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SECTION III

INTELLIGENCE

1. ENEMY SITUATION AT THE BEGINNING OF THE PERIOD:

During this period 3d Battelion, 4th Marines area of operation was north of Cam Lo and then the Camp J J CARROLL TARR.

a. AREA NORTH OF CAM TO:

On Hill # 208 (YD 0464) and surrounding hills numerous bunkers, supported by spider traps were found and destroyed. This area is believed to contain harboring sites for infiltrating NVA units moving south out of the DNZ. This belief is supported by the fact that L/3/4 received 25 rounds of 60mm Mortars on the 1st of June from this position. Company "L" received 35 rounds of 60mm Mortar and sporadic sniper fire on 25 June from Hill 124 (YD 07621). Kho Ma (YD 080597) was found to be heavily booby trapped with DH-10's (NVA's Claymore) and M-26 grenades.

b. CAMP J J CARROLJ, AMD DELTA-5 AREA:

In these areas there has been almost no enemy ground activity. It is believed that 31st NVA Regiment has been employing training cadre in the D-5 area to train the local guerrillas in the use of booby traps.

2. TOTAL ENEMY LOSSES FOR THE PERIOD:

- c. Equipment: 1 DH-10 Directional Mine

3. SIGNIFICANT EVENTS:

There has been an increase in the enemies use of booby traps, shiper fire and mortar fire. There has been no major contact in the TAOR. Intelligence sources indicate that the enemy is replenishing his supplies and personnel foraa major ground effort.

4. ENEMY SITUATION AT THE END OF THE PERIOD:

Since the beginning of the month enemy ground activity has decreased. He is apparently using small sized units to harass patrols and cadre for training the local VC in the use and deployment of booky traps.

OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

1. The following training was conducted by the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines during the period 1-30 June 1967. Throughout this period the Battalion was engaged in heavy and constant patrolling.

- (1) At 0740H, Company "K", found a grave at YD 071669 with 1 NVA body in uniform without weapon. Results: 1 NVA/KIA CONF
- (2) At 1720H, Company "L", at YD 053649 and Company "I" at YD 059642 received 25 rounds of incoming 60mm morters from vicinity YD 052642. Returned fire with 81mm Horters and Artillery. Results: (39) USAC WIA.

b. 02 June 1967:


- (1) At 1810H, Company "L" observed 5 persons at YD 068660. Opened fire with LAAW, N-79, and Small arms. Results: (1) NVA/KIA PROB
- (2) At 1900H, Company "I", at YD 056651 received 4 incoming 82mm Mortars from vicinity YD 043657. Returned fire with 81mm and Artillery. Results: (2) USEC WIA
- (3) At 1920H, H&S Company at YD 062649 received 10 incoming 82mm Mortar rounds from vicinity YD 043657. Returned fire with 81mm and Artillery. Results: No friendly casualties.

c. 14 June 1967:

(1) At 1945H, a friendly Shrike type gir to ground missile Control outside Camp J J CARROLL perimeter at vicinity YD 059559. Not I friendly casualties.

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d. 15 Juno 1967:

(1) At 1115H, Company "M", while on a search and destroy mission, detonated an anti-personnel mine, while probing a punji pit cover to place a charge inside punji pit at YD 120527. Results: (12) USPO WIA

e. 16 June 1967:

- (1) At 2115H, Company "K" spotted moving lights at vicinity YD 025590, 035576, 039582. Fired 60mm and called Artillery mission. Lights went out. Results of firing mission unknown.
- (2) At 2030H, Company "K" at YD 031581 received 16 rounds incoming 40mm fire. Believed to be friendly. Results: (3) USMC WIA.

f. 17 June 1967:

(1) At 2230H, Company "M" heard movement at vicinity YD 019593. Called in 81mm illumination and opened fire with small arms. Results: Unknown.

g. 18 June 1967:

(1) At 2230H, Company "I" heard movement at vicinity YD 100510, Called in 81mm illumination and opened fire with small arms. Results: Unknown.

h. 20 June 1967:

- (1) At 1245H, Company "M" tripped a booby trap, while crossing hedge row at YD 102527. Results: (2) USIC WIA
- (2) At 1330H, Company "M" tripped a booby trapped anti-personnel mine on heavily weeded trail at YD 097485. Results: (3) USMC WIA.
- (3) At 2015H, Company "M" apprehended (1) male Vietnamese at YD 106543, without identification. Individual was taken to Cam Lo for interrogation.

i. 21 June 1967:

(1) At 1850H, Company "M", at YD 120526 spotted VC in black pajamas and carrying weapons at vicinity YD 122531. Called in Artillery mission with unknown results.

j. 22 June 1967:

- (1) At 1015H, Company "M" found 3 NVA graves at YD 124500. Results: (3) NVA/KIA CONF
- (2) At 1130H, Company "M", at YD 121510, while on patrol received one round small arms sniper fire from vicinity YD 125510. No friendly casualties.



