

SECTION B

INTELLIGENCE

- 1. During the month of January, the bettalion participated in the Voluntary Informant Program with purchase totaling 16,290 VN Piasters. All purchases were made for ordnance brought out of the field by local Vietnamese.
- 2. During the past month infrastructure activity by local Viet Cong included loudspeaker broadcasts, pamphlet drops, and the masting of numerous Viet Cong and Communist Party flags in various villages. Indectrination/recruiting meetings have continued. Terrorist activities have persisted throughout the period reported on with the continued emplacement of mines and booby Traps, the assasination of Ol Vietnamese Civilian, and the abduction of 30 others. Reports of enemy main forces units in the western portion of the Battalion TAOR continue but this threat is being neutralized by a heavy concentration of bombings and artillery strikes.
- 3. Small scale hit-and-run attacks in conjunction with active propaganda and terrorist tactics are expected to continue as local force guerrillas and cadre teams emphasize the solidification of their infrastructure.



SECTION COPERATIONS AND TRAINING



Operations


- a. <u>Mission</u>. From 1-31 January 1971, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines was assigned the mission of conducting unilateral and combined offensive operations in cooperation/coordination with Vietnamese Forces within our designated TAOR in order to search out and eliminate enemy forces and his logistical installations. The primary emphasis was placed on those elements and base areas posing the greatest hazards to the Government of Vietnam's control of significantly populated areas and to the security of friendly installations, as well as the task of denying the enemy access to rocket sites against the Danang Vital Area.
- b. <u>Tasks</u>. From 1-31 January 1971, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines was assigned the following tasks:
- (1) To occupy and defend the USMC portion of Hill 37, vic. AT 916581.
 - (2) To occupy and defend Hill 65, vic. AT 880580.
- (3) To provide security for OP located on Hill 270, vic. AT 865681.
- (4) From 1-31 January 1971; to provide security for Engineers and Scabee projects within our TAOR, to include daily mine sweeps along common access: routes.
- (5) To be prepared to provide a reaction force capable of relieving the High Duc, Dai Loc, and Thuong Duc District Headquarters and Combined Action Company units within the TAOR.
- (6) To deny the enemy access to probable rocket launch sites against the Danang Vital Area.

c. Special Operations

- (1) From 1-31 January 1971, Company "M" CUPP units conducted combined tactical, civil, medical and psychological operations with local RF/PF Forces in their assigned TAOR.
- (2) From 1-6 January 1971, Company "M" provided day security and extensive night ambushes along Route 4 east to ensure safe passage of conveys by intendicting avenues of approach.

- (3) From 7-31 January 1971, Company "D" provided day security and extensive night ambushes along Route 4 cast to ensure safe passage of convoys by interdicting avenues of approach.
- (4) From 1-12 and 24-31 January Company "D" provided a reinforced platoon with two 61mm mortars with the mission of establishing and providing security for a safe haven for recon teams working in the vicinity of ZC 199581.
- (5) On the 5, 13, 15, 17, & 18 of January Companies "A", "C", & "M" provided read security for 1st plateon Company "A", 1st Engineer Battalion's read sweep from Hill 65 to Hill 52. (SEE TAB A)
- (6) From 13-23 January Company "B" & Company "R" conducted a "Recon in Force" operation, in the vic. of Hill 383, vic. ZC 199581, concentrating on interdiction of enemy lines of communication and location/destruction of enemy bases and equipment. (SEE TAB B)
- (7) On the 23 & 24 of Jamuary Company "A" and Company "M" previded road security for 1st platoon Company "A" 1st Engineer Battalian's road sweep from Hill 65 to Hill 52. (SEE TAB C)

2. Training

- a. A mine/booby trap contact team from 1st Engineer Battalion held instruction on land mines and booby traps. Five classes were held with a total attendance of 150 personnel.
- b. During the month of January, 399 personnel joining the Battalion received the Battalion Orientation Course.
- c. Twenty-two personnel attended the one week Resident Land Mine Warfare School conducted by 1st Engineer Battalion.
- d. Three enlisted personnel attended NCO School in Okinswa. One enlisted man attended the Basic Infantry Weapons Repair Course in Okinawa. Six enlisted personnel attended in-country Vietnameso Language School.
- c. Company level training was mission orientated and placed emphasis on Land Navigation, Map and Compass Reading, Night Firing, Ambush Techniques and Mine/Booby Traps Counternessures.

