PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the period 1-31 January 1968, the 5th Marines operated intensively within their TAOR in Quang Nam Province with the 3d Battalion of the regiment and with the continued operational control of the 2d Battalion, 3d Marines until 12 January 1968 when the 5th Marines was chopped to direct operational control of Task Force XRAY and moved north to Thua Thien Province in accordance with Operation CHECKMATE. The 2d Battalion, 3d Marines and 3d Battalion, 5th Marines were chopped to the direct operational control of the 1st Marine Division. The 1st Battalion of the regiment operated intensively in the Phu Loc District, Thua Thien Province. The 2d Battalion of the regiment operated in the An Hoa area under direct operational control of 1st Marine Division until 011200H January, when they were returned to operational control of the 5th Marine Regiment. On 13 January, the 2d Battalion moved to the Phu Bai area, Thua Thien Province and began operating in and around Phu Bai. On 30 January, the Phu Bai AO was chopped to 1st Marines and the 2d Battalion moved south to the Phu Loc AO to begin development of a battalion assembly area.

Priority of operational efforts within the Regimental TAOR in Quang Nam Province was directed at the protection of the Da Nang vital area and the support of the Revolutionary Development effort. Aggressive day and night patrolling and ambushes were conducted with intensification of efforts within the Rocket Belt; all avenues of ingress and egress including waterways were kept under constant surveillance and interdiction; and reaction forces were maintained in readiness for contingency defense of centers of Vietnamese political and economic importance and other military installations such as those of the Combined Action Group.

Priority of operational efforts within the Regimental AO in Thua Thien Province was directed to securing Highway 1 (the MSR from Hai Van Pass to Phu Bai) and the support of the revolutionary development effort. Aggressive patrolling and ambushes were conducted along the MSR with emphasis on bridges and culvert security. Strong points were established to provide security for key locations, and to provide ready reaction forces for all Combined Action Platoons and centers of Vietnamese political and economic importance.

7 Feb 1968PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Personnel and Administration. The command received an input of 14 officers and 404 enlisted personnel during the month of January from normal replacement channels.

A total of 1 officer and 142 enlisted personnel were medically evacuated out of RVN during the month.

The average chargeable strength for the Regiment was 138 Marine Officers, 3528 Marine enlisted, 9 Naval Officers and 157 Naval enlisted personnel.

2. Intelligence

a. General. During the month of January 1968, the S-2 section continued planning and preparation for and executed Operation CHECKERS, the Regimental move into the Phu Loc and Phu Bai Areas of Operations. On 10 January, the S-2 with 3 members of the S-2 section deployed to Phu Bai with the Advance CP Group, and the remainder of the section closed Phu Bai on 12 January.

Turnover liaison was immediately established with the 3rd Marine Division G-2 and 2nd Battalion, 26th Marines S-2. Assistance provided by the 3rd Marine Division included the transfer of 10 Kit Carson Scouts from the Phu Bai-Phu Loc area to 5th Marines. Operational liaison was established with the newly activated Task Force XRAY G-2; 1st CI Team, FIF; and Combined Action Group 3 Hqs. In addition, liaison visits to Thua Thien Sector Hq, and 1st ARVN Division were conducted.

On 2 January 1968, Gunnery Sergeant R. WHITE joined the S-2 section as the S-2 Chief Analyst, and on 12 January, 1stLt B.Z. MOORE was assigned as the Assistant S-2.

During the period 3-14 January, LCpl P.J. GIVENS attended school on the AN/PPS-6 and is now developing lesson plans for a radar operator's course.

d. Significant aspects of enemy, weather, and terrain:

(1) Enemy.

(a) The enemy encountered at the end of December on Operation AUBURN (believed to have been elements of the V-25 Bn) withdrew to the west and southwest, leaving local guerrillas to cover the withdrawal.

(b) Responsibly developed intelligence indicated the presence of a regimental headquarters, 2 NVA battalions, 2 Main Force battalions, 2 NVA Engineer/Sapper companies and 1 local force company, with a total estimated strength of 2000, operating in the area from the Troui River Valley to the Hai Van Pass (Phu Loc AO).

(c) Enemy activity during the first 6 days of the month consisted of reconnaissance and observation in the Phu Loc AO.

(d) On 7 January, an enemy force of 2 battalions reinforced with sapper and local guerrillas effected a carefully-planned, coordinated attack on the Phu Loc District Headquarters, Combined Action Platoons H-6 & H-7, 1/5 Battalion Command Post and Co D 1/5 outpost. The enemy sapper elements successfully penetrated the District Headquarters and CAP H-6, and completely overran CAP H-7. The attacks on 1st Battalion, 5th Marines positions, however, were limited to attacks by fire with mortars and RPG series rocket launchers. Enemy forces involved are believed to have been the 1st Bn, 4th NVA Regiment, K4B Main Force VC Battalion, the C118 Local Force Company, the C19 Engineer Company and the C24 Sapper Company.

(e) Following the successful attacks of 7 January, the enemy withdrew into his mountain retreats, and largely confined his activities to harrassing mortar and small arms contacts, as well as continued interdiction and mining of the MSR. During this period, enemy activity was negligible in the Phu Bai AO.

(f) On 30 January, it is believed that a major attack (part of the "Tet Campaign") on Phu Loc District Headquarters and 1/5 Battalion Command Post was averted by early discovery of an estimated NVA Co by a 1st Force Recon Co Team, "Pearl Chest". Quick reaction by Co B 1/5, which immediately deployed into the heavily canopied mountain area south-southeast of Phu Loc served to further disrupt the enemy's plans. However, on 31 January, the enemy attacked CAP's H-3 and 8, and the Troui River Bridge, as well as Bridges 6 and 7 with an estimated reinforced Main Force VC Company. At the same time, the enemy attacked the Phu Bai Vital Area with 122mm rockets to commence a program of random H&I fires.

(g) With the exception of the Phu Loc attack on 7 January, enemy contacts during the month retained their guerrilla characteristics until the beginning of the Tet Campaign, at 1800H on 29 January. The enemy then adopted more nearly conventional warfare tactics.

(2) Weather. During the reporting period, the weather conditions have not significantly affected friendly operations in the Phu Loc and Phu Bai Areas of Operations, with the occasional exception of low ceilings restricting air support.

(3) Terrain. The movement of friendly forces out of the rice paddies and flat lands into the mountainous areas around Phu Loc was significant. Little detailed information concerning the heavily canopied mountains to the south was available. The S-2 section is making extensive efforts to develop terrain and trail information, utilizing photography, reconnaissance inserts and organic patrols with considerable success.

c. Miscellaneous.

(1) On 10 January, Co A 1/5 apprehended 2 NVA PW's, one a Sergeant from the 4th Bn, 5th NVA Regiment (AKA 1st Bn, 4th NVA Regiment), who confirmed the presence of this battalion in the Phu Loc area which had previously been reported by Chieu Hoi.

(2) The escape from enemy captivity and the return of 2 USMC Combined Action Platoon personnel, who were captured by the enemy during the 7 January attack, provided the S-2 section with extensive tactical infor-

action on enemy positions and trails. This information is being exploited with supporting arms.

3. Training. During the reporting period, 1 January to 31 January 1968, the following number of personnel attended formal schools; in addition normal OJT and indoctrination of replacement personnel continued. There was a significant number of Marines who attended Combined Action Group School and were subsequently reassigned to a CAG Unit.

4. Operations. During the month of January, the 3d Battalion, 5th Marines continued on Operation AUBURN until 031530H January 1968. Due to the size of the initial contact, and intelligence reports that the enemy was retreating west, the 3d Battalion was ordered to continue the attack in a westerly sweep along the Song Cau Lau River. The sweep was marked by light to moderate contact, however it was evident that a large size enemy force had recently occupied the area.

The 5th Marines and the 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines completed Operation CHECKERS which moved the two units north to join the 1st Battalion in the Thua Thien Province. The 3d Battalion was chopped to the 1st Marine Division.

The 1st and 2d Battalion, 5th Marines conducted numerous company sized and smaller sized operations to familiarize the units with the new AO and to gain information on targets for future battalion sized operations. Emphasis was placed on sweeps of the low coastal, well populated areas, and reconnaissance patrols along the edges of the canopy to locate and mark trails and routes of ingress for future operations.

The regiment maintained strong point reaction forces for key bridges and terrain, and for Combined Action Platoons and political installations within the AO.

The Main Supply Route from Hai Van Pass to Phu Bai presented initial problems for the regiment, for the enemy interdicted Highway #1 often by the destruction of bridges and culverts along the highway. The 1st Battalion saturated the 29.5 mile long stretch with intensive patrols and ambushes and successfully opened the MSR to convoys.

