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SECTION II

PERSONNEL/ADMINISTRATION

A. Summary. The Battalion spent the entire month within the Chu Lai enclave. On 25 January, Operation Spread Eagle was effected (see Section IV); a forward Command post was established at vicinity (BT 462073) on that date. The organization participated in no other major operations. The Personnel Section was involved in administrative duties, casualty reporting, and handling of Viet Cong suspects.

B. Significant Events

1 Jan - LtCol R. E. SULLIVAN assumed command as Battalion Commander

9 Jan - Commandant of the Marine Corps attended services at Bn Chapel, visited Co "D" CP. Commandant awarded a Bronze Star to member of Co "A", Navy Commendation Medal to Navy Corpsman. Commanding Officer meritoriously promoted Bronze Star winner from LCpl to Cpl.

15 Jan - One temporary appointment to 1stLt delivered to officer of the command.

19 Jan - Rosters received stating names of those persons whose RTD was changed to 12 months vice 13 months (over 100 men affected by the change). One Bronze Star awarded by Assistant Division Commander to member of Company "A".

20 Jan - 1st Marines (-)(Rein) assumed Administrative and Operational control of this command. Cease fire by all MACV forces in Vietnam commenced at 1200, to last until 231800H Jan (in observance of Vietnamese Lunar New Year, TET).

21 Jan - Vietnamese holiday season of TET began, festivities to last for seven days.

24 Jan - Two Navy Commendation Medals awarded by Assistant Division Commander to members of Company "A".

25 Jan - Battalion commenced Operation SPREAD EAGLE (see Section IV).

27 Jan - Squad-size outpost raided by Viet Cong, resulting in five Marines KIA (see Section IV).

C. Problem Areas/New Developments

1. Problem areas have decreased somewhat during the past month. Administrative supplies, including two typewriters, have been received.

Shortage in consumable paper forms continues to preclude implementation of Addressograph system into the administration. Communications have not improved to the island units, and hamper the administrative efficiency of the section. Recent disposition of units in accordance with Operation SPREAD EAGLE now allows only one guard mail run per day; two companies are separated from their administrative headquarters, causing further delay in administration. Difficulty is experienced in the interpretation of "battle death", as per JAG Manual and MARCORPERS Manual, pertaining to the submission of investigative reports.

2. New developments include a new casualty reporting procedure (see attached papers), free radiogram service to the United States, availability of R&R in Manila.
3. The area of personnel rotation holds both a problem and a new development. Critical months for rotation are April, June, and October, with 200 persons or more rotating during each month. "Short-touring" has been of little help to lessen the loss for each month in OF other than O3. Further, the majority of June rotatees are in Company "A", the majority of October rotatees in Company "C". The section has developed a system of transferring such persons within the Battalion, so that all companies have an equal number of men rotating within any of these critical months. Implementation of the system has begun, and will probably continue for the next month. However the "hump" rotation remains, in "H&S" Company, for personnel in OF other than O3, as there are no units with like OF in the Battalion to level the hump with.

F. Morale, PX, Postal Affairs, Liberty, R&R

1. Morale remains high, though contact with the enemy is hampered by our present location. Good food, beer and soda, remain available for all hands. Billeting space has improved with six native shelters being constructed by local civilians. Weather has improved, with less rain and warmer temperatures noted. The roster of early rotatees, mentioned in C. 3. above, has greatly bolstered the morale of some.

2. Exchange facilities are inadequate, and unsatisfactory. It is noted that wide selection of venereal prophylactics are stocked, while health and comfort items are not available. Necessities not available include: toothbrushes, foot powder, shaving cream, towels, and writing materials. Other necessary items available perhaps once each month are: razor blades (of any type), tooth paste, batteries, and laundry soap. Many items have never been available in the system, and can be purchased only in Vietnamese hamlets. These include wash basins, wash rags and towels, soap dishes, flashlights, kerosene lamps, scrub brushes, shower shoes, combs, nail clip-pers, and candles. The foregoing has obvious implications in the gold flow problem, as U. S. items would be purchased instead of inferior Viet-namense products if the U. S. product was available.

3. Postal services continue to be adequate.

4. Liberty is not authorized for the command.

5. R&R is available in the following areas: Okinawa, Bangkok, Hong Kong, Taipei, Manila, Tokyo, and Saigon. Quotas allocated are sufficient.

INTELLIGENCE

SECTION III

A. Summary of enemy activity1. General.

- (a) The period was characterized by an increase in small unit action and mining activity primarily in the HOA XUAN (BT 4515) area. The attack of a VC platoon size unit upon "B" Company outpost in the Binh An (2) area (BT 460145) is indicative of this activity. VC squad to platoon (-) engagements in the western TAOR, vic of KHUONG DAI (BT 4410), KHUONG NHON (BT 4309), Hill 69 (BT 468068), Thanh My Trung (BT 4503) and sporadic small arms/grenade incidents indicate a marked increase of enemy Recon and probing activity. The appearance of 60mm mortar fire used by the enemy indicates a marked improvement in unit armament and training. Possibly infiltration of Main Force elements integrating themselves with local militia could be an explanation of this change.
- (b) The primary units operating within the TAOR and adjacent areas are local militia, A-19 and A-21 Local Force Companies. The 94th Battalion plus small highly trained suicide/sabotage teams were also reported. The enemy propaganda effort aimed at U.S. Service men was a definite upgrading of the VC subversion effort during the period. During "TET" Holidays the VC initiated an intense propaganda effort but generally held to their cease fire agreement.
- (c) Significant trends toward squad size probes and the use of indirect fire weapons indicate a willingness to engage that was lacking during the past three months. The improved weather conditions during the month and effect it had upon the enemy logistical situation may have provided him with needed staples and material. Increased enemy activity of platoon to company strength is well within the enemy's capability due to enemy infiltration and stockpiling.
- (d) Roadblock incidents and kidnapping increased during the month, however, positive retaliatory action by USMC units in the area have made this form of coercion less lucrative to the VC.

Of a total of 18 booby traps found, 4 were detonated by Marines, 14 were destroyed.

C. Weather and Terrain (January 1966)

1. The period was characterized by intermittent light showers. Rain occurred normally during early morning darkness. Generally clear weather prevailed during daylight hours. A total of 3.77 inches of rain fell during the reporting period. Average visibility was 5.7 miles with periods of 2-3 miles during early morning fog. Temperatures were mild and comfortable with a range of 85° maximum, 78° mean, and 67° minimum.

(a) Western TAOR dtd 25 Jan 66 to 31 Jan 66.

- (1) Partly cloudy with occasional rainshowers throughout period. Heaviest rainfall occurred during darkness. Visibility generally unrestricted, 3-5 miles during rainshowers. Low cloud formations restricted observation of mountainous areas in the western boundaries of the TAOR. Weather had no effect on troop movement. The weather had no appreciable effect on movement of vehicles.

2. Thick undergrowth in low areas impaired visibility but had no effect on movement of troops.

(a) Western TAOR dtd 25 Jan 66 to 31 Jan 66.

- (1) The terrain and vegetation posed no problem in the movement of foot troops. Vegetation obstructs observation in some areas, however, generally observation is considered good. Surface materials vary greatly within the western TAOR, consisting of deep sand and barren sand dunes, black silt marshes along slack water areas, rice paddies (full), red clay in heavily vegetated hill areas, and tidal flats along the inland waterways.

3. Trafficability was excellent to good in all areas with water patrol activity being hampered by occasionally fresh winds.

(a) Western TAOR dtd 25 Jan 66 to 31 Jan 66.

