OPERATIONS / TRAININGSECTION IV

A. MISSION. During this reporting period the 1st Battalion 4th Marines continued its assignment as the Special Landing Force, OPCON to CTG 79.5. Missions were assigned as follows:

- 1 - 3 March Continue Operation DECKHOUSE-VI - phase II.
- 3 March Conduct tactical amphibious withdrawal. Embark onboard ARG Shipping.

SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS/ACTIVITIES

B. On 1 March 1967 Companies A and B continued Search and Destroy Operations advancing south to phase line Bravo. Company D continued search and destroy operations along the northern boundary to prevent infiltration into the areas behind Company A and B. Company C continued its assigned mission of maintaining the perimeter around the Beach area. Battery G and 107 Battery continued to support the Battalion from Blue Beach.

At 011015H at BS 795484 a platoon from Company D received 6 rounds sniper fire from BS 796485. The platoon overran the position and captured 1 VCS.

Company B reported at 011100H receiving 10 rounds from a village located at BS 817445. Company B returned fire, then searched the village discovering numerous installations and supplies. Means were not available for the evacuation of the supplies; therefore, all supplies and installations were destroyed.

Sniper fire was received by Company D at 011135H near BS 795472. The unit assaulted by fire and maneuver resulting in 1 VC/KIA (conf) 2 VC/KIA (prob). One rifle was captured.

Recon platoon at 011145H observed a Viet Cong with rifle in a cane field located at BS 797493. The attached Sniper Team took the VC under fire, 1 VC/KIA. Company A reported locating and destroying five 250 pound bombs (duds).

At 020150H Company B received 1 incoming mortar round at an ambush site. Company B secured a landing zone and Med-Evacuated 1 friendly KIA and 5 friendly WIA.

Companies A and B continued the attack southward at 020815H.

Company D at 020930H located at BS 795491 found 180 cubic feet of VC supplies. No means were available for transporting supplies to secure area. The supplies were destroyed.

At 021230H a Company D unit acting as a blocking force located at BS 793493 encountered enemy with automatic weapons causing 3 VC/KIA (conf)

At 021310H a Company C patrol conducting Search and Destroy operations at BS 803473 found and destroyed large amounts of supplies buried in hut. Documents were discovered and turned over to S-2.

A platoon from Company D at 021505H located at BS 791487 received 5 incoming sniper rounds. Company D unit assaulted positions and confirmed 1 VC/KIA.

At 021800H a Frag Order was received from CTG 79.5 indicating termination of DECKHOUSE VI - Phase II on the following day.

At 030310H Company D ambush located at BS 794443 took approximately 12 VC under fire resulting in 5 VC/KIA (conf).

Back loading began at 030800H. All units had completed back loading by 031230H with the exception of Company B.

Company B began back loading at 031600H and was completed at 031630H.

At 031800H Operation DECKHOUSE VI - Phase II was concluded.

C. TRAINING

No training was conducted during this period.

SECTION VLOGISTICS

1. LOGISTIC STIPULATION. During the period 1-3 March 1967 the final stages of DECKHOUSE VI was completed. Backloading aboard assigned shipping was completed at 1630 on 3 March and the Operation was formally completed at 1800 on 3 March 1967.

2. SUPPLY. 130 tons of resupply were delivered by helicopter and landing craft during the reporting period.

a. Class I. 15,444 meals, combat individual and 2,210 gallons of water were distributed during the period of operations. The rations were supplemented by at least one hot meal of "Alpha" rations daily to all units deployed in the field.

b. Class II. Class II supplies were issued as appropriate. This mainly consisted of insect repellent, batteries and communication wire.

c. Class III. Class III supplies were issued as appropriate.

d. Class IV. Class IV supplies were issued as appropriate.



PERSONNEL/ADMINISTRATION**UNCLASSIFIED**SECTION IIA. Summary.

On 4 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 sailed for Subic Bay in the Republic of the Philippines. It arrived in Subic Bay on 6 March 1967, disembarked, and moved to the SLF Base Camp located at Cubi Point. On 15 March 1967 the Battalion Landing Team again embarked aboard the Amphibious Ready Group Ships which were then the USS PRINCETON, USS OGDEN, and the USS MONTICELLO, and sailed on 16 March 1967 for the Republic of Vietnam to conduct Operation BEACON HILL I. On 20 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 conducted an amphibious landing in Gio Linh District, Quang Tri Province, Republic of Vietnam, commencing Operation BEACON HILL I. On 26 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 came under the operational control of the 3rd Marine Regiment. On 28 March 1967 Lieutenant Colonel Jack WESTERMAN was transferred to the 3rd Marine Regiment, and Lieutenant Colonel T. J. WILLIS became the Battalion Landing Team Commanding Officer. At 0200, 1 April 1967, this command returned to the command of the 3rd Marine Division.

B. Significant Events.

On 6 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 arrived at Subic Bay, disembarked, and moved to the SLF Base Camp located at Cubi Point.

On 15 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 embarked aboard the USS PRINCETON, USS OGDEN, and the USS MONTICELLO.

On 16 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 sailed for the Republic of Vietnam.

On 19 March 1967 the Amphibious Ready Group Ships with Battalion Landing Team 1/4 aboard arrived off the coast of the Republic of Vietnam.

On 20 March 1967 Battalion Landing Team 1/4 landed at Gio Linh District, Quang Tri Province, Republic of Vietnam, commencing Operation BEACON HILL I.

On 26 March 1967 the 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division (Rein) FMP assumed operational control of Battalion Landing Team 1/4.

On 28 March 1967 Lieutenant Colonel Jack WESTERMAN was transferred to the 3rd Marine Regiment, and Lieutenant Colonel Theodore J. WILLIS became the Battalion Landing Team Commanding Officer.

At 0200, 1 April 1967, the command of Battalion Landing Team 1/4 was passed to the 3rd Marine Division.

1. The shortage in enlisted MOS 0141 continues with five (5) needed to bring the Battalion Landing Team up to manning level.

2. Upon the commencement of Operation REACON HILL I, the Battalion Landing Team S-1 established a forward administration section in the Battalion Landing Team CP, and a rear administration section remained aboard the USS PRINCETON. The casualty reporting center, consisting of the Battalion Landing Team S-1 and the chief clerk from each company, was established aboard the USS PRINCETON. However, weather prevented casualties from being evacuated directly to the USS PRINCETON as planned, and the casualty reporting center was moved to Dong Ha for the remainder of the operation.

F. Morale, Postal Affairs, Liberty, R&R, PX.

The morale was excellent throughout the reporting period. The maximum liberty possible was enjoyed by all hands during the Battalion Landing Team's stay at the SLF Base Camp in the Philippines. The PX's at the Naval Station, Subic Bay, were available to all hands, as well as the facilities aboard the ships. Postal services continue to be satisfactory, although the frequent changes in location resulted in the sporadic delivery of mail.

G. Chaplain's Activities.

Upon the Battalion Landing Team's arrival at Subic Bay, immediate liaison was effected with the Base Protestant Chaplain to arrange for him to conduct Sunday Services. One of the Quonset Huts at the SLF Base Camp was used for Divine Services and also for an office for counseling and the preparation of the necessary correspondence. Due to the Battalion Landing Team being in a liberty port, there was a decided decrease in the number of services and number of personnel seeking counseling. This situation changed with the Battalion Landing Team's arrival at Gio Linh in the Republic of Vietnam.

A. General. Between 4 and 15 March, the battalion was involved in a phase of replenishment and transfer of supplies and equipment. The Battalion Headquarters was located at the SLF Camp, NAS Cubic Point, P. I.

On 16 March, the Battalion embarked aboard the USS PRINCETON (LPH-5).

From 17 to 19 March, the Intelligence Section was engaged in writing the Intelligence Annex to Operation Order 3-67 (Beacon Hill 1). The Battalion commenced Operation Beacon Hill I on 20 March and terminated the operation on 1 April.

C. After-action Report to Operation "Beacon Hill I".

1. Enemy Situation and Capabilities - Prior to Operation Beacon Hill I.

a. Enemy Situation. Enemy ground units in the objective area were identified as the 5th and 6th Battalions, 812th Regiment; 7th and 8th Battalions, 90th Regiment; and the 1st Battalion, 31st Regiment (All NVA). In addition there was also a guerrilla force of approximately 2000 men operating independently throughout Quang Tri Province.

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b. Enemy Capabilities. It was anticipated that the enemy could attack isolated units and outposts with up to Battalion strength, delay friendly forces and defend the operating area with forces locally available, and attack our HLZ's with mines and AW/SA fire.

2. Enemy Situation and Tactics - During Operation Beacon Hill I.

a. Enemy Situation. From the first contact with the enemy it was apparent that he was regular NVA, armed with heavy caliber mortars; 82mm and 120mm.

Captured weapons and equipment revealed that the enemy was also supplied with a standardized small arms weapons system (AK-47's, RPD's, SKS's); wore a definite recognizable uniform, and carried combat field gear (packs, cartridge belts, gas masks, etc) in good condition; all of which were of North Vietnamese origin.

Captured documents definitely identified two of the enemy units; one as the 18th Company 812th Regiment, 324B NVA Division, and the other as K-9/3rd Company, 9th Battalion.

b. Enemy Tactics. The enemy displayed those tactics usually ascribed to a well-trained regular force. Enemy mortar attacks were conducted from varied and widely separated firing positions, sometimes slowing an immediate concentration of friendly fire upon the enemy's position.

Defensive positions constructed by the enemy were well-built and reinforced, suggesting that the enemy had been in the area for some time or had unlimited facilities and personnel to use in fortifying his positions.

Offensively the enemy employed the use of initial mortar attacks followed by small arms and automatic weapons fire against friendly companies on the move.

In conclusion it can be said that the enemy was well armed, well-equipped and trained to a point well above that of the VC guerrilla. He used conventional tactics modified to the point where he attempted to avoid exposing his troops, thereby exposing them to concentrated friendly firepower.

3. Terrain and Weather.

a. Critical terrain features, Cover and Concealment.

(1) Critical Terrain Features. Two important terrain features were obvious within the HLT's AOA. There were two ridge lines; one running from East to West from YD219746 to YD197747, and one ridge line running Southwest to Northeast from YD161731 to YD188747. Both ridgelines were used by the enemy as hidden mortar positions for enfilade fire upon the HLT CP and outlying companies.

In the objective area friendly units encountered dense, thick undergrowth which made movement slow and observation poor through the heavy foliage.

In one instance the height of the trees reduced the capability of helicopters to a minimum, subjecting them to intensive enemy fire while maneuvering into the HLZ.

National Route #1 ran through the HLT AOA offering an all-weather vehicle route for resupply, and providing an alternate system of transportation when weather hampered air operations.

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(2) Cover and Concealment. Concealment throughout the Battalion AOA was fair to excellent. Excellent concealment was available in the form of thick, sub-tropical evergreen forest and spacious stands of 8 foot-high elephant grass. Concealment was naturally lessened in the formerly cultivated open areas.

Underground cover was the most feasible protection from mortar attack, however, the dense, continuous foliage offered some protection from small arms.

b. Observation.

(1) Air Observation. Aerial observation of built-up and adjacent areas was excellent when not hindered by the poor weather conditions, (See para b). Good observation in the outlying areas was marginal in that the thick foliage was a source of natural camouflage.

(2) Ground Observation. Ground observation was again hindered by weather during the first 3 days of the operation. During periods of clear skies the areas of Objective 3 (YD172722), Objective 4 (YD140733), and Objective 5 (YD133712) were excellent vantage points for observation in all directions.

The denseness of the foliage also had an adverse effect upon ground observation, causing one friendly ground unit difficulty in ascertaining its location while in contact with the enemy.

c. Avenues of Approach. National Route #1, open and trafficable from the DMZ to DONG HA, was a prime avenue of approach. Other avenues of approach included two loose surface, dry-weather roads, one winding East to West from (YD095704) to (YD214727) and connecting with National Route #1; the other winding North to South from (YD158740) at the DMZ to (YD147603) at the CAM LO River.

In addition to the roads mentioned above the terrain of the AOA was crisscrossed with many footpaths and trails, of specific importance were those trails running South from the DMZ into the AOA.

d. Weather. From the morning of 21 March to late evening of 24 Mar., continuous low ceiling and heavy early morning and late evening fog hampered air operations seriously. Air observation was poor, Close Air Support missions were reduced to a minimum, and helicopter operations concerning resupply and especially Med-Evacs were hampered to the point where some WIA became DOWs. The execution of daily Search and Destroy operations by ground units was delayed until late morning due to lack of air support. Being burdened with WIAs, not lifted out by helicopters.

From 25 Mar. to the termination of the operation, the weather was excellent for friendly operations with visibility from 7 to 10 miles with some fog in early morning and evening.

Rainfall during the operation was very slight; temperatures ranged from a 70° minimum to a maximum of 95°. Humidity averaged 80%.

Rainfall and temperature had no adverse effect upon friendly operations.

SECTION IV

A. MISSION. During the reporting period the 1st Battalion, 4th Marines continued its assignment as the Special Landing Force, OPCON to CTG 79.5. During this period missions assigned were as follows:

4 - 6 March	Enroute to SUBIC BAY PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.
6 - 15 March	Preparation for Special Operations.
16 March	Rehersal Landing at SUBIC BAY PHILIPPINE ISLANDS, for Special Operations in REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM.
20 March - 1 April	Operation BEACON HILL I in the GIO LINH District QUANA TRI Providence of the REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM.

B. SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS/ACTIVITIES.

The Battalion Landing Team spent the period embarked on board ships of the Amphibious Ready Group. The HLT Headquarters was located on board the USS IWO JIMA until 6 March then moved to the SLF Base Camp where it remained until 15 March at which time it moved aboard the USS PRINCETON LPH-5.

On 6 March HLT 1/4 debarked from the ARG shipping and moved to the Special Landing Force Base Camp.

During the period 6 to 15 March the HLT began preparation for Special Operations in RVN.

On 15 March HLT 1/4 embarked aboard the new ARG shipping.

On 16 March, the HLT received the target area for BEACON HILL I and began preparation of Operation Order 3-67. On 16 March ARG shipping sailed for the landing area with tentative D-Day of 19 March and H-Hour of 0800.

