## 1. Operation Lancaster II

(a) In accordance with 3d MarDiv Operation Order 58-67 the combat missions assigned the 4th Marines were as follows:

- (1) Conduct search and destroy operations in OA.
- (2) Defend combat bases and other vital installations in OA.
- (3) Maintain combat bases at Camp Carroll, Thon Son Lam, Ca Lu and LZ Stud.
- (4) Open and secure lines of communication in OA.
- (5) Secure and protect RT 9 in OA.
- (6) Maintain active ground surveillance screening operations and spoiling attacks against NVA/VC forces.
- (7) Conduct rice denial operations.
- (8) Support SVN RD Campaign Plan 1967.

2. 3d MarDiv order 03009, 4 required unit commanders to provide security for and defense of installations and vital areas in their respective operating areas. The Commanding Officer 4th Marines, as base coordinator Camp Carroll, was therefore responsible for base security and defense to include personnel, equipment and installations located therein.

B. Significant Operations Conducted.

1. The continuing effort of the Regiment was directed toward preventing the NVA/VC forces from interdicting RT 9 between Cam Lo, Camp Carroll, Thon Son Lam, LZ Stud, Ca Lu and that portion of RT 9 in the Regimental OA extending west of Ca Lu. NVA elements were engaged west of Ca Lu in minor contacts throughout the month. With security maintained along the western portion of RT 9, convoys from Khe Sanh combat base were able to utilize the resupply point at LZ Stud on a daily basis. Aggressive small unit activities were conducted to include daily patrol and night ambushes. An active and aggressive day and night artillery interdiction program was maintained to keep the NVA/VC from passing his forces or moving supplies and equipment.

2. Daily security operations were conducted in conjunction with mine and road sweeps, CB efforts and rough rider convoys between Camp Carroll, Thon Son Lam, LZ Stud, Ca Lu and Dong Ha combat bases.

E. New Techniques Employed. NONEF. Command Relations.

1. As Commanding Officer 4th Marines, the Regimental Commander exercised command over those units assigned opcon to and in support of the regiment through normal channels.

2. As Base Coordinator for Camp Carroll, the Regimental Commander was responsible for establishing administrative and regulatory procedures for the establishment and the control of normal base activities within the Camp Carroll area.

3. The Regimental Commander maintained constant communications and liaison with the 123d RF Company, Cam Lo district Headquarters and the district chief through U. S. Army advisory channels.

4. Contact with Division Headquarters and adjacent regimental command echelons was maintained through normal command/control communications channels and command/staff visits.

G. Equipment. On 25 May, received one (1) 2,000 Gallon Non-potable Water tanker.H. Logistics.

(1) Supply. Primary source of supply was FLSC-B at Dong Ha.

(2) Resupply

(a) Helicopter resupply in general support of Operation Lancaster II has been routine with the exception of three (3) emergency resupplies.

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(b) See Tab (A) for Helo Resupply Weights.

(3) Transportation. "C" Co, 9th MT Bn provided truck support during the month of May, transporting 306 Tons, of supply and 2,274 troops, for a distance of 7,510 miles. On 22 May, "A" Co, 9th MT Bn relieved "C" Co, 9th MT Bn. "A" Co, 9th MT Bn transported 393 tons of supplies and 1,579 troops for a total of 4,140 miles. The U. S. Army's 2nd Bn 9th Arty, "C" Btry, 1st Bn 14th Arty and the 1st Bn, 12th Marines used their own organic vehicles to resupply themselves.

(4) Services

(a) 3rd Engr Bn continued to maintain the regimental Water Point producing a total of 620,000 gallons of potable water during the month of May. b. Twenty-three Vietnamese from NGHIA HE Hamlet (YD 132590) were employed during May to fill 9500 sandbags. They were paid with 12,060 \$VN.

c. During May 568 bundles of laundry were washed by refugees of NAM THUAN Hamlet (YD 129590) and paid for with 102,945 \$VN.

d. Two hundred Montangards were employed by Headquarters, 4th Marines for 28 days to cut brush along Route 9. They were paid with 10,728 pounds of rolled oats, 18,500 pounds of cornmeal, 22,100 pounds of rice, 1008 gallons of salad oil, and 148,320 \$VN.

e. Headquarters 4th Marines delivered eight five ton trucks loads of wood from the dump to HOANG HOA Refugees (KHE SANG Montangards).

f. During May, Headquarters 4th Marines delivered 30 sheets of tin, 1 sewing machine, 8 midwife kits, 4 carpenter kits, 1 mess kit, 4 garden kits, 1 blackboard, 35 rolls of concertina, 8 padlocks, 1 farm kit, 40 spools of barbed wire, 400 stakes, 50 pounds of 8 penny nails, 20 boxes of medicine, and 300 pounds of clothing to the Montangards from KHE BANH.

