## 10. MISSION

a. 1 - 25 May 1966 - 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines defend HUE-PHU BAI Airfield and 8th ARU, control assigned portion of HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base; conduct combat/reconnaissance patrols in assigned portion of HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base and combined operations with RVNAF within and beyond boundaries of assigned portion of HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base. Prepare defense and counter-attack plans to restore integrity of defensive perimeter to include PHU-PHU BAI Airfield and 8th ARU facilities.

b. 26 - 31 May 1966 - 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines to conduct Search and Destroy operations in area of operation; deny the enemy (VC) utilization of the CO BI THANH TAN Lowland area; provide security for artillery, LSA, and other direct support units; render assistance to PHUONG DIEM District Headquarters in removing population/resources from the operational area; and conduct such civic action as circumstances may allow; provide Ready Reserve Reaction Force in support of Recon Operation in RZ # 1; man Out Post 674 and provide security for Radio Relay.

## 11. BACKGROUND

a. 1-25 May 1966 - To accomplish the assigned mission for the Battalion portions of HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base had been divided into company sectors with each rifle company conducting aggressive patrolling, sweeps and numerous ambushes in their assigned sector. The companies defend their portion of the MLR by employing observation posts, listening posts, road blocks, checkpoints, and through occupation of prepared positions in critical areas.

b. 26-31 May 1966 - To accomplish the assigned mission in the CO BI THANH TAN Area of Operation the Commanding Officer assigned one rifle company plus H&S Company as the security force for the Logistic Support Area (LSA). The remaining rifle companies are assigned to areas of responsibility for control and conduct of Company Operations. A Reinforced rifle platoon has been assigned to Hill 674 for the security of the Regimental Radio Relay equipment, the helicopter pad and general observation.

## INTELLIGENCE

a. The enemy situation on 01 May 1966 was as follows:

(1) HUE-PHU BAI. There are two (2) Local Force Companies, the C-117 Armed Unit and the C-116 Armed Unit with an estimated strength of 100 and 80 men respectively, operating in the TAOR. Enemy activity within the TAOR consisted of perimeter harassment by small enemy units during the hours of darkness, limited probing of outlying Marine units, propaganda meetings with the local populace, and infiltration into the TAOR for rice and intelligence gathering.

Enemy units that operate near our TAOR

(1) Elements of the 95th Regiment with an estimated strength of from 500-600 men, is located in the vicinity of Grid Square ZC 0493. Weapons are unknown.

(2) The 810th (K-10) Main Force Battalion with an estimated strength of 300-400 men is located in the vicinity of Grid Square YC 9293. Weapons include 2-81mm, 2-57mm RR, unknown number of B-40 (RPG) Anti-tank weapons, machine guns, SIG's and individual weapons.

(3) HUONG THUY Armed Unit (C-116/D-4), a Local Force Company, with an estimated strength of 80 men has been operating throughout HUONG THUY District.

(4) PHU THU Armed Unit (C-117/D-1), a Local Force Company with an estimated strength of 100 men has been operating throughout PHU THU Peninsula. **DECLASSIFIED**

(5) Elements of the Intelligence/Reconnaissance Company (C-11) have been operating from a base in the vicinity of YD 785102, in the HUE-KAM HOA-PHU BAI Area. The estimated strength is 80 men.

(6) One SAPPER Squad with an estimated strength of 8-10 men, has been operating in the southern portion of the TAOR.

(7) An unknown number of local guerrillas, operating in conjunction with Main Force and Local Units, are operating in the HUE-PHU BAI Area.

(8) CO BI THANH TAN. There is one Local Force Company, P-15 Armed Unit with an estimated strength of 90 men, and one Main Force Battalion, the 800th with an estimated strength of between 400-500 men operating in the CO BI THANH TAN AREA.

ENCLOSURE (1)

Enemy units that operate near the CO BI THANH TAN Area.

(1) The 802nd (K-2) Main Force Battalion with an estimated strength of 350-400 men is located in the vicinity of Grid Square YD 6319. Weapons consists of 2-57mm RR, 2-81mm mortars, unknown number of B-40 (PRG) Anti-tank weapons, machine guns and individual weapons. The possibility of the presence of 120mm mortars are now included in the 802nd weapon capability.

(2) The 800th (K-1) Main force battalion with an estimated strength of 400-500 men has been operating out of a base camp in the piedmont south of CO BI THANH TAN. Weapons include 2-57mm RR, 2-81mm and 6-60mm mortars, 2 LMG, 9-HMG, 6-B40 (PRG) anti-tank weapons and individual weapons. Recent capture of weapons include the AK-47 sub-machine gun, SKS assault, and the PRD-LMG.

(3) The QUANG DIEN (P-14) Armed Unit with an estimated strength of 80-100 men has been operating within the QUANG DIEN District.

(4) The PHONG DIEN (P-15) Armed Unit with an estimated strength of 90 men has been operating throughout the PHONG DIEN District.

b. The enemy initiated the following incidents during the period:

(1) PHU BAI

The enemy initiated 12 incidents during the period 1-25 May. Seven of the incidents consisted of snipers during periods of day and night, at people, vehicles and at aircraft. There were two incidents of line harassment by probing to expose defensive fires and generally to harass the defensive positions. Two patrols were harassed by the VC who throw grenades into their positions and there was one incident of an electrical booby trap which failed to detonate.

(2) CO BI THANH TAN

The enemy initiated eight incidents during the period 26-31 May. Four of the incidents consisted of minor snippings during the periods of day and night. There was one minor booby trap incident and one incident of anti-tank mining. There were two major incidents.

d. Significant trend during period.

(1) PHU BAI. The number of incidents during the month of May decreased. Infiltration attempts into the RUE-PHU BAI TAOR not only decreased but in the size of VC units that were able to move through decreased substantially.

(2) CO BI THANH TAN. Indications point to the fact that local guerrillas are attempting to evacuate the CO BI THANH TAN complex by posing as civilians since current operations commenced. Also the VC units are willing to accept aggressive combat with numerically inferior or equal force for short duration to inflict the maximum number of casualties, then withdrawing and leaving small pockets of resistance.

e. Enemy situation at the end of period.

The RUE-PHU BAI and CO BI THANH TAN enemy situation remains the same as stated in paragraph a.

Nuclear, Biological, Chemical and Other Types of Warfare.

a. During this reporting period, there were no instances of use of this battalion of NBC Warfare or equipment peculiar to NBC Warfare.

b. Training Accomplished. During the reporting period the remainder of the command received an average of 2 hours on:

- (1) Field Protective Mask M-17 (Fitting and Masking Procedures).
- (2) RCM Agents (capabilities, employment and munitions).
- (3) The Mighty Mite M-106 (Turbine Blower/Sprayer). (The employment and capabilities).

c. Status of NBC Equipment on hand. All items of NBC equipment authorized by T/E are held by this command and are operational.

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(a) Squad size. There were 716 squad size patrols conducted.

(b) Platoon size. There were 42 platoon size patrols conducted.

(c) Company size. None.

(2) Ambushes. There 562 squad size and 23 platoon size ambushes employed.

(3) Listening Posts. There were 514 Listening Posts employed.

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b. Significant Events.

(1) Sequential listing of all contacts, general description of scheme of maneuver and results attained.

(a) 1 May - At 010001H a guard at CAC-3 sighted 1 VC in the vicinity of YD 912118, guard opened fire and VC fled in an unknown direction. CAC-3 sent a squad out to search the area. Results of contact: Negative. At 012120H G-1 patrol received 1 hand grenade in rear of their patrol. The Patrol returned fire with 15 rounds of small arms and 5 hand grenades. Results of Contact: 1 Marine KIA. A search of the area was conducted with negative results. At 012205H CAC-5 patrol heard movement in grass approximately 60 meters north of their ambush site at YD 846194. Squad immediately opened fire on VC. VC broke contact and CAC-5 physically pursued VC until contact was lost. A search of the area was conducted with negative results. At 012255H Hill 180 sighted an unknown number of VC at YD 854133, OP immediately opened fire with 50 rounds of small arms and illuminated the area with 5 rounds of 81mm mortars. A search of the area was conducted at first light with negative results. There were 30 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 26 squad size ambushes with 20 listening posts employed.

