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PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the period 1-13 August 1969, 5th Marines continued Operation DURHAM PEAK with 2nd and 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines (OPCON until 3 August) and 1st Battalion, 1st Marines (OPCON during 3-7 Augst). Artillery support was provided by 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines (Rein) during the period until the operation terminated at 131800H August. Although large scale enemy contact was not experienced, Operation DURHAM PEAK was considered highly successful in that it denied the enemy freedom of movement in his normally natural haven. The presence of a multi-battalion force caused the enemy to abandon his numerous base camps and flee to the lowlands north and south of the Que Son Mountains. Here, the enemy was exposed to the fires of adjacent units which added to the chaos of an already confused and disorganized enemy. Numerous large base camps and caches were discovered and destroyed. In addition, valuable intelligence information was gained concerning the Que Son Mountains, e.g. trail networks, base camps, and caves.

2. The 1st Battalion, 5th Marines continued to provide security for Liberty Bridge and Liberty Road south to the An Hoa Combat Base. Concurrently, Companies A and B participated in the Division "Stack Arms" Program during the last week in August.

3. In compliance with the CG's message 180115Z July 1969, the 5th Marines effected Area of Responsibility (AO) adjustments during the period 13-16 August 1969. Particularly significant was the Fifth Marines assumption of responsibility for the Thuong Duc Valley north of the Song Vu Gia. The most prominent terrain features within the new AO is Hill 65 (grid AT878575) and the southern slope of Charlie Ridge. Elements of 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines displaced to Hill 65 on 13 and 14 August to relieve the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines on 16 August 1969 while the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines displaced to the southern "Arizona" on 16 August to conduct search and destroy operations within that area.

4. On 16 August 1969, Colonel William J. ZARO was relieved as Commander, 5th Marines by Colonel Noble L. BECK.

5. During the month, An Hoa Combat Base received incoming rockets, mortars, et.al. on several occasions. The first incident occurred on 8 August when one (1) lob bomb (155mm artillery round) was hurled into the base resulting in one (1) USMC killed. At 0300 and again at 1630 on 12 August, the An Hoa Combat Base was struck by five (5) and fourteen (14) incoming 140mm rockets respectively. No personnel injuries resulted; however, the 3rd Br Armory was completely destroyed. The next day, 13 August, the base received three (3) more 140mm rockets with no resultant loss of life or property damage. During the early morning hours of 19 August, the base was attacked by sappers

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armed with small arms, hand grenades, mortars, and RPGs. The attack resulted in two (2) USMC KIA, 10 USMC WIAE, while ten (10) NVA were KIA; two (2) AK-47, one (1) AK-50, one (1) RPG launcher were captured. Later that same day, eleven (11) 122mm rockets impacted on the base with no loss of personnel or damage to property. The last rocket attack of the month occurred on 22 August when the base received four (4) 122mm rockets. Again no loss of personnel or damage was suffered.

6. The remainder of the month was unusually quiet in the 5th Marines AO with only sporadic enemy contact. However, the enemy continued to emplace large numbers of surprise firing devices (SFD) throughout the AO. SFD countermeasures continued to be highlighted in Regimental training programs and re-emphasized by unit commanders and small unit leaders in the field.

7. For detailed information concerning the activities of the 5th Marine Regiment see the remainder of enclosure (1) and enclosures (2) through (6).

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PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Personnel and Administration. The command received an input of 18 officers and 268 enlisted personnel during the month of August 1969. A total of 2 officers and 155 enlisted personnel were medically evacuated out of RVN during the month. The average chargeable strength for the Regiment was 113 Marine Officers, 3255 Marine Enlisted, 11 Naval Officers, and 167 Naval Enlisted personnel.

2. Intelligence

a. General. During the month of August, the Regiment continued the collection, analysis, and dissemination of intelligence in support of the final phase of Operation DURHAM PEAK which terminated at 1800 on 13 August. An AO realignment in mid-August required an exchange of intelligence targeting and OB holdings. The An Hoa/Dai Loc/Seventh Marines intelligence community fully participated in this endeavor.

(1) During the reporting period the GVN intelligence network continued to provide some marginally useful information to the Fifth Marines. On the other hand, the Duc Duc District Chief and National Police Chief made some progress in penetrating the VC infrastructure: letters were written to families of the VC. These letters encouraged the VC to return to GVN control, and to date have been highly successful; the numbers of Hoi Chanhs in Duc Duc District has increased tenfold. As a result of close coordination with Duc Duc District Headquarters, the First Reconnaissance Battalion, aerial observers, and the First Force Reconnaissance Company achieved maximum surveillance and information collection on suspected enemy movements and locations.

c. Significant Aspects of the Enemy Disposition, Weather, and Terrain(1) Enemy

(a) The month of August was characterized by a dramatic shift of enemy activity from the Que Son Mountains to the southern and central Arizona. This shift became apparent on 11 August when elements of the 7th Marines made heavy contact with the 9th Battalion, 90th Regiment. On 16 August, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines was subjected to an attack consisting of 13 122mm rockets; 120mm, 82mm and twice by 60mm mortars. Since that time, the 3rd Battalion has been in constant contact with small enemy units.

(b) SFD activity remained at a high level with 79 devices located; 55 percent were discovered and destroyed while 45 percent were inadvertently detonated. The majority of the SFDs were encountered in the Phu Nhuan (AT8949) north of An Hoa.

(c) Psychological operations resulted in 5 Hoi Chanhs including 3 members of the Ap Hai (3) Hamlet Security Unit and 2 members of the Soc Son Autonomous Village Committee.

(d) POW and Hoi Chanh interrogation, captured documents and intelligence reports indicate the presence of the 90th Regiment within the 5th Marines AO. Also included are elements of the 36th and 141st Regts, the 575th Rocket Bn, the D-3 and T-89th Sapper Bns, 577th Rocket Bn, the Q 82 and Q 83 Main Force Bns, the K-600 and K-625 Transportation Bns, the 703rd Communications Bn, the 42nd Recon Bn, and the Q 77 Dispensary.

(2) Weather. There was no significant weather phenomenon during the reporting period.

(3) Terrain. The Que Son Mountains and flatlands of the Arizona presented no appreciable difficulty to friendly or enemy forces. The terrain in the Arizona is characterized by low hills, tree lines, and rice paddies, and is particularly suited to defensive operations. The hills and treelines offer excellent cover and concealment and the rice paddies ready-made clear fields of fire.

4. Operations. From 1-13 August 1969, the Regiment less 1st Battalion, 5th Marines continued Operation DURHAM PEAK. At the termination of Operation DURHAM PEAK, the Regiment commenced an unnamed operation which continued until the end of the reporting period.

5. Fire Support. See Enclosure (6).

6. Air Support. During the month of August, the 5th Marine Regiment was supported by 282 close air support missions, and 78 A-6 beacon missions. On 27 August, a flight of F-4s accounted for 10 KEMA at AT933495 in support of 1/5. Daily resupply for units in the field was accomplished with a package of two (2) CH-46s and two (2) UH-1Es or AH-1Gs. Dependent on the cargo loads, two (2) CH-53s were also utilized on this mission. A Command and Control (C and C) package of two (2) CH-46s were provided almost daily in support of the Regimental Commander. The 5th Marines utilized 147 Aerial Observer (AO) flights during the month for visual reconnaissance, control of tactical air strikes, and artillery spotting. Throughout the month 312 medevac missions were completed, transporting 803 injured and sick personnel to medical facilities. A total of four (4) flare ships, eight (8) "Spooky", and two (2) "Shadow" flights supported either units in the field or the combat base at An Hoa throughout the month.

7. Logistics, Equipment, and Supply

a. Base Development. Sandbagging and improvement to field fortifications

and barriers along the base perimeter continued at a high rate during the month of August. The project to improve the defense posture of the Delta Base Defense Sector located immediately at the northeast end of the runway is near completion. An additional project to denude the area immediately in front of the Echo Base Defense Sector was commenced during the month. This project is continuing and will greatly enhance the defense of this area. Two 30 foot observation towers were emplaced, one in the Delta Sector and one in the Golf Sector, during this month. The sandbagging of protective walls around all living quarters, recreational facilities, and messing facilities continued during the month.

b. Supply. The following amounts of consumable supplies (by classes) were received during the month of August at the LSA, in support of operations:

Class I - 408.6 Tons

Class III (W) - 650.3 Tons

Class V (W) - 1050 Tons

In addition, 195 tons of Class II material were delivered via RUC to the LSU, marked for units located here.

c. Land Transportation. Liberty Road remained open throughout the month as favorable weather conditions facilitated land transportation to and from the Combat Base. The 7th Engineer Battalion continued work on the upgrading of Liberty Road now having completed grading and rock-filling as far south as the 51 gridline. An additional 2½ ton truck was assigned in support of the Regiment from the 1st Motor Transport Battalion, bringing the total number of trucks to 18. The Truck Platoon traveled 6,414 miles, hauled 1,847.75 tons and transported 12,285 troops during the month of August.

d. Air Transportation. A total of 248 fixed wing aircraft landed and launched from the airfield during the month. There continued to be a predominant reliance on rotary wing aircraft for the movement of personnel, priority supplies, equipment, and mail to An Hoa from Da Nang. There were 5,484 landings by helicopters at the airfield during the month. Helicopters continued to provide the majority of resupply to units in the field with 554 lifts, 352 short tons of cargo, and 2,860 passengers being lifted during the month.

8. Communications

a. During the month of August 1969 communications in the Fifth Marines area of operation were maintained as previously established with the following changes:

(1) A radio retransmission team was located at LZ IKE in connection with Operation DURHAM PEAK. The nets involved were the "F" Battery COF and the

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TACP Local #3.

(2) A 100 foot span of 100 pair cable was replaced due to shrapnel and fire damage.

(3) A direct radio relay voice circuit was established from the 5th Marines to Hill 65 due to the change in AO.

(4) A direct radio relay voice circuit was also established from the 5th Marines to Hill 55 due to the change in AO.

b. Friendly frequency interference continues to be encountered on both radio and radio relay in the VHF range. A definite requirement for spare frequencies at both the Division and Regiment levels exists.

9. Medical

a. During the month of August 1969, The Regimental Aid Station continued in full operation. On 10 August, the shock & resuscitation team from 1st Medical Battalion departed An Hoa, hence the RAS resumed full responsibility for all medical evacuation from An Hoa. The RAS staff was augmented by one corpsman from BAS 1/5 and 3/5 to assist in this increased responsibility. During the month, the RAS treated:

Other significant events were:

b. On 5 and 7 August, RAS administered advancement exams to qualified ~~corpsmen~~ within the Regiment.

c. During the month, the base came under direct and indirect attack on seven occasions resulting in 14 battle casualties requiring treatment at the RAS.

d. On 13 August, RAS received whole blood from NSA, thereby providing the RAS with a whole blood capability.

e. During August, RAS evacuated a total of 326 patients by helicopter of which 24 were battle casualties.

f. Malaria cases peaked at 120 for the month as a result of Operation DURHAM PEAK. The high incidence rate should decline in subsequent months.

10. Civil Affairs

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a. During the month Civil Affairs operations increased and became more intensified in the An Hoa Area.

b. Highlights of Civil Affairs activities were:

(1) 13,300 board feet of lumber and 1000 pounds of foodstuffs were distributed to needy villages in the hamlet of Chum Quay. The building material was utilized to replace or repair homes damaged by friendly artillery fire.

(2) Medical treatment was administered to approximately 2,400 refugees located within the local area while Medcap classes on sanitation and personal hygiene continued at a high rate.

(3) Daily employment of approximately 90 refugees for work on and off the An Hoa Combat Base continued. Refugees have filled approximately 155,600 sandbags as a part of the base defense and development program during the past month.

11. Psychological Operations. There were 265 leaflet drops, 88 aerial broadcasts flown, 41 hours of ground broadcasts were conducted, and 11 hours of the "early word" broadcasts were conducted within the 5th Marines AO during the month of August.

12. Chaplain

a. During the reporting period, Cndr Charles L. KEYSER, CHC USNR, relieved Lt Cndr R. W. HARPER as Regimental Chaplain, 5th Marines.

b. Significant statistics in Chaplain services over the past month are:

(1) Twenty-two religious services were conducted aboard the An Hoa Combat Base by the Regimental Chaplain.

(2) Four lectures on the "Religiously Based Customs in Vietnam" have been delivered to the indoctrination classes as part of the Personal Response Program.