5. Fire Support

a. The 2d Battalion, 11th Marines continues to be in direct support of the 5th Marines. During the month of January the following missions were fired in support of the 5th Marine Regiment.

7. Logistics. Normal operations within the TAOR were supported logistically during the month of January through both surface means and helicopter. The first four days of January saw the end of Operation AUBURN, a battalion size operation in the Go Noi Island area of Quang Nam Province. A temporary LSA was set up in 3d Battalion, 5th Marines Command Post with Class I, III, V and limited Class II supplies.

The most significant events of the month were the moves of Hq, 5th Marines and 2d Battalion, 5th Marines from the Da Nang TAOR and An Hoa TAOR respectively to the Phu Bai AO. Headquarters moved north by helicopter, fixed wing, LCU and motor convey from 11 through 16 January. 2d Battalion moved from An Hoa to Phu Bai entirely by Air Force fixed wing, with the advance party moving on 9 January and the main body closing on 13, 14 and 15 January.

1st Battalion, 5th Marines suffered substantial material losses in mortar attacks on 7 and 12 January. Large quantities of tents, 782 gear, individual clothing and boots were replaced.

The opening of 5th Marines Messhall was delayed four days until 20 January while the entire messhall was re-screened, thoroughly cleaned and painted throughout.

A large amount of RUC gear which had backed up while units moved was delivered from LZ 23 to Hq Co, 1st Battalion and 2d Battalion. Arrangements were made to have all subsequent gear from FLC at Da Nang forwarded to Shipping and Receiving at FLSC-ALPHA, Phu Bai.

On 26 January, a change was made in the 5th Marines AO which resulted in 2d Battalion being required to move to the field in the Phu Loc area, establishing a rear in the Hq, 5th Marines cantonment. Preparations were begun to construct a hardened base camp in the Phu Loc AO while conducting combat operations in the area. The move to the field was accomplished by motor convoy from 26 through 31 January with 1st Battalion, 1st Marines relieving in place.

8. Communications. From 1 to 10 January, communications elements provided support in the Quang Nam TAOR for tactical operations in addition to furnishing support for liaison purposes to 3d Battalion, 2d ROKMC Brigade. Communications was maintained with the 1st Battalion at Phu Loc via an AN/MRC-63 radio relay site at Hai Van Pass.

On 10 January, the advance party departed for Phu Bai and with the minimum of difficulty, completed the necessary communications installations for the Regimental Command Group on 12 January. Upon arrival of the Regimental Commander, the rear command post in Quang Nam was closed and command and control of the 5th Marines established in Thua Thien Province.

Commencing 13 January, communications planning for combat operations was conducted in conjunction with operational planning.

9. Medical. During the month of January, a total of 72 patients were treated at the Regimental Aid Station of which some 60% or 43 were referrals from the battalions. In addition, a number of Vietnamese civilians were treated for humanitarian reasons, and in MEDCAPS conducted regularly by the Regimental Surgeon. On 12 January 1968, the Regimental Aid Station was moved to Phu Bai and was operational by 15 January 1968.

10. Dental. During the reporting period, a total of 122 Marines and several Vietnamese civilians were treated at the mobile dental unit located at the Regimental Command Post, of which some 70% or 86 were from Headquarters Company itself. On 12 January, the Regimental Dental Clinic was moved with the Regimental Command Post to the Phu Bai AO.

11. Civil Affairs. During the period 1 to 12 January, no new civic action projects were planned nor commenced due to the impending displacement.

The 1st Battalion, 5th Marines at Phu Loc established a temporary MEDCAP station just outside the tactical wire enclosing the Command Post. Liaison has been between the Unit Civil Affairs Officer and the Loc Tri Village Chief and the Phu Loc District Chief for the purpose of determining civic action

needs. Project submittal sheets for repairs of a school and the construction of a well in the school yard were turned over to the village officials. The project submittal sheets have not been returned to the Civil Affairs Officer as yet.

The 2d Battalion, 5th Marines due to operational commitments and changes in areas of operation have not as yet established an effective civic action program.

The 5th Marines Command Post located in the Phu Bai area, which is the AO of the 1st Marines, has conducted no civic action, however assistance is available to the 1st Marines upon request.

Approximately 4,000 TEF gifts were distributed by the 5th Marines, 1,500 were distributed by units of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, the remainder was passed to CAG 3 for distribution by the Alpha and Hotel CAP units in the Thua Thien Province.

12. Psychological Operations. During the month of January, 11,100 leaflets were hand distributed in and around the CAP units in the 5th Marines AO. 1,725 posters, 2,000 newsletters, 21 hours of ground broadcasting time and 100 magazines were also distributed in the 5th Marines AO. 20,000 aerial leaflets were dropped in the Da Nang TAOR on 5 January 1968.

The themes of the leaflets, ground broadcasts, posters, and newsletters were Chieu Hoi, Health and Sanitation, Rewards for Mines and Booby Traps, Safe Conduct Passes, VC Terror, Support the Government of Vietnam, and Allied Power. The magazines covered agricultural themes and were distributed to farmers.

The newsletter, THE BUTTPLATER, has been published and will continue to carry stories about improving Vietnamese and Marine Corps relations. The person to person program will continue to be stressed.

13. Chaplain. During the month of January, the Regimental Chaplain provided services for the Regiment and for Combined Action Platoons in the Regimental AO.

Encl: (1) Operations Sketch

1. Concept. One battalion (Phu Loc Bn) remains in control of Route #1 to protect bridges and culverts to keep the MSR open; to protect U.S. and GVN installations along axis of Route #1; to act as a blocking and channeling force in support of Maneuver Bn to conduct limited offensive operations in the MSR (Main Supply Route Zone); and take part in multi-battalion operations in the Phu Loc AO as directed. One battalion (Maneuver Bn) conducts offensive operations throughout Phu Loc AO, utilizing established positions of Phu Loc Bn to block and channelize enemy forces.

2. Overall Scheme of Maneuver. Conduct offensive operations with main thrust to north peninsula, driving north, then south to cross Route #1, 5 kilometers south of Route #1, then west to Song Trai. Operations to be a series of battalion drives utilizing Phu Loc Bn to block. Elements of Phu Loc Bn will be used to maneuver as targets develop. (See enclosure (1)).

3. Operations:

a. North Peninsula Drive. Maneuver Bn drives from Song Trai east, with left flank on coast to strike villages Long On Ngai, Thoi Phu Hai and adjacent hamlets; then wheels north to sweep Mai Tran Peninsula to the sea.

b. Mai Phu Gio Drive. Maneuver Bn drives south on Mai Phu Gio into blocks established by Phu Loc Bn on Route #1.

c. Mai Chin Drive. Maneuver Bn drives south to Mai Chin wheeling west to Dong Top, then south to Route #1 with left flank on Song Trai. Phu Loc Bn blocks on Route #1 and east branch of Song Trai.

d. Phu Loc Canopy Drive. Maneuver Bn drives from Loc Thuy Valley west, sweeping Hills 248 and to 246, wheeling to drive north with left flank on Bach Ma Road. Phu Loc Bn blocks as required.

Subj: Courses of Action

1. Concept of Operations

a. Organization of Ground and Disposition of Forces. Leave assigned Regimental AO in tact without internal boundaries or assignment of battalion AOs. One battalion tasked with keeping Route #1 open; security of bridges, Phu Gia Fire Base, and Phu Loc Combat Base. One battalion assigned as maneuver battalion to locate and destroy enemy forces in entire AO. Battalion responsible for Route #1 located at Phu Loc Combat Base (ZC076985). Maneuver battalion would establish a Log-Admin Base in AO at a point designated.

b. Supporting Arms

(1) Air and Naval Gunfire. Unaffected.

(2) Artillery. Artillery firing positions now established at Phu Loc and Phu Gia would remain in position with no change. Battery supporting maneuver battalion would be able to transit Route #1 to support all operations conducted by maneuver battalion. Relocation of all firing units of DS Arty Bn would require location of DS Arty Bn CP in Phu Loc AO for command and control.

2. Considerations

a. Location of Log-Admin Base of Maneuver Bn at Rock Crusher Site (ZD0202)

(1) Advantages

(a) Location of base of operations for maneuver battalion can be based on logistics and admin requirements only. Colocating with CB unit at rock crusher would enhance facilities to support battalion in the field.

(b) Location of maneuver bn H&S Co at rock crusher would eliminate requirement of 1 rifle company to defend that site.

(c) Location of rock crusher is on MSR 15 kilometers from Phu Bai Base.

(d) Location of maneuver battalion DS battery at rock crusher would have equal logistics and admin advantages. DS battery could support

all operations of maneuver battalion from positions on Route #1.

