

SECTION II

A. Summary

During this reporting period, the battalion was located at Camp Schwab, Okinawa. The battalion continued to receive replacements, and most of the critical LOS billets were filled. An inspection of the battalion's administrative activities was conducted on 9 January 1967. On 16 January BLT 1/4 was reactivated with all of the supporting units brought out of RVN returning to the command of 1st Battalion, 4th Marines. On 21 January all non-deployable personnel were transferred to Headquarters Company, RLT 26. Also during this period, personnel changes occurred in some key billets as indicated under the significant events paragraph. On 26 January 1967, Company "C" (Rein) and Company "D" (Rein) embarked aboard the U.S.S. VANCOUVER in preparation for joining the SLF.

B. Significant Events

On 9 January 1967 an administrative inspection was conducted by the Ninth Marine Amphibious Brigade.

On 11 January 1967 Captain B. F. ENNIS was assigned as Battalion Adjutant.

On 16 January 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 was reactivated.

On 21 January 1967 Captain K. R. RANDY was assigned as Commanding Officer, Company "B".

On 21 January 1967 all non-deployable personnel were transferred to Headquarters Company, RLT 26.

On 24 January 1967 Captain B. G. SIMS was assigned as Commanding Officer, Mortar Battery 3/12.

On 26 January 1967 Company "C" (Rein) and Company "D" (Rein) embarked aboard the U.S.S. VANCOUVER.

C. Problem Areas/New Developments

1. The battalion and all supporting elements of the Battalion Landing Team received replacements to fill most critical billets and were brought up to manning level in most LOS's. The most significant shortage at this time is in the LOS 6707, Forward Air Controller. The battalion is authorized two (2) officers with the 6707 LOS. Presently the battalion has one Captain 7302 who is filling the billet of Air Liaison Officer 6708.

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Vacancies exist in the two Forward Air Comptroller billets. The results of the administrative inspection conducted by the Ninth Marine Amphibious Brigade revealed major discrepancies in the areas of Postal and Registered Publications and S&C. All other areas were considered satisfactory with minor discrepancies. All discrepancies were corrected, and the above mentioned areas were reinspected and found to be satisfactory during this reporting period.

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INTELLIGENCE

SECTION III

A. General. (period covered: 1 January 1967 to 26 January 1967)
The battalion was engaged in a replenishment and refurbishment cycle at Camp Schwab, Okinawa during the reporting period.

The Intelligence Assistant was transferred to S-2, RIT-26 on 3 January. One Intelligence Assistant and two Scouts were transferred to the section from Headquarters Company, RIT-26 on 6 January.

The section satisfactorily passed an inspection administered by G-2, 9th MAB on 11 January.

Replenishment of office supplies was accomplished during this period. The Battalion Scouts were attached to the separate rifle companies for scheduled training throughout the period.

One of the section scouts and the S-2 Officer graduated from Vietnamese Language School at Camp Sukiran, Okinawa on 20 January. On 21 January, the S-2 Officer was transferred to RIT-26.

Embarkation preparation was conducted 18-25 January.

OPERATIONS/TRAININGSECTION IV

A. Mission. During the period 1-26 January 1967, the battalion continued training, replenishment of supplies and equipment in preparation for assuming duties as the Special Landing Force. Missions are as follows

1-26 January	Training, replenishment/refurbishment at Camp SCHWAB, OKINAWA. Prepare for embarkation.
9 January	ELT 1/4 Activated for planning (Ref: RLT-26 Msg 060310Z)
16 January	ELT 1/4 Activated for operations (Ref: RLT-26 Msg 060319Z)

B. The battalion conducted the following training utilizing company, platoon and squad size units.

Counter-Guerrilla Warfare
Jungle Lane & Trap Line Orientation
Demolition & Landmine Orientation
Raid Training
Helicopter Training

During the reporting period, 106RR mounted on LVTP-5's, were successfully fired. The battalion was able to Fam Fire all weapons except the 60mm Mortar, which could not be fired due to faulty mortar ammunition.

GED & PRT tests were administered to the battalion and refresher schools were attended by communications personnel.

