ENCLOSURE (1)

A. PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

1. Awards

During this reporting period twenty four Vietnamese Crosses of Gallantry with Silver and Bronze Stars were received for Marines of this Battalion. Twelve will be presented to Marines who remain in the Battalion. The remainder have been forwarded to their parent commands. In addition to the above awards, two Bronze Star Medals are on hand for presentation. All of the awards are for periods of service when this Battalion was a member of the Special Landing Force. Five end-of-tour awards have been submitted during this period. Major General YOUNGDALE presented a Bronze Star Medal to a hospitalized Marine at Naval Support Activity Hospital, Danang.

2. Legal and Discipline

During this reporting period, five investigations were completed. Six Special and Four Summary Court Martials were completed. There are three Special Courts-Martial pending. There were thirteen Battalion Commander, and Five Company Commander Non Judicial Punishments for the reporting period.

3. Postal

Mail is being received regularly and delivered to all personnel. There was an entire day period while the Battalion was engaged in an operation that Package Mail was not delivered because of the moving situation. Letter mail was delivered during the operation. It is noted that Kilo Company has been separated from the Battalion for the entire period, but their mail is delivered on a timely basis.

4. R&R Quotas

During this month, the problems with personnel departing on R&R were minor. Quotas received were 72; which was much less than those received during the previous period. This was a result of the reduction in strength from BLT size.

5. Promotions

Promotions to Corporal and Lance Corporal continued to be wide open. There were 72 Corporal and 125 Lance Corporal vacancies available. Most all quotas allocated to the companies were filled. There was one Meritorious Combat promotion to Corporal; which was presented by Major General YOUNGDALE, Commanding General, 1st Marine Division. In addition there was one meritorious promotion to Gunnery Sergeant.



## 6. Pay and Allowances

Personnel continued to receive special payments upon transfer and when departing on R&R. The only problem noted was transportation to and from disbursing.

## 7. Post Exchange

Post exchange facilities are satisfactory within the Battalion Command Post. Mobile exchanges were on limited basis because of operational commitments. Sundry Packages were made available to all companies.

## 9. Religious services

### (a) Divine Services

During this period there were ten Sunday and six weekday services held by the Battalion Chaplain. Attendance at these services was 191 on Sunday and 145 on the weekday services. It is noted that the Battalion Chaplain was transferred on 25 July 1968, and the Battalion was without a Chaplain for the remainder of the reporting period.

### (b) Personal Response

The Battalion Chaplain made forty three visits to sick Marines of this Battalion. These were visited at the Naval Support Activity Danang and 1st Hospital Company.

### (c) Counseling

The chaplain held twenty two counseling sessions prior to his transfer.

### (d) Liaison

Liaison was continued by this Battalion with neighboring units and with Regiment, to provide services for Marines in the field as well as in the Battalion Command Post.

## B. INTELLIGENCE

During the period 12-23 July, S-2 personnel continued participation in Operation Mameluke Thrust. A total of 7 Kit Carson Scouts and 2 ARVN interpreters were utilized during the operation. Three Kit Carson Scouts were wounded in action.

One regimental scout and one Kit Carson Scout were attached by 7th Marines Regiment to 3/1 for the duration of the operation. Also attached was one 2-man psyops team with portable broadcast equipment.

Initial interrogation of detainees and translation of captured documents for tactical information was accomplished in the field prior to evacuation to the collection center established at S-2, 7th Marine Regiment. Both the Kit Carson Scouts and ARVN interpreters performed exceptionally well during the operation.

Upon return to the battalion area after completion of the operation, a conference was held by the S-2 with all battalion scouts and Kit Carson Scouts during which a critique of the operation was held. Two Kit Carson Scouts were assigned to India, Lima, and Mike companies on a permanent basis and participated in normal company patrol activities.

S-2 continued work on developing local intelligence sources to provide early warning on enemy movement and activities. A daily intelligence summary was published and distributed to all nearby commands. S-2 continued supervision of the rewards funds programs during the reporting period \$2300 VN was paid as rewards to Vietnamese nationals.