(3) Four memorial services were conducted by the Regimental Chaplain in honor of Marines of the 5th Marine Regiment who had been killed in action.

c. In addition, the Regimental Chaplain has been most active in working with the indigenous peoples of the District: specifically the Village Orphanage, Father Peter Thanh's School and Parish Church, and the District Buddhist Orphanage.

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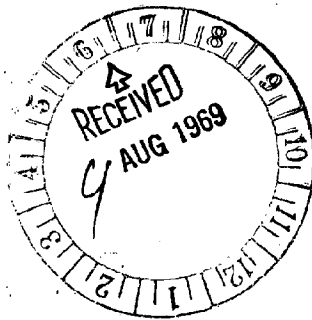

(6) Disposition. Artillery support followed the doctrinal progression of the tactical situation through the development of Fire Support Bases (FSBs) in accordance with Operation Order 1-69. FSBs were selected and developed in such a manner that they were mutually supporting and provided maximum depth in support of the infantry and Division reconnaissance teams. Individual artillery positions on the FSBs were preselected and developed when occupied. In this regard, artillery liaison personnel in coordination with engineer personnel produced exacting position refinements. Gun pits were subsequently constructed with sandbags thereby providing berm protection from enemy artillery. However, no pit docking was laid, as level traversing of

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the 105mm Howitzer proved adequate. In addition, a small reinforced platform was constructed for the 155mm Howitzers TD "speed jack" enabling them to traverse 360 degrees. FSBs were improved daily during occupation by the batteries, to include the construction of ammunition storage berms for isolation of munitions and for protection of personnel and equipment. Approximately 1,263 tons lifted by 1355 helicopter sorties were delivered to DURHAM PEAK FSBs during the period 20 July to 13 August 1969.

(8) Fire Support Coordination. Fire support coordination remained at the Regimental level. Its function was to plan and coordinate all supporting arms fires within the DURHAM PEAK AO. In compliance with Division Order P03300.1, the FSCC further insured that all supporting arms were economically employed and within the requisite safety tolerances.

(9) Restrictive Fire Plan. "Save-A-Plane" actions were initiated by the FSCC, immediately processed, and implemented, thereby diverting supporting air from artillery trajectory and impact areas. The ability of the Fire Support Coordinator to work directly with the Regimental Air Officer held restrictive fire plans and check fires to a minimum throughout the operation. No unusual situations were encountered.

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(10) Rounds Expended. As an aggregate, the direct support and general support batteries engaged in Operation DURHAM PEAK responded to a total of 4,206 fire missions. Of the total, 491 were observed, 1,645 were unobserved, and 2,070 were harassing and interdiction fire missions. Total rounds expended exceeded 75,500 of all calibers and types. The following table is a recapitulation of rounds expended by type and mission from 19 July through 13 August 1969.

(11) Artillery Mission Surveillance and BDA. Within the Operation DURHAM PEAK AO, thick canopy and rugged terrain reduced the surveillance information normally obtained from forward observers, air observers, and reconnaissance teams. The following is a tabulation of artillery mission surveillance received from these sources during the period of 20 July - 13 August 1969:

(12) Naval Gunfire. Naval Gunfire supported Operation DURHAM PEAK daily from 21-26 July 1969. Fires were concentrated primarily as prep and interdiction-type missions located within the seaward portion of the AO. While naval gun ammunition expenditures exceeded 800 rounds of 8"/55, damage assessment was estimated as minimal. Only two secondary explosions were observed. This is attributed to the thick canopy and mountainous terrain which made surveillance difficult.

c. Air

(1) General. On 19 July 1969, air operations for Operation DURHAM PEAK commenced with the occupation of the FSB on Go Noi Island (vic BT050530). Due to marshy terrain, the operation was almost entirely dependent upon helicopters for major troop movements and resupply. Helicopter support was provided by Marine units located at Marble Mountain Air Facility and Phu Bai. Fixed wing units of the First Marine Aircraft Wing provided C-130 Flareships, F-4s, A-4s, A-6s, and OV-10 aircraft throughout the operation. Air Force CAS aircraft "fragged" through the AO and "diverts" were also utilized.

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(2) Air Liaison Functions. The Air Liaison Section of the 5th Marine Regiment operated in accordance with standing operating procedures of the 1st Marine Division/1st MAM.

(3) Helicopter Mission Assignment. Standard mission numbers were assigned to the 5th Marines for use during Operation DURHAM PEAK. These were as follows:

(4) Support Statistics. The following statistics for helicopter and fixed wing support of Operation DURHAM PEAK were compiled by the 5th Marines.

(5) Helicopter Employment Factors. The factors affecting helicopter support were:

- (a) Aircraft required versus aircraft received.
- (b) Weather
- (c) Security of landing zones.
- (d) Efficiency of the units handling air assets.

The effect of these factors varied from day to day. By constant supervision, the variables were leveled and overall effective aircraft utilization was achieved.

Overall, helicopter support was considered entirely adequate for the operation.

d. Engineer Support(1) Forces Available

(a) Task Organization. Forces available for support of the operation were limited to Company B (-) (Rein), 1st Engineer Battalion.

(1) 2nd Platoon supported 2/5.

(2) 3rd Platoon supported 3/5.

(3) A fire support base team consisting of one (1) Case Tractor Operator, ten (10) combat engineers, one (1) corpsman, and one (1) radio operator were assigned to Company B.

(b) Special Items of Equipment. This was limited to the Case 450 tractor which was utilized in construction of fire support bases.

(c) Engineer Coordinator. Commanding Officer, Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion.

(d) Organizational Structure. Organizational structure of Company B remained conventional during the entire operation.

(2) Employment of Forces

(a) General. Second Platoon, Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion supported 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines. Third Platoon, Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion supported 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines. The FSB team remained "on call" ready for deployment anywhere within the 5th Marines AO.

(b) FSB/COB Development. FSB development was in accordance with guidance given by the Commanding Officer, 1st Engineer Battalion. An overall reduction in manhours and demolitions expended was effected through site selection of existing FSB Ryder and LZ Ike. FSB Pony, although undeveloped, was relatively clear, thereby requiring little effort.

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(c) Use of Demolitions in FSB Development. Due to the excellent condition of existing FSBs, use of demolitions was limited.

(d) Close-down of LZs and FSBs. Engineer assistance teams were provided to assist units in the clean-up and disassembly of LZs and FSBs. In addition, a FSB Inspection Team, consisting of the S-4, 5th Marines, and the CO, Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion, was constituted. This team visited all the FSBs prior to disestablishment providing guidance and assistance. Further, the team revisited the sites upon abandonment to ensure that all tasks had been completed.

(e) Allied Forces. The First ARVN Ranger Group (-) consisting of the 21st and 37th Battalions, reinforced with B Battery, 64th ARVN Artillery Battalion conducted operations as a blocking force in the Antenna Valley. Although the Rangers were the first elements committed on D-Day, they encountered only light enemy contacts during the operation. The organization of the ARVN Ranger Forces was as follows:

8. (S) INTELLIGENCE

a. Enemy Forces in the AO. Upon initiation of Operation DURHAM PEAK, the following enemy units were considered to be operating in and contiguous to the DURHAM PEAK Area of Responsibility. Enclosure (2) depicts the disposition of these forces.

b. Enemy Forces Reinforcement. Enemy units considered to be operating on the periphery of the DURHAM PEAK AO and capable of reinforcing units therein are listed below. Their disposition is also illustrated in enclosure (2).

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the east by Deo La Pass. NVA forces in the Antenna Valley as a numerical inferior force will attempt to evade FVMAF by withdrawing into the Southern Que Son Mountains and conduct harassing activities against friendly forces in the area. Many local enemy personnel dispersed into the farm population and attempted to avoid detection by working in the fields under the guise of peaceful families.

d. Collection Agencies. The below listed intelligence collection agencies were employed by, or rendered support to DURHAM PEAK. The type support provided is as indicated below:

(1) First Marine Division G-2. Intelligence from all sources; invaluable background data and administrative assistance.

(2) Photo Interpretation Team, III MAF. Photographic assistance in reading, assembling, and briefing on current photographic coverage of the objective area.

(3) First Force Reconnaissance Company (Rein). Reconnaissance efforts provided timely information as to enemy movement through known infiltration routes and resupply trails. Recon elements provided updated trail information with new enemy trail activity reported in Southern Que Son Mountains. Recon further provided security and terminal guidance for the helo lift of artillery elements into Fire Support Base RYDER (for pre/during DURHAM PEAK patrol routes see enclosure (5)).

(4) Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division. Reconnaissance efforts provided timely information as to enemy movements along known infiltration routes and resupply trails. Previously recon teams manning observation posts had provided timely and accurate information as to enemy movement through the Que Son Mountains and Phu Loc Valley since May. During the early phases of Operation DURHAM PEAK, a recon team was placed astride the Khe Sui Noi stream and trail to observe any enemy entering or leaving the valley by this route. A recon team was also tasked with providing security and terminal guidance for Landing Zone Halsey in the event 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines was committed (for pre/during DURHAM PEAK patrol routes see enclosure (5)).

(5) 13th IRT (Rein)

(a) The 13th IRT, augmented by a sub-team from Quang Da Special Zone Headquarters provided interrogation/classification of detainees; submission of associated reports; supervision of detainee evacuation; scanning of captured documents; screening of all refugees relocated from Antenna Valley; maintaining a "Go-Team" capability to provide interrogation of infantry battalion detainees; and providing Ho Chi Chams to work with FVMAF in the field.

(b) A joint U. S./ARVN interrogation center was activated on 20 July 1969 and deactivated on 13 August 1969. Results of its operation

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during periods 20 July - 13 August 1969 are contained in enclosures (6), (7), and (8).

(6) Air Observers. During the period 20 July - 13 August 1969, the Division AO Section was tasked with an exclusive intelligence mission for one daily AO flight. The AO and pilot were briefed on the ground and tasked with an intelligence gathering mission either visual or photographic. AO and pilot briefs/debriefs were accomplished prior and subsequent to each daily flight; thereby ensuring a timely and responsive intelligence collection system. The following statistics indicate some of the more significant Air Observer achievements:

(7) Sub-Team, 3rd CTT. Normal CI support.

(8) District Intelligence Operations Coordinating Center (DIOCC)
Due Due. Agent reports and information from refugees.

(9) Civilian Irregular Defense Group (CIDG), Nong Song. Tactical and local agent reports on Antenna Valley.

(10) 196th Light Infantry Brigade (USA). Information via Liaison Officer and radio/radio relay communications.

(11) Sensor Devices. Employed in Phu Loc Valley in addition to night observation devices (NOD).

f. Situation Encountered. The impact of weather and the enemy situation encountered is discussed as it occurred in the geographical sectors of the AO described in paragraph 8.d.(1)/(2).

(1) Weather. The weather during the period was considered excellent. The only inclement weather which was experienced, occurred in late July when two days of high winds were encountered making troop and resupply helolifts extremely hazardous in the higher elevations. Weather presented no problem to fixed wing missions and the ceilings were generally 1500 feet or higher during the entire operation. There were four days of thundershowers; generally occurring in the late afternoon and early evening. Resupply missions were affected on one day due to poor weather.

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12 Sep 1969(2) Que Son Mountains - Phu Loc Valley

(a) The initial helicopter entry into FSB IKE and PONY and LZs PORTER, NIMITZ, and TAYLOR went unopposed. As patrols ranged from their bases, they uncovered extensive bunker complexes, tunnels, hootches, and supply caches as indicated in enclosures (9), (10), and (11) and uncovered numerous NVA graves. Inspection of trails in the area verified the existence of a major enemy supply route/line of communication (enclosures (3) and (12)). Generally, enemy resistance was light, stemming primarily from small groups attempting to evade friendly infantry forces. The main tactic employed by the enemy in delaying was ambush, snipers, and surprise firing devices. Captured documents/materials/POWs (enclosure (6) and (7)) verified the presence of two battalions of 36th Regiment, T89 Sapper Battalion, 3rd Sapper Battalion, 577th Artillery Battalion, and Hospital 78. Numerous sightings in the eastern lowlands contiguous to the Que Son Mountains were made by 196th Light Infantry Brigade and 2nd Battalion, 5th ARVN. Sightings increased in that area due to pressure in the mountains by FMAF.

