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
Effective 010600H December 1967, the 2d Battalion, 3d Marines was under the OPCON of 5th Marines and APCON of the 1st Marine Division. The month was characterized by aggressive patrolling within the assigned TAOR, especially within the Rocket Belt. Waterway and lines of communication were kept under surveillance and interdicted, search and destroy operations of company and platoon size were run on targets of opportunity. Additionally, intensive hole hunting operations were conducted throughout the TAOR.

Company E was OPCON to 3d Bn, 5th Marines from 1-6 December, 14... December, 23-24 December and 27-31 December for operations within that battalion's TAOR.

Company F maintained constant security and surveillance over the TU CAU Bridge, and was OPCON to 3d 5th Marines on 14 December and from 17-18 December for operations whin that battalion's TAOR.

Company G was chopped OPCON to 7th Marines for utilization within the 7th Marines TaOR from 8-31 December 1967.

Company H was OPCON to 3d Battalion, 5th Marines on 18 December for an operation within the 3/5 TaoR. One platoon provided security for 5th Marines CP from 20-31 December and one platoon was chopped OPCON to 1st Marine Division as Rough Rider security from 29-31 December.







b. Surveillance and Reconnaissance. Use of available sources of surveillance and reconnaissance was considered excellent considering the equipment and the trained personnel available. 90 hours of aerial reconnaissance was flown over our TAOH.

c. Weather and Terrain. Weather for the month was for the most part fair and overcast. A marked increase in precipitation prevailed during the latter portion of the month, in the form of afternoon and evening thundershowers. The temperature fluctuated slightly due to the frequent rains. The average high was 75 degrees, average low 67 degrees. The terrain throughout the TAOR offered only a slight impediment to foot traffic.

b. Supply -

- (1) On 11 December 1967, a let Marine Division inventory teem inspected the battalion's supply. It was recommended that the division send a SNCO from the Division Supply Office and seven 3051 warehousemen to help inventory and store gear.






- c. Civil Affairs Assistance. A cleanup campaign was initiated in Nui Kim San (BT 072702) with the full cooperation of the village chief. The battalion also participated in a Christmas Party in the same village and distributed approximately 1500 gifts.
- d. <u>Instruction</u>. All new members joining this command during December received an indoctrination class on civil affairs. Additional classes were also given on company and platoon levels.
- e. Contact with Local Officials. The Thanh Thuy village chief holds a weekly meeting at the 2/3 Mechap station. The Vietnamese from Thanh Thuy village come to the Battalion CP for their meetings, availing themselves of the security provided by the CP.
- f. Outlook. In the near future 2/3 will be working in a much larger TAOR with thousands of Vietnamese civilians living in our area. The assistance that the 29th Civil Affairs Company will provide will greatly benefit our civic action efforts.

9. Communications

- a. On 1 December 1967 the Battalion Message Center was opened.
- b. An inventory of all communications equipment was conducted on 10 December, and a 1st Parimo Division Assistance Toam checked Bat-talion communications produces on 11 December.





On the morning of 22 December 1967, Hotel Company conducted a sweep of the Happy Haven Leprosarium in conjuction with a blocking force supplied by Echo Company. Frior to first light Echo moved from three separate platoon defensive perimeters to establish a 360 degree encirclement around the Leprosarium to prohibit the egress of personnel from that position and to detain any questionable VC suspects who might try to flee once the sweep of theLeprosarium began. The Third Ilatoon of Hotel Company with the Company Command Group and attachments from the Battalion S-5 Section and ITT moved from its night platoon defensive perimeter to the vicinity of the Leprosarium from 0700 to 0800. There an assembly area was selected and packs were discarded. A loud speaker system was then set up just to the rear of the Echo block on the eastern side of the hospital. A Chou Hoi was used to speak to the inhabitants of the hospital explaining that the Marines were coming in to look around and for the patients and other personnel to move to the center of the Leprosarium. After this initial announcement had been made one squad of infantry with the Cr group and ITT began to move into the hospital. At first the inhabitants were hesitant to move into the middle of the camp, and an interpeter was used to assist the movement. As the people began to move, one squad entered from the right flank and another from the left flank to clear the out-laying portions of the hospital grounds. No difficulties were encountered in assembling the people, and all but those confined to their beds were assembled.

I met and introduced myself to the Vietnamese Minister located at the hospital. I explained our purpose and that we meant no harm to the patients. He was most friendly and rendered minor assistance in our search. He explained that the

Leprosarium ha about 200 patients and about 20 aditional persons lived on the grounds. Thes people came from View Dong and other near-by villages to escape artillery fire because they knew the Marines could not shoot within the hospital grounds.

Of the personnel assembled, approximately 350, about half were lepers and the rest villagers. Most were 'mall children and old people, but there were a few males of military age present. Because it would be practically impossible to interrogate all persons, about twenty five were selected for interview. These were the young males and several others picked at random. These people could offer no information of intelligence value and either possessed Leper I.D. cards or regulation I.D. cards. They stated that they had not seen any VC for long periods of time and that they did not know who placed the punji stakes on the eastern side of the hospital grounds.

As ITT was talking to the people, the third platoon conducted a search of the holpital buildings and the huts in the area. Extreme care was taken to insure that these buildings were neither damaged nor any personal property destroyed. The search did not locate any weapons or equipment which might be used by the VC. The hospital staff were agreeable and unlocked several closets containing medicine and other supplies

during the search.


I believe the living condition of the Lepers and their families is of some significance. Most of these people live on the north western portion of the grounds. The huts are constructed of bamboo with straw or pine needle roofs. The animals live with the people. This area is one of the filthiest places that I have observed. Flies were everywhere, and the smell of the area is putrid. I believe any disease within this area could rapidly reach epidemic proportions.

The hospital itself is cleaner, but by our standards is still filthy. The floor of one building was gory and bloodstained, and sand was merely thrown over this filth. Bandages Were not burned, but collected, and then buried. I consider


the hospital completely unsanitary.

The search of the area was concluded at about 1015. Neither the patients nor the search of the buildings offered any real intelligence material. Frior to leaving the area, the Chou Hoi was used to explain the reward system to the people. They were also instructed to stay out of the TAOR at night and to use only the beach when departing or entering the Leprosarium. Prior to moving out, about 200 punji stakes were removed from the eastern flank of the Leprosarium and burned.