An inspection team from 9th MAB conducted an inspection on 11 January 1967. The results were satisfactory with complimentary observations on training and off duty education.

Company "A" conducted raid training utilizing USS MEDREGAL. The Battalion participated in change of command ceremony for the Commanding General, 9th MAB on 4 January. Battalion Competitive firing was conducted for the M-14, Cal. 45 automatic pistol, and crew served weapons.

On 9 January 1967, BLT 1/4 was activated for planning. On 16 January 1967 the BLT was activated for operations. (Ref: RLT-26 Msg 060310Z)

While the BLT attachments were hosted by their like units, each attended Counter-Guerrilla Warfare, Demolition & Landmine school, and the

Jungle Lane and Trap Line courses. In addition, helicopter training was conducted and FAM firing of their respective weapons was accomplished.

On 20 January, Combat Cargo Officers began arriving from SLF shipping and began preparation of loading plans. Loading plans for all ships were finished by 23 January. On 23 January SLF Staff representatives arrived for a planning conference. The BLT began staging equipment on 24 January. Companies "C" and "D" boarded the ship on 26 January, with the remainder of the BLT loading on 27 January. BLT 1/4 chopped to CTG 79.5 at 27 0800I. (Ref: CTG 79.5 Msg 280310Z)

C. Training Problems Encountered. Untimely return of weapons from FSR resulted in cancellation of [redacted] exercises for 82mm Mortars, 50 cal. machine guns, M-60 machine guns and the 106RR. Although 81mm Mortars, 106RR and 50 cal. machine guns were rescheduled when weapons were made available, training time was severely reduced. The BLT received 43 M-60 machine guns during the last three days prior to embarkation, consequently only test firing could be accomplished.

Administrative requirements reduced the amount of training time available within the training period.

Section VLOGISTICS

1. Logistical Situation. During the period 1 - 26 January 1967 the battalion was based at Camp Schwab, OKINAWA and completed its refurbishment and training and prepared to embark aboard shipping as the Special Landing Force.

2. Supply

a. Class I - Alpha rations were served at all times while units were based at Camp Schwab. Over 25,000 MCI were issued to units training at the Northern Training Area.

b. Class II - Class II, Type I and Class II, Type II items were requisitioned through the appropriate issuing activity.

c. Class III - POL was provided by the Camp Schwab distribution point.

d. Class IV - N/A.

e. Class V - An allowance as set forth in Brigade Order 8011.1 was the guideline set forth for training. In addition, 400 rounds of 60mm practice mortar ammunition was received for training purposes, however, these proved to be of no use inasmuch as the tail assemblies were rusted and the increments were wet.

3. Evacuation and Hospitalization. See Section IX

4. Transportation. The battalion was supported by two 3/4 ton commercial trucks, three 3 ton commercial trucks and one 25 ton semi-trailer daily. This was in addition to an average of seven M422A1's which were used as safety vehicles while companies were on firing exercises.

5. Miscellaneous. Towards the end of the reporting period it was necessary to walk-through FSR all documents for combat essential items considered critical. The main reason for this was two-fold:

- a. The non-availability of some spare and repair parts on OKINAWA.
- b. Ordnance items returned for additional repair.

COMMUNICATION-ELECTRONICSSECTION VI

1. General. During the period 1 through 26 January 1967, the battalion Communications Platoon conducted refresher MOS training and participated in GMS training conducted by H&S Company. MOS training was conducted for personnel in their assigned MOS and also in related communication fields. Cross training was designed to broaden individual knowledge in communications and to give personnel sufficient knowledge to perform basic duties in related fields.

a. The Communications Platoon embarked with the battalion for SLF operations on 27 January 1967.

b. The bulk of the platoon (1 officer and 58 enlisted) embarked on board the USS IWO JIMA, while seven personnel embarked with communication vehicles on board the USS VANCOUVER.

2. The Communications Platoon underwent an operational readiness inspection by 9th MAB on 12 January 1967. Results of the inspection were satisfactory.