Operation was delayed until 20 March due to weather at sea. L-Hour was further delayed until 1320H, due to fog in the LPH operating area. The first wave of Company A was launched at 1300. No contact was made in the LZ and the CP group landed at approx 1415H and moved inside the protective wire of GIO LINH Artillery complex. Defensive positions were immediately began. Company C landed at BLUE Beach at 1400 by LVT and began movement to Objective #1. Company B landed in LZ SPARROW at approx 1430H and established night defensive positions. Company D was landed in LZ BLUEBIRD at approximately 1600H. Company A and D established perimeters around the Battalion Command Post.

At 201735H CTG 79.5 Frag Order # 1 was received directing the HLT to consolidate positions, establish night defensive positions and ambushes, and commencing at first light to seize objective 1, 2 and 3. Be prepared in order to seize objective 4 and 5.

1/4 (6703)

At 201915H to 201015H Company A and Company D at coordinates YD 20874 sustained the first casualties of this operation when they received approximately 300 rounds of 82mm and 120mm Mortar fire. Counter Battery fire was fired by the 105mm Howitzer and 107mm Mortar Batteries. Friendly casualties were 3 KIA's and 17 WIA's.

At 202220H Bn CP at coord YD 208745 received 50 rounds of 82mm, 120mm mortars and 105mm howitzer. Counter Battery fire was returned by 82mm, 107mm mortars and 105's. One secondary explosion was observed.

At 202100H Company B coordinates YD 208745 received 12 incoming mortar rounds and S/A fire from coordinates YD 182725.

At 211240H Company B on objective 3 at coord YD 175722 found 3 VC 82mm rounds, 1 pack, 4 grenades, 3 rice packs which were tagged and sent to BLT S-2.

At 212420H CTG 79.5 intelligence reported 2 VC Battalions located in the area of coordinates YD 171726 and YD 179713, getting in position to oppose Marines on Objective 3. A helicopter spotted 60 enemy spread out from coordinates YD 1471 to YD 1771 in trenches and holes and around the village at coordinates YD 138716.

At 212445H 3rd Platoon Company B received S/A fire from estimated NVA troops. The platoon returned fire with S/A and 60mm mortar. Air strikes were called and dropped 10 tons of bombs, 10 rockets and 250 rounds. There were 3 Fr/WIA's sustained and 10 enemy KIA (Conf), 15 enemy KIA (Prob).

At 212000H 1st Platoon Company B received 1200 S/A rounds. Returned 150 S/A, 7 M-79 rounds, 7 hand grenades, captured 1 Chi Com A/weapon and 250 rounds ammunition. They sustained 3 Fr/WIA's. Enemy casualties were 6 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 6 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 212015H 1st Platoon Company B surprised a VC ambush at coord YD 153700. Company B received 200 rounds S/A and returned 150 rounds S/A, resulting in 6 VC/KIA (Conf), 5 VC/KIA (Prob) and captured VC grenades and 2.5 liters of gasoline.

At 212030H Company B received 25 incoming 82mm mortar rounds, returned 60mm and 82mm mortar and S/A fire. They sustained 2 Fr/WIA's while causing 2 VC/KIA (Conf) and 4 VC/KIA (Prob).

At 220940H information was received from 3rd Marine Division of 7 confirmed mortar positions at YD 168753. C and G batteries fired a missile. Company D reported seeing and hearing 6 secondary explosions from results of the artillery mission.

At 221025H Company B received 15 rounds 82mm mortar fire, called an artillery mission on the suspected enemy positions. They sustained 10 Fr/WIA's from the incoming fire.

At 221215H Company D received 35 to 40 82mm mortar rounds from coordinates YD 173717. Company D called an air strike. One secondary explosion was noted. 7 FR/WIA's were caused by this attack.

At 221315H Company B at coordinates YD 157719 received 15 to 20 82mm mortar rounds and spotted two enemy platoons north of the road. Company B gave pursuit, made contact with the enemy. The enemy threw a large number of grenades and fired A/W and S/A fire. Company B withdrew from contact, called in 82mm mortar and artillery fire. They sustained 5 FR/KIA's and 14 FR/WIA's. enemy casualties were 46 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 6 NVA/KIA (Prob)

At 221600H Company C at YD 174721 located 9 N-1A1 Chi Com anti-tank mines and one can of 82mm mortar increments.

From 221600H to 222000H Company B lead elements received incoming S/A and 57mm recoilless rifle rounds. Leading elements of one fire team were pinned down on the opposite side of hill from rest of the unit. The enemy was too close for CAS and was trying to out flank the leading element. By fire and maneuver and artillery fire, after several tries, the leading element was retracted from the hill. They received 2000 rds S/A, 3 grenades, 20 57mm RR, 30 82mm mortar, and 13 60mm mortar rounds incoming. They returned fire with 1500 S/A, 15 M-79, 6 LAWS, 9 grenades and 105mm artillery fire. The Company consolidated and set up a perimeter for the night. They had sustained 8 FR/WIA's. Enemy casualties were 18 NVA/KIA and 30 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 222230H Company B at YD 155709 heard NVA voices on a hill and saturated the area with artillery and S/A fire. Results were 4 NVA/KIA and 10 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 230300H Company B at YD 153715 received 30 82mm mortar rounds resulting in 15 FR/WIA's.

At 230900H Company C on the move received 82mm mortar and intensive S/A fire. Artillery fired 24 rounds in their support. The result of this action was 1 FR/KIA and 5 FR/WIA's, 5 NVA/KIA (Conf), and 10 NVA/KIA (Prob). One machine gun was captured.

From 231100H to 231145H Company B at YD 152714 received 400 S/A rounds. Artillery was requested and the enemy engaged with S/A. Enemy casualties were 9 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 5 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 231225H Company C at YD 155719 made contact with an unknown size enemy force resulting in 1 FR/KIA and 5 FR/WIA's, 7 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 5 NVA/KIA (Prob). Company C captured 1 pack, personnel gear, 1 gas mask, 2 packs of linked ammo, 2 rocket rounds, corpsman gear, 1 spare barrel and 2 Chi Com machine guns.

At 232335H Company C moving out to objective 4 made contact with 40 NVA. They captured 1 Chi Com carbine, 1 Chi Com rifle, 1 2.7 rocket pack with 3 rounds ammo, 1 2.7 rocket, 3 NVA "E" tools, 1 box of (6) rocket heads, 5 packs, 2 cooking pots, and one 60mm mortar set which was turned over to the HLT S-2

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At 231730H Company C in route to Objective 5 killed one VC and captured 3 Chi Com grenades.

At 232730H Company A providing security for 2 downed helicopters received 82mm mortar and S/A fire. They returned 50 cal and 60mm mortar fire and called in artillery. Results were 13 FR/WIA's 6 Med-Evac. Enemy losses were 10 NVA/KIA (Prob).

From 232945H to 232115H Company D received 30 to 40 82mm mortar rds north and west of their perimeter. They returned S/A fire, hand grenades and artillery fire. A landing zone was cleared for Med-Evac helicopters. The 1st and 2nd helicopters into the zone received no fire but the 3rd received a heavy volume and did not get into the zone. The helicopters spotted two 50 cal gun positions 200 yds north of the landing zone and called in an artillery mission. Twenty-one FR/WIA's were incurred, ten were evacuated. Enemy casualties unknown.

At 240700H Company C received 82mm mortar fire from YD 135619, YD 134720, and YD 135921. An estimated NVA Company assaulted their position. Casualties were 6 FR/KIA's, 17 FR/WIA's, 38 NVA/KIA (Conf), and 63 NVA/KIA (Prob). Equipment captured included Chi Com grenades, two 2.7 inch rocket rounds, 15 full packs containing misc, papers and letters and helmets, 9 Chi Com carbines and 6 AK-47's.

At 240845H Company D at coordinates YD 162730 was searching the area in front of their lines and discovered 4 NVA dressed in green uniforms moving a 7.62 machine gun on wheels into position. Two NVA were confirmed kills and 1 NVA/KIA (Prob). The Russian machine gun on wheels and 100 rounds of ammo (7.62) was captured. Objective 5 killed one VC and

At 241300H Company B made contact with unknown size of NVA force at YD 170707 and received 200 S/A and returned 650 S/A and 12 M-19 rds. Enemy broke contact after a 15 minute fire fight. Artillery fired 45 rounds with good coverage. Company B captured 3 carbines, 18 60mm rounds, 3 cartridge belts, 6 bags of rice, 3 canteens, 3 pr VC sneakers, 12 Chi Com grenades and 2 VC "G" tools. Enemy casualties were 10 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 20 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 241300H Company D found one 105mm round with Chinese markings at CP. This projectile was forwarded to Division Fwd C-2. This projectile was a 105mm shell.

At 241050H Company B spotted 6 to 8 enemy at YD 168729 moving north and called an artillery mission of 6 rounds, three VC/KIA (prob).

At 241300H Company D at coord YD 162729 searched the area of supporting fires of the previous night and found an additional 23 NVA/KIA (Conf) and evidence of 59 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 241700H at coordinates YD 160720 a Company D scouting party found 3 graves with 4 NVA bodies, killed by artillery fire.

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At 241800H Company B spotted 10 NVA moving in trench line at coordinates YD 164731 and called an air strike. Investigation found 4 NVA/KIA (Conf) and evidence of 6 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 250505H Company C received 100 rds of incoming mortar fire and sustained 3 FR/WIA's.

Company D at 250830H located at YD 152734 reported an evaluation of their night defensive fires. One surprise firing device was found in front of their lines and was destroyed. The results of the night engagement was 4 NVA/KIA (Conf), 4 VC/KIA (Prob), 8 NVA/KIA (Prob). Enemy equipment included packs, canteens and a mortar base plate was returned to Bn S-2.

At 252040H Company C reported moving through Objective 5.

At 251415H Company D reported lead elements receiving heavy automatic weapons fire from the left and right front. Company D called in artillery and air strikes on the objective located at YD 251430.

Recon Platoon reported searching coordinates YD 196737, and finding trench lines and fortified positions.

At 251545H Company D engaged an estimated NVA Battalion in trench lines and prepared positions extending from YD 147731 to YD 145737. Air strikes were called.

At 251945H Company A located at YD 152715 received approximately 15 rounds of 60mm in their perimeter. Company A returned heavy mortar and small arms fire. The result of this action was 6 FR/WIA's, one NVA/KIA (Conf) and three NVA/KIA (Prob).

Company C at 251900H located at YD 725710 detonated a surprise firing device causing 4 FR/WIA's

Company A at 251915H located near YD 715152 received incoming 60mm and sporadic small arms. They returned a heavy volume of mortar and small arms fire. Casualties were 5 FR/WIA's, 5 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 12 NVA/KIA (Prob).

At 252155 Company D reported mortars and small arms at 4 suspected enemy positions. Company D confirmed 6 NVA/KIA's with 8 NVA/KIA (Prob).

During the early morning hours of 26 March 1967 all companies were in their assigned positions preparing to conduct Search and Destroy operations.

At 261044H Company A discovered 3 NVA/KIA (Conf) at YD 153716, results of artillery fire.

Battalion Landing Team 1/4 came under Operational Control of the 3rd Marine Regiment at 160900H.

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At 261415H Company C reported receiving sniper fire from ID 124735, while the FAC team landed by helicopter. Small arms and mortar fire was returned. The result of this encounter was 2 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 3 NVA/KIA (Prob).

Recon platoon departed HLT 1/4's CP at 261425H to search for a downed aircraft in the vicinity of ID 153716.

Company D reported moving out at 161420H to search Objective 2.

Recon platoon located parts of the downed aircraft in the vicinity of ID 157718.

At 261700H Located at Coord ID 141732 Company D reported that on Objective 4 enemy fortifications were completely destroyed. Company D found numerous NVA 782 gear.

Company C reported at 262310H that while conducting assigned Search and Destroy missions, it received 82mm mortar and heavy volume of small arms fire from the vicinity of ID 117721. Helicopters were requested to take out Med-Evac's. The result of this engagement was 6 FR/KIA's 7 NVA/KIA (Conf) and 10 NVA/KIA (Prob), 28 FR/KIA's.

During the late evening and early morning of 26 and 27 March 1967 a ring of fire was created around Company C. No other action reported.

Company C reported at 271018H the finding of 25 NVA/KIA (Conf), 15 NVA/KIA (Prob), and numerous enemy equipment, including 3 AK-47's, after sweeping the surrounding area. Receiving sniper fire from ID 124735, while the FAC team landed by helicopter. Small arms and mortar fire.

At 271206H Company A reported moving to new location at ID 175715.

Company D, continuing the search of the fortifications and trench lines on Objective 4, and discovered 7 more NVA/KIA (Conf), and for a downed aircraft in the vicinity of ID 153716.

Company A at 171910H reported that their patrol, searching the area near ID 140781, found graves containing 83 NVA's search Objective 2.

During the late evening and early morning of 27 and 28 March vicinity night activities were initiated and H&I fires conducted. No contact was made with the enemy.

At 280850H located at Coord ID 141732 Company D reported that on Objective 4 noise and activity in front of their position. The patrol called in artillery and 82mm mortar fire on suspected area resulting in 8 NVA/KIA (Conf).

At 280945H the Recon platoon located 5 NVA at ID 191757 and called in artillery fire with good coverage.

Company D at 280900H located at ID 141733 discovered large quantities of enemy equipment, including a message book. All items were forwarded to Division Fwd G-2.

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Company C at 281145H reported being on the move to Objective 3.

Lt Col T. J. WILLIS assumed command of the HLT at 281245H.

Company A at 281500H located near YD 156722 captured one VCS.

Company D reported that while blowing two friendly bombs at YD 141733 one Marine was hit by shrapnel and consequently DOW at 271900H.

Company D reported reaching Objective 2 at 281715H.

At 290010H the Battalion received a warning order from 3rd Marine Reg't to be prepared to conduct Search and Destroy operations in the vicinity of YD 225660.

Company D at 291500H located and destroyed extensive trench and mortar positions at YD 180732.

Company D located a mine field at 291820H at YD 193731.

Company C at 300335H received enemy mortar fire from coordinates YD 175722.

Company D assisted Company C in a fire mission with good results.

Company A reported reaching Objective RED at 300415H.

The ARVN Company with the recon liaison team attached reported encountering a VC ambush at YD 259753 in the ARVN unit sustained 3 WIA's. Enemy casualties were unknown.

Lt Col T. J. WILLIS assumed command of the HLT at 281245H.

At approx 302400H a warning order was received from 3rd Marine Regiment to stand by for commitment into units south of CON THIEN. The Battalion was placed on a 2-hour alert for movement by helicopter after first light. At approximately 310000H the battalion was placed on a one hour alert to move into blocking positions along road running east and west, south of CON THIEN from YD 119689 to YD 093686. Helicopters would be utilized to lift the battalion inside the perimeter of CON THIEN.