(b) 2 May - At 020250H CAC-7 reported their CP in vicinity of YD 819179 was probed by approximately 5 VC. CAC-7 took VC under fire and VC returned fire with approximately 15 rounds of automatic fire, VC broke contact and fled in an unknown direction. CAC-7 immediately searched the area with negative results. At 022145H PF's from F/CAC Company spotted 2 VC in vicinity of YD 821178. PF's immediately took the VC under fire with approximately 30 rounds of automatic fire and throw 3 hand grenades. VC broke contact and fled towards LOI NONG. Contact results were negative. At 022205H CAC-9 spotted 2 VC in vicinity of YD 934074. CAC-9 searched the area with negative results. There were 30 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 26 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(c) 3 May - At 032220H MCB-7 lines reported sighting blinking lights at YD 896136, magnetic azimuth 116 range 1600 meters. Range was confirmed by the Tanks. Appeared to be in open and to be in closer to their position than usual. Blinking lights appeared to be code, but not in Morse Code. There were 31 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 25 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(d) 4 May - There were 31 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 27 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

ENCLOSURE (1)

(e) 5 May - At 050200E CAC-3 received information from villagers that 60 VC were moving west and firing their weapons into the air in order to gain the people's attention while passing out propaganda leaflets. CAC-3 investigated the firing and tried to ambush the VC. No contact was established. There were 28 squad size and 3 platoon size patrols with 23 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(f) 6 May - At 060915E 3-2 patrol located some ordnance at YD 790114. VC attempted to fire a hidden explosive electrically from across the river. The blasting cap was detonated, the hidden explosive charge did not detonate. It was reported that the patrol was being observed while dismantling the charge from approximately 200 meters. The patrol collected the enemy ordnance and turned it into Bn S-2. Munitions Captured: 7-1 lb blocks of TET, U.S. Manufactured, 2 pineapple grenades, possible Chinese origin; 200 yards of new communications wire, U.S. Manufacture. At 062320E a marine guard of CAC-3 reported 1 unidentified person shot 2 rounds of small arms at his security position. Guard returned fire with 1 grenade and 10 rounds of 7.62. CAC-3 conducted a search of the area at first light with negative results. There were 30 squad size and 1 platoon size patrols with 22 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(g) 7 May - There were 26 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 21 squad and 1 platoon size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(h) 8 May - At 082350E E Company lines reported sighting 6 unidentified persons at their right flank position at coordinates YD 883123. OP opened fire with 70 rounds of small arms. A patrol was immediately dispatched to the area to conduct a sweep, which yielded negative results. Contact results: 1 VC KIA (Unconfirmed). There were 27 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 20 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(i) 9 May - At 090030E Hill 180 heard noises southeast of their OP at YD 885131. Hill 180 fired 3 81mm illumination rounds, 2 HE 81mm rounds and 1 M-79 rounds in the direction of the noises. A search of the area at first light yielded negative results. At 090045E a patrol from E company reported movement in brush at YD 889129, patrol opened fire. Unidentified person was spotted moving towards the river at GC YD 899137. Illumination was requested and an unidentified person was again sighted at the tomb at YD 890101, across the river. Patrol searched the area with negative results.

ENCLOSURE (1)

At 092300H CAC-4 sent out a patrol to check out area where a dog was barking and received 1 hand grenade by an estimated 2 VC. One radioman was slightly wounded in left arm from grenade. A search of the area yielded no further contact. At 092345H Hill 180 reported picking up noises on the SID device at YD 955131. OP threw 1 hand illumination grenade at suspected noises and spotted 3 VC. OP opened fire with 20 rounds of 7.62 and threw 8 hand grenades. A search of the area was conducted at first light which yielded negative results. There were 22 squad size patrols with 17 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(i) 10 May - At 102040H H-2 reported suspected enemy movement at YD 782132, patrol opened fire with 500 rounds of 7.62 and received 50 rounds of small arms. H-2 illuminated the area with 21 rounds of 155mm illumination rounds while the area was searched. The sweep yielded negative results. At 102355H CAC-7B sighted 2 VC running northeast from YD 899175. CAC-7B opened fire on VC and received 3 incoming rounds. VC were carrying 2 semi-automatic weapons. VC broke contact and fled east to vicinity of CAC-7 CP. A search of the CP was conducted with negative results. There were 25 squad size patrols with 19 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(j) 11 May - There were 26 squad size patrols with 20 squad size ambushes and 20 listening posts employed.

(k) 12 May - At 122305H The village chief of CAC-3 reported seeing an unknown number of VC immediately west of railroad tracks near YD 911118. CAC-3 immediately dispatched a patrol to the railroad tracks west of the CP. Negative contact was made but the patrol fired 4 M-79 rounds into suspected fighting positions. A search of the area was conducted with negative results. There were 28 squad size patrols with 20 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(l) 13 May - At 132155H MCB-7 lines spotted 1 VC at concertina wire. OP fired 1 round of 7.62 and illuminated the area with an illumination grenade. No incoming rounds were received. A search of the area was conducted at first light with negative results. There were 24 squad size patrols with 19 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(m) 14 May - At 140100H MCB-7 lines observed 3 VC at left flank position, vicinity YD 902138. MCB-7 fired 6 M-79 rounds and 335 rounds of M-60. MCB-7 received 10 incoming rounds of semi-automatic small arms fire into center of lines at YD 895135. MCB-7 again opened fire into suspected area with 180 rounds of small arms. VC broke contact and fled in an unknown direction. Contact results: Negative.

ENCLOSURE (1)

At 140100H Co H listening post in front of lines at YD 895151 sighted 2 VC moving north in front of their position in vicinity of YD 895153. Listening post lost observation with VC and was unable to regain visual contact. At 0700H a patrol was dispatched from H Company's lines and a search of the area was conducted. Results yielded a large pool of blood in front of the left flank, the patrol found where the wire to the SID device had been cut with a knife, and found numerous fresh foot prints and boot prints. It is suspected that contact with VC yielded 1 WIA or 1 KIA. At 140014H CAC-3B sighted 1 VC at YD 904114, assaulted the VC's position and fired 50 rounds of small arms. A search of the area was conducted with negative results. At 141520H CAC-7B found a VC storage supply dump and tunnels at YD 803196. EQUIPMENT CAPTURED: 22-BAR Magazines, 1 Thompson magazine, 62 lb blocks of TNT, 45 - .45 Cal. rounds, 67 - .30 Cal rounds, 2 Packs, and 1 poncho. Final results: Tunnels destroyed. At 141500H the Battalion Sparrow/Hawk was placed on a five minute alert status and committed at 141535H. At 141535H OpCon was chopped to 4th Marine Regiment. At 141615H Sparrow/Hawk was landed at Recon LZ (YD 526237) and proceeded to YD 545240. G-2 (Sparrow/Hawk) received light sniper fire and received 2 marine WIA's. At 141950H Sparrow/Hawk enroute to INM-163. At 142000H Sparrow/Hawk (G-2) returned OpCon 2/1. There were 24 squad size patrols with 19 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(n) 15 May - At 151930H a mighty mito from F/CAC Headquarters received fire by an estimated 10-15 VC at YD 824179. The vehicle continued to its destination at CAC-7 CP. Contact results: Negative. At 152010H a patrol from CAC-7A reported sighting 3 VC in vicinity of YD 823180. CAC-7A opened fire on VC and VC broke contact and fled in an unknown direction. A search of the area yielded negative results. At 152010H CAC-7A reported sighting 4 VC on route #1 at coordinates YD 822180. VC fired 5 rounds of semi-automatic fire and CAC-7A returned fire with 80 rounds of small arms. VC carried 2 semi-automatic weapons. It is believed that the VC were disorganized and trying to reassemble after firing on F/CAC vehicle. Contact results: 1 VC KIA (Unconfirmed). At 152245H and 152315H MCB-7 observed 1 VC in center sector of their area of the perimeter at YD 897135. Opened fire on VC with 15 rounds 7.62 and received 2 rounds of semi-automatic fire. Illuminated the area and VC was observed fleeing in a southeast direction. At 2315H the left flank of MCB-7 lines sighted 1 VC outside the wire and opened fire. The area was searched at first light with negative results. There were 21 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 15 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(o) 16 May - There were 24 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 19 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

