

a. Personnel. The Battery operated at close to T.O. strength from 1 January through 11 March 1970. On 11 March 70 the Battery embarked aboard the USS VANCOUVER with six (6) officers and 205 enlisted men. Immediately upon arrival in CONUS on 27 March 70, 103 men were transferred for release from Active Duty. On 31 March 70, 75 enlisted and 3 officers were transferred on PCS Orders. The Battery strength upon arrival at Camp Lejeune on 16 May 70 was 2 officers and 26 enlisted. The Battery is expected to be at T.O strength by 30 June 70.

b. Administration. Some administrative problems have been encountered since the Battery arrived at Camp Lejeune. The Directives and records arrived incomplete with many out of date and missing changes. Continuity of administrative work has been nonexistant since no administrative personnel arrived with the Battery. Battery personnel are in the process of reworking the directives system and writing new Battery Orders.

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- c. Intelligence. Current Intelligence Summarys
- d. Training. Informal on-the-job training was held on a daily basis while in Vietnam. In addition to fam firing, individual and crew-served weapons, FDC classes in specialized topics and firing battery drills were conducted. During 28-31 January 70 a direct fire demonstration was conducted on a section level and then on a Battery level. During February and March there was embarkaton training in preparation for return to CONUS. Since the arrival at Camp Lejeune all available time has been spent on inventorying, maintenance and turn in of equipment.
- e. Special Operations. The Battery participated in two artillery raids during the period covered. The first was TASK FORCE SMITH #2 from 14-18 January 70 where 1600 rounds were expended. The second was 6/33d ARTYTASK FORCE from 28-31 January 70 where 1056 rounds were expended.
- f. NBC. None
- g. Command and Control. The Battery has been under the command and control of 1st Marine Division, Force Troops FMFPac, 5th MEB and Force Troops FMFLant.
- h. Close Combat. The Battery received incoming rockets and mortar rounds on several occasions during this period while serving in RVN.

j. Logistics. During the month of January a complete inventory of all T E equipment, a comprehensive T A and a new 782 gear control system was initiated and put into action. Initial preparation for possible embarkation including inventories, manifests and marking was completed in early February. Preparation for embarkation was the main project during February and early March. The Battery embarked on 11 March 70. The main project since arrival at Camp Lejeune has been inventoring equipment and surveying that equipment which is unserviceable. 2nd FSR is in the process of performing 3rd and 4th echelon maintenance on all six 175mm guns. All motor transport vehicles have been turned over to 2nd FSR for survey or repair. The general condition of all supply items including the supply records which arrived at Camp Lejeune is poor. A complete inventory and ordering of all supplies needed is currently underway.

#### 1. Close Air Support. None

M. Civil Affairs/Military Government/Community Relations. During January 3 MedCaps were held at the Refugee Camp at Cam Lo in Quan Cam Lo District. Approximately 180 persons were treated at each MedCap. Various Medical supplies were given to the local priest for distribution as necessary. In February several civilians were hired to work on the Battery Area, so more Marines would be free to work toward embarkation.

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n. Fiscal Matters. There are no records at this Command to show how much money was alloted between 31 December 1969 and 1 June 1970. This Battery has spent money alloted to the Second Field Artillery Group from 1 June until 12 June 1970, when all spending in the Battery was suspended. During the period 1 June until 12 June 1970 the Battery spent \$5,723.58 in OFF's and \$3,756.04 in OPBUD for a total of \$9,479.62.

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