At 290010H the Battalion received a warning order from 3rd Marine Reg't Company A was lifted from YD 207740 and the initial wave landed at CON THIEN at 310112. Company A was followed by Company C from YD 188720. The HLT Command Group arrived by 311200H and Company D by 311215H. Company D at 291500H located and destroyed extensive trench and mortar positions at YD 180732.

At approx 311315H the Battalion began moving to designated blocking positions with Company A leading. By 311500H all units were in position with Company A from YD 093686 to YD 105687 and Company C from YD 105687 to YD 118687. Company D established a perimeter in the vicinity of YD 117695 and the Battalion Command Group with H&S security at YD 117692. 3/4, 3/9, 3/3 units were attacking north between grid lines YD 09 and YD 12. One PIP was established at Grid line YD 68. The night of 31 March passed without incident.

Company A reported reaching Objective 1 at 300415H.

The ARVN Company with the recon liaison team attached reported

At 010200H April 1967 BLT 1/4 dissolved as the SLF and BEACON HILL I were terminated

At 010920H an order from the 3rd Marines was received to conduct Search and Destroy operations westward to DMZ and include GS YD 0868, YD 0869, YD 0870. The Battalion CO requested permission to extend operations into GS YD 0768 and was given permission to do so. Company D moved from their position through Company C and Company A and conducted Search and Destroy operations in GS YD 0869, YD 0870. 81mm mortar sections from Company A and Company D was consolidated at the Company C position in general support of the Battalion. Company A moved into GS YD 0868 and YD 0768 and continued Search and Destroy operations. Company D made no contact and returned to their original position via CON THIEN.

The night of 1 April passed without enemy contact. At 012200H the Battalion received a 3rd Marine warning order to change OPCON to 3rd Marine Division(Fwd) effective 020800H, and be prepared to be helicopter lifted to DONG HA to assume the mission as Base Defense Battalion. The helicopter lift was delayed by fog until 1030H. The last elements of the Battalion reached DONG HA at 1600H.

#### C. TRAINING.

Company C conducted  $\frac{1}{2}$  day platoon tactics on 13 March in training area # 5 while at SUBIC BAY SLF CAMP. Company D conducted  $\frac{1}{2}$  day FAM firing at GREEN BEACH in SUBIC BAY on 14 March. No other training was conducted during March due to non-availability of training areas and or tactical commitment.

At 010200H April 1967 BLT 1/4 dissolved as the SLF and BEACON HILL I were terminated

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### 5. Supporting Forces.

a. Air, Artillery, Naval Gunfire, Tanks and Engineers all played an integral part in BLT Operations during the period covered by this report. Tanks were utilized in a defensive role and for convoy escort. Engineer squads attached to the rifle companies were effectively and extensively utilized to destroy the numerous obstacles and fortifications encountered throughout the Operation. Operation of the fire Support Coordination center was in accordance with current doctrine and no unusual problems were encountered.

b. Air Support. On D-day 3 rifle companies, the 105mm Battery, the 107mm Battery, and headquarters elements were all helilifted ashore. Initial helicopter support was provided by HMM-363 and embarked detachment of UH-1E and CH-46 aircraft from First Marine Aircraft Wing. Fixed wing, close Air Support (CAS) was provided by the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. It was readily accessible, responsive to the situation, and effective. Control of Tactical Air was by Tactical Air Controller, (Airborne) in almost every case due to terrain factors limiting the observation of Forward Air Controllers. Helicopter support was generally adequate although poor night-time and early morning weather throughout most of the operation limited it's effectiveness.

c. Artillery. During BEACON HILL I, BLT 1/4 was supported by Battery G and Mortar Battery 3rd Battalion, 12th Marines, Battery F, 2nd Battalion, 12th Marines, and the 175mm guns of the 74th Army Artillery.

During this operation Sav-a-Plans were issued promptly in most instances and as a result critically needed fires were delivered rapidly.

During the early stages of the operation, communications between forward observers and the firing batteries were poor, but FSCC relayed and only a short amount of time was lost between the initial fire request and the firing of the first rounds.

The batteries fired a heavy volume of counter-mortar fire and H&I concentrations. Counter-mortar fires were effective in suppressing enemy mortar attacks. This task was difficult because the enemy was firing a number of weapons from different firing positions. The H&I fires effectively limited the enemy's capability to mass his troops and reduced his night movements.

On several occasions when rifle companies were surrounded by enemy forces, the Artillery Forward Observer was able to control and adjust the fires of three separate firing batteries. These fires were instrumental in keeping the enemy from achieving success.

Over 12,000 rounds of various caliber artillery were fired in support of the BLT during the operation.

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d. Naval Gunfire Support. Initial Naval Gunfire Support was provided by USS EDSON (DD 946) and the USS WHITE RIVER (LSMR 536). All D-day prep fires and deep support targets were on-call missions.

At no time was the operation without support of Naval Gunfire. Although the scheme of maneuver was such that elements of the Battalion were soon beyond the maximum effective range of the ships, the supporting ships were able to provide extensive H&I, deep support and counter-mortar fires in conjunction with artillery fires.

Coordination of Naval Gunfire was effective throughout the operation. Communications posed no major problems and were routine.

The following ships supported Operation BEACON HILL I:

A total of 1210 5" 54, 237 5" 38, 643 5" SSR rounds were fired on 242 H&I missions; 5 district missions and 9 counter-mortar missions.

#### 6. INTELLIGENCE

a. Enemy Situation and Capabilities - Prior to Operation Beacon HILL

(1) Enemy Situation. Enemy ground units in the objective area were identified as the 5th and 6th Battalions, 812th Regiment; 7th and 8th Battalions, 90th Regiment; and the 1st Battalion, 31st Regiment (all NVA). In addition there was also a guerrilla force of approximately 2000 men operating independently throughout QUANG TRI Province.

(2) Enemy Capabilities. It was anticipated that the enemy could attack isolated units and outposts in Battalion strength, delay friendly forces, defend the operating area with forces locally available, and attack our HZ's with mines and AW/SA fire.

b. Enemy Situation and Tactics - During Operation BEACON HILL I.

(1) Enemy Situation. From the first contact with the enemy it was apparent that he was regular NVA, armed with 82mm and 120mm mortars and an extensive armory of small arms, automatic weapons, and ordnance.

Captured weapons and equipment revealed that the enemy was also supplied with a standardized small arms weapons system (AK-47's, RPD's, SKS's); wore definite recognizable uniforms, and carried combat field gear (packs, cartridge belts, gas masks, etc) in good condition; all of which was of North Vietnamese origin.

Captured documents definitely identified two of the enemy units; one as the 18th Company 812th Regiment, 324B NVA Division, and the other as K-9/3rd Company, 9th Battalion.

(2) Enemy Tactics. The enemy displayed those tactics usually ascribed to a well - trained regular force. Enemy mortar attacks were conducted from varied and widely separated firing positions, sometimes preventing an immediate concentration of friendly fire upon the enemy's positions.

Defensive positions constructed by the enemy were well built and reinforced, indicating that the enemy had been in the area for some time and or had unlimited facilities and personnel to use in improving his positions.

Offensively the enemy employed the use of mortar attacks followed by small arms and automatic weapons fire against friendly companies on the move.

In conclusion it can be said that the enemy was well armed, well equipped, and trained to a point well above that of the VC guerrilla. He used conventional tactics modified to the point where he attempted to avoid massing his troops, thereby exposing them to concentrated friendly firepower.

c. Terrain and Weather.

(1) Critical terrain features, Cover and concealment

(a) Critical Terrain Features. Two important terrain features were within the BLT's AOA. There were two ridge lines; one running from East to West from YD 219746 to YD 197747, and one running Southwest to Northeast from YD 161731 to YD 188747. Both ridge lines were used by the enemy as hidden mortar positions for enfilade fire upon BLT CP and outlying companies.

In the objective area friendly units encountered dense, thick undergrowth which made movement slow and observation poor. In one instance the height of the trees reduced the capability of helicopters, providing concealment for the enemy who was able to deliver heavy fire against the helicopters as they maneuvered into the LZ.

National Route # 1 ran through the BLT AOA offering an all-weather vehicle route for resupply, and provided an alternate method of transportation when weather hampered air operations.

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(b) Cover and Concealment. Concealment throughout the Battalion AOA was fair to excellent. Excellent concealment was available in the form of thick, sub-tropical evergreen forest and spacious stands of 8 foot-high elephant grass. Concealment was naturally lessened in the formerly cultivated open areas.

Underground cover was the most feasible protection from morta attack, and the dense, continuous foliage offered some protection from small arms.

(2) Observation

(a) Air Observation. Aerial observation of the built-up and tilled areas was excellent when not hindered by poor weather conditions (See para 4). Good observation in the outlying areas was marginal in that the thick foliage provided natural camouflage.

(b) Ground Observation. Ground observation was hindered by weather during the first 3 days of the operation. During periods of clear weather the areas around objective 3 (vic YD 172722), objective 4 (vic YD 140733), and objective 5 (vic 133712) were excellent vantage points for observation in all directions.

The denseness of the foliage had an adverse effect upon ground observation, causing, on one occasion, a friendly ground unit difficulty in ascertaining it's location while in contact with the enemy.

(3) Avenues of Approach. National Route # 1, open and trafficable from the DMZ to DONG HA, was a prime avenue of approach. Other avenues of approach included two loose surface, dry-weather roads, one winding east to west from (YD 095704) to (YD 214727) and connecting with National Route # 1; the other winding north to south from (YD 158740) at the DMZ to (YD 147603) at the CAM LO River.

In addition to the road mentioned above the terrain of the AOA was crisscrossed with footpaths and trails; of specific importance were those running south from the DMZ into the AOA.

(4) Weather. From the morning of the 21 March to late evening of 24 March, continuous low ceiling and heavy early morning and late evening fog severely restricted air operations. Air observation was poor, close air support missions were reduced to a minimum, and helicopter operations involving resupply, and especially Med-Evacs, were hampered to the point where some WIA's became DOW's. The execution of daily search and destroy operations by ground units was delayed until morning due to lack of air support or being burdened with WIA's not lifted out by helicopters.

From 25 March to the termination of the operation, the weather was excellent for friendly operations with visibility from 7 to 10 miles with slight fog in early morning and evening.

Rainfall during the operation was very slight; temperatures ranged from 70° to 95°. Humidity averaged 80%. Rainfall and temperature had no adverse effect upon friendly operations.

7. Psychological Warfare Efforts.

a. The Psychological Warfare Team attached to the HLT was not utilized during BEACON HILL I because the particular area of operations did not lend itself to such efforts. Very few inhabitants remained in the AOA after D-day.

8. Mission.

a. Commencing at L-hour on D-day land three rifle companies by helicopter assault in landing zones BLUEBIRD and SPARROW, at H-hour land one rifle company over Beach BLUE; all companies consolidate positions for night defensive action. Seize objective 1, 2, and 3. Be prepared to seize objective 4 and 5 on order.

9. Concept of Operations.

a. The operation was planned to allow rapid build-up ashore by landing one company in landing zone BLUEBIRD, and one company immediately following in landing zone SPARROW, seizing objectives 2 and 3 respectively.

b. At H-hour one company was to land by amphibian tractor over Beach BLUE and seize objective 1.

c. The Recon platoon was to be inserted at landing zone HAWK, then move west along the southern edge of the DMZ to landing zone BLUEBIRD.

d. The 105mm howitzer and 107mm mortar batteries were to land by helo in LZ BLUEBIRD; the 105mm howitzer battery in direct support of the BLT and the 107mm mortar battery providing reinforcing fires.

e. A provisional company was formed from H&S Company and attached units and retained aboard LPN-5 for possible employment.

f. After seizure of the landing force objectives, the HLT was to be prepared to conduct deliberate search and destroy operations throughout the area and was to be prepared to carry out any new missions.

10. Execution.

During the period 20 March 1967 to 1 April 1967, this Battalion conducted Search and Destroy operations in GIQ LINH District, QUANG TRI Province, REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM.

At 182145H advance parties arrived at DONG HA to effect liaison for the Landing of HLT 1/4 on 19 March 1967. Weather precluded the HLT from landing on the scheduled date but it was successfully landed the following day, commencing at 201430H. The HLT met no opposition upon landing.

By 201635H Companies A, B & C had completed landing in their respective zones. Elements of the HLT headquarters arrived at 211510H.

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At LZ BLUEBIRD units set up night defensive positions and prepared to conduct Search and Destroy operations on 21 March 1967.

At 201915H the HLT units located in Landing zone BLUEBIRD began receiving heavy incoming mortar fire from the west. Approximately 300 rounds of 82mm and 120mm were received until 202015H. The 105's and 107's and 81mm positions returned a heavy volume of fire upon the suspected enemy mortar positions. The HLT sustained 3 Ft/KIA's and 12 WIA's during this attack.

At 212220H additional incoming Artillery fire was received and the 105mm and 107mm batteries and the 81mm Platoon again returned heavy fire which resulted in one secondary explosion.

Company B at 220015H received 12 incoming mortar rounds from YD 202755. Naval Gunfire along with small arms fire was returned.

Company I/ 3/4 requested assistance from 1/4 in an extraction of an ammunition convoy at YD 215720. The convoy had been ambushed and pinned down. Company B, 1st Battalion, 4th Marines was assigned to assist the convoy.

At 210730H Company C began moving from objective #1 to Landing Zone SPARROW and Company B continued Search and Destroy operations toward Objective #3.

At 211100H Company D reported seizing Objective #2.

Company C reached Objective #3 at 211155H.

At 211215H Recon Platoon began moving from Landing Zone HAWK toward Landing Zone BLUEBIRD.

Company B at 211310H was directed to move to Hill 39, coordinates YD 153777, and conduct Search and Destroy operations in that area.

At 211316H Company B reported finding VC supplies and evidence of recent enemy dead. 10 VC/KIA (C).

At 211630H CTG 79.5 reported that control and coordination of supporting arms was passed ashore to HLT 1/4.

Company B at 211745H received an estimated 1000 small arms rounds from a force of approximately 80 NVA. Company B returned fire and called an Air Strike; 3 friendly WIA's, 10 NVA/KIA (C), 15 NVA/KIA (P) and 3 VCS resulted from this encounter.