(2) Disadvantages

(a) Log-Admin Base would be located in western portion of AO a great distance of eastern boundary.

(b) DS battery would require preselected secure positions on Route #1, with infantry protection, to support operations.

b. Location of Combat Base of Maneuver Bn at Coco Palms Area (ZD1701)

(1) Advantages

(a) Excellent defense of area. Grazing fire for at least 2,000 meters all around.

(b) DS battery can support operations from stationary position.

(c) Maneuver battalion can operate from base, centered in AO, to any part of AO.

(2) Disadvantages

(a) Low ground with water seepage at two feet. All strongpoint positions would have to be above ground.

(b) Seasonal rains would limit use of base to dry season only.

c. Location of Maneuver Bn with Phu Loc Bn at Phu Loc Combat Base (ZC0798)

(1) Advantages

(a) Base already established, would require limited expansion.

(b) Added strength of H&S elements of maneuver bn would free tactical formations now employed around base.


(c) Command and control of two battalions colocated would be simplified.

(2) Disadvantages

(a) Increasing target mass for massing of enemy mortars.

(b) Two battalions based in same area of large AO limiting reaction time.

(c) All artillery based in one site, non-mutual supporting.

1. Purpose. To provide training syllabus guidelines for possible jungle operations.
2. General. In view of the increased likelihood that the 5th Marines will possibly be operating in jungle terrain, this command feels it necessary to publish a training syllabus to better prepare the individual Marine and his unit for such operations. Jungle operations require special equipment and specific knowledge of the techniques which will enhance the performance of a unit working under conditions peculiar to jungle terrain. This command feels that the Marine will be prepared to meet these conditions if he is properly instructed in the subjects listed in enclosure (1).
3. Actions. It is the unit commanders responsibility to see that all members of his unit are properly instructed and prepared for operations in dense jungle terrain. Emphasis is placed on techniques which will enable the individual Marine and his unit to fight, live and move in the varied types of terrain, vegetation, and climatic conditions which the jungle presents. The topics listed in enclosure (1) are recommended to be included in any jungle training syllabus set up by subject commands.

Training Syllabus Guidelines

Jungle Navigation: Due to increased difficulty in navigation in dense jungle terrain, units should work to increase their proficiency in map reading, use of compasses, and employment of pacers. Stress detail of prior planning by small unit leaders as to best route, to include compass courses for each leg of the route, and number of paces required for each leg, plus compensation of obstacles which must be traversed.

(Note: For additional guidance, see paragraph 32 of reference (a); and reference (b))

Obstacles: In dense jungle, the Marine is likely to encounter obstacles he is unfamiliar with. Therefore attention should be given to training in traversing such obstacles. In particular, emphasis should be placed on river crossings to include different type rope bridges and their method of employment. Rappelling should also be taught, introduce necessary equipment, and methods of rappelling from airborne vehicles, as well as cliffs and hilly terrain.

(Note: For additional guidance, see reference (a); reference (c); and paragraphs 139, 146 and 147 of reference (d))

Survival: Emphasis should be placed on personal hygiene, tropical diseases, and on equipment needed to help the Marine survive in the jungle, and on field expedients at his disposal.

(Note: For additional guidance, see references (a) and (c))

Communications: Due to thick vegetation and canopy overhead, communications could present a problem in the jungle. Therefore Marines should understand how to use various methods at his disposal to rig antennas and other communication systems that will help him in dense jungle areas.

(Note: For additional guidance, see paragraph 4 of reference (a); and chapter 6 of reference (f))

Tactical Considerations: Emphasis should be placed on movement, ambush and counter ambush techniques, and on night defense. Thick growth may limit movement and employment of troops. Quite often, a unit is forced to travel in column, giving the enemy the opportunity of ambush. Also terrain may not lend itself to standard perimeter night defenses. Units should give thought to "Y" type night defenses in these areas.

- (6) Be prepared to support any U. S. or GVN unit under enemy attack in the Phu Bai AO.
- (7) Be prepared to assume the mission of the maneuver battalion or the responsibility for conduct of operations in the Phu Loc AO.

d. Bn (Rein), 5th Marines (Phu Loc AO)

- (1) Establish a combat base in the Phu Loc AO.
- (2) Conduct offensive operations in the Phu Loc AO to destroy enemy personnel and materiel.
- (3) Establish strongpoints of defense of designated key bridges and installations, and conduct mine sweeping and clearing operations to keep Route #1 open.
- (4) Establish strongpoints of defense of other key installations as directed.
- (5) Conduct maximum patrolling and ambush operations at and near obvious targets for attack or destruction by utilizing pre-planned and observed artillery and mortar fires, command detonated mines, and organic infantry weapons.
- (6) Deny less critical targets by maximum but well controlled use of mines and booby traps, and H&I artillery fires taking full advantage of the antipersonnel but nondestructive effects of VT on bridges and culverts.
- (7) Be prepared to support any U. S. or GVN installation or unit under or threatened by enemy attack in the Phu Loc AO.
- (8) Be prepared to assume the mission of the maneuver battalion or the responsibility for conduct of operations in the Phu Bai AO.

e. Coordinating Instructions

- (1) Areas of Operations: Annex C (Operations Overlay).
- (2) Battalions will be rotated in missions and AOs on order. Task organization of battalions will be as set forth in Annex A (Task Organization) for assigned mission and AO.

1. SUMMARY OF ENEMY SITUATION

a. Enemy Forces

(1) Appendix 1 (Intelligence Estimate)

- b. PW's, captured documents and recent enemy activities indicate that the most probable course of action to be taken by the enemy is the continuing interdiction of Highway 1 by a combination of mining, explosive devices, mortar/rocket attacks, sapper attacks on bridges, culverts and CAP units, and ambushes of convoys. The enemy can also be expected to use his capability to export rice and foodstuffs from the lowlands across Highway 1 into the mountainous area base camps. The enemy has the capability to conduct attacks of up to reinforced Regimental strength on friendly units and installations throughout the Area of Operations.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION

a. Essential Elements of Information

- (1) Determine if the enemy will attack friendly forces and/or installations. If so, when, where, in what strength, and with what forces?
- (2) Determine if the enemy will defend enemy held or controlled areas against friendly operations. If so, when, where, in what strength, and with what forces?
- (3) Determine if the enemy will reinforce units in or near the 5th Marines AO. If so, when, where, in what strength, and with what forces?
- (4) Determine if the enemy will withdraw. If so, when, where, with what forces, and to what new location?

- (5) Determine if the enemy will delay. If so, when, where, in what strength, and with what forces?
- (6) Determine if the enemy will employ NBC weapons. If so what types, when, where, by what units, with what delivery means, and how many?
- (7) Determine the correct locations of enemy units and strengths.
- (8) Determine the location of all roads, trails, river fords, and bridges not shown on the map and the conditions of all roads, trails, fords, and bridges within the AO.

b. Other Intelligence Requirements

- (1) Determine VC/NVA land and water routes for the infiltration of personnel and material into RVN: Give special attention to routes leading into and through the Regiment's area of operations.
- (2) Determine the attitude of the local population towards the Marines and VC/NVA forces in areas defined as pacified, under pacification, cleared, neither GVN or VC/NVA controlled and VC controlled. What factors affect these attitudes?
- (3) Determine methods employed by the VC/NVA to control the population and to instill and maintain a hostile attitude towards Americans in the minds of the local population. What is the relative effectiveness of these different methods?
- (4) Determine the effect of aircraft bombing, artillery, naval gunfire and tank fire on enemy emplacements with regard to material damage, casualties, and the morale of both VC and civilian population?
- (5) Determine the enemy's capability of employing and/or defending against NBC warfare.
- (6) Determine which controlled main routes, bridges, and areas are of interest to the enemy.
- (7) Determine which areas are controlled by the enemy; and to what extent this control is maintained.
- (8) Determine the enemy's anti-vehicular and antimechanized

capability to include numbers and types of weapons, units possessing same, and current locations.

- (9) Determine the current location and disposition of elements of the 6th NVA Regiment.
- (10) Determine the enemy's logistic capabilities, to include methods of transport, locations of transportation units, status of supply, and locations of supply caches, hospitals, armories, and other logistical facilities.

3. INTELLIGENCE ACQUISITION

a. Area of collection responsibility

- (1) Each subordinate battalion is responsible for the overall collective effort within its assigned area of operations.
- (2) All other organic and assigned units to the 5th Marines are responsible for the collection effort within their respective areas of responsibility.

b. Orders for Subordinate Commands

- (1) All units report immediately:
 - (a) All VC/NVA sightings and contacts.
 - (b) The size, direction and location of all VC/NVA movements.
 - (c) All fighting holes, tunnels, bunkers, caves and other fortifications discovered, and their disposition.
 - (d) Any sudden increase/decrease in attendance at market place.
 - (e) Any sudden increase/decrease in attendance at MEDCAP.
 - (f) Any trails, paths or areas which VN civilians avoid using.
 - (g) All supply and arms caches found.
 - (h) All secondary explosions noted.
 - (i) All suspicious or unusual river or road traffic.
 - (j) All instances of VC/NVA warning measures and devices.

