

PART II
NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of June, new construction or modification of in progress construction continued to be dominant projects. Command briefings were held as indicated in parts III and IV.

Staff sections and subordinate units are maintaining effective performance under an extremely, and ever-increasing workload. The 3d Force Service Regiment is fulfilling its mission to provide sustained logistical support to all FMF WestPac Forces from Okinawa, while conducting comprehensive internal training programs.

Battalion Commanders were further directed to requisition replacement items prior to 30 June 1967.

Buildings TG-10A, TG-10B and TG-10C, REX Area, Camp Courtney, have been assigned to 3dFSR for use by Supply Battalion. These buildings are required in order to provide covered storage for kits, chests and sets, which at the present time are stored outside.

This Command has the requirement to expeditiously receive, store and issue supplies in direct support of operations in RVN. It has been determined that improvements are required to existing storage areas and additional storage and staging areas are needed to properly support this requirement. It has been requested that 6,691 cubic yards of commercial coral be purchased and be delivered to areas concerned. The areas will be prepared, leveled and filled, as a troop training project by the Regimental Utilities Section, 3dFSR. The commercial coral requested will be used as a four inch topping.

Refuge collection in Camp Foster is provided by means of a "no cost contract" with the city of Kitanakagusuku. Liaison is maintained through the Realty Specialist of Camp Butler on call from the Regimental S-4. The frequency of pick up is as follows:

"H" Area twice a day. Three times if necessary.

"M" Area twice a day.

Motor Transport Area every other day.

Battalion Commanders have been further requested to inform this Headquarters (S-4) if pick up points are missed or frequency of pick ups is not as scheduled.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Total incoming and outgoing Message Center traffic was 10,834 messages, 162,137 AUTODIN cards and 2,280 AUTODIN messages.
2. Headquarters and Service Battalion vehicles travelled 146,952 miles, hauled 32,729 short tons of cargo, and transported 18,474 personnel.
3. The Baggage Facility received 6,247 pieces of personal baggage for storage while shipping out 6,673 pieces. There remains a total of 71,111 pieces of personal baggage for storage. The Shipping and Receiving Platoon received for 8,744 measurement tons of incoming cargo on ten ships and shipped 13,215 measurement tons of outgoing cargo on 14 ships during the month.



BRIEFING ITEM: Fiscal/R/RCC Update

BACKGROUND: The FMFPAC EQUIPMENT REPAIR/REBUILD PROGRAM is directed by the Repair/Rebuild Control Center (R/RCC). It was established within the Force Logistics Support Section in late July 1966 to assist the CO, 3d FSR in directing and monitoring logistic support programs for all FMF Units in WestPac.

This program is designed to conserve ground and aviation FMF assets in the Western Pacific by timely repair/rebuild at a military, or civilian contractor facility located in the Western Pacific. Repair/rebuild facilities are located on Okinawa and Japan.

DISCUSSION: The primary rebuild programs are the GENERATOR and MOTOR TRANSPORT programs.

GENERATOR REBUILD PROGRAM (CHART #1)

The output of rebuilt generators by PWC, Yokosuka is showing an upward trend toward the planned monthly output of twenty-nine (29). This figure of (29) is total output and consists of twenty-four (24) designated rebuild generators (PU-239, PU-482, PU-296, PU-589, PU-590 and 60KW) plus five other type generators (ground or aviation).

To summarize progress to date:

One hundred and forty-five (145) generators have been rebuilt, seventy-six (76) ground and sixty-nine (69) air including the twenty-seven (27) miscellaneous Section "M".

One hundred and eighty-eight (188) generators are at the facility in progress.

Forty-four (44) generators are awaiting shipment or in transit.

MOTOR TRANSPORT REBUILD PROGRAM (CHART #1)

The M-36 (Truck, Cargo, 2 1/2) rebuild program is on schedule with an output of five per month.

The M-37 (Personnel Carrier, 3/4 Ton) and M-43 (Ambulance 3/4 Ton) were inducted into the FMFPAC EQUIPMENT REBUILD PROGRAM in October 1966 with a planned combined output of five in December and January. The combined output for the remainder of FY67 commencing in February 1967 is 10 per month. The planned overall rebuild ratio will be 9 to 1 (M-37 to M-43). M-37 vehicles in the "FIFTH ECHELON SECTION "M" REHABILITATION PROGRAM" will be included in the rebuild program this month.