3. Equipment. Extensive efforts were directed toward refurbishing communication-electronics equipment. Upon return from 3rd FSR, equipment was painted, remarked, and generally reconditioned. With the exception of one AN/MRC-83 radio set, T/E shortages were replaced either by procurement of new equipment or by temporary loan of equipment from 9th MAB units. Major items on temporary loan include:

1	AN/MRC-87
1	AN/PRC-41

Additionally, certain critical component items, i. e. antennas and antenna bases; and BB-451 wet cell batteries were provided from 9th MAB units.

a. In preparation for SLF operations, steps were taken to provide the capability to operate AN/PRC-25 and AN/PRC-47 radios from within the LVTC during amphibious operations. Special antenna lead-ins were fabricated to permit utilizing organic external antennas on the LVTC to operate AN/PRC-25 radios. A transmission line was also fabricated to allow operation of one AN/PRC-47 from within the tractor.

b. Tests were conducted with AN/MRC-109 and KY-8 Secure Speech Equipment. Successful operation was achieved and it is anticipated that this equipment will be employed during SLF operations.

7. The program of Stannous Fluoride treatments for all BLT 1/4 personnel begun in late December by the Dental Department of Camp Schwab was continued into the month of January. Approximately all personnel of BLT 1/4 have now been treated. There were 46 routine dental consults.

8. During this period, the Medical Department held sick call in conjunction with the medical staff of the Camp Schwab Dispensary. The Battalion Aid Station was utilized for purposes of administration, supply and screening sick call.

9. Chest x-rays of all personnel taken at the end of the previous month failed to reveal any significant acute or chronic pulmonary disease.

10. On 15 January 1967, the Battalion Landing Team was joined by a Reinforced Clearing Platoon of Delta Company, 3rd Medical Battalion which consisted of three Medical Officers, 24 Hospital Corpsmen, four Marine drivers and one Marine mechanic. The medical personnel of this unit were integrated into sick call for the duration of the stay in Okinawa.

11. Prior to embarkation, medical and dental personnel were divided between the USS IWO JIMA (LPH-2) and the USS VANCOUVER (LPD-2) as follows:

a. The Battalion Surgeon, one Chief Hospital Corpsman and 12 corpsmen were to be billeted aboard the USS IWO JIMA (LPH-2).

b. The Assistant Battalion Surgeon, one Chief Hospital Corpsman and four corpsmen were placed aboard the USS VANCOUVER (LPD-2).

c. The BLT Dental Officer and his enlisted assistant were to be placed aboard the USS IWO JIMA (LPH-2).

d. Personnel assigned to the LPD boarded their ship on 26 January 1967. The boarding of personnel assigned to the LPH was not accomplished during the period encompassed by this report.

12. The Medical Department debarked from Okinawa with essentially its full complement of IOL equipment. In order to obtain quantities of routine sick call items which were unobtainable in Okinawa, an advance party of two senior Hospital Corpsmen was sent on TAD orders to Subic Bay, Phillipine Islands. This party was also responsible for obtaining 246 pairs of glasses for BLT 1/4 personnel.



SECTION II

A. SUMMARY

During the period covered by this report, 27-31 January 1967, Battalion Landing Team 1/4 was aboard the USS IWO JIMA, USS VANCOUVER, and USS POINT DEFILANCE. On 27 January, Company "A", Company "B", and H&S Company with their supporting elements, embarked aboard the USS IWO JIMA to prepare for duty with the Special Landing Force. On 28 January all three ships with Battalion Landing Team 1/4 aboard, departed Okinawa for Keelung, Taiwan and arrived in that port on the morning of 29 January 1967. The USS VANCOUVER, with Company "C", Company "D" and the 107 Mortar Battery aboard was unable to obtain a suitable berthing space and departed for Subic Bay in the Phillipine Islands during the afternoon of the same day. The USS POINT DEFILANCE with "G" Battery 3/12 aboard, sailed for Subic Bay on 31 January, and the IWO JIMA with the remainder of the Battalion Landing Team aboard, remained in Keelung until the following day. All Marines took advantage of the liberal liberty policy while in Keelung, although, the planning and preparation for Exercise Mud Puppy was also in progress.