## C. OPERATIONS

### 1. Disposition Of Forces

The Battalion continued to perform its primary mission of providing defense for the Danang TAOR through extensive patrolling activities. During this period 1008 small unit combat patrols were run, 542 of which were at night and each involved one or more ambushes. Initial disposition of forces was; Co I at Nam O Bridge (AT931838) and the Esso Gasoline Storage Plant (AT 892622); Co K (Rear) at Dai La Pass (AT 938752); and Co L at Hill 190 (AT 892622). Company K was OPCON to 7th Marines and Company M was OPCON to 3rd Bn, 7th Marines. Company M was CHOPPED OPCON back to 3/1 at 111400H and relieved Co I at Nam O Bridge and the Esso Plant. At the same time OPCON was assumed of Co M 3/7. At 121030H OPCON was assumed of Co B 1/7. These two companies augmented the Battalion for its part in "Operation Mameluke Thrust." Both companies CHOPPED OPCON back to their parent units at 231600H. [REDACTED] OPCON was assumed over Co I 3/5 for patrol activities [REDACTED] Belt. During the entire period Co K was OPCON to 7th Marines.

## 2. Training.

The Battalion conducted the following training during this period.

(a) A formal Orientation/Indoctrination program was conducted for 297 personnel. Lectures were presented by the Battalion Commander, all Staff Sections, Supply Officer, Air Liaison Officer, Artillery Liaison Officer, Medical Officer, Chaplain and Communications Officer. Special emphasis was placed on orders which govern the actions of the individual Marine, the Personal Response Program, the conditions in the AO under which Marines will serve, and the goals and missions of this Battalion. One full day of training was devoted to care and cleaning, safety features, familiarization firing, and zeroing of the M16A1 Rifle.

(b) The Division NCO School conducted 60mm mortar live-fire exercises on 12 and 26 July at Hill 190.

(c) The 1st Engineer Bn. Land Mine and Booby Trap Warfare Course provided 3-day courses for 52 replacements.

(d) Quotas were received and filled for formal training in Okinawa and in-country schools. This training includes the following.

(e) The Battalion weekly training schedule was published and followed during this period, (see Part IV)

(f) The Division Schools Mobile Training Team conducted three days of training for the Battalion.

### 3. TACTICAL OPERATIONS.

Artillery missions for the period were confined primarily to non-observed fires on either acquired targets (intelligence readouts from sensory devices, etc.) or harassment and interdiction targets on likely areas of enemy activity. Round expenditures were as follows:

In addition to the above list, naval gunfire and reinforcing artillery on occasion fired acquired and interdiction targets for which we have no accurate record of expenditures. Not included is the artillery support of Operation Mamaluke Thrust (See Part IV "After Action Report.")

### 5. AIR SUPPORT/DEFENSE

#### (a) Fixed Wing

Flare ships were used on two occasions, and provided excellent support. Sixty-five TPO-10 missions were dropped by fixed wing aircraft on suspected enemy positions. AO's were used on numerous occasions to check out suspected enemy positions and rocket sites in the Elephant Valley Area.

#### (b) Helicopter Support

Helicopter support for the Battalion consisted of the following for the period. Resupply missions were carried out for companies in the field and "K" company at Thuong Duc by CH-46 aircraft.

These resupply missions were sometimes delayed by poor aircraft availability. There was also a weekly resupply of our positions on Radio Hill. One troop lift was accomplished by CH-53 aircraft. Medevacs were dragged through Da Nang DCS and were carried out promptly according to their priority.

#### D. LOGISTICS.

1. Engineer assistance and other construction. During this reporting period two Engineer Assistance Requests were completed. The COC Bunker was repaired and the road between the Battalion Command Post and Hill 190 is now oiled every two weeks. A new ammunition revetment was dug as recommended by Division Ordnance. A new hardback building with cement deck is presently being constructed. This building will house battalion supply's operational stock.

#### 2. Supply

(a) During this reporting period there was no significant problem in obtaining Class I, III, IV and V supplies. A serious problem obtaining Class II repair parts for the truck platform M-274A2 has been encountered. Long lead times have necessitated priority O2 walk-through requisitions.

(b) While the Battalion was participating on Operation Mameluke Thrust from 12-24 July, an LSA located at the 7th Marines Command Post (Hill 55) supported the battalion with all classes of supplies. Resupply was accomplished by helicopter.

**B CIVIL AFFAIRS/PSYCHOLOGICAL WARFARE**

1. Projects under current construction consist of periodic inspection of progress made in completing refugee hamlet at Nam My, Hoa Lac (AT898817). The project is now approximately 70% completed.

2. MEDCAP activities totaled 633 civilians treated. Weekly MEDCAPS were held at Nam My refugee hamlet, and at Kim Lien Village (AT910923). In addition, three civilians were medevaced by battalion personnel for treatment at hospitals in the DaNang area. In co-ordination with the Battalion Aid Station, a nurse training program was initiated for local Vietnamese girls. The trainees are taught personnel hygiene, basic first aid, and are familiarized with the uses of a variety of local drugs and medications. The newly trained nurses were given on-the-job training during recent MEDCAPS, and proved to be an asset to the BAS staff.