- (1) On road trafficability is considered good, off road trafficability poor to untrafficable in all but sandy areas and low hill areas where trafficability is fair to good,

4. High Tides: Maximum 6.3 feet, Mean 4.7 feet, Minimum 1.7 feet
Low Tides: Maximum 3.0 feet, Mean 1.9 feet, Minimum 0.8 feet

D. Battalion Scout/Sniper Team

1. Two Scout/Sniper Teams in position vic (BT 447158) @ 240735H fired and hit (twice) one VC standing guard vic (BT 436157). At 240740H, they fired and scored two hits (possibly killing) one VC at same location. At 240817H, the Scout/Sniper Teams located vic (BT 455157) observed three armed VC moving vic (BT 450150) @ 240817H. The VC were taken under fire and one man was observed falling to the ground. A sniper fired a second at the VC when he tried to get up and the VC was hit in the back. He was later observed being carried away by the other two VC, the snipers were not in position at this time to take them under fire.
2. The most salient feature of this action was that the team was inserted into hostile territory under cover of a pre-dusk sweep and then harboured until just prior to dawn. Two teams employed together provide an excellent kill capability and minimum amount of security allowed the entire unit to remain undetected until after they had accomplished their mission.

SECTION IV.

OPERATIONS/TRAINING

A. Mission. During the period of this chronology the missions of the 1st Battalion, 4th Marines continued to be as assigned by the 4th Marine Regiment Operation Order 308-65 dated 20 December 1965; namely:

1. Occupy and defend in assigned zone of the 4th Marines sector.
2. Maintain combat patrol bases on KY HOA and KY XUAN Islands.
3. Conduct and maintain surveillance of seaward approaches within sector to repel landings and prohibit infiltration.
4. Conduct aggressive operations and patrolling within assigned zone.
5. Be prepared to conduct operations outside the TAOR unilaterally or bilaterally with RVNAF.
6. Construct and maintain field fortifications required for protection of the vital area on KY HA Peninsula.
7. Establish a Peninsula Defense Command to coordinate activities among organizations on the KY HA Peninsula.
8. Conduct a vigorous Civil Affairs Program within assigned zone.
9. Provide liaison personnel to the Chief, QUANG TIN Province, TAM KY.

On 26 January 1966 this Battalion assumed the additional responsibilities outlined in the mission of the 2d Battalion, 4th Marines by physically occupying and defending strategic positions within that TAOR. A forward command post of the Battalion set up operation in 2d Battalion, 4th Marines CP along with two rifle companies.

All assigned missions were executed with vigor. Aggressive saturation patrolling and ambush establishment precluded any large scale enemy buildup intent upon attacking the vital logistic support areas in the rear.

B. Operations. During the first twenty-five days of January the Battalion maintained two rifle companies along the MLR on the KY HA Peninsula, and one company on each of the two islands, KY HOA and KY XUAN. On the peninsula Companies A and C conducted vigorous saturation patrolling forward of the MLR and along the entire length of the Peninsula. Patrols and ambushes were maintained at a maximum level during the hours of darkness. Several of these were coordinated U.S. Marines/Popular Forces activities. In addition, combined U.S. Marine/Self Defense Corps checkpoints were manned in the various hamlets to insure compliance with established curfew regulations. Company A provided security for the LST ramp (BT 522121) located on the northeast tip of the peninsula in addition to manning their portion of the MLR. Companies B and D conducted aggressive patrolling on the islands of KY HOA (BT 5014) and KY XUAN (BT 4810) respectively. The patrol activities were in conjunction with an active pacification/rural reconstruction program. Self Defense Corps checkpoints were maintained on KY HOA Island to insure compliance with established curfew regulations.

H&S Company continued to defend the Battalion Command Post. In addition the company provided personnel as security for the waterborne patrol and to accompany the nightly Popular Forces ambush within the KY HA Village. The 2d Platoon, Company A, 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion conducted nightly waterborne patrols throughout the various inland waterways within the Battalion's TAOR. The patrols primary mission was to insure compliance with the existing surfew regulations. In addition to the above mentioned mission the LVT's provided logistic support to the patrol bases located on the islands of KY HOA and KY XUAN. Tactical support in the form of amphibious landings was provided during the scheduled operations on HOA XUAN Island (BT 4315). Offensive operations for the Battalion consisted of one Battalion (-) operation and several platoon (rein) operations. On 15 January 1966 Operation QUICK ST, a Battalion (-) operation, was executed on HOA XUAN Island (BT 4315). Companies C (-) and D (-) were helo lifted into separate landing zones at (BT 423135) and (BT 409155) respectively to conduct search and clear operations along a west to east axis of advance. One reinforced platoon from Company B moved by LT to the vicinity of (BT 437157) and established a blocking position at those coordinates. Prior to these three simultaneous landings combined fixed wing and helicopter preparatory fires were directed by a TAC(A) on the selected sites. The coordination of air/ground employment was excellently demonstrated on this operation. Sporadic small arms fire was encountered but, as has been noted before, operations involving more than platoon size forces rarely, if ever, meet with heavy resistance/harrassment from the VC on this particular island. Eight VCS were apprehended on the sweep and the entire force retracted at 1400H from (BT 460147) by LVT and returned to its patrol base/MLR positions.

One additional development was the tactical employment of two scout/sniper teams shortly after TET ended 24 January 1966. The teams were dropped off at (BT 4516) and harbored overnight. On sunrise of the next day the team spotted a VC sentry with a rifle near (BT 436157). Four rounds were fired, the VC was hit by two of these. A second VC moved up to give assistance to his fellow comrade and he also was shot and apparently killed. The team then moved southeastward to (BT 450156). Three more VC were sighted moving into a tree line and were taken under fire by the snipers. One VC dropped, attempted to get up, was shot again in the chest, and appeared to have been killed. Moments later the remaining two VC were observed carrying a limp figure away. The first tabulation was three confirmed VC wounded, with all three possibly killed.

The employment of the sniper teams seems to provide an effective psychological shock to VC who normally have no problem with their own security. The attempt will be made on future operations to exploit the potential of the scout/sniper team more fully.

On 201600H January 1966 the Battalion became OPCON to the 1st Marines. On 260900H January 1966 the Battalion acquired the added responsibility of occupying and defending 2d Battalion, 4th Marines TAOR in addition to its own.

C. Chronological Narrative of Significant Events.January

- 1 At 012204H Marines in a defensive position on the CP perimeter (BT 526091) fired one burst of A/W at a man to the front of their position. The man had not halted when challenged and appeared to fall when fired at. Marines in the adjacent position observed a figure get up and move toward the south. The man was challenged again and did not halt. Seven to eight M-14 rounds were fired as the man disappeared into the brush. Four rounds of 81mm Mortar illumination were fired and an eight man patrol checked the area, finding nothing unusual.
- 2 At 020818H, the second platoon, Company B received S/A fire from (BT 435152) and (BT 435160) while located on Hill 10 (BT 438158). Artillery was called and a fire for effect was given. The area was thoroughly covered by fire, however, upon conducting a physical surveillance of the area nothing unusual was found. At 020855H, one Company B Marine WIA was sustained when S/A fire was received at (BT 437156). The enemy withdrew before contact could be regained. At 021032H at (BT 438153) another Company B Marine WIA was sustained when he activated a 60mm Mortar mine/booby trap. At 021100H a Company D squad security patrol apprehended one VC at (BT 495102), armed with two grenades and carrying assorted documents. Company B searched PHU VINH Hamlet (BT 43114) at 021330H. A total of eleven VCS were apprehended.
3. At 030800H, Company B's ambush in the vicinity of (BT 462146) apprehended two (2) female VCS that had moved in a boat from (BT 461148) to (BT 462146). One of the women did not have an I. D. card. The PF platoon commander Mr. ICH informed the Marines that these women were the wives of VC. The two VCS were sent to the Chu Lai Collection Point. At 031350H a Company D patrol apprehended two (2) VCS males with improper identification in the vicinity of (BT 482094). The two VCS were taken to the Village Chief for disposition. The Village Chief recognized one of the VCS and released him. The other VCS was sent to the Chu Lai Collection Point because the Village Chief did not recognize him and he did not have an I.D. card.
- 4 At 041222H, a Company B patrol discovered two booby traps in the vicinity of (BT 468140). The fragmentation grenades used in the booby traps were wired into punji pits. The booby traps were blown in place by the patrol.
- 5 At 050825H, in the vicinity (BT 415159), seven persons were observed to run from a building and fire S/A at a helicopter carrying the Battalion Commander and his staff on a reconnaissance flight of HOA XUAN Island. The immediate evasive action taken by the pilot did not allow fire to be returned and the VC were not observed again.

