given in July 1970.

(4) 1,489 Vietnamese civilians were treated by the Med-Cap personnel.

d. DAILY ACTIVITIES. Sanitation inspections of the cantonment and messing facilities are conducted at regular intervals.

11. RELIGIOUS SERVICES

a. Eleven Protestant services were conducted for the Battalion during the month of July. The total attendance was 136. The number receiving communion was 113.

b. Three Protestant services were conducted by the Battalion Chaplin for other units. The total attendance was 28. The number receiving communion was 20.

c. Six Catholic Masses were conducted for the Battalion. The total attendance was 64.

d. Sixteen men were visited in the hospitals. Five men were visited in the III MAF Brig.

e. One Division Chaplin's meeting was attended.

f. Two men of the Battalion were notified by the Red Cross concerning current family situations.

g. Sixty-seven men of the Battalion have received private counseling from the Chaplin during the month of July.

- 011920H The IOD on OP 270 observed 1 enemy with pack and rifle, sitting in grass vic. AT860625. A fire mission of 36 rds of 105mm HE resulted in excellent coverage of target area, but negative surveillance due to darkness.
- 021300H While in their daytime PPB, B-1 found one earthen urn partially exposed. The urn was located approx. 10 meters from Song Tuy Loan River vic. AT876707, near a lightly used trail. Inside the urn were found: 9 ChiCom grenades, 3 B-40 rockets, 5 B-41 rockets, and 100 rds 7.62 small arms ammunition.
- 022115H While in their night PPB, vic. AT958689, A-1 heard movement approx. 50 meters South of their position. The unit threw grenades and sighted 2 enemy running East towards the river. The unit opened fire with small arms and immediately swept area under 81mm illumination, resulting in the finding of 1 blood trail leading into the river.
- 031220H A1, while conducting daytime combat patrol, detonated a ChiCom grenade booby-trap, resulting in 1 Marine being priority medevaced.
- 051500H A-1, while conducting water run to Song Yen River vic. AT958684, observed 5 Vn. Males in civilian clothing crossing the river in a small boat. When the Vn. saw the Marines, they changed their direction and headed downstream. "F" Co., 2/1, the adjacent unit across the river was alerted and F6 diverted his VR helicopter to the area. The VR helicopter received small arms fire from vic. AT967697, forcing the helicopter to land and assess the damage. A1 observed 8 enemy suspects in area where small arms fire was delivered from started fleeing the area. After shouting for the suspects to halt, the Marines fired two warning shots over their heads. Four of the suspects immediately halted, but the remaining 4 continued running. A1 opened fire, wounding 3 suspects. A1 then gathered all detainees and turned them over to EMT for interrogation.
- 032145H While in their ambush position, A13 heard movement approx. 300 meters to their East, vic. AT957680. Unit opened fire and pursued enemy. Enemy returned fire and A13 pursued 2-4 enemy to Song Yen River, where enemy escaped.

