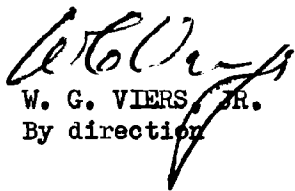

On 23 November LCpl J. D. HUDSON was KIA while on a road sweep with 1/26.

On 24 November LtCol. G. M. PEARCE departed on Emergency Leave to CONUS.

3. Intelligence

The battalion Intelligence (S-2) Officer held nightly briefings for the officers of the battalion and the non-commissioned officers in charge of sections. Areas emphasized were mine incidents occurring in the PHU BAI - DONG HA TAOR, and significant reports of enemy activities which might effect engineer operations. The S-2 Chief gave briefings in the absence of the Intelligence Officer. In addition, the Intelligence Officer conducted briefings for each of the companies which consisted of a general picture of the enemy situation and pointed out areas in which work may be susceptible to VC/NVA harrassing action.

During the month of November 1966, a total of 15 mine/boobytrap incidents were recorded, as shown in Enclosure (2).

A water survey was initiated by the Intelligence section during the month. The Battalion Intelligence Officer conferred with the Intelligence (S-2) section of the 2d ARVN Regiment in DONG HA and found no statistical information was available concerning maximum levels of water beneath road bridges and by-passes. Six check points were installed at bridges on National Route #9 to be observed periodically during the monsoon season. The measurements will aid in determining by-pass requirements at each of the bridge sites. Thus far, a two foot rise from original levels has been recorded since the beginning of November 1966.

The map inventory was reviewed and replenished. A complete complement of Photomap supplements, 1/25,000, was ordered and part has been received.

4. Training

a. Training during November consisted entirely of MOS Training, conducted primarily on-the-job, however, certain specialized skills received more formal training. No training schedule was published in November due to the 3d Division displacement to the North. A new schedule will appear in December.

b. On 18 November, Cpl T. E. AGUILAR departed for OKINAWA to attend the Infantry Weapons Repair School. On 20 November Sgt. R. C. WARMAN departed for Embarkation School and Cpl. R. D. MIERS departed for Vietnamese Language School, both on OKINAWA.

c. The 3d Marine Division Land Mine Warfare and Demolition School, conducted by this battalion, continued to instruct both division and non-division personnel in mines, boobytraps and demolitions. The instruction was conducted by contact teams and by resident courses in the battalion school area. The normal input of students was reduced greatly due to the displacement of the 3d Marine Division to the North. The following is a recapitulation of the training conducted by the school during November 1966.

(1) A contact instructor team deployed to the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines on 3 November and remained for approximately four days. During this period, the team instructed 50 students on U. S. Landmine Warfare, VC Mines and Boobytraps, Pyrotechnics and Claymore Mines.

d. During the month of November the tunnel teams continued to train.

e. There were no students enrolled in the generator operator course.

f. On 27 and 28 November instruction was presented to the 9th Motor Transport Battalion on the employment of the Claymore Mine.

In many areas around the CP it became necessary to clean out ditches daily, due to vehicle traffic passing across the ditches to enter supply dumps, messhalls, and battalion CP areas. To eliminate this daily job and release engineer equipment for other projects, the battalion began to install half culverts at critical crossing points. Although this innovation will not stand up to heavy traffic, it will provide a means of access for vehicles up to 3/4 ton. On the CAM LO Road gravel was hauled and spread in an effort to stabilize the road and make it passable for traffic and engineer trucks hauling gravel to other areas. A bridge was constructed 300 meters North of the CAM LO Bridge. The Camp Carroll Access Road was raised by the addition of numerous loads of gravel, hauled from the rock source along the SONG TRINH HIN, west of the M-6 Bridge. Despite the heavy rains the road was in acceptable condition by the end of the month. Lieutenant Earle WENTWORTH and the men of the third Platoon of Company "A" supported the 3d Marines in the opening phase of a sweep in the CUA valley. A ford and bridge reconnaissance was conducted and several places along Route #558 were repaired to permit a convoy to move into the operation area. The balance of the work done was continued improvement of the 3d Battalion 4th Marines Access Road and repair of the shoulders along Route #1.