3. PsyOps activities included 62 requested leaflet air sorties. Hand distribution of leaflets totalled 20,495 for the month. Movies were shown at Kim Lien for a total of 6 hours, and the PsyOps broadcast teams were utilized for a total of 6 hours. The themes of the Psychological Operations for the month were "Americans are Friends," and "Chieu Hoi."

**F COMBINED ACTION COMPANY**

CAPS 216, 275, 281, 282, 283, and 284, and the headquarters of CAC 2-8 are located within the Battalion AO. The Battalion coordinated its activities during this period with CAP activities to insure maximum patrol coverage. The Battalion provided reaction/reinforcing units to assist and exploit CAP contacts and intelligence reports. The Battalion also provided class I, III and V logistical support.

**G COMMUNICATIONS/ELECTRONICS.**

1. Personnel As of 31 July 1968 The Communications Platoon has one officer and 67 enlisted on its rolls.

2. Equipment

(a) As of 31 July 1968 all T/E Communications equipment was on hand or on order.

(b) At the present time 1 AN/GCG-3 has been deadlined in excess of 30 days. Equipment has been evacuated to Okinawa. The deadlining of this equipment greatly impairs the over all efficient operation of the Message Center.

(c) The Battalion at present is short 3 radio sets AN/PRC25

- (d) Tape antennas with bases remain in short supply.
3. MESSAGE CENTER The Message Center processed 53 outgoing messages and 1034 incoming messages during July.
  4. OPERATIONS/TRAINING
    - (a) Operations The Battalion participated in "Mamaluke Thrust."
    - (b) Training The Communications Platoon conducted training on the following subjects:  
Code Practice, Radio Telephone Procedures, Antenna siting, Message Handling. In addition, BAS conducted a class in treatment for electrical shock; artificial respiration. A class was held on supply procedures, use of SC's and Technical manuals.
  5. SUPPORT
    - (a) An engineer maintenance man from FSR was assigned on TAD orders to Nam O Bridge to train generator operators.
    - (b) Seventh Marine Regiment conducted a technical inspection on 26 July. Results were generally satisfactory with the exception of P.M. of wet cell batteries. Remedial action has been taken on all discrepancies noted.

#### H. MEDICAL/DENTAL AFFAIRS

1. PERSONNEL
  - (a) On 31 July total strength was 01 Medical Officer and 50 Corpsmen. Of the total 03 Corpsmen remained on the sick list of other commands. During this period 03 Corpsmen and 01 Medical Officer were transferred to other commands and 19 Corpsmen reported aboard for duty. There were 02 Corpsmen WIA for the period.
2. PATIENT LOAD
  - (a) For this period 647 patients were seen at BAS sick call for an average of 21 patients a day.
3. MEDCAP/DENTCAP
  - (a) Medical aid was given to 390 Vietnamese civilians within the TAOR.
  - (b) There was no DENTCAP.
4. SANITATION
  - (a) Water and refrigeration needs at the Hill 190 and Esso Plant/Nam O Bridge areas are the main problem. Overall the sanitation within the TAOR has greatly improved within the last week of the reporting period.

151515H. M 3/7, OPCON to 3/1, found one 40 lb. box mine at AT 878827.

181020H. A truck carrying 1/5 personnel from Hill 190 hit a mine at AT 898815 resulting in 15 WIA medevacs. At 1330, a wrecker moving to pick up the damaged truck struck a second mine resulting in 2 WIA medevacs.

200750H. Mine sweep found one 15 lb box mine in the road at AT901805.

212205H. CAP 283 ambush at AT903806 took under fire a force of approximately 130 NVA/VC. Called in 81mm mortar and artillery missions and AC-47 gunship. Reaction forces from Hill 190 searched area and found 5 NVA KIA, 2 POWs, one AK-47, 2 B40 RL's and miscellaneous equipment. There were no friendly casualties.

220900H. A patrol from B 1/7 detonated a grenade booby trap at AT 895817 resulting in 2 WIA medevacs.

230100H. FLC received 18-24 rockets of unknown caliber. Hill 190 received 26 rounds of incoming mortar fire resulting in 3 WIA medevacs. Fired counter mortar and counter rocket fires at grids AT 885835 and 872829 and grid squares 8687, 8477. At 1335, a platoon from B 1/7 was lifted into AT 843773 and found 4 NVA KIA at rocket site.