B. Significant Events

On 27 January 1967, Company "A", Company "B" and H&S Company with supporting elements embarked aboard the USS IWO JIMA.

On 28 January 1967, the USS IWO JIMA, USS VANCOUVER AND THE USS POINT DEFILANCE sailed for Keelung, Taiwan.

On 29 January, Battalion Landing Team 1/4 arrived at Keelung, Taiwan aboard the three ships indicated above.

On 29 January 1967, the USS VANCOUVER departed for Subic Bay in the Phillipine Islands.

On 31 January, the USS POINT DEFILANCE sailed for Subic Bay.

C. Problem Areas/New Developments

1. The Battalion received no replacements during the reporting period since the input of personnel had been terminated when embarkation commenced. 7. Every effort was made during this period to integrate BLT 1/4 medical personnel with the ship's medical department. The IWO JIMA's sick bay facilities were fully utilized for BLT 1/4 sick call.

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

- (12) All naval gunfire missions require positive clearance and approval by SACC/FSGC.

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

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

d. Supplies and Equipment Available

(1) Control and Distribution

(a) Control

1. The BLT will establish a TAC LOG aboard the LPH and the LSD with sub units on other shipping.

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2. Custody, control and distribution is a BLT responsibility. Request for transportation will be submitted through the S-4.

3. Every effort will be made to ensure supplies and equipment are safe guarded against damage, capture, and pilferage from both friendly and enemy forces.

4. Report all classes of supplies expended or consumed by type and quantity to the BLT S-4 upon completion of operations.

(b) Distribution

1. Levels of supply in the objective area will not exceed one DOS for any class unless approved by the BLT Commander, or the S-4.

2. Landing of supplies and serials will be reported to BLT S-4 when completed.

3. Captured material (See Intelligence Annex).

4. Salvage

a. All material requiring salvage will be reported to the BLT S-4 and returned to the amphibious shipping by the most expedient means.

b. No material of potential use to the enemy will be left unguarded or unattended.

2. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION

a. See Annex B (Medical) to Administrative Order 001-67.

b. All class V will be removed from casualties prior to being evacuated.

c. Upon arrival of the casualty to the flight deck aboard the LPH, designated personnel from collection and clearing platoon will search the Halo and casualty for any class V prior to admitting him to the operating room.

3. TRANSPORTATION

a. Land. The landing of wheeled and tracked vehicles will be restricted to those required to accomplish the mission. Vehicles will be designated and debarked on order.

b. Sea. 20 River boats and 20 outboard engines will be embarked aboard SLP shipping. SP will coordinate and dispatch these boats to using units on order. Strict accountability will be observed by SP Commander for the condition of boats checked out and returned. Boats and motors will be marked with masking tape for identification. SP Commander will ensure that motors are flushed with fresh water upon completion of each days use.

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c. Air. As directed and approved by CTG 79.5.

4. SERVICE

a. Functions

(1) Construction as required.

(2) Maintenance to be provided by the service attachments of the BLT. Maximum use will be made of contact teams and end items replacements.

5. PERSONNEL. See Annex D (Personnel) to Administrative Order 001-67.

6. MISCELLANEOUS

a. Security of all supplies, equipment and personal effects while aboard is the responsibility of the embarked unit commanders.

c. When operating ashore, all expended dry cell batteries will be returned to the LPH for disposal.

d. Deadlined equipment will be reported immediately to this Headquarters (Attn: S-4).

e. Prior to re-embarkation unit commanders will ensure Class V items recovered are free of rust, dirt, and moisture.

f. Supply economy will be enforced at all times.

g. On D-Day minus one, Recon units draw prescribed loads.

h. On D-Day minus one, aggressor forces and tactical units draw prescribed loads.

i. Safety

(1) Hand grenades will not be removed from their containers prior to L-2 or H-2 whichever is applicable.

(2) Magazines will not be loaded prior to L-2 or H-2 whichever is applicable.

(3) Grenades will not be suspended from cartridge belts, belt suspenders, pockets of utility coats or any other area that may cause the pins to disengage from the grenade at any time.

b. This plan calls for landing by a combination of helicopterborne and waterborne amphibious assaults.