- (k) Any other information obtained to satisfy the intelligence requirements.

c. Requests to Higher and Adjacent Headquarters

(1) G-2, 1st Mar Div/Task Force X-Ray

- (a) Provide, as requested, photo imagery and APD interpretations.
- (b) Provide additional intelligence studies as developed.
- (c) Provide technical intelligence assistance as required.
- (d) Provide Special intelligence.
- (e) Coordinate exchange of pertinent intelligence information with 2nd ARVN Division elements as developed.

(2) 1st CI Team, FME

- (a) Provide up to date black lists with diacritical markings - 6 copies.
- (b) Provide agent reports as obtained.

(3) Thua Thien Province Headquarters

- (a) Provide Gazetteer of GVN/VC names for hamlets and villages - 6 copies.
- (b) Exchange pertinent intelligence information as developed.

4. MEASURES FOR HANDLING PERSONNEL, DOCUMENTS, AND MATERIAL

- a. Captured personnel and documents. Detainees and captured documents will be processed in accordance with existing directives.
- b. Captured Materials. Routine processing of captured material will be effected through normal channels to include Task Force X-Ray. Special emphasis will be placed on rapid evacuation of material having significant intelligence value of an immediate nature. Items of specific intelligence listed below will be forwarded to higher echelons as the tactical situation permits:
 - (1) All captured materials (weapons, ammunitions, foodstuffs,

and medical supplies) that have not been encountered heretofore. When large quantities of enemy materials are captured and the situation precludes evacuation, samples will be forwarded to this headquarters and the remainder destroyed.

- (2) All communications equipment.
- (3) All chemical warfare material.
- (4) VC/NVA uniforms of all types including head gear and accouterments.
- (5) Miscellaneous items such as flags, banners, political propaganda (14 copies if possible) and pictures.

5. MAPS, PHOTOGRAPHS AND AREA STUDIES

a. Maps

- (1) The standard tactical map for operations in Vietnam is Map, Vietnam, 1:50,000, AMS Series L7014. The following sheets are required for the 5th Marines TAOR: Sheets 6642 II, 6542 III, 6441 I, 6541 IV, 6541 I, 6641 IV, 6441 II, 6541 III, 6541 II, 6641 II
- (2) Requisition and distribution. Requisition and distribution will be made on an as required basis via the chain of command.

b. Aerial Photographs

- (1) A limited amount of "on hand" aerial photography is maintained at Division PIIU film library for the Hue and Phu Loc TAOR.
- (2) Photography can be obtained by submitting a photo request (in writing) to ACoS, G-2 (Attn: PIIU) in accordance with the 1st Marine Division Intelligence SOP.
- (3) Requests for high performance aerial photography should be submitted at least 15 days prior to desired delivery date. Additional delay may be anticipated during the monsoon season. This factor should be acknowledged by permitting sufficient lead time for processing.



- (j) 1st MarDiv Special Intelligence Study 13-67 (Thu Loc) of 17 Nov 1967
- (k) 1st MarDiv Special Intelligence Study 17-67 (Nam Dong) of 11 Nov 1967

1. MISSION

- a. Basic Mission. Keep MSR along Route #1 in assigned AO open. In conjunction with friendly forces protect U.S. and GVN installations, bridges, overpasses, vehicles, equipment, supplies and personnel by destroying threatening enemy forces in assigned AO. Conduct offensive operations in AO to kill or capture enemy personnel and destroy enemy weapons, material and positions.
- b. Previous Decisions
- (1) 1st Bn, 5th Marines assigned Phu Loc AO with base camp located at coordinates ZC075987.
 - (2) 2d Bn, 5th Marines assigned Phu Bai Combat Base, responsible for the Phu Bai AO.
 - (3) 3d Bn, 5th Marines assigned Phu Bai Combat Base and designated as maneuver battalion.
- c. Purpose of this Estimate. To provide sufficient intelligence information to plan and prepare to carry out the basic mission.

2. ENEMY SITUATION

a. Characteristics of Area of Operations.

- (1) Military Geography. The TAOR, located in the eastern and southern portion of Thua Thien Province, ICTZ, is divided topographically into the western mountains, the central piedmont and the coastal plain.
 - (a) The mountains which extend in a general north-south belt along the western boundary, and an east-west belt along the southern boundary, are heavily dissected and rugged with slopes ranging from 30 to 40 degrees. Evergreen secondary forests are predominant, trees range in height from 25-30 meters with some as high as 50 meters. The canopy is continuous and dark green. Tree trunks are straight, commonly 2 to 16 meters apart and unbranched to great heights. Secondary forests consist of smaller trees with a discontinuous canopy and more dense undergrowth.
 - (b) The narrow piedmont, west of Route #1, consists of undulating hills which are cut by numerous river valleys. These waterways extend like fingers from the western highlands, through the piedmont and into the coastal plain. Hills in the piedmont range from 30 to 70 meters in elevation with slopes between 10 and 20 degrees. The piedmont is predominantly secondary, broadleaf forest with some dense evergreen forest. Dense undergrowth is more abundant than in the mountains, with 15-30 foot high bamboo and palm thickets very common. There are some grass areas, growing as high as five feet, as well as small cultivated areas of dry crops.
 - (c) The coastal plain is a relatively flat strip 10 to 15 kilometers wide which extends the length of the coast. The plains are interspersed by isolated hills and ridges, and are sectioned into many areas of rice paddies bounded by dikes 2 to 5 feet high. The eastern edge of the coastal plain consists of a belt which averages 200 meters in width, of beach and sand dunes 3 to 20 meters in height. The coastal plain is characterized by canals and irrigation ditches which link together numerous streams, deltas, and distributing channels, forming a network of waterways to provide drainage, irrigation, and water transportation. In the coastal plains, wetland rice and some dry crops are the major vegetation, although dune grass and marshes are scattered throughout. Rice fields, flooded to a depth of 6 to 18 inches during the growing

SECRET

season, are drained just prior to the harvests in March and August, and are driest in September. Mature rice forms a dense grass 3 to 4 feet high. Villages are covered by a dense vegetation, including thick hedges between houses. Soils throughout the coastal area and in some inland areas are a sandy silt, poorly suited for construction, except to fill.

- (d) Good observation and fields of fire in the mountains are restricted to those areas where slopes abut open valleys. Aerial observation is severely limited by the dense vegetation. In the piedmont good observation and fields of fire can be found in the low hills and the open areas on the valley floors. Aerial observation is improved by a decrease in vegetation density but remains locally restricted by areas of dense undergrowth. In the coastal area observation and fields of fire are generally good but impeded by local irregularities and hedges in built up areas. Air observation is good.
- (e) Cover and Concealment. Cover and concealment in the mountains and in the piedmont are excellent. In the coastal plains some cover is provided by paddy dikes and occasional sand dunes. Concealment is limited to that available in the built up areas and in the dense, mature rice fields at certain times of the year.
- (f) Avenues of Approach. Avenues of approach are restricted to the existing very limited road net; helicopter landing zones which vary from plentiful in the coastal plain to infrequent and easily interdicted in the mountains; the navigable waterways of the coastal plain; the minor valley systems with gradual gradients; and an extensive trail net.
- (g) Key Terrain
1. The military complex at Hue/Thu Bai, containing the FLSG and the airfield, which is essential to support of sustained operations.
 2. The Song Huong, from its mouth to Hue, with associated waterfront, highway, and logistical facilities serving the Hue/Thu Bai military complex.
 3. Route #1, the MSR, throughout the TAOR, but particularly in the Hai Van Pass area, the Troui and Lang Co bridges, and the Da Bac, Hoc Rai and Phu Gia passes where it can be most easily interdicted.

4. Small hills, stream valley and trail junctions along the piedmont which control avenues of approach from the west and south.
5. The Cau Tso Hien which provides water access to the Don Cau Hai, controlling a major water infiltration route.
6. Control of rice producing areas will seriously hinder the enemy's food supplies.
7. The city of Hue, although outside our area of responsibility is important from historical, cultural, religious and political points of view. Accordingly, protection of its southern and eastern approaches is a consideration.