241916H. FLC received 6 rockets. Fired counter rocket fire at AT 858803.

262100H. CAP 284 ambush at AT916835 took approximately 6 VC under fire resulting in one VC/NVA KIA(confirmed) and the capture of one VZ-58 assault rifle.

272250H. L 3/1 ambush at AT 899824 observed and killed one VC and re-captured one M-16 rifle.

282140H. CAP 275 had one grenade thrown at psy ops movie team resulting in one USMC WIA and one civilian wounded.

(a) CAS - 3/1 used 57 two plane flights consisting of Marine A-4's, Marine F-4B's, and Air Force F4C's. Types of ordnance expended are as follows:

Approx 200, 500lb high drag bombs  
Approx 160, 500lb low drag bombs (point detonation and fuse delay)  
Approx 70, 5 in. Zuni Rockets  
Approx 120, 500lb napalm  
Thousands of rounds from 20mm cannon and gun pods.

Air strikes were run as objective preps and also on targets of opportunity. CAS was used to silence AA positions which had fired on helicopters working in support of the operation. During these strikes, eight enemy KLAS were observed. CAS availability was outstanding on this operation and quick response was provided.

(b) AO's - 3/1 made extensive use of approximately 29 AO's in "O-1", "O-2" and "OV-10A" aircraft. The AO's were very useful in running CAS and observing enemy movement and positions. During the operation availability was excellent and AO's were used every day in the field.

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(b) AC-47 Gunships were used on two occasions at night to suppress enemy movement and provided excellent support.

(2) Helicopter

(a) Helicopter support was primarily confined to medevacs and resupply. On several instances the medevac escorts gave assistance to the ground forces. Hue Gunships were used to suppress sniper fire on one (1) occasion. Medevac reaction time was satisfactory and the overall support provided was very good.

b. Artillery

(1) During the operation both direct support and reinforcing artillery were utilized. Extensive prep fires and H&I's were employed. Contact missions were primarily used against sniper fire with occasional missions on larger enemy forces. The following batteries fired in support of the operation:

c. 81mm Mortars

(1) Two Sections of 81mm mortars accompanied 3/1 on this operation and were employed as a 4 gun battery in general support of the battalion. 624 rounds were expended on prep fires and contact missions. The battery shifted firing positions on three occasions to better support the current scheme of maneuver.

d. Tanks

(1) One section of tanks from "C" Co, 1st Tank Battalion was in support of this operation. However, due to the frequent mechanical difficulties encountered, they were able to provide only limited support.

V. Intelligence

(a) Enemy Strength and Capabilities Prior to the Operation

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(1) The operation was conducted in two separate operational areas, each with a substantially different enemy situation. The first phase of the operation, conducted from 13 - 16 July, was centered in an operational area northeast of An Hoa. Enemy forces in this area were believed to consist of 1 NVA battalion plus local VC forces of company strength. The enemy in company strength had previously attacked a combined outpost manned by a platoon from "K" Co, 3/7 and a Regional Force Company located at AT 908503. During this attack the enemy sustained 19 KIA. The enemy was known to be armed with conventional small arms and automatic weapons, 82mm and 60mm mortars, heavy machineguns used in an antiaircraft role, and RPG rocket launchers. Extensive enemy use of mines and surprise firing devices on likely avenues of approach was expected.

(2) The second phase of the operation was conducted in the "Dodge City" area south of the 7th Marine Regimental Headquarters on Hill 55. The operational area was a known enemy staging and transit area. An operation conducted by 3/26 had concluded four days prior to the commencement of the second phase of our operation. Overall light enemy contact had been reported; however, 3/26 had reported that the area was honeycombed with extremely well fortified bunkers, trenches, and fighting holes. Overall enemy strength in the AO was not known. The enemy was known to make extensive use of hidden snipers and to attempt to evade superior friendly forces by hiding underground in concealed holes until friendly forces had passed through the area. Enemy use of mines and surprise firing devices was expected to be initially light, increasing in intensity after the enemy believed he had determined the direction of friendly operations. The enemy was known to use automatic weapons and conventional small arms in an antiaircraft role, particularly against helicopters.

(b) Enemy Strength & Capabilities during the Operation

(1) During the first phase of the operation, enemy contact was limited to isolated small unit actions. The enemy made extensive use of antipersonnel mines and surprise firing devices. Information obtained from 2 VC's taken during this phase of the operation indicated that the enemy had warned the local people to stay clear of hilltops, ridges, and other high points in the area as they were all heavily boobytrapped. One VC stated that an NVA force of approximately 100 men had moved north across the river in the vicinity of AT 890518 when friendly airstrikes had been conducted in the operational area.