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(p) 17 May - At 170142H L-2 was probed by 2 VC at YD 852105. L-2 opened fire with 25 rounds of small arms and 3 rounds of M-79. A search of the area yielded negative results. At 171630H E Company lines apprehended a Vietnamese boy who was marking their lines with wire and rocks. Suspect was turned over to ITT for interrogation. At 172010H F Company reported sighting 4 to 5 junk boats with VC at YD 936140. A fire mission was fired and boats were destroyed. There were 21 squad size and 3 platoon size patrols with 15 squad and 3 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(q) 18 May - At 180225H CAC-7B patrol saw 1 VC moving through brush besides trail at approximate coordinates of YD 882175. The patrol fired 45 rounds of small arms and swept the area with negative results. At 182145H CAC-7A patrol sighted an unknown number of VC in a boat moving up stream at YD 820184. CAC-7A fired 180 rounds of small arms and 6 M-79 rounds. Pursuit was impossible without water transportation. There were 23 squad size patrols with 15 squad size and 3 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(r) 19 May - There were 25 squad size patrols with 24 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(s) 20 May - At 201300H CAC-7B received 20 rounds of sniper fire from the vicinity of YD 835208. Patrol searched the area with negative results. At 202100H CAC-7A reported receiving 10 rounds of small arms fire from approximately 10 VC on northside of CP at YD 819178. Area was searched by patrol with negative results. There were 22 squad size patrols with 18 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(t) 21 May - There were 26 squad size and 1 platoon size security patrols with 19 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes conducted and 17 listening posts employed.

(u) 22 May - At 220125H E Company patrol sighted 3 VC at approximate coordinates of YD 834065. Patrol opened fire with 40 rounds of small arms. A search of the area was conducted with negative results. At 221515H MCB-7 observed 1 VC crawl through concertina wire and start digging a hole inside the perimeter. When suspect discovered he was being observed he tried to flee. Suspect was apprehended and turned over to ITT for interrogation. At 222115H E-2 reported sighting 5 VC at YD 901092. LP opened fire with 15 rounds of small arms and 3 M-79 rounds. VC fled the area without returning the fire. A search of the area was made with negative results. At 222225H CAC-3B patrol reported spotting 1 VC proceeding north at YD 907124.

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A search of the entire area was conducted with negative results. At 222100H MCB-7 lines sighted 1 VC at YD 902138. Lines opened fire with 2 M-79 rounds and 2 hand grenades. Area was illuminated and the VC disappeared. A search of the area was conducted at first light with negative results. At 222345H MCB-7 lines reported sighting 1 VC moving from left to right at YD 902138. MCB-7 threw an illumination grenade and VC ducked down behind the ridge line and disappeared. There were 27 squad size and 1 platoon size patrols with 20 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(v) 23 May - F-7 reports apprehending 1 old Vietnamese woman in DONG TAM Hamlet at coordinates YD 825175. F-7 captured 1 French entrenching tool, 2 pans, 1 road breathing apparatus. VC3 was turned over to IIT for interrogation. There were 25 squad size and 1 platoon size patrols with 16 squad size and 2 platoon size ambushes with 17 listening posts employed.

(w) 24 May - At 240001H MCB-7 sighted approximately 3 VC near concertina wire in vicinity of YD 987135. Area was illuminated and MCB-7 lines fired 20 rounds of small arms and 6 rounds of M-79. VC broke contact and fled in a southeasterly direction. Area was searched at first light with negative results. At 241930Z CAC-7A patrol sighted 3 VC at YD 830174. Patrol opened fire and physically pursued with negative results. Contact results: 1 Vietnamese child was injured by stray round. The child was evacuated to "A" Med. There were 26 squad size and 2 platoon size patrols with 21 squad size and 1 platoon size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(x) 25 May - At 251200H "E" Company departed HUE-PHU BAI for CO BI THANH TAN Operations Area. At 252145H B1A (OP-180) reported VC movement at YD 853133. Illumination was requested and it yielded 1 VC sniper. B11180 opened fire with 15 rounds of small arms and received 6 rounds of semi-automatic fire. VC broke contact in an unknown direction. B1A conducted a squad size sweep of the area at first light with negative results. There were 22 squad size patrols with 19 squad size ambushes and 17 listening posts employed.

(y) 26 May - At 260800H 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines (-) departed HUE-PHU BAI Area enroute to CO BI THANH TAN Operations Area. At 261115H 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines assumed operational control of CO BI THANH TAN Operational Area. At 261855H E-2 patrol received 1 round of sniper fire from vicinity of YD 547275. Patrol returned fire with 50 rounds of small arms. At 261945H sniper fire continued, patrol returned fire and VC entered a small house. 81mm mortars were requested on the house and the house was destroyed. At 261945H E-1 patrol sighted 6 VC running and carrying a heavy object at YD 513260. E-1 requested an artillery concentration in the area. Results were unknown.

At 262400H a listening post of F-2 heard noises at YD 5453. LP checked out the area and spotted 4 VC. LP's opened fire with small arms. A search of the area was made at first light with negative results. There were 6 squad and 4 platoon size patrols with 7 squad size ambushes employed.

At 271815H G-3 sighted 4 VC approaching their harboring site at YD 501285. VC spotted G-3 and began to withdraw and G-3 opened fire with small arms and artillery at 400 meters. A patrol was dispatched to search the area and reported negative results. Between the hours of 270800H to 271800H E-2-A reported bunkers at YD 53281. Rice was found at YD 54280 throughout area to YD 548276. Trench lines at YD 547284 to YD 546284. There were 19 bunkers and approximately 2500 pounds of rice throughout the village. Bunkers were destroyed. There were 8 squad size and 1 platoon size ambushes employed.

(bb) 28 May - At 280915H E-3 tripped a VC booby trap at YD 538297 wounding 1 marine slightly which did not require med evacuation. E-3 completed a search of the area without further incidents. At 280945H E-1 patrol sighted 5 VC at YD 53286. Patrol opened fire with small arms and M-79 rounds. VC broke contact and fled southwest into village. Contact results: 1 VC WIA. E-1 pursued VC until contact was lost in the vicinity of YD 520280. At 280945H E2A received sniper fire from a house at YD 544275. Patrol returned fire with small arms and M-79 rounds. House was destroyed and a secondary explosion resulted. A search of the house and area was conducted. Results: 1 Marine WIA caused by secondary explosion, 1 male Vietnamese KIA and 2 female KIA. No weapons were found in the vicinity of the house. At 281100H E-1 apprehended 1 male VCS of military age at YD 534286. VCS was escorted to YD 520300 and was turned over to Bn S-2, then to ITT for interrogation. At 281120H E-1 found a reinforced concrete tunnel at YD 536287 and destroyed the tunnel with explosives. At 280930H thru 281200H E-1 found rice at the below listed coordinates and amounts at each location:

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Most of the rice was in small sacks and was left intact by patrol. At 281630H G-1 patrol located a large camouflaged bin at YD 53286 which contained approximately 700 lbs of rice, patrol reported it was too heavy to return to CP, rice left intact.

