NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. GENERAL OVERALL VIEW OF ALL ACTIVITIES. The Battalion operated in 2 S/D operations and 1 special operation. 1-2 May Operation Maine Crag, 3-31 May Operation Virginia Ridge, and 26-27 May Operation Pink Panther (Ops in the DMZ. See after Action report in supporting documents). Enemy contact during the earlier part of May was characterized by booby traps and 3-4 man point contacts. As the Battalion moved to the north and northwest, they began to discover numerous bunkers and storage/resupply caches of the enemy. Numerous enemy mortaring incidents began to take place. The Battalion changed over from Battalion administration to company level administration.

1. Your request for employment of L/3/3 is approved. Lift will commence at 1000H.
2. Possibility of tactical demonstration is 21 May, at earliest.

4. INTELLIGENCE. During the month of May, the Battalion operated in 2 similar areas with unrelated missions. Up to 2 May, Operation Maine Crag was conducted in the Vietnamese salient south of Khe Sahn. On 3 May, the Battalion commenced Operation Virginia Ridge in the Mutter's Ridge area northwest of Dong Ha mountain. While in the Virginia Ridge AO, enemy activity was light to medium. Several large caches were found. Company L discovered a large bunker complex and cache on 16 May in the vicinity of YD058612. Total contacts in the Virginia Ridge AO were 19 minor contacts, 6 incidents involving mines and booby traps, 14 mortar attacks, and several miscellaneous incidents. Based upon an accumulation of high level intelligence source items; numerous sightings by aerial observers, sightings, sketches, and other evidence collected by 3d Recon Bn, SLAR, IR, and aerial photography. It was deemed that a major operation should be conducted to seek out and destroy enemy supply/storage areas within

The AO. The Virginia Ridge AO is a densely forested mountainous area. Elevation ranges from 100 to 549 meters. The AO runs SW-NE to the southern border of the DMZ. The NVA apparently are not restricted in their movements and thus chose to construct large bunker complexes and supply and storage areas.

During May, resupply was by helicopter. A very inadequate number of helicopters was encountered during this period.

c. Evacuation & Hospitalization

All medevacs were by helicopter and no problems were encountered.

d. Transportation

9. COMMUNICATIONS & ELECTRONICS

a. Frequency modulated equipment continued to remain effective and highly reliable. The antenna system AS2236 was carried as supplemental

equipment by the command group in the field. However, only extreme ranges in connection with critical terrain features would justify the extra weight and burden of the antenna during command post displacement. The properly oriented antenna AS2236 in the rear areas along with modified ground plane antennas in the field provided reliable FM communication.

b. The Forward Air Controller made effective use of the AN/PRC 41 in conjunction with the SST122 radar beacon.

c. With the acquisition of 27 telephones TAP, each company was provided with 5 telephones and 1 wireman (2511). New wiremen were given field experience by rotating them with the wiremen in the field.

d. Wet cell batteries BB451 have a rapid rate of discharge under field conditions and recommendations are:

(1) Replace batteries in the field periodically regardless of use or charge indicated.

(2) Store batteries in a dry and relatively cool place.

JOURNAL SUMMARY

01 May No significant events.

02 May 0945H In the area of YD043186, elements of Co L observed 3 NVA moving S to SW. Two were wearing dark clothing and some type of frame on their backs. One was wearing light colored clothing. Artillery was called in with excellent coverage but results unknown.

1835H In the area of XD973334, elements of Co G, 2/3 received 10 rounds of 82mm mortar. Counter fire was called using mortars and artillery. Results unknown.

03 May No significant events.

04 May No significant events.

05 May No significant events.

06 May 1000H In the area of XD992592, elements of Co K discovered a trail recently used by unknown personnel. Searched the trail with negative results.

07 May 0830H In the area of XD966566, elements of Co K discovered a large cave approximately 30' in diameter, 3 tunnels inside of cave running away from the main cave. The tunnels were 4' in diameter and 6' long. The area showed no sign of recent use.