(2) During the second phase of the operation, enemy contact was limited to small unit actions and extensive enemy employment of hidden snipers. Enemy employment of AP mines and surprise firing devices was light throughout. The enemy attempted to evade contact with friendly forces and engaged only when forced to do so, with the exception of sniper fire. The area was found to contain extensive enemy bunkers, trench lines, and fighting holes. The majority of the enemy positions found were several months old with little evidence of new construction activity. The enemy continued the tactic of firing on aircraft at every opportunity, particularly at helicopters. Generally utilizing small arms in an antiaircraft role, his fires were ineffective throughout the operation.

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c. Terrain

(1) The terrain in the operational area during the first phase of the operation was characterized by large cultivated rice areas, heavy treelines around hamlets, and some gently rolling hills not exceeding 20 meters in height. Movement by foot was generally unimpeded by terrain or obstacles. Movement by wheeled or tracked vehicles in most areas was impracticable except on traveled roads.

(2) The terrain in the operational area during the second phase of the operation was generally flat. The only significant obstacle to movement by foot was streams. The most prominent terrain feature in the area was the old railroad bed. The bed was generally well elevated above the surrounding terrain, afforded good observation, and served as an excellent orientation feature for navigational purposes. Most of the areas that appeared on the map as cultivated rice land are now overgrown with savannah grass two to four feet in height. Areas that appeared on the map as inhabited areas are now largely ruins. Heavy treelines still exist around formerly inhabited hamlets, with large open areas in between that offer poor cover and concealment.

d. Weather

(1) Weather was an important factor in that the combination of high humidity and high temperatures was a causative factor in producing a number of heat casualties, particularly in the first phase of the operation. A slower than normal tempo of operations during the mid-afternoon was necessary to minimize the number of heat casualties. High consumption of drinking water made water resupply critical.

Unlimited visibility during daylight hours was a definite asset for fixed and rotary wing air support. No scheduled air operations were cancelled due to adverse weather conditions.

8. Mission

a. To commence wide range operation in the An Hoa Basin to find, fix and destroy enemy forces, supplies, and equipment.

b. To continue the attack in the Dodge City area.

c. To maintain security and normal patrolling activities within assigned AO with two rifle companies and elements of H&S Company.

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9. Concept of Operations

a. The concept of operations was to search out assigned objectives throughout the designated areas. When the objectives were secured, company sized units were deployed into likely areas of enemy activity in an attempt to make contact. Detailed search and destroy procedures were employed. Upon encountering a significant force, the unit would maintain the contact so that all other necessary forces could be committed to destroy the enemy. Extensive night ambushes and patrolling activities were employed, and all bunkers and trenchlines uncovered were destroyed.

10. Execution

a. On 10 and 11 July 1968 planning was carried out in preparation for this battalion's participation in Operation "Mamaluks Thrust". At 111400H OPCON of Co B, 1st Bn, 7th Marines and Co. M, 3rd Bn, 7th Marines was passed to 3/1. Company M, 3/7 moved to Hill 190 to relieve Company L, 3/1 so that Company L, 3/1 could move south to participate in Phase I of the operation.

b. Beginning at 120730, Company B, 1/7 was lifted by CH 53 to An Hoa, followed by Company L, 3/1, Company I, 3/1, and the CP Group. The troop lift to An Hoa was completed at 121425.

c. Final preparations were made at An Hoa and at 130400 the battalion moved out in the attack from An Hoa to the north.

d. 13 July 1968

(1) 130810H, Company L, 3/1 found and destroyed one bunker 4'X3'X3', constructed of wood and dirt at AT 888484.

(2) 130840H, Company B, 1/7 found and destroyed a complex of 4 tunnels at AT 892488.

(3) 130935H, Company B, 1/7 at AT 893492 received 4 or 5 burst of small arms fire. An 81mm mortar mission was called and the area searched with no evidence of enemy casualties.

(4) 131045H, Company L, 3/1 at AT 887491 detonated a grenade booby trap resulting in 4 medevacs.

(5) 131330H, Company B, 1/7 at AT 892494 received 10 rounds of sniper fire. An artillery mission was called with negative results.

(6) 131430H, Company L, 3/1 at 894497 had 11 non-hostile heat casualties.

(7) 131530H, Company I, 3/1 detonated a booby trap resulting in 7 medevacs.