A Platoon of Company B at 2120225H surprised a NVA ambush and reported 6 NVA/KIA (C), 5 NVA/KIA (P) and captured Chi Com grenades and 3.5 rocket ammunition.

At 212030H Company B received 25 incoming 82mm Mortar rounds. Company B returned fire with Mortars and small arms. This action resulted in 3 friendly WIA's, 2 NVA/KIA (C), and 4 NVA/KIA (P).

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At 212040H a Frag Order from CTG 79.5 was received directing the HLT to conduct Search and Destroy operations and seize objective 4 & 5.

During the evening of 21 March the rifle companies conducted night activities and prepared for Search and Destroy operations on 22 March.

At 220730H CTG 79.5 reported that weather was hindering movement of serials that were called from the ships.

3d Marine Division (G-2) reported 7 NVA Mortar positions at YD 168753 and Golf Battery 2/12 fired a mission with good target coverage reported by the AO.

At 221020 H Company B reported capturing 3 NVA at YD 153719. From 221025H to 222000H Company B received mortar rounds, 57mm pounds and numerous small arms fire from an NVA unit.

Company B, while securing an intermediate objective, captured enemy supplies, one AK-47 w/magazine, and small arms ammunition. Company B returned the enemy supplies to S-2 by helicopter. The results during the period were 16 NVA/KIA (C), 60 NVA/KIA (P).

Company D, while located at coordinates YD 173747, received incoming 82mm mortar rounds at 221215H. A platoon of Company D spotted enemy gun positions and called a 105mm Artillery mission and Air Strikes.

At 221600H Company C located at YD 174721 located 12 anti-tank mines in the middle of the road. All were detonated in place by the attached engineer team.

Frag Order #3 from CTG 79.5 was received at 221746H indicating that a new grid reference code would be utilized commencing at 230800H.

Company B at 222230H took an unknown number of NVA under fire, 4 NVA/KIA (C).

The Battalion-Command Post located at Landing Zone BLUEBIRD received incoming mortar rounds at 230105H. Golf Battery and the 81mm mortars were registered on enemy positions and caused large secondary explosions at YD 201749.

At 230345H Company B received incoming mortar rounds resulting in 15 friendly WIA's. Their return fire produced 10 NVA/KIA (C).

Company C at 230935H begin receiving incoming mortar fire and small arms fire from coordinates YD 165725. Artillery and Naval Gunfire were called on the enemy positions with good target coverage. Company C sustained 1 friendly KIA and 5 friendly WIA's. The company continued to move and at 231000H while located at coordinates YD 170723, overran a NVA force consisting of approximately 30 NVA. The action resulted in 1 Carbine captured, 5 NVA/KIA (C) and 10 NVA/KIA (P).

At 231225 Company C located at Coord YD 155719 captured NVA packs, rice, clothes, a gas mask, ammunition, and 2 Chi Com sub-machine guns.

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At 231345H Company B located at YD 152714 received 400 rounds of small arms. Company B called in Artillery and returned heavy small arms fire which resulted in 9 NVA/KIA (C) and 5 NVA/KIA (P).

Company C at 231445H continuing movement encountered an estimated 40 NVA. The enemy was driven off by small arms fire and Company C captured miscellaneous supplies, and two weapons.

A recently dug and camouflaged 82mm mortar pit was found at 231514H. at Coord YD 170730 by Company D.

Company C at 231550H shot one NVA while enroute to Objective 5 and captured 3 Chi Com grenades.

Company A at 231550H, while providing security for 2 downed helicopters, began receiving 82mm mortar and small arms fire. Company A returned fire with Artillery, 60mm mortars, and 50 caliber machine guns. This action resulted in 13 Friendly WIA's from Company A.

At 232115H Company D received 30-40 rounds of incoming 82mm Mortar, and small caliber automatic weapons fire, and 50 caliber machine gun fire from the north and west side of their perimeter. Artillery fire was requested. Company D sustained 21 Friendly WIA's, 10 were Med Evacuated.

At 232236H the Division Air Liaison Officer informed BLT 1/4 that due to a helicopter shortage, emergency re-supply was impossible at that time.

At 240750H BLT Frag Order directed that Company B return to the BLT Command Post and all other companies would continue their assigned mission.

D+4  
A platoon from Company D reported at 240845H that they had discovered NVA in green uniforms moving a 7.62 Machine Gun into position at Coord YD 162730. The platoon took the NVA unit under fire and killed two NVA (C), with one NVA/KIA (P). The platoon from Company D captured one 7.62 machine gun, mounted on wheels, with ammunition.

Company C made a final spot report at 241000H concerning a contact with estimated NVA Company at 240715H. The enemy locations were YD 135619, 134720, 134720 and 135721. Company C called in 60mm and 82mm mortars and the enemy was repulsed; while sweeping the area they discovered 18 weapons destroyed by artillery, 9 ChiCom grenades, 9 Chi Com carbines and 6 AK-47's. This action resulted in 4 friendly KIA's, 15 friendly WIA's and 38 NVA/KIA (C), 63 NVA/KIA (P). Company D platoon at 241025H located at YD 162730 found NVA packs and personal equipment. The number of NVA killed was 2 NVA/KIA (C), 3 NVA/KIA (P).

At 241145H Recon Platoon reported establishing an ambush between check points 2 and 3.

Company C reported at 241300H finding NVA equipment consisting of: one Chinese sub-machine gun, 50 ChiCom grenades, 2-2.7 Rocket rounds, 15 full packs, and miscellaneous items.

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At 241240H EOD team reported finding one 105MM round with Chinese markings at Coord YD 208734. Round forwarded to Division G-2.

Company D at 241525H located at YD 169714 spotted 6 to 8 enemy NVA moving north at YD 168720. Company B called in artillery resulting in 3 NVA/KIA (C) and 3 NVA/KIA (P).

Company D at 241300H located at YD 170707 encountered an undetermined size NVA force. NVA broke contact after 15 minute fire fight. Company B called in artillery fire with good coverage. After sweeping area the company found two Chinese machine guns, NVA equipment, and personnel items. The company reported 10 NVA/KIA (C) and 20 NVA/KIA (P).

At 241535H Company D reported finding 23 NVA/KIA (C) and 59 NVA/KIA (P) after searching area YD 163727.

At 242155H Company B at YD 164731 spotted 10 NVA moving in trench line, an Air strike was called and upon completion of Air Strike the Company investigated the area and found 4 NVA/KIA (C) evidence of 4 NVA/KIA (P).

At 250300H Company D located at YD 167729 received approximately 50 incoming 82mm mortar and moderate small arms rounds. Company D returned fire with 81mm and 60mm mortars, artillery, and small arms.

Company D at 250830H located at YD 152734 reported an evaluation of their night defensive fires. One surprise firing device was found in front of their lines and was destroyed. The result of the night engagement was 4 NVA/KIA (C), and 8 NVA/KIA (P). Enemy equipment including packs, canteens and a mortar base plate was returned to S-2.

Company C reported seizing and moving through objective #5 at 251040H.

At 251415H Company D reported that lead elements received heavy automatic weapons fire from their left and right front. Company D called in artillery and air strikes on objective #4 located at YD 251430.

Recon platoon reported reaching a check point at Coord YD 196737, and finding trench lines and fortified positions.

At 251545H Company D engaged an estimated NVA Battalion in trench lines and prepared positions extending from YD 147731 to YD 145737. Air Strikes were called.

At 251945H Company A located at YD 152715 received approximately 15 rounds of 60mm mortar in their perimeter. Company A returned heavy mortar and small arms fire. The result of this action was 6 friendly WIA's, one NVA/KIA (C) and 3 NVA/KIA (P).

Company C at 251900H located near YD 725710, detonated a surprise firing device causing 4 friendly WIA's.

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Company A at 251915H located at YD 715152 received incoming 60mm mortar and sporadic small arms fire. They returned a heavy volume of mortar and small arms fire. Results were 5 friendly WIA's, 5 NVA/KIA (C) and 12 NVA/KIA (P).

At 252155H Company D reported firing mortars and small arms at a suspected enemy position. Company D confirmed 6 NVA/KIA's and 8 NVA/KIA (F).

During the early morning hours of 26 March 1967 all companies were in their assigned positions preparing to conduct Search and Destroy operations.

At 261044H Company A discovered 3 NVA/KIA (C) as results of Artillery fire located YD 153716.

Battalion Landing Team 1/4 became under operational control of the 3rd Marine Regiment at 260900H.

At 261415H Company C reported receiving sniper fire, at YD 124735, while their FAC team landed by helicopter. The results of this encounter were 2 NVA/KIA (C) and 3 NVA/KIA (P).

Recon platoon departed BLT 1/4's CP at 161425H to search for downed aircraft in the vicinity of YD 153716.

Company D reported moving out at 261420H to search objective #4.

Recon platoon located parts of aircraft in the vicinity of YD 157718.

At 261700H at coordinates YD 141732 company D reported fortifications on Objective #4 were completely destroyed. Company D found NVA equipment.

Company C reported at 262310 that while conducting assigned Search and Destroy mission, it received 82mm mortars and a heavy volume of small arms fire from the vicinity of YD 117721. Helicopters were requested to take out med-evacs for Company C. The results of this engagement were 6 friendly KIA's, 28 friendly WIA's, 7 NVA/KIA (C) and 10 NVA/KIA (P).

During the late evening and early morning of 26 to 27 March a ring of protective fire was registered around Company C. No other action was reported.

Company C reported at 271018H the finding of 25 NVA/KIA (C) and evidence of 15 NVA/KIA (P), and numerous items of enemy equipment, including 3 AK-47's after sweeping surrounding area.

At 271206H Company A reported moving to a new location YD 145715.

Company D, continuing to search fortifications and trench lines on Objective 4 discovered 7 more NVA/KIA (C) at 271330H.

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Company B reported at 271350H that their patrol was returning to the BLT CP.

Company A at 271910H reported searching the area in the vicinity of YD 149718 and finding 33 NVA/KIA (C).

During the late evening and early morning of 27 and 28 March night activities were initiated and H&I fires conducted. No contact was made with the enemy.

At 280850H a patrol of Company D at coordinates YD 141723 observed noise and activity in front of their position. The patrol called in Artillery and 82mm mortars on the suspected area resulting in 8 NVA/KIA (C).

At 280945H the Recon platoon located 5 NVA located at YD 191757 and called in Artillery fire with good results.

Company D at 280900H located at YD 141733 discovered large quantities of enemy equipment and a message book. All items were forwarded to Division G-2.

Company C at 281145H reported being on the move to Objective #3.

Lt Col T. J. WILLIS assumed command of BLT 1/4 at 281245H.

Company A at 281500H, located near YD 156722, captured one MSS.

Company D reported that while blowing two friendly bombs at Coord YD 141733 one Marine was hit by shrapnel and subsequently died at 291700H.

Company D reported reaching objective #2 at 181715H.

The BLT came under the OPCON of the 3rd Marines and received their warning order at 290010H to be prepared to conduct search and destroy operations in the vicinity of YD 225660.

Company D at 291500H located and destroyed extensive trench and mortar positions at YD 187742 and YD 186745.

Company D located a mine field at 291820H at YD 193731.

At 292310H received Frag Order from Regiment to continue mission in assigned AO. Company A was ordered to move to YD 263739 to act as a blocking force for a sweep to be conducted by two ARVN Companies, from a point approx 5,000 yds east of LZ BLUEBIRD to Objective #1.

At 300110H Company A was on the move to their objective.

Company C at 300335H received enemy mortar fire at Coord YD 175722. Company D assisted Company C in fire mission with good results.

Company A reported at 300415H reaching assigned blocking positions.

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At 300550H one ARVN unit with liaison team attached reported encountering VC ambush at YD 253753. The ARVN unit sustained 3 WIA's med-evac. Enemy casualties unknown. No further contact occurred during this sweep. Company A remained overnight in the general area of blocking position Red (YD 263739).

At approx 302400H March the BLT received a warning order from the 3d Marine Regiment to standby for commitment into an area south of CON THIEN. The Battalion was placed on a 2-hour alert for movement by helo after first light.

At approx 310700H March the Battalion was placed on a 1 hour alert to move into blocking position along road running east and west, south of CON THIEN, vicinity YD 119689 to YD 093686. Helicopters would be utilized to lift the Battalion inside the perimeter of CON THIEN.

Co A was lifted first from YD 267748 and the initial wave landed at CON THIEN at approx YD 311012H. Co A was followed by Co C from YD 188720. The CP group arrived at 311200H and Co D at 311215H.

At approximately 311315H the Battalion began moving to designated blocking position with Co A leading. By 311530H all units were in position with Co A from YD 093686 to YD 105687 and Co C from YD 105687 to YD 118687. Co D established a perimeter at YD 117695 and the Battalion CP with H&S security at YD 117692. 3/4, 3/9 and 3/3 units were attacking north between grid lines 09 and 12. The FCL was established at Grid Line 08. The night of 31 March passed without incident.

At 010200H April BLT 1/4 was dissolved and became 1st Bn, 4th Marines and chopped from the SLF.

At 010920H a message was received from 3d Marines to conduct Search and Destroy operations westward to the DMZ and include GS YD 0868, YD 0869, and YD 0870. The Bn CO requested permission to extend operation into GS YD 0768 and was given permission to do so. Co D moved from their positions through Co C and A and conducted Search and Destroy operations in GS YD 0869 and YD 0870. The 81mm mortar sections from Co A and Co D was consolidated at Co C position to support both Companies. Co A moved into GS YD 0868 and YD 0768 and conducted Search and Destroy operations.

Company D made no contact and returned to their original position via CON THIEN.

Company A returned to its original position.

The night of 1 April passed without contact. At 012200H a 3d Marines warning order directed 1/4 to change OPCON to 3d Mar Div (Fwd) effective 020800H, and to be prepared to be helo lifted to DONG HA to assume mission as Base Defense Bn. The helo lift was delayed due to fog until 1030H. The last elements of the Battalion reached DONG HA at 1600H.

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## a. Friendly Losses.

(1) The following is a recapitulation of friendly casualties sustained by the Battalion Landing Team 1/4 during Operation BEACON HILL I covering the period 20 March 1967 to 1 April 1967.

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c. It was not always possible to immediately search areas where Air Strikes and Artillery missions were conducted. The results of fires utilized in close support of friendly troops were always evaluated by area searches. Harrassing and deep supporting fires could not be evaluated.

d. No material, food stuffs, or medicines of U.S origin were recovered.