At 291030H "G" Company was ordered to alert one platoon to reinforce the 1st Platoon. 2nd Platoon was heli-lifted to YD 523264. C.O. 2/1 directed the 2nd & 3rd platoons of "G" Company to deviate from their patrol routes to an area north of the contact. C.O. "E" Company with the 1st platoon was ordered to move and link up with the 2nd & 3rd platoons of "G" Company. At 291045H 1st platoon of "G" Company was diverted from its patrol route and directed to establish a blocking position at YD 505286. Co "F" was ordered to prepare a Command Group and 2 platoons to be heli-lifted to YD 533258. At 291205H 2nd Platoon "G" Company was heli-lifted and junctured with 1st Platoon "G" Company and began search of the area of contact, encountering VC in tree line and fighting holes in the vicinity of YD 528265. At 291225H 1st Platoon, "H" Company established a blocking position in the vicinity of YD 505280 and was joined by "H" Company (-) and the Command Group. At 291255H "F" Company was heli-lifted to the vicinity of YD 533328. At 291340H "F" Company reported in blocking position in vicinity YD 537258. E Company commenced sweep south. At 291415H 1st and 2nd Platoons "G" Company in blocking positions in the vicinity of YD 528265. At 291505H "E" Company reported receiving sniper fire. Continuing sweep through sniper positions; results of sweep 2 VC KIA. At 291502H "F" Company was ordered to sweep west, and it was reported that sweep of contact area was completed. "F" Company junctured with "E" Company and two platoons of "G" Company in vicinity of YD 526272. "I" Company continued to block and moved slowly to the east and established contact with 2nd platoon "G" Company. At 291542H "E" Company apprehended 4 VCS and 29 Vietnamese civilians. At 291600H all units ordered to conduct a sweep search and destroy operation orientated north with "F" Company on the right, "E" Company center, and "H" Company on the left. At 291700H C.O. "G" Company with the 3rd platoon "G" Company (Rein) with a platoon of tanks was ordered to establish a blocking position in the vicinity of YD 525287 east to YD 530287 and to provide overhead fire in support of the sweep/search and destroy operation. At 291615H all units completed the operation and were ordered to proceed to their respective GP's.

Damage to the tank consisted of 2 damaged road wheels and 2 damaged road arms. There were no friendly casualties. At 310720H, Golf Company departed from CP moving to the LOD. At 310745H, Golf Company departed from CP moving to the LOD. At 310752H, Echo Company departed from CP moving to the LOD. At 310800H, Foxtrot Company with a Command Group and 2 platoons was designated as the alert company. At 310830H, Command Group "A" completed heli-lift to hill # 51. At 310852H, 3rd Platoon Echo Company receiving sniper fire from GC YD 515274. Platoon searched area with negative results. Received more sniper fire from the same area, called a fire mission, good effect on target, 1 possible VC KIA. At 310950H, Roadblock through the 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines perimeter opened for Vietnamese Nationals to enter the CO BI THANH TAN area to retrieve personal possessions. At 311025H, Companies E, G, and H crossed the LOD. At 311100H, Echo Company made contact with VC pockets of resistance consisting of sniper and carbine fire at GC YD 545256. Echo Company called for artillery fire, search the area and killed 2 VC with 4 possible KIA's by Echo and 4 possible KIA's by Artillery. At 311155H, Hotel Company in blocking position. At 311330H, Echo Company discovered 7 60mm mortar rounds at GC YD 550258. At 311422H, Golf Company established blocking position. At 311433H, Echo Company established blocking position. At 311522H, Golf and Hotel Companies ordered to terminate blocks and commence movement back to Company CP's. At 311600H, Echo Company ordered to terminate block and commence movement back to Company CP. At 311800H, Foxtrot Company relieved of standby status. At 311845H, all units returned to their respective CP's. Resources removed by Vietnamese Nationals and PF Units.

## LOGISTICS

1. In accordance with reference (a) the following report is submitted on the subject operation.

a. Intelligence.

(1) A detachment of the 3rd Counter Intelligence Team was attached to the Company conducting this operation. The Counter Intelligence Team is compiling a report of the intelligence that they gathered, therefore, information contained in this report is limited to that gathered by the company conducting the operation.

(2) Terrain. The terrain in the vicinity of the LZ (YD 799119) consisted of low rolling hills of between 10-20 meters high. The hills were covered with light undergrowth that was about knee high that did not hinder the movement of foot troops. There were also several widely separated bushes and small trees approximately 15 feet tall. Several small rice paddies were situated between the small hills. The paddies were large enough to accomodate one helicopter. Each of the small hills could adequately handle one helicopter. The area between the landing zone and the hamlet of THON DINH MON (YD 780119) consisted of dense foliage of tall bushes (14 feet tall), vines, and widely separated tall pine trees, which did hinder the movement of foot troops. The village was approximately 1000 meters long and approximately 150 meters wide. The principle trails ran perpendicular to the long axis of the village generally from Southwest to North-

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east. There were few trails within the hamlet that went along the long axis of the village with exception of the main trail that paralleled the river. This trail was lined with several cuspidore shaped holes or tunnels that are usually found along VC communication routes. These holes are believed to be used for protection against aircraft observation and attack. This hamlet could not be classed as a fortified hamlet. A similar trail paralleled the west edge of the village. The terrain west of the village consisted of a combination of areas of dense vegetation and small to large cultivated areas. The larger cultivated areas would accommodate up to 14 H-34 helicopters. The larger paddies had good approach and departure routes for helicopters. There is at least one good trail from the center of the village that leads to Royal Tombs (YD 779111 and YD 779114), the principle North-South trail joins a trail (YD 787106) indicated on the map which is well defined. This trail leads to Royal Tombs. In the immediate vicinity of the trail junction the vegetation is moderately dense consisting of a tall bush canopy with light under brush about knee high. This area contained several tunnel type trails that went in many different directions. These trails appeared to have been used extensively at one time, but are now more or less overgrown. If the VC use this area for a harboring or refuge site this would be the most likely place. (Reports indicate that the VC have used the Royal Tombs Area as a refuge and bivouac site). The southern trail to the Royal Tombs traverses several small hills (20 meters maximum height) that have many trails. These hills are covered with knee high light under growth and widely separated fairly tall trees (20 feet tall). There are several small one helicopter landing zones in this area. The brush in this area does not hinder foot troops movements. The trees become taller (50 to 75 feet high) and closer together in the vicinity of the Royal Tombs. There are few suitable landing zones in this area. The immediate area of the Royal Tombs has many tall trees (50 - 75 feet tall) situated close together. The undergrowth is light. Ground observation in the vicinity of the hamlet of DINH MON and the Royal Tombs is poor. At the time of the operation the scattered rice paddies were dry with the exception of a few low lying paddies. There is an adequate water supply in the area from several streams and the river that parallels the hamlet of PHON DINH MON.

b. Enemy. If there were any main force units in the area they must have withdrawn from the area prior to the arrival of friendly forces conducting the search and participating in the blocking force. Only minor VC cadre and VC hamlet guards were apprehended by the searching forces. One VC squad leader was captured. He had been wounded by a VC anti-personnel mine while trying to evade the searching forces.

c. Operations.

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(1) 302100H April Company Commander of Company H, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines was given a warning order to be prepared to conduct a Combined Search and Destroy Operation in the vicinity of YD 783114 on 2 May 1966.