(8) 131730H, Company B, 1/7 at AT 890494 detonated a pressure type booby trap resulting in 2 medevacs.

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(9) 131900H. Company B, 1/7 AT 900491 apprehended one VCS who attempted to flee from the patrol.

(10) 132030H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 887504 detonated a booby trap resulting in 3 medevacs.

(11) 132145H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 887501 detonated a large booby trap resulting in 1 KIA and 12 medevacs.

e. 14 July 1968, continued the attack to the northeast.

(1) 140630H. Company I, 3/1 found a rice cache of 300 lbs of rice hidden under a haystack.

(2) 140632H. Company B, 1/7 at AT 803495 found and destroyed 16 dud 2.75 inch HUEY rockets.

(3) 140930H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 888503 found and destroyed one old trench line.

(4) 140950H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 890506 found a claymore carrying bag containing 5 BAR magazines and 30 rounds.

(5) 141000H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 888505 received 5 rounds SAF, returned fire with negative results.

(6) 141000H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 890506 found documents listing VC rice collections.

(7) 141305H. Company I, 3/1 at 896506 observed 10 VCS moving toward a treeline, took them under fire with negative results.

(8) 141310H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 892509 had one Marine wounded by shrapnel from a friendly air strike.

(9) 141335H. Company B, 1/7 at AT 889508 found and destroyed one booby trapped chi-com grenade.

(10) 141720H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 892509 detonated a small surprise firing device resulting in one medevac.

(11) 141750H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 892509 found one NVA pack containing assorted clothing.

(12) 141755H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 899500 observed 3 males fleeing from the area and took them under fire with negative results.

(13) 141945H. Company B, 1/7 and Company L, 3/1 at AT 904503, while setting up defensive positions a large explosive device was detonated resulting in 3 KIA and 26 WIA medevaced.

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(14) 142335H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 882513 observed 5 VC in a boat. An artillery mission was called, but there was no evidence of enemy casualties.

f. 15 July 1968, continued the attack toward Liberty Bridge AT 925533.

(1) 150800H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 895505 received a burst of long range sniper fire. Fire was returned with negative results.

(2) 151130H. Company B, 1/7 at AT 915513 found two surprise explosive devices and one mine and destroyed them in place. A third surprise explosive device was detonated resulting in 4 medevacs.

(3) 151220H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 912512 received 5 or 6 rounds of sniper fire. Fire was returned with negative results.

g. 16 July 1968, continued the attack from Liberty Bridge to Hill 55.

(1) 160640H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 925544 detonated one surprise firing device resulting in one medevac. In addition, one booby trapped M-26 grenade was found and blown in place.

(2) 161520H. Company I, 3/1 received sniper fire from AT 948566. Fire was returned and unit continued to move.

(3) 161600H. Company I, 3/1 received sniper fire from AT 954567. Artillery missions and a fixed wing air strike were called and the fire was suppressed.

(4) The battalion moved into Hill 55 during the late afternoon.

h. 17 July 1968, short patrols were run from Hill 55.

(1) 170540H. Platoon position from Company L, 3/1 at AT 993606 received 3 to 5 rounds of sniper fire.

(2) 170700H. Platoon patrol from Company L, 3/1 at AT 968604 received 15 to 20 rounds of sniper fire. Patrol returned fire with negative results.

i. 18 July 1968. The battalion continued to patrol and prepare at Hill 55 to move into the attack in the Dodge City area.

(1) 181245H. Company I, 3/1 patrol observed 5 VC at AT 988602 and received small arms fire resulting in one WIA. Patrol returned fire and called artillery fire mission. One child was wounded by friendly fire and brought back with patrol.

j. 19 July 1968, the battalion with Company I, 3/1, Company L, 3/1, and Company M, 3/7 moved under cover of darkness into the Dodge City area. The lead element moved out at 182000H. A platoon of ARVN Rangers operated with the battalion.

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(1) 190500H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 986603 had one man fall and sprain his ankle resulting in a medevac.

(2) 190800H. Company L, 3/1 received sniper fire while leading the battalion to the attack position.

(3) 191000H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 001606 had one WIA medevac from shrapnel from friendly artillery fire.

(4) 191015H. Company L, 3/1 at BT 001606 had one man fall and sprain his ankle, requiring medevac.

(5) 191105H. Company M, 3/7 found and destroyed one dud 155mm round at BT 000599.

(6) 191140H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 997607 received automatic weapons fire. The area was swept with negative results.