January

The helicopter received one hit without serious damage, and no casualties were sustained.

6

At 2135H the waterborne patrol hailed a native boat which failed to stop. Approximately 20 rounds of automatic weapons fire were directed across the bow of the boat. The boat was searched and credentials checked. The personnel were allowed to continue on their way.

7

At 070315H Company B platoon patrol vicinity (BT 431142) received heavy small arms fire from Phu Vinh Hamlet (BT 433145). Platoon returned fire killing one VC and wounding one. Wounded VC withdrew before platoon could reach him. At 070815H Company B platoon apprehended one male VCS who appeared unusually interested in VCK vicinity (BT 433145). At 071035H Company B platoon vicinity (BT 435155) received sporadic sniper fire from (BT 429158). B platoon returned fire with a M-60 machine gun at what appeared to be 3 VC. Artillery was called with three (3) rounds to adjust and a five round fire for effect that landed twenty-five (25) yards from the group of VC. Firing from the VC ceased until the platoon started moving toward their LVT pickup point, at which time two (2) more rounds were fired by the VC and the enemy then ceased firing completely when the platoon returned fire again by an M-60 machine gun. The platoon then moved to LVT pickup point. Company B platoon patrol apprehended six (6) VCS in Phu Vinh Hamlet during the morning of 7 January. VCS were of military age and were in the area from which earlier sniper rounds had been fired at platoon.

8

At 072130H a Company B squad ambush at (BT 461145) sighted a boat vicinity (BT 456146) moving toward their location from HOA XUAN Island. The ambush issued verbal warnings, but the boat did not stop. An M-60 machine gun and M-14 rifle fire was then directed at the boat. The boat returned to HOA XUAN. The ambush could not physically apprehend the boat due to lack of water transportation. There were no apparent casualties aboard the boat.

9

At 082240H, a 10 man patrol from Company D at (BT 486116) received one incoming grenade and two rounds S/A's fire. The grenade failed to immediately detonate and was picked up by a member of the patrol and thrown aside. At that time it exploded. There were no casualties from the grenade or the small arms fire. The squad was subsequently formed into two elements, a search element and covering force, consisting of five men each. As a Marine, moving as a member of the search element started in the front of the covering force position and across an open area, he was mistaken for the enemy, taken under fire, and killed. The body was evacuated by helicopter to B-Med.

January

- 10 At 100500H the waterborne patrol apprehended one Vietnamese boat at (BT 485120) which contained 5-10 pounds of rice. One man, one woman, and a child were embarked. They were on their way to Ky Xuan because they heard that there was an infirmery/sickbay there where this woman would be able to deliver her baby. The people are from Ky Xuan Village but live on the boat. This is a good example of the effect the MedCAP/Civil Affairs program has on the people once its reputation spreads. People like this are risking possible reprisal from the VC in order to seek out aid from the U. S./GVN force.
- 11-12 At 120145H, joint USMC/SDC post #2 located at (BT 518102) reported three small arms rounds going over their heads. Communications were established with a Company A squad patrol in the area, and the area where the small arms rounds were thought to originate was investigated, however, nothing unusual was found.
- 13 At 130833H a platoon of Company A received sporadic small arms fire and three incoming 60mm Mortar rounds, thought to originate from the vicinity of (BT 437157). The platoon was aboard LVT's moving northwest up the TRUONG GIANG River at (BT 443158) enroute to their landing point (BT 438110) to commence a one day Search and Clear Operation. Small-arms and artillery fire was not returned due to the inability of the platoon to observe the enemy. After the initial incident fire, the enemy ceased fire of their own volition and the remainder of the landing was unopposed. No further enemy contact was made throughout the operation. The platoon commenced retraction at 131216H and returned to the splash point (BT 517117) at 131225H.
- 14 At 132010H, the PAT squad operating on Ky Xuan Island (BT 4910) reported VC activity in a hamlet located (BT 485098), and they had subsequently fired small arms at a house in the hamlet. A squad from Company D and the village chief immediately checked the hamlet and the house in question. The search revealed a small group of Vietnamese that were extremely intoxicated as a result of pre-TET celebrating. The village chief dispersed the party and no other unusual activity was found.
- 15 At 150714H, a Company D platoon apprehended two VCS while debarking from helicopters during the Battalion(-) Operation (Operation QUICK STEP) on Hoa Xuan Island (BT 4215). The VCS were captured near the landing zone vicinity (BT 416158).

January

Neither VCS had an identification card, subsequently both were turned over to Chu Lai Collection Point. At 150735H, a Company D platoon during the Operation, discovered two dead Vietnamese in the helicopters landing zone located at (BT 410156). Both victims appeared to have been killed during the landing zone air prep. From 150705H to 151400H a total of eight VCS were apprehended by elements of the Battalion during the sweep and destroy operation. All VCS were turned over to Chu Lai Collection Point. No specific enemy contact was made on the Island, and no casualties were sustained. The Battalion returned to Ky Ha at 1515H.

16-17

At 170347H, the waterborne patrol located at (BT 515119) reported approximately 30 boats approaching the mouth of the inland waterway (BT 518118) from numerous positions along the shore. Verbal attempts to return the fishermen to shore went unheeded and the waterborne patrol subsequently fired three warning shots into the air. Upon hearing the shots the boats immediately returned to their moorings, along the shoreline. At 170945H, a Company A squad patrol observed a small boy with a homemade booby trap device in his possession in the vicinity of (BT 515105). When the booby trap was taken from the boy, he ran and the Marines were unable to apprehend him. The booby trap consisted of a hollow piece of bamboo with a 7.62 round and a nail plunger inside. When the bamboo is buried in the ground in a verticle position the round is fired when pressure is applied by stepping on the top of the device.

18.

At 172230H, one incoming grenade was received at a Company A defensive bunker located at (BT 517117). The bunker is part of the defensive positions in support of the LST ramp. Thirty rounds of S/A fire were directed at a figure seen fleeing in a northeasterly direction. A squad immediately searched the area but could not locate the individual. There were no casualties. At 1728H, inside Company B's perimeter wire, (BT 511125) a trip flare was set off which revealed an individual. This person immediately fled the area. Four rounds of S/A were returned and the area carefully searched; however, contact was not regained. A Company D sentry, at 180210H, vicinity (BT 486103), fired two rounds of S/A at a suspected enemy movement after issuing verbal warnings to halt, and illuminating the area. Nothing significant evolved as a result of this contact.

January

At 180403H, a Company D squad size patrol apprehended ten curfew violators in the vicinity of (BT 482112). Nine of the violators had identification and were accordingly turned over to the Village Chief. The one without identification was sent to Chu Lai Collection Point as a VCS.

19-20-21 At 201930H receipt of intelligence information from Ly Tin District Headquarters indicated that two squads of VC guerrillas would be visiting Ky Xuan Island (BT 4810) during the night to obtain food. They would then move the food by boat from the general area of (BT 4708) to (BT 4608). Two squads from Company A were alerted and slept in two LVT's at the splash point (BT 517117), and the boat patrol was ordered to concentrate its surveillance from (BT 47711C) to (BT 493077) to (BT 499084). Company D set four squad ambushes in the southwestern area of Ky Xuan (BT 4809) along likely avenues of approach into the area. No VC were encountered during the night.

22-23 At 222130H, Company A command post reported hearing four rounds of small arms fire in the vicinity of (BT 527110). All units in that area were immediately contacted but neither the origin of the fire nor its specific location could be determined.

24 ~~Battalion~~ SitRep # 263 paragraph 1.b reported that possibly two VC were wounded as a result of sniper fire. After a debrief of the scout/sniper team, a more complete and accurate account was obtained. One VC, armed with a rifle was sighted in the vicinity of (BT 436157) at 24073 H by the team located in the vicinity of (BT 444160).

A total of four rounds were fired at the VC, two of which were observed hits. The insurgent failed to move after the second hit. A second VC moved to the same location as the initial sighting. He was immediately taken under sniper fire, hit, and observed lying motionless on the ground. Both enemy personnel were listed as confirmed WIA's and possible KIA's. The sniper team then displaced to the vicinity (BT 450156). Upon arriving and establishing their positions, they observed three more armed VC moving in the vicinity of (BT 450150). At 240817H, the VC were immediately taken under fire and one man was observed slumping to the ground. He attempted to get up, presenting a full body shot, the sniper team fired again and observed the figure fall.

