SECRETPART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY1. PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

a. Strength. Total strength at the beginning of the month was 38 officers and 1093 enlisted. By 15 May the Battalion's strength was 37 Marine Officers and 1059 Marine Enlisted. By the end of the month the Battalion's strength had changed to 32 Officers and 1008 Enlisted. At this time one officer and 29 enlisted are hospitalized. Joinings during the month totaled one officer and sixty-three enlisted.

b. Discipline, Law, and Legal. There were nine Special Courts-Martial and three Summary Courts-Martial convened during May. This left three Specials and three Summaries to be processed. Six investigations were completed, and three are pending.

c. POW/Detainees. There were twenty detainees processed during May. Nine detainees were classified POW.

d. Morale. Morale and fighting spirit remain excellent.

e. Postal. Postal Service is still at a noteworthy high. Mail is quickly distributed after being received twice daily. Delivery of mail to the field is going smoothly.

f. Awards. Six Silver Stars, seven Bronze Stars, and six Navy Commendation Medals were presented to members of this Battalion. Six Bronze Stars, seven Navy Achievements and seven Purple Hearts were forwarded to former members of this command. Numerous recommendations were submitted during the month for heroism and meritorious service.

g. Interior Management. Administrative procedures, as well as the proficiency of the Battalion, continued to improve.

2. ENEMY, WEATHER AND TERRAIN. During this period 1st Battalion, 5th Marines was committed to "OPERATION HOUSTON" Phase II. This portion of the Command Chronology is included in the After Action Report attached hereto as Tab "A".

3. ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS.

a. Organization. The organization of the battalion remained substantially the same throughout the month of May. The battalion continued in Operation "HOUSTON" Phase II throughout the month from 010001H through 312400H. The following units were OPCON to the Battalion during the month:

- (1) Det, Sentry Dog Teams, 3rd MPBn
- (2) Det, Scout Dog Teams, 3rd MPBn
- (3) Det, Scout Sniper Plat, HqCo, 5th Mar
- (4) Det, Co B, 1st Engr Bn
- (5) Company M, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines was OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 010001H through 061400H May 1968.
- (6) Company A, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines was OPCON to Fifth Marines from 010001H through 012400H May 1968.
- (7) 3rd Plat, Company D, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines was OPCON to 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines from 091400H through 161630H May 1968.
- (8) Elements of First Force Recon Company and Company H, 2nd Battalion, 27th Marines formed a provisional company and were OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 291910H May 1968 to 300700H May 1968.

b. Operations.

(1) The Battalion continued to participate in Operation "HOUSTON" Phase II from 1 May 1968 through 31 May 1968. Phase III Operation "HOUSTON" commenced at 010001H 1 Jun 1968.

(2) The Battalion conducted numerous small unit operations during the month. The following activities were conducted:

(a) Day activities for the month totalled 15 fire team activities; 160 squad activities; 92 platoon activities; and 11 Company Operations.

(b) Night activities for the month totalled 12 fire team activities; 575 squad activities; 42 platoon activities; and 4 Company Operations.

(3) During Phase II, units of the Battalion assisted GVN forces in conducting rice denial operations. Through combined efforts, over 350 tons of rice was stored in secure areas.

(4) Two combined operations were conducted with elements of the Provincial Reconnaissance Unit. One, a Cordon and Search, resulted in the detention of nine civil defendants, purchasers for the VC. The second operation, a night raid supported by blocking forces, produced the following results: Eight VC KIA confirmed, and 8 AK-47's captured.

c. Supporting Arms.

(1) Air. During this period 31 missions were flown by Marine TAC/AO teams for 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, controlling 10 flights of fixed wing and providing valuable aerial observation in support of the Battalion's mission of patrolling, road security, special operations and waterway denial. Other missions completed included 13 visual reconnaissance missions, 49 medevacs, 12 flareships, 8 flights of HUE-1 Gun Ships and 1 Spooky mission.

(2) Artillery. Battery "D", 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines was in direct support for 1st Battalion, 5th Marines during the month of May. Following an expansion of 1st Battalion, 5th Marines AO, Battery "E", 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines assumed a mission of General Support with Priority of Fires for 1st Battalion, 5th Marines. The majority of artillery fire support was in the form of Day and Night Harassing and Interdiction fires, Blocking Fires and S-2 Targets. Reconnaissance inserts and CAP units were also supported by artillery fires from Batteries "D" and "E".

(3) Tanks. Tanks were employed in small unit mechanized patrols south of route # 1 to search for and destroy enemy forces and to determine trafficability of the terrain for tracked vehicles.

(4) Ontos. Ontos were employed in small unit mechanized patrols south of route # 1 to search for and destroy enemy forces and to determine trafficability of the terrain for tracked vehicles.