- (h) Effect on enemy capabilities. The mountains and piedmont favor the enemy tactically. Irregular terrain and dense vegetation offer excellent concealment, routes of infiltration and defensive positions. The coastal plains do not favor sustained attacks by large forces.
- (i) Effect of friendly forces. The steep, rugged, heavily forested mountains in the west and south of our TMOR will seriously hinder overland mobility. Short fields of fire, restricted observation, and limited LOC and helicopter LZ's make forces operating in these areas particularly vulnerable to ambushes and difficult to support logistically. The piedmont area is less restrictive. It contains more LOC and helicopter LZ's as well as numerous areas where observation and fields of fire are much better than in the mountains. Dense undergrowth throughout much of the piedmont, however, will impose definite restrictions on friendly operations. In the coastal plains during the monsoon season, flooded rice paddies and the extensive waterway system will impede foot movement and seriously restrict motorized/mechanized movement. During the dry season, however, these areas will favor our operations. The extensive waterway system can be exploited year around with special equipment and techniques.

(2) Hydrography

- (a) The Don Cau Hai, the large lagoon along the coast, is approximately 8 kilometers wide and has a depth of 12 meters at its deepest point. This lagoon is connected by a series of lagoons to form an inland waterway running

the length of the TAOR, approximately 64 kilometers long.

- (b) Surf and tide conditions are affected by the season of the year. During the period November through March, surf 4 feet or higher occurs along the exposed beaches up to 55% of the time. During the period June through September surf 4 feet or higher occurs 26% of the time. Average tidal range for this area is two feet.
- (c) Numerous landing beaches exist along the entire length of the TAOR. Beach approaches near shore are clear. Near shore slopes range from steep to flat but relatively few steep slopes front the beaches. The primary near shore bottom material is sand. Beach gradients are predominantly steep to moderate in the low water to high water and mostly steep in the high water zone. Exits from the beaches are almost nonexistent, presenting a major difficulty to sustained amphibious landings.

- (3) Climate and Weather. The northeastern monsoon, which normally begins in October and lasts through February, affects the coastal plain, the piedmont and the eastern slopes of the mountains. The average monthly rainfall is 9-23 inches, highest in the first half of the wet season, tapering off in the latter half. Monthly rainfall in the dry season is 1-4 inches. Prolonged precipitation occurs frequently between late November and late March. Ceilings under 1,000 feet and visibility levels between $\frac{1}{2}$ and 2 miles are common to the period. Between September and March, frequent fogs occur along the coast, beginning about 0300 and dissipating about 0800 daily. Typhoons with associated flooding occur from August through November with October the peak month. Temperatures range as high as 130 degrees fahrenheit during the dry season and as low as 40 degrees during the wet season. The monsoon season favors the enemy in that it restricts air operations and ground movement, and conversely, the dry season favors friendly operations.

(4) Transportation

- (a) Highway. The main north-south route is Highway #1. The road bed is built up; however, the foundation is weak and has not held up under heavy traffic. The surface is bituminous macadam and varies in width from three to seven meters. The overall rating is class 15, though it is possible to sustain up to class 25 traffic by exercising caution, accepting risk crossings of certain bridges and utilizing bypasses during the dry season. Highways are easily interdicted and keeping them open is an important indication of controlling ICTZ. Replacement of timber-trestle bridges washed out during the past monsoon with

SECRET

pile-bent bridges is expected to impede further washouts. On the southeastern edge of the TAOR, Highway #1 cuts through a mountainous section (Hai Van Pass) where the road is so narrow that traffic must be monitored at terminal points to permit only one way traffic.

- (b) Railroads. The national railroad parallels Highway #1 throughout the TAOR; however, enemy interdiction has made the use of rail facilities impossible.
- (c) Waterways. Streams flow swiftly in the highlands but as they reach the piedmont they widen into rivers and flow more slowly. In the coastlands they become sluggish and subject to silting. Consequently the utility of the rivers and the inland waterways is largely limited to shallow draft ships or craft. There are three principal waterways within the TAOR: the Song Huong, the Song Dai Giang - River/Canal complex, and the inland waterway made up of the Dan Thanh Len, the Lagoon De L'Est and the Dan Cau Hai. These are navigable only to small native craft. The Song Huong (YD8031) will accommodate LCU's inland as far as Hue. The Lagoon De L'Est (YD9026) and the Dan Cau Hai have a safe draft of 3.3 meters at high water and 1.5 meters at low water.
- (d) Although friendly forces seldom use the inland highways, the VC are continuously using them in conjunction with the trail system and waterways, as primary transportation routes.
- (e) The main roads are easily interdicted, but cuts are usually repaired or bypassed within 24 hours. Increased bridge and road security measures will be required to improve the reliability of land travel. Accordingly, a heavy dependence on air and sea LOC is anticipated. The only significant airfield is located at Phu Bai (YD8814). Waterways in the coastal plain may be of some use provided adequate small craft are available.

(5) Telecommunications

- (a) The military network includes a major switchboard at Phu Bai which connects to a switchboard at Hue. This system links Hue --- Phu Bai with DaNang, Tam Ky, Quang Ngai, Chu Lai, Hoi An, and various stations outside ICTZ with both voice and teletype circuits.
- (b) The Northern Toll system of the Post Telephone and

SECRET

Telegraph Company links Hue and DaNang by HF. This net is too insecure for most friendly traffic, however, it is used during emergencies, and by ARVN. It also enables a shrewd enemy to pass his own traffic.

- (6) Politics. The political situation within the TAOR is much the same as is found elsewhere in ICTZ.
- (7) Economy. Agriculture is the area's basic industry with rice culture in the coastal plain principal. Fishing is the second most important industry. However, security restrictions have severely hampered its exploitation. Some light industries exist near the cities, however, most manufactured items must be imported. Despite two rice crops annually, the area remains a food deficit area. The current economic situation favors VC economic and propaganda warfare. Effective security on the rice production areas, on the other hand, will destroy a vital element of the enemy's logistics base.
- (8) Sociology
- (a) Language. Central dialect Vietnamese, understood by both Northerners and Southerners is the most important language. French is understood by a large percentage of the urban population, and some English is also spoken in the cities. The few Chinese of the area understand Vietnamese but cling to their ancient language. The Montagnards speak a tribal language intelligible only to members of their own tribe.
- (b) Religion. The majority of the Vietnamese are nominal Buddhist. The activist element of the Buddhist Hierarchy is located in Hue. In the past, a militant Buddhist element has had considerable influence upon the GVN. The most important minority religion is Catholic, and Hoa Hao and Cao Dai sects are found in small numbers. The Montagnards are almost uniformly animist.
- (c) Education. The schools are patterned after the French system with 5 primary and 7 secondary grades. Since many rural dwellers spend no more than 3 years in school, the literacy rate is generally low. Educational opportunities for the Montagnards are almost nonexistent. Hue University is one of the most important institutions in the area. It is not only a center of higher learning, but also a center of religious and political activist groups, who in the past have shown considerable hostility toward the U.S..

- (d) Minorities. Some members of the PACOH Montagnard tribe may be found in the northwestern part of the TAOR. However, their numbers are normally insignificant.
- (e) Overall. Social unrest is aggravated by economic, political and military dislocation of Vietnamese life. Family and village groupings continue as the basic social and economic units, hampering efforts toward achieving national identity.
- (f) Public Health. Public health is plagued by dietary diseases, inadequate GVN medical services, lack of potable water, and primitive sanitation and hygiene standards. This is due to a low level of health education and a prevailing philosophy which accepts diseases as the normal condition.
- (g) Effects on enemy capabilities. The relative homogeneity of the society limits the enemy's capability to exploit antagonisms between ethnic groups. The issues of relative poverty and wealth, social unrest and national loyalty are exploitable.
- (h) Effects on friendly capabilities. Social conditions in areas under GVN control favor the maintenance of large numbers of U.S. forces. These conditions will prevail as long as social progress brings increased benefits to the masses. Non-indigenous troops, however, are particularly susceptible to the health hazards of the area. Extensive education and training programs are essential to the long range nation-building processes within the TAOR. Conditions are particularly good for an extensive civic action program to win the confidence and support of the people. School aid, public health and technical training programs are prime CA targets.
- (9) Science and Technology. Capabilities in these endeavors appear to be virtually nonexistent at present. This favors the enemy in that it hampers GVN economic, health and education projects.

b. Enemy Military Situation

- (1) See Tab 1 (Enemy Order of Battle, 5th Marines Regimental Area of Operations).
- (2) Composition. Headquarters Northern Front (also known as Tri-Tien Military Region Headquarters) controls both the provinces of Quang Tri and Thua Thien, and is directly subordinate to

the High Command in Hanoi. Main force and NVA units are subordinate to Headquarters Northern Front, while local force units and guerrillas are subordinate to province, district and village committees.

(3) Availability of reinforcements.

