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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

I. COMMAND, OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

A. Enemy activity decreased significantly during this reporting period. Contact with enemy forces resulted in six VC/NVA KIA, and eight individual weapons captured.

B. Three Combined Action Companies were deactivated during the month of July, save CACO 3-1 Headquarters which was deactivated on 1 August. A ceremony was held in each village with the CAP Marines and the Popular Forces in attendance. When the last CAP of each company was deactivated, a formal ceremony was conducted at each District Headquarters. Both Vietnamese and Americans made appropriate remarks and gifts were exchanged.

C. CAP leaders seminars were held on the 6th and the 27th of July. The topics included forward observers duties, helicopter medevac procedures, explosive ordnance disposal, field sanitation and current postal regulations. Three guest lecturers contributed significantly to this month's seminars. After lunch the CAP leaders returned to the field.

D. Formal classes continued to be conducted in the field by the S-3 Mobile Training Team. Classes were held on 3, 6, 8, 10, 13, 15, 17, 20, 22, 24, 27, 29 and 31 July and were attended by 125 Marines and 127 Popular Forces soldiers from the CAPs.

E. A summary of activities by CACO is as follows:

1. CACO 3-1

a. There was only one contact in CACO 3-1 during this reporting period, resulting in one VC KIA.

b. The entire company was deactivated by 1 August. During the deactivation ceremony, a total of 12 Marines were individually decorated.

2. CACO 3-2

a. CAPs from CACO 3-2 continued long range patrols and combined CAP activities.

b. This company also had only one contact resulting in one VC/NVA KIA.

3. CACO 3-3

a. The deactivation of CACO 3-3 was completed on 11 July 1970. The deactivation ceremony included a meal and Vietnamese show provided by Phu Thu District Officials.

ENCLOSURE (1)

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4. CACO 3-4

a. The deactivation of CACO 3-4 took place on 6 July. Gifts were exchanged and speeches were made by District Officials and the 3d CAG Commanding Officer.

5. CACO 3-5

a. This company continues to have a particularly significant number of contacts. A total of two VC/NVA were KIA during the month.

F. The 3d CAG armorer made 13 visits to the CAPs in the field to inspect and make minor repairs to weapons.

G. On 7 July, Colonel Metzger and the new Commanding Officer of CAG, Colonel Ralph Estey, visited 3d CAG. Colonel Estey returned to 3d CAG on 14 July and visited five CAP's and CACO 3-1 Headquarters.

H. During the month of July, LCmdr D. V. Page was relieved by Lieutenant A. L. Fiorino as 3d CAG Chaplain. A total of 75 services were attended by 763 persons.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. On 4 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-3-2 observed one VC approximately 100 meters east of the ambush site. CAP 3-3-2 initiated contact with eight rounds of M-16 fire and one M-79 HE round. There was negative incoming fire received. A sweep of the area produced one VC KIA and one AK-47 rifle.
2. On 5 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-4-3 initiated contact with SAF against two VC. There was negative incoming fire and the VC fled to the north. A sweep of the area produced one VC KIA, one 9mm pistol and two loaded magazines.
3. On 5 July 1970 CAP 3-5-2 found 600 pounds of rice while on a day patrol. The rice was hidden under a false floor in a house. The rice and all occupants of the house were turned over to District Headquarters.
4. On 6 July 1970 Combined Action Company 3-4 was deactivated.
5. On 8 July 1970 CAP 3-3-1 and CAP 3-3-5 were deactivated.
6. On 10 July 1970 CAP 3-3-2 and CAP 3-3-3 were deactivated.
7. On 11 July 1970 CAP 3-3-4, CAP 3-3-6 and CACO 3-3 Headquarters were deactivated.
8. On 12 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-5-2 observed six NVA carrying weapons. At a distance of approximately 10 meters, CAP 3-5-2 initiated contact with claymores and SAF. The enemy returned fire with AK-47s and approximately three B-40 rockets, slightly wounding one Marine who was medevaced the following morning. A sweep of the area produced one NVA KIA and one AK-47 rifle.
9. On 22 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-5-5 observed one VC carrying a weapon approximately 15 meters away. CAP 3-5-5 initiated contact at approximately five meters with SAF. Negative incoming fire was received. A sweep of the area produced one VC KIA and one AK-47 rifle.
10. On 22 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-5-5 observed five VC carrying weapons approximately 50 meters to the north. CAP 3-5-5 initiated contact at approximately 50 meters with claymores and SAF. The enemy returned fire with AK-47s and fled to the south. A sweep of the area produced one VC KIA POW and one AK-47 rifle.
11. On 23 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-1-3 observed 10 VC with weapons. CAP 3-1-3 initiated contact at approximately 30 meters with SAF. The VC returned fire with AK-47s and fled to the south. A sweep of the area produced one VC KIA and one AK-47 rifle.

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12. On 27 July 1970 while set in an ambush site, CAP 3-2-5 observed approximately 30 NVA with weapons moving through a tree line approximately 50 meters to the north. CAP 3-2-5 initiated contact at approximately 50 meters with claymores and S&F. The NVA returned fire with approximately six B-40 rockets and approximately 150 rounds of AK-47 fire and fled to the northwest. CAP 3-2-5 commenced a sweep of the area and received three rounds of B-40 fire. Lacking a discernible target, the CAP did not return fire. The CAP continued the sweep and found one NVA KIA and one AK-47 rifle.

13. On 28 July 1970 CAP 3-1-5 and CAP 3-1-6 were deactivated.

14. On 30 July 1970 CAP 3-1-1 and CAP 3-1-4 were deactivated.