0945H In the area of XD991613, elements of Co M discovered three Chicom grenades and a 1lb ball of TNT along the side of the trail. The ordnance appeared to be in place for about 3 weeks. The items were destroyed.

1330H In the area of XD991613, elements of Co M discovered five fighting holes and 1 mortar position. They appeared to be about 2 months old and were destroyed.

1615H In the area of XD997605, elements of Co K discovered 30 to 40 bunkers and fighting holes. One bunker appeared to be a command bunker. The area was over 6 months old. NVA ration wrappers were found in several of the bunkers. The bunkers were destroyed.

1640H In the area of XD993500, elements of Co K discovered 8 fighting holes estimated to be 8 months old. Searched area with negative results.

08 May 0715H In the area of XD991613, elements of Co I were traveling along a trail when an unknown type of directional explosive device was detonated towards the trail. The shrapnel appeared to be 1/8" in diameter and smaller. They were unable to determine if the device was command or trip detonated. Results were 4 WIA medevacs and 2 WIA non-medevacs.

0825H In the area of XD991615, elements of Co I were setting up security for an LZ when an explosive device was detonated. It was believed to be an M26 grenade. Results

1330H In the area of XD983546, elements of Co L, 3/9 observed a CH46 medevac helicopter make an emergency landing. The Helicopter was hit by a RPG.

1745H In the area of XD997644, Co M had a Claymore mine spontaneously detonate. According to the S-2, a Claymore mine could be detonated by the electricity in the air if the protective plug isn't covering the electric wires. The protective plug will be used until the Claymores are set into place.

09 May 1130H In the area of YD002623, elements of Co M discovered an enemy water point that appeared to be an overnight position. There were hollow bamboo shoots running into the water. Sandal tracks approximately 24hrs old were found around the water point. Artillery was called in on the position that night with unknown results.

1500H In the area of YD001622, elements of Co M discovered a small stream used as a water point and overnight position. The area could accommodate 150-200 personnel. There were no bunkers and appeared to be approximately 2 weeks old. Trails leading north were very heavily traveled compared to those leading south. Equipment found: 1 NV, canteen, 1 can of rice, 1 helmet net, 1 oven, old US sandbags, old C-rations, 1 plastic water container.

10 May 1015H In the area of XD995559, the road sweep had completed its sweep of Route #9 when convoy from Dong Ha hit 2 mines on the right and center left of the road. The route was reswept with negative results.

1220H In the area of YD019639, elements of Co I moving on to a LZ detonated an explosive device located along side of the trail and laid into an old trash pit. The tripwire had been covered with mud. The explosion and crater indicated the explosive device was a LAW or 81mm round. Approximately 30ft of nylon rope was found running from the crater to a freshly dug fighting hole that overlooked the trail. There was blood found by the hole. Results were 1 Marine WIA.

1500H In the area of XD994558, elements of Co L, 3/9 on a truck hit a mine after a large amount of traffic had passed over the area. Two reinforced squads, engineers, and dusters were sent to check area with negative results.

1515H In the area of XD990629, elements of Co I secured an objective and sent a fireteam forward for an OP among extremely thick bamboo. Initial contact was made when Chicom grenades were thrown at the OP. The OP returned fire and a machinegun was brought up. A squad leader observed 5 enemy fall. Two platoons then swept down the finger and received heavy fire. The platoons moved back and called 3 flights of air, artillery, and 60mm mortars. After the prep fire the platoons started to sweep again and found a bunker complex. Due to darkness, the platoons moved into a defensive position. Sweep of the area the next day resulted in

finding 10 new bunkers. The bunkers were constructed very low to the ground and covered with logs. Assorted gear and rice were found inside. There were several trails leading from the complex. It was estimated that there had been 30 NVA in the complex and they were trying to leave when contact was made. Results were 1 Marine WIA.

11 May 0115H In the area of YD001622, elements of Co M set in ambush heard movement on the right flank and threw grenades. In a few minutes later, 2 Chicoms were thrown into the ambush site from the right flank. The ambush throw more grenades and detonated a Claymore. During the flash of a grenade, a squad leader saw 3 bodies. Area was checked at first light and blood and several escape trails were found. There was 4 Marine WIA's.