- (a) The 6th NVA Regiment consisting of a Hq, the C-4 Recon Co, the C-5th Signal Co (located at Base 114); the 800th MF Bn (YD6122) on 16 Dec 67; the 806th NVA Bn (YD5642); and the 802nd NVA Bn mentioned above, is considered locally available with additional strength of 1500 and weapons similar to those mentioned in Tab 1. It is estimated that additional specialist reinforcements from the Northern Front Headquarters are also available. These include the C11th NVA Intelligence Co, the C12th NVA Sapper Co, the C13th NVA Communications Co, the C14th NVA Engineer Co, the C15th NVA AA Co, the C16th NVA Mortar Co, and the C17th NVA RR Co with strengths totaling 710.
- (b) The enemy is capable of reinforcing his present forces in Thua Thien with forces from a neighboring province. If this capability should be adopted, which appears doubtful at present, the reinforcements could be expected to be MF and NVA units. Main Force and NVA total strength in Quang Tri and Quang Nam Provinces presently are estimated at 16,340 and 1,745 respectively, including confirmed, probable and possible.

(4) Movement and Activities. Enemy activities in the TAOR during the four week period 23 December through 16 January has consisted of mortar and rocket attacks and small scale harassing actions from Truoi Bridge (YD968062) southeast to Hai Van Pass (AT938916), with one large scale ground attack of estimated two battalion size on the Phu Loc District Headquarters, Phu Loc combat base and CAP units H-6 and H-7. The enemy has continued to employ mines and booby traps throughout the TAOR, a large portion of which are being placed on or near Route #1.

(5) VC Naval/Air Defense Forces

- (a) Naval. The VC have no Navy and constitute no naval threat to operations in our TAOR other than small arms and mortar fire from junks, a rarely used tactic. The VC do have a limited underwater mining and swimmer capability which they have used occasionally in river operations.

(b) Air Defense. Enemy AA weaponry consists primarily of captured U.S. and French machine guns, plus assorted Communist bloc and Chicom 7.62mm and 12.7mm machine guns. 20mm aircraft cannon recovered from downed aircraft have also probably been modified for use in an AA role. Reports indicate that all weapons, including mortars, shaped charges and small arms are used against aircraft. The increased number of hits sustained by U.S. aircraft throughout ICTZ indicates emphasis on AA training.

(6) Logistics

- (a) The enemy logistics system rests on three bases: support from the population, the resources of North Vietnam, and battle booty, particularly arms and ammunition. Principal items provided by the population are food, clothing, some medicine and some communication equipment. North Vietnamese material support which depends upon land and sea infiltration routes, consists principally of weapons and ammunition.
- (b) Infiltration routes are primarily overland, but include one intra-province sea route which terminates on the Phu Loc beaches between ZD1806 and AU8206.
- (c) The base area concept is fundamental to the Viet Cong logistics system. The nearest accepted base areas (114 and 607) are located to the north and west of our TAOR. Base areas are supplemented by "combat villages" which have been fortified with both active and passive defenses. One VC/NVA objective is to maintain secure corridors between these areas.
- (d) For operations in forward areas, the enemy depends on materials moved to and cached in the intended area of operations.
- (e) The VC exercise close control over medical supplies, which are inadequate by Western standards, and frequently in short supply. A substantial amount of the drugs are purchased on the local markets in Hue, DaNang and Saigon, and transported into the AOR. Medical supplies are also infiltrated from North Vietnam. The medical support system, while austere, is apparently capable of providing the minimum support necessary to sustain VC/NVA operations.

- (f) Transportation. The VC/NVA forces rely heavily upon human transporters, pack animals and bicycles for movement of their supplies. Two transportation battalions, consisting of a large number of porters, are reported active near the Laotian border. In addition, local villagers are often recruited for logistics movements.
- (7) Signal and Communications Equipment. In the area of signal equipment, the VC have developed a reliable communications system. They also have the capability to build their own equipment from locally purchased materials. VC signal equipment in use is of U.S., Chinese, Japanese and French manufacture. One prime source of VC communications equipment has been captured friendly equipment. Because of the significant amount of captured equipment, it must be presumed that the enemy is capable of monitoring any and all friendly transmissions.
- (8) Combat Intelligence and Counterintelligence. The enemy has an unsophisticated but well-organized and effective intelligence and counterintelligence system. Combat intelligence is usually provided by local guerrillas and MF/NVA intelligence companies. Counterintelligence agents include children, vendors and U.S. base employees.
- (9) Chemical Warfare
- (a) A captured document indicates that one unit has issued protective suits and masks in anticipation of U.S. initiated chemical warfare. One protective suit and many gas mask have been captured. The majority of these captured masks were simple, homemade devices with charcoal filters. NVA units have an effective two-piece mask of Chicom manufacture, consisting of goggles and a separate face-piece with an activated-charcoal-filter canister. This is similar to those used by U.S. policemen in riot control.
- (b) Chemical capabilities
1. VC are capable of employing homemade and captured smoke and riot-control munitions.
 2. VC are capable of making use of locally available poisons.
 3. The use of CS by NVA units has been reported in this area.

- (c) Vulnerabilities. The VC are vulnerable to all types of currently authorized chemical agents.

(10) Significant Strengths and Weaknesses

(a) Strengths

1. The VC control the western highlands, which gives them free access to infiltration/resupply routes from Laos.
2. The VC have developed a highly effective population control system, which enables them to obtain manpower, money, shelter, and supplies to sustain their operations.
3. The VC have an excellent, well established intelligence system.
4. Being of the same ethnic origin as the people of SVN the VC have little difficulty, except in definitely anti-VC areas, of gaining concealment by intermingling with the populace.
5. VC/NVA forces generally have available combat experienced leaders and, in most units, combat experienced troops.
6. VC/NVA forces have the capability of employing both conventional and guerrilla warfare.
7. VC/NVA forces possess a capability of rapid cross country mobility.

(b) Weaknesses

1. VC/NVA forces in our AOR possess no air support and only limited artillery support.
2. The VC rely heavily upon external support for arms and ammunition. This support is dependent upon infiltration routes subject to interdiction, thus necessitating long lead times and caches to insure availability.
3. The VC rely heavily upon the local population who may become disenchanted by heavy taxes, conscription of manpower, and death and destruction.

4. Animosity between NVA and VC, due to the NVA attitude of superiority, has been known to affect discipline, tactics and chains of command.

(c) Peculiarities

1. Offensive Combat

- a. VC/NVA attacks are thoroughly planned and quickly executed with a high element of surprise and maximum fire at the onset. After the attack, contact is broken quickly, and the battlefield is normally carefully policed.
- b. VC/NVA offensives normally have only the objectives of inflicting casualties and destroying installations. However, captured documents and defectors have indicated that the mission of the 324B Division is to seize, control, and defend Quang Tri and Thua Thien Provinces.
- c. Withdrawals are usually covered, and normal withdrawal routes are along the axis of the attack.
- d. Contact is most often established in the evening or late at night to restrict friendly maneuver, while providing time for withdrawal under cover of darkness.
- e. Doctrinally, the enemy does not commit reinforcements to save trapped units or to insure the accomplishment of a mission for which presumably adequate forces have already been allocated.

2. Defensive positions are characterized by mutually supporting bunkers, concealed under hedgerows, with narrow firing ports 8-12 inches in diameter and 6-8 inches above the ground. This makes them very difficult to see or hit. Connected by deep, narrow communications trenches, these positions are relatively invulnerable to mortar or light artillery fire, which facilitates the enemy's delivery of close supporting fires. Fire discipline has been excellent with most engagements initiated at ranges of less than 100 meters.

3. Others. One recent tactic employed by VC/NVA forces has been "Hugging". The technique is to attempt to

maintain as close a contact with friendly forces as possible to minimize the effect of friendly supporting arms.

c. Enemy Unconventional and Psychological Warfare.

- (1) Guerrillas. The guerrilla continues to be the base for the VC effort in SVN, providing the military force required for successful support of the VC infrastructure; harrassment of friendly LOC, installations and troop concentrations; and guides for MF/NVA units.
- (2) Psychological
 - (a) Since the beginning of the VC insurgency, the conversion of friendly troops has been given a priority equal to military and political actions. Three to five member cells, predominantly women, are organized for this purpose. Results are lowered morale and reduced combat effectiveness of allied units, and occasionally a propaganda or intelligence agent won at very low cost.
 - (b) Propaganda has been disseminated by leaflet, indoctrination courses, political lectures, newspapers, magazines and whisper campaigns. The most prevalent themes are divisive ones, aimed at exploiting disaffection among U.S. forces, and VN civilians. English language themes stressing the lack of support at home and racial strife have recently been aimed at U.S. forces.
 - (c) Psychological Warfare. Targeting of American servicemen, ARVN and the civilian population of various hamlets and villages is expected to continue.
- (3) Subversion. Subversive operations are standard throughout the area, and in many cases overshadow VC military efforts. Among the many subversive techniques employed by the VC, and probably the single most important technique is terror. Terror programs are executed by "Special Activities Cells" made up of dedicated militants generally between the ages of 13 and 25. Terror targets are most frequently natives of the area, rather than Saigon Appointees, and normally include only the very best and the very worst officials. Terror has five objectives: to improve VC morale, to advertise the movement, to create disorientation and psychological isolation, to eliminate opposing forces, and to provoke the GVN into repressive measures.