2. MISSION:

a. Medical support

(1) Land on order with 1st Battalion, 4th Marines and establish a Battalion Aid Station. Provide replacement personnel as needed.

(2) Collecting and Clearing platoon will land on order and establish a collecting and clearing station in a designated area.

(3) If seaward evacuation of casualties for second echelon care is more desirable, the attached medical units will be prepared to integrate with and complement the medical department of the casualty receiving ship.

b. All Medical Units

- (1) Provide markers on evacuation routes to designate location of unit.
- (2) Be prepared to furnish emergency treatment to civilian populous.
- (3) Test local water for potability.

3. SANITATION AND PREVENTIVE MEDICINE

a. Reference (a) and Appendix 1.

b. Troop Commanders at all echelons will require maximum sanitary discipline under combat conditions.

c. Information on disease which may be expected in the objective area. See Annex B (Intelligence) to Operation Order 1-67 and Appendix 1.

d. Food and water will be consumed from authorized sources only.

e. Bathing will be permitted only where service shower units have been installed.

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f. All troops will have routine immunizations brought up to date, and will be immunized for smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, typhus, cholera, plague, and gamma globulin prior to embarkation.

4. EVACUATION

a. Reference (e).

b. Movement

(1) After departing port of embarkation, casualties occurring aboard ship, which require care beyond the capability of that ship, will be transferred to designated casualty receiving ships at the earliest practicable time.

(2) The health of all troops embarked is the responsibility of the Amphibious Task Force Commander.

(3) Troop medical personnel will render all practicable assistance to ship's medical personnel as regards medical service to embarked troops.

c. Assault Plan

(1) Waterborne Force

(a) Ship-to-shore

1. Living casualties in the landing craft will remain in the craft for return to the casualty receiving ships as directed.

2. All dead occurring in the landing craft will be placed on the beach above the high water mark for collection by Graves Registration personnel of the Shore Party.

3. All dead occurring in amphibious vehicles will remain in the vehicle for return to the beach for collection by the Graves Registration personnel of the Shore Party.

(2) Helicopterborne Forces

(a) Ship-to-shore

1. Living casualties occurring in the helicopterborne force will be evacuated by returning helicopter to the LPH.

2. All dead occurring will be returned to the LPH by returning helicopter in the helicopterborne force. Alternatively, they may be left in the landing zone until linkup with ground forces. The choice will be determined by the extensiveness of the commitment of returning helicopters to carry living casualties.

d. Ashore

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- (1) Initially, casualties will be evacuated via landing craft or helicopter to casualty receiving ships.
- (2) Report location of medical installations when established.
- (3) In no case will evacuation of casualties be delayed solely for lack of complete medical records or other administrative requirements.
- (4) Priority will be given to rapid casualty collection and evacuation to Amphibious Task Force medical facilities.
- (5) Normally, casualties will be evacuated to ships of the Amphibious Task Force as soon as possible, either directly by helicopter or via shore party evacuation facilities.
- (6) Evacuation of all casualties will be direct to the LPH by helicopter.
- (7) The LPH will be designated the casualty receiving ship.
- (8) The LPH and LPD, when ready to receive casualties will fly an oversize MIKE Flag. At night a blinking green light will be used for identification.

e. Air Evacuation

- (1) Helicopter evacuation.
 - (a) All casualties occurring in the helicopterborne force will be evacuated via helicopter to LPH.
 - (b) Upon completion of the landing of helicopterborne troops, ambulance helicopter will be available for evacuation.
 - (c) Requests for helicopter for shore-to-ship evacuation will be made to the CECO.
 - (d) In requesting ambulance, helicopter, units will use the following classification system for indicating priority of casualties.

Emergency: Those requiring immediate evacuation for emergency treatment.

Priority: Those requiring emergency treatment but whose condition will allow a one to three hour delay.

Routine: Those requiring helicopter evacuation because of the nature of their injury. No emergency treatment necessary but smooth evacuation desirable.

- (2) On order, detainee casualties will be evacuated.
- (3) Indigenous civilian casualties will be evacuated from the objective area at the discretion of the Amphibious Task Force Commander.