0800H In the area of YD012618, elements of Co K fired 4 rounds and used 60mm mortars at observed movement. Searched area with negative results.

0930H In the area of XD990290, elements of Co I discovered an extensive bunker complex. One bunker contained 5 NVA packs and various other enemy gear. The bunkers were destroyed.

1430H In the area of YD017621, elements of Co K observed enemy movement from a hill. Artillery was called and the area searched with negative results.

1515H In the area of XD990290, elements of Co I discovered a bunker complex that was approximately 80m down a finger and 50m across the finger. There were 10 new bunkers, 1 month old, covered with logs and 8 other bunkers that were about 8 months old; 20 fighting holes were along the perimeter. The bunkers appeared to be used for living quarters and some had fireplaces and places to hang cooking utensils. Items found included: 75 AK47 rounds, 3 RPG2 rounds, 1 RPG2, 20 NVA packs, 9 E-tools, 12 khaki shirts, 8 trousers, 6 small silver stars, 15 ponchos, 11 hammocks, 100lbs of rice, 30lbs of grain and meal, 2 flashlights, 2 helmets, 2 binocular cases, 2 soft covers, 2 canteen covers, 1pr sandals, 6 mosquito nets, 14 canteens, 19 blocks of TNT with blasting caps, and various medical supplies and documents. The documents and supplies were turned over to the S-2 and the bunkers destroyed.

1900H In the area of YD024630, elements of Co K discovered 4 bunkers with partial overheads and were 2-3 months old. From 2010-2045 lights were seen in the vicinity of YD016635 and artillery was called in with 1 secondary explosion. The bunkers were destroyed.

12 May 1450H In the area of YD020623, elements of Co K discovered 4 old bunkers with the overheads tore off and 6 fighting holes. Also found 12 friendly fighting holes and an LZ last occupied 5-10 days prior.

13 May 0730H In the area of XD997561, elements of Co L, 3/9 discovered a mine on the north side of the road. The mine was buried about 2" deep and was 2ft in diameter. It was blown in place.

1500H In the area of YD048618, elements of Co L discovered a bunker complex consisting of 30 bunkers ranging in size from 8' to 5x10'. The bunkers were all constructed underground and had logs reinforcing the tops. One bunker was used for cooking and had a stovepipe running away from it for 20'. Search of the complex resulted in finding 2 RPG rounds, many AK47 rounds, several magazines and pouches, 1 telegraph key, 1 handset, 1 detonation charge 4" long and 4" in diameter weighing 3lbs, 1 first aid kit, battle dressings, vials of unknown medicine, 300lbs of rice, and 50lbs of dried foods. The complex appeared to be a way station rather than a fighting area. Set ambush in area and will search out area tomorrow.

1500H In the area of YD044619, elements of Co L discovered a bunker complex consisting of 15 bunkers. Each was large enough to hold 3 men and appeared to be 1-2 weeks old. Found in bunkers were 7 AK47 magazines, 2 ponchos, 2 NVA tools, 1 pick, 100lbs of rice, and 1 radio headset. The bunkers and gear was destroyed.

14 May 1130H In the area of YD032628, elements of Co K found 1 pair of NVA sandals, 30m of communication wire, and 2 pair of khaki shorts. The items appeared to be 6 months old.

1715H In the area of YD034639, elements of Co K observed 2 NVA by the river. Artillery was called in with unknown results.

2000H In the area of YD047617, elements of Co L continued the search of the bunker complex with negative results. It was found that the complex had been hit by artillery at one time but with no apparent damage. The complete complex had 42 bunkers in it and was well camouflaged and could not be seen from the air. Engineers destroyed all the gear that was not of tactical use and all the bunkers. Additional items that were found were: 1 radio power supply, 1 radio receiver device, 1 small microphone, 7 AT mines, 6 Chicom Claymores, 1 drum for a machinegun, 20 Chicom grenades, 2 hammocks, 2 ponchos, 3 picks, 7 NVA tools, 4 NVA canteens.