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- 050610H The IOD on OP 270 observed 4 enemy running from East to West vic. AT870629. The enemy carried weapons and light or no packs. A fire mission consisting of 54 rds of 105mm HE resulted in 1 probable enemy KIA.
- 050718H The IOD on OP 270 observed 1 enemy moving North to South vic. AT868-628. No weapon or pack was observed. A fire mission of 18 rds of 105mm HE was fired with negative surveillance on the target.
- 051930H While moving to night defensive position, C3 personnel tripped a Chi-Con booby-trap, placed in high grass approx. 5 feet off side of trail, vic. AT962692. The Marine WIA was emergency medevaced.
- 071655H A32, while on patrol, detonated an M-26 grenade booby-trap, placed in water puddle on trail. Trail led through break in wire leading through DAIS, vic. AT954653, therefore channelizing the patrol. Marines sustained 2 WIA and 1 scout dog WIA. Personnel and dog were emergency medevaced. One WIA later died of wounds resulting in 1 USMC KIA.
- 091000H Lieutenant Colonel R. P. ROSE relieved Lieutenant Colonel C. G. LITTLE as Commanding Officer, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines.
- 091715H Acting on intelligence information stating that the T-89th Sapper Bn. was active vic. AT956678, Co. "C" (Rein) conducted sweep of La Chau (3), with mission to locate, capture or destroy enemy troops, equipment, or installations. Marines checked 57 Vn. civilians for ID cards and detained 2. Detainees were taken to Hieu Duc District Headquarters for interrogation.
- 101645H While returning from a water resupply patrol, D1 personnel detonated M-26 grenade booby trap with trip wire, vic. AT884712, resulting in one Marine being priority medevaced.
- 101645H H&S Co., 81mm Mortar Plt. personnel located Hill 10, vic. 924690, had accidental discharge with .45 cal pistol, and wounded himself in the head. Exact circumstances are not known as personnel was alone when the AD occurred. Marine was emergency medevaced, however, he died of wounds in the hospital.
- 102140H C15, while in ambush position, observed 3 enemy moving East to West approx. 300 meters from their position vic. AT915702. Unit reported sighting but did not initiate contact due to fleeing target and because of friendly units in area. No further sightings of the enemy were made.
- 161530H Company "C" (Rein) in coordination/cooperation with RF from Hieu Duc District and G400 2-1, commenced County Fair operation 160200H in the BO BAN village, vic. AT9569. The operation secured 161350H with a total of 557 Vn. civilians being screened. The breakdown was 137 adult males, 130 adult females, 140 male children and 150 female children.

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300 Vn. attended the MEDCAP and 35 attended the DENTCAP. 15 Vn. were detained for various reasons, 14 were taken to Hieu Duc District Intelligence Operations Center and 1 to CIT. A detailed search of County Fair area by RF produced negative findings. (Ref. Bn Frag0 017-70, Tab A to Encl (1)).

- 171323H While on a security patrol, fire team from A1 was moving through Phu Son (1) hamlet when the patrol received 2 incoming M-26 grenades, resulting in 1 Marine routine medevac and 1 Vn. girl, priority medevac. A1 immediately cordoned off the hamlet and with the assistance of RF and PHU's, swept the area and detained 3 Vn. male suspects, ages 13, 13, and 14. Suspects were taken to CIT for interrogation and WIA's medevaced by helicopter. The young terrorist was apprehended.
- 180842H The IOD on OP 270 observed 9 enemy vic. AT863629, dressed in green utilities and shorts and carrying weapons and packs. A fire mission of 108 rds of 105mm HE and 36 rds of 107mm HE resulted in 7 probable enemy KIA's. The IOD reported they could see bodies, weapons, and equipment strewn about the area. A TACOR extension and helicopter support were requested, in order that A1 be inserted into the area for intelligence gathering purposes. The request was approved and A1 landed 200 meters South of the target area 181120H. Because of the difficulty of the terrain and time limit imposed, 90 minutes, the Marines were able to cover only approx. one-third of the target area. At 18250H, A1 lifted out of the target area and the operation terminated with negative findings.
- 201635H Upon completion of Reconnaissance in Force operation vic. AT8664, (Ref. Bn Frag0 019-70, Tab B to Encl (1)), Co. "A" commenced moving by foot march toward Hill 10. While moving through "Mortar Valley", unit detonated a booby-trap, vic. AT883655, believed to be approx. 10 pound box mine, resulting in 2 emergency medevacs. While the helicopter LZ was being prepared and the casualties moved, a second booby-trap was detonated, resulting in 6 additional priority medevacs. All 8 Marines were emergency medevaced.
- 201700H Co. "A" Reconnaissance in Force operation (Ref. Bn Frag0 019-70, Tab B to Encl (1)), vic. AT8664, produced the following results: 15 57mm RR cannisters and old camp harbor sites. Unit found prints in stream beds, indicating the enemy is using the area and moving along stream beds rather than trails.
- 211537H The IOD on OP 270 observed 3 enemy moving North to South vic. AT867630. The enemy were wearing black uniforms, no packs or rifles were observed. A fire mission consisting of 20 rds of 105mm HE was fired. Results of the fire mission are unknown.
- 230930H The IOD on OP 270 observed 2 enemy moving East to West vic. AT863682. Three minutes later, the IOD sighted the same 2 enemy moving West to East, leading 7 additional enemy. The enemy personnel wore green uniforms and were heavily camouflaged with bushes. Packs and weapons were