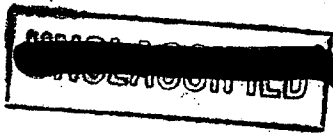
(b) The week 20-27 July was characterized by finding large numbers of bunkers, caves, hootches, and tunnels. Most bunkers and hootches showed extensive damage as a result of ARC LIGHTS which were dropped in the Que Son Mountains prior to commencement of DURHAM PEAK (enclosure (13)). As friendly forces moved to the higher areas of NUI MAT RANG MOUNTAIN and NUI DA BEO MOUNTAIN, enemy activity increased. Many PW and Hoi Chanh reports indicated the presence of Hospital 78 and numerous enemy units on the ridgeline of HON NUI TAU - DEO-LE NUI-DA-BEO Mountains. A large number of unit locations were also on the eastern slope of the mountains. The eastern slope had not been heavily saturated with artillery and air strikes as was the western slope. Enemy sightings on the eastern lowlands of Que Son District were on the increase with 483 enemy sighted by 196th Brigade and 5th ARVN Regiment. One sharp contact occurred as an enemy force of approximately 30-40 NVA ambushed a friendly platoon on NUI MAT RANG Mountain.

(c) The week of 28 July to 4 August was characterized by increased enemy sightings and contacts by fire. The enemy elected to conduct delaying tactics by use of snipers, ambushes, and surprise firing devices. Increased discoveries of materiel, hootches, caves, and bunkers were made as troops checked out areas on the high ground. A total of eighty enemy were sighted moving ahead of the attacking forces. The enemy suffered 16 killed by small arms fire, and 12 were discovered KIA from artillery and air strikes. A large hospital site was uncovered with operating facilities and surgical equipment more sophisticated than uncovered earlier in the aid stations. An unusual cache was found in a cave located in the foothills by G 2/1. The cache consisted of 3 bicycles, 100 new bicycle tires, 600 tubes of toothpaste, 250 toothbrushes, 600 yards of uniform cloth, 400 bath towels, and 200 hand towels. Two POWs captured were tentatively identified as soldiers from the T89th Sapper Battalion and the 577th Rocket Battalion.

(d) The period of 5 August to 13 August was characterized by

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several sharp, fierce contacts by fire, numerous enemy fortifications and living places discovered, and a large number of POWs captured from the 36th Regiment. The enemy continually evaded battle and had broken contact during each engagement with U. S. forces. Based upon POW interrogations, the enemy left in the area were sick and wounded; the able bodied men had fragmented into small groups and fled into the Que Son lowlands. The majority of the enemy captured during the period were from the 2nd Battalion, 36th Regiment. Prisoners of war were for the most part, undernourished, sick with malaria, disgusted with the war, and convinced they were on the losing side. They no longer believed the political officers' propaganda concerning NVA victories in the south. Although hearsay, POWs have stated that the majority of the 36th Regiment is sick and their spirit for battle is low.

(3) Antenna Valley

(a) The initial helicopter entry into FSB RYDER and LZ MIKE went unopposed. The classical helicopter entry was marred only by a CH-46 crash in which several ARVN Rangers were killed. The ARVN Artillery Group assisted by USMC engineers quickly developed FSB RYDER and the Rangers moved into their assigned blocking position astride the southern entrance to the "slot" (corridor which bisects the northern Que Son Mountains). Generally, enemy resistance was very light with only a few sniper incidents and ground fire at the Army C&C helicopter. The ARVN Rangers uncovered one ammunition cache containing twenty-one (21) 120mm mortar rounds and a rice cache of 3000 pounds. During subsequent sweeps of the valley approximately 250 women and children were evacuated to Duc Duc District Headquarters. Although there were several pregnant women and young mothers with babies in arms, the group was conspicuous by the absence of young men. All the young mothers professed to being war widows.

(b) The period 28 July to 30 August saw little increase in activity in Antenna Valley. The ARVN Ranger Group continued to seek out likely enemy strong points, routes of egress, and cache sites with negative results. The enemy had vacated the valley and retreated into the Southern Que Son Mountains. A guerrilla force of about 30 men which operates in the western portion of Antenna Valley was engaged by air and an undetermined number were killed or wounded. Local civilians who were queried regarding locations of enemy in the valley said the NVA/VC departed to the south a few hours ahead of the Ranger landing in the Valley. Although the Rangers did not encounter any enemy force in the valley, their unopposed presence there demonstrated to the people that GVN troops could come into a VC stronghold and remain there indefinitely. This was not the case in early 1969. (At that time 1st VC Regiment controlled the valley and any government venture into the valley would have been met with fierce resistance).

(4) In summary, the enemy response to DURHAM PEAK was essentially as estimated prior to commencing the operation. There were two significant variations from the estimate in that (1), the 2nd Mortar Battalion (GK-33) never

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was encountered and (2), the enemy present did not severely contest U. S. Forces as had been anticipated. DURHAM PEAK drove the enemy out of Base Area 116, and in many instances into the waiting guns of the 196th Infantry Brigade who were providing flank security in the Que Son lowlands. During the period 20 July - 10 August 1969, the area contiguous to DURHAM PEAK provided the FVMAF with the following activity which was an increase over the past months:

(2) Units cited in paragraph 8.g.(1), above, were identified by POWs/ documents (enclosure (6) and (7)). Recognizing the possible inaccuracy of the statements concerning other units and infiltration groups, to include possible exaggerations as to the health and fighting condition of the 36th Regiment, the information has been included as collateral data in unit identification and SICRs (enclosure (17)).

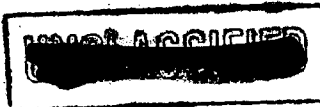
(3) Enclosure (7) also cited captured documents identifying the presence of units and subordinate elements thereof in Quang Nam Province. Numerous other captured documents substantiated the fact that former Base Area 116 housed various training schools, hospitals, command posts, and R&R-type areas. These documents have been recorded by 13th JET (An Hoa) and the First Marine Division Document Translation Center (FDC) for further use.

h. Significant Intelligence

(1) Identification of Infiltration Units and Routes of Supply

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(a) Que Son Mountains. The primary infiltration route, shown in enclosure (3), was verified by sightings and contacts as previously described. Other routes paralleling the trail networks are described in enclosure (12). These connect the waterborne supply route, i.e., the Song Thu Bon, the hamlet of THACH BICH, and the overland routes through the southern Que Son Mountains. Enclosure (12) also lists trails reported during Operation DURHAM PEAK.

(2) Location of Captured/Destroyed Enemy Equipment

(a) Enclosure (10) lists the total materiel and complexes captured or destroyed.

(b) Enclosure (11) lists the location of significant caches/bunker complexes. Enclosure (9) illustrates several of these locations).

(3) Other Significant Information Recorded

(a) The following information was recorded for future use:

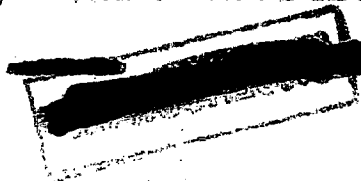
- (1) Enemy AA positions (Enclosure (14)).
- (2) Enemy complexes uncovered and destroyed (Enclosure (10)).
- (3) Sketches of significant complexes and type buildings uncovered in Que Son Mountains (Enclosure (15)).
- (4) Helicopter Landing Zones in Que Son Mountains (Enclosure (16)).

i. Targeting

(1) Targeting in support of the friendly scheme of maneuver was accomplished by the S-2 through the employment of the various collection agencies. During the operation, targets were acquired for employment of the following supporting arms:

- (a) Artillery
- (b) TFQ-10
- (c) CAS
- (d) ABOLIGHTS

(2) Eleven ABOLIGHT strikes were targeted by the 1st Marine Division



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G-2 (Enclosure (13)). The amount of artillery fire targeted against intelligence-developed targets was undetermined.

j. Cover and Concealment

(1) Que Son Mountains. The heavy secondary underbrush and single jungle canopy afforded maximum concealment for both friendly and enemy forces. Cover from small-arms and flat trajectory weapons was provided by the numerous large boulders that are characteristic of the area.

(2) Antenna Valley. Natural concealment is generally poor in the rice field areas, improving somewhat near the hamlets, adjacent hedgerows, and treelines. Natural cover from flat trajectory weapons provided by rice paddy dikes is considered fair. Man-made spider holes, tombs, fortified bunkers, and well camouflaged fighting holes provided the enemy with excellent cover and concealment.

k. Obstacles

(1) Que Son Mountains. Numerous densely vegetated and narrow steep-sided ravines and gorges compartmented the area. One principle corridor ran the entire length of the northern Que Son Mountains from Antenna Valley to Phu Loc Valley. There was one main choke point between HON NUI TAU and NUI MAT RANG Mountains where steep mountain slopes restricted and channelized movement.

(2) Antenna Valley. No major obstacles were present except poor road conditions which prohibited any large wheeled or tracked vehicle movement. The valley presented no problem to foot movement and permitted units to disperse widely during tactical formations. No surprise firing devices were found or detonated during the operation in Antenna Valley.

9. (S) MISSION. Fifth Marines (-) (Rein) in coordination and cooperation with ARVN Forces conducts operations in the Que Son Mountains/Phu Loc Valley/Antenna Valley area to find, fix, and destroy enemy forces, harbor sites, and fortifications, and to locate and capture enemy caches in assigned AO.

10. (S) CONCEPT.

a. General (See Enclosure (16)). Fifth Marines (-) (Rein), in coordination and cooperation with the First ARVN Ranger Group (-), lands by helicopter in the Que Son Mountains/Phu Loc Valley/Antenna Valley area as follows:

(1) On D-1 and D-Day, two Marine Artillery Batteries conduct motor march to temporary FSB to be established vicinity BTO453 to support landing of two USMC battalions in Phu Loc Valley/Que Son Mountains area.

(2) On D-Day, one ARVN Ranger Company lands at FSB Ryder vicinity AT9434 and secures site. When site is secure, ARVN 105mm Artillery Battery (Rein) lands, establishes FSB, and prepares to support 1st ARVN Ranger Group.

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landing, also on D-Day.

(3) On D-Day, one battalion from Fifth Marines lands by helicopter in LZ Ike, vicinity AT9440, and establishes positions initially to block movement of enemy forces from Que Son Mountains to the west and southwest. One 4.2" Battery (-) (on call) displaces from An Hoa to vicinity LZ Ike to provide fire support in that area.

(4) On D-Day, 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-) lands in Antenna Valley vicinity AT9336 and commences Phase I ARVN operations. Initially blocks enemy escape routes from Que Son Mountains into Antenna Valley. Prepares for Phase II ARVN operations in central Antenna Valley and Phase III ARVN operations in western Antenna Valley. Conducts search and destroy operations during Phases II and III.

(5) On D+1, one battalion lands at LZ Nimitz vicinity of BT0048, LZ Porter vicinity AT9847, and FSB Pony vicinity of BT0347 in the Phu Loc Valley. Initially blocks northern and northeastern enemy escape routes from the Que Son Mountains area. Conducts search and destroy missions thereafter.

(6) On order, about D+2, one battalion of Fifth Marines lands in LZ Halsey in northern Que Son Mountain area vicinity BT0144, or other LZ as directed, and attacks to the southwest. Conducts operations to find, fix, and destroy enemy forces in AO and to locate enemy base camps and caches.

(7) Elements of the Americal Division screen area east and southeast of Que Son Mountains astride enemy escape routes.

(8) Artillery support provided from An Hoa, Liberty Bridge, FSB Ryder, a temporary FSB on Go Noi Island, FSB Pony, and LZ Ike.

(9) Artillery and air preparation of landing zones conducted as required.

(10) Flexible posture maintained following initial attack in order to exploit the enemy situation as it may develop. Battalions conduct search and destroy operations in assigned AOs to locate enemy safe harbor sites and caches.

b. Preliminary Intelligence Collection. During the period of approximately 8 July to 18 July 1969, elements of the 1st Reconnaissance Battalion and 1st Force Reconnaissance Company reported large sightings of enemy carrying heavy loads of supplies from the Go Noi Island area south into the Que Son Mountains. The information collected during 8-18 July by the reconnaissance elements plus other information provided by earlier reconnaissance teams was compiled by the 1st Marine Division and utilized by the 5th Marines in preparation of the estimate of the enemy situation for Operation DURHAM PEAK.

11. (S) EXECUTION

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12 Sep 1969a. Day By Day Narrative. (See Enclosure (19)).b. Significant Actions/Occurrences

(1) 201440H Jul - 37th Bn, 1st Ranger Group (-) combat assault location vic AT934366. CH-46 crashes resulting in 9 ARVN NECK, 8 ARVN NBCE, and 1 USMC NBCE (MAG-16). Crash was caused by obscure narrow ridge on landing site at LZ Mike. CH-46 helo totally destroyed.

(2) 220945H Jul - OV-10A working in support of 3/5 crashed vic AT969420 while attempting to make a bomb assessment of area where fixed wing aircraft had expended ordnance. Both pilot and AO ejected. Pilot was rescued shortly after the crash. AO was found dead in shallow grave by Co I 3/5 after 281200H in vic of crash site.

