(2) Trainings

- (a) The company is currently in the process of relocating. Therefore, training has been temporarily suspended except for a rather extensive "on the job" training program.
- (b) Weekly fire drills and periodical "Red Alert" drills are conducted to maintain organizational readiness.

(3) Command and Control:

- (a) The Commanding Officer meets weekly with the staff officer's to discuss medical, administrative, military, and organizational matters of current importance and interest.
- (b) The Administrative Officer meets daily with the senior petty officer's and section leader's to discuss matters of daily significance and to keep informed of local problems, current events, and future planning.

(4) Logistic's:

(a) This command maintains an I. O. L. for a Collecting and Clearing Platon; in addition to the maintenance of the normal medical supplies and equipment used by this unit in the accomplishment of it's mission.

(5) Chaplain Support:

(a) This unit is provided with one chaplain corps officer and one enlisted chaplains assistant to administer to the religious needs of staff and patient personnel.

(5) New Construction:

- (a) The hospital is in the process of being relocated to a new area. At present, all building constructions (12 "strong backs" and 9 "quonset huts") are complete with the exception of the billeting area for staff personnel. This is dependent upon the clearing of a "mine field" located beside the new hospital area.
- (b) One underground bunker for patients and eight personnel bunkers have been completed. Sandbagging of the new hospital compound is underway. Water drainage ditches are being dug.