January

Moments later the remaining two VC were observed carrying a limp figure away. However, they were unable to be taken under fire. No further sightings were reported for the duration of the day. Final tabulations were three VC confirmed wounded, with all three possible KIA's. Confirmation of kills was impossible due to distance involved (900 meters) and the TRUONG GIANG River (BT 4415) between the snipers and enemy.

- 25 At 21225H, the waterborne patrol apprehended one VCS at (BT 476100). The VN male did not possess an ID card and was turned over to SDC Post #1 located at (BT 515115). He was held there until daylight, at which time he was turned over to the Village Chief for disposition. At 251115H, the Company B squad outpost at Kahoolawe, (BT 461145), received one incoming S/A round from (BT 457135). A fire team was immediately sent to check the area of origin, but was unable to locate any enemy forces.
- 26 The Battalion OP forty and two rifle companies (Rein) commenced tactical responsibility of 2/4 area.
- 27 At 270210H, A Company D squad ambush at (BT 459072) received four incoming sniper rounds from (BT 461078). No rounds were returned due to the distance and uncertainty as to the exact location of origin of the sniper. At 270220H, a Company B reinforced squad outpost at (BT 458143) was attacked by approximately 20 to 30 VC. The VC initiated the attack with 4-5 60mm mortar rounds and A/W (suspected .50 Cal MG) fire from (BT 457147), immediately followed by approximately five grenades thrown into the squad CP position killing the squad leader and radio man immediately. The VC then threw grenades and fired S/A's at the machine gun and 3.5 rocket launcher positions. After the initial grenade and S/A attack, the remaining two fire teams regrouped and set up a hasty defense at (BT 458142) and returned fire. The attack came from a southerly direction and was the opposite direction from which the outpost was oriented. A significant point is that the VC knew exactly where the squad CP and machine gun were located. An additional point, the raiding party covered an area of more than 200 meters that was well covered with trip flares, no flares were tripped.

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The weapons and equipment lost by the squad outpost were two .45 caliber pistols, one M-79 grenade launcher, and 17 rounds of ammo, one M-14 rifle, one 3.5 rocket launcher, and one PRC/6 radio. There were five friendly killed in action. The squad outpost observed approximately six to ten VC being carried away in a southerly direction toward (BT 460135). At 270900H, a Company A squad patrol located at (BT 443056) received one sniper round from an undetermined origin. The enemy was not observed and no fire was returned. At 270915H, the patrol discovered one booby trapped grenade at (BT 445057). The booby trap was disarmed with no casualties. Numerous propaganda signs were observed in the area of (BT 455055). One sign translated to read "We will try again to defeat American Imperialism".

28

At 272100H, a Company B platoon outpost located at (BT 476143) fired an 81mm Mortar H and I mission at suspected enemy movement at (BT 472147). The area was observed at dawn and there were no enemy casualties observed. At 280935H, a Company D(-) combat patrol located at (BT 452109) received two sniper rounds from the vicinity of (BT 440110). The distance to the origin of firing was too great to return fire and the sniper was unobserved. The patrol continued on its patrol route toward the sniper but there was no enemy located in that area. At 281015H, the Company D (-) combat patrol located at (BT 439093), received S/A's and automatic weapons fire from approximately 15 VC located in the vicinity of (BT 428094). S/A's fire, one M-79 and two 3.5 inch rocket launcher rounds were immediately returned. Two of the VC were seen falling down but when the area was investigated by the patrol there were no wounded or dead VC in the area. At 281050H, the Company D (-) combat patrol apprehended one VCS in the vicinity of (BT 425090). The VCS was a 14 year old male who was seen in the area from which the patrol had received sniper fire at 281015H. The boy was turned over to LY TIN District Headquarters. At 281530H, Company B while conducting H&I fires on Hoa Xuan Island with 81mm Mortar, had one short round. Short round fell into Hamlet of Binh An (2) at (BT 464143) killing 2 Vietnamese civilians and wounding three.

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29

At 282200H, the waterborne patrol apprehended two curfew violators in the vicinity of (BT 460119). Both curfew violators were turned over to the Chu Lai Collection Point.

30

At 292227H, a Company A squad (rein) ambush located at (BT 441029) received two incoming 60mm mortar rounds that landed 100 meters east of their position. The squad could not determine the origin of the mortars and moved their ambush position 500 meters east. From 300317H to 300330H, the CMR located at 1st Bn, 11th Marines position reported 60mm mortar rounds being fired from (BT 4938505210). The area was taken under fire by 107mm platoon with two rounds being fired into that area. At 300343H, CMR again reported 60mm mortar fire at (BT 491056). Again the 107mm platoon fired into the area with four rounds. There was no surveillance on effect on target and the firing ceased both times when the 107mm platoon fired. At 301120H, a Company A platoon patrol located at (BT 439046) received two incoming sniper rounds from the vicinity of (BT 443033). At the same time as the sniper rounds were received the platoon discovered four AP mines. The patrol destroyed the land mines. Return fire on the snipers position was not undertaken due to the extreme distance.

31

At 302145H, a Company M fire team patrol in the vicinity of (BT 521105) observed two VN. The patrol challenged three times and then received two rounds of S/A fire. S/A fire was immediately returned. The fire team advanced to check the area. There were no enemy casualties found. At 302305H, a Company A defensive position located at (BT 468067) received one incoming grenade. A M-26 grenade was thrown at the suspected origin of the incoming grenade and one VC was observed crawling away at 302320H. The VC was pursued by fire and then physically pursued but fled before he could be apprehended. One Marine WIA was sustained but did not need evacuation. At 310240H, a Company B LP in the vicinity of (BT 515122) observed two VN on a trail leading into their LP. The men were challenged. The area was then illuminated and the VN ran into some bushes along the trail. The LP fired eight rounds at the fleeing VN but could not observe whether the VN were wounded or not.

D. Training.

- (1) Training was continued with on-the-job instruction within the rifle companies, H&S Company and direct support units. Orientation and indoctrination briefings were conducted for all personnel joining the Battalion.
- (2) Rifle company training emphasized General Military Subjects directly applicable to the present mission of the Battalion.
- (3) In addition to on-the-job training, H&S Company conducted semi-formal training in various subjects including; communication security, compass and map reading, helicopter support team operation, AN/PRC-25 (Radio), operators vehicle maintenance, baking, meat cutting, fuel mixing (flame thrower), gun drill (81mm mortar and 106mm recoilless rifle platoon), VD lectures, mines, demolitions and booby traps.
- (4) 109 Marines attended the two day Regimental Mine Warfare School.
- (5) Training for the local Popular Forces and Self Defense Corps (Home Guard) was conducted during this period. Coordination was established with unit leaders and district headquarters. In KY HA Village training was conducted in bayonet and hand to hand combat fighting. A total of 30 PF attended. Results were considered good.
- (6) Engineer training was conducted in tunnel probing and searching for hidden caves. An officer from 4th Marines came to the Battalion to instruct personnel in the techniques effectively employed.
- (7) Communications security school was held by Detachment J from 0830-1030 on scheduled days. Over 100 people were instructed in the elements and techniques of communications security.
- (8) 60mm and 81mm mortar training was held to give additional operational instruction in the effective use of these weapons.

LOGISTICSSECTION V.A. SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

This Battalion plus attached and/or supporting units averaged a monthly strength of 1100. The Battalion was realigned on 26 January to include 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines TAOR with Company M, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines attached. The Battalion has one rifle company positioned on two outlying islands forward of the MLR. Water, including that for showers, is furnished to this unit on a daily basis. One hot meal a day is furnished this company and two hot meals a day to the units on the MLR. Those units displaced to 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines TAOR are being supported logistically from the forward echelons position.

An increased amount of material, spare parts and equipment has been received. The receipt of these items has helped alleviate several problem areas. However the supply of cots is still critical. A "CRITIPAK" issue was received on 25 January.