3. Air Support


a. During the month of January 1971, 17 flights of fixed wing from MAG 11, were flown in support of the battalion. The aircraft expended as

total of 168,500 lbs. of bombs, 34,000 lbs. of napalm, 0 pods of 2.75 rockets and 400 rounds of 20mm ammunition. The damage assessment was as follows: A total of 10 secondary fires were noted, 01 structure destroyed, 03 caves destroyed, and 04 fighting holes were uncovered.

- b. OVIOA Bronce air craft from VMO-02 amassed 35 hours of flight time in aerial observation, artillery spotting missions and close air support. The aircraft expended 22 pods of rockets and 35,700 rounds of 7.62 ammunition.
- c. In support of combat operations within the TAOR a total of 44 sorties for 23 emergency, 34 priority and 25 routine med-evacs were flown. Also 5 sorties were flown by CH-46D and CH-53 helicopters lifting and extracting 1,170 troops. A total of 15 hours flight time was flown by "Cobra" gunships. They expended 16 rocket pods and 26,000 rounds of 7.62 amunition. Twenty three visual recon missions were flown for a total of 21 hours 10 minutes, flight time. Twelve (12) resupply missions with a total weight of 149,596 pounds were flown.

4. Artillery Support

- a. During the month of January 1971 "A" Battery 1st Battalion 11th Marines continued to fire in support of the 1st Battalion 1st Marines. Batteries "B", "L" and "WZ" 1st Battalion 11th Marines provided general support for the 1st Battalion 1st Marines.
- b. A total of 10,685 rounds were fired in support of 1st Battalion 1st Marines. There were 4 contact missions fired expending 65 rounds, 48 targets of opportunity fired upon expending 966 rounds and 40 intelligence targets which expended 330 rounds. Three hundred and sixty seven preemptive targets were fired upon expending 647 rounds. Batteries "A", "AX", and "L" of 1st Battalion 11th Marines combined to fire 8,677 rounds on the confirmed base camp of the NVA 575th Artillery Battalion, vicinity 8064.
- c. Artillery is credited with 3 KTA's, 1 probable, and 3 second-ary explosions.






SECTION D LOGISTICS

- 1. During January a major emphasis has been placed on embarkation readimess. All companies UCH's have been up dated. The Battalion MEDS deckis in the process of being up dated. At this date the Battalion is being furnished with enough 4 cubic feet boxes to meet our embarkation requirement:
- 2. Aproximately 150,000 lbs of supplies, munitions and equipment were flown out of LZ 452 the last thirty days in support of the Battalion's operations.



SECTION E PSYCHOLOGICAL ONERATIONS/CIVIL AFFAIRS

- 1. Public Works. Megative report for the month of January 1971.
- 2. Welfare. This battalion distributed approximately 400 health and confort items to students throughout the CAAOR.
- 3. Education. Distributed 450 school kits to the students of the Dai Ioc High School and grade schools in the District.
- 4. Health. A total of 679 Vietnamese Civilians were treated at our Battalion's daily Hed-Caps. No Mobile Hed-Caps were conducted during the month of January.
- 5. Social. This Battalion provided 05 Vietnamese civilians with transportation to hospitals in Da Nang. A check in the amount of 27.50003VN was donated to the Dai Loc Catholic Church for the TET HCLI-DAY by G-5.
- 6. Security. An HB Team was utilized in the promotion of ordnance turn in and Chieu Moi messages in the CAAOR.
- 7. Personal Response. Twelve Personal Response Classes were held for the new arrivals in country.
- 8. Solatium Payments. Negative report for this month.





SECTION F COMPUNICATIONS AND ELECTRONICS

1. Highlights of activity for communications during the month of January 1971 include the rotation of the Battalion Radio Chief (with no replacement) and the rotation of the Battalion Message Center Chief. Highlights of seperate sections are listed below.

A. Radio

- 1. During the month of January the Radio Section supported the Battalion with reliable communications on all nets.
- The Radio Section maintained re-transmission sites on Hills 65,270 and 37 in support of the Battalion operating in the vicinity of Hill 363 on Charlie Ridge from 13 to 23 January 1971.
- 3. During the month of January, 703 incoming messages and 590 outgoing messages were processed through the COC.