observed on all personnel. An artillery ambush was submitted and a request for the "Pacifier" package was made. The enemy appeared again at 1007H and the artillery ambush was sprung, firing a total of 42 rds 105mm HE. An AO was called and a request for "divert" air was made. A CAS commenced at 1120H, dropping retarded 250 pound bombs and napalm. The IOD observed one direct hit on the target but could not observe the enemy. The "Pacifier" request was denied, resulting in negative results surveillance of the target area.

- 240405H While in ambush position, vic. AT905675, C23 received approx. 3 rds. of incoming small arms fire from their West. Unit observed 2 enemy with packs and weapons vic. AT904675, fleeing in a Westerly direction. Unit opened fire with small arms and claymores and immediately swept area. The sweep produced negative results.
- 241045H The IOD on OP 270 observed 5 enemy moving West to East vic. AT864629. It appeared that they were carrying rice. A fire mission consisting of 12 rds of 105mm HE resulted in good coverage of target area but with negative surveillance of any enemy KIA's.
- 241720H An artillery ambush was fired on area of previous sightings, vic. AT864629. A total of 32 rds of 107mm HE were fired, resulting in three secondary explosions. The IOD on OP 270 observed no enemy.
- 250625H The IOD on OP 270 observed 2 enemy moving East to West vic. AT864630. Enemy appeared to be carrying bags of rice. No weapons were observed. An artillery mission consisting of 18 rds of 105mm HE were fired, with good coverage of target area, but no enemy KIA's sighted.
- 271420H Lt. General McCUTCHEON, CG III MAF, visited units A2, B2 and D2 in the field and conversed with the Marines.
- 281150H While in daytime FIB, A1 observed 2 Vn. females, approx. age 35, removing wires from BPS sensors located in DAIS vic. AT950650. Females were detained, interrogated by ITT, and turned over to Hieu Duc District Headquarters.
- 281630H Co. "D" completed Reconnaissance in Force operation, vic. AT865627 (Ref. Bn FragO 020-70, Tab C to Encl (1)). A detailed reconnaissance and search produced the following: 1 bounding-type anti-personnel mine, located in middle of a well used trail vic. AT865627. When the mine was destroyed in place, the resulting explosion indicated a larger charge had been placed either beside or underneath the AP mine. D(Rein) also found 2 caves vic. AT879677, AT881626, used as harbor sites. Inside the caves were household furnishings and cooking areas. Denial operations were executed by placing CS crystals in caves. PsyOps, material was spread through area around small resting areas and way-stations. Conclusions, based on the intelligence gathered: that the enemy uses the area although he has no permanent large scale base camps. The trails running East and West are heavily travelled and hard packed.

302045H While occupying defensive position on OP KENO, vic. AT884747, Co. "C" (Provisional squad) heard movement approx. 50 meters north of their position. Unit called for hand and 81mm mortar illumination. When illumination came up, 3 enemy were sighted in the wire, and 3 more enemy were sighted in another location. The Marines initiated contact with claymores and grenades. No weapons were observed on enemy and no exchange of small arms was made. A thorough search of the area was conducted 310500H and results included finding broken and dragged down wire at two locations, North-East and North-West of the position.

311100H A21, while on water resupply patrol at Song Yen River vic. AT957655, detonated an estimated 5 pound box mine, located on the bank of the river, resulting in 1 Marine KIA. The Marine was routinely redeployed.