During January, no tent strongbacks were allocated to this Battalion. Construction of eight native shelters was started. Completion is expected by 3 February 1966.

B. SUPPLY1. Supply Requirements

(a) Class I - 8000 gallons water/day
1100 rations/day

(b) Class II - Office supplies, housekeeping supplies, rifle oil, administrative forms, lightweight utilities and common size jungle boots are in short supply.

(c) Class III - 150 gallons MOGAS, 100 gallons diesel, 15 gallons kerosene and limited quantities of all types of oil are required daily.

(d) Class IV - A requirement exists for 30,000 sandbags, 1000 rolls of barbed wire and sufficient stakes (8', 5', 32", 24") to complete the MLR positions.

(e) Class V - A Basic Allowance is maintained by all units with an additional Basic Allowance for the outpost units.

2. Procurement Problems

(a) A great time lag still exists from the document draft date and receipt of advise cards on priority O2 requisitions. Some priority O2 requisitions have been downgraded without notifying this unit. This could be contributed to key-punch operator mistakes.

C. TRANSPORTATION

1. Transportation support has improved some this month.

2. Actual availability of cargo vehicles is limited due to breakdowns on the job. However, the support received from the truck units has been very good considering the conditions under which they have been operating.

D. MAINTENANCE

1. Second echelon maintenance is still fluctuating from good to bad depending on the number of spare parts received.

2. Third echelon maintenance support has been excellent considering FLSU# 1 is also hampered by lack of repair parts.

E. SANITATION

1. Limited amounts of lime, soap, DDT and other items have been received but not enough to completely alleviate the problems encountered with sanitation.

F. DEADLINED COMBAT ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT BY TYPE. Items deadlined for the month of January are listed in Section VIII - Supporting documents.

G. EMPLOYMENT OF LOCAL CIVILIANS

1. Local civilians are employed to work in the mess hall, barber-shops and laundries.

SECTION VIII.

AIR SUPPORT/DEFENSE

- A. Air Support. During the month of January, air support requirements consisted mainly of helicopter resupply. Approximately 5 percent of all helicopter requests were not filled. Aircraft availability was greatly improved over last month due primarily to the advent of good weather and a period of general operational inactivity in and about the Chu Lai Enclave. All requests for emergency evacuation were fulfilled.

- B. Air Defense. Air defense measures employed by the Battalion are passive. No organic weapons are available for active defense.

- C. This Battalion has experienced an appreciable increase over last month in cooperation from the various agencies supplying air support. The static condition of this Battalion has relegated it to a low priority on air requests, however the response to request for supporting air for small unit actions within the TAOR has been encouraging.

MEDICAL/DENTAL AFFAIRSSECTION IX

1. The daily average number of patients seen at the Battalion Aid Station was 18.4. Of these, 53 were admitted to the ward for further treatment and/or observation. Eighty-two were referred to Company "B", 3rd Medical Battalion; twenty-seven of these being admitted for further treatment. Dental referrals numbered 49.

2. Prevalent and significant diseases encountered, with the rate of incidence, are as follows:

- a. Bronchitis - 05
- b. Diarrhea, acute - 32
- c. Gastroenteritis, acute - 16
- d. Gonorrhea - 04*
- * Contacted while on R&R

3. Emergency situation encountered and the treatment rendered is as follows:

a. SGT. C.W. PHILLIPS, 1293125, USMC, H&S Company reported to B.A.S. at approximately 1955 on 26 January 1966 with the diagnosis of wound, missile, gunshot, right upper arm. The humerus was fractured, the brachial artery was severed and the ulnar nerve was contused. Intravenous feeding was commenced and Procaine Penicillin and Tetanus Toxoid administered. The arm was splinted and the patient transferred to B-MED for further treatment.

4. Medical resupply is becoming exceedingly difficult, especially in certain critical items such as parenteral penicillin, cough syrups, Darvon, and anti-diarrhea medications. Refilling the mount-out block is hampered by nonavailability of SLIT documents. Blankets used on the ward are rapidly becoming soiled due to the increased census this month. These should be cleaned but no facilities are available.

5. The total number of inoculations administered during the month was 128. Serums most commonly used were Typhoid, Plague and Gamma Globulin.

6. During the month, MEDCAP treated approximately 3,735 civilians in the following villages: An Hai; Trung Toan; Sam Lin; Hoa Tong; Hoe Trung, and Tan Tong. The most common diseases encountered were dermatological types (ulcerated lesions), minor respiratory disorders, gastrointestinal disorders and dental extractions. Sanitation conditions in all villages are primitive but some progress is continuing to be made. The total number of patients seen decreased due to observance of TET (Lunar New Year).

SECTION X. CIVIL AFFAIRS-PSYCHOLOGICAL WARFARE ACTIVITIES

A. General.

- a. This command's Civic Action program consists primarily of medical assistance, development of local village governments and both joint and self-help projects. Civic Actions are conducted in three villages, KY HA, KY HOA, and KY XUAN.
 - (1) KY HA Village has an active government which plays an important part in the peoples lives, providing them with leadership and an organized means of communicating their needs to higher authority for assistance. The village has an active PF platoon, a well organized Self Defense Corps (Home Guard) and can all but be considered secure.
 - (2) The government of KY HOA Village has grown from a rough beginning into a well functioning organization, due primarily to the leadership of an enthusiastic Village Chief. One PF platoon is present in the village and the Self Defense Corps is active and effective in all hamlets. The people of KY HOA are very responsive to the programs and projects initiated by Company B and have a definite desire to help themselves.
 - (3) KY XUAN, under the leadership of the Village Chief, has a fairly effective government which is beginning to become an increasingly important part of the people lives. The people are quite friendly and have confidence in the Marines on the island as well as being responsive to their programs.

b. See Daily Civil Affairs Situation Reports (attached).

B. Significant Events.

- a. The Battalion Civic Action Out-Patient Clinic and company held scheduled treatment (MedCAP) in all three villages. The doctors and corpsmen treated a total of 3,662 villagers during the month. In addition, dentists provided treatment in the three villages, treating a total of 99 people.
- b. Gifts were distributed to 600 school children in KY HOA in celebration of TET. The gifts included clothing, toys, candy and books.
- c. The LY TIN District Chief paid two groups of villagers assistance money due from GVN. In HOA MY Hamlet, 185 persons received 3500 piastres each for damage to their houses from artillery fire during the VC assault on the Junk Fleet Base in July. The original 89 refugee families in HOA LONG Hamlet also received 3500 piastres relocation money.
- d. Company D conducted a survey in KY XUAN Village to gather information on people's reaction to GVN and Marine Civic Action Programs. Approximately 75 families were visited and given an opportunity to voice their opinions. The conclusions were:

- (1) The people feel that they are safe from the VC during the day but still not at night. They want Marines to stay in the Village at all times.
 - (2) They are grateful for the Marines assistance in opening the schools, but a shortage of both, buildings and supplies, still exists.
 - (3) The people feel that sick-call at Company D is a very good program and use it when they need it.
 - (4) The people are very poorly informed, they know nothing about national news and very little about what is happening in their village.
- e. On 6 January, CHAU NCOC HUONG was medically evacuated to DA NANG. HUONG, a 9 year old boy, from KY XUAN, was severely burned by an illumination grenade dud which he threw into a fire approximately 6 weeks prior. He will receive skin grafts on his left leg and be returned to his home.
 - f. On 12 January, two Vietnamese villagers from KY HOA were burned by a kerosene lamp. Their condition necessitated that they be air evacuated to QUANG NGAI USOM Hospital.
 - g. The Village Chief of KY HA, Mr. CAM, invited the Battalion Commander, Company Commanders of A and C, Battalion S-2 to celebrate the feast of the end of the year. Prior to the meal, there was a short ceremony at which time the Battalion Commander made a brief speech about the progress of the past year and hopes for the New Year.
 - h. Gift packages of rice, tea and Vietnamese candy were distributed to 500 poor families to help them celebrate TET. The Village Chiefs of KY HA, KY HOA and KY XUAN were responsible for distributing the gifts to the needy families. Money to purchase these gift packages was donated by the members of this Battalion.
 - i. A check for \$360 was donated by Elmwood Park High School, Elmwood Park, Illinois. The money will be used for Scholarships, improvement of present educational facilities and for purchase of school supplies. The check is a result of a letter sent by Pfc Steven C. ABBATE, a member of Company B, to his former High School.
 - j. Care school supplies were distributed to 200 school children to KY HA Village. Distribution was made by the School teachers in each hamlet.
 - k. Care supplies (150 lbs.) were distributed in the five hamlets of KY HOA. Included in the supplies were clothes, soap, medical supplies and Mid-Wife Kits.
 - l. The Battalion Education Development Section conducted and supervised 88 hours of instruction for 148 English language students in KY HA, KY HOA and KY XUAN.