g. During May Headquarters, 4th Marines delivered to Father KO, the Catholic Priest of GIA MON Hamlet (YD 115577), 2 bags of rice and 600 pounds of assorted foods to feed patients in his dispensary, 10 school charts and 1 blackboard for his school, and 1000 bars of soap.

h. On 30 May, S-5 of 4th Marines obtained 60,000 Plasters from the AIK fund and gave this to Capt. RAO the Cam Lo District chief. This money was used to pay for 400 manday's of labor in constructing a reservoir and distribution system for the Cam Lo Refugee Camp.

i. Headquarters 4th Marines gave 10,000 \$VN to one Company of the 5th Mobile Construction Battalion, USN to be used to pay refugees to fill sandbags.

2. Psychological Warfare. During May, Psywar efforts supported Operation Lancaster II utilizing media available.

a. On 26 May, HB Det 2/7 Pys Ops Bn (USA) were utilized to broadcast CHIEU NOI theme in vic (XD 955452). Broadcast hours for May totaled 10 hours.

b. To support Operation Lancaster II, six airborne leaflet drops totaling 600,000 leaflets were made against predominately NVA audience.

c. Aerial broadcast was used but the exact hours are not known.

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J. Administration. Functioning in accordance with Division Order 5450.1

(1) All administrative personnel received on-the-job training in the field during Operation Lancaster II. This training consisted of all phases of administration under combat conditions.

(2) During the entire period of this report 50% of the personnel in the S-1/Adjutant section were members of the Headquarters Company reaction platoon. Inspection of personnel and equipment proved them to be in a high state of readiness.

L. Intelligence The enemy order of battle within the Lancaster II Area of operation has not undergone any significant changes during the month of May.

1. Numerous reports continue to confirm the element of the 27th Independent Battalion continue to operate in the northeastern sector of the 4th Marines area of responsibility. No definite location is confirmed but reports indicate their presence in vicinity of (XD 0360). A review of recent OOB Studies indicate that elements of the 4th Bn 29th Regt are reportedly operating in the vicinity of (XD 095443). The artillery attacks on Camp Carroll are believed to be a continuing effort on the part of the 164th Artillery Regt and possible elements of the 54th Artillery Regt.

2. The enemy continued to subject Camp Carroll and 4th Marines outposts to rocket, artillery and mortar fire. Total rounds fired within the 4th Marines AO were 55 rounds of 75mm Arty, 52 rounds of 122 Rockets, 6 rounds of 130mm Arty, 67 rounds of 82mm mortar, 20 rounds of 107mm Rocket, 32 rounds of U/I Rockets, and 29 rounds of U/I Arty; for a total of 261 rounds.

3. The total of mining incidents along Route 9 for the reporting period was 6.

4. Contacts within the area of operation were relatively light. There were no major enemy forces engaged during the reporting period. Electronic devices and Recon reports indicate the enemy's continued capability of transiting the 4th Marines Area of Operation.

5. Recon teams continued to make sporadic contact with enemy elements ranging in size from two to fifteen men. Four teams were forced into emergency extractions including: 1. 2 men were Albatross in vicinity of (XD 191459), 2. 1 man was in vicinity of (XD 878509), 3. 1 man was in vicinity of (XD 066414), and 4. 1 man was in vicinity of (XD 124516).

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6. During late May the presence of enemy anti-aircraft machine guns was noted eight kilometers south of Camp Carroll. The identification of such weapons north of the Quang Tri River, between Route 9 and 558, represents a new development. Their location constitutes a threat to aircraft utilizing landing zone Stui and to aircraft in general transit over the area. It is further possible enemy elements so located could assist in the staging of rocket or ground efforts directed against Camp Carroll or the Ca Lu complex.

#### M. Training.

1. Training for the month consisted of FAM firing of weapons on a weekly basis, indoctrination lectures for newly arrived personnel, weekly classes on tactical trends, and on the job training.

3. **Other Air Support:** During this period the majority of air strikes were made in the forward portion of our AO along RT 9 attacking hill 190, bunker and bunker positions, AF positions and troop concentrations. The 4th Marines supported the Air Striker and received 65 employing mostly D-9, D-1 and D-2 type aircraft.

4. **TPQ Targets:** A total of 151 TPQ targets were submitted by this company and 50 targets actually being attacked with a total of 118 tons of ordnance.

5. **Other support units utilized:** aerial observers were mainly used for the purpose of surveying and were effective in support of all operations in this area.