- (3) At 1135H, Company "M" tripped a booby trap at YD 105438. Results: (1) USHC WIA
- (4) At 1215H, Company "M" tripped a booby trap at YD 129511. Results: (3) USMC WIA
- (5) At 1900H, Company "L", while on sweep at YD 081596, tripped two booby traps. Results: (1) USMC KIA, (7) USMC WIA

k. 23 June 1967:

- (1) At 0930H, Company "L" had one man trip a booby trapped Chicom grenado at YD 083599. Rosults: (1) USMC WIA
- (2) At 1725H, Company "L" at YD 072625 received 10 rounds sporatic small arms sniper fire from vicinity 078622. Roturned fire with small arms. Results: (1) USNC KIA
- (3) At 2100H, Company "M" tripped a booby trap at YD 120503, while moving into night time position. Results: (3) USHC WIA
- (4) At 2250H, Company "M" at YD 101511 spotted 2 figures at YD 115515. Opened fire with 7 rounds M-79 and flares. Results: Unknown.

1. 24 June 1967:

- (1) At 1000H, Company "M" apprehended one Vietnamese male with 20 small bags of rice and one Vietnamese female with 4000 plasters at vicinity YD 095515. Both were sent to Cam Lo for interrogation. Results: Both were released.
- (2) At 1603H, Company "N" apprehended 3 Viotnamese males carrying scythes at YD 062582. Two had ID Cards and were released. One had no ID Card and rotained for interrogation. Results: (1) Detaince.

25 June 1967:

- (1) At 1515H, Company "M" Found harboring site at YD 135535. Also found clothing and documents. Results: Clothing destroyed and documents returned to rear.
- it 1545H, Company "K" apprehended two Vietnamese females without ID Cards at YD 063570. Taken to Cam Lo for interrogation. Results: (2) Detainces.
- (3) At 1930H, Company "L" at YD 067605 received 35 rounds 60mm mortar fire from vicinity YD 077622. Artillery mission called. Results: No friendly casualties.

26 Juno 1967:

At 1700H, Company "M" spotted 12 individuals, called AO who received three rounds sniper fire from vicinity YD 118539. At developed banks ongino trouble and had to return to base. ENCLOSURE (1)

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- o. 29 June 1967:
 - (1) At 1235H, Company "M" dostroyed a concussion typo explosive device at YD 125513.

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SECTION Y

LOGISTICS

1. General:

- a. There were no major logistical problems encountered during this reporting period. One Battalion size operation was conducted. All units in the field were resupplied by helicopter through the LSA at Dong Ha. Outstanding support in this respect was rendered by the 3d Shore Party Battalion; by personnel at the ISA and HST teams in the field.
- b. The move of the Battalion from the field (and some of its elements from Dong Ha) to Camp Carroll and to Ba Long and D-5 was effected smoothly. 9th Motors provided sufficient vehicles for the move. The S-4, 3d Marines was instrumental in arranging for India Company's helolift to Ba Long.
- c. Resupply of units at Camp Carroll, and at the outposts at D-5 and Khe Gia Bridge were accomplished by truck without incident. India Company at Ba Long was resupplied daily by helicopter directly from the ISA. HST teams were readily provided by 3d Shore Party Battalion for companies conducting sweeps of three or more days.

2. Supply:

a. Overall supply support during this period was excellent. There was a serious shortage of sandbags at one point but this has been corrected. There still exists numerous shortages in the area of "in country" allowances.

3. Transportation:

- a. Notor transport support from the 3d Marines and 9th Motors for tactical and administrative requirements has been sufficient.
- b. Heavy employment of the M-274A1(mule) for administrative tasks has resulted in deadlining of a large number of those vehicles. Therefore, a Division Order has placed them in Administrative Deadline for tectical use only.
- c. Spare part shortages for vehicles do exist but has not presented a serious problem in the 1st and 2nd Echelons of Maintenance.

COMMUNICATIONS AND ELECTRONICS

1. Radio:

The Battalion established and maintained the following radio circuits:

2. Viro:

- A complete new wire system was installed with throo switch boards (SB-72) stacked to provide adequate wire communications within the Battalion CP.
- b. .: switchboard (SB-22) and wire system was installed at the Bridge and at the D-5 Defensive positions.

3. Radio Relay:

i radio relay shot was established by the 3d Marino Regiment from Camp J J CARROLL to the C.C unit located in the D-5 area. One (1) channel was allocated to the Battalion for telecom between the Battalion CP and Mike Company CP in D-5, with hours of operation from 0700-1930 daily.

4. Power:

The 11th Engineers Bettalion provided Camp power for the Battage throughout the month of June. VI-1

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SECTION VIII

AIR SUPPORT

- 1. Air support continued to be a major supporting element for operations in Juno. Statistics below indicate the use of air.
- 2. Several new procedures have been introduced to the TACP: Night MedEvac for a squad size ambush presented one problem because the radio operator was not properly briefed and equipped. Each efternoon the TACP member now briefs the squad on proper procedures for MedEvacs. All night ambushes now carry at least three flash lights for use in guiding MedEvacs.