(3) 241330H Jul - 37th Battalion, 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-) found an enemy cache containing twenty-one (21) 120mm Chicom mortar rounds with fuzes at AT907395.

(4) 261510H Jul - While attempting to complete a medevac vic AT979429, a CH-46 helicopter was shot down in the LZ. Medevacs were moved to another LZ and the evac was completed by use of Neil Robinson Jungle Penetrator. One platoon from Co H 2/1 was left as security around the helicopter. The downed helicopter was extracted at 271620H.

(5) 271215H Jul - While conducting a medevac vic AT970404 for Co L 3/5, CH-46 helicopter received ground fire when leaving the LZ and crashed and burned. There were no survivors.

(6) 310800H Jul - Second Bn, 5th Marines (-) helolifted from vic Liberty Bridge into LZ Scott vic AT985415.

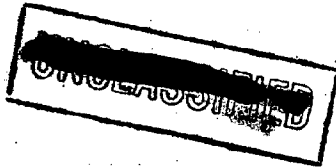
(7) 021400H Aug - Co I 3/5 while conducting offensive S&D operations vic AT972423 located several caves which contained assorted medical gear, 10 lbs of documents, five (5) AK-44s, six (6) M-1 carbines, one (1) recoil Chicom grease gun, and five (5) Chicom grenades.

(8) 021615H Aug - Co F 2/5 platoon while occupying blocking positions vic BT012412 received minigun fire from friendly U.S. Army Cobra gun ship. Incident resulted in 1 USMC NBCE.

(9) 021430H Aug - Co G 2/5 while conducting offensive S&D operations vic BT000397 received friendly rocket fire from (AO Hostage Duke). Incident resulted in 4 USMC NBCE and 1 USMC NEC(M).

(10) 030730H Aug - 1/1 relieved 2/1 in place with CP and (2) companies. Commencing at H Hour, 1/1 commenced helolift with CP and Cos A and D. CP and Co A lifted into LZ vic BT001427 to relieve Co F 2/1. Co D helolifted into FSB Pony to relieve Co H 2/5. Utilizing same helos, Co H 2/5 helolifted to LZ vic AT987412 to return OPCON of 2/5. Co F 2/1 utilized same helos for

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return to 2/1 rear. Cos G and H 2/1 remained in the operation OFCON to 1/1. Effective 031000H Aug 69, 5th Marines passed OFCON 2/1 to 1st Marines and simultaneously assumed OFCON of 1/1 for participation in Operation DURHAM PEAK.

(11) 031000H Aug - 5th Marines passed OFCON 2/1 to 1st Marines and simultaneously assumed OFCON of 1/1.

(12) 071400H Aug - 5th Marines passed OFCON 1/1 to 1st Marines. The operation continued with two (2) battalions instead of three (3). All of 1/1 was extracted from FSB Pony vicinity BF034475.

(13) 071330H Aug - Co L 3/5 helolifted to FSB Pony to relieve Co D, 1/1 of the mission of security for the fire support base.

(14) 071630H Aug - Co M 3/5 platoon combat patrol found 8 SKS rifles, 3 AK-47 rifles, 1 AK-50, 1 9mm pistol - total 13 IVC at AT974373.

(15) 072355H Aug - Co I, 3/5 located in night defensive position vicinity AT938444 received approximately ten (10) rounds friendly 4.2" mortar resulting in one (1) USMC killed and eight (8) wounded.

(16) 080800H Aug - Co M 3/5 platoon combat patrol had contact with unknown size enemy force. Enemy broke contact. Platoon found one (1) 60mm Mortar tube, 5 AK-47 rifles, 2 NVA KIA, 5 detainees.

(17) 081200H Aug - Battery B, 64th Artillery Battalion in support of the 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-) located at FSB Ryder vic AT947345 was withdrawn from operation and helolifted to An Hoa Combat Base.

(18) 081300H Aug - Co I 3/5 moved overland from vic AT938442 to the An Hoa Combat Base to be withdrawn from the operation.

(19) 090935H Aug - 3/5 CP helolifted from LZ Ike vic AT945404 to An Hoa Combat Base.

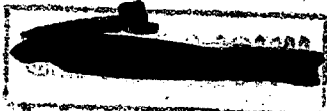
(20) 100930H Aug - 2/5 CP relocated from vic AT991390 to vic AT989377 by helicopter.

(21) 111030H Aug - Btry W (-) 2/11 (three (3) 4.2" mortars) withdrawn from Operation DURHAM PEAK's LZ vic AT945404 to An Hoa Combat Base.

(22) 121020H Aug - 2/5 (Rein) with Co M 3/5 withdrawn from operation to An Hoa Combat Base by helicopter.

(23) 130800H Aug - Co K 3/5 completed overland withdrawal from LZ Ike vic AT945404.

(24) 131800H Aug - Operation DURHAM PEAK terminated.



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c. Unusual Tactics and Techniques. Use of "Early Word" - During DURHAM PEAK the "Early Word" capability was utilized on an almost daily basis. This airborne capability which allowed a Hoi Chanh, or POW to broadcast from inside a building and speak to his former comrades in almost any portion of the area of operation. This ground to air, to ground, broadcast system, was effectively employed during DURHAM PEAK utilizing a PRC-25, and both Hoi Chanh's and POWs. For additional data, see paragraphs (11.d./17.g.) psychological operations.

d. Civil Affairs/Psyps Activities

(1) Civil Affairs. Due to the nature of the terrain and the lack of villages or hamlets, there was no civil affairs activity in the operation.

(2) Psyps Activities.

(a) General. The psychological operation in support of Operation DURHAM PEAK was executed successfully. Daily leaflet drops and aerial loudspeaker broadcasts were planned and executed to exploit enemy contacts and the tactical situation. (See Enclosure (20)).

(b) Leaflets with the Hoi Chanh's picture and statement were developed by 7th Psyps Battalion; and were dropped on the target areas. Leaflets and aerial broadcasts were used daily throughout the operation. All efforts were made to insure that the themes of the leaflets and broadcasts were relevant to the particular situation.

(c) Special leaflets and aerial loudspeaker broadcasts were frequently developed and used to support the tactical situation. The ground broadcasts teams were also used with the units to broadcast locally developed themes to ensure maximum utilization of Psyp assets.

e. Deception/Withdrawal

(1) Deception. There was not an actual deception plan in effect during the operation. However, it was anticipated that the pre-D-Day and D-Day operations would lead the enemy to believe that the operation was going to be centered in the Antenna Valley and mountains immediately around Antenna Valley.

(2) Withdrawal

(a) The withdrawal of forces from the operation was accomplished in several unrelated phases. Due to the relief in place of 2/1 by 1/1, the initial withdrawal commenced on 3 August. At 030730H, the helilift of 1/1's CP and Cos A & D commenced. The 1/1 CP and Co A helilifted into a LZ vicinity BT001427 to relieve the 2/1 CP and Co F. Co D, 1/1 helilifted into FSB Pony to relieve Co H 2/5. Utilizing the same helicopters that brought Co D into the zone, Co H 2/5 helilifted to a LZ vicinity AT987412 to return

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OPCON of 2/5. On 3 August, the 2/1 CP and Cos E and F withdrew from the operation. The following day, Cos G & H 2/1 were relieved in place and withdrew.

(b) On 7 August, 1/1 was withdrawn from the operation by helicopter from FSB Pony vicinity BP035475 and returned to OPCON of the 1st Marines. Battery B, 1st Battalion, 11th Marines was also withdrawn from FSB Pony this date.

(c) Bravo Battery, 64th Artillery Bn, in support of the 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-) located at FSB Ryder vicinity AT947345 was withdrawn on 8 August and returned to An Hoa Combat Base. In addition, Co I 3/5 moved overland from vicinity AT938442 to the An Hoa Combat Base to be withdrawn from the operation on 8 August.

(d) On 9 August, the 3/5 CP was withdrawn from the operation at LZ Ike vicinity AT948406 to An Hoa Combat Base. Two of 3/5's companies remained in the operation and 3/5 continued to control from the battalion CP located at the An Hoa Combat Base.

(e) The 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-) commenced a three (3) day overland movement on 8 August with intermediate objectives and a return to An Hoa Combat Base on 9 August.

(f) The largest withdrawal of forces in any one day occurred on 12 August. The entire 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, reinforced with Co M, 3/5, was helolifted from the southwestern Que Son Mountains to the An Hoa Combat Base. While the helolift of 2/5 was being conducted, Co K, 3/5 was moving overland from LZ Ike vicinity AT948406 to the An Hoa Combat Base. Prior to Co K departing LZ Ike on its overland march, W Battery 2/11 was helolifted back to An Hoa Combat Base on 11 August.

(g) The final phase of the withdrawal occurred on 13 August when Battery F, 2/11 and Co L 3/5 were helolifted from FSB Pony to the An Hoa Combat Base.

b. Bomb Damage Assessment (BDA). Bomb damage assessments were recorded by the 5th Marines Air Section on tactical air strikes. The analysis was made by the TAD(A), Aerial Observer, or ground unit supported. BDAs compare the amount of ordnance on target and the ordnance coverage of the target.

(1) The following bomb damage assessments were reported by airborne and ground observers:

(2) Numerous tactical air strikes were conducted in which no BDA could be assessed.

13. (S) ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

a. Administrative Plan. 1st Mar Div Admin Order 301-68 and 5th Marines Operation Order 1-69, Annex I, directed the procedures by which the administrative aspects of Operation DURHAM PEAK would be accomplished and described the logistics procedures to be followed. They were adequate in all respects as to basic concepts and procedures. The 5th Marines Logistics Operations Center (LOC), An Hoa, was operated in accordance with the Division SOP (DivO P4000.17A) which was found to provide adequate procedures and guidance.

b. Supply/Resupply

(1) The LSA, An Hoa, was the primary LSA which provided supply and service support to Operation DURHAM PEAK. No alternate LSA was designated; however, two artillery batteries were airlifted from the LSA at Hill 55, and this facility could have been used as an alternate had the need arisen.

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(2) Force Logistics Command (FIC) was the primary source of supply for all Marine units participating in the operation. FIC operated an LSU at An Hoa which maintained a 10 day level of Classes I, III, and V in the supply storage areas. All other classes of supply were ordered direct by the Marine operating units from FIC and delivered to the units (RUC LINES) at the An Hoa LSU.

(3) The ARVN Rangers' primary source of supply was their base camp at Phu Loc. Their supplies were delivered to a storage area provided for them at the LSA, An Hoa. ARVN personnel maintained and operated this storage area.

(4) The 5th Marines LOC supervised and coordinated the functioning of the LSA and the resupply of all units, including the ARVN units in the field.

(5) The flow of supplies to US units was as follows:

(a) Units made routine requests for supplies to their S-4 representative in the LOC by 1500 the day prior to delivery date.

(b) Unit representatives drew supplies from the LSU or unit supply storeroom.

(c) Supplies were staged by the helo pad at the LSA.

(d) HST personnel prepared supplies for external helicopter lifts.

(e) Supplies were lifted by helicopter and delivered direct to the units.

(6) The flow of supplies for the ARVN units was the same as above except for the following:

(a) Requests for supplies from the units in the field were made to the ARVN Group Headquarters, An Hoa.

(b) ARVN personnel drew supplies from ARVN storage area at the LSA, An Hoa.

(c) ARVN personnel staged the supplies on the helo pad at the LSA with the assistance of write-out material handling provided by the HST personnel.

(7) Resupply of units in the field on a daily basis was as shown in enclosure (21).

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(8) The following quantities of supplies and passengers were airlifted by CH-53s and CH-46s from the LSA.

(9) All external lifting equipment used by HST personnel for the delivery of supplies to the operating units performed satisfactorily. Of the 1,036 loads lifted, only 2 loads were inadvertently dropped. One was due to a broken pendant on a CH-53, and one was due to a defective hook on a CH-46.

c. Combat Loads

(1) Combat loads were as follows:

(2) The possibility of inclement weather and possible nonavailability of helicopters necessitated the establishment of a Class I emergency reserve for all units, except FSBs. To avoid overburdening troops, these emergency rations were limited to Long Range Patrol Rations which were issued only to units in mountain areas. This Headquarters was notified when reserve rations were consumed.

d. Transportation

(1) Transportation used during the operation consisted of surface movement by convoy to An Hoa and air transportation by helicopter to and from An Hoa and the units operating in the field. Supplies were delivered daily to the LSA at An Hoa from FIC, Da Nang, by convoy over 35 miles of MSR including an insecure portion of Route 540 from Liberty Bridge to An Hoa. Prior to dispatching the convoys each day, engineer teams swept the entire road for mines. Security for the convoys consisted of gun trucks at a ratio

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of one gun truck for every eight trucks. An infantry security unit consisting of two squads joined the convoy daily at Liberty Bridge and remained with the convoy until its return to Liberty Bridge on the return trip north. In addition, an AO was on station for all convoys traversing the road between Liberty Bridge and An Hoa. The convoys were occasionally delayed due to mining incidents or road washouts. Normally, a resupply convoy was able to complete a round trip from Danang to An Hoa and return on the same day, providing that no major problems or enemy action occurred during the trip.