- (4) Espionage. Espionage agents, principally low level, are active throughout the area. Frequently, cover is provided by exploiting the divergent social and political aims of religious, ethnic and student groups. Recruitment of agents is often the result of threats or pressures against the individual or his family. Agents include vendors, children, and U.S. forces employees. Recruiting of females is emphasized. Although some sophisticated communications have been reported, the individual courier is probably the only reliable media, restricting the VC in the receipt of timely intelligence. Targeting of easily accessible installations, to collect sufficient information for sabotage operations, is expected to continue.
- (5) Sabotage
- (a) Sabotage units are known to be operating throughout the area. These units usually operate as cells; however, all military and guerrilla units are considered capable of sabotage activities.
- (b) The vast majority of these acts have been conducted with explosive devices. Principal targets have been unguarded LOC and lightly defended installations.
- (c) The majority of operations appear to be crude, conducted by inexperienced persons, and sometimes ineffective. They have enjoyed considerable success against LOC however.
- (d) It is estimated that the VC have the capability to perform acts of sabotage in the cities and against any installation within our AOR. This is a highly probable course of action as it avoids the risk of heavy losses in large scale attacks.

3. ENEMY CAPABILITIESa. Attack

- (1) Attack installations in the Huc/Phu Bai area with one regiment (6th NVA) and two separate battalions (804th MF and 810th LF) with an aggregate strength of about 1500.
- (2) Attack installations in the Phu Loc AO with up to 1 reinforced regiment (4th NVA consisting of the 802nd NVA Bn, the K4B MF Bn, the 1st Bn, 4th Regt, the C19 and C21 Engr Support Co's, and the C118 LF Co) with an aggregate strength of about 1400.

SECRET

- (3) Attack isolated units and outposts with up to one reinforced regiment.
 - (4) Attack selected key installations with medium and/or heavy mortars, artillery and rockets.
- b. Defend. Defend isolated positions anywhere within our TAOR with forces locally available.
 - c. Delay. Delay in present operating areas with forces locally available.
 - d. Unconventional and Psychological Warfare. Conduct unconventional and psychological warfare to include small scale attacks, ambushes, interdiction of LOC, terrorism, sabotage, propaganda activities, the use of mines and booby traps, and the use of nontoxic chemical capabilities.

4. ANALYSIS OF ENEMY CAPABILITIES

a. Attack

- (1) Attack installations in the Hue/Phu Bai area with one regiment and two separate battalions.
 - (a) The following factors favor adoption of this capability:
 1. The enemy's knowledge of our situation and the terrain, based on extensive reconnaissance activities.
 2. The enemy's desire to achieve tactical success.
 3. A successful attack would provide a significant propaganda advantage, and if terrain were held, would provide a strong bargaining point for peace talks, a known TET objective.
 4. Dissident Buddhist and remnants of the militant movement could provide sympathizers and collaborators to the enemy.
 - (b) The following factors militate against this capability:
 1. The enemy's losses during recent operations.
 2. The enemy's reluctance to mass his forces

3. The fact that installations in the Hue/Phu Bai area are located on an exposed coastal plain where surrounding terrain is unfavorable to the enemy's tactics.
- (c) VC/NVA troop movements and activity in the coastal plains to the north and in the piedmont to the south of the Hue/Phu Bai installations are considered indicators of the possible adoption of this capability.
- (2) Attack the Phu Loc area with one regiment reinforced.
- (a) The following factors favor the adoption of this capability:
1. The enemy's knowledge of our situation and the terrain, based on extensive reconnaissance activities.
 2. The enemy's desire to achieve tactical success.
 3. The Phu Loc area is strategically an ideal place to sever the country and, if successfully held, would provide a tactical as well as political advantage.
 4. The enemy has demonstrated capabilities of interdicting Highway #1 and carrying out battalion-sized operations within the Phu Loc area.
 5. The terrain, coupled with low overcasts expected during the monsoon season which would restrict the use of air support favors the enemy's normal sapper tactics as well as a subsequent defense in strength.
- (b) The following factors militate against this capability:
1. Recent improvements on friendly positions.
 2. Recent build-up of friendly forces throughout the AO.
 3. Fear of supporting arms.
 4. Possibility of large losses.
 5. Limitations of enemy supporting arms.
- (c) The following are indicators of the adoption of this capability:
1. Movement of forces to obvious attack positions.

SECRET

2. Reinforcements in the area.
 3. Presence of reconnaissance elements in the vicinity of key targets.
 4. Introduction of new longer range supporting arms.
 5. Concerted efforts to isolate the battle field.
 6. In addition, the preparation of defensive positions on key terrain would indicate the enemy's intention to subsequently hold terrain.
- (3) Attack isolated units and outposts with up to one reinforced regiment.
- (a) The following factors favor the adoption of this capability:
1. The enemy's knowledge of our situation and the terrain based on extensive reconnaissance activities.
 2. Isolated units and outposts offer the best targets at the least risk.
 3. The enemy's past successes against isolated targets.
 4. Many outposts lie astride main infiltration routes where the enemy may achieve temporary superiority.
 5. Enemy doctrine dictates the attack of relatively weak targets under the most favorable conditions.
 6. The enemy's desire to achieve tactical success.
- (b) The following factors militate against this capability:
1. The enemy's reluctance to mass his forces.
 2. The demonstrated friendly ability to detect enemy build-ups and to react rapidly to destroy them by supporting arms and ground attacks.
- (c) The following factors are indicators of adoption of this capability:
1. Interrogation reports, captured documents, and low level agent reports continue to indicate the possibility of such attacks.

SECRET

2. The enemy's known desire to disrupt the GVN RD program.
- (4) Attacks on selected key installations with medium and/or heavy mortars, artillery and rockets.
- (a) The following factors favor adoption of this capability:
1. Lucrative targets can be hit from a distance with less risk than ground attacks.
 2. The practice of striking quickly under the most favorable conditions is a basic enemy tactic.
 3. The enemy's past limited successes in such attacks.
 4. The enemy's desire to achieve tactical success.
- (b) There are no factors which militate against the adoption of this capability.
- (c) The fact that the enemy is currently exploiting this capability throughout ICTZ indicates continued adoption of this capability.

b. Defense

- (1) Defend isolated positions anywhere within the AO with forces locally available.
- (a) The following factors favor the adoption of this capability:
1. The enemy may adopt a hasty defense in order to delay while command posts, vital installations, and caches are displaced, concealed or dispersed.
 2. The enemy's need to protect vital base areas which may have been established or may be establishing within our TAOR.
 3. The enemy's desire to conserve forces in our area while exploiting an opportunity elsewhere.
 4. Political and propaganda advantages.
- (b) The following factors militate against adoption of this capability:
1. Reluctance to stand and fight except under the most favorable conditions.

SECRET

2. Enemy doctrine dictates against defending occupied terrain unless it is absolutely vital.
 3. The enemy's limited in-country supporting arms capability.
 4. Past enemy operations have avoided direct contact with superior forces and emphasized small unit harrasing actions designed to inflict maximum casualties at minimum cost.
 5. The achievement of a much needed victory is unlikely by defensive actions.
- (c) The enemy's losses in recent operations throughout ICTZ is an indicator of adoption of this capability.

c. Delay

- (1) Delay in present operating areas with forces locally available.
- (a) The following factors favor the adoption of this capability:
1. The enemy's desire to conserve forces and await conditions more favorable to him.
 2. The enemy's desire to prevent expansion of the GVN RD program.
 3. Delay of friendly operations would enhance the enemy's prestige with the local populace.
- (b) There are no factors which militate against this capability.
- (c) The enemy's need for the support of the local populace, primarily as a source of food, recruits, and intelligence, is an indicator of the adoption of this capability in conjunction with obtaining the local required support.

d. Unconventional and Psychological Warfare

- (1) Conduct unconventional and psychological warfare to include small scale attacks and ambushes, interdiction of LOC, terrorism, sabotage, and propaganda activities, the use of mines and booby traps, and the use of nontoxic munitions.
- (a) The following factors favor the adoption of this capability:

1. This capability is a basic enemy tactic.
 2. It provides the enemy an opportunity to inflict damage on friendly forces while minimizing the effects of friendly supporting arms.
 3. VC knowledge of the terrain and local populace.
 4. The enemy's belief that successful exploitation of this capability will wear down friendly forces.
 5. Guerrilla and local force VC units hope to tie down friendly forces with static defense and local reaction missions while VC main force and NVA units conduct large scale operations.
- (b) There are no factors which militate against this capability.
- (c) The following facts are indicators of the adoption of this capability:
1. The enemy is currently exploiting this capability.
 2. Interrogation reports, captured documents, and low level agent reports continue to indicate that the enemy will emphasize this tactic.