15 May 0810H In the area of YD037677, elements of Co L came upon what appeared to be an ambush. The point element came under small arms fire from approximately 6 NVA dressed in green uniforms. The platoon moved into the attack and the enemy broke contact. Artillery was called in on the escape routes with results unknown. Search of the ambush site resulted in finding 4 Chicom grenades, 1 Chicom Claymore mine, 1 NVA belt, and 1 hat.

0915H In the area of YD056617, elements of Co K discovered 5 new bunkers. Four were completed and 1 appeared to be a command bunker. Search of the area resulted in finding 1 Chicom grenade, 3 AT Chinese mines, 2 82mm mortar rounds, 2 helmets, empty fruit cans, rice bowls, and old sheets. The area was destroyed.

0950H In the area of YD040670, elements of Co K discovered 7 mines, 3 M46 and 4 Chinese, 2 82mm mortar rounds. About 125m.

1420H In the area of YD063936, elements of Co K discovered 1 canteen, 1 first aid kit on what appeared to be an officer's belt.

1430H In the area of YD058612, elements of Co L discovered a complex consisting of 30 sleeping/fighting bunkers. There were fighting holes facing the northeast. The bunkers were elaborately constructed with logs and wood reinforcement. All bunkers were approximately 10x15'. Estimated age of construction was 1 week to 1 month. Search of the area resulted in finding 20 E-tools, 20 picks, 20 packs, 7 RPG rounds, 82mm mortar bore brush, and rice packets. Destroyed bunkers.

1500H In the area of YD011581, Co I received information of enemy deployed in the area. An 81mm mortar mission was called and area searched with negative results.

1620H In the area of YD030628, elements of Co K discovered 18 bunkers approximately 1 month old. In the bunkers were found 7 Chinese 82mm mortar rounds, 16 Chinese 60mm mortar rounds, 1 AK47, 1 cleaning rod for mortars, 1 USMC pack, 10 NVA packs, 1 NVA belt, AK47 magazines, 2 fresh graves with just heads in them, 31 Chicom grenades, 6 blasting caps, 3 7.62 machinogun drums, 3 radio-type dry cells, 7 Chinese gasmasks with extra cannisters, 1 shovel, 5 picks, 13 E-tools, 1 machette, 1 82mm mortar timing stake, 14 rice bowls, 10 cooking pots, 5 baskets, 5 opium pipes, 7 canteens, 8 first aid kits, 3 NVA hammocks, 4pr NVA boots, 10 sandals, 3 battle dressings, 5 bush hats, 3 NVA helmets, 1 US E-tool, 1 3d M r Div sweatshirt, 3 blue sweatshirts, 1 poncho liner, 2 canteen cups, 3 radio log books, 1 book on the English language. The bunkers and gear were destroyed.

16 May 0855H In the area of YD039637, elements of Co K discovered 14 82mm mortar rounds with 15 fuses, 15 increments, 30 60mm mortar rounds, 36 fuses, 30 increments, 1 case of AK47 rounds (720), 1 Chinese AT mine, and 1 Chicom grenade. All the ordnance was destroyed.

1130H In the area of YD058612, elements of Co L discovered an extensive bunker complex consisting of approximately 60 bunkers on 3 fingers and in the ravines between the fingers. The bunkers were well constructed and log reinforced. The age of the complex ranged from 1 week to 6 months old. The following items were found in the complex: 10 gasmasks, 45 machettes, 32 hammocks, 3pr tennis shoes, 4 sandals, 44 rice bowls, 4 fl shlights, 19 cooking pots, 16 baskets, 600lbs of rice, 40 1/2 lbs of TNT, 55 E-tools, 30 picks, 49 packs, 21 shirts, 10 whistles, 3 pocket knives, 40 mosquito nets, 30 bottles DDT, 25 82mm mortar rounds, 15 60mm mortar rounds, 18 RPG2 rounds, 5 AT mines, 3 Chicom Claymores, 6 communications batteries, 3 mortar brushes, 2 timing stakes, 2 Chicom grenades, mortar plotting board, 1 protractor, 2 firing dat books, 50cal machinogun barrel, 1 NVA flag, 10

NVA first aid packets, 2000ft comm wire, 82mm mortar bipod, 82mm mortar base plate, canned food, NVA long range rations, and shaving gear.

