



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

PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

This reporting period was characterized by a continuation of extensive patrolling effort in attempting to make contact with the enemy and assure early warning of his arrival in the area of operations. Enemy contact remained light, and primary emphasis was placed on improving defensive positions in the immediate vicinity of the Khe Sanh airfield. Close-in defensive positions were approximately 90% completed at the end of the reporting period. During the period of Christmas and New Year's truce, close-in defensive positions were occupied, and combat outposts improved.

Training continued to receive maximum attention, with emphasis on 81mm morter platoon training in a general support mission. All personnel armed with the M-14 rifle received marksmanship instruction consisting of lectures and zeroing at 15 yards and 200 yards. Approximately 300 men in the battalion received instruction in demolitions and explosives, given by an attached squad from 3d Engineer Battalion.

RVN units formerly in the Khe Sanh TAOR (CIDG and LLDB) were relocated to other sectors during the month, necessitating increased emphasis on perimeter security and adjustment of areas of patrol responsibility.



SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- 1. Combat mission assigned: to conduct reconnaissance in force operations in the Khe Sanh TAOR to provide security for the Khe Sanh airfield complex.

- (1) 032150. A Company "B" patrol enroute to a designated ambush site, vicinity 833436, reacted to voices in heavy brush to their flank by firing 25 rounds, small arms. Two flashes as if from return small arms were noted by patrol members. Area searched, negative results.
- (2) 041445. Commanding General, 3d Marine Division arrived in the Sanh TAOR.
- (3) 091126. Patrol leader from Company "A" fell into punjitrap, vicinity 775439, puncturing left leg and requiring med-evac from battalion TAOR. Negative enemy contact made.
- (4) 100030. Company "A" reported a light at 822402. 81mm mortar fire called, excellent coverage. Light went out.
- (5) 101325. Generals CHAPMAN, MURRAY, KYLE and ENGLISH visited Khe Sanh and battalion.
- (6) 102220. Company "A" patrol, in defensive position for night (vicinity 813463) reported movement on perimeter. One grenade thrown by patrol. Area searched at first light. Negative results.





- (7) 11440. A.D.C. 3d Marine Division arrived in Khe Sanh TAOR.
- (8) 121545. Battalion area visited by COMUSMACV.
- (9) 140855. Battalion rifle range officially opened by D Company range detail.
- (10) 141220. Helicopter gun ship flying cover for Company B patrol insert reported three (3) VC in vicinity 849494. Artillery fire mission called, followed by strafing run by gun ship. Company B patrol searched area. Blood trail found and followed for 300 meters. Trail ended at that point.
- (11) 141425. Company B patrol in vicinity 852495 discovered thirty (30) bamboo hooch frames (for 2-3 men hooch), and recently used fire pits. Later a B Company patrol at 858482 discovered two (2) spider holes, eleven (11) tables (class area). At 852495 the same patrol discovered forty hooch poles, thirty nine (39) fireplaces, thirteen (13) kettles and evidence of fresh grape-fruit and berries.
- (12) 161610. Generals WAIM, KYLE and distinguished guest arrived in Khe Sanh.
 - (13) 181400. A.D.C. 3d Marine Division visited Khe Sanh TAOR.
- (14) 182145. A Company "A" listening post reported two (2) VC moving to their front. Small arms fired at enemy. LP received incoming carbine fire, and called for 81mm illumination. VC pursued by reaction unit. Fire fight followed. Reaction force withdrawn and 60mm mortar fired into area, followed by squad sweep. Negative results on sweep.
- (15) 201930. 1st Battalion commenced scheduled occupancy of close in defensive positions around Khe Sanh airfield.
- (16) 231007. B Bty 1/13 conducted fire mission in response to request by local CIDG element ambushed shortly before at 815371. Excellent coverage of area. Results unknown.
 - (17) 240700-260700. Christmas truce in effect. .
 - (18) 310700. New Year's truce in effect.
- 3. Casualties inflicted on the enemy: None confirmed.
- 4. Casualties sustained: One gunshot wound, two punji stake wounds.
- 5. New techniques employed: No new techniques employed.



- 6. Command relations: Battalion was OPCON CG 3d Mar Div/CG III MAF Representative, Khe Sanh, and ADCON CG 3d Mar Div.
- 7. Equipment: A heavy section of M-76 "Otters" was utilized effectively in providing logistic support to areas when road conditions prohibited passage of wheeled vehicles.