The M-51 (Truck, Dump, 5 Ton) rebuild program terminated with the completion of 6 vehicles. All other M-51 vehicles will be disposed of in accordance with CG, FMFPac msg 180345Z Feb 67.

The M-54 (Truck, Cargo, 5 Ton) rebuild program will terminate upon repair of all prepositioned vehicles.

To summarize to date:

One hundred and eighty-four (184) vehicles have been rebuilt.

One hundred and thirteen (113) vehicles are at rebuild facilities.

Eight vehicles are awaiting shipment or in transit to the repair facility.

SECTION "M" REHABILITATION

This command has been directed to assume responsibility through the Repair/Rebuild Control Center of the rehabilitation of Section "M" equipments. Initially all Section "M" equipment was repaired at Public Works Center, Yokosuka but the increase in requirements soon exceeded their capability. This problem is being alleviated by obtaining other facilities such as U. S. Naval Air Station, Atsugi, Japan, Maintenance Battalion, 3d Force Service Regiment and Construction Battalion Center, Port Hueneme, California which can take designated items for repair thereby distributing the workload.

Commanding General, 1st Marine Air Wing has provided, for planning purposes a forecast of Section "M" equipment requiring rehabilitation through the first half of FY68. Material considered critical to mission has been indicated. The Repair/Rebuild Control Center has placed a priority on these items. Section "M" Repair/Rebuild is performed through three separate and distinct programs. Repair Program; Fifth Echelon Section "M" Rehabilitation Program and FMFPac Generator Rebuild Program.

To summarize entire rebuild/repair program to date:

Three hundred and seventy-three (373) equipments have been repaired/rebuilt.

Four hundred and seventeen (417) equipments are at the facilities.

One hundred and thirty-five (135) equipments are awaiting shipment.

Fabrication Programs in progress are as follows:

LVT Road Wheels - five hundred (500); torque rods and ball assemblies for five ton vehicles - 2000 which have been completed and an additional 1000 ordered; axle assembly and components for 6000 lbs rough terrain forklifts.

BODY ARMOR REPAIR PROGRAM

This program is designed to reclaim the ballistic components of the body armor and by replacing all the cloth, zippers, snaps, etc., contractor furnished, place the armor in a completely serviceable condition for reissue to Marine units in Vietnam.

The USMC Body Armor Repair Program is progressing satisfactorily. The original contractor was RYUKYU MIE CHEMICAL CO. An additional

contractor YOGI SHOKAI, will repair upper torso body armor at a rate of 500 per week at a repair cost of \$6.50 each. Production samples have been received and the results are satisfactory. Contractors for the repair of lower torso body armor have been located. A rate of 250 lowers per week has been set as the minimum. The input/output status is shown on CHART #III.

The ROKMC Body Armor Repair Program is progressing. The output rate is 100 per month as required by III MAF and the estimated repair cost is \$4.95 each. The first 300 repaired assets were delivered to ROKMC Control Center by courier. Contract has been awarded and production rate of 100 per month will continue until end of FY67 contract period. Contract clauses contain the indefinite quantity and option to extend clauses.

A repair program to handle NAVSUPACT Saigon requirements for repair of body armor was established. The type of armor to be repaired will be standard Army infantry style plus a test model style and about 40 units per month will be repaired. As a matter of interest 19,123 upper torso have been repaired at a savings of \$1,287,021 and 7593 lower torso at a savings of \$122,619.

RECOMMENDATION: Continue to monitor the program.

BRIEFING ITEM: Update on financial programs


BACKGROUND: Budget formulation and execution within 3d Force Service Regiment requires the active participation of Battalion Commanding Officers in that they submit budget estimates and receive funds; both planning estimate (hard dollars) and operating budget (soft dollars).

DISCUSSION: The various Marine Corps Appropriations and Budget projects for which the Commanding Officer, 3d Force Service Regiment submits budget estimates and receives funds are as follows:

1. Operations and maintenance, Marine Corps - Budget Project 11. The funds budgeted for and received under this appropriation are used for the normal day-to-day expenses of the 3d Force Service Regiment. (Chart #1, enclosure (1))
2. Within Project 11 are fifteen (15) program codes in which funds are provided for a variety of requirements ranging from TAD to support of supply, maintenance and service support requirements for Westpac Fleet Marine Force, units. (Chart #2, enclosure (2))
3. Approximately 95% of these funds are obligated and expended for Program Code "R", Stock Replenishment. (Chart #3, enclosure (3))
4. Military personnel, Marine Corps - Budget Project 31. Funds budgeted for and received under this appropriation are used to reimburse the Army for all on-island subsistence. Included also are funds for units of 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade and the Marine Range Detachment, Camp Fuji. (Chart #4, enclosure (4))
5. From the appropriation "OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, NAVY" under Project 20 funds are authorized for medical and dental supplies for all Westpac Fleet Marine Force units. The funding at 3d Force Service Regiment for these supplies will be reduced as the COMMON ITEM SUPPORT PROGRAM within Vietnam is implemented. When this program is fully implemented 3d Force Service Regiment will support only on-island and SLF requirements for medical and dental supplies. (Chart #5, enclosure (5))
6. From the appropriation "MILITARY PERSONNEL, MARINE CORPS" under Project 31 funds are authorized for subsistence items for on-island requirements to include the rotating BLT's. Since the budget was submitted support requirements have increased from approximately 8500 to approximately 13,000 personnel. (Chart #4, enclosure (4))
7. In addition to the above, the Commanding Officer, 3d Force Service Regiment receives funds for on-island ammunition requirements, spare parts support for new items of equipment introduced into the MF and funds for 5th echelon repair/rebuild of certain items of Section "M" (aviation).







BRIEFING ITEM: Update of the Third Force Service Regiment rewarehousing program

BACKGROUND: The purpose of this briefing is to provide an update of the current rewarehousing program of the Third Force Service Regiment. The basic program commenced in late 1966 with the relocation of stationary stocks to provide space in warehouse 1102 for erection of the Automated Material Handling System. Also during this period metal bins were being erected in warehouse 1101 with a subsequent relocation and consolidation of binable stocks. Some progress was made during the early months of 1967 however a comprehensive program could not be initiated due to the heavy issue workload and severe MHE problems that existed at the time. During early March plans were completed for major rewarehousing of all covered and open storage areas. The basic plan was intended to provide: (1) A consolidation of stocks by federal group, (2) Better utilization of covered space, (3) Improved protection of material stored in open storage areas, (4) Identification of Misidentified/Unidentified Stocks, and (5) Preservation and recrating of weathered stocks. Engineering projects were included in the plan for semi-improvement of open storage areas within the "H" Area, Inflammable Storage Lot, Camp Hauge and Packing and Crating and Shipping and Receiving staging areas, Rex Area. The program actually commenced in Mid-March with the re-habilitation and rewarehousing of Lot #10, "H" Area.

DISCUSSION: The current program consists of five major areas of effort:

a. Relocation and consolidation of stocks within all major storage areas. An indication of the magnitude of the effort is reflected in the large volume of location changes being initiated. Through March, April and May an average of 140,000 changes were made monthly. During June the input has decreased, due primarily to the various phases of completion, to 91,000 changes submitted through the 27th.

b. Preservation and recrating of weathered stocks. Program consists of continuing inspections of material to determine serviceability, disposal of unserviceable stocks and replacement of unserviceable crates and containers. The Preservation, Packaging and Packing Platoon has been augmented with forty personnel to provide preservation assistance.

c. Identification of Misidentified/Unidentified Stock. The majority of these stocks have been detected as a result of the rewarehousing program. During May, 2486 line items were identified and returned to stock. Through 27 June, 1785 have been identified.

d. Improved protection of stocks located in open storage. Surface conditioning of open storage lot #10 and Rex Area staging areas was completed on 1 May and 1 June respectively by the Engineer Platoon, 3d FSR. Work commenced on 27 June by Camp Butler crews, augmented by 3d FSR, to recondition the Inflammable Storage Area, Camp Hauge. In addition, 260 nylon reinforced tarps were procured during May for use on Lots #10 and #05, "H" Area. Additional tarps will be procured for inflammable storage on completion of the current effort.

e. Material offerings to the Force Logistics Command. During the initial phases of the rewarehouseing effort at Camp Hauge considerable quantities of non-preferred insecticides were noted. A review of obligations and past issue history indicated little or no demand by RVN units although it was believed that they could be used effectively in RVN insect control programs. An offering of this material was made by speedletter to the FLC on 17 May and did result in significant movement of assets. Based on the success of this first offering, similar screens are currently being conducted in the areas of housekeeping and cleaning supplies, construction materials, prefabricated boxes and messhall equipment.

The current status of individual storage areas, with pertinent highlights if applicable, is indicated below.