(2) 011700H the helicopter strike leader, Company Commander and Platoon Commanders of Company H conducted an aerial recon of the objective area to determine an appropriate helicopter landing zone. (Company Commanders Comment: Three possible landing zones were observed and later discussed. Two were in close proximity of THON DINH MON (YD 785115) and the third was 300 meters north of THON DINH MON. The largest helicopter landing zone was along the eastern edge of the village. This zone was acceptable to the air commander but unacceptable to the ground commander. The northern landing zone which was situated in a hilly and in somewhat rough terrain was the first choice of the ground commander but was unacceptable to the air commander. The third landing zone was located at the northeastern edge of the THON DINH MON village. This zone was partly acceptable to both the air and ground commander. It was designated as the alternate landing zone. The landing zone located 300 meters north of THON DINH MON was designated as the primary landing zone. Since this landing zone was in fairly rugged terrain the helicopter strike leader was given the option of using the primary or alternate zone if upon close inspection during his approach, he determined that the primary zone was unsuitable. The primary landing zone was used for the landing, although only four or five H-34's could land in the zone at a time. The delay was minimal because the strike leader staggered his 14 aircraft into 4 plane divisions so that 4 aircraft were landing as four were departing the zone. The zone offered maximum protection to both the ground troops and aircraft as well as affording the ground commander the opportunity to launch his attack on the objective from key terrain. The first elements entered the LZ at 0735H. The lift was completed at 0755H. 168 men and their equipment (21 heliteams) were lifted by 14 aircraft.

(3) 020530H G-2-1 relieved H-2-1 of its lines in the vicinity of YD 895152 to YD 901138.

(4) 020640H H-2-1 departed its company area (YD 892140) by truck for the landing zone (YD 883132).

(5) 020705H H-2-1 arrived at the landing zone and boarded the aircraft.

(6) 020720H Helo lift commenced.

(7) 020735H the lead elements of H-2-1 landed in primary landing zone (YD 779119) with negative contact.

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(8) 020755H lift completed (21 lifts, 168 men with equipment).

(9) 020800H 2nd Platoon, Company H, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines (2-H) departed LZ enroute to Company Objective A in the vicinity of YD 777118. (Company Commanders Comment: Company Objective A was located west of the north edge of THON DINH MON. It offered some observation into the northern edge of THON DINH MON and a suitable jumping off point on the flank of THON DINH MON (Battalion Objective 1). The remaining two platoons were to attack the northern edge of Battalion Objective 1.

(10) 020810H 2-H received one round of small arms fire from the vicinity of YD 771119. 2-H was located at YD 775119. No casualties. 2-H continued on to company objective A (YD 777118) with negative contact. (Company Commanders Comment: This round was high and was probably not intended for 2-H).

(11) 020840H the 1st Platoon, Company H (1-H) and the 3rd Platoon, Company H (3-H) crossed the line of departure (YD 779119 - 780120) enroute to THON DINH MON. (Battalion Objective 1). (Company Commanders Comment: 2-H had not reached company objective A but it had masked the planned protective fires provided by 3-H. It was also advisable to displace the covering forces forwarded in case 2-H developed enemy contact.)

(12) 020845H 2-H secured company objective 1 and provided a covering force to cover 1-H and 3-H's movement to Battalion Objective 1.

(13) 020845H 2-H captured one viet cong in the vicinity of YD 788113. (Company Commanders Comment: The VC was unarmed and had been wounded by a VC anti-personnel mine. Subject VCC was given medical aid and questioned by members of the attached Counter Intelligence Team. CIT determined that the VCC was a VC squad leader because his name was on their black-list. The VCC furnished some intelligence information. He was evacuated for hospitalization and further interrogation but he died enroute).

(14) 020845H 1-H and 3-H entered the northern edge of Battalion Objective 1 with negative contact. (Company Commanders Comment: The terrain traversed by 1-H and 3-H was covered with dense foliage of bushes and vines approximately 14 feet tall. The squads had to proceed in column. Six separated squad columns were utilized.)

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(15) 020910H 1-H discovered one VC hand grenade employed as an anti-personnel mine on a trail in the vicinity of YD 779119. The mine was disarmed by attached engineers and later destroyed. (Company Commanders Comment: Enclosure (2) contains a description and method of employment of the mine).

(16) 020915H 3-H discovered one VC hand grenade employed as an anti-personnel mine on a trail in the vicinity of YD 778118. The anti-personnel mine was destroyed in place by attached engineers. (Company Commanders Comment). The mine was of the same type and employed in the same manner as that discovered by 1-H at 020910H. (See enclosure (2)).

(17) 020920H 1-H apprehended one male Vietnamese national, age 14, in the vicinity of YD 785116. (Company Commanders Comment: Subject was apprehended because upon questioning by CIT, it was determined he had valuable information. Subject was evacuated to the Battalion Collection Point for further interrogation.

(18) 021025H H-2-1 received Frag Order directing it to search and clear the vicinity of the Royal Tombs at YD 779104 upon securing objective 1. (See Footnote on page 8).

(19) 021030H 1-H apprehended two VC female cadre and 3 VCS in vicinity of YD 772115. (Company Commanders Comment: VC cadre were confirmed by CIT Blacklist. Subjects evacuated to Battalion Collection Point for further interrogation. Throughout this operation the Counter Intelligence Team with its Blacklist, which was very extensive, proved to be an extremely valuable aid in screening the villagers. This allowed selective apprehension thus preventing excessive use of helicopters, rapid initial screening and interrogation, and a minimum of harassment of the villagers yet permitting the apprehension of members of the VC infrastructure in the hamlet. The use of trained Counter Intelligence Personnel and Blacklists on search and clear operations cannot be over emphasized. The VCS apprehended had members of their family on the Blacklist. A total of 6 VCC and 7 VCS were apprehended using the CIT Blacklist on the operation.

(20) 021200H 1-H captured 3 VC confirmed by the CIT Blacklist in the vicinity of YD 788112. (Company Commanders Comment: It was initially believed that one of the VCC was the chairman of the national liberation front for THON DINH NON Hamlet but it was later determined he was his brother.).

(21) 021230H Battalion Objective 1 secured. (Company Commanders Comment: The principle trails of this hamlet ran at a right angle to the Company's axis of advance. These trails were approximately 100 yards apart and were used as limits of advance as the platoon searched and cleared each block of the hamlet. Many Vietnamese hamlets have a logical

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town plan. If the Company Commander has an uncontrolled mosaic (1:5000 scale) and stereo pairs he can determine the town plan, and plan his searching and clearing accordingly. The 3rd Counter Intelligence Team provided such a mosaic for this operation. The use of "Hand Held Photographs" taken by Marine Tactical Air Observers would have been an extremely valuable aid, if they were available, as they give very detailed information. There is no need to take new aerial photographs of built up areas as Division has old but still effective photo coverage of most of its area of operation.

(22) 021305H H-2-1 requested fixed wing attack aircraft on station by 1500H over YD 778104 armed with rockets and napalm. H-2-1 was informed aircraft requested would be on 15 minute strip alert at DaNang.

(23) 021330H H-2-1 crossed IP at YD 788106 enroute to the Royal Tombs (Battalion Final Objective) located at YD 778104.

(24) 021410H H-2-1 arrived at Company assembly area in vicinity of YD 782102 and conducted recon of objective area.

(25) 021420H H-2-1 order issued to cross the line of departure in the vicinity of YD 782102 at 021440H with one platoon up, two back.

(26) 021440H H-2-1 crossed line of departure enroute to the Battalion Final Objective.

(27) 021450H 3-H reached the Battalion Final Objective with negative contact.

(28) 021600H Battalion Objective secured with negative contact. H-2-1 departed for landing zone located at YD 781111.

(29) 021650H H-2-1 commenced withdrawal by helicopter to Battalion area.

(30) 021755H lift completed. Operation secured.

d. Personnel.

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(2) Friendly Casualties.

(a) Battalion Casualties. None.