5. CONCLUSIONS

a. Enemy capabilities in relative probability of adoption:

- (1) Capability 4.d.(1). Conduct unconventional warfare to include small scale attacks and ambushes, interdiction of LOC, terrorism, sabotage, propaganda activities, the use of mines and booby traps and the use of nontoxic chemical munitions.
- (2) Capability 4.a.(4). Attack selected key installations with medium and/or heavy mortar, artillery and rockets.
- (3) Capability 4.a.(3). Attack isolated units and outposts with up to one reinforced regiment.
- (4) Capability 4.a.(2). Attack the Phu Loc area with one regiment (reinforced).
- (5) Capability 4.a.(1). Attack the Hue/Phu Bai area with one regiment and two separate battalions.
- (6) Capability 4.b.(1). Defend isolated positions anywhere within our TAOR with forces locally available.



- (7) Capability 4.c.(1). Delay in present operating areas with forces locally available.

b. Enemy Vulnerabilities

- (1) Enemy forces, installations, and LOC are vulnerable to air, artillery and naval gunfire attack.
- (2) Enemy forces are generally weak in total combat power because of the absence of air support and the limited availability of supporting arms.
- (3) Rigid tactical doctrine and dependence upon detailed planning render the enemy vulnerable to surprise.
- (4) The recent drop in overall combat effectiveness of enemy forces has increased his vulnerability to psychological warfare operations. Contributing factors include: recent decisive defeats; increased reliance upon conscripted personnel; reduced training time; lower morale due to shortages of food and medicine, sickness, general hardships and fear of our supporting arms; and our increased psychological warfare operations.
- (5) Enemy forces are becoming more dependent upon local resources, especially food, for support. The resulting increased pressures on these resources have served to jeopardize the enemy's standing with the local populace.

- (4) Heavy cruisers - 8"/55, Light cruisers - 6"/47, and destroyers - 5"/54 will normally operate in the immediate vicinity of the DMZ.
- (5) IFS and LSMR rocket ships are normally used only in general support in sparsely inhabited areas.
- (6) Heavier support ships may be requested for a specific operation or commitment, subject to approval and assignment by III MAF.

1. SITUATION

2. MISSION

The units listed in reference (a) are tasked to conduct operations in direct support, close air support and in defense of Task Force XRAY and the 1st Marine Division.

3. PROCEDURES

a. General

- (1) All air control and air coordination procedures conform to established doctrine as defined by references listed in references (a).
- (2) Positive control of all airstrikes is required. Controlling agencies include FAC, TAC(A), TACA/AO or ASRT. During operations utilizing coordinated FAC/TAC(A) controlled airstrikes, the FAC is the final clearing authority.

b. Execution

- (1) Battalion Air Officers will submit routine air requests to the Regimental Air Officer by 0900 and priority requests by 1600 the day prior to the day desired. The Regimental Air Officer consolidates all regimental requests and in-turn submits the consolidated request to the Task Force XRAY Air Officer by 0930 for routine and 1630 for priority the day prior to the day desired. All requests for air support are submitted in the formats set forth in appendixes 1 and 2.

- (2) Air support liaison for pre-planned operations should be requested at a minimum of 48 hours prior to the operation. Requests for helo, AO and fixed wing liaison meetings will be submitted through regiment in accordance with appendixes 4 and 5.

4. RESOURCES AND CONSIDERATIONS

a. Resources

- (1) The First Marine Airwing normally provides both fixed wing and helicopter support as required. Air support from friendly forces listed in reference (a) can be expected when directed by higher authority.
- (2) On call support includes:
- (a) Med Evac (Appendix 3, Request Form)
 - (b) Sparrow Hawk
 - (c) Bald Eagle
 - (d) Fast Reaction Gunships
 - (e) Aerial Observers

- (3) Special aircraft mission requests for photo, VR, CS Delivery, etc. will be made through normal channels. Allow sufficient lead time when requesting special missions and if possible have secondary targets planned to prevent mission aborts.

- (1) Enemy interdiction of the MSR often requires resupply by helicopter, but a maximum effort should be made while the MSR is possible to resupply by vehicle and reduce helo requirements.





2. MISSION

Support combat operations within the 5th Marines AO and to win the support of the people toward the Government of Vietnam.

3. EXECUTION

- c. Concept of Operations. Psychological operations will be conducted in three phases throughout the 5th Marines AO. The first phase of psychological operations will be conducted during the clearing phase. All units of the 5th Marines will conduct concurrent PsyOps campaigns to persuade local citizens to quit supporting VC and NVA. Propaganda themes will be designed to create discontent, (food shortages, poor medical care), demoralize enemy, (allied power, hopelessness of his cause) and create support for national government, (what government and people can do together and what their government is doing for them). During the second phase PsyOps objectives will continue to undermine the remaining VC influence and build support for establishing a local government. Emphasis of Chieu Hoi appeals will shift from the individual to his family. All supporting equipment will be used to keep the populace informed of what their government has done and is trying to do. PsyOps objectives in the last phase will be essentially the same as in phase two. The difference being in the refinement of the program. More sophisticated methods of keeping the populace informed will be employed, such as radios, newspapers and television. Psychological objectives and themes will be designed and stressed in accordance with the insurgency phase in specified

areas. (Appendix 1 (Psychological Operations Overlay)). Tactical operations being conducted will have priority of Psychological support.

- b. Bn. 5th Marines. Conduct Psychological operations within the Phu Loc AO.

(1) Coordinated PsyOps will be conducted during all tactical operations. Local VC, Hardcore NVA and the Vietnamese citizens are the major target groups within the 5th Marines AO. PsyOps themes will be directed toward and determined by target groups vulnerabilities. (Appendix 1 (Psychological Operations Overlay)). Themes will change depending on the phase of insurgency. Currently it is believed the major target groups are vulnerable to the following themes. (Annex B (Intelligence)).

- (a) Local citizens - They must pay taxes.
 - Suffer consequences of VC/NVA acts.
 - Members of their families may have been killed by VC/NVA.
 - Sons may have been impressed into service.
- (b) Local VC - Know they are considered to be inferior by NVA.
 - Some impressed into service.
 - Subject to influence of their families.
 - Superiority of allied forces.
- (c) Hardcore NVA - Long way from home.
 - Bad living conditions.
 - Medical treatment bad.
 - Food shortages.
 - Superiority of allied forces.



2. MISSION. To conduct civic action in the assigned AO in support of the Government of Vietnam Nation building effort.

3. EXECUTION.

a. Concept of Operation. The Commanding Officer, 5th Marines, has been assigned as the Civic Action coordinator in THUA THIEN Province south and east of the Song Huong River. (Annex I (Civic Action) to Operation order 301-68.) In establishing new combat bases and in initiating operations within the new AO, maximum effort will be made to foster good will between the Marine Corps and the indigenous population. Existing 3rd Mar Div. civil affairs policies, programs and projects will be continued to the maximum possible extent.

b. Infantry Battalions.

(1) Establish CA control in the Phu Bai - Phu Loc AOs (Annex I (Civic Action) to OpO 301-68.

(2) Explain Marine presence, policies, and requirements to local government leaders and the civilian populace of the Phu Bai - Phu Loc area concurrently with the physical occupation of combat base. Maximum use of psy ops personnel/equipment will be made to accomplish this task.

(4) Process Serious Incident Reports arising from this operation in accordance with paragraph 7003.3 of reference (d).

(5) Continue, to the maximum possible extent, existing 3rd Mar Div. civic action policies, programs and projects in the Phu Bai - Phu Loc area.

c. Delegation of Authority.

(1) Battalion commanders are delegated authority to conduct civil affairs operations in their respective AO except those areas and villages delineated in Annex I (Civic Action) to Operation Order 301-68.

(2) Delegation of such authority below battalion level only upon approval this headquarters.

d. Coordinating Instructions.

(1) Maximum coordination will be effected with 3rd Mar Div units to insure continuity of policies, programs and projects in the new TAOR.