Rewarehousing associated with the AMHS is 80% complete. Erection of 3184 bins was completed 1 April. Program now involves a physical screen of all bulk warehouses to locate additional items for bin storage. Program expected to generate approximately 18,000 additional items. Total of 102,000 locations established to date with estimated 120,000 on completion. Slippage has been experienced in the erection phase of the system with completion now planned for 31 October in lieu of 18 September. Finally, a temporary postal facility was established within warehouse 1101 on 1 June to provide for expedited movement of parcel post material. This facility was staffed with postal personnel of 3d FSR and Camp Butler. A permanent operation will be established concurrently with the AMHS.

Unidentified bulk steel, rods, angle iron and steel plate are on hand. This situation developed through prolonged outside storage and the fact that most items are extremely difficult to identify due to peculiar characteristics (ie: hot rolled vs. cold rolled steel). Identification program started in January of this year and considerable progress has been made. Rewarehousing of Lot 50 is considered to be the most difficult phase of the entire 3d FSR rewarehousing program.

Flammable Storage

Paints - Insecticides

30 August

A number of projects have been implemented to expedite the rewarehousing of Inflammables. These projects were intended to reduce the inventory of material on the lot to permit grading, filling and semi-improved surfacing prior to rewarehousing. Included among those projects were: First, a complete physical screen of all assets on the lot to detect material required by RVN units. Second, a screen of all insecticides to determine those that could be used in RVN insect control programs although they were non-preferred and indicated little or no demand by RVN units. Finally, establishment of a medium lot inflammable storage site within the H Area. The engineer effort commenced on the lot on 27 June. Rewarehousing will be conducted concurrently with the engineer effort and will include: disposal of unserviceable stocks, repacking of serviceable stocks (where required), erection of steel pallet racks for storage and procurement of nylon reinforced plastic tarps for weather protection.

Briefing Item: Update on Maintenance Programs

Background: The maintenance programs within Maintenance Battalion and the total workload of the Battalion have been affected by the implementation of the MUMMS system; the conversion period has affected spare parts support to a sizable degree, which is reflected in a significant drop in shop stores fill rate. Curtailment of rotating BLT's has also affected total workload input of the Battalion.

Discussion: There has been a decrease in the workload in Motor Transport, Ordnance, and Electronics Maintenance Companies in the past two months; this is partially attributed to the temporary abatement of the rotating BLT Program. Although considerable work is still on hand in all companies, the decrease in work input should permit the reduction of work backlog; thus far this has not been possible, however, because of the lack of repair parts. This repair parts problem is due to the introduction of MUMMS, and the inherent problems associated with the start of any new program. There have been indications within the past few weeks that the downward trend in the shop stores fill rate has stopped and is beginning an increase.

Improvement continues to be made in methods and techniques of production in anticipation of increased workloads due to possible

additional programs, resumption of rotating BLT's, and the cyclic increase of work.

Electronics Maintenance Company is short over forty personnel and have on hand only 112 of their rated 152.

Certain special facilities which are vital, such as parkerization, will not be ready this calender year unless special action is taken.

Recommendations:

- (1) That additional electronics personnel be provided;
- (2) That action be taken to expedite the installation of the parkerization facility.

Good Afternoon, General, I am Lieutenant Colonel Miniclier, Commanding Officer of Maintenance Battalion.

This afternoon I will bring you up-to-date on the overall status of the maintenance effort within Maintenance Battalion, 3d FSR.

(Chart 1) This chart shows a recapitulation of the three vehicle rebuild programs within Maintenance Battalion. The M-36 program continues to meet the monthly assigned output of five. The M-37 program has not been able to expand to the goal of fifteen a month due to a spare parts shortage; nine M-37's will be rebuilt this month, and the two M-43's received during May will be completed during July.

(Chart 2) This chart covers the total number of engines, by type, that we have moved through our engine shop in the past six months. The final figure with this week's production should reach 600. If sufficient repair parts are on hand, we can double this output over the next six months period. This significant increase in production is possible through new shop methods, an increase in civilian employees, and the pending installation of an additional dynamometer. In an effort to comply with your order that all engines in WestPac will be rebuilt at 3d FSR, we have taken action to stop shipment of multi-fuel engine parts to RVN. We are considering taking similar action on other type engines such as MHE, tanks, and LVT's. The engine rebuild effort has suffered work stoppages within the last month because of the lack of spare parts; this lack of spare parts is attributable in large part to the implementation of MUMMS.