(7) 191300H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 998594 found and destroyed three 155mm duds, two 105mm duds, and one 155 firecracker dud.

(8) 191400H. Company L, 3/1 at BT 004597 detained 7 Vietnamese females.

(9) 191420H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 997594 observed 2 VC in a spider hole. Took position under fire resulting in 4 VC KIA (confirmed) and 1 VC POW.

(10) 191510H. Company L, 3/1 from BT 009595 received 3 to 4 rounds of sniper fire. Fire was returned with negative results.

(11) 191800H. CP group resupply helicopter at AT 999595 took small arms fire.

k. 20 July 1968 the battalion continued search operations in the Dodge City area.

(1) 200715H. Company L, 3/1 found and destroyed 2 chi-con grenade booby traps and 4 dud 105mm rounds at BT 017606.

(2) 200815H. Company L, 3/1 observed 3 to 4 VC across a river at BT 019607. An AO was called and area taken under fire, but unable to search area due to river.

(3) 200900H. Company L, 3/1 at BT 020605 found and destroyed 2 dud 105mm rounds.

(4) 200910H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 004608 found 9 old bunkers.

(5) 200940H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 005607 found and destroyed 75 punji stakes, each one foot long.

(6) 200945H. Company L, 3/1 at BT 018603 found and destroyed a tunnel complex of three tunnels, each approximately 4ft X 4ft X 15 ft long.

(7) 200950H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 010603 found and destroyed one dud 105mm round.

(8) 201020H. Resupply helicopters took automatic SAF from AT 990600.

(9) 201150H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 005608 found and destroyed a tunnel 3½ft X 3½ft X 30 feet.

(10) 201150H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 008607 found and destroyed 2 dud 105mm rounds.

(11) 201155H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 007607 found and destroyed one dud 105mm round.

(12) 201330H. CP Group at BT 007595 found 75lbs of rice buried in a large cement jar.

(13) 201330. CP Group at BT 006596 found three graves with four bodies, one of which was wearing green NVA type trousers, counting 4 KIA (confirmed).

(14) 201445H. Company L, 3/1 received 3 rounds sniper fire from BT 018595 resulting in one medevac; returned fire and called artillery mission and gunship.

(15) 201700H. Company M, 3/7 detained one female found hiding in a bunker at BT 002602.

(16) 201830H. ARVN Rangers in area BT 000597 to BT 000600 to AT 997600 found an extensive bunker complex with trenches, mortar positions, and fighting holes. All bunkers were concealed well, but did not have hidden entrances or secret rooms. The position was occupied and destroyed the following day.

(17) 201930H. Helicopters at BT 001597 received fire. CP positions returned fire and received 50-100 rounds small arms fire, resulting in one medevac.

(18) 202040H. Company L, 3/1 at BT 002602 received 3 incoming M-79 rounds. Returned fire and called 81mm mortar mission.

1. 21 July 1968 the battalion continued search operations in the Dodge City area. The ARVN Rangers searched and destroyed the bunker complex found at 1830 on the 20th.

(1) 210730H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 003595 found and destroyed one dud M-79rd, two dud 105mm rds, and one 250 lb bomb.

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(2) 210835H. Company L, 3/1 AT 997584 found and destroyed a tunnel complex of three tunnels with no central entrance. Tunnels were 1½ X 1 X 10 feet long.

(3) 210835H. AO observed 3 VC with weapons at AT 992588 and called in artillery and fixed wing air strikes.

(4) 210710H. AO reported enemy mortar platoon at BT 028608, called artillery fire mission.

(5) 211015H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 003581 detonated 2 M-26 booby traps resulting in two medevacs. Helicopter received SAF.

(6) 21050H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 003581 found and destroyed two M-26 booby traps.

(7) 211130H. Company M, 3/7 at BT 003579 detonated two M-26 booby traps, resulting in 1 KIA and 3 WIA medevacs.

(8) 211900H. A summary of bunkers searched and destroyed by the Rangers included 12 8-man bunkers, 45 4-man bunkers, and 300 meters of trench line.

n. 22 July 1968

(1) 220245H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 982586 found and destroyed one fighting hole and one M-26 booby trap.

(2) 221000H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 983585 detonated one M-26 type booby trap resulting in 1 medevac.

(3) 221130H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 986584 found and destroyed 50 punji pits, each approximately 1'X2'X1' deep.

(4) 221125H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 986585 detonated a 15 lb mine resulting in 1 KIA and 5 WIA medevacs.