(2) Transportation of supplies by fixed wing aircraft was not utilized. All high-priority supplies were flown to An Hoa by helicopter and all routine supply was by truck convoy.

(3) Units in the field were resupplied from the LSA by helicopter, with the primary resupply aircraft being the CH-53 and the CH-46 helicopters. Helicopter resupply was hampered for limited periods by high winds in the mountain areas and the lack of suitable and cleared landing zones. This caused resupply to be delayed at times and on occasion, completely cancelled prior to completion.

(4) During these resupply operations it was determined that a standard resupply package of CH-53s and CH-46s with UH-1E escorts were required each day for resupply only. If CH-53s were not available, they had to be replaced on approximately a four to one basis by CH-46s in order to be able to deliver the same amount of supplies to the units in the field.

(5) Throughout the operations, passengers were transported by helicopter and truck. Between Danang and An Hoa, passengers were carried by truck and CH-53s and CH-46s. Personnel were transported to the field only by helicopter.

a. Strengths, Casualties/Hospitalization and Graves Registration

(1) Strengths

(a) Total strength of forces employed in Operation DURHAM PEAK as of 2400H each Saturday is depicted in enclosure (22). The strength of the force was steady throughout the operation. The only major variance in the strength occurred during the period 3-7 August 1969 when 1st Battalion, 1st Marines was committed to the operation.

(b) Marine Rifle Company strengths are depicted in enclosure (23). Throughout the operation, all battalions were in a C-1 MARES readiness category based on chargeable strengths. However some companies had a low-effective field strength due to large number of non-effectives (hospital, awaiting transfer, admin hold, indoctrination training for newly joined personnel, etc.)

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(c) Due to limited contact with the enemy and the short period of the operation, the field strength of companies was not a major problem.

(2) Casualties and Hospitalization

(a) Concept

1 In support of Operation DURHAM PEAK, it was decided to supplement the medical facilities of the 5th Marines by the addition of a Shock and Resuscitation Team from the 1st Medical Battalion to be located at the RAS and to form a S&R Team/5th Marines Medevac Center. The team consisted of one general surgeon, one general medical officer, one lab technician, three operating room technicians, one Marine electrician, and one Marine driver in addition to the RAS staff of one GNO, one HMC and four general corpsmen. The team had the capabilities for emergency treatment and resuscitative measures such as administration of IV fluids and whole blood, tracheotomy, and the placement of chest tubes.

2 The concept of medical evacuation and treatment was as follows: It was felt that optimum patient care would be provided if casualties, when possible, were taken directly from the field by medevac helicopter to the hospital facilities in Danang. Thus, the majority of emergency and priority medevacs from the field bypassed An Hoa and were flown directly to Danang. In the following circumstances, medevacs from the field were brought directly to the An Hoa facility: (1) certain critically wounded patients who, in the opinion of the corpsmen aboard the medevac helicopter, required emergency treatment which could not be delayed by the time required for flight to Danang; (2) medevacs who because of tactical or logistical reasons could not be taken directly to Danang; (3) the majority of routine medevacs, who were then distributed to the appropriate BAS or held at the An Hoa facility for further evacuation to Danang. In addition, persons requiring medical evacuation to Danang facilities from the An Hoa Base were routed through this medevac center.

(b) Execution. The Shock and Resuscitation Team became functional on 20 July and continued to operate until termination of Operation DURHAM PEAK on 13 August. During this period, there was a total of nine emergency cases treated, four being the result of hostile action and five being non-battle casualties. In addition, there were 24 other battle casualties and 228 non-battle casualties routed through the medevac center. There were a total of four units of blood administered. No tracheotomies or closed thoracostomies were performed.

(3) Graves Registration. The Graves Registration at the An Hoa Combat Base accomplished the identification of KIAs. Graves Registration was under the OPCON of Support Company, Force Logistics Command, and received its supplies through LSU. Graves Registration had reefer space for 22 bodies. Bodies that could not be readily identified (such as bodies too

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badly burned or decomposed) were flown direct to 1st Medical Battalion, Danang, for identification and processing. Two acquaintances of the deceased were required to view the remains for the purpose of identification. The establishment of the Graves Registration at An Hoa significantly expedited the identification and processing of bodies.

(4) Non-Battle Casualties. Battle casualty statistics are shown in paragraph 12. Enclosure (25) depicts the number of non-battle casualties suffered due to illness, disease, or injury by accident.

(5) Malaria. Operation DURHAM PEAK was carried out in an area suspected to be one of high risk for malaria infection. The basic malaria preventive measures, that is, the use of repellent and other personal protective measures and the weekly administration of chloroquine primaquine prophylaxis was stressed. In addition, in an attempt to help determine the effectiveness of daily dapsone prophylaxis, roughly one half of the men operating in this high risk area were placed on daily dapsone for the duration of the operation. Specifically, in 3/5, K and L companies were on dapsone while I, M, and H&S were not; in 2/5, the Third Platoon and Weapons Platoon and the Company CP were on dapsone while the first and second platoons of each company were not. The total number of malaria cases contracted on the operation and the number of those who were on dapsone will be reported when this data becomes available.

f. Communication

(1) Radio Retransmission/Relay. A communications relay/retransmission team was organized in anticipation of direct communications difficulties between An Hoa and the Second Battalion, 5th Marines. The team was composed of seven men and 1140 pounds of equipment from Headquarters Company, 5th Marines, 2/5, and 2/11 and was helolifted to the Recon Battalion OP on Hill 425 (AT9946) on D+1. The team retransmitted a TACP Local Net frequency, the Regimental Tactical Net #2, an Artillery Liaison Net, and the administrative net of 2/5. The team also manually relayed the Regimental Tactical Net #1 in cipher and the Regimental Command Net. Difficulties arose with one of the AN/PRC-25 radios and five retransmission cables. On 22 July, a radio technician was sent to Hill 425 in order to make on the spot minor repairs of equipment. The team was resupplied with food, water, batteries, and crypto extracts approximately every three days throughout the duration of the operation.

(2) Radio Communications

(a) The 196th Brigade Signal Officer visited An Hoa prior to the operation and agreed to set up the necessary equipment and enter the Regimental Tactical Net #2 in cipher.

(b) It was initially estimated that VHF communications from An Hoa to FSB Ryder (Via AT9435) for the Engineer Company Team would not be practical. Accordingly, an HF 2-man radio team employing the AN/PRC-47 was

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dispatched on D-Day with the engineers to FSB Ryder. However, it developed that VHF communications from the FSB to An Hoa were in fact excellent and HF communications were not required.

(c) 3/5 and 2/1 entered the Regimental Tactical Net #1, TACP Local, and the Logistics Net as directed. In addition, 3/5 and 2/1 were informed that Regimental Tactical Net #2 and the Regimental Command Net would be manned by a listening watch at the Regiment.

(3) Frequencies. Several additional frequencies were allocated to the 5th Marines for use in DURHAM PEAK.

(a) A third VHF frequency for use as a TACP Local Net was provided in order to facilitate control over the supporting aircraft.

(b) VHF frequencies for the retransmission nets were procured for use on the Regimental Tactical Net #2, a TACP Local Net, Arty Liaison Nets, and the Administrative Net of 2/5.

(c) An additional Landing Zone Control Net was provided on 22 July in order to expedite the handling of resupply helicopters vectored to a total of ten separate LZs. In this connection the 196th Brigade Signal Officer provided the 5th Marines with a copy of the Brigade SOI containing their call signs and frequencies and they in turn were provided with a copy of the Regimental CEOI.

(4) Upon arrival of the 1st ARVN Ranger Group CP, Hq Co, 5th Marines provided the following communications support:

- (a) A telephone line to the 5th Marines Administrative Switchboard.
- (b) A telephone line to the 5th Marines COC Switchboard.
- (c) A telephone hot-line to the 5th Marines FSCC.
- (d) The use of two VHF antennas adjacent to the Alternate COC.
- (e) The use of an HF radio located at the Radio Bunker operated remotely from the Alternate COC.

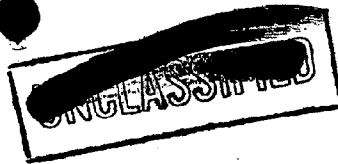
(5) Radio Relay.

(a) A direct link from the 7th Marines COC to the 5th Marines COC was established on Channel One of the AN/NRC-62 link to the 7th Marines. This channel was to coordinate the resupply of the 1st ARVN Ranger Group located at An Hoa from LZ 491 adjacent to the 7th Marines CP.

(b) A channel on the AN/TRC-97 was procured in order to establish a direct voice circuit between the 5th Marines COC and the 196th Infantry.

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Brigade's TOC.

(6) The Headquarters Company, 5th Marines Communications Platoon laid hot lines from ALO to RAS and from ALO to the helicopter crew bunker to provide rapid communications to the medevac helicopters and the medevac shack.

14. (S) SPECIAL EQUIPMENT/TECHNIQUES

a. Scout Dog Teams. During Operation DURHAM PEAK, Scout Dog Teams were used most effectively. The teams were credited with locating and detecting several enemy positions before the enemy could initiate action against friendly troops.

b. Use of TPQ-10s

(1) Air support radar teams (ASRT) and the AN/TPQ-10 Radar Course Directing Centrals were utilized to provide continuous air support to Operation DURHAM PEAK units. The primary function of ASRT was to provide harassing and interdicting bombing missions on enemy positions and installations.

(2) The total of air munitions delivered by ASRT controlled aircraft during Operation DURHAM PEAK was 813.75 tons.

c. Beacons. A total of two (2) beacon hops were flown during the operation. Ordnance delivered totaled 22 tons. Due to the nature of the terrain TPQ-10 flights were considered more effective in target coverage.

d. 50 Foot Pendant. Helicopter resupply operations in the mountain areas were frequently hampered by the lack of suitable sitdown landing zones. In these instances, the solution was the utilization of a 1/2 inch steel cable pendant up to 50 feet in length attached to the external load. This procedure allowed the aircraft to hover over the trees and slowly lower the load down through an opening. There were, however, several instances when pilots of CH-53s would not use the pendant because of the possibility of its breaking and causing damage to the aircraft.

e. Special Logistics Techniques/Logistic Operation Centers

(1) Use of 175mm Gun Canisters for Water Resupply Containers. During the operation, 175mm projectile canisters having a 12 gallon capacity were used for water resupply containers and proved to be a very durable substitute item for 5 gallon water containers. Their cylindrical shape makes the canisters easy to handle and load in a net as compared to the standard water can or plastic water containers which must be lifted in wire baskets to reduce damage and leakage. If retrograde is not possible, the canister can be destroyed by demolition or disposed of without resultant loss of T/E equipment. Prior to use, however, the canisters must be cleaned out and

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chlorinated.

(2) Logistics Operations Center

(a) During Operation DURHAM PEAK, a Logistics Operations Center (LOC) coordinated all the helicopter resupply for units in the field. The LOC was operated in strict compliance with the standing operating procedures for LOCs contained in Division Order P4000.17A.

(b) The center was under the direct control of the S-4, 5th Marines, and was manned by the following personnel:

- One captain - LOC Coordinator
- One staff sergeant - LOC Chief
- One private first class - Logistics Clerk
- One logistics representative and one radio operator - each Bn.

NOTE: The ARVN Rangers provided an English-speaking officer representative and a working party.

(c) The use of the Logistics Operation Center proved to be extremely successful in coordinating the overall resupply effort required during DURHAM PEAK.

(d) The only difficulties experienced during the operation, insofar as the LOC operations were concerned occurred when units attempted to deviate from the SOP. These actions either resulted in lifts not being recorded at the proper time or supplies not being staged in sufficient time for lift-out.