(b) Non-Battle Casualties. 3 heat casualties.

1. All officers and staff non-commissioned officers and approximately 35% of the company were body armor (Upper Torso). Only one of the heat casualties was wearing body armor. Maximum use of local water treated with halazone prevented increased heat casualties. This reduced the use of helicopters for resupply of water and evacuation of heat casualties.

(3) Enemy casualties. 1 VC DOV.

(4) Discipline, Law and Order. No problems encountered.

(5) Captives. 6 VCC and 7 VCS.

(6) Burial and Graves Registration. None.

(7) Morale. There were indications of a rise in morale after the operation. This can more or less be attributed to the facts that the company had no battle casualties; the operation was short in duration; the troops were given free cold sodas upon completion of the operation; the pace and objectives of the operation were both reasonable and realistic; the area of Royal Tombs was interesting; the troops were given an opportunity to be relieved of the boredom of local area defense, and above all the troops were given the opportunity to get a good undisturbed nights sleep in their own racks in the company area.

e. Logistics. No logistics problems were encountered and there was no requirement for resupply of ammunition, rations, or water. Evacuation of captives, suspects and casualties was done by helicopter.

f. Communications. Three (3) PRC-25's were utilized for the external company communications. The PRC-25 provided excellent communications even with the tape antenna. Five (5) PRC-10's were used for internal company communications. The PRC-10's performed satisfactorily. Nine (9) PRC-6's were used for additional internal company communications.

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Two of the nine PRC-6's performed satisfactorily. The PRC-68 is an unsatisfactory piece of communications equipment.

g. Lessons Learned.

Item # 1. Utilization of Counter-Intelligence personnel.

Discussion. It was determined that the attaching of CI personnel to the search and destroy unit proved to be highly successful in expediting screenings of Vietnamese civilians encountered. By the use of Black and Gray lists the CI personnel were able to quickly determine the VC cadres, VC, and other known sympathizers from friendly civilians. This assistance aided the unit commander in conducting a more effective search.

Recommendation: That unit operations have CI personnel attached for future operations and that such personnel have an up dated Black and Gray List of suspected personnel located in the area of the planned operation.

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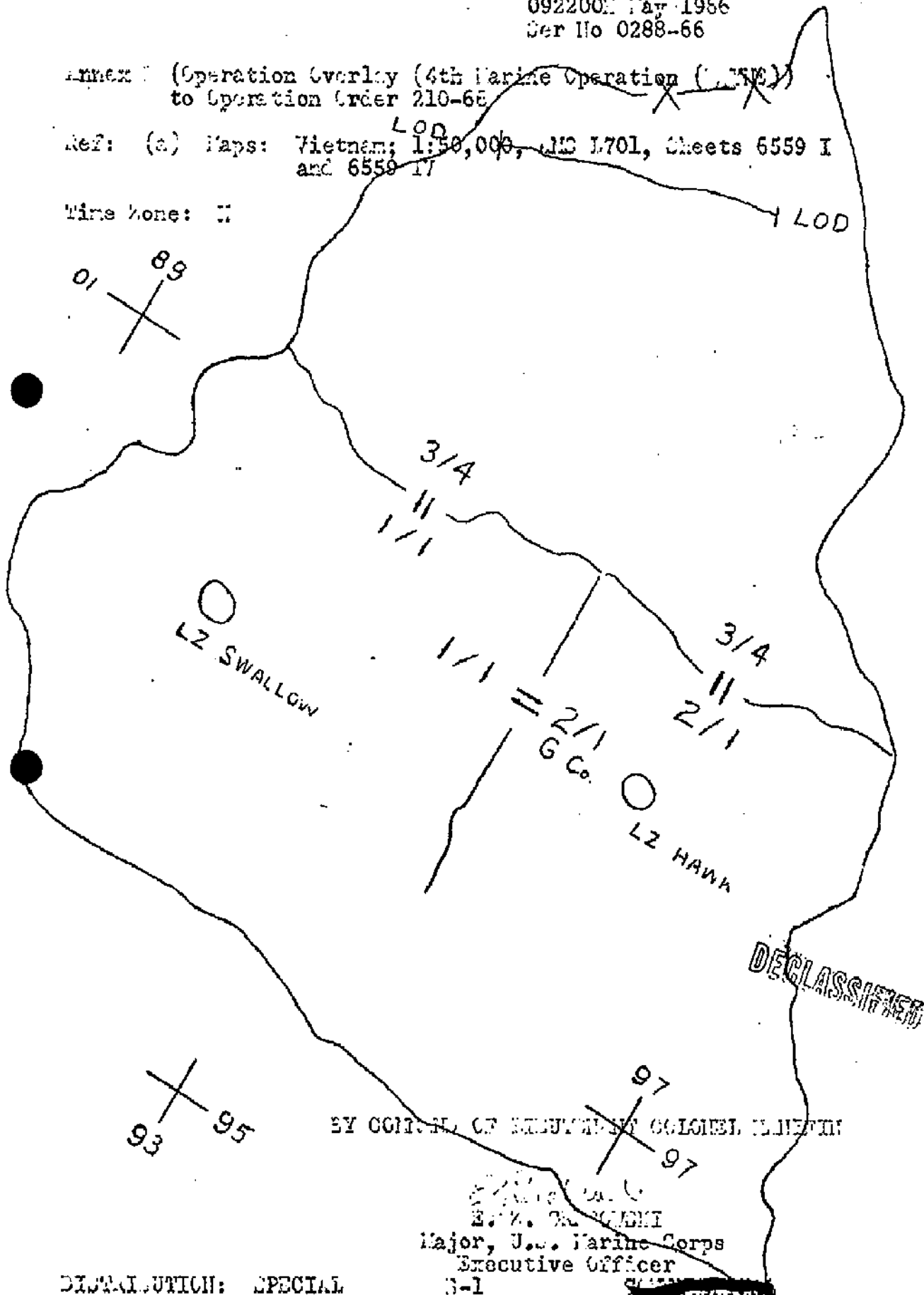

1. In accordance with reference (a) the following report is submitted on the subject operation.

(a) Intelligence.

(1) Terrain. The terrain in the operation area was dominated by a high hill mass running from east to west. This hill mass, with heights to 1048 meters, formed the southern boundary of the operation area. Immediately to the north another hill mass running east to west marked the northern boundary of the company's operation area. This hill mass ran to 224 meters in height. Between these two hill masses a narrow valley runs east to west. The eastern end of the valley is blocked by the SONG TROUI River while the western end terminates at National Route 14,

(2) Vegetation. Vegetation over 90% of the area is secondary jungle with canopy up to 70 feet. This canopy existed in the valley and on both hill masses forming the southern and northern boundaries. Vegetation at the eastern and western ends of the valley consisted chiefly of dense elephant grass from 2 to 12 feet in height. Small trees and bushes were interspersed in the grassy area.

(3) Drainage. Many streams flowed from the hills into the valley from both north and south. These streams flowed into two major streams, one at each end of valley. All streams were fordable at almost any point.

(4) Movement. Movement in this area was restricted to existing trails and stream beds. Movement from east to west was possible following alternating trails and stream beds with a minimum of off trail movement. Movement off of trails and stream beds was extremely difficult

(5) Cover and Concealment. Cover was excellent except in areas where elephant grass abounded. Concealment was excellent throughout the entire area.

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(b) Enemy. See enclosure (1) (Operation Order) for original situation. During the entire operation no enemy contact was made by this company, however, evidence was found that indicated habitation of the operation area (camp fires, huts, and head facilities).

(c) Operations.

(1) At 091300H May, Company Commander of Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines was given a warning order to be prepared to act as a blocking force in the vicinity of YD 955997 for a two battalion search and destroy operation.

(2) At 091330H, Executive Officer, Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines made a helo recon of landing zone H&K in the vicinity of YD 955997.

