Encl: (1) Patient's Personal Effects Receipt

1. Purpose. To establish procedures for the receipt and custody of personal effects received from patients arriving at A Company.

2. Action.

a. When patients arrive at A Company who are unable to retain custody of their valuables i.e., watches, rings, wallets, etc., it is the responsibility of the Senior Petty Officer in charge of Admission and Sorting to inventory and take custody of the valuables.

b. A receipt will be prepared, in duplicate, by the person taking custody of the valuables. The original receipt will be delivered to the patient immediately and the copy attached to the individual's clinical chart. In the event the receipt cannot be delivered (patient is unconscious, in surgery, etc.), both copies will be attached to the clinical chart until such time as the original receipt can be delivered to the patient.

c. Valuables received from patients will be delivered immediately to the Administration Office for safekeeping and appropriate disposition. Only those persons in the Administration Office authorized in writing by the Commanding Officer will receive valuables for safekeeping.

d. Personal effects will not be taken from patients who are capable of retaining them.

e. Items of clothing will not be delivered to the Administration Office, but will be tagged and kept with the patient at all times.

f. 782 gear and weapons will be delivered to the Supply Sergeant who will make appropriate disposition.

Information relative to the ultimate destination of evacuated patients is no longer available for inclusion on the daily report of the sick. When this information becomes available, it will again be published.

3. Training: Revision of the professional training program for Hospital Corpsmen has continued and will be completed soon. All personnel were given lectures pertaining to Federal and State income-tax responsibility by the Administrative Officer.

4. Command and Control: The Commanding Officer continues to meet with the professional staff on an informal basis to discuss patient problems. The Commanding Officer conducts a weekly inspection of personnel and weapons, billeting and working spaces. The Administrative Officer meets with senior P.O.'s and NCO's weekly to discuss problem areas and for dissemination of information.

5. Logistics: Medical Supply personnel required to establish a medical supply unit within FLSU #1 were received. The medical supply functions now performed by this company for other units within the enclave will be transferred to FLSU #1 as soon as the new unit is operative. An additional 10 day medical resupply block and 30 day medical resupply block were repacked during this period. Work continues on the remaining blocks held by this company.