(Charts 3 & 4) These two charts show the General Supply Maintenance workload for Fiscal Year 1967, through 24 June 1967. It is anticipated that the workload for June will exceed that shown for May. The green columns show the work requests received, the yellow the work requests completed, the blue the work requests on hand, and the red the work requests awaiting spare parts at the end of the period, which is zero in this commodity area. In black, directly above June, is shown the breakdown of working TERO's, or the difference between the red and blue columns. For ease of comparison the workload for last July is repeated in the upper right hand corner. The rotating BLT's had little effect in this commodity area. The trend of a gradual work increase starting in July with a peak in March, followed by a slight decline through the months of April, May, and June, is the same trend you will see in the charts that follow for each company. I will discuss this trend later.

(Charts 5 & 6) These two charts show the Electronics Maintenance Company workload for Fiscal Year 1967, through 24 June 1967. The same information as the last chart is shown in a similar manner. It is anticipated that the work input for June will exceed that shown for May. You will note the same trend with work increasing since last July, peaking in March, followed by a decrease. The lower output is primarily due to a large influx of radiac instruments which are on ISSA with the Army, and the fact that a large number of organic test equipment passed through the cyclic calibration period during June.

(Charts 7 & 8) These two charts show the Engineer Maintenance Company workload for Fiscal Year 1967 in the same manner as the previous

charts. This company received an average of thirty work orders from BLT's; therefore, the BLT's had no great impact on the work effort. The trend of work increase and decrease is the same as in the other commodity areas, with the peak once again in March. Our concern here is the drop in work effort in combat essential items or large end items.

(Charts 9 & 10) Ordnance again shows the same trend of work increase, peaking in March. As in other commodity areas, our output is affected by the lack of spare parts.

(Charts 11 & 12) Motor Transport Maintenance shows the trend depicted in every company, with its peak also occurring in March. Parts shortages in this company have become critical, and have been the cause of work stoppages. This we believe is a result of MUMMS and also the reduction of our stockage in shop stores from 90 days to 45 days. The problems which involve repair parts shortages are being worked on daily. This period of reduced work load which occurs during June, July and August should be the time that we reduce our backlog rather than have it increase, and this is what we intend to do.

(Charts 13 & 14) These two charts are the totals of the companies work load; therefore, they show the Battalion total for the year and they again reinforce the established trend, as noted. The work input for June should be as great as that shown for May, or possibly exceed that of May.

(Charts 15 & 16) These charts show the same kind of information by Fiscal Year Quarters, and permit a comparison between Fiscal Year 66

and the current Fiscal Year. The same trend that we have seen in each company over the past year stands out in the FY-67 chart and is also present in the FY-66 chart. This indicates that we can expect an increase in work load in FY-68 over FY-67, but the increase should not be as great as it was in FY-67 over FY-66 because of the increased capabilities in-country. We can also expect an increase in work load during the second and third quarters, with a reduction in the fourth quarter. A cursory analysis of this trend seems to indicate that the increase in the quarters shown is due to pending operational commitments and weather conditions in RVN. A more detailed study of these trends is being conducted at this time.

BRIEFING ITEM: STATUS OF TRANSITION TO ACCOMPANIED TOURS.

BACKGROUND:

With the desireability for continuity in many billets in this Command, 3d Force Service Regiment was included in the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific's request submitted to the Commandant of the Marine Corps that certain key billets be accompanied tour billets. Headquarters Marine Corps approved 57 officer and 43 enlisted billets.

DISCUSSION:

To date we have information by name of 20 officer assignments, 7 of whom are incumbents within 3d Force Service Regiment, and 1 enlisted man who will be coming from outside the Command.

A. TRANSPORTATION. Provision has been made by Headquarters for incumbents to travel to CONUS when deemed essential to assist dependents in moving to Okinawa.

B. HOUSING. From interviews with officers who have been seeking housing, some points appear which I'm sure will be of interest. The Joint Housing Inspection and Control Office (abbreviated JHICO) do control rental housing. As is usual, the most desireable housing is often arranged for by word of mouth. There is no central heating. Air conditioners, which are usually a luxury item in CONUS, are considered by personnel who own their own furniture, to be a necessity. Both clothing and furniture deteriorate with out the air

conditioning. An average two or three bedroom home often needs two air conditioners to combat dampness. The electricity bill which includes these two "furniture savers" is between \$50.00 to \$70.00 per month.

Personnel living in civilian housing usually pay \$5.00 a month for "guards". If guards are not desired the "stealie boys" have a field day.

Prices on a good rental house in a desireable location is \$140.00 plus utilities.