(2) Field Fortifications. During November the work done on field fortifications included the construction of bunkers in the 3d Engineers area, filling sandbags for bunkers and the supervision of field fortifications projects completed by infantry units. Men of the 3d Engineer Battalion erected or supervised the erection of over 3000 meters of wire obstacles. Two bunkers were pre-out, flown to 3/3 (Fwd) and were built by engineers from Company "A". In the Division CP (Fwd) area, Company "B" repaired the fence around the mine-field and hung new mine warning signs. This was in an effort to insure that personnel would not enter the field accidentally.

(3) General Construction. Construction work continued in the 3d Engineer Battalion CP area and several billeting areas were completed. The construction platoon led by WO1 BRATCHER completed work projects in the DONG HA Combat Base including much renovation work in the Division CP (Fwd). At the Commanding General's Mess screen work, construction and hanging of doors, electrical work, installation of a grease trap in the rear of the galley and construction of a serving line rounded out the work done. In the General's Quarters the carpenters constructed shelves, cabinets and other items of furniture. With the arrival of 31,000 feet of heavy gauge plastic the battalion undertook a weather proofing program. The men of the construction platoon built model huts to show units who would receive the weather-proofing how it should be utilized. Window frames, screening and weather proofing were installed at the PMO/IRO office and siding was put on the new Post Office Building. Several old French buildings were dismantled and an ammunition bunker was constructed near the LCU Ramp. At the Battalion Aid Station, in the Division Compound, a weather tower was constructed, shelves were built, and electrical work and drainage work were completed.

A team of engineers, who were supporting Company "A", 3d Tanks, constructed a strongback. Generator sheds were constructed for the 4th Marine Regiment, 3d Marines at Camp Carroll, and in the Division CP. Water Tank pads were pre-fabricated and constructed at the DONG HA, CAM LO and Camp Carroll water points. The 3d Battalion, 3d Marine Regiment requested two bunkers which were packed and flown to their position. The end of the month saw construction working to prepare four huts in the 3d Marines area for Division Disbursing and constructing signs for the Division CP.

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The Drafting and Surveying Section did the layout work for the new Post Exchange and Post Office site and supplied sketches and technical drawings to division units.

(4) Utilities. The 3d Engineer Battalion Utilities Platoon continued to supply divisional units with raw and potable water. Six water points were under the operational control of the 1st Marine Division in DA NANG and six were operational in the PHU BAI and DONG HA TAOR'S. Totals for the month at DONG HA and PHU BAI are as follows:

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5. Operations

a. General. During November the 3d Engineer Battalion remained in general support of the 3d Marine Division. Company "C", 3d Engineer Battalion remained under operational control of the 1st Engineer Battalion. Employment of the battalion was in the following two categories: Combat Support and Combat Service Support:

- (1) Combat Support Operations consisted of providing mine detection and demolition teams in support of infantry operations and daily sweeps of MSR's for mines and boobytraps. Companies "A" and "B" supported six infantry battalions. The combat support provided involved:
 - (a) A total of 210 deliberate mine detector sweeps of MSR segments.
 - (b) A total of 33 visual sweeps.
 - (c) Daily Average distance swept was 5,030 kilometers.
 - (d) Excluding clearance, no incidents required engineer effort during sweeps. See paragraph 3, Intelligence.
 - (e) Ordnance and Fortifications destroyed by combat engineers during November totaled twenty-one (21) bunkers.

b. Combat Support

- (1) DONG HA TAOR
 - (a) During the month of November the following visual sweeps were made: (YDO20365-025564) and (YDO90815-091115). This sweep was not conducted on a daily basis, but on request from various units using the road for convoys.
 - (b) Deliberate sweeps were made as follows:
 - (YD061549-033563)

 - (c) Combat Support of infantry operations was provided by Companies "A" and "B". Personnel from Company "A" supported Operation PRAIRIE, See Enclosure (10). In addition, support was given to Company "A", 3d Tanks and the Provisional Battalion.

c. Combat Service Support

- (1) Roads and Bridges. The majority of the work done on routes of communication was centered around the DONG HA Combat Base. In conjunction with the movement of elements of the Second Battalion, Ninety-Fourth Field Artillery Group to Camp Carroll, the First Platoon of Third Bridge Company constructed a 60 foot deck balk fixed span bridge to serve as a by-pass on Route #9. Several of the by-passes required maintenance work in order to enable tracked vehicles to pass. Also on Route #9 the approaches to the bridges were built up to prolong deck life and decrease wear on vehicles crossing these bridges. In the latter part of the month an M4T6 bridge on Route #1, north of DONG HA was reinforced by adding three floats and building up the approaches. The work done on the Division CP (Fwd) Road Network was performed as maintenance. Gravel was hauled and spread to fill the many potholes and ruts that appeared after the recent heavy rains. Several culverts were installed to relieve drainage problems around the perimeter road. Work was done on the 9th Motors Access Road and a bridge on the road to Artillery Village was rehabilitated.