8. logistics:

- a. Supply. During this period, the availability of all classes of supply improved to the extent that sufficient stocks of some previously short items(dry cell batteries and field fortification material) were maintained in the LSA and the LSU. Supply of class II remained a serious problem, due primarily to competing requirements for available transportation. The supply status of the Battalion was enhanced by two events during the month; The relief of the LSA by an FLSU unit on 6 December, and the arrival of the Battalion Supply Officer from Danang on 14 December with sufficient stocks of class II supplies to alleviate some of the Battalion's supply shortages. Of particular note was the assistance rendered this unit by the Division Forward Supply Officer and the continued assistance rendered by the FLSU at Dong Na.
- b. Maintenance. The maintenance status of the service elements of the Battalion improved during this period to the extent that six (6) 274Al vehicles involuntarily deadlined earlier this month were removed from deadline by organic organizational maintenance capability. The primary reason for this improvement was the arrival of needed repair parts from the battalion rear at Danang. The arrival of the FLSU at Khe sanh also enhanced the maintenance situation of the Battalion in ordnance, communications-Electronics and Motor transport, Since the FLSU includes personnel authorized to perform third echelon maintenance.
- c. Food Services. The Galley continues to operate in the forward area feeding approximately 1100 men a noon meal of "B" rations, and soup in the evening for one company and a portion of H&S Company. The previous Mess Sergeant, SSgt MERLE MITTFORD, was transferred and received a letter of appreciation from the Battalion Commander in recognition of his efforts. GySgt ADAMS, who recently joined this unit, is presently the Mess Sergeant. The Galley does not have the capability to serve "A" rations every day due to non availability of sufficient electric power to operate a large reefer. However, a 100 cu ft reefer is being obtained to partially alleviate the after situation. The traditional dinner of Turkey and Ham was served on thristmas Day.
- d. Cantonment and Camp Facilities Development. The facilities at Khe Sanh have expanded and now include GP tents for living spaces for the Galley personnel and Battalion Supply storage areas, an additional GP tent for Motor Transport servicing area and a storeroom for BAS. Additional facility

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improvements were made by strong backing of the BAS sickward and the Galley. In addition, each company has a GP tent for drying and storage. Electricity has been provided to BAS and the Galley. A command burker has been constructed by a detachment of engineers and is in the process of improvement prior to being occupied. The home-made living shelters in the company and GP positions are continually being improved and have more than held their own against the elements. A llot Shower Unit was received during the last week of December and is in operation on the north side of the airstrip.

- e. Transportation. The Battalion experienced an extensive period of inclement weather during December which rendered all routes of communication impassable to organic vehicles. The only vehicles able to travel the roads were 21/2 ton and 5 ton trucks and bull dozers. Even these vehicles, with chains, became entrapped in the mud. As the weather cleared and the ground dried, new roads were formed by bull dozers traveling adjacent to impassable stretches. A new, fairweather road has been built around the airstrip by NCB-10. The MSR to one company's defensive positions was improved by providing drainage and culverting. Three M-76 "Otters" were provided during the month, and were invaluable in operating in the mud. Aircraft continues as the only means of transportation into and out of Khe Sanh.
- f. Fiscal. No significant events or changes. Supply economy is continuously stressed as the most effective method of conservation of collar resources.
- g. Water. During this month, the resupply of water to the Battalion became a problem due to the location of the water point in an outpost area and the impassability of the roads. Bull dozers became prime movers for towing water trailers to and from the water point. When the weather cleared and the roads were still impassable, Helicopters and "Otters" were used to effect water resupply for companies. Since then the water point has been relocated to a more suitable position within Phase III positions on the north side of the airfield. A hot shower unit was subsequently added. In addition to the two water trailers presently at Khe Sanh, three more have been manifested for movement from Danang to Khe Sanh.
- h. <u>Motor Transport</u>. The Battalion has 18 M274Al "Mules" and ten M422Al "Mites" assigned to Khe Sanh. A driving school was conducted for "Mite" and "Mule" drivers during the month, stressing driving under poor road conditions and preventive maintenance. Each type vehicle was covered in a three-day course of instruction with approximately 33 men attending both achools.
- i. Embarkation. Plans for embarkation from Khe Sanh have been initiated with all companies and sections determining and updating their embarkation requirements. Rapid progress has been made in this area of planning.

j. <u>Hospitalization</u> and Evacuation. Hospitalization and evacuation facilities both were improved. The provision of electricity to BAS and the strong backing of the sickward were significant improvements. The evacuation capability for the Battalion was vastly improved with the attachment of H-34 Helicopters which remain with the Battalion overnight. 74 men were evacuated during the month; 3 battle and 71 non-battle casualties.