(e) The LOC staff operated at reduced personnel strength from that used during previous operations. It is believed that at least one additional clerk would have enabled more efficient and timely reporting of logistics data.

f. ZIPPO Teams (Zone Interpretation, Planning, Preparation, and Overfly)

(1) Prior to all major helolifts into unsecure landing zones, a ZIPPO Team was created to brief, plan, and select the landing zone. As a result of the use of ZIPPO Teams, all helolifts were effectively and successfully accomplished.

(2) The team consisted of key personnel from all participating units. The following were the representative personnel:

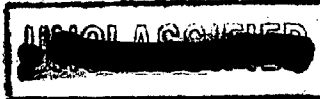
(a) Flight leader of troop lifts and gunship helo.

(b) Unit Air Officer.

(c) Commander of unit being lifted.

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(d) Helicopter controller, airborne, if utilized.

(3) Prior to making the visual recon overfly, the "ZIPPO" was briefed on the operation with regard to the mission, the concept, and tentative zones selected. Following the VR of the operating area, the team met to determine a final zone selection and provided an operations brief for key participating personnel.

(4) The "ZIPPO" Team was normally dispatched two days prior, but no later than one day prior to the planned helolift.

g. FIRPPO Team (Fire Base Interpretation, Recon, Planning, Preparation, and Overfly)

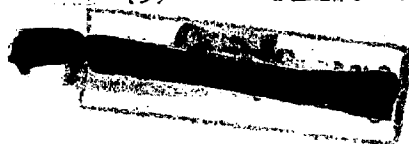
(1) A "FIRPPO" team was formed prior to the establishment of each FSB with the objective of determining the suitability of the selected LZ site and to make certain decisions as to the requirement, timing, and actual layout of the projected FSB. By an overfly the team made an inspection of each proposed site to determine gun positions, area to be cleared, bunker locations, and other pertinent data. The team was composed of the following:

- (a) Artillery Battalion Commander
- (b) Artillery Battery Commander
- (c) Engineer Officer
- (d) Infantry Commander responsible for providing security for FSB
- (e) Unit Air Officer

(2) The "FIRPPO" teams determined the following pertinent information prior to commencement of construction of each FSB.

- (a) Time and place for the establishment of the FSB.
- (b) Size of area required to be cleared.
- (c) Gun positions to be utilized.
- (d) Number of helo transportable tractors (M450 or M580) required.
- (e) Positions for storage of ammo and construction effort required.
- (f) Site for the Fire Direction Center bunker.
- (g) Estimated time required to complete construction of the FSB.

(3) The "FIRPPO" team made an actual on-site inspection as soon as



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possible after the site for the proposed FSB had been secured.

- (4) All "FIRPO" teams were successfully employed.

h. Employment of Bulk CS

(1) Bulk CS was utilized extensively during Operation DURHAM PEAK. Tunnel complexes were rendered unusable by "dusting" the floors with micro-pulverized CS.

(2) Although no confirmed data is available, it is believed that the CS will deny utilization of those areas to the enemy for a period of at least four months.

15. (S) PHOTOGRAPHIC SUPPLEMENT. The Informational Service Officer, 1st Marine Division, provided news release coverage for the operation. Enclosure (27) contains photographs taken during the operation for release to the news media. Enclosure (28) contains photographs taken during the operation, but not approved for release to the news media (to be issued).

16. (C) RECOMMENDATIONS/LESSONS LEARNED

a. Lessons Learned

- (1) Item: Fragmenting of company into platoon-size LZs for resupply.

Comment: In several instances, company-size units operating in the Que Son Mountains requested resupply at platoon positions, the interval between platoon positions being not more than 200 meters. Separate resupply missions for these small units subsequently resulted in loads approximately 750 pounds which constituted inefficient utilization of aircraft.

Recommendation: That one central company LZ for resupply be established and that smaller units draw their resupply from the LZ, if possible.

- (2) Item: Use of ARVN representative in LOC.

Comment: During Operation DURHAM PEAK, resupply for the ARVN Rangers was coordinated through the LOC at An Hoa. Initially a U. S. Army Advisor was utilized to assist in coordinating the ARVN lifts but he was not able to be physically located at the LOC. As a consequence, many difficulties arose due to a lack of constant supervision and coordination over ARVN working parties and resupply efforts. This was soon corrected by the assignment of an English-speaking ARVN Officer to the LSA/LOC.

Recommendation: That when U. S. units are effecting the resupply for ARVN or other free world forces, an English-speaking representative from that force be present at all times in the LSA/LOC.

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- (3) Item: Use of LZ Common radio circuit for other than resupply matters.

Comment: During the resupply operations it was found that many of the Company HST teams were using the LZ Common net to pass administrative and non-essential traffic. This caused the net to become overcrowded, thereby interfering with zone briefs to pilots and other essential resupply traffic. In all cases, this situation was attributed to the Battalion HST Team not exercising net control over its subordinate units.

Recommendations:

(a) That the Battalion HST Team maintain strict control over traffic on the LZ Common station.

(b) That only essential resupply traffic be passed over this net

- (4) Item: Fire Support Coordination

Comment: Fire support coordination between the 196th Infantry Brigade and the 5th Marines could have been improved if the 196th had provided an artillery liaison team to the 5th Marines during the operation.

Recommendation: That fire support liaison teams be provided for operations involving units other than Marines.

- (5) Item: Condition of bunkers delivered to Fire Support Bases.

Comment: Bunkers helilifted to the site were in some cases incomplete.

Recommendation: A close check should be made while staging to insure that bunker material is banded and the HST is briefed on the sequence and component listing for the lift.

- (6) Item: Information made available to engineers.

Comment: On several occasions, the Engineer Officer had inadequate information for planning his demolition efforts in the building of fire support bases and landing zones.

Recommendations: The Engineer Officer should be afforded the opportunity for a visual reconnaissance of FSBs and LZs.

- (7) Item: Aerial Loudspeaker Broadcasts

Comment: Aerial broadcasts were found to be most effective if

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they were utilized during the hours of darkness. Broadcasts at night were more audible and the enemy was more likely to hear the broadcast due to the fact that he probably was not moving at night in the mountains.

Recommendation: Whenever possible, utilize aerial loudspeaker broadcasts during the hours of darkness.

17. COMMANDER'S ANALYSIS

a. Tasks. The Force structure of Operation DURHAM PEAK was conceived and organized to execute a search and destroy operation within the enemy's old Base Area 116 thereby neutralizing its effectiveness. The stated mission could logically be divided into the following:

- (1) Destroy VC/NVA forces in the assigned AO.
- (2) Neutralize the Que Son Mountain Area formerly known as Base Area 116.
- (3) Develop Fire Support Bases as required in support of the operation.

b. Forces

- (1) Forces assigned to DURHAM PEAK were as follows:

(a) Three USMC Battalions, two being provided by the Fifth Marines and one by the First Marines. In conjunction with these forces, and operating in close cooperation and coordination, was the First ARVN Ranger Group, concentrated in the Antenna Valley Area.

(b) Artillery support was from the Second Battalion, Eleventh Marines (Rein) with six batteries of light artillery, one battery of medium artillery, and two platoons of heavy artillery, attaining a density of 44 artillery tubes, exclusive of Americal Division artillery units.

(c) The reconnaissance effort was executed by Company B, First Recon Battalion, and First Force Recon Company.

(d) Other combat support and combat service support units brought the total force strength to approximately 4040 Marines and 970 ARVN Rangers.

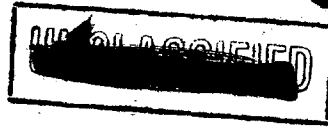
(2) The Marine forces were dependent logistically upon helicopter resupply, while rifle companies operated semi-independently in the mountainous area. Combat actions were characterized by meeting engagements of short duration with only a fraction of a unit involved.

c. Preoperational Intelligence. Analysis of the intelligence produced for the planning phase of Operation DURHAM PEAK established the enemy forces in the northern, central, and southern Que Son Mountains. The enemy situation in

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Antenna Valley fluctuated between enemy passing through the valley on a north-south movement to enemy temporarily resting in the Valley. No known enemy force had actually occupied the central or eastern portion of the valley for some time prior to DURNAM PEAK. Perhaps since the 1st VC Regiment departed during March-April of 1969. The enemy logistic, staging, medical, and training facilities were concentrated predominantly in the higher reaches of the central and northern Que Son Mountains. The supply routes, way stations, and a scattering of smaller logistics facilities were along the main infiltration/supply route from Antenna Valley through the higher reaches of the mountains into Phu Loc Valley. Of a more nebulous nature, were the locations of the Headquarters, 36th Regiment, and command/control elements of Front 4. The mobility of these elements and the cover and concealment afforded by the heavy secondary jungle growth was expected to contribute to the elusiveness of the Headquarters and Service Groups. The preoperational intelligence was vindicated by the actual location of ninety percent of the enemy units who were estimated to be in the area of operation.

d. Scheme of Maneuvers. The scheme of maneuver for the operation involved three (3) Marine battalions and the 1st ARVN Ranger Group (-). The 1st ARVN Rangers (-) helolifted into the Eastern Antenna Valley to block enemy escape routes south from the Que Son Mountains. One battalion helolifted into the vicinity of AT9440 to conduct search and destroy operations and block escape routes of enemy forces from the Que Son Mountains to the west and southwest. One battalion helolifted into the vicinity BT0048, AT9047, and BT0347 to conduct offensive search and destroy operations and block escape routes of enemy forces from the Que Son Mountains to the north and northeast. One battalion was held in reserve ready to exploit enemy contacts or reinforce friendly units as required. Elements of Americal Division screened the area east and south-east of Que Son Mountains while the reserve battalion was committed by helicopter to vicinity AT905415 to conduct offensive search and destroy operations in southwest area of operational AO.

e. Reconnaissance. Pre-operational reconnaissance teams deployed south of the DURNAM PEAK AO contributed valuable information primarily concerning the strength and direction of enemy units moving into the AO. Recon inserts further provided valuable helicopter terminal guidance and security for the helblift into Fire Support Base RYDER.

f. Intelligence Collection Agencies. During the operation, as many as 14 intelligence acquisition agencies supported Operation DURNAM PEAK. These assets, employed as described in paragraph 8.e., provided timely and accurate intelligence as a basis for maneuver and fire support planning.

g. Psychological Operations. Psychological operations in support of Operation DURNAM PEAK were conducted on a continuous basis. Daily leaflet drops and aerial loudspeaker broadcasts with "Daily Word" aircraft were planned and executed to exploit enemy contacts and the tactical situation. Special leaflets were developed and used to support the tactical situation.

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h. Air Support. Marine Air, augmented on occasion by Army aircraft and frequently by Air Force fixed wing aircraft, played a vital role in the operation. Every major troop lift, all supplies, as well as artillery pieces and ammunition were helo-transported into the operation area. Fixed wing observation planes sought out the enemy and called close air support strikes and artillery fire throughout the area of operations. A total of 369 Deacon and TPQ sorties, delivering 835.75 tons of ordnance, interdicted enemy positions and infiltration routes. Visual reconnaissance gave unit commanders and their staff an invaluable knowledge of the terrain, enemy disposition, and relative distances. The assignment of a medevac helicopter to the An Hoa Area contributed to a significant reduction in friendly losses by decreasing materially the time lapse between request and pickup. These aircraft carried 586 sick and wounded to life-saving medical facilities.

i. Artillery. The preponderance of artillery support for Operation DURHAM PEAK was dependent upon helicopter availability for initially establishing the fire support bases and for daily resupply. Because of the total heavy resupply demand placed upon the helicopter assets, the 2 1/2 batteries in the field proved to be the maximum supportable. Of course, more artillery units could have been displaced to the field if their ammunition consumption was restricted, i.e., contact missions only.

j. Logistics

(1) The logistic support concept for Operation DURHAM PEAK proved to be completely sound. Supply levels established at the LSU located at An Hoa were based upon a 10 day requirement. These pre-established levels were deemed necessary as a contingency for any possible delays in convoy resupply from the primary supply point (FIC) or the interruption of air resupply from Danang due to bad flying weather.

(2) The Logistics Operations Center (LOC) effectively coordinated the large number of unit resupply requirements. The LOC constantly supervised the flow of supplies and, therefore, had the capability for determining current resupply levels and had the reactive power to promptly correct serious supply deficiencies in the field. Strict adherence to the concept and SOP for the LOC proved to be the key to successful logistical operations.

(3) Based upon the probability of periods of inclement weather and non-availability of helicopters and the consequential inability to resupply, prescribed minimum stock levels were established for FSBs of five days operational stock level of all classes of resupply. Units operating in the field normally carried a minimum of two days normal Class I, one day emergency Class I, and a BA, and three days of ammunition. All these levels proved completely adequate to meet operational contingencies. There were no requirements for emergency resupply to any units during the operation.