(3) 101020H, commenced helicopter lift.

(4) 101030H, leading elements of Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines arrived in landing zone H&K.

(5) 101045H, helicopter lift completed. Lift took 18 aircraft for 182 men and equipment.

(6) After a visual reconnaissance, a blocking position was selected at YD 964997.

(7) 101100H, commenced movement to blocking position.

(8) 101515H, arrived at blocking position. Movement was extremely difficult due to dense elephant grass 8 to 12 feet in height.

(9) Set up blocking force with two platoons across the valley and positioned on high ground on southern side of the valley. One platoon was held in reserve and protected the blocking force rear. One section of 81mm mortars and 2 60mm mortars were set up to deliver fires in the valley and on the high ground to the west. Defensive fires by artillery were plotted and H&A fires were fired at selected coordinates beginning at 101800H. Six M8A1 "Claymore" AP mines were positioned in front of the blocking force. Two listening posts were established from 101930H to 110630H. At 110700H a squad size patrol was dispatched to patrol the area 1000 yards west of the blocking force.

(10) Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines remained in blocking position until 111000H when orders were received from Commanding Officer, 4th Marine Regiment to displace to new blocking position at YD 949001.

(11) 111035H, commenced move to new blocking position.

(12) 111315H, arrived at new blocking position and commenced positioning.

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(13) 111400H, OpCon of Company G, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines transferred from Commanding Officer, 4th Marines to Commanding Officer, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines. Received order from S-3 1st Battalion, 1st Marines to follow in trace of Company A, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines and move west to National Route 14.

(14) 111615H, made contact with Company A, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines at YD 994000.

(15) 111630H, commenced move west along valley.

(16) 111930H, received word from S-3, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines to hold present position for night and continue west in morning. Held position at YD 918996. Set up defense and remained until 120700H.

(17) 120700H, resumed movement to 1st Battalion, 1st Marines CP vicinity of YD 897610.

(18) 120815H, arrived at 1st Battalion, 1st Marines CP area and received instructions to disperse company vicinity YD 897008 to await transportation to return to 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines CP.

(19) 121124H, truck convoy arrived and company embarked on 7 trucks for return to 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines.

(20) 121150H departed 1st Battalion, 1st Marines CP.

(21) 121230H arrived at Company G area.

(22) 121230H OpCon Company G reverted to Commanding Officer, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines. Company G secured from operation.

(2) Friendly Casualties.

(c) Logistics. No problems were encountered although no resupply was effected during the operation. Maximum use of local water and water purification tablets made resupply of water unnecessary.

(f) Communications. Two AN/PRC-25 radios were used by the company for internal and external communications. The AN/PRC-25 provided excellent communication with tape antennas. Three AN/PRC-10 radios were used by the company, one with each platoon, which proved to be satisfactory. Six AN/PRC-6's were available for additional internal communications. In addition, one AN/PRC-10 was used by the Helicopter Support Team (HST), one AN/PRC-9 by the Artillery Forward Observer (FO) Team and one AN/PRC-41 and one AN/PRC-47 were used by Forward Air Controller (FAC) Team.

(g) Lessons Learned.

Item #1. Utilization of 81mm mortars in jungle or heavy canopy.

Discussion. Once units begin to operate under heavy canopy the effectiveness of attached 81mm mortars was reduced considerably; in addition, movement of the unit was greatly impeded by the mortar section, which had difficulty moving through heavy underbrush.

Recommendation. That 81mm mortars not be attached to units operating under a heavy canopy and that rifle companies rely on 60mm mortars to provide support when necessary and where canopy permits their employment.

2. The capability to use Counter-Mortar Radar (CMR) as an integral part in the defense of the HUE PHU BAI Vital Area was lost on 20 May 1966, with the transfer of CMR to DANANG. At present it is not anticipated that a CMR capability will be returned to this area.

3. Periodic searches of the area within 120mm mortar range of the Vital Area is considered essential. Requests to conduct security operations in those areas shown in Enclosure (1) of the basic letter are to be forwarded to this Headquarters for clearance.

4. The concept of planning a counter-mortar observation post in the airfield control tower during the hours of darkness is considered practical and should be pursued.

1. Reference (a) directs attention to the threat and vulnerability of the vital area to mortar attacks and offers recommendations to counter this threat.
2. In view of the above guidance it is requested that an artillery counter fire battery be designated to work in conjunction with the Counter Mortar Radar (CMR) on a permanent basis and that this capability be placed under the OpCon of the Vital Area Coordinator. It is further requested that authorization be granted to allow periodic searches of the area which is within the 120mm mortar range band, but, beyond the limits of the combat base as indicated on enclosure (1).
3. The recommendations pertaining to OP's, reaction force, patrolling and illumination is being implemented daily except for the area of search beyond the limits of the HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base. It is further anticipated that a sentry for counter mortar observation can best be utilized if he is authorized to take his post in the airfield control tower during the hours of darkness. This is being negotiated at the present time.
4. These are measures intended to obtain immediate reaction to mortar attacks on the HUE-PHU BAI Combat Base and its vital installations. It is requested that the above be approved.