C. Civic Action Projects.

- a. A foot bridge was constructed by the members of Company C and villagers from XUAN TRUNG Hamlet. The bridge was built over a section of the trail which was washed out by water run off from recent rains. Materials and actual construction was a Joint-Work Project.
- b. A Vietnamese team of five officials from District Headquarters met with Village Chief and Company B Civil Affairs Representatives to discuss preparations for building a refugee camp on KY HOA. Plans will be completed prior to 1 February when construction will begin.
- c. Joint Vietnamese and Marine construction of a shower unit for the people of XUAN TRUNG Hamlet. The shower unit is located near the site where MedCAP is performed. This facilitates the availability for patients to bathe prior to receiving medication.

D. Problem Areas.

- a. The decrease in number of Marines on KY XUAN and the presence of only 11 Popular Forces continues to be a restraining factor in the development of effective local security. Emphasis is being placed on local governments furnishing adequate security, thereby, deemphasizing the Marine role in government activities.
- b. A continuous problem is the cooperation of the Vietnamese people with their government. This problem will decrease when their confidence is again restored in the security provided them against VC retaliation.

E. Plans.

- a. Development of a Self Defense Corps in KY XUAN Village. This is dependent upon assignment of at least one Popular Force Unit.
- b. The installation of a Boat Inspection Center at SAM HAI. This facility would render inspection and registration of all boats in the District, thereby, providing a security measure on the waterways.
- c. To encourage participation of other Marine units in the Civil Affairs Program. This would concentrate many units in the area where one unit operated previously. It is hopeful, that this will increase the confidence and strengthen the relationship between the Vietnamese people and the GVN.

F. Psychological Operations.

- a. A total of 7,600 leaflets (numbers 10-65, 4-65, 5-65, and 13-65) were distributed throughout the island of HOA XUAN (BT 4215) during a search and destroy operation on 15 January. Six thousand leaflets (10-65) were dropped by an A0 to coincide with the arrival of the first Marine element on HOA XUAN. Sixteen hundred leaflets were distributed by the sweeping forces.
- b. Leaflets were obtained from 4th Marines Headquarters.
- c. On 20 January, fourteen transistor radios were received from JUSPAO for distribution to the local leaders within the TAOR. Five of the radios were immediately distributed to the Hamlet Chiefs of Ky Ha Village in order that the Hamlet Chiefs could keep the local populace informed of the progress of the GVN in their fight against communist insurgents. The other nine radios will be distributed to the other hamlet chiefs within the TAOR upon completion of the GVN radio station in QUANG NGAI.
- d. In conjunction with the celebration of the Chinese New Year (TET), five hundred gaily decorated packages containing one Dong coins were presented to the children of the villages of Ka Ha, Ky Hoa, and Ky Xuan. The money was freely contributed by the men of the Battalion in a gesture of friendship toward the Vietnamese People.
- e. Eight hundred agricultural magazines (HUONG QUE) were presented to the Hamlet Chiefs of Ky Ha, Ky Hoa, and Ky Xuan on 2 January in order to reinforce the Civil Affairs program and to present a favorable picture of the GVN as an active and caring government. The Hamlet Chiefs further distributed the magazines to villagers. The magazines were obtained from JUSPAO and were well received by the local populace.

SNIPER MISSION REPORT

At dawn I observed two men with weapons at a range of 900 meters at (BT 437157). One man disappeared below hill crest but other man remained standing. I could see him from approximately the knees up. Fired first round and missed. Man ducked but then stood up again. Fired second round and dropped him. He struggled to get away and I shot him a second time. After this he appeared dead. We then started to move to another position immediately after firing when I noticed a second man (different from other 2) move towards the body, so I shot him and dropped him. He too tried to crawl, and I shot him a second time. Both men appeared motionless and dead. We then moved approx 1000 meters south to a new position at (BT 450156). Immediately after we set in, I observed a three man patrol on opposite shore at (BT 448153). All three had weapons. (Two carbines, possibly one BAR). Targets were in full view and moving from left to right. I shot at the last man in line (range 400meters) and he dropped. I observed him slide behind a small bush and his back was in view. I fired another round. My spotter later observed the remaining two men carry off the wounded (or dead) man. He was totally limp and probably dead. We kept moving positions until 1500H when we were picked up by LVT. All three men were hit twice each, and all three appeared either dead, unconscious or critically wounded.

In my estimation, and in those who commanded me, the mission was a total success and everything went perfect. My section leader, 1stLt Ronald C. CORNIER (S-2 Officer) remarked that this was the first successful mission of this sort within the 1st Battalion TAOR. As far as we can tell, we never once disclosed our position or were compromised. None of the subjects taken under fire appeared to know the origin of the firing.

Troubles encountered:

My scope fogged up seriously after I hit the 3rd man, and I doubt if I could have fired again even if I saw another target. The scope is still fogged and I may have to take it to FLSU for repair if it doesn't clear up. Another fault I have found is that the lens caps do not stay on weapon.

- (b) On one occasion the VC buried a large aerial bomb along a trail and electrically detonated it when elements of a friendly convoy passed. The force of the explosion was sufficient to cause many casualties, as well as to destroy an APC and effectively interdict the road.
- (c) On another occasion two aerial bombs were buried along a trail used by friendly forces. Smaller explosive charges and hand thrown grenades were employed concurrently. When friendly troops attempted to cross the trail, both bombs were detonated simultaneously, followed by the smaller explosives and hand grenades.
- (d) Other reports reveal the VC placed a single claymore type mine along a trail, backed up by as many as eight others. After the first mine was detonated and friendly troops moved through the area, they were suddenly confronted by a large number of electrically detonated mines fired in rapid succession. This technique, in one instance, was reinforced by electrically detonated 81mm Mortar and 105mm Howitzer projectiles suspended from trees.



The VC are preparing full scale attacks on Marine outposts around the Chu Lai perimeter, especially those located in KY HOA and KY XUAN Villages. They are planning on using VC forces from KHUONG NHON, KY CHANH and KY TRUNG Villages to attack the Marines from the fourth to the seventh day after TET (24-27 January), to capture Marine artillery pieces at KY HOA and to shell the Chu Lai Airfield.

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and is possible. Infiltrate into the Airfield proper. In addition, suicide type agents, armed with explosives and mines, will attempt to destroy important elements at the Chu Lai Base. (Source Evaluation C/2) (Source Comment: The above information was obtained at a VC meeting by an APA Agent who has infiltrated the VC network in this area. This information as reported is probably true, in that it was discussed at the meeting. It is felt that the VC have a capability to:

- (1) Launch attacks against Marine outposts in the Chu Lai area; and
- (2) Dispatch suicide type missions against the base camp.

It is believed that a plan to capture artillery pieces from Marine Units to shell the airfield is wishful thinking on their part; however, the possibility of such an attempt should not be overlooked.

On 14 January 1966, a Province Intelligence source furnished the following: PHAM-TU, an important VC leader and a team of three men are presently at KY-XUAN Island approximately (BT 1908). Their mission on KY-XUAN is to get the people to dig secret caves and tunnels. They want the caves and tunnels completed before TET. (21Jan66) CIT Eval: (C/3).