1730H In the area of YD991632, elements of Co M while moving on to landing zone observed 10 NVA and opened fire on them with small arms and CS. The CS caused the enemy to flee to the north. The NVA returned fire with RPG's and AK47's and 2 command detonated Claymore mines. The enemy had an OP in a tree. It appeared that the NVA were going through the trash pits on the LZ. There were 4 freshly dug bunkers facing southwest. Artillery was called in on the escape routes, also Air which had 5 secondary explosions. Results of the contact were 5 WIA, 1 WIA Kit Carson Scout, 4 NVA KIA, and captured 1 AK47, 2 NVA Claymore mines, 10 packs, medical gear, 2 NVA helmets, and light green utilities.

17 May 0450H In the area of XD991632, elements of Co M while in a defensive position heard 1 enemy on the lines apparently yelling for his comrades. Two Marines move out from the lines and captured the enemy for a POW. He had no weapon and was wearing dark green utilities and jungle boots.

0730H In the area of YD058612, elements of Co L continued the search of the bunker complex and found 1 damaged 82mm mortar tube and site.

0930H In the area of XD989629, elements of Co M continued the search of the bunker complex reported 16 1700H. The complex was approximately 400m in length and ran northeast to southwest. There were a total of 20 bunkers; 10 living, 3 messhalls, and 7 fighting. The living and messhalls were constructed in a frame type, the fighting bunkers were constructed with heavy logs and had apertures facing the southwest. The complex was approximately 2 months old. The area was booby trapped with 3 Chicom grenades and 2 DH10 mines. Gear captured was 2 AK47 magazines, 7NVA undershirts, 3 T-shirts, 2 NVA wallets, 1 NVA nap, 3 books (1 poetry, 1 diary, 1 supply), personnel letters, and charts with grids. The bunkers were destroyed and the gear turned over to the S-2.

1700H In the area of XD989629, elements of Co M were setting in night defense when an NVA was seen hiding in a partially covered hole outside of the perimeter. Scouts tried to talk him out but he would not answer. An explosion took place in the hole killing him. He had on NVA utilities and boots, but no weapons were found. Searched immediate area with negative results.

18 May 1000H In the area of YD058612, elements of Co L tabulated the total amount of captured gear in the bunker complex: 1 82mm mortar complete, 25 82mm rounds, 15 60mm rounds, 18 RPG2 rounds, 5 AT mines, 16 anti-personnel mines, 2 plastic AT mines, 6 comm batteries, 55 B-tools, 30 picks, 2 mortar brushes, 2 aiming stakes, 12 Chicom grenades, 49 packs, 500lbs of rice, 1 mortar plotting board, 1 protractor, 2 81mm mortar data books, 1 50cal machinegun barrel, 1 NVA flag, 19 cooking pots, 2 helmets, 10 NVA first aid packets, 40 1/2lb blocks of TNT, 2000' comm wire,

24 gasmasks, 100 rounds of miscellaneous ammunition, 21 shirts, 32 hammocks, 5pr socks, 6 cans of increments, 4 flashlights, 44 rice bowls, 45 machettes, 8 NVA belts, 5 NVA canteens, 30 feet time fuse, 1pr of tennis shoes, 4 sandals, 16 baskets, 30 DDT bottles, 30 NVA rations, 10 whistles, 3 pocket knives, 40 mosquito nets, 3 handsaws, and miscellaneous gear. Items not of tactical value were destroyed.

1715H In the area of XD989628, elements of Co M received 12 rounds of 82mm mortar outside the perimeter. Fire was returned with unknown results.