6. Communications

- a. Continuous communications ^{WERE} ~~was~~ maintained with battalion units located at DA NANG and DONG HA.
- b. The "A" and "B" Company communications facilities were remarried with the battalion communication platoon.
- c. The area defense wire was established. Initial problems encountered were improperly functioning telephones and wire lines being cut. Corrective action was taken.
- d. The motor transport control net was activated to provide control for the battalion wrecker.
- e. The battalion communication center/office was established in its permanent location.
- f. A trunk line was established to the U. S. Army position to allow coordination of the area defense.
- g. The communication storeroom was relocated adjacent to the communication center/office.
- h. The area defense radio net was centralized under the control of the officer of the day.
- i. The Motor Transport control net was deactivated and the Motor Transport stations were intergrated into the battalion control net.
- j. A change to the COI was received which necessitated a change in the battalion control frequency. The frequency change was accomplished.

7. Logisticsa. Coordination and Control

(1) Battalion staff continued to be split between DONG HA and DA NANG, with the Commanding Officer, S-2 and S-3 at DONG HA and the Executive Officer, S-1, and S-4 at DA NANG. This has created considerable difficulty in logistical management because of very meager communications.

(2) Action was initiated during period to consolidate the Battalion at DONG HA.

(3) Captain GRAFF, S-4 reporting for duty on 22 November 1966, was assigned present duties on 27 November, in relief of WO-1 SCOTT, who until that date acted as S-4/Supply Officer and afterwards assumed the single duty of Supply Officer.

b. Supply

(1) Support in all classes of material remains normal under conditions and adequate except as noted below.

(2) Operational capabilities continued to be affected by a high volume of outstanding requisitions. Of the 25,111 requisitions submitted during FY-66 and to date in FY-67, 4,569 remain outstanding, and 68% of that figure ~~has~~ ^{HAVE} been so far more than 120 days.

(3) With the majority of the Battalion's rolling stock at DONG HA, difficulty was encountered with continuing influx of supplies from FLSC-A. An experimental unit distribution system initiated by FLSC-A should alleviate this problem, although it is too early to evaluate its operation. Additionally, however, about 750,000 board feet of lumber has been released by FLSC-A for issue to this organization during the period. Lack of transportation has limited withdrawal of this lumber to about 300,000 board feet. This is one of the major problems affecting the Battalion's consolidation at DONG HA.

(4) Transfer of supplies from DA NANG to DONG HA continued at a slow pace. The Battalion (Rear) was dependent upon outside support to meet most of its motor transport requirements other than internal activities; and sealift, mostly in the form of LCU's, was available only sporadically. On 30 November four truck loads of lumber were sent to DONG HA via "ROUGH RIDER".

(5) Staging of equipment for one platoon of Company "B" for the rotational BLT was completed on 30 November.

c. Maintenance

(1) The Battalion had a density of 401 combat essential items of equipment, of which 127 are on involuntary deadline; 71 at second echelon, and 56 at 3d echelon. (These figures include the Battalion (Forward)). Operational percentage is 68%.

(2) Lack of supply support evidenced by the number of outstanding requisitions continued to be the cause of a high deadline figure.

(3) Critical deadlined items during the period were M-51 dump trucks at DONG HA, with 1/3 of the available assets on deadline, and P-153 mine detectors in the DA NANG TAOR, with half the Battalion's assets on deadline. While the Battalion's mission was not jeopardized during the period, lack of these items in any greater quantity will have a significant impact on the effectiveness of engineer support to forward units.

d. Food Service

(1) 25,614 rations were fed during period at the Battalion (Rear), consisting of 90 meals "A" rations and 11 meals "B" rations.