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

LANG DEN Alias BLACK LANG

1. Since mid 1965 there have been numerous reports of Negro men associated with the VC operating in the DANANG area. Reports have stated these men will impersonate Americans in order to gain access to U.S. installations. Although reported more frequently in Quang Nam, there have been sightings of suspicious negroes in Quang Tin and Thua Thien.
2. One particular Negro individual, known variously as LANG DEN, NGUYEN BACH and "BLACK LANG", is particularly notorious. Son of a French Negro and a VN Bar Girl, he has been involved in the revolutionary movement since the VIET MINH days when he was a Charge D'Affaires in DANANG. More recently he has been reported as an assassin, Cmr of a suicide platoon in attacks against installations in the DANANG area, and as a Bn Cmr of an unidentified Bn.
3. LANG has been described as stocky and about 5'11" to 5'6" Tall. He is reported to speak excellent English. LANG has reportedly worked as a mechanic.
4. There have been several instances when Marines have seen or talked to a man who could have been LANG; However through one set of circumstances or another, the suspect has not been apprehended.

- (2) Battalion Artillery Group displaces to a prearranged firing area and renders artillery support as requested.

- (5) Co B, 3d AT Battalion provides Ontos as requested.
- (6) Co B, 3d Engineer Battalion provides demolition teams as requested.

2. MISSION. 1st Battalion (-)(Rein), 4th Marines (-)(Rein) lands at H-hour on D-day with two rifle companies (-)(Rein) on HOA XUAN Island (BT 4315), and conducts search and clear operations in order to destroy/apprehend all VC/VCS, confiscate all VC supplies, destroy VC installations and defenses located thereon; prepares company patrol base positions, and occupies the Island with one rifle company (Rein) upon retraction of the Battalion (-)(Rein) on D+2 day.

- (a) Movement to the objective. Company B moves one platoon overland under cover of darkness to the southeast finger of HOA XUAN (BT 460146). The remainder of the company moves and lands by LVT at (BT 441159). Company C moves one platoon via helicopter to LZ STRIKE while the remaining elements of the Company (-) moves by LVT along National Route #1 to (BT 419123) and crosses the SONG CHO River to the objective at (BT 417133). The Command Group moves by LVT with Company B.

(b) D-day operations.

- 1 Company B at H minus 7 hours on D-day moves one platoon overland up the southeast finger of HOA XUAN conducting a search and clear operation to the north to include the Hamlet of PHU VINH. The Company (-) lands at H-hour on D-day at (BT 441159), occupies Hill 10 (BT 437157) and dispatches one platoon to clear the BINH AN, HOA XUAN (2) Hamlet area. One platoon remains on Hill 10 with two LVT's as the Battalion Reserve/mobile strike force, to be committed if necessary by the Battalion Commander. On order, the Reserve element moves to sweep the eastern portion of the HOA XUAN (1) Hamlet complex to Company Patrol base vicinity (BT 426158). Upon completion of clearing operations the company reorganizes at the patrol base area and commences initial defensive preparations for night occupancy. During the night of D-day the company occupies and defends the patrol base, and conducts security patrols around the perimeter of the patrol base.
- 2 Company C (-) moves via LVT north along National Route #1 and at H-hour on D-day crosses the SONG CHO River and establishes blocking positions at (BT 417132) and (BT 416138), the remaining platoon lands at L-Hour on D-day by helicopter in LZ STRIKE, and establishes a blocking position at (BT 410155). On order, the Company conducts search and clear operations of the Hamlet DONG THANH (1) and the western portion of HOA XUAN (1). Upon completion of the clearing operation the Company moves to join Company B at the patrol base and commences hasty night defensive positions. During the evening of D-day the Company occupies, assists in the defense of the patrol base and conducts security patrols around the perimeter of the base.

(c) Subsequent operations (D+1 and D+2).

- 1 Company B continues fortification of the patrol base, preparing for occupation of the Island on a permanent basis. During the evenings of D+1 and D+2 harbors at the patrol base and dispatches security patrols.

VC units up to Company size strength with MG, 81mm mortar and/or 60mm mortar capabilities have been reported in the tactical zone during the past 20 days.

On 14 January 1966, a National Police Source reported that the VC have laid mines at approximately (BT 440030), (BT 433039), (BT 440022), (BT 442055), (BT 441049) and (BT 450053). These mines are laid in groups of 20 to 50 mines per group. These groups of mines are laid over a wide area to take advantage of the way Marines spread out on an operation. (CIT Eval: C/3)

b. Friendly forces.

- (2) Battalion Artillery Group continues artillery support as requested.

1. TYPE OF OPERATION. The operation consisted of searching, clearing and destroying the Viet Cong, his supplies and installations, based primarily on receipt of intelligence which indicated the possession of at least one 60mm Mortar.

2. DURATION. The duration of the operation was from H-hour 150700H to R-hour 151100H 11 July 1966.

3. LOCATION. The operation was conducted on HOA XUAN Island, centered (BT 4315) in LY TIN District, QUANG TIN Province, Republic of SOUTH VIETNAM.

4. COMMAND HEADQUARTERS. 1st Battalion (-)(Rein), 4th Marines (-)(Rein), 3d Marine Division (Rein), FMF.

9. MISSION. 1st Bn (-)(Rein) landed at L-hour and H-hour on D-day, and conducted a search and destroy operation to capture the VC and his supporting arms on HOA XUAN Island (BT 4315).

10. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS

- a. See enclosure (1).

b. At H-hour on D-day two rifle companies (-)(Rein) and one platoon (Rein) landed as follows: one company landed by helicopter in landing zone MERCURY at (BT 440156); one company landed in landing zone MARS at (BT 425135); one platoon moved by LVT to landing point at (BT 440160) and moved into blocking position at (BT 437157). The two companies conducted a thorough clearing operation during which a detailed search was conducted for weapons, caches, and tunnels, within assigned zones of action along designated axes of advance to the limit of advance. Upon completion of the operation, and on order, the companies and the platoon retracted via LVT from vicinity (BT 460115), and returned to the MLR and/or permanent patrol bases.

c. Attached units as shown in paragraph six above moved with individual assault companies. Artillery Forward Observers and Forward Air Controller Teams moved with Companies A and D. One Forward Observer moved with the platoon from Company B.

d. Supporting units operated as follows:

(1) Battery G, 3/12 displaced to a firing position north of Hill 69 (BT 469069) to support the operation.

(2) MAG-12 and MAG-36. MAG-36 provided helicopter transportation to the LZ's and furnished LZ prep fires in MERCURY and MARS. MAG-12 flew air cover for the helicopter movement, conducted one preplanned bomb mission and provided on call close air support.

(3) Company A, 1st AmTrac Battalion provided two LVTP-5's and one LVT-1E to transport Company B's platoon to its blocking position. The LVT-1E was provided as an on call anti-mine support vehicle. Two LVTP-5's were used as potential support for a fast reaction by the Battalion Reserve if necessary. Eight LVTP-5's and one LVT-1E were provided to return the two companies to the Battalion's splash point upon completion of the operation.

(4) Company B, 3d Engineer Battalion provided an engineer demolition team to each company.

(5) One Popular Force Squad was assigned to each rifle company to assist in search and clearing and handling of the local populace. Two squads from KY HA were utilized.

11. EXECUTION

Operation Plan 003-66 was originated on 14 January 1966 and executed the following day in order to take advantage of the recently acquired intelligence gained as a result of the previous days platoon patrol.

MAG-36 landing pad was designated the staging area from which the two companies pre-loaded their first wave at 0600H, and staged their second wave for immediate embarkation upon return of the initial wave of helicopters. The first wave lifted off at 0645H and arrived at the LZ's at 0705H with the second wave landing 20 minutes thereafter. Company B's platoon embarked aboard LVT's at 0614H and moved along the ocean side of KY HOA Island (BT 4914) to ORANGE Beach (BT 440160). After 10 minutes of AH-1E air prep, the platoon landed at 0703H and proceeded immediately to their blocking position at Hill 10, (BT 432157) arriving at 0720H. Upon completion of their consolidation of the hill and establishment of the blocking position, they received four rounds of incoming small arms harassing fire at 0730H. After the initial receipt of fire, an individual was seen fleeing at (BT 437153) and was immediately taken under fire by a moderate amount of Marine small arms fire and 3.5 rocket rounds. One HE round and one WP round were fired at the fleeing subject but to no avail. In quick retaliatory action, a squad was dispatched to check the area, however, found nothing of any significance and no trace of the suspected sniper.