1715H In the area of XD989625, elements of Co M moving into an ambush position, observed 1 NVA and opened fire with small arms. Search of the area resulted in finding 1 bloody helmet, sandals, 1 Chicom grenade, and drag marks along the blood trail.

1740H In the area of XD980623, elements of Co K searched area where contact was made earlier. Discovered 2 bodies and a blood trail of another. Could not find the third. Discovered 2 packs, 1 Chicom carrying case, 4 Chicom grenades, 180 AK47 rounds, 2 E-tools, 1 machette, 1pr sandals, 1pr NVA boots, 8 shirts, 1 NVA canteen, 3 NVA trousers, 2pr socks, 2 hammocks, 1 mosquito net, 1 belt, 1 cartridge belt, 1 US canteen, 1 poncho liner, 2 rice bowls, ID papers, 2 record books, and miscellaneous stationary.

1800H In the area of XD989628, elements of Co M received 3 more rounds of 82mm mortar. Continued to call counter mortar fire.

19 May 0200H In the area of XD989628, elements of Co M received 3 RPG rounds from the northwest. All 3 landed in the perimeter. Counter fire was initiated with mortars and artillery with unknown results. There were 4 Marine KIA's.

0700H In the area of XD989628, elements of Co M received 3 rounds of 82mm mortars outside of the perimeter while helicopters were landing. Fire was returned with mortar. An AO on station could not observe the results.

0800H In the area of XD989620, elements of Co M received 3 more rounds of 82mm mortar while helicopters were landing. All the rounds landed outside the perimeter.

1050H In the area of XD988629, elements of Co M received 3 rounds of 82mm mortar outside their perimeter. Counter fire was called.

2200H In the area of XD989629, elements of Co M had their lines probed by an estimated squad of enemy. They were repelled by grenades and artillery. Results unknown.

20 May 1155H In the area of XD988629, the CP received 5 rounds of 82mm mortar. An AO was requested. Artillery and 81mm mortar fire was returned with unknown results.

21 May 0900H In the area of XD973638, elements of Co K while moving the rear security, observed 3 NVA. The NVA were taken under fire with small arms killing 2. Search of the area resulted in finding 1 AK47, 2 AK47 magazines, 4 Chicom grenades, 2 belts, 1 canteen, 1 battle dressing, 1 first aid kit.

0930H In the area of XD978647, elements of Co K made contact with approximately 4 NVA. The NVA were taken under fire. The NVA broke contact and fled to the north. Search of the area resulted in finding 1 SKS rifle and 2 Chicom grenades.

1800H In the area of XD965636, elements of Co K found a trail from a stream bed to a hill at XD967634. The base of the hill and the trail to the southwest had 8 A-frame bunkers. The trail and bunkers were booby trapped. The trails runs to the top of hill at XD969633 where an 82mm mortar pit was well camouflaged. The pit was 5' deep and connected by a partially covered trench line to 4 bunkers. The trench line was also booby trapped with Chicom grenades. One of which wounded the point man. All trails and bunkers were less than a week old and vacated less than 2 days prior. The camouflage consisted of live bamboo across the top of the pit and trench line held in place by green comm wire. The cover over the mortar pit, at a height of 10', may be opened and closed at will. Search of the complex resulted in finding 12 82mm mortar rounds, 2 cans of increments, and 20-30 empty cans.

22 May In the area of XD978650, elements of Co K initiated contact with 2-3 NVA moving on a trail, killing 1 and capturing 1 POW, 1 60mm mortar, 12 60mm rounds, 2 canteens, and 2 packs.

0900H In the area of XD965636, elements of Co K continued searching of the bunker complex and found 50 82mm rounds with red and green bands, 12 cans of fuses and increments. Sent samples to S-2.

1400H In the area of XD978650, elements of Co K executed a daylight ambush, killing 1 NVA and capturing 1 AK47, 1 pack, 2 grenade pouches, 3 canteens, 1 helmet, 1 pay receipt, 2 AK47 pouches, and 6 magazines, and 8 Chicom grenades. One Marine was wounded in the contact.