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- (2) 8402 meals "C" rations were issued on an as required basis.
(3) Usage of ice averaged about 600 pounds per day in the DA NANG area. No ice is available at DONG HA.

e. Facilities. No significant events during period beyond the weather-proofing of buildings as protection from tropical storm NANCY.

f. Industrial Relations. The Battalion (Rear) employed an average of 138 Vietnamese nationals daily and paid wages in the amount of 563,359\$ piastres for this purpose during period.

g. Fiscal. The Battalion Operating Budget was increased by \$1,000,000 leaving a new unobligated balance of \$1,766,066 at the end of the period. The increase is slated for lumber stocks.

h. Ammunition. 400 rounds of 7.62mm and 75 rounds of caliber .45 ammunition were expended during period by the Battalion (Rear) in the conduct of local security. Stocks remained ample to meet requirements.

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8. Civil Affairs

On 6 November 1966 3d Marine Division Order 5081.1 was published assigning areas of responsibility to units in the DONG HA, CAM LO, and KHE SANH TAOR. The 3d Engineer Battalion was assigned the hamlet of VINH PHUOC (YD280583) for the purpose of disaster relief and reporting. This hamlet is located a great distance from engineer areas of operation. Upon special request, the civil affairs area coordinator, G-5, authorized the battalion to operate in CAM LO in close proximity to engineer projects. This request was based on previous experience which proved highly successful in the past.

Liaison was established with the MACV Senior Advisor at CAM LO District Headquarters, Major WALL USA. A MEDCAP program was established with scheduled visits to each of the hamlets in the CAM LO complex. Medical treatments have been few currently due to the lack of MEDCAP supplies. The 3d Engineer's medical team was warmly welcomed into each of the hamlets it visited and in a total of 9 visits from 14 November to 30 November 1966. 541 people were treated. The hamlets visited were TAN DINH (YD118585), VANH AN (YD161604), TAY HOA (YD136602), AN HUNG (YD123593), a refugee hamlet at (YD121585), and VAN QUAT XA (YD102598).

During the month of November 1966 a total of four M-51 dump truck loads of scrap lumber were delivered to the district. The lumber was excess from engineer projects in the area. Road improvement in the CAM LO area has established a close rapport between engineers and local Vietnamese.

11 November 1966
Departed 3d Engineer Battalion approximately 1600, arrived at 2d Battalion 9th Marines Command Post approximately 1700.

12 November 1966
Departed 2d Battalion, 9th Marines area approximately 1130 by tanks to support Company "E", 2d Battalion, 9th Marines.
One boobytrap and one mortar round were found on the trail.
Destroyed each with 2½ pounds of C-4.

13 November 1966
Destroyed 17 family bunkers. 10 pounds of C-4 on each of two large "L" shaped bunkers. 2½ pounds of C-4 on each of the smaller bunkers. Charges were placed in the middle of the bunker where the sides meet the roof.

14 November 1966
Moved to new location.

15 November 1966
Departed area approximately 0800, arrived 2d Battalion, 9th Marines Command Post approximately 1000.

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Departed 2d Battalion, 9th Marines area approximately 2030 by foot, with Companies "G" and "H", 2d Battalion, 9th Marines.

16 November 1966

Arrived at assembly area approximately 0610, departed approximately 0700 for objective.

Destroyed three family bunkers (See illustration) using 5 pounds of C-4 on each.

17 November 1966

Destroyed 12 family bunkers at coordinates YD113506. Used 5 pounds of C-4 per bunker.

18 November 1966

- A. Destroyed 26 family bunkers at coordinates YD113514 (THOM MAI LOC) using $4\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of C-3 per bunker. There were two secondary explosions, powerful enough to completely destroy the hut beside the bunker. A small bottle of North Vietnamese Malaria pills were found in one bunker and turned over to Company "H", 2d Battalion, 9th Marines.
- B. Destroyed tail section of downed helicopter at coordinates YD113514, using 25 pounds of C-4.

19 November 1966

- A. Destroyed 36 family bunkers in same village as 18 November 1966, using $4\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of C-3 per bunker.

20 November 1966

No Work Done

21 November 1966

- A. Destroyed ordnance that 2d Battalion, 9th Marines was unable to carry, at coordinates YD113514, using 60 pounds of C-3.
- B. 8 men sweep team (mine), alternating 4 men and two detectors (P-153s) every 20 minutes. Swept road from coordinates YD113514 to YD116582 for the purpose of detecting anti-tank mines. Negative results. Arrived 2d Battalion, 9th Marines area approximately 1630, departed 2d Battalion, 9th Marines area approximately 1800, arrived 3d Engineer Battalion area approximately 1900.