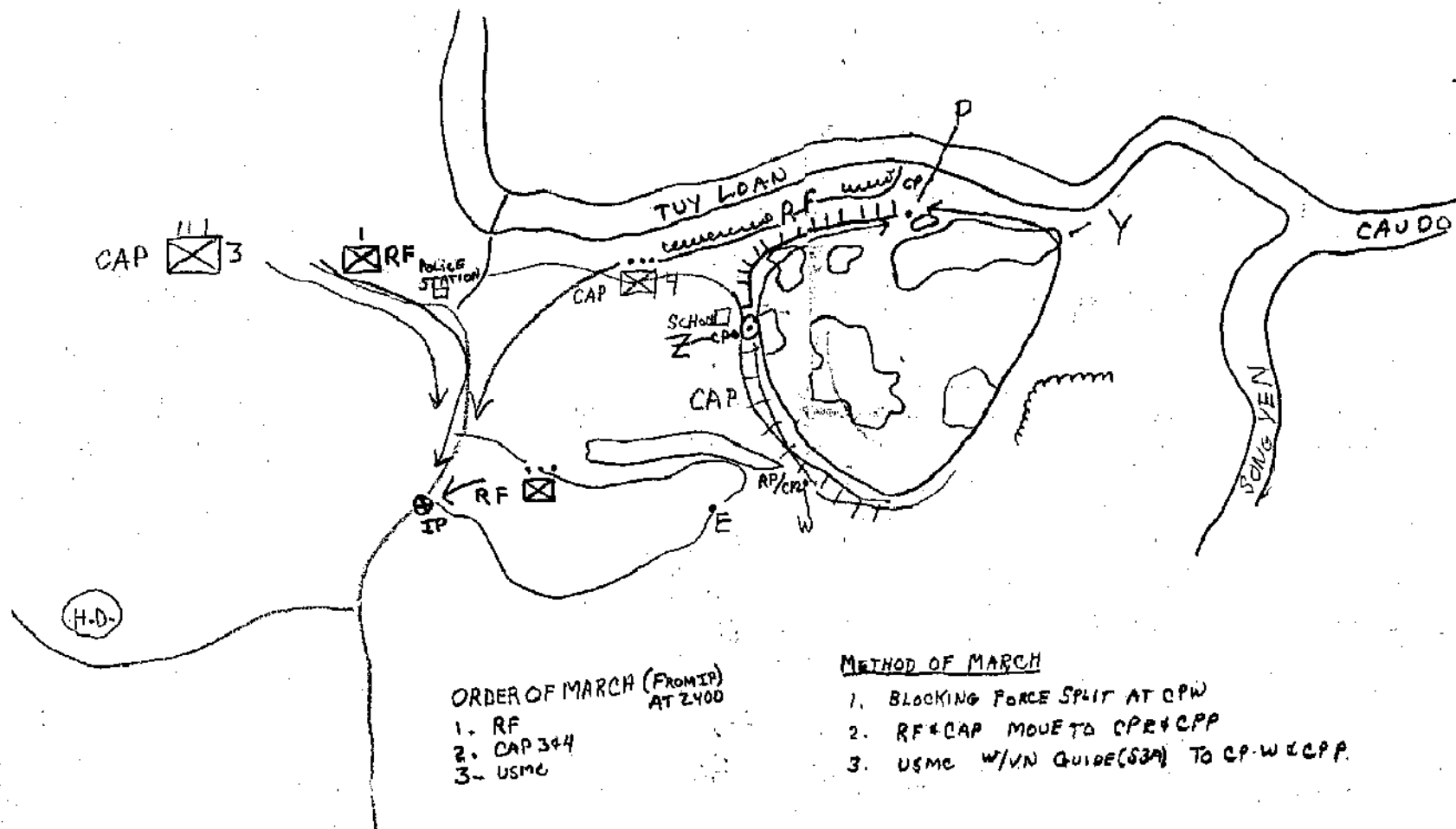