9. Civic Action:

- a. On 24 December 1966, a Christmas party sponsored by the Battalion, for the children of Khe Sanh, was given in support of Vietnamese Christmas celebrations. Approximately one hundred gifts were distributed.
- b. On 24 December 1966, church services conducted by a Vietnamese minister was attended by a volunteer group of 21 Marines who also represented the Battalion at the childrens Christmas party.
- c. A mimeograph machine was presented by the Battalion to the Tin Lanh mission in Khe Sanh, during December. (See Chaplaine Support; paragraph (c))
- d. Visitation of the Vietnamese Government Clinic and the Missionary Clinic in Khe Sanh is on a continuing basis.
- e. Although Med-Cap supplies remain on a limited basis, a Med Cap program has been instituted in the following villfages:
 - (1) Ta Cong
 - (2) A Reing
 - (3) No Xun
 - (4) Lan Bui
 - (5) Khe Sanh

To date this team has seen 405 men, women and children. Most treatments are for skin infections, worms, eye infections, vitamin deficiency, dolds, diarrhea, etc. These conditions exist mainly through a lack of knowledge of personal hygiene. It is anticipated that the Med Cap program will be able to assist these indigenous people to achieve a more hygienic and sanitary living conditions.

10. ATMINISTRATION: trorderly administration under conditions of a split administrative rear echelon (which processes incoming and outgoing personnel, R&R personnel, claims, and performs normal company administration) and a forward element performing legal, reporting, casualty, and mail services (including teletype and attendant administrative traffic) is far more

taxing than that encountered in a garrison status. Company administration is performed without the constant supervision of first sergeants, who divide their time between forward and rear echelons. Shortages of administrative personnel have been partially alleviated joinings, but remain a problem. The lack of a trained legal clerk and lack of telephone communications between forward and rear echelons are the most critical areas in administration. Courier service was established but has been handicapped by weather conditions.

- h. Postal: Postal service continues to be satisfactory. Weather prevents aircraft from delivering wail daily. Mail is sorted by company at Dong Ha, with resultant minimum handling at Khe Sanh.
- i. Post Exchange: Limited exchange facilities have been available through mobile exchange from Division. Resupply has been severely restricted by difficulty in getting supplies manifested aboard aircraft at Phu Bai.

12. Intelligence:

- a. Summary of Enemy Situation during Period.
- (1) There was no increase in enemy activity during the reporting period.
- (2) Enemy recon/combat teams of 2-4 men continued to harrass fixed positions but avoided contact with USMC recon/combat patrols. See paragraph (b).
- (3) Enemy tactical intentions, unit identification, base camp locations, and strength continued to be un-determined.
 - b. Enemy Initiated Incidents during period.
- (1) 032150H-- Company "B" patrol 350 meters from Company CP, moving NE, heard noise to right flank of patrol. One Marine brought area under fire; 2 flashes were observed; 1 hand illumination grenade thrown; area searched; Negative results. Marine Patrol suffered one WIA.
- (2) 141040H -- Company "B" patrol being inserted by helicopter at XD 849494, spotted three VC at XD 834485. Direction of movement not known.
- (3) 170050H -- Company "A" listening post observed one VC in front of their position. No SAF was exchanged. One grenade thrown by LF when VC moved away from position.

- (1) Inclement weather restricted air reconnaissance and reduced ground observation considerably during reporting period.

13. Communications:

- a. Wire. During the period no major changes to the Battalion's wire system were made. Phase III Tactical wiring was completed. The Battalion is operating at this time with 46 locals, and trunks to 3dMarDiv(2), 3dMarDiv Fwd(2) and 3d Marines(1). The following units and/or attachments are serviced by the Battalion switchboard:

- b. Radio communications, during the period, remained normal intype and operation. 8 Additional AN/PRC-25's and the AN/GRM-55 were received during the month. Some difficulty with the radio circuit to the Battalion rear, Danang, was experienced. A change in frequency and provisions for operating the net CW have been made. Mobile HF equipment failure continues to be a minor problem.
- c. Radio Relay. During the entire period two AN/MRC-62 radio relay circuits to 3dMarDiv and 3dMarDiv Fwd were operating in support of the Battalion and other units at Khe Sanh. These circuits are providing teletype, common user and single user service to 3dMarDiv, FLSU #1, 3d MarDiv Fwd and MATCU 68. Equipment outages have been minimum and of short duration.

- d. Message Center. The message center continued to provide a covered teletype circuit to 3dMarDiv. The Message center experienced no significant equipment outages during the period. A total of 394 outgoing and 380 incoming messages were handled during the month.
- e. Maintenance and Supply. No serious supply problems were encountered during the period. Dry cell battery and field telephone cable resupply was timely and adequate throughout the period. Maintenance support from the FLSU was good, hampered only by weather induced transportation problems. The Preventive Maintenance programs started in November were continued. All shop and maintenance records were brought forward from the rear.
- f. Problems Encountered. Confusion resulting from inadequate message handling instruction caused some problems in delivery of message traffic to SOP 3dMarDiv on a timely basis. This problem resolved by a memo from 3dMarDiv CEO to the Division Staff.
- 14. Weather: During December the weather continued cold and overcast, with frequent rain and wind. The weather created a significant problem in logistics, as the area is entirely dependent upon air for resupply.