(4) The primary resupply vehicle was the helicopter. Although resupply was hampered occasionally by inclement weather and lack of helicopters, the

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overall supply effort and support was deemed more than adequate. There would be no major changes in the concept of the logistical operations if the operation were to be conducted again. A total of 1,036 resupply lifts weighing 2,040 tons were delivered to units during Operation DURHAM PEAK.

k. Engineers. Engineer operations in the Que Son Mountains required a rapid and concentrated engineer effort which was primarily concerned with the rapid development of FSBs and HLZs on selected objectives. In general, engineers performed effectively and resourcefully, while contributing significantly to the attainment of the operation goals.

l. Communications. In the aggregate, communications were adequate to support the scheme of maneuver. However, some difficulties were experienced in maintaining direct communication links to certain units, e.g., between 2/5's Forward Air Controllers and the An Hoa Air Liaison Officer, and between 2/5's Forward Observers and the Fire Direction Center at Fire Support Base PONY. As 2/5 descended the southeastern slope of the Que Son Mountains. The rapid installation of automatic radio retransmission equipment immediately resolved the problem.

m. Summary. Although large scale contacts were not established with the enemy during the operation, DURHAM PEAK was highly successful in that it denied the enemy freedom of movement in his normally natural haven. The presence of a multi-battalion force caused the enemy to abandon his numerous base camps and flee to the lowlands north and south of the Que Son Mountains where he was exposed to other supporting units who added to the chaos of an already confused and disorganized enemy. The numerous large base camps were not only burned and destroyed but the area was rendered ineffective for an estimated period of five (5) or six (6) months by use of micro-pulverized CS gas. Of significant value is the intelligence information gained concerning the Que Son Mountains, i.e., trail networks, base camps, caves, etc. Undoubtedly, the enemy will return in force to the Que Son Mountains. When he does and if another large size operation is conducted in the area, the intelligence information gained on DURHAM PEAK will contribute greatly to the planning and conduct of a subsequent operation. There will be a significant lapse in time before the enemy reconstitutes his previous logistics and command structures in the Que Son Mountains. In particular, it is believed that the 36th NVA Regiment has been rendered totally ineffective, at least for the short run. The most immediate result of the operation was the disruption of the enemy's ability of immediately mounting and sustaining a major attack from the Que Son Mountains.

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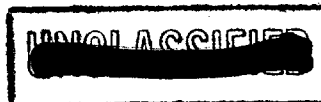

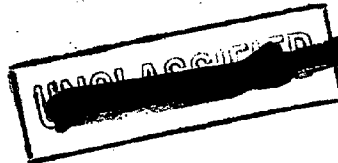

g. Problem Encountered:

(1) The only problem encountered was that when the bunkers arrived they were not complete. Whether those pieces were not cut or were lost in transport is difficult to say. This did delay completion of the base though by approximately 6 hours. This time could prove to be critical. To avoid this problem in the future a close check should be made to assure all materials are out and staged properly; also, that these materials are properly banded together.

h. Comments: The advanced party of artillery and engineer team landed at the same time at an already secure LZ Pony. From that time on there was mutual cooperation between the artillery people, the infantry security, and the engineers. This cooperation allowed the most effective base to be constructed in a minimum time.

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g. Problem Encountered:

(1) The main problem encountered upon this LZ was that of never having seen the area before going into blow the LZ. For instance, the growth on this particular LZ was mostly scrub and small saplings with very few large trees. Engineers landed with only C-4 explosive which was excellent for blowing the larger trees but the smaller stuff was so flexible that they would bend with the blast and for the most part, were very slightly damaged. What would have been ideal for this particular LZ and area is bangalore torpedoes, which finally managed to come in on resupply. In using the bangalors, the work was out in half, because the fragments at detonation cleared out all of the small scrub growth and saplings leaving the larger trees which were blown down with C-4.

h. Comments: The senior engineer should have more information made available to him, if at all possible, so that he can utilize his arsenal of explosives to do his work more effectively using less explosives and man power.

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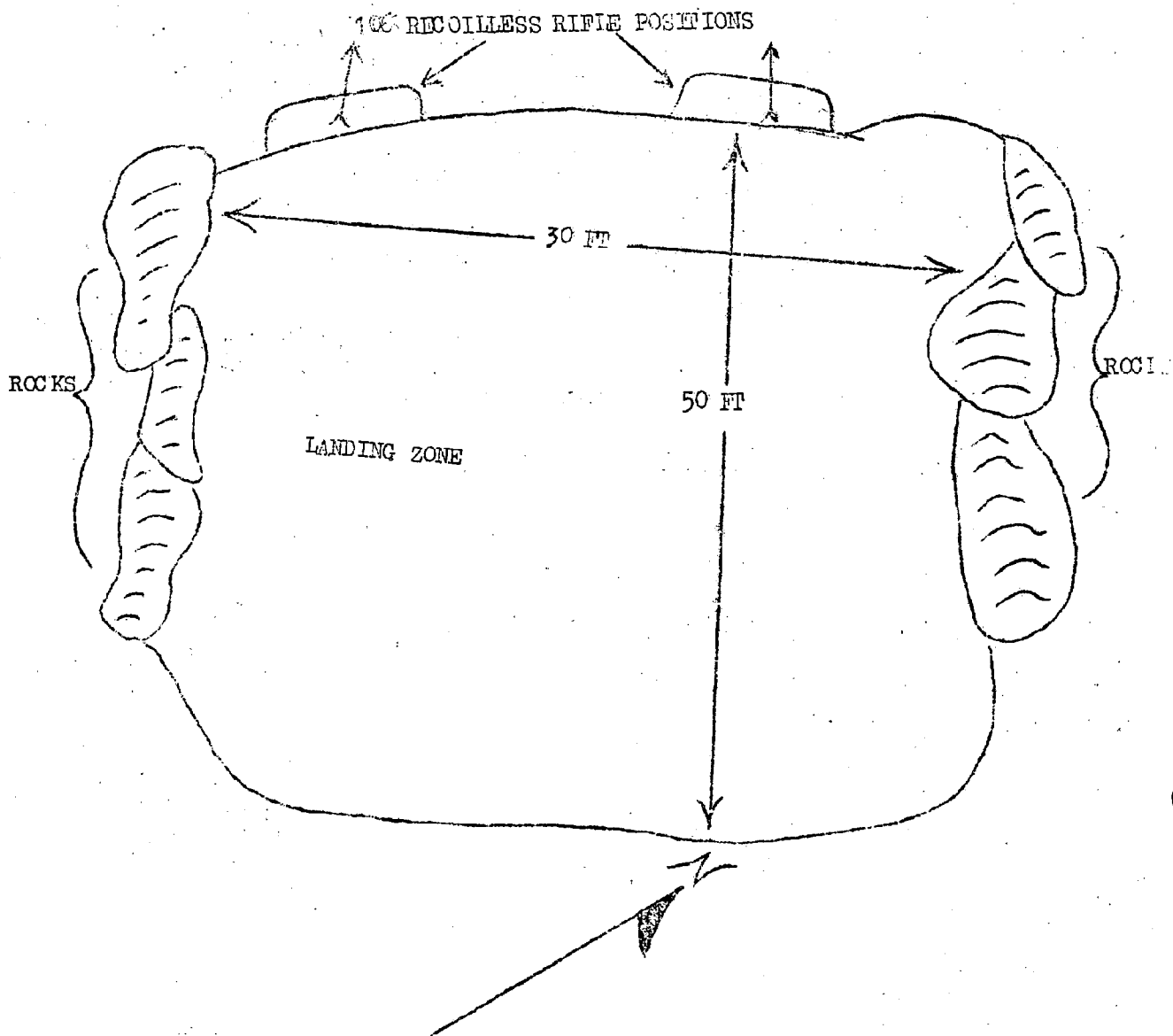

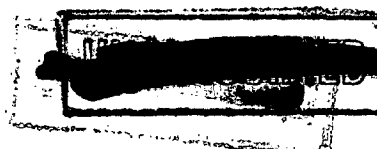

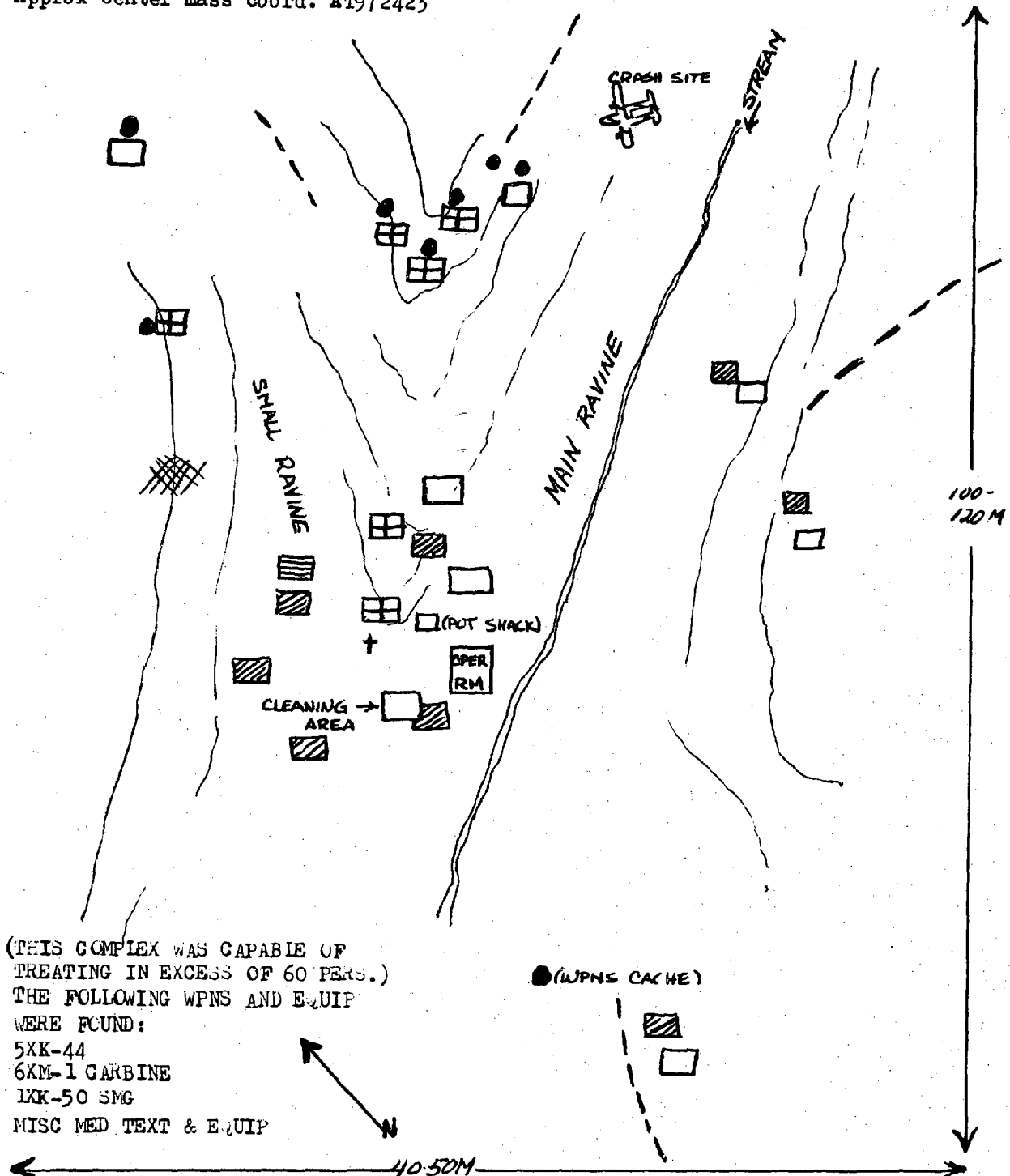
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Diagram of hospital area discovered by 1/3/5 on 021300Z Aug 69