B. Wire

- 1. During the month of January the Wire Section provided wire support for the operation on Hill 383 from 13 to 23 January 1971.
- 2. During the month of January the switchboard on Hill 37 handled approximately 18,500 calls.



SECTION G MEDICAL

- 1. Personel: The battalion has one Medical Officer, I Chief Hospital Corspmen and 21 Mospital Corpsmen assigned to Hill 37 BAS. The battalion also has one Hedical Officer, 2 Hospital Corpsmen assigned to Hill 65 BAS, 10 Hospital Corpsmen assigned to CUPP Units and 30 Hospital Corpsmen assigned to rifle Companies. Two Hospital Corpsmen are on emergency leave and 6 Hospital Corpsmen on Hill 37 are in the process of indoctrination.
- 2. Facilities: The Battalion Aid Station on Hill 37 consists of 4 buildings and 1 bunker which are utilized for the baggage storage of attached personnel, supply, health records, laboratory, administration, immunization clinic, sick call, living quarters and emergency bunker. The Battalion Aid Station on Hill 65 consists of 2 buildings and 1 bunker which are utilized for sick call, health records, immunization clinic and living quarters.

3. Daily Activities:


a. Sick Call is held from 0830 to 0930 and 1300 to 1400 daily. Emergencies are taken care of anytime.



SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT TWENTS

- 071315H D/11, while on patrol, found an EVA/VC cache at ZC 198586 consisting of 500 pounds of rice, 25 pounds of salt, numerous coeking utensils, 5 pounds of documents, assorted small arms ammunition, blasting caps, booby trap wire, and rifle magazines.
- 072150H C21, while set in night ambush position vic AT954630, sighted 04 VC. One VC fired upon C21 with an Ak 47 and C21 returned fire with small arms, N-60 machine gun and claymore nines. Action resulted in O2 VC KIA and capture of O1 AK-50 rifle; assorted equipment and ordnance.
- 110020H D35, while set in night ambush position vic AT951635, heard noise in the river 50-70 meters to their east. They opened fire with small arms and M-79. Action resulted in 03 VC KIA.
- 14093CH E-Co Opcon to 1/1 found Enemy Base Camp Area vic ZC195585, the following weapons and material was found in caves/tunnels; 6

 AK-47 rifles, 8 SKS rifles, 4 BAR's 3 M-16 rifles and 3 M-1 carbines. All were rusty but majority were in serviceable condition. Also found were 65 lbs of medical supplies 2 sewing machines, 5 commercial type, Sony transister radios, 100 lbs of large cooking utensils, 30 assorted documents, 100 lbs of rice and assorted clothing. All weapons and materials evacuated to 1st Marines.
- 141140M B-Co searching in vic ZC192590 found one (1) 75mm Recoiless Rifle with mount. The weapon was hidden in a small cave with the entrance camoflouged, also 2 empended Recoiless Rifle casings whe found in the cave along with 10 lbs of clothing and documents. Weapon and equipment were evacuated to 1st Marines.
- 151100H C-31 while on patrol, point man detonated a pressure release booby trap, vic AT810569, resulting in Ol USEC WIA emergency medevac.
- 151115H While attempting to land at C31's position, vic ATC10569, a medevac helicopter set off a pressure type booby trapped 81mm round resulting in C3 USEC WEA and extensive damage to the helicopter.
- 151130H K-2(Opeon to 1/1) vic ZC203601 found an abandoned base camp area was approximately 75 meters wide 200 meters long. A search of the base camp area resulted in finding 2 SKS rifles,

1 expended 75mm Recoiless Rifle casing of Chinese manufacture and approximately 100 expended 50cal casings.

- 151700H K-3(Open to 1/1) vic Z0201597 found two (2) 75mm Receiless Rifle rounds of Chineses manufacture. The rounds were in excellent condition and were backed in a metal carrying case with a carrying stray attached. Rounds were blown in place with C-4.
- 160900H B-3 vic ZC198603 found a bunker complex consisting of 8 bunkers approximately size 5 X 6. Area was devoid of enemy equipment. All buniters were destroyed with C-4.
- 161100H B-1 vig 20187589 found a bunker complex consisting of 10 bunkers approximately size 6 X 6 X 5. Each bunker had cooking and sleeping areas. The area appeared to have been vacated approximately (5-8 months prior. Assorted individual equipment, cooking utensils and a few rounds of assorted small arms amno were found in the bunkers. All bunkers were destroyed with C-4.