12. Administrative Matters. The Administrative Order proved to be adequate in all respects. No difficulties were encountered with the serial assignment table and all items of equipment called for were delivered with a very short lead time.

a. Supply techniques, combat loads, ammunitions, and weapons carried by assault troops:

(1) On D-1 ammunitions and rations were staged aboard assigned shipping and broken down by Companies, batteries and attachments. These supplies were issued on D-day in accordance with authorized Basic Allowance (B/A).

(2) Units landed by surface or air lift carried the prescribed load as directed by the Administrative order and the Basic Allowance. Resupply requests were submitted by the using units to the BLT S-4 one day prior to the required date of delivery. Helicopters were ordered one day prior to date of use, and the time of arrival was dictated by the tactical situation of each requesting unit. Combat loads, weapons, and ammunition carried by troops proved to be adequate except in a few instances. On the evening of D-day the battalion was subjected to heavy enemy mortar and artillery attacks. The 105 howitzer battery and the 81mm mortar platoon quickly expended their Basic Allowance firing counter mortar fires. An emergency resupply request was ordered and delivered to the battalion within two hours. Ammunition was also received from an adjacent artillery battery to supplement the emergency resupply. On D+8 two rifle companies encountered a built-up area consisting of enemy Bunkers and trenches. 300 pounds of demolitions were requested by these companies and delivered to them.

(3) While ashore, all units were resupplied from the LSA, DONG HA combat base. Helicopters from assigned shipping were used to deliver the supplies from the LSA to requesting units.

b. MAINTENANCE. Maintenance was performed by FLSG, DONG HA. Down items of equipment were delivered to FLSG by helicopter or vehicle. Contact teams were available from the attached LSU of the BLT when needed.

c. TREATMENT OF CASUALTIES AND EVACUATIONS AND HOSPITALIZATION. First echelon medical care was performed in the field by hospital corpsman attached to the various Rifle Companies and other units. Following field first aid, those patients requiring further care were evacuated by helicopter to the nearest available medical facility. The definitive treat-

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ment center of the SLF was the USS PRINCETON (LPH-5) where the SLF surgical team was augmented by the medical personnel of the ship, the personnel of the collecting and clearing platoon, and a complement of corpsmen from BLT 1/4. In addition, a medical Officer and 3 corpsmen accompanied H&S Company as a "Forward B.A.S.", but this unit was in no way utilized in the chain of evacuation and confined itself to treatment of wounds and diseases occurring in its own area of the TAOR.

The following system was utilized for processing casualties aboard the casualty evacuation ship: The med-evac helicopter was met on the flight deck by medical personnel and the patients weapons were removed at this time. Patients observed to have wounds requiring specialized skills not available aboard the casualty eva ship (Neurosurgery, Ophthalmology, Otoaryngology, Maxillo-facial surgery) were to be immediately evacuated to the nearest facility having this type of care (The need for this procedure did not arise during this Operation). The patients were then removed by elevator to the hanger deck where they were completely undressed, tetanus administered, the nature of their wounds determined and an order of treatment established. The patients were then lowered by hoist one deck below to the shock and Resuscitation area where further examination including X-ray studies and blood work was accomplished and IV fluid therapy and other supportive measures initiated. Here, the patients were also prepared for surgery and debridement and closure of minor wounds was accomplished. The surgical suite, consisting of two operating rooms, was located one deck below the Shock and Resuscitation area; patients requiring surgery were removed to this area by hoist.

Total hospital beds were 160. These were divided into four wards as follows:

Ward I - 4 beds used as Sick Officers Quarters.

Ward II - (Intensive Care Unit) 36 beds for post operative patients following major, general and orthopedic surgical procedures requiring frequent surveillance and care.

Ward III & IV - 120 beds for ambulatory patients requiring routine care.

The daily census averaged 115 patients; at no time were all hospital beds filled.

d. TRANSPORTATION. On D-day the battalion air lifted the LIWC's (Mules) into the Command Group's position. Located at this position were H&S Company, 1 Rifle Company, 1 section 82mm mortars, and the 105mm howitzer battery. The LIWC's proved to be invaluable in moving supplies from the 12 to the using units, particularly the 105mm and 82mm ammunition. On D+1 motor transport elements of the HLT Motor Transport Platoon and the 105mm Battery were moved by surface craft to DONG HA. These vehicles were used to resupply all the units located at Command Post area, greatly reducing the need for helicopter support in that area. The medium helicopter squadron in direct support was the principle means of transportation used by the rifle companies. They provided for Med-Evac, troops lifts and resupply of the rifle

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companies. Additional transportation was provided by CH-46 helicopters for lifting heavy external loads.

e. Communications. Communications nets were activated at H-90 minutes on D-day, 20 March 1967, in support of Operation BEACON HILL I. Communications was generally satisfactory during all phases of the operation. Problems involving mutual interference between frequency modulated (FM) radio nets, and between FM radio nets and radio relay circuits were encountered. Interference was most severe during the early evening hours. Both radio and radio relay circuits from the shore became marginal and brief outages were experienced as a result of unusable frequencies. No outages were experienced on internal BLT radio nets.

(1) Supporting arms radio nets were satisfactory. Some difficulty was encountered initially in contacting gunfire support ships. The specific cause of this was not determined, however, with subsequent frequency changes and the changing of supporting ships this problem was eliminated.

(2) The shifting of control of Air from ship (TACC) to shore (DASC-DONG HA) caused confusion in requesting and coordinating Air Support.

(3) Planned ship-to-shore communications consisted of two radio nets. LF TAC #1 (HF) and LF TAC #2 (FM), and one radio relay circuit utilizing the AN/MRC-62. LF TAC #1 was activated very briefly during the initial phases of operations ashore. This net was secured on D+1 and not activated again. LF TAC #2 was operated on a continual basis until the BLT changed operational control to 3rd Marine Regiment. It was necessary to change frequency on this net on three separate occasions to maintain satisfactory communications. Though covered operation was planned for this net, it was not ordered and the net remained uncovered.

(a) The radio relay circuit was operational approximately 85 percent of the time. Outages were caused primarily by unusable frequencies. It becomes necessary to place this circuit on a scheduled basis (three hours up one hour down) due to downed generator equipment on 27 March 1967. During this period one PE-75, organic to the AN/MRC-62, as well as the battalion PUL-197 were inoperative. The following day a second PE-75 was borrowed and the circuit resumed full time operation. This circuit was secured on 31 March 1967 when the BLT CP displaced to the CON THIEN area.

(4) On 23 March 1967 radio relay communications was established with 3rd MarDiv (Fwd) utilizing an AN/MRC-62 provided by that unit. This circuit provided direct entry into the 3rd MarDiv/III MAF telephone system, plus dedicated (Hot Line) circuits between the BLT WC and 3rd MarDiv (Fwd) OOC, and BLT FSCC and 3rd MarDiv (Fwd) FSCC. This circuit remained in operation until the BLT CP displaced to the CON THIEN area on 31 March 1967 at which time the van was returned to DONG HA.

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(5) Internal BLT radio nets were satisfactory during all phases of BEACON HILL I. The employment of both a HLT TAC net and ADMIN/LOG net again proved most advantageous. The availability of an ADMIN/LOG net for administrative/ logistic type traffic greatly alleviated traffic volume on the ELT TAC Net leaving this net free for purely tactical control.

(6) Coincident with the change of operational control of the HLT to 3rd Marine Regiment, the LF TAC #2 was secured and the BLT entered the 3rd Marine Regiment TAC net. No problems were encountered in this transition and continuous radio communications was maintained on this net until the HLT returned to DONG HA on 2 April 1967. Telephone communications with 3rd Marine Regiment was available via radio relay.

(7) Subsequent to 26 March 1967, radio communications with SLF were maintained via the HLT TAC Net and/or the 3rd Marine Regiment TAC Net, both of which the SLF monitored. As stated in paragraph (3) above radio relay was maintained with the SLF until 31 March 1967.

(8) Normal internal telephone communications was provided within the BLT CP ashore. One common user channel was provided for telephone communications with BLT elements afloat. Two common user channels providing entry into 3rd MarDiv/III MAF were also provided. One external trunk line was installed to the Provisional Artillery unit located at GIO LINH. No difficulties were encountered in the installation and operation of this telephone system.

(a) The BLT Message Center remained on board the USS PRINCETON during the operation. All message center functions were performed from that location. The message center moved ashore on 27 March 1967 and set up operations in DONG HA.

(9) Maintenance was also performed on board the USS PRINCETON during the operation. Most equipment evacuated from the field was taken directly to the LoA in DONG HA while some was evacuated to the ship. At this writing some items of equipment remain unaccounted for. On 25 March 1967 maintenance personnel were sent ashore to the LSA to recover equipment as it was evacuated. Subsequent to this date gear requiring 3rd echelon maintenance was taken directly to FLSU #1.

(10) Operation BEACON HILL I terminated at 0200H on 1 April 1967. Upon movement of the BLT to DONG HA on 1 April 1967 all radio nets were secured.

f. Medical Evaluation.

(1) The frequent inability of the medevac helicopters to find the USS PRINCETON due to inclement weather emphasized the need for alternative definitive medical treatment center (eg. USS REPOSE, Company D 3rd Med Bn, DONG HA).

(2) The combining of second and third echelon medical support (Collecting and Clearing Platoon, SLF Surgical Team) proved less of an advantage than in previous operations due to the breakdown of the chain of evacuation between field and the casualty evac ship. The potential ability of the C & C platoon should be remembered and utilized in future operations if practicable.

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(3) It is the opinion of the surgical team that the presence of a male nurse aboard the casualty evac ship would be an aid in improving patient care:

(4) The medical facilities of the USS PRINCETON, while adequate, are far from optimal. One difficulty encountered was the transportation of patients among the various areas and wards, all of which seemed to be located on different decks without direct access between areas for non-ambulatory patients, although the wards of the casualty evac ship were never filled. Assuming the Casualty evac ship had been the sole evacuation center, bed space would have been totally inadequate.

#### 12. SPECIAL EQUIPMENT AND TECHNIQUES.

a. Sniper employment: Two man sniper teams were employed with each rifle company. During the operation they evidenced a marked improvement over their performance in earlier operations (DECKHOUSE VI). They provided good close-in and distant fire support to the units to which assigned. Their excellent marksmanship accounted for a total of 24 NVA confirmed kills during BEACON HILL I.

#### 13. COMMANDERS ANALYSIS.

a. Operation BEACON HILL I was entirely successful. Collectively, enemy casualties exceeded that of a NVA Battalion. Actually, three different NVA Battalions were reduced to virtual ineffectiveness as a result of Operation BEACON HILL I.

The Landing was conducted without incident into secure Landing zones. The distance involved and weather were the problem areas. The concurrent Landing of elements of the HLT by helicopter from three different ships illustrated once again the flexibility available in an Amphibious operation. This allowed for rapid build-up ashore, extremely important since H-hour had been delayed due to bad weather.

Worthy of note is the fact that one of the units was a 105mm howitzer battery embarked in an LSD.

b. The operations ashore consisted of the small unit engagements generally associated with Guerrilla operations, consisting mainly of company size operations.

The enemy, however, proved to be regular NVA, well equipped, and well organized.

The fact that all units of the HLT ashore received extensive enemy mortar fire and on one occasion 105mm Howitzer fire, emphasized the continuing need for maximum dispersion of personnel and digging in; strict adherence to this policy undoubtedly held friendly casualties to a minimum.

In counter-battery firing and in all operations, the need for rapid fire support and detailed fire support coordination was confirmed. The ability to concentrate the fires of three separate batteries allowed maximum fire to be delivered on lucrative enemy targets and provided protection to separated friendly units against numerically superior enemy forces.

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c. The sparse civilian population in the area of operations, the dispersed employment of the companies, and savage continuing nature of the fighting, left no opportunity for implementing a Civil Affairs or Psychological Warfare Program.

Marine Corps Matters

Addendum to Combat After Action Report Operation BEACON HILL I  
20 March thru 1 April 1967.

Air Support

Difficulties were encountered in obtaining helicopters due to the fact that Air Control was maintained afloat. In several instances it was impossible for the Air Liaison team to contact the controlling agency. This is considered to be a major problem area. One example is an emergency Med-Evac which required one hour and 25 minutes to be completed, as a result of communications / coordination problems. The SACC provided little if any useful support during the operation and generally caused excessive delays due to its inability to maintain radio contact with the Battalion. The Battalion used a MRC-87 radio and had completely satisfactory communications with all other stations on all other nets. During the 48 hour period that helicopter control was exercised through Division Air, no problems of this nature were encountered.

Administrative Matters

Problems were encountered with the system used to request helicopters. The helicopters were initially based ~~ashore~~ the LPH and this required the BLT S-4 to send requests to the BLT tac-log aboard the LPH. The BLT S-4 was then required to order the resupplies from the LSA and request that they be staged for pick up by the helicopters based aboard the LPH. Exact times for pick up could not be given to the LSA due to fast moving tactical situation of the units. On one occasion four helicopters from SLF squadron arrived on the LSA to pick up resupply and found other helicopters on that position. Coordination was poor between the SLF squadron, the Division Air Officer, and the LSA. The situation was complicated due to the fact that the LSA was supporting several battalions at this time. Early morning and late evening, ground fog reduced the available flying time and this, together with the time needed for coordination between the assigned helicopter squadron, the Division Air Officer, the LSA and the battalion S-4, caused three of the rifle companies to miss resupply on D+1. On several occasions the helicopters aboard the LPH were grounded due to fog conditions at sea while ashore there was no fog. It is recommended, that in future operations helicopters from SLF squadrons that are in direct support of the BLT be located, if possible, at the supply source; in this instance the LSA, at LONG HA.

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
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Operations Overlay (Operation BEACON HILL I)





**2. SEIS.**

- a. Determine the enemy's capability to defend his present positions, if so, in what strength.  
b. Determine the enemy's capability to attack and possible routes of advance as well as his strength.  
c. Determine the locations to where the enemy may withdraw, how far, and possible routes of withdrawal.  
d. Determine the enemy's capability to delay advancing friendly forces and in what strength.  
e. Determine whether the enemy has reinforcements available and when and where they may be employed and in what strength.

**3. CIRs.**

- a. The following list of CIRs is pertinent to this operation.
- (1) Determine the location of fixed enemy installations such as tunnel systems, caves, and supply caches.
  - (2) Determine enemy techniques for sabotage, espionage, and terrorism.
  - (3) Determine enemy capabilities for resupply.
  - (4) Determine the enemy's vulnerabilities and weaknesses.
  - (5) Determine the enemy's physical condition and morale.
  - (6) Determine the condition and quality of enemy equipment.