8. LESSONS LEARNED:

- A. Do not try to mold C-4 or C-3 in heavy rain.
- B. The best place for explosive charge in a bunker is the half-way point where sides and roof meet.

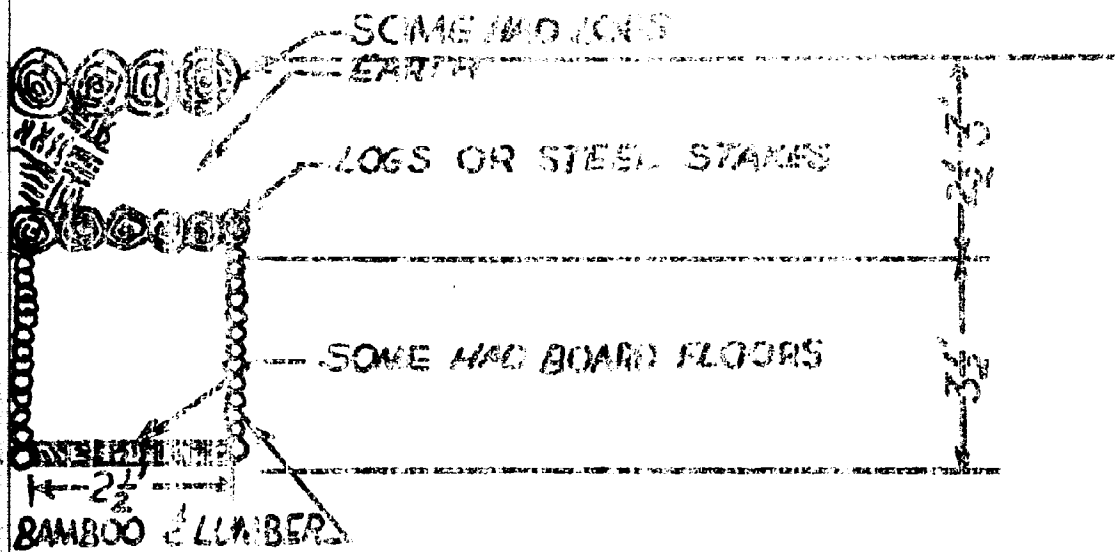
9. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- A. Carry more than enough fuse lighters estimated to do the job. They are hard to get on resupply.