1230H In the area of XD962649, elements of Co K executed a reinforced squad size ambush on the lead elements of an NVA force of approximately 8 enemy. The force was followed by a larger force of about 20 enemy. When the search party went to search the bodies, the larger force open fire on them. The ambush detonated 2 Claymores and the NVA broke contact. An artillery and mortar mission was called on the escape route. Results of the contact were 3 US WL's and 3 NVA KI's.

23 May 1730H In the area of XD965648, elements of Co K searched the area where the ambush of the day before took place and found the following: 1 AK47, 8 Chicom grenades, 4 82mm mortar rounds, 30 82mm mortar fuses, 6 cans of increments, and numerous blood trails. XD960645 is a major trail network.

1815H Co M at XD984638 and Co K at XD973640 received 15-20 60mm mortar rounds. All rounds landed outside the perimeter. Counter mortar fire was used with unknown results.

1900H In the area of XD964634, elements of Co K found a small ammo cache. In the cache were 18 82mm mortar rounds, blue grey with red bands, and 27 82mm mortar rounds, green with red bands. They were found in 5 bunkers, 1 booby trapped with a LAAW. The bunkers were destroyed and the rounds sent to S-2.

24 May 0915H In the area of XD983637, elements of Co M discovered what appeared to be booby traps. One was located on a finger and the other in a draw. They looked like trip flares with the spoons on the top and springs stretched across the top of the device. Rocks were placed on top of the springs. They were not camouflaged and were marked so that they could be seen easily.

1300H In the area of XD953632, elements of Co K discovered a grave with 2 decomposed bodies. The bodies appeared to be buried approximately 2 months. Bodies apparently had been hit by shrapnel. Results were 2 NVA KBA's.

Called in artillery, 81mm mortars, and 60mm mortar missions. The platoon assaulted the position with an A0 on station. The A0 ran 2 flights of fixed wing. The NVA withdrew in an orderly and professional manner, they also employed snipers in groups of 2-3 on the escape route. The A0 observed several NVA in the open and called air strikes on them. Results were 1 AK47, 1 SKS, 30 Chicom grenades, 2 mines and 4 NVA KBA's. Also 10 USMC WL's.

1745H In the area of XD973658, elements of Co K received 25-30 rounds of 82mm mortar. Countered with mortars and artillery. Results unknown.

0945H In the area of XD968672, elements of Co K observed an unknown number of NVA moving around fighting holes and bunkers. Closing on enemy for better observation.

0955H In the area of XD968672, elements of Co K observed 6 NVA moving on trail to the south wearing green uniforms, packs, but no hats.

1110-1300H In the area of XD968673, elements of Co K moved into the enemy bunker complex. The NVA initiated contact with small arms fire. Co K returned fire with 60mm mortar, M16, M60, M79, and CS grenades. The contact continued and 3d plt, Co K was committed as an extraction force at 1130H. AO came on station and artillery missions were called in on the complex. Co K broke contact at 1210H and moved south to meet the extraction force at XD968668. Turned over 1 badly wounded POW and 2 USMC WIA's.

1120H In the area of YD005665, elements of Co M found 1pr of NVA tennis shoes. They appeared to have been there for 4-6 weeks. Shoes destroyed with knife.

1300-1515H In the area of XD968673, elements of Co K returned to the bunker complex. Search of the area discovered 1 AK47, 2 AK47 magazines, 8 Chicom grenades, letter from home, empty notebook, 1 hammock, US razor blades, 1 helmet, 1 E-tool, and 1 new rice bowl.

1310H In the area of XD999665, elements of Co M discovered a 15 man campsite approximately 1 week old. Searched area with negative results.

1715H In the area of YD003672-YD003674, elements of Co M discovered a heavily used trail with 4x3x5' holes every 20m. The holes had a lot of food wrappers, rags, and paper in them and 1 torn NVA map completely deteriorated. No evidence of use within the last 3-5 weeks.