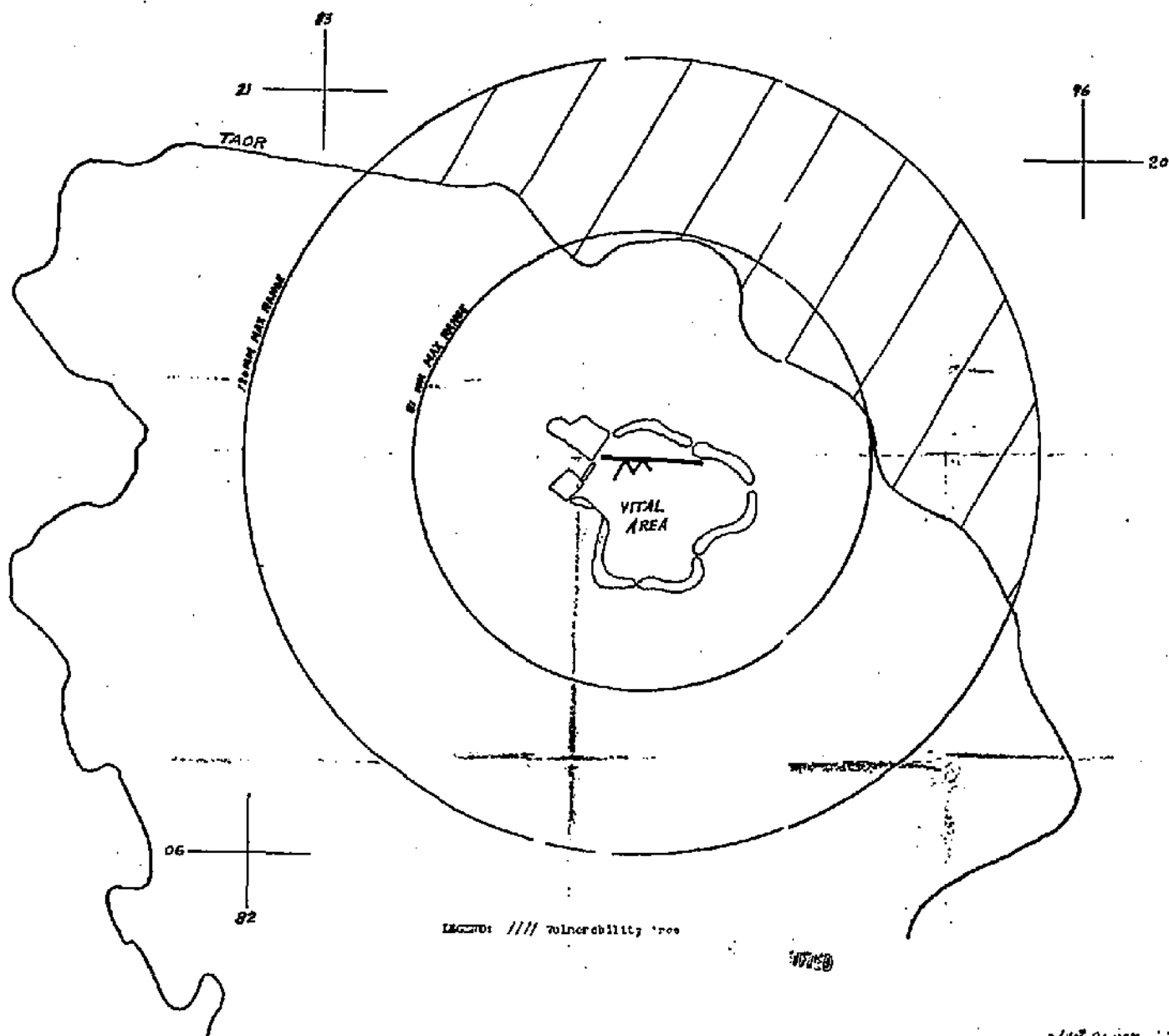



## 1. SUMMARY OF ENEMY SITUATION

### a. Characteristics of the Area of Operation

- (1) The area of operation is bounded in the east by the SONG BO River, in the south by the piedmont, in the west by the SONG Q LAC River, and in the north by National Route #1. The area is characterized by low rolling hills and large rice paddies. These hills rising to a maximum of 50 meters, extending from Route #1 for approximately 300 meters. The rice paddies extend for 500 meters to where the terrain rises abruptly into the piedmont to the south. The main access route into the area is the dirt road which runs southwest from Route #1 through the hills to the vicinity of YD 486275 where it then turns northeast and southeast through the rice paddies to the SONG BO River. Bad weather has an adverse effect on the terrain. Trafficability for tracked and wheeled vehicles becomes difficult to impossible. Poor drainage causes the water to stand in pools and the paddies from 6 inches to 3 feet. The marshes along the rivers and the piedmont become impassable filling from 4 to 6 feet. The rivers swell and become unfordable natural obstacles forcing channelization along narrow access routes. Good weather improves the terrain rapidly, however the paddies and marshes are slow to drain. Critical terrain features are Hill 51 (YD 549281) and the first ridgeline of the piedmont (YD 519245 to YD 600235). From these features it is possible to observe the entire area of operations. The most dangerous avenue of approach into the area of operation are three river draws that cut the first ridgeline of the piedmont (YD 518249, YD 545237 and YD 567232). The VC have used these routes of access in some of their most recent attacks.

- b. Composition. Enemy units known to have been operating in the area of operation during the past 60 day period consist of the

B-1

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800th Main Force Battalion and the PHONG DIEN Local Force armed Unit (C-113). The GUAN DIEN Local Force Armed Unit (C-114) has been working in conjunction with C-113 unit in the area of operations.

c. Strength and Combat Efficiency.

- (1) It is estimated that the strength of the enemy units in the area of operation is between 75% and 90% of TO. The 800th Battalion strength was between 400-500; the local units strength was 80-100. Casualties and sickness have taken an unknown number during the past months.
- (2) The combat efficiency of both the 800th and the Local units is estimated to be very good. Previous jungle training, operations in the piedmont, combined with a knowledge of the CO BI THANH TAN area, will probable offset the "green" replacements that have infiltrated in from North Vietnam during the past few months.

d. Arms and armament. In addition to the individual weapons, consisting of an assortment of foreign made bolt action, semi-automatic and automatic rifles, the armament of 2-57mmRR, 2-81mm and 6-60mm mortars, 2 LMGs, 9 HMGs and 6 340AT weapons may be encountered. As indicated during the past few attacks, munition of all types appears to be in abundance.

e. Recent and Present Activities. Recent activities in the CO BI THANH TAN area consisted of operations to secure the rice harvest and establish the political, economic and military cadre within the local hamlets. The most recent contacts includes units up to company size moving out of the piedmont under the cover of darkness and attacking in the lowlands, withdrawing back to the piedmont prior to first light. During the past 25 days, VC units concentrated their major effort in two main locations. One in the north of the area of operations (LSA installation at YD 550322) and the second in the southern part near YD 548266 (Co "C", 1/4 CP).

f. Reinforcements. The following Main Force battalions have the capability of reinforcing present units in the area of operations within a 24-48 hour time period:

806th (K-6) strength of 400-450, operating in the piedmont to the west,

802nd (K-2), strength of 350-400, operating area YD 6319.

812th, strength 350, operating in the piedmont to the northwest.

808th, strength of 400, operating in the piedmont to the southwest.

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## Capabilities

### (1) Enumeration

- (a) Attack at any time and at any place with up to regimental strength.
- (b) Attack at any time and at any place with forces available.
- (c) Defend with forces available.
- (d) Withdraw from the area of operations leaving behind small sniper elements to cover the withdrawal of the main body.
- (e) Withdraw from the area of operations prior to movement by friendly forces into the area of operations.
- (f) Employ mines and/or booby traps extensively at any time throughout the area of operations.

### (2) Discussion

- (a) The enemy knowledge of the terrain, superiority in forces, covered routes of access and egress into the area of operations and lucrative targets favor this capability. However, the massing of troops necessary for such an attack make security extremely difficult therefore exposing the enemy to combined supporting arms.
- (b) The enemy's knowledge of the terrain, covered routes of access and egress into the area of operations, lucrative targets, and past tactics favor this capability. However, inferiority in forces and exposure to supporting arms do not favor this capability.
- (c) The terrain favors the defense because of limited routes of access into the area of operations, however, in the defense the enemy is exposed to supporting arms.
- (d) Prior tactics used by the enemy favor the employment of this capability. In addition the enemy is able to inflict maximum casualties while avoiding major contact and with it, the use of supporting arms.
- (e) Prior tactics used by the enemy favor the employment of this capability as he avoids contact with a superior force and its supporting arms.
- (f) Prior tactics used by the enemy favor the employment of this capability as he can inflict maximum casualties while avoiding any contact.

### (3) Conclusion

- (a) The enemy will employ in order of probability capabilities (c), (d), (b), (e), and (a). He can employ capability (f) at any time.
- (b) The employment of capabilities (b) through (f) will not effect the mission of the Battalion, however, if the enemy employs capability (a), extensive reinforcements will be required.

- a. Determine the strength, location, identification, composition, and organization of VC Main Force, Local Force, Regional and Paramilitary forces that are operating in the area of operation.
- b. Determine if the VC will attack the CO BI THANH TAN area. If so, when, in what strength, with what forces and from what direction?
- c. Determine the VC routes of access into and/or across from the area of operations. How often do the VC deviate from established routes and time of movement (during hours of daylight and darkness)?
- d. To what extent will mines and/or booby traps be employed by the VC? If used, what type and how employed?
- e. Determine the type(s), locations number and method of employment of enemy mortar/artillery/anti-tank/antiaircraft weapons within range of friendly units in the area of operations.
- f. Determine the locations of VC supply points, harboring sites, caches (weapons, equipment, rice, etc.), tunnel networks, assembly areas, and fortified hamlets in the area of operations.
- g. To what extent has the local populace supported the VC and his activities in the area of operations?
- h. Determine the navigability of existing streams and rivers. To what extent do the VC utilize this means of transportation, especially during the hours of darkness?
- i. Determine if the VC will defend against USMC operations. If so, in what area(s), and to what extent?

3. RECONNAISSANCE AND OBSERVATION MISSIONS

a. Orders to subordinate units

- (1) Report as obtained, information answering any of the EELs.
- (2) The SPOT REPORT method of reporting will be used.