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SECTION IX

MEDICAL AFFAIRS

- 1. Medical problems encountered during this reporting period were in the field of sanitation end the treatment of non-hostile casualties in outlaying areas.
- 2. Upon arrival at the Battalion's new camp site a large rat problem was evident. At the end of this reporting period a firm rat control program is underway with excellent results. Latrines were relocated and Heads renovated in the area. At this time area sanitation is good with daily improvements. Lost man hours have been difficult to avoid due to having to transport patients from outlaying areas to the BAS for treatment of Jungle Rot and infections, which consisted mostly of hot soaks and antibiotics on a daily level. The Battalion Aid Station had had improvements made daily in the working area assigned. Bunker facilities for artillery attack are good with a large medical holding bunker for the treatment of casualties and a large bunker for the protection of patients interned on the ward.
- 3. MedCap has been held on a twice weekly basis in the D-5 area since our arrival here with a total of 377 civilians receiving treatment.

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SECTION X

CIVIL AFFAIRS

- 1. This unit has treated approximately 377 Victnamese civilians through our MEDCAP program, and is currently employing 50 Montgnards to clear fields of fire outside our perimeter wire.
- 2. On 27 June 1967, six houses were destroyed as the result of a defective 60mm Mortar round. The heads of the families were issued six sheets of tin, pots and pans, rice, bulgar, corn, salad oil, and will be awarded a solatium payment of 500 \$VN per family.
- 3. One woman suffered minor burns on her back and was treated by the Bettalion surgeon. She will be awarded 300 \$VN via a solatium payment.

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SECTION XI

LESSONS LEARNED PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

1. ITEM: Artillery and Aircraft:

- a. Clearance of routine artillery missions is often excessively delayed by a general "Check Fire" for Aircraft in the area. In practice it is often impossible for the Commanding Officer to exercise his responsibility as Fire Support Coordinator within his TMOR. A routine resupply mission once airborne seems to result in an automatic cancellation of all fires for the duration of the mission without regard to the actual presence of aircraft in the area. Attempts to divert aircraft and get fires cleared usually result in total frustration and end with neither supply nor Artillery support. During a multi-Battalion operation someono's aircraft is bound to be constantly on the Gun Target Line. On the question of Save-a-plane this Battalion has actually experienced delays of up to 30 minutes while a Save-a-plane was established for one marking found of illumination, even though H&I fires were continuing to be fired in the same grid as that requested for the illumination round. The conduct of fire not is so cluttered with "Clearing" stations that inquiries as to delay result in a series of "Wait Outs" which provide neither information nor fire.
- b. RECOMMENDATION: That the problem of fire support coordination be studied with a view towards flexibility in diverting aircraft, switching missions to different gun positions to alter the gun target line, the reduction of blanket check fires for entire TAOR's and the elimination of unnecessary Save-a-planes.

2. ITEM: Ammunition and 782 Gear:

- a. Experience has dictated modifications to the Basic Allowance of ammunition carried and the items of 782 gear issued.
- b. RECOMMENDATION: That the following items of ammunition and 782 gear be taken into consideration as basic allowance:
 - (1) Basic Ammunition allowance for Rifle Company:
 - (a) M-16 ammo: 7 Magazines and 1 Bandoleer

(b) M-26 as prescribed.

- (c) Smoke grenade: 2 Red, 2 Green, and 5 Yellow per squad.
- (d) Hand held illumination: 2 Red, 2 Green, and 4 White per Squad.

(o) Claymores as prescribed.

(f) Trip Flares: 1 per fire team.

(g) LAAWS: 1 Per Squad.

h) M-79: 24 Rounds.

(i) M-60 ammo: Gunner 100 rounds, Armo Carrier 400 rounds, Team Loader 200 rounds, Squad Loader 200 rounds, Asst Gunner 300 rounds, Members armed with M-16 carry 7 Magazines.

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(j) 60mm Mortar Section: Rifleman 7 Magazines, HE 8 rounds, per gun team, WP 6 rounds per gun team, illumination 5 rounds per gun team.

(2) 782 Goar Issued:

- (a) Blankets: One during monsoon season.
- (b) Mosquito Net: One during hot season.
- (c) Boots: One pair during hot season, 2 pair during monsoon.

(d) Suspender Straps: Upon request.

(e) Mosquito Head Net: One during hot season.

- (f) Canteens: 3 per man during hot season, 2 per man during monsoon.
- (g) Ponchos: One per man during hot season, 2 per man during monsoon.
- (h) Haversack: One per man, No knapsack.

3. ITEM: Artillery and Aircraft Preparation Fires:

- a. Often artillery and Air to ground preparation firing tend to give away the intended objective and mission.
- b. RECOMENDATION: That Artillery and Air to ground preparations should be fired on different locations simultaneously, in order to confuse the energy as to what objective you are moving to.

4. ITEM: Resupply and MedEvac Helicopters:

- a. With the enemies increased use of rockets and nortars, it is apparent that the resupply and MedEvac helicopters are becoming prime targets. It is important that when helicopters land that there is maximum dispersion and that helmets and flak jackets be worn.
- b. RECOMMENDATION: That when supplies are dropped in the LZ, have a rainirum of men helping with the handling of supplies to avoid a concentration of men. It is also not desirable to be resupplied in what will be your next night time position, when you know you will be on the move the next day and can be resupplied at a temporary position.

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