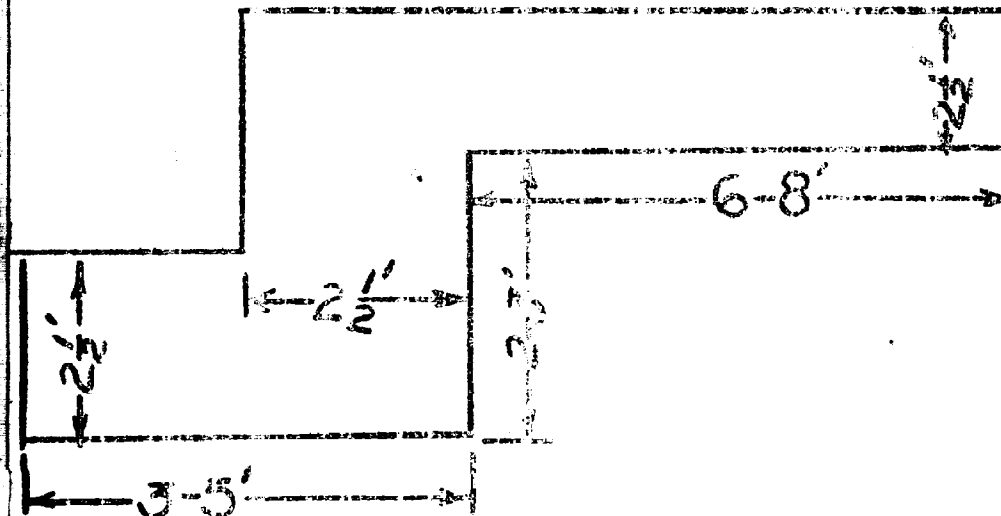
FAMILY BUNKERS FOUND AND DESTROYED

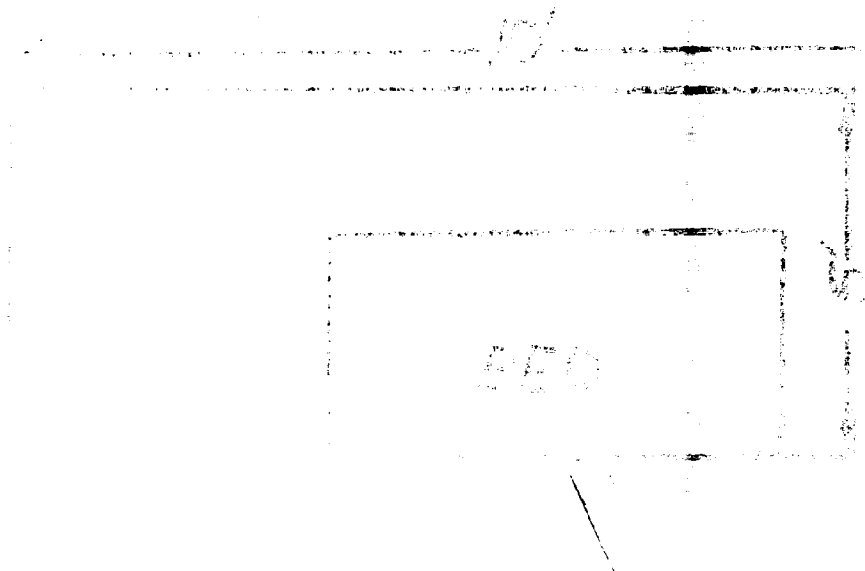

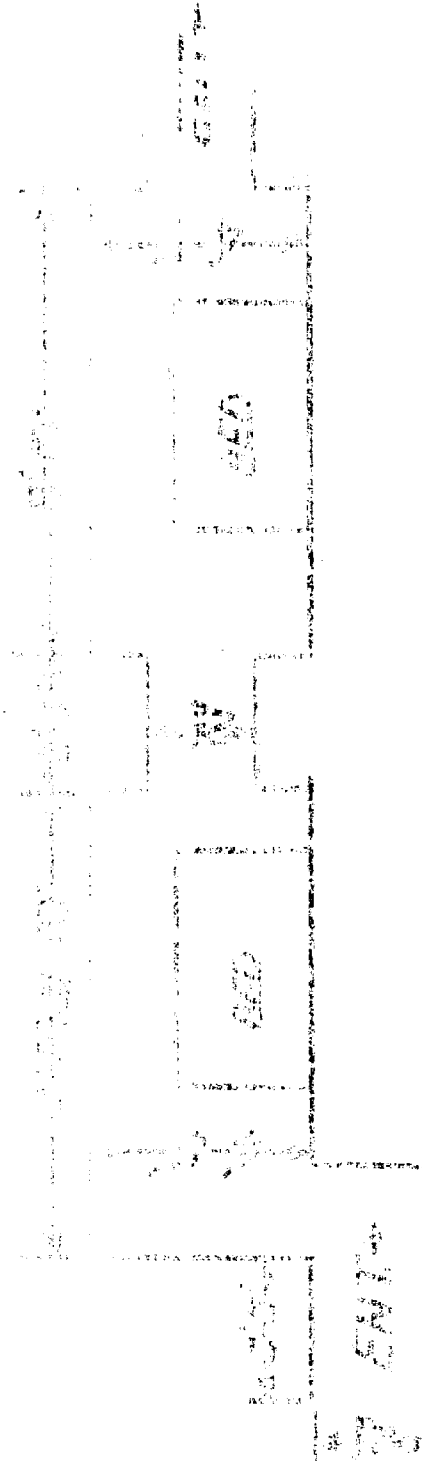

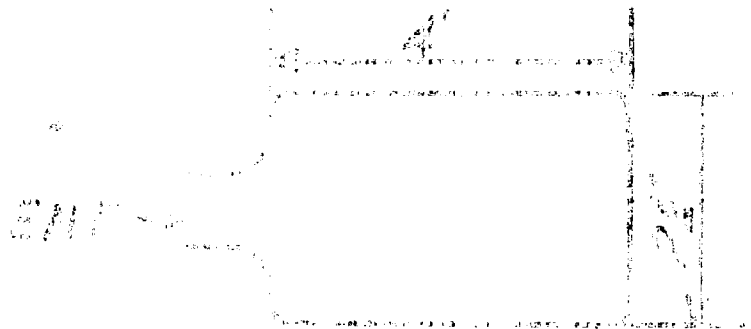