4. HANDLING OF CAPTURED PERSONNEL, EQUIPMENT/MATERIAL, AND DOCUMENTS.

a. Captured Personnel. All captured personnel shall be searched, segregated, silenced, and safeguarded. Speed is of the essence in forwarding detainees to the collection point.

(1) Captives will be treated in a humane manner, but will be handled so as to maintain the shock of being captured.

(2) Capturing units will:

(a) Immediately search detainees thoroughly and enforce rigid silence.

(b) Segregate into groups: Officer, NCO, Nalliers, other enlisted and VC suspects.

(c) All captured personnel will be tagged with the standard Detainees Tags.

(d) Place documents removed from the detainees in Captured Documents Envelopes as provided and identified with the detainees.

b. Captured Equipment/Material. All captured equipment/material will be forwarded to the BLT S-2 unless otherwise directed.

(1) Any equipment such as communications/electronic equipment will be forwarded by the fastest means possible.

(2) If unit commanders are directed to destroy captured equipment/material, photographs should be taken whenever possible.

(3) If the tactical situation permits, detailed reports will be made as to complete identification of captured equipment/material.

c. Captured Documents. Personnel who find enemy documents, either on captives or otherwise are to forward same to BLT S-2 as soon as possible.

(1) Under no circumstances will any mention of captured communication documents or material be made in plain language transmission over any electronic means of communication.

(2) All captured documents will be tagged as set forth in Paragraph d, Section 5.

d. Procedures for tagging captured personnel, equipment/material, and documents are listed below.

(1) Include capturing unit.

(2) Where captured. (Location by coordinates)

(3) When captured. (DTG)

(4) Circumstances of capture.

5. COUNTERMINT INTELLIGENCE.

- a. Insure that all personnel are instructed in the Code of Conduct in case of possible capture.
- b. Maximum security protection must be afforded the exact location and date of execution of an operation.
- c. All personnel will be instructed in the proper use of Password and Countersign.
- d. BLT S-2 will be immediately notified when compromise of the Challenge and Password is suspected.

6. REPORTS.

- a. Spot Reports. Accurate, complete spot reports of incidents will be forwarded to the BLT S-2 as soon as the tactical situation permits. Corrections to spot reports must be expedited to BLT S-2 immediately. (Format for Spot Report see ANNEX L (Reports) to Operation Order 3-67).

- b. Intelligence Summaries. The BLT S-2 will submit intelligence summaries at 0800 and 2000 daily.

7. ATTACHMENTS.

- a. Supported command provides interrogator-translator (ITT) sub-teams.
- b. Supported command provides language qualified advisors.
- c. It is envisioned that a minimum of two liaison/advisors will accompany each rifle company. The ITT will normally remain at the VC/VCS collection point.

b. This estimate supplements reference (c). (79.5 Operation Plan 120A-67 for Operation BEACON HILL).

c. CHARACTERISTICS OF THE AREA OF OPERATION.

a. Weather.

(1) Temperature. The mean annual temperature for the objective area is 84 degrees maximum and 71 degrees minimum. The mean daily temperature for all seasons varies only a few degrees from these averages.

(2) Precipitation. Monthly mean rainfall from February through July varies from 1 to 4 inches or 4 to 12 rainy days per month. Monthly rainfall ranges from highs of 7 to 17 inches to lows of 0 to 2 inches.

(3) Winds. The winds occur out of the southwest approximately 50% of the time with an average speed of 6 knots.

(4) Clouds. The minimum cloudiness occurs from May through August, averaging 59% per month. The cloud cover for March and April averages 70%.

(5) Visibility. In general visibility is fair during all seasons, and varies between 6 and 12 miles.

(6) Light Data. See enclosure 4 (Astronomical and Tidal Data).

(7) Effect on Enemy Operations. Weather conditions will afford the enemy good visibility over our landing areas and routes of approach inland. However, with almost unrestricted visibility he will be unable to move large forces undetected during daylight hours.

b. Terrain.

(1) General. The objective area is generally a narrow coastal lowland and is considered as part of the Northern Plains Region. This area is devoted primarily to the growing of rice.

(2) Relief. This area is primarily a lowland coastal plain with relief that rarely exceeds 10 meters. The immediate coast usually falls into one of two categories: (1) that of parallel, curved beach ridges, whose populated areas are only a few feet higher than the cultivated depressions, and (2) local belts of sand dunes, some of which are stabilized by the natural growth of brush and grass. Behind the coast is a nearly flat rice growing plain approximately 14 kilometers wide.

(3) Vegetation and Surface Material.

(a) Vegetation. The vegetation along the beach ridges and sand dunes consists of shrubs and grass. In the lowland plain, vegetation is primarily cultivated rice crops. The forest generally consists of dense broadleaf evergreen and deciduous growth which has in some instances two or three canopies.

(b) Surface Material. Within this area the surface soils are predominantly silty clays. These surface soils are usually underlain at about 3 meters by impermeable hardpan.

(4) Observation and Fields of Fire. Observation and fields of fire will be generally good throughout the objective area due to the near flat terrain.

(5) Obstacles. The major obstacles will be the Cua Viet, Song Thachi Han and the canal that runs from north to south from Song Ben Hai River to the Cua Viet River.

(6) Cover and Concealment.

(a) Cover. Cover throughout the area will be fair to poor; however, the many paddy dikes, drainage ditches, and canal and stream banks will afford some cover.

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(b) Concealment. Throughout the area concealment will be fair, provided by paddy dikes, drainage ditches and canals and stream banks.

(7) Avenues of Approach. The two major avenues of approach will be from the SE or NW along National Route #1. Another natural approach will be via the Cua Viet River. Route #9 will provide an approach from the West into the objective area. Due to the many culverts and stream bridges all of the above land routes will be vulnerable to interdiction.

(8) Landing Zones. See enclosure (2). (Helicopter Landing Zones).

(9) Landing Beach. See enclosure (1). (Beach Study).

(10) Inland Waterways.

(a) Song Ben Hai (River). This waterway traverses the objective area in a southwest direction. The width varies from 65 to 400 meters and has a bottom of sand and silt. The north banks are of rock and the south banks are of sand. This waterway can be navigated by LCWs as far as Highway Bridge #1.

(b) Cua Viet (River). This waterway traverses the objective area in a southwest direction. The width of this waterway varies from 120 to 900 meters. The bottom is made up of sand and silt. A shallow sandbar at the mouth limits the soft draft to 1.0 meters at low water.

(c) The canal that runs in a generally north-south direction from Song Ben Hai to Cua Viet can be navigated throughout the year by small craft. The bottom consists of sandy silt.

3. ENEMY SITUATION.

a. Composition.

(1) Ground. Enemy ground units in the objective area have been identified as the 5th and 6th Bn, 812th Regt; 7th and 8th Bn, 90th Regt; and the 1st Bn, 31st Regt. Their arms and armament includes 82mm mortars and 140mm Rockets. In addition a guerrilla force of approximately 2000 are operating independently in the Quang Tri Province.

(2) Air. The latest known jet fighters count totaled 53 Fagot/Fresco/Fishbed (MIGs 15/17/21). In addition to the fighter aircraft 8 twin jet light bombers (IL-28 Beagles) were identified in North Vietnam as late as January 67. The 45 jet fighters at Phuc Yen have a limited capability to attack vital areas in Quang Tri in support of reinforcements moving south. The Beagle is capable of attacking targets in the northern I Corps with up to 6,600 pounds bomb load per aircraft.

4. ENEMY CAPABILITIES.

a. Attack isolated units and outposts with up to Bn strength.

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b. Deploy and defend the present operating areas with local forces available.

c. Employ limited fighter and bomber attacks from north of the DMZ.

d. Locally defend the area with forces locally available.

e. Attack our helicopter landing zones with mines and AT/SA fire.

5. CONCLUSIONS.

a. It is considered most probable that the enemy will attack our helicopter landing zones with mines, AW and SA with forces locally available, but will avoid any large scale contact due to his reluctance to mass his forces.

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## BLUE BEACH STUDY

1. Introduction.

a. Locating coordinates. Beach Center ID 322722, Lat 16-55-24 N,  
Long 107-10-52 E.

b. General Description. Blue Beach is a 500 yd beach located in the northern portion of N18 Beach 1. The beach is straight and faces 048T. The Cau Viet is located 1.6 miles south of Beach Center. A small village is located on the left flank 400 yds inland.

2. Offshore. The 6 fathom curve runs 1050 yds off the beach. The bottom is sand with some mud; there are no known navigational hazards. Anchorage are exposed to NE, E and SE winds and seas.

3. Nearshore. Two separate sandbars run parallel to the beach. The inshore bar runs 40-70 yds off the beach and has a least depth of 1-2 feet at LLW. The second sandbar lies 190-270 yds off the beach and has a least depth of 6 feet at LLW. These sandbars will be changed by any storms in the area. Gradients are as follows:

The bottom is composed of medium grained sand.

4. Foreshore. The average beach width is 20 yds. It is composed of medium grain sand and has an average gradient of 1:12. Trafficability is rated good for tracked vehicles and personnel on foot and fair for wheeled vehicles.

5. Backshore. The backshore is composed of fine grain sand and varies from 50 to 200 yds. Trafficability is good for tracked vehicles, fair for personnel and wheeled vehicles. Two footpaths on the right flank provide exits.

6. Hinterland. Sand dunes up to 15 ft high are located on the left two thirds of the beach. Pines grow behind these dunes. Villages are located 800 yds NW and 500 yds SW of beach center.

7. Tides, Currents and Surf. Tidal range varies between 0.2 and 2.1 ft. Offshore currents, outside the 2 fathom curve, have been reported running in the opposite direction as the littoral current and at nearly the same speed. Surf above 4 ft occurs 48% of the time in March, but is predicted to be less than 2 ft for the next 3-4 days.

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9. Evaluation. The beach is suitable for an LVT, LCM-6, and LCVP operations. LCVP's and LCM-6s can operate except in severe tidal conditions. The inshore sandbar will have to be blasted to permit LCM-8 and LCU operations.



Task Organization: Annex A (Task Organization)

1. Situation.

a. General.

- (1) Annex K (Rules of Engagement) to Operation Order 3-67 will be closely adhered to in control and coordination of supporting arms.

b. Enemy Forces.

- (1) Annex B (Intelligence)  
(2) Current Intsums.

c. Friendly Forces.

- (1) Annex F (Naval Gunfire)  
(2) Annex G (Air Operations)  
(3) Annex E (Artillery)

2. Mission. BLT 1/4 fire support coordination center (FSCC) will exercise responsibility for planning and coordinating all supporting fires for the BLT after responsibility for coordination is passed ashore.

3. Execution.

a. Concept.

- (1) Fire support coordination afloat will be coordinated and controlled by SACC.  
(2) The BLT will establish a FGSS ashore for coordination of supporting arms. Control and coordination of supporting arms will be passed ashore on request of the CLP from the CATT. Coordination will be passed back to CATT prior to commencement of the Amphibious tactical withdrawal.

- (3) The BLT will plan preparatory pre H-hour and L-hour fires for helicopter landing zones and landing beaches.
  - (4) Close air support will be under the positive control of the SFCP, TAC(A) or TAO. Airborne Controllers will establish communications with friendly units for positive location before attacking a target.
  - (5) Artillery and naval gunfire will be under the positive control of the SFCP, FO or airborne spotter.
- b. Coordination of Air Support. All close air support requests coordinated by the ACO must have final approval by SACC.
- c. Coordination of Artillery and Naval Gunfire.
- (1) When coordination of supporting arms is passed ashore to FSCC, SACC will be notified of all missions prior to firing. The following information will be passed to SACC.
    - (a) Unit or ship firing.
    - (b) Coordinates of target and target number.
    - (c) Maximum ordinate.
    - (d) Estimated time that firing will commence.
    - (e) When mission has been completed.
  - (2) The FSCC will at all times keep SACC abreast of unit locations.
  - (3) The SACC will immediately pass all information on supporting fires within the AOA to HDC to insure the safety of halos.
  - (4) SACC and HDC will transmit "Save -- A-- Planes" to all aircraft entering the AOA over the TAD nets and HD nets respectively.
- d. Target information.
- (1) Initially maintained by CATF.
  - (2) FSCC will maintain a target list when ashore.
  - (3) Target numbers will be assigned in accordance with reference (b).
  - (4) Night defensive fire plans will be transmitted by the FSCC to CLP and SACC.
  - (5) Annex B (Intelligence).
  - (6) Current INTSUMS.

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e. Aircraft Safety.

- (1) Air sentries and lookouts.
  - (a) Air sentries will be positioned at artillery firing batteries and will cease fire when friendly aircraft are observed approaching danger areas.
  - (b) Artillery forward observers, naval gunfire spotters and airborne spotters will check fire when it appears that the trajectories of artillery and naval gunfire will endanger friendly aircraft.
  - (c) Unless special coordination measures are prescribed, fires on helicopter routes are restricted to observed fires where the observer is capable of ensuring the safety of the helicopters using the routes.

f. Coordination techniques.

**1. SITUATION.**

a. General. Reference (b) states that in other than built up areas Naval Gunfire may be directed against enemy forces in contact, in accordance with normal procedures. When not in contact, unobserved NGF will be directed only at targets declared hostile by indigenous personnel, ground observers or airborne spotters. Further, unobserved Naval gunfire will be employed only under exceptional circumstances and in cases where:

- (1) The requested Naval Gunfire mission cannot be observed due to geography, weather, or other factors; or
- (2) No U. S. TACP, SFCP, FAC's or airborne artillery spotters trained in Naval Gunfire spotting are available.