5. HOSPITALIZATION

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a. Ship Medical Facilities

(1) The ships of the Amphibious Task Force will provide hospitalization. The LPH has been designated to receive the more serious casualties throughout the operation.

(2) At the discretion of the Amphibious Task Force Surgeon, overflow facilities for minor casualties will be established aboard the LPH.

b. Detainees

(1) Detainees will receive prophylactic injections of smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, typhus, cholera, and plague.

(2) Detainees will be hospitalized as directed by the Landing Force Commander.

(3) Maximum use of captured medical personnel and supplies will be made in the treatment of detainees.

c. RAMP's. (Recovered Allied Military Personnel)

(1) All RAMP's will receive prophylactic injections of smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, typhus, cholera, and plague.

(2) RAMP's will be isolated from troops, civilians and detainees in a detention area on the beach.

(3) RAMP's requiring hospitalization and casualties requiring emergency treatment will be evacuated in the normal chain seaward.

6. MEDICAL SUPPLY

a. Landing Force

(1) Reference (f).

(2) Requests for emergency supplies by air drop will be made as indicated.

(3) Captured medical supplies will be salvaged for the care of detainees.

(4) The LPH will be stocked with and act as distribution center for whole blood.

7. MEDICAL ADMINISTRATION

a. Location of Landing Force Surgeon

(1) Afloat: LPH

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(2) Ashore: To be announced.

(a) Manual of Preventive Medicine (NAVMED P-5010)

Time Zone H

1. MISSION. To promote and maintain the health and well-being of all troops in the field prior to, during, and after combat operations.

2. SITUATION

a. Due to conditions and poverty, the country containing the objective area has a distinct impediment toward progress in health and sanitation measures.

b. As a result of the problem, many diseases are widespread and sanitary measures are almost nil. Vectors of disease are widespread and due to climatic conditions, epidemics of many diseases are almost continuous.

3. DISEASE INFORMATION

a. Diseases of Special Military Importance

- (1) Malaria: Greatest mortality cause - widespread.
- (2) Dysenteries: Next in importance - widespread.
- (3) Plague: Occasional epidemics - widespread.
- (4) Cholera: Occasional epidemics - widespread.
- (5) Venereal Diseases: Prevalent in large communities.
- (6) Typhus Fever: Occurs in hill country.
- (7) Dengue Fever: Yearly epidemics - southern and central portions.

b. Diseases of potential military importance

- (1) Malaria: Sporadic outbreaks but preventive medication will keep incidence low.
- (2) Plague: Sporadic outbreaks but control measures may keep incidence low.

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CONFIDENTIALc. Miscellaneous Diseases

- (1) Typhoid Fever: Common among civilians due to contaminated water supply.
- (2) Smallpox: Controlled by vaccines.

4. INSECTS AND DANGEROUS ANIMALSa. Vectors of disease.

- (1) Mosquitoes: Anopheles most prevalent.
- (2) Flies: Many varieties the year around.
- (3) Lice: Very common.
- (4) Fleas: Tropical fleas most prevalent.
- (5) Rodents: Many varieties of rats and rat-like animals transmit typhus fever.

- b. Troop commanders at all echelons will require maximum sanitary discipline possible under combat conditions.
- c. All local water, regardless of source will be considered unsafe and will be treated properly prior to use.
- d. Food will be consumed from authorized military sources only.
- e. Bathing will be permitted only where service shower units have been installed.

• MEDICAL UNITS

- a. Train all personnel in preventive medicine measures required in the recognition of snakes, dangerous animals, etc., and the treatment of all known and expected diseases in the area.
- b. Medical personnel will ensure that troop personnel are indoctrinated in the wearing of helmet nets and the use of other types of insect repellant nets.
- c. All medical units will indoctrinate troop personnel in the hazards of hot, humid and rainy climates and the methods to combat these hazards.
- d. All units carry impregnated salt tablets.
- e. All troops will have routine immunizations brought up to date, and will be immunized for smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, cholera, typhus, plague, and gammaglobulin before embarkation.