(1) BUYING A HOME. The stated cost is in most cases not the true cost. An example would be an \$8,000 home with no landscaping. By "no landscaping" it is meant the grass would be an added cost of \$75.00 to \$100.00. A retaining wall (a necessity in this area) is another \$1,200. Refrigerators and gas ranges etc. are not furnished.

A 30 to 40% downpayment is required and the balance must be paid prior to the completion of the tour. The interest rate is 8%.

The advantage monetarily than an Army or Air Force man has is noteworthy. An Air Force enlisted man is in rental housing for 6 to 9 months, then he moves into government housing. His cash outlay drops sharply and remains low during the remainder of his tour. Our Marines continue to live a period of from 18 to 24 months beyond that time and pay out an additional \$2,000 in cash as compared with his counterpart. The financial burden on an enlisted man is commensurate to taking away his reenlistment bonus.

This is expected to have an adverse effect on our retention rate and should be a sound piece of information to use in obtaining government quarters at HQ/DOD level.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That continuing efforts be exerted at the highest level to obtain government quarters.
2. That a supplemental rental allowance be paid until such time as government quarters are available.
3. That personnel requiring 4 bedrooms not be ordered to Okinawa for an accompanied tour.

BRIEFING ITEM: As you know sir, on 17 November, 1966, Third Force Service Regiment became a tributary station on the Pacific Interim Autodin network. As far as practicable the circuit was secured in accordance with RED/BLACK criteria on 22 February, 1967. We can now handle traffic up to and including TOP SECRET.

We have the IBM 1013 transmission terminal operating at a speed of 100 cards per minute at 2400 BAUD. The usual operating speed for this terminal is 1200 BAUD. The principle reason why we operate at twice the normal speed is that the circuit between 3d Force Service Regiment and Stratcomm, our major relay center, is conducive to this speed. By operating at 2400 BAUD it makes for a more satisfactory operating circuit and there are no delays in the cards comming in. The other equipment at 3d Force Service Regiment includes the 407 Page Printer, IBM 577 Alphabetic Interperter and the IBM 026 Card Punch.

DISCUSSION: As a result of our testing with Force Logistics Command at Red Beach, we discovered a few problems in our autodin system here. Steps were taken at 3d Force Service Regiment to improve our autodin service. One problem encountered was one of lack of proper training and knowledge of the IBM machines used in the autodin system. This was remedied by instigating a training program with the Army Stratcomm facility here on Okinawa. Other problems encountered at 3d Force Service Regiment are those of long handling times of messages, tracer action and reporting procedures between 3d Force Service Regiment and Force Logistics Command. Our Message Center Officer 2ndLt. Joseph R. NIX and the Communication Center Chief recently visited the Force Logistics Command Communication Center and co-ordinated solutions to these problems. Both units now employ the same procedures for in station operating and serving of misrouted messages. We feel that the problem of long handling times on test batches was due to the fact that at the relay centers test batches are being set aside for the transmission of actual traffic. Once actual message traffic has began, all concerned feel that the message handling times will be greatly reduced.

Presently the circuit is operating very well. Traffic to Conus has been transmitted and received almost error free. Lt. NIX's visit to the Force Logistics Command at Red Beach has confirmed the fact that all messages received by them from us, are also

almost error free. Sufficient controls have been devised to promote efficient handling of live traffic as opposed to those currently in effect for test batches and there are no expected problems here.

This year our Communication Center has handled in excess of 5,484 autodin messages with a monthly average of approx. 1,371. Those messages totaled out at 786,569 cards or a monthly average of 196,652 cards.

Autodin maintenance at 3d Force Service Regiment is by contract with IBM here on Okinawa. We have been fortunate that they are located close by and have been answering our calls for service promptly.

Our last problem is one of space. Current autodin work space as well as card storage space is both limited and cramped. This will be rectified in the near future, when we move into our new Communications Center. Space has been designed into the Comm Center Plans for autodin working and storage areas. During the movement from our old to new Communications Center we are expecting to close down our autodin circuit for a maximum of three days.

Finally, I would like to thank both the 3d Force Service Regiment and Force Service Command that we can activate our message traffic on a permanent circuit at the present time with good results.

PRINTING ITEM: Update on Supply Statistics in Support of West Pac Units.

BACKGROUND: During each visit to 3d FSR by the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, an updated report on supply statistics is furnished.

DISCUSSION: Supply Statistics reflecting support of all West Pac Units for class II & IV material are shown in enclosures (1) through (4).