2. MISSION. Naval Gunfire support unit (TU 76.5.1) supports the landing and operations ashore of BLT 1/4 with Naval Gunfire.
3. EXECUTION.
  - a. Naval Gunfire support unit (TU 76.5.1) will support the BLT maneuver ashore
  - b. Coordinating Instructions.
    - (1) Fire support areas and stations, boundaries and zones of responsibility of fire support ships will be promulgated by CATF.
    - (2) SACC will control and coordinate Naval Gunfire until passed to FSCC ashore.
    - (3) When BLT FSCC is established ashore, coordination of Naval Gunfire with other supporting arms will be in accordance to reference (c).
    - (4) Request for Naval Gunfire support will be made to the gunfire support ships by spot teams, forward observers, air observers and other qualified to adjust fires.
    - (5) VT and MTF fuzed projectiles not set on safe will not be fired over the heads or within 300 yards of friendly ships, troops, landing, or assault boats, unless specifically requested by the supporting unit.
    - (6) Use UTM grid reference system for all target locations.
    - (7) Restrictive fire plans will be in accordance with Annex D (Fire Support Coordination).
    - (8) Creeping methods of adjustment will be used in all dangerously close missions.
    - (9) All spotters will give the Naval Gunfire Ship, upon completion of a mission, "End of Target". Following by a damage assessment and effectiveness of fire.
    - (10) The SFCP will report to the Naval Gunfire Ship(s) friendly positions every hour or when there is a significant change.
    - (11) BLT Commander will coordinate Naval Gunfire zones of responsibility to correspond to the boundaries of the supported troop unit.
    - (12) All Naval Gunfire missions require positive clearance and approval by SACC/FSCC.

- (13) BLT will submit requirements to CLF for D-Day schedule of fires.
  - (14) The BLT commander will coordinate screening smoke with organic units and CLF.
  - (15) Rockets will not be fired over heads of friendly troops, landing craft, assault boats or shipping.
  - (16) Illumination missions will be fired only upon approval of BLT Commander.
  - (17) SFCP will establish radio communications with direct support ships at H-60. In the interval before SFCP commences functioning ashore, NGF ships will execute scheduled fires using an Airborne Spotter. Airborne Spotter (TAO) may request repetition, acceleration, reduction, or shifting of scheduled fires as the situation dictates.
  - (18) Coordination of Air support, Artillery, and Naval Gunfire in accordance with Annex D (Fire Support Coordination).

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

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d. Supplies and Equipment Available

(1) Control and Distribution

(a) Control

1 The BLT will establish a TAC LOG aboard the LPH and the LSD with sub units on other shipping. The LSD is the primary control ship.

2 Custody, control and distribution is a BLT responsibility. Request for transportation will be submitted through the S-4.

3 Every effort will be made to ensure supplies and equipment are safeguarded against damage, capture, and pilferage from both friendly and enemy forces.

4 Report all classes of supplies expended or consumed by type and quantity to the BLT S-4 upon completion of operations.

(b) Distribution

1 Levels of supply in the objective area will not exceed one DCS for any class unless approved by the BLT Commander, or the S-4.

2 Landing of supplies and serials will be reported to BLT S-4 when completed.

3 Captured material (See Intelligence Annex).

4 Salvage

a All material requiring salvage will be reported to the BLT S-4 and returned to the amphibious shipping by the most expedient means.

b No material of potential use to the enemy will be left unguarded or unattended.

2. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION

a. See Annex B (Medical) to Administrative Order 003-67.

b. All class V will be removed from casualties prior to being evacuated.

c. Upon arrival of the casualty to the flight deck aboard the LPH, designated personnel from collection and clearing platoon will search the halo and casualty for any class V prior to admitting him to the operating room. This process will again be completed when the individual is taken to the Hangar Deck.

3. TRANSPORTATION

a. Land. The landing of wheeled and tracked vehicles will be restricted to those required to accomplish the mission. Vehicles will be designated and embarked on order.

b. Air. As directed and approved by CTG 79.5.

4. SERVICE

a. Fuctions

(1) Construction as required.

(2) Maintenance to be provided by the service attachments of the BLT. Maximum use will be made of contact teams and end items replacement.

5. PERSONNEL. See Annex D (Personnel) to Administrative Order 003-67.

6. MISCELLANEOUS

a. Security of all supplies, equipment and personal effects while aboard is the responsibility of the embarked unit commanders.

b. When operation ashore, all expended dry cell batteries will be destroyed and buried if possible.

c. Deadlined equipment will be reported immediately to this Headquarters (Attn: S-4).

d. Prior to re-embarkation unit commanders will ensure Class V items recovered are free of rust, dirt, and moisture.

e. Supply economy will be enforced at all times.

f. On D-Day minus one, all units draw prescribed loads.

g. Safety

(1) Hand grenades will not be removed from their containers prior to L-2 or H-2 whichever is applicable.

(2) Magazines will not be loaded prior to L-2 or H-2 whichever is applicable.

(3) Grenades will not be suspended from cartridge belts, belt suspenders, pockets of utility coats or any other area that may cause the pins to disengage from the grenade at any time.

2. MISSION:

a. Medical Support

(1) Land on order with 1st Battalion, 4th Marines and establish a Battalion Aid Station. Provide replacement personnel as needed.

(2) Collecting and Clearing platoon will land on order and establish a collecting and clearing station in a designated area.

(3) If seaward evacuation of casualties for second echelon care is more desirable, the attached medical units will be prepared to integrate with and compliment the medical department of the casualty receiving ship.

b. All Medical Units

(1) Provide markers on evacuation routes to designate location of unit.

(2) Be prepared to furnish emergency treatment to civilian populous.

(3) Test local water for potability.

3. SANITATION AND PREVENTIVE MEDICINE. See Appendix 1.

4. EVACUATION

a. Reference (e).

b. Movement

(1) After departing port of embarkation, casualties occurring aboard ship, which require care beyond the capability of that ship, will be transferred to designated casualty receiving ships at the earliest practicable time.

[REDACTED]

(2) The health of all troops embarked is the responsibility of the Amphibious Task Force Commander.

(3) Troop medical personnel will render all practicable assistance to ship's medical personnel as regards medical service to embarked troops.

c. Assault Plan

(1) Waterborne Force

(a) Ship-to-shore

1 Living casualties in the landing craft will remain in the craft for return to the casualty receiving ships as directed.

2 All dead occurring in the landing craft will be placed on the beach above the high water mark for collection by Graves Registration personnel of the Shore Party.

3 All dead occurring in amphibious vehicles will remain in the vehicle for return to the beach for collection by the Graves Registration personnel of the Shore Party.

(2) Helicopterborne Forces

(a) Ship-to-shore

1 Living casualties occurring in the helicopterborne force will be evacuated by returning helicopter to the LPH.

2 All dead occurring will be returned to the LPH by returning helicopter in the helicopterborne force. Alternatively, they may be left in the landing zone until linkup with ground forces. The choice will be determined by the extensiveness of the commitment of returning helicopters to carry living casualties.

d. Ashore

(1) Initially, casualties will be evacuated via landing craft or helicopter to casualty receiving ships.

(2) Report location of medical installations when established.

(3) In no case will evacuation of casualties be delayed solely for lack of complete medical records or other administrative requirements.

(4) Priority will be given to rapid casualty collection and evacuation to Amphibious Task Force medical facilities.

(5) Normally, casualties will be evacuated to ships of the Amphibious Task Force as soon as possible, either directly by helicopter or via shore party evacuation facilities.

- (6) Evacuation of all casualties will be direct to the LPH by Helicopter.
- (7) The LPH will be designated the casualty receiving ship.
- (8) The LPH and LPD, when ready to receive casualties will fly an oversize MIKE flag. At night a blinking green light will be used for identification.

e. Air Evacuation

- (1) Helicopter evacuation.
- (a) All casualties occurring in the helicopterborne force will be evacuated via helicopter to LPH.
- (b) Upon completion of the landing of helicopterborne troops, ambulance helicopter will be available for evacuation.
- (c) Requests for helicopter for shore-to-shore evacuation will be made to the CECO.
- (d) In requesting ambulance, helicopter, units will use the following classification system for indicating priority of casualties.

**Emergency:** Those requiring immediate evacuation for emergency treatment.

**Priority:** Those requiring emergency treatment but whose condition will allow a one to three hour delay.

**Routine:** Those requiring helicopter evacuation because of the nature of their injury. No emergency treatment necessary but smooth evacuation desirable.

- (2) On order, detainee casualties will be evacuated.

- (3) Indigenous civilian casualties will be evacuated from the objective area at the discretion of the Amphibious Task Force Commander.

a. Ship Medical Facilities

- (1) The ships of the Amphibious Task Force will provide hospitalization. The LPH has been designated to receive the more serious casualties throughout the operation.

- (2) At the discretion of the Amphibious Task Force Surgeon, overflow facilities for minor casualties will be established aboard the LPD.

b. Detainees

- (1) Detainees will receive prophylactic injections of smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, typhus, cholera, and plague.

(2) Detainees will be hospitalized as directed by the Landing Force Commander.

(3) Maximum use of captured medical personnel and supplies will be made in the treatment of detainees.

c. RAMP's. (Recovered Allied Military Personnel)

(1) All RAMP's will receive prophylactic injections of smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, typhus, cholera, and plague.

(2) RAMP's will be isolated from troops, civilians and detainees in a detention area on the beach.

(3) RAMP's requiring hospitalization and casualties requiring emergency treatment will be evacuated in the normal chain seaward.

6. MEDICAL SUPPLY

a. Landing Force

(1) Reference (f).

(2) Requests for emergency supplies by air drop will be made as indicated.

(3) Captured medical supplies will be salvaged for the care of detainees.

(4) The LPH will be stocked with and act as distribution center for whole blood.

7. MEDICAL ADMINISTRATION

a. Location of Landing Force Surgeon

(1) Afloat: LPH

(2) Ashore: To be announced.

Time Zone: H

1. MISSION. To promote and maintain the health and well-being of all troops in the field prior to, during, and after combat operations.

2. SITUATION

a. Due to conditions and poverty, the country containing the objective area has a distinct impediment toward progress in health and sanitation measures.

b. As a result of the problem, many diseases are widespread and sanitary measures are almost nil. Vectors of disease are widespread and due to climatic conditions, epidemics of many diseases are almost continuous.

3. DISEASE INFORMATION

a. Diseases of Special Military Importance

- (1) Malaria: Greatest mortality cause - widespread.
- (2) Dysenteries: Next in importance - widespread.
- (3) Plague: Occasional epidemics - widespread.
- (4) Cholera: Occasional epidemics - widespread.
- (5) Venereal Diseases: Prevalent in large communities.
- (6) Typhus Fever: Occurs in hill country.

b. Diseases of potential military importance

(1) Malaria: Sporadic outbreaks but preventive medication will keep incidence low.

(2) Plague: Sporadic outbreaks but control measures may keep incidence low.

c. Miscellaneous Diseases

(1) Typhoid Fever: Common among civilians due to contaminated water supply.

(2) Smallpox: Controlled by vaccines.

4. INSECTS AND DANGEROUS ANIMALSa. Vectors of disease.

- (1) Mosquitoes: Anopheles most prevalent.
- (2) Flies: Many varieties the year around.
- (3) Lice: Very Common.
- (4) Fleas: Tropical fleas most prevalent.
- (5) Rodents: Many varieties of rats and rat-like animals transmit typhus fever.

b. Animals. Possibly dangerous animals are wild elephants, bears, tigers, wild cows, and boars. As a rule it is difficult to encounter these animals, but troops maneuvering as a group may anger and stampede them.

5. PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- a. Troop commanders at all echelons will require maximum sanitary discipline possible under combat conditions.
- b. All local water, regardless of source will be considered unsafe and will be treated properly prior to use.
- c. Food will be consumed from authorized military sources only.

6. MEDICAL UNITS

- a. Train all personnel in preventive medicine measures required in the recognition of snakes, dangerous animals, etc., and the treatment of all known and expected diseases in the area.
- b. Medical personnel will ensure that troop personnel are indoctrinated in the wearing of helmet nets and the use of other types of insect repellent nets.
- c. All medical units will indoctrinate troop personnel in the hazards of hot, humid and rainy climates and the methods to combat these hazards.
- d. All units carry impregnated salt tablets.
- e. All troops will have routine immunizations brought up to date, and will be immunized for smallpox, typhoid-paratyphoid, tetanus-diphtheria, poliomyelitis, cholera, typhus, plague, and gamma globulin before embarkation.



- (4) BLT S-1 submit weekly Personnel Status Report in accordance with reference (c).

3. REPLACEMENTS. None anticipated.4. DISCIPLINE, LAW AND ORDER

- a. Military justice will be governed by the provisions of reference (d).
- b. Minor infractions will be deferred until completion of the operation. Serious incidents and infractions will be reported immediately.
- c. Subordinate commanders are responsible for stragglers in their area of responsibility.

[REDACTED] d. Straggler control on the beach will be by the Shore Party [REDACTED] Order.

e. When the BLT CP is established ashore, straggler control will be by the BLT S-1.

f. Detainees

(1) All provisions of the Geneva Convention will be observed.

(2) All detainees will be searched immediately.

(3) All detainees will be reported immediately upon capture to the BLT S-2. Disposition will be in accordance with instructions provided by the BLT S-2.

(4) The BLT S-1 will be prepared to establish a temporary detainee compound in the vicinity of the BLT CP.

(5) Detainees will be handled in accordance with reference (f).

5. GRAVES REGISTRATION

a. All friendly deceased personnel will be evacuated to the USS TWO JIMA.

b. All personal effects of deceased personnel will be turned in to the BLT S-1 and processed in accordance with reference (b).

6. MORALE AND PERSONNEL SERVICES

a. Leave. Only emergency leave will be granted. Complete verification by the Red Cross will be required.

b. Decorations and Awards. Recommendations for decorations and awards will be submitted as expeditiously as possible. Every effort will be made to obtain eyewitness statements.

c. Postal. Pick up and delivery of mail will be arranged by the BLT Postal Officer.

d. Religious Services. As scheduled by the BLT Chaplain. Information regarding times and location of services will be announced.

e. Pay. Information will be promulgated by the Paymastering Officer regarding the pay schedule in the event a pay day is held prior to completion of the operation.

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



Time Zone: H

1. GENERAL

- a. Visual signals are a supplementary means of communications and are transmitted by panels, flashing lights, signal flags and pyrotechnics.
- b. Unit tactical CW call signs will be used as applicable on all visual circuits.

2. MISCELLANEOUS VISUAL SIGNALS

- a. Flag displayed from tank turret:

<u>Signal</u>	<u>Meaning</u>
"RED"	Tank is in distress, require infantry assistance.
"ORANGE"	Tank is low on fuel or ammunition, pulling back to replenish.
"GREEN"	Request contact on telephone at rear of tank.

- b. Aircraft Maneuver Signals:

<u>Aircraft Maneuver</u>	<u>Meaning</u>
360 Degree left turn	Display CP identification.
360 Degree right turn	Mission complete.
*Alternate dips and climbs	Display front line markings.
Rock wings	Message or display understood.
Sharp S-turn	Will support, you mark target.
Circle right-rocking wing	Am trying to contact you by radio.