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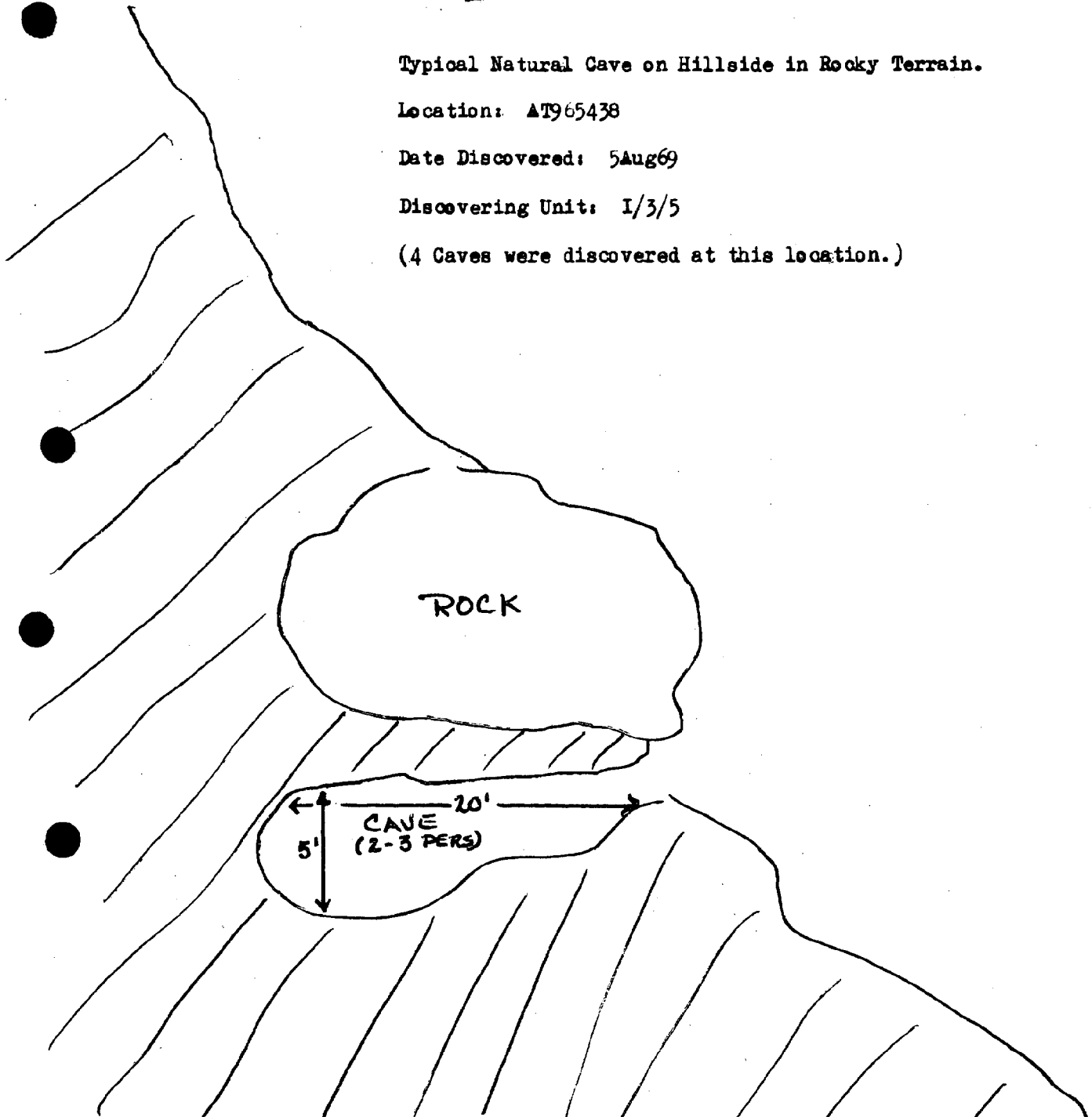

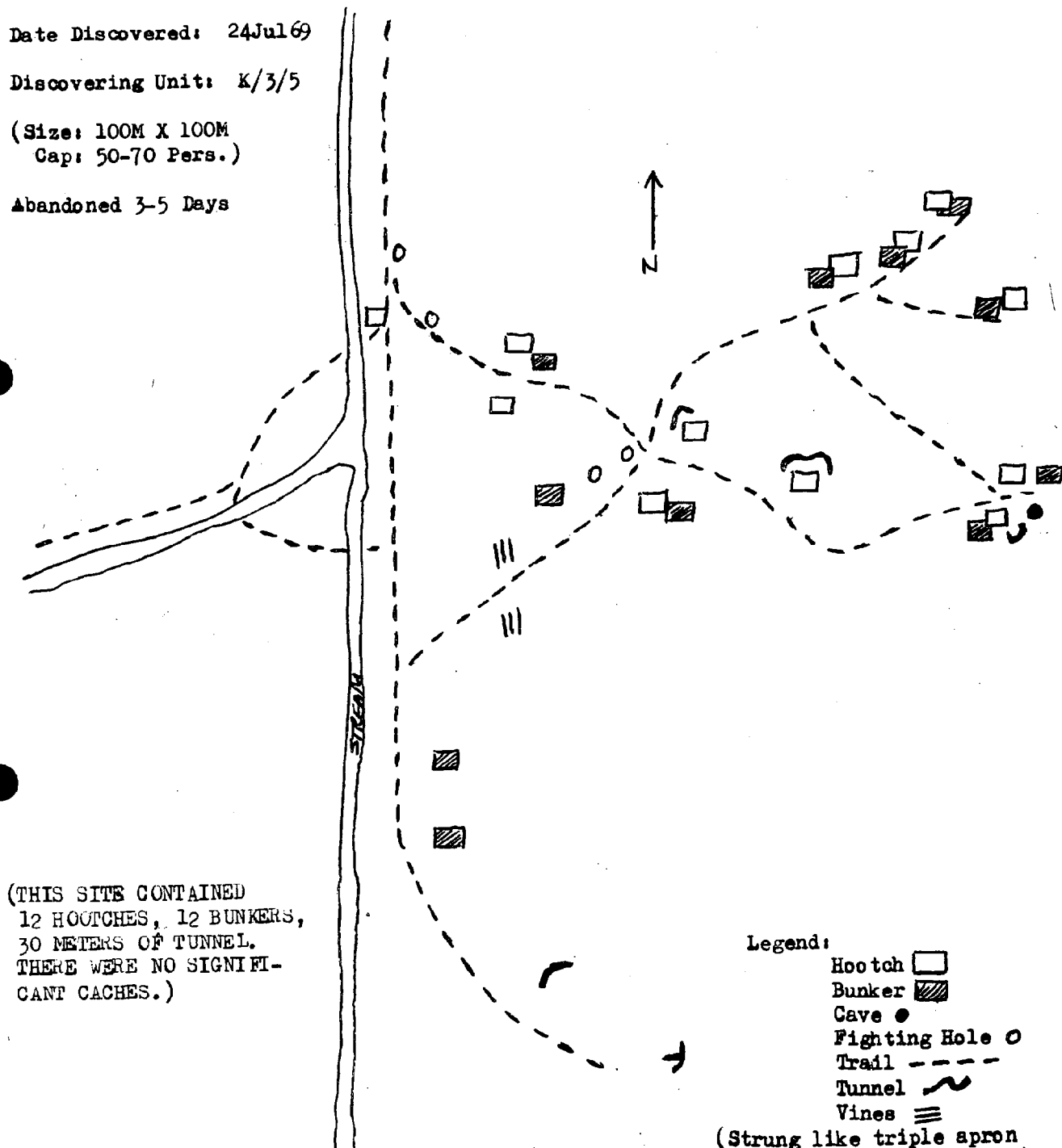

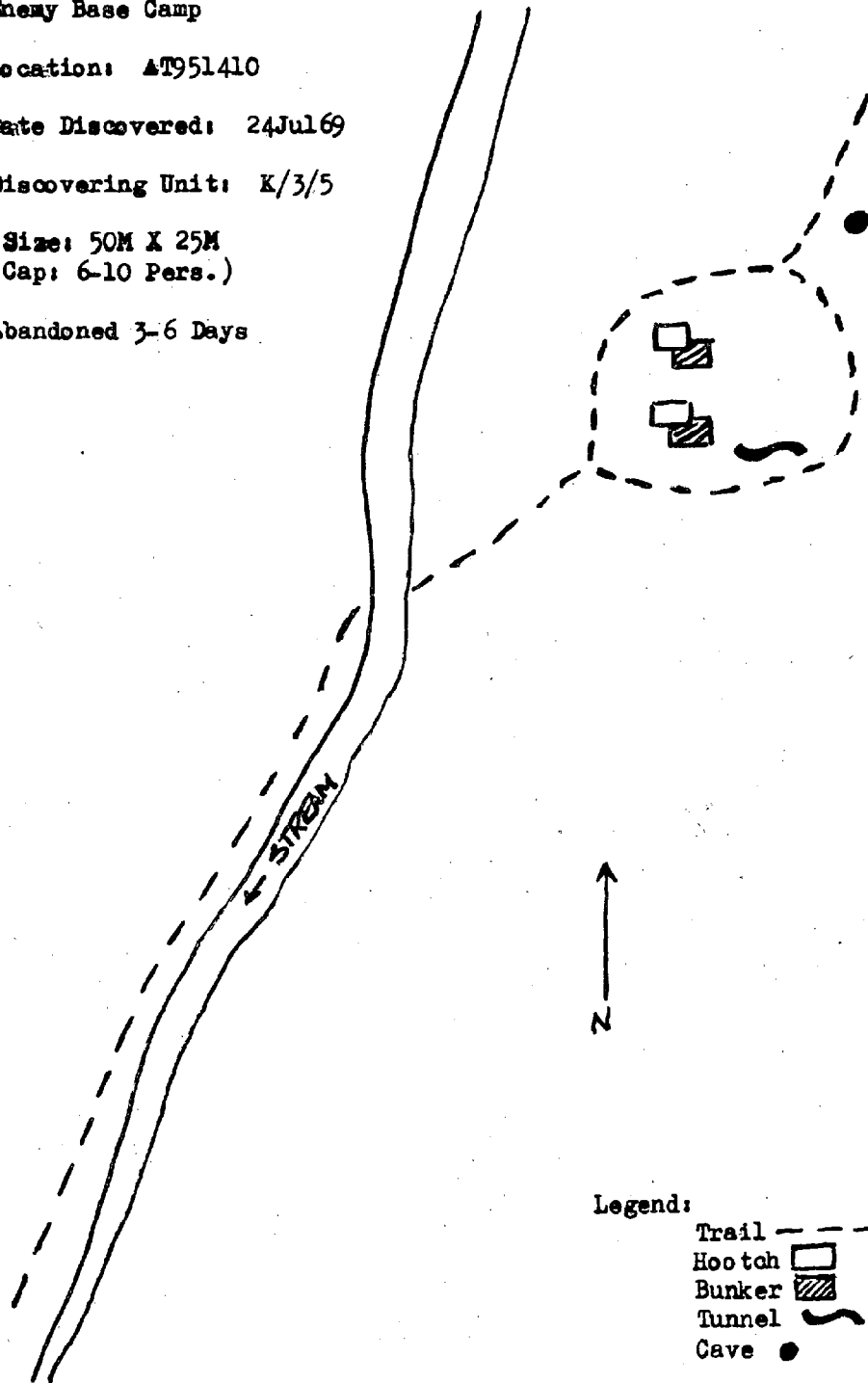

a. Psyops assets immediately available to support DURHAM PEAK included one Ground Broadcast Team in direct support of the 5th Marines. In addition the 7th Psyops Battalion assisted in the development and reproduction of leaflets and tapes. Early Word was available on short notice to take advantage of the tactical situation and exploit Hoi Chanhs. The 9th Special Operations Squadron flew all aerial leaflet drops and aerial loudspeaker broadcasts. During these air operations a total of 4,717,000 leaflets were dropped and 4 hours of aerial loudspeaker broadcasts were flown and Early Word broadcast a total of 9 hours. The Ground Broadcast Teams were used in the last phases of the operation. They were attached to 2/5. Two NVA Hoi Chanhs and nine NVA POWs were produced as a direct result of the Psyops input.

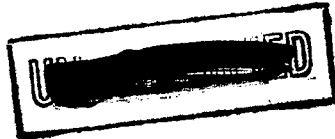

1. Page 2 of this enclosure provides statistical figures concerning messages sent and received by the 5th Marine Regiment prior to and during Operation DURHAM PEAK. The figures are set apart in three categories:

- a. Three weeks traffic figures prior to commencement of the planning phase (14 June to 5 July 1969).
- b. Two weeks constituting the planning phase (6 July to 19 July 1969).
- c. Four weeks constituting the operations phase (20 July to 13 August 1969)
(Note: The final week's figures are projected, not actual, so that they can be compared with the previous week's figures.)

2. Message traffic counts during the planning phase show that the first week's traffic remained at the same level as previous weeks and the second week's traffic dropped by approximately 27%. Traffic remained at approximately that level until the last two weeks of the operation when the traffic count jumped 54% over the previous three weeks count.