The decrease in demands as shown in enclosure (1) is attributed to conversion of Slit requisitioning/accounting procedures to MILSTRIP requisitioning/accounting procedures. The decrease in demands for May was further influenced by directives emphasizing to all commands the necessity to closely monitor requirements and the challenge programs of the Stock Account.

The decreased fill rate as shown on enclosure (1) for May is attributed generally to the conversion to the 360 computer and to MILSTRIP/MILSTRAP procedures. No replenishment requirements were processed from 1 May 67 until 22 May 67. This coupled with the fact that the shelves were emptied at the beginning of conversion reduced the fill rate to approximately 30% for the month of May. The fill rate for June shows an upward trend. Every effort is being made to continue this upward trend.

The decrease in obligations is directly attributable to the decrease demands for the month of May.

BRIEFING ITEM:

CHALLENGE PROGRAM: Analysis on requisition challenge program.

Background: During the 12 March 1967 visit to 3d FSR by the CG FMFPac, a briefing was conducted on a program whereby the Stock Account was challenging high quantity/high dollar value unit requisitions. Since that time, 3d FSR has made weekly reports on status of the challenge program. Subsequent to the conversion of accounting procedures from SLIT to MILSTRIP and the introduction of the 360 computer, the Stock Account presently utilizes a computer program to challenge unit requisitions. Since the initiation of the requisition challenge program the following results have been obtained:

It should be pointed out that the challenge program does more than cause a verification of requirements. It is a police action to correct human errors. Approximately 13 million of the 25.5 million cancelled to date under the manual challenge program was the result of erroneous unit of issue errors. These errors were not factored when processed by the Stock Account in country and at 3d FSR.

BRIEFING ITEM: Analysis of Requisition Challenge Program.

The 360 computer is programmed to screen all customer requisitions which have an extended value of over \$500 or a quantity in excess of RO. These exceptions are analyzed as follows:

1. High Dollar Value Exceptions

a. Other than FLC or 1st or 3d Service Battalion

(1) SFA items over \$500.00 are compared by quantity to demand history. If request is greater than demand history, a challenge is effected. If not the requisition is reinducted and processed normally.

b. FLC, 1st or 3d Service Battalion

(1) SFA items over \$3,000.00 are compared by quantity to demand history. If request is greater than 3 times demand history, a challenge is effected. If not the requisition is reinducted and processed normally.

2. High Quantity Exceptions

a. Other than FLC, 1st or 3d Service Battalion

(1) If SFA or ASA and demand code is R, multiply RO times 4. If results are greater than quantity requested, assign OOC and reinduct. If results of RO times 4 are less than quantity requested, effect challenge.

(2) If SFA or ASA and demand code is N, multiply RO TIMES 5. If results are greater than quantity requested, assign OOC and reinduct. If results of RO times 5 are less than quantity requested, effect challenge.

BRIEFING ITEM: STEPS TAKEN TO PREVENT ABUSE OF SHIPPING PRIORITIES

BACKGROUND: IN CONVERTING MATERIEL REQUISITION PRIORITIES TO TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES THE MILSTAMP CONVERSION TABLE AND CINPAC TIME FRAMES ARE USED BY THE THIRD FORCE SERVICE REGIMENT AS INDICATED BY CHART 1.

DISCUSSION: TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT AT THE THIRD FORCE SERVICE REGIMENT IN SUPPORT OF MARINE CORPS DEPLOYED UNITS IS SUCH THAT REQUIRED DELIVERY DATES ESTABLISHED BY PRIORITY STANDARDS ARE OBSERVED WITHOUT EXCEPTION. HOWEVER, EVERY EFFORT IS MADE TO AVOID HIGH COST TRANSPORTATION AND IMPAIR LIFT CAPABILITY WHERE THIS IS NOT A VALID NEED.

PRIOR TO 28 JUNE 1967 THE TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT OFFICE ACCEPTED AND OFFERED ALL TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY ONE DOCUMENTS FOR SHIPMENT VIA PREMIUM TYPE AIR TRANSPORTATION IF THEY WERE COMPATIBLE FOR AIR SHIPMENT. TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY TWO DOCUMENTS WHOSE REQUIRED DELIVERY DATES COULD NOT BE MET WERE DIVERTED TO AIR TRANSPORTATION IN ORDER TO MEET THE DEMANDS OF THE CUSTOMER.