\*It is impractical for jet aircraft to execute these maneuver signals.

### 3. SIMPLIFIED PYROTECHNICS AND SMOKE SIGNALS

- a. The basic reason for a standardized pyrotechnic and smoke signal code is for personal emergencies and to provide an elementary alternate means of communications. Smoke signals are necessary also to guide fighter planes to enemy position, friendly airplanes and helicopters to friendly positions, and to mark points of reference.
- b. Illumination and smoke signals once used are immediately declassified since the enemy may also see them. When the source of origin cannot definitely be identified, all illumination and smoke signals should be verified by radio or panel markers.
- c. After firing signal for radio breakdown, other signals may be fired as appropriate. Illumination and smoke signal requests for bombardment must repeat must be confirmed by radio, panel markers, or higher headquarters.
- d. Special circumstances may warrant departure from a prescribed signal meaning. Such departure should be kept to a minimum and is feasible provided parties concerned have radio communications or otherwise understand the special meanings. The code is confined to fundamental meanings and is based upon color. The code does not distinguish between a cluster and a parachute pyrotechnic light signal flare.
- e. Except for pyrotechnic signals 7 and 8, combinations of different color pyrotechnic or smoke signals are not included. Designation of other combinations is left to the discretion of subordinate commands. As stated in para 31, all parties concerned must know special signal meanings. Allowing subordinate commands to designate color combination meanings give flexibility to the code and will give security to combination signals which may have to be changed often (e.g. code words).

4. PANEL SIGNALSa. General.

(1) Use of Panel Sets, AP-30C (Black) and AP-30D (White) as a "means of communication" with aircraft will be in accordance with ACP-136A.

b. Vehicle Identification.

(1) Use VS-4/U (Red) Panels on odd dates.

(2) Use VS-6/U (Yellow) Panels on even dates.

c. Helicopter Landing Point Identification.

(1) All landing points will be marked with an equilateral triangle formed by using three panels from either panel Set AP-30C or AP-30D. The color selection will contrast with the landing point in order to be easily recognized by aircraft.

(2) Prevailing wind direction will be shown by installing a short pole (about 3 feet) with streamers, flag or pennant of sufficient length to permit the pilot to determine the local wind.

(3) The type of unit will be identified by one or more panels in the center of the triangle as follows:

<u>Type of Unit</u>	<u>Identification</u>
Infantry/Recon	One Yellow Panel (VS-6/U)
Artillery/Tanks	One Red Panel (VS-4/U)
Aviation	Two Yellow Panels (VS-6/U)
Service and Support	Two Red Panels (VS-4/U)

(4) The size of unit will be identified by one or more panels (AP-30C or AP-30D) placed directly above and centered on top of the triangle as follows:

<u>Size of Unit</u>	<u>Identification</u>
Company/Battery	Roman Numeral One
Battalion/Squadron	Roman Numeral Two
Regt/MAC/MAU	Roman Numeral Three
Brigade/MAG	Letter "X"
Division/Wing	Letter "XX"
MAF/MAC	Letter "XXX"

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(5) Night marking of helicopter landing points, when tactically feasible, may consist of three flashlights placed at the apex of the triangle or vehicle lights flashed from downwind of the landing point and illuminating the landing area.

d. Front line Marking. Marking of friendly front lines will be by use of panels VS-6/U (Yellow) placed parallel to front lines.

Time Zone: H

1. GENERAL

- a. Nothing shall infringe on the inherent right of an individual Marine to defend himself against attack. In the event of attack, the individual concerned may take immediate aggressive action against the attacking force by any means available.
- b. In order to avoid embittering the friendly indigenous population against U.S. Forces in-country, unit commanders must avoid the use of unnecessary force leading to noncombatant battle casualties.
- c. Maximum use will be made of friendly indigenous personnel (liaison) during the conduct of operations in order to provide identification of friendly forces and as a means of contact and identification of civilians.

2. MINIMIZING NONCOMBATANT CASUALTIES

Commanders will hold troop indoctrination briefings prior to conducting operation to emphasize the importance of minimizing noncombatant casualties, and will conduct operations utilizing reference (a) for operations in RVN and as guidance in other non-hostile countries. In addition the following guidelines are applicable:

- a. In cases where defensive fire is undertaken, care will be exercised to ensure that friendly or innocent personnel are not endangered.
- b. In situations where light small arms fire is received from a populated area, every effort will be made to identify the exact

target before engagement.

- c. The proper selection of landing zones, the careful planning and execution of air strikes, and the proper employment of artillery and armed helicopters will avoid unnecessary damage to lives and property of noncombatants.
- d. TACPs, SFOPs and pilots of armed helicopters will be briefed on areas to be avoided due to the presence of a friendly or potentially friendly population. Such information will be determined from local officials at province and district level by CTF 79.5.

### 3. SAFEGUARDING OF VIETNAMESE AND NONHOSTILE INDIGENOUS PERSONNEL, PROPERTIES AND FOOD SUPPLIES

Reference (c) promulgates the following guidelines concerning property and food supplies.

- a. Marines engaged in search and destroy operations will take all practicable measures to minimize the destruction of Vietnamese and non-hostile indigenous personnel property. The destruction of dwellings and livestock by U.S. Forces as a denial measure is prohibited. Such actions must be performed by RVNAF units and in operations in other non-hostile countries by forces designated in the initiating directive.
- b. Requests by indigenous authorities for employment of U.S. Forces to destroy indigenous property, including livestock, will be referred to the CLF.
- c. Large food caches discovered or captured in VIETNAM or non-hostile nations will be reported to the CLF for extraction and redistribution by local officials.

### 4. RULES OF ENGAGEMENT

- a. Unit commanders will instruct troops to fire only under the following circumstances:
  - (1) When they observe and identify a person or persons as enemy.
  - (2) When fire is being delivered on friendly troops.
  - (3) When personnel are obviously attempting, by hasty or suspicious acts, to avoid contact with friendly troops.

(4) When requested to fire by friendly armed forces commanders, after approval from appropriate headquarters.

b. Reference (d) authorizes artillery and naval gunfire missions to be conducted in accordance with the following:

(1) In areas exclusive of villages and hamlets, artillery fire and naval gunfire may be directed against enemy forces in accordance with normal fire direction procedures.

(2) Unobserved artillery fire will be employed only in cases where requested missions cannot be observed due to terrain, weather, or when no U.S. TAC (A), TAO or SFOP is available and then only at targets declared hostile by GVN or VN liaison personnel.

(3) Unobserved naval gunfire will be employed only in cases where requested missions cannot be observed due to terrain, weather, or when no U.S. TAC (A), TAO or SFOP is available and then only at targets declared hostile by GVN or VN liaison personnel. Use of naval gunfire in this manner will be employed only when absolutely required and will not be considered as normal procedure.

(4) Missions against known or suspected VC targets in hamlets and villages occupied by noncombatants will be conducted as follows:

(a) All fire missions on hamlets or villages will be controlled by TAO or ground forward observer (FO) and will be executed only after local government armed forces officials approval, as appropriate. Approval will be requested by CTG 79.5.

(b) Hamlets or villages not associated with ground operations will not be attacked by gunfire without prior warning (by leaflets and/or speaker systems or other appropriate means) even though light fire is received from them.

(c) Hamlets and villages may be attacked without prior warning if the attack is in conjunction with a ground operation involving the movement of ground forces through the area and if, in the judgement of the ground commander, his mission would be jeopardized by such warning.

- c. Reference (e) authorizes close air support missions to be conducted in accordance with the following:
- (1) All targets selected for an air strike will be approved by the Province Chief directly or through higher RVN authority.
  - (2) All pilots will endeavor to minimize noncombatant casualties and civilian property damage. A strike will not be executed where identification of friendly forces is in doubt.
  - (3) All pilots will have knowledge of the disposition of friendly forces and/or civilians prior to conducting a strike. This information may come from ground or air briefing.
  - (4) For purposes of this directive, references to the Forward Air Controller (FAC) also encompass and apply to the Marine Tactical Air Coordinator Airborne TAC (A).
  - (5) USAF, USMC, and VNAF strike aircraft will normally be controlled by the following in the order of preference as listed:
    - (a) USMC/USAF/ALO/FAC or TAC(A).
    - (b) VNAF FAC/FAO.
    - (c) USAF MSQ-77 (SKY SPOT) or USMC TPQ - 10.
  - (6) In an emergency, when no qualified means of control is available, the following personnel may designate the target for strike aircraft:
    - (a) The commander of a ground unit or US Advisor engaged with the enemy.
    - (b) US pilot of an airplane or helicopter supporting a ground unit, who has radio contact with the ground unit involved and/or can identify friendly positions in relation to enemy positions.

\*Under VFR conditions, when USAF, USMC, or VNAF FAC is not available, a qualified Army Target Identifying Pilot (TIP) may designate the target to be struck and the flight leader of the strike aircraft

Will control the strike.

- (c) US pilot of an airplane or helicopter required to operate within the vicinity of a hostile village or hamlet for the purpose of conducting a medical evacuation or supply mission, and where enemy fire presents an immediate threat to the lives of the helicopter or transport crew.
- (7) Close air support missions that involve strikes on hamlets or villages must always be controlled by a FAC. If the attack on a village or hamlet is deemed necessary and is executed in conjunction with a ground operation involving movement of ground forces through the area, the attack may be made without warning; however, appropriate US/VN-RVNAF approval is required, except in emergencies. If the attack on a village or hamlet is not in conjunction with any immediate ground operation, the inhabitants must be warned by leaflets and/or loudspeaker system prior to the attack and must be given sufficient time to evacuate the area.
- (8) ALO/FAC will:
  - (a) Have thorough knowledge of the ground scheme of maneuver.
  - (b) Make every effort to secure a VNAF observer to assist in directing an air strike. If a VNAF observer is not available, an ALO/FAC is authorized to direct the air strike.
  - (c) Maintain reliable communications with ground unit and strike aircraft.
  - (d) Make positive identification and mark the target.
  - (e) Insure that strike pilots are aware of friendly locations in relation to target, characteristics of target area, and local weather conditions.
  - (f) Use 1:50,000 scale maps of target area, and photographs when available.
- (9) Strike Pilots will:
  - (a) Always be under the control and have direct radio contact for a strike with a Forward Air Controller or designated control agency (airborne or ground).

- (b) Have visual contact with target or target marked except as noted in paragraph (f), below.
- (c) Always ascertain the position of friendly troops (or civilians, when applicable).
- (d) Ascertain local conditions regarding weather, target area, and surrounding terrain characteristics.
- (e) Defend themselves against ground fire providing:
  - (1) Source of fire can be visually identified.
  - (2) The strike can be positively oriented against the source.
  - (3) The fire is of such intensity that counter-action is necessary.
- (f) Strike at night only with flares, unless under control of TPQ-10 or MSQ-77.
- (10) Aircraft will not cross the demilitarized zone of Cambodian border unless specifically authorized by COMUSMACV when operating in RVN.
- (11) All FACs operating in the vicinity of the RVN/Cambodian border will have a 1:50,000 map of the target area. Maps, mosaics, and photos will be made available to the pilots.
- (12) Joint operations-intelligence facilities will be established and complete pre-strike briefings and post-strike debriefings will be conducted for strikes within 5000 meters of the RVN/Cambodian border, when practical.
- (13) Cambodian border restrictions which are additional to the above:
  - (a) Strike aircraft within 5000 meters of the Cambodian border will be under positive control of a Forward Air Controller or MSQ-77/TPQ10. The authority to waive this requirement is restricted to COMUSMACV or his designated representative.
  - (b) All organizations responsible for planning or execution of missions within 5 km of the border will have posted in operations a 1:250,000 or larger

scale map on which the Cambodian border is distinctly marked, on the RVN side, to the depth of 5km.

- (c) Aircraft supporting border outposts (fire support, reconnaissance, supply, and transportation) are allowed to operate as necessary in the outpost area, but will neither cross nor fire across the border.
- (d) Appropriate radar stations will flight follow aircraft on missions within 5km of the border within equipment capability.
- (14) Munitions will be jettisoned only in designated jettison areas.
- (15) During night or IFR conditions, aircraft will be under positive radar control while jettisoning.
- (16) During day VFR, drops will be monitored by radar whenever possible.
- (17) US Army and US Marines armed helicopters will be marked "US Army" or "US Marine," as appropriate, and may be manned with all-US crews at the unit commander direction.
- (18) If the target involves noncombatants, such as in a hamlet or village, whenever possible an RVNAF observer will be aboard the helicopter and US-GVN-RVNAF approval to fire must be obtained unless the situation clearly represents an immediate threat to the lives of the crew.
- (19) Operational restrictions placed upon reconnaissance aircraft near the RVN/Cambodian border, for the purpose of insuring that inadvertent overflights do not occur, preclude aerial reconnaissance over large areas within RVN where significant enemy activity is known to be taking place. In order to eliminate the immunity of such areas to observation and photography, these restrictions may be waived on a case-by-case basis.
- (20) Reconnaissance requests for coverage in areas which present a danger of an overflight or border violation will be forwarded through normal reconnaissance request channels to the TASE. Upon determination that a waiver is justified, the request will be executed. In the event of particularly sensitive complications, COMUSMACV will be the final determining authority.

- (21) US Army OV-1 aircraft may be armed with target marking ordnance while on surveillance missions.
- (22) Commander, 7th Air Force, prescribes Rules of Engagement and Restrictions for air to air combat in RVN. These are published by that headquarters in Tactical Air Control center (TACC) Operating instructions (OI) No 55-33, March 1966.

5. CONDUCT OF LANDING FORCE PERSONNEL

a. In order to win and maintain the support of the Vietnamese or non-hostile nations people in assisting U.S. Forces in the struggle against the enemy forces, all troops will be indoctrinated in the following rules of conduct while ashore:

- (1) They are guest of the Vietnamese and non-hostile nation and should act as such.
- (2) They should gain with the people and try to help them in any way possible.
- (3) They should be particularly polite to women and children.
- (4) They should make friends with their local nations counterparts.
- (5) They should be alert at all times.
- (6) They should give the indigenous personnel the right of way whenever they are driving a vehicle.
- (7) They should not be loud and boisterous.
- (8) They should not "show off" money when in the company of indigenous personnel.
- (9) They should reflect honor on themselves and their country at all times.