During consolidation of the landing zone (BT 412157), Company D discovered two dead Vietnamese believed to have been killed by the landing zone air prep. Both Vietnamese appeared to have been killed by HU-1E/H-34 machine gun fire. Upon completion of Company D's landing, at 0750H, the Company began to move along its designated axis of advance. As the lead elements approached (BT 416158) at 0815H two VCS were apprehended due to lack of proper identification.

Company A started its search and destroy operation along their designated axis of advance at 0725H. Upon departure from the LZ the Company's lead elements apprehended two VCS who were without proper identification. At this time a VMO-6 helicopter reported a VCS lying on the ground at (BT 427135). A fire team was dispatched to the area and apprehended an additional Vietnamese male lying on the ground with his white shirt hidden under his body. This was evidently done to preclude his discovery by the low flying aircraft. Later in the morning at 1018H, Company A apprehended two additional VCS at (BT 416158) once again due to improper identification.

As the search operation continued, Company D apprehended one VCS in the vicinity of (BT 427158) at 1030H who possessed no identification card but did have on his person an old Company B POW tag. He was found hiding beneath a pile of wood. At 1110H, a steel spike punji trap with Vietnamese warning signs was located at (BT 431159) by Company D's sweeping elements. Moving ahead, no further contact was made until 1130H when one small arms round was heard to the rear of the Company D force and adjacent to the Command Group, vicinity (BT 435163). A squad maneuvered into and searched the area from which the round was thought to originate, but was unable to locate the insurgent. At 1200H, Company D linked up with the Company B platoon and assumed operational control of that unit. Moving down the southeast finger of the island at 1235H two booby trapped grenades and one booby trapped mortar round were discovered by the Company at (BT 460146). The engineer team detonated the traps in place rather than risk the danger inherent in disarming them. The grenades were placed adjacent to a foot trap covered with a bamboo mat into which the trip wire was woven. Thus when the mat was stepped on, the pressure of the foot would collapse the mat thus triggering the trip wire and the booby trap. The 60mm mortar trap was placed in front of a pathway through a cut in a barbed wire fence and was located by a Marine moving through the gate. Company A met no further activity during the remainder of the operation.

At 1400H both Companies and Company B's platoon embarked aboard LVT's at (BT 460147) and returned to their patrol bases/MLR positions arriving at the splash point (BT 517117) at 1430H.

12. RESULTS

Friendly Casualties-None.

- 2 VN killed by landing zone preparatory fires.
- 8 VCS apprehended
- 8 VCS turned over to the Chu Lai Collection Point.

13. ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS. No major administrative problems were encountered.

14. SPECIAL TECHNIQUES. None.

15. COMMANDERS ANALYSIS/LESSONS LEARNED

a. Once again this operation indicated that large scale (company size or larger) operations result in less insurgent contact than smaller units (squad and platoon size). It is a known fact that the VC will not engage the Marines with more than harrassing fire unless they feel sure they have the element of surprise on their side and have a force large enough to insure victory.

The movement of a large force requires transportation elements which can be seen or heard far enough in advance to permit the Viet Cong to mingle with the local population, go underground or exfiltrate prior to the initial landing. The solution to this particular problem lies in occupation of this Island on a continuing basis. In the interim period small unit operations must be continued.

b. Tagging of VC/VCS upon capture/apprehension can be expedited by having the tags prestamped through the use of address-o-graph plates. Upon capture/apprehension of the VC/VCS information can be furnished rapidly by merely filling in the blank spaces.

c. Current policy concerning communications procedures states that coordinates of all enemy contacts are to be sent in the clear to preclude ~~compromise of the radio system.~~ The ~~coordinates of apprehension sites of~~ VCS, even though initially considered as enemy, should be sent encoded, to preclude the possible plotting of the units axis of advance by the enemy.

d. During the operation, the assault troops were preloaded at the MAG-36 helicopter pad. Transportation to the pad was accomplished by truck convoy. This method of embarking proved highly successful. Accordingly it required less fuel which in turn permitted the initial wave to accommodate nine combat loaded Marines. The end result placed six to twelve additional Marines into the landing zone in the first wave. This method of preloading insures timely meeting on L-hours, and in operations in close proximity to the enclave, permits maximum troop lift capability with minimum fuel load.

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INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY

(Operation QUICK STEP, Operation Order 003-66)

1. Summary of Enemy Activitya. Ground Activity

- (1) The following is a chronological listing of enemy activity in subject area since January 1, 1966.
- (a) INTSUM NR 1, Jan 66 - Booby traps vic (BT 460143). One LMG fired at "B" Company patrol vic (BT 461148) at 011503H.
 - (b) INTSUM NR 2, Jan 66 - 60mm Mortar Rounds found booby trapped vic (BT 438153) at 021032H. Two booby traps found vic (BT 437153) at 021111H.
 - (c) INTSUM NR 4, Jan 66 - Punji traps and booby traps vic (BT 468140) at 041222H.
 - (d) INTSUM NR 6, Jan 66 - One VC KIA. Platoon Leader reported weapons of greater than .30 Cal being fired vic (BT 431143) at 070255H.
 - (e) INTSUM NR 10, Jan 66 - Total of seven yellow flares vic (BT 466153) at 102030H. No friendly units in area.
 - (f) INTSUM NR 12, Jan 66 - Ly Tin Agent reported (C/3) dtd 10Jan66: One VC Militia Squad located at (BT 447144) and thirty VC Militia at KY XUAN Village, located at (BT 457146). They had secret caves at (BT 477125) and were armed with one BAR and 27 assorted rifles. Sixty VC Militia located at (BT 430144), (BT 417138) and (BT 413157), Commanded by QUYEN and VO VIEN, armed with two BARs, 14 SMCs and an unknown number of rifles. They forced people to make candy and cake to give to their liberation troops before "TET".
 - (g) INTSUM NR 13, Jan 66 - Company "A" received sporadic S/A fire and three 80mm Mortar rounds at 130833H while moving NW in LVT's up the TRUONG GIANG River vic (BT 443158). The enemy fire was thought to have come from vic (BT 437157). Fire was not returned due to the inability of the platoon to observe the enemy. After the initial incoming fire, the enemy ceased fire and no further contact was made.
 - (h) Msg dtd 14 Jan 66 - Four captives were apprehended vic (BT 453148) at 140945H by "B" Company Patrol. The captives, two women and two children, were without proper identification. All were taken to "B" Company CP for interrogation. The women were questioned about VC movement and/or activity, however, they would say nothing. All four were sent to Chu Lai Collection Point as VCS for further interrogation. AO report of new trenches vic (BT 43115) at 141120H. "B" Company reports. 1

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2. Discussion. Mining activity in the subject area had been totally ineffective prior to the 1 Jan 66 incident. Reports of MF units moving on the island have been sporadic during the last three weeks. Crew served weapons, i.e., 60mm Mortars and Machine Guns, encountered during the past two weeks indicate a vast improvement in technique which could not have been accomplished by local guerrillas without direct training and/or assistance from Main Force/Regional Force Units.
3. Conclusions. The VC have been making a concerted effort to deny USMC access to the subject area. The increase of crew served weapons and improved mining capabilities indicates the presence of highly trained troops in the subject area. Estimates of one Company of Main Force VC armed with one 60mm Mortar, one LMG plus assorted SMG and S/A may be considered well within the capabilities of the VC in that area.
4. Intelligence Recapitulation. A total of four S/A rounds were fired at USMC troops in a blocking position (BT 437158) from vic (BT 437152) at 150730H. An additional round was fired at 151130H from vicinity of (BT 435163). No casualties resulted and no further enemy sightings were noted.
Three booby traps were found vic (BT 459147). Two consisted of booby trapped grenades and one was a 60mm Mortar round with the pressure nose exposed above the ground. Pressure type detonation was required to detonate all traps.
Eight VCS apprehended during sweep. One male was sent to Quang Ngai for having active connection with VC. The remaining VCS were released by Chu Lai Collection Point and sent to Ly Tin District Headquarters for final disposition.