THERE HAS BEEN AND WILL CONTINUE TO BE CERTAIN DEMANDS FOR MATERIELS ASSIGNED TRANSPORTATION PRIORITY ONE WHICH MUST OF NECESSITY BE DIVERTED TO SEA TRANSPORTATION BECAUSE OF:

TOPIC: MHE PILOT REBUILD PROGRAM

BACKGROUND: The MHE Pilot Rebuild Program was initiated by Project Order Number 2302322 Feb 67 after an analysis was conducted as to the feasibility of such a program. Action was initiated on 15 Feb 67 Project Order Number 0100447 March 67 to provide assets for this program. Subsequent discussions established that a total of two Pettibone models and two Clark models would be rebuilt at Yokosuka and three Baker models and three Clark models rebuilt at FLC.

DISCUSSION: The MHE Pilot Rebuild Program is an on-going activity at Yokosuka with the forklifts which have been received. The two models received at the Public Works Center, Yokosuka has been repaired and the two 4000 lbs models are Pettibone models and both of the two 4000 lbs models are Clark models. The 4000 lbs model is scheduled for the Pilot Rebuild Program. The remaining 6000 lbs model is a Pettibone and is awaiting shipping at Force Logistic Center Yokosuka. Pettibone's Material Service Regiment has received two of the 6000 lbs models. The 4000 lbs model and all three of the 4000 lbs command models are at FLC. The remaining three Baker model is at FLC awaiting shipment. The 6000 lbs model has not been received at the repair facilities. It has been received at the repair facilities as follows:

Yokosuka

6000 lbs 302860 - received on 1 Jun 1967. 100% of parts received.
No parts received.

4000 lbs 247152 - received on 22 May 1967. Disassembled.

247178 - parts not requisitioned due to lack of manuals.

3d FMR

6000 lbs 239735 - received on 1 Jun 1967.
Baker

300762 - received on 15 May 1967. Disassembled. 100% parts requisitioned. Assembly started.

4000 lbs 247155 - both received on 15 May 1967. Disassembled.
Clark 247173 100% parts requisitioned. 20% parts received.
Assembly started.

247167 - received on 5 Jun 1967. Being disassembled.

The work order funding the MHE Pilot Rebuild Program has been given a Project Order Number in order to preserve privately allotted funds at the end of the fiscal year.

Considering the time lapse since the beginning of this program and the difficulty experienced in retrograde movement of assets, the 3d

Pilot Rebuild program is proceeding encompassing only those assets which have been received at the rebuild facilities. To delay further will extend the duration of the program at least another 90 to 120 days. It is anticipated that forklifts can be turned out one week after receipt of all repair parts.

In addition to the pilot program, disposition instructions have been provided to CG, ForLogMnd to ship 19 6000 lbs forklifts to 3d FMR for 5th echelon maintenance.

RECOMMENDATION: Continue to monitor the program to ensure earliest implementations.

STAFF PAPER: Anticipated Utilization of Containerization Program

BACKGROUND: Military Sea Transportation Service (MSTS) is currently implementing containerized service from CONUS to DANANG, and the institution of this shipment mode for Marine Corps cargoes (Okinawa to Danang) is feasible.

DISCUSSION: Facilities for loading containerized trailers aboard vessels are available through the Naha Army Port. Currently, the Shipping and Receiving Platoon, Headquarters and Service Battalion, 3d FSR, receives approximately 25 containerized trailers monthly from CONUS via the Naha Army Port. With the available facilities at Naha for the loading of trailers aboard the vessel, and the construction of a loading ramp in the 3d PSR area, this Battalion could utilize this mode of transportation. Containerized shipments provide consolidation of shipping units to the same RUE, reduces cargo damage and excess handling of individual pieces of cargo, greatly reduce pilferage, and in many instances expedite the cargo movement from the consignor to the consignee. It is estimated that 2500 measurement tons (M/T) of cargo per month could be provided for containerized shipment to Danang.

This projected requirement could be met by the use of approximately 50 containerized shipping trailers. A break-bulk site has been constructed in the Forces Logistics Command (FLC) area at Danang which will accommodate the simultaneous unloading of three containers. It is assumed that this site is adequate for Okinawa shipments in addition to those containers originating from COMUS.


RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That appropriate steps be taken to implement a Marine Corps containerized shipping program from Okinawa to Danang.
2. That a covered loading ramp be constructed in the 3d PSR area for the loading and unloading of containerized trailers (see enclosure (1)), provided recommendation #1 is approved.