1800H In the area of XD968668, elements of Co K discovered a large assembly area with signs of recent evacuation. The area consisted of 35-40 three man bunkers, half A-frame and slanting roof. Three were cooking huts with cooking utensils. Eight trails led in and out of the complex. The area appeared to have been built within the last 2-3 weeks. Search of the complex resulted in finding 25 sleeping mats, 150 Chicom grenades, 5000 rds AK ammo, NVA det cord and TNT, 3 Claymores, rice bags, 25 packs, 15 bush covers, 25 E-tools, food wrappers, US chewing gum, bloody band ges, open first aid kits, 1 US 5gal water can, 1 transistor radio, and prop and leaflets.

1810H In the area of YD992669, elements of Co M discovered a layover site large enough for 15-20 personnel. There were many trails leading in all directions. Fresh water buffalo tracks leading north. The site appeared to have been used in the last week.

2200H In the area of YD003675, elements of Co M observed 40 NVA moving south past their position. They were carrying small arms and equipment. They were moving at a rapid pace. Every 4th or 5th man appeared to be an officer or NCO as they were prodding the others along. Called in an artillery mission with unknown results.

27 May 0700H In the area of XD978672, elements of Co K exchanged small arms fire with 1 NVA who was traveling west. Searched area and found 1 NVA KIA.

1000H In the area of XD968667, elements of Co K returned to the bunker complex to destroy the captured equipment. There was evidence of 15-20 enemy had been in the complex the night before. The unit was unable to destroy the complex completely due to the large number of well constructed bunkers. While moving south out of the complex, contact was made with an unknown size enemy force. The extraction platoon was committed to assist the unit at 1055H. Unit fired M79, M60, and small arms. Artillery mission was to be called in after contact was broken. A request for a TPQ was made as soon as the units were out of the area. Results of the fire fight was 1 NVA KIA, 1 AK47.

1300H In the area of XD986626, elements of Co L discovered a bunker complex of 16 bunkers, 11 were fighting type. Five large bunkers contained ordnance. Search of the area resulted in finding: 1 SKS, 1 Soviet 82mm recoilless gun w/tripod type B10, 56 RPG rounds, 29 Claymore mines, 406 82mm mortar rounds, 357 Chicom grenades, 119 82mm recoilless rifle rounds, 54 75mm pack howitzer rounds, 96 recoilless gun primers and 145 fuses, 340lbs TNT (5 crates, 24 boxes per crate, each box 4x6"), 97 120mm mortar rounds, 50 AK47 magazines, 7 AT mines, 4 E-tools, 1 pick, 2 wire cutters, 764 boxes fuse lighters, 1 7.62 machinegun barrel, 1 aiming stake, 1800 7.62 linked rounds, 46,000 50cal rounds, 13800 AK47 rounds. Most ammunition was in good to fair condition despite heavy weathering of containers. The ordnance was blown in place.

1650-1845H In the area of XD971658, elements of Co K received 20 rounds of 60mm mortar fire from 2 different positions. Artillery mission and AO called. Results 3 USMC WIA's, enemy unknown.

28 May 0530H In the area of XD971658, elements of Co K received 1 RPG round from XD967662. Artillery and 60mm mortars returned fire with unknown results.

1200H In the area of XD998642, elements of Co L discovered a shallow grave. The remains in the grave appeared to have been dead for about 3 months. The appearance of the body was that he was killed by an air strike. He was wearing green utilities

Although the enemy responded to Co K's presence adjacent to the DMZ with attacks by fire, he did not appear to anticipate or rapidly react to Co K's patrol activity within the DMZ. As Co K's patrols moved into the DMZ, the enemy's response appeared to be one of surprise, and gave the impression that his continuing construction activities and troop movement were based on presumed impunity from US incursions into the DMZ.

c. Based on the limited duration of Pink Panther, the following conclusions were derived:

- (1) That the area covered by Co K and H is being used as an infiltration route.
- (2) That way stations and storage/supply areas are being expanded and improved.
- (3) That more extensive patrol activity in this area is required.
- (4) That the concept of operation implemented was highly successful.

14. Recommendations. That further patrol activity be authorized into the DMZ north of the current 3d Bn, 3d Marines AO.