(5) 223645H. ARVN Rangers at AT 977567 surprised a group of VC resulting in 1 Ranger WIA, 1 VC KIA (confirmed), 1 NVA KIA (confirmed), 5 VC POW's, and the capture of one AK-47 and 1 SKS carbine.

(6) 221020H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 986558 to AT 992558 made contact with estimated enemy squad received a heavy volume of SAF and AWF resulting in 3 friendly KIA and 5 friendly WIA. Returned fire and called artillery. Negative evidence of enemy casualties.

n. 23 July 1968 the battalion concluded search operations in the Dodge City area.

(1) 230600H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 990564 while searching area of previous days contact found and destroyed 4 bunkers.

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(2) 230845H. Company M, 3/7 at AT 985560 found and destroyed one bunker 4' X 4' X 4' and assorted clothing and gear.

(3) 231045H. Company L, 3/1 at AT 982556 found and destroyed 32 bunkers, and 13 chi-con grenades and found assorted clothing, gear, and documents.

(4) 231100H. Company I, 3/1 at AT 995559 found and destroyed 2 fighting holes, 2 bunkers, and 2 tunnels 8ft long.

d. Approximately 231430H the battalion arrived at Hill 55. AT 231600H Company B, 1/7 and Company M, 3/7 were chopped back to their parent battalions.

#### 11. Results

Operation NAMELUKE THRUST accounted for 1 NVA KIA (confirmed), 10 VC KIA (confirmed), 6 VC POW, and 5 VOS detainees. See paragraph 7e for detailed list. Friendly casualties were: 54-MIA, 6-KIA, 0-MIA. On several occasions air strikes and/or artillery missions were conducted in areas where ground forces were unable to search because of water barriers and time factors.

#### 12. Administrative Matters

##### a. Supply

(1) An LSA located at the 7th Marines Command Post at Hill 55 and operated by Shore Party, augmented by 3/1 support personnel, supported the battalion with all classes of supplies. Resupply was requested through helicopter support teams which were attached to the companies and the Battalion Command Group. All classes of supplies were available and issued upon request. C-ration supplements, fruit juice, and fresh fruit was provided on four different occasions.

(2) Resupply was accomplished by helicopter during every 24 hour period except one. During this one period resupply was not accomplished due to nonavailability of aircraft.

b. Maintenance. Items of ordnance and communications requiring second or third echelon maintenance were evacuated to the LSA and repaired on the spot by FLC contact teams.

##### c. Casualties and Evacuation

(1) Priority and emergency casualties were evacuated by helicopter to either First Hospital Company or NSA Hospital, Danang.

(2) Routine casualties were evacuated by helicopter to the LSA. Most routine casualties were treated at the LSA and returned to duty.

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(3) Equipment belonging to casualties was evacuated to the LSA when practicable. During a fast moving tactical situation it was sometimes burdensome for a company to carry this gear until another helicopter became available. When the situation demanded, medevac equipment accompanied the casualty and was recovered by a battalion representative at either First Hospital Company or NSA Hospital.

d. Transportation. Transportation from 3/1 battalion area to An Hoa was accomplished by CH-53. All tactical personnel movement during the operation was by foot. Resupply has been discussed in para. 12a. Vehicular transportation was provided from Hill 55 to 3/1 area at the conclusion of the operation.

e. Communications. During operation "Mameluke Thrust" the communications platoon had the requirement to support operations in the AO assigned to 3/1, plus the battalion command group and three rifle companies participating in Mameluke Thrust. This requirement placed a strain on our ability to properly support the Battalion but was successfully accomplished. Communications during operation "Mameluke Thrust" were generally satisfactory. Some difficulty was encountered initially at An Hoa in maintaining radio communications with the 7th Marines. No satisfactory reason was ever discovered for this difficulty; however, during this time we could maintain radio communications with 3/1 rear located at Hill 282. During the remainder of "Mameluke Thrust" no significant communications difficulties were encountered.

Of particular note during the operation was the value of having communication equipment staged at the LSA on Hill 55. Considerable time was saved when replacement equipment was needed by the battalion operating in the field by having the equipment located at the supply point.

### 13. Special Equipment and Techniques

a. None.

### 14. Commander's Analysis

The operation was characterized by a lack of significant enemy contact. Contact consisted of sporadic sniper fire and extensive anti-personnel surprise firing devices.

Utilization of the ARVN Ranger Platoon as a point unit and as the searching/destroying element when an enemy complex was located proved to be very successful. Their professional competency was characterized by their very aggressive and thorough performance.

### 15. Recommendations