4. TRAINING.

a. The following training was conducted during the month:

- (1) Weapons Safety
- (2) Ambushes
- (3) Patrolling

- (4) Gun drill: 81mm; 60mm; 106MM's; and M-60 MG
- (5) Small Unit Leadership
- (6) Care and Cleaning of Weapons and Equipment
- (7) Mapping and Compass
- (8) Familiarization Firing and Zeroing of Small Arms
- (9) Weapons Inspection

b. During the past month, three courses of instructions were conducted on the battalion level as follows:

(1) Artillery F.O. Procedures. A four-hour course with three hours of application, taught four times to a total of twenty-four Marines.

(2) Communications Procedures and Preventive Maintenance for the AN/PRC 25, 41 and 47. This course of twenty-four hours instruction and application taught over a three-day period was repeated three times and was attended by twenty-four Marines.

(3) Radar PPS-6 Operators. This course of twenty-four hours instruction and application taught over a three-day period, was repeated three times and was attended by eight Marines.

c. Replacement personnel received five (5) days training at 5th Marines Headquarters prior to being committed to the field.

d. The Battalion continued to utilize schools provided by higher headquarters. During the month, 28 members of the Battalion attended schools in DaNang and Okinawa.

## 5. LOGISTICS.

a. Supply. During the past month no major problems occurred in the logistical area. The resupply of companies along route # 1 was greatly assisted by the addition of two 6x6 trucks, which gives the Battalion four 6x6 trucks. Three of the trucks are utilized from the Phu Bai area, and the fourth assists the company which operates in the vicinity.

#### 7. Supporting Forces

a. Air. 1st MAW provided fixed wing and helicopter support. During this period 9 missions were flown by Marine TAC/40 Teams for 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, controlling 1 flight of fixed wing and providing valuable aerial observation in support of the Battalion's mission of patrolling, road security, special operations and waterway denial. Other missions completed included 7 visual reconnaissance missions, 18 Modovacs, 2 flareships, and 4 flights of HUE-1 Gunships.

b. Artillery

(1) Delta Battery, 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines, was in direct support of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines with Echo Battery, 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines, in general support with priority of fires to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines. A platoon of 155 guns from 1st 155 Gun Battery, 11th Marines also provided support.

(2) Delta Battery fired a total of 54 missions in support of the maneuver elements.

(3) Artillery support for the month was primarily unobserved missions such as S-2 Targets, Blocking Fires and Harassing & Interdiction Fires.

(4) An average of 55 H&I Fires were delivered daily on likely enemy targets.

c. Tanks. Tanks were employed in Direct Support of small unit and platoon size mechanized patrols to search for and destroy enemy forces and equipment, and to determine the trafficability of the terrain for tracked vehicles. Excellent results were achieved by using tanks to support an infantry assault.

d. Ontos. Ontos were employed in Direct Support of small unit and platoon size mechanized patrols to search for and destroy enemy forces and equipment, and to determine the trafficability of the terrain for tracked vehicles. Excellent results were achieved by using Ontos to support an infantry assault.

e. Engineers. Engineers were employed principally to supervise mine laying, construct bunkers, destroy duds, booby traps and captured enemy ammunition, and to conduct daily mine sweeps of the road networks in the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines TAOR.

f. Shore Party (HST). HST provided good support in coordinating and effecting helicopter resupply and medevacs.

a. Estimate of NVA/VC strength, location and disposition in the objective area. Intelligence reports received from 5th Marines order of Battle Section on 30 June 1968, identified elements of the following units operating in or near the Battalion's Area of Operation.

b. Enemy strength and disposition actually determined during operations.

(1) Based on information derived from POW enemy documents recovered, intelligence reports from higher headquarters and the nature of enemy contacts encountered during this period, enemy strength within the Battalion AO was estimated to be one regiment, and separate supporting units. The enemy had the capability of reinforcing with one regiment(-) within 14 hours.

(2) A total of 19 contacts were recorded during this period, nine were friendly initiated by ambush and patrols. One Anti-Tank mine was discovered and destroyed in place.

c. NVA/VC Unit Identified. During this reporting period, a document taken from a body revealed elements of the D4C Battalion were operating in the Battalion's TAOR.

d. Significant Intelligence Gained. During this reporting period an increase in enemy contacts (probes and harassing friendly positions in the Battalion AO) indicates that the enemy is completing his reorganization.

e. Terrain. (No change).

f. Weather. Throughout this period of the operation, the weather was warm to hot during daylight hours, and mild to cool at night. Sky conditions were partly cloudy during the day with afternoon and evening thunderstorms or rain showers. Mostly clear skies were reported during the nights. Visibility was generally unrestricted, decreasing 1-3 miles in shower activity. Air operations were hampered slightly during this period.

9. Mission. 1st Battalion, 5th Marines provide security for vital bridges along MSR and observation posts in

AO. Conduct Search and Destroy operations in AO to fix and destroy the enemy, his weapons, supplies and fortifications. Conduct rice denial operations. Assume Bald Eagle/Sparrowhawk commitment and other missions as directed.

(1) Intelligence reports received from 5th Marines on 23 May 1968, identified elements of the following units, operating in or in the vicinity the Battalion's area of operation.

b. Enemy strength and disposition actually determined during operations.(1) Phu Bai TAOR

(a) Based on information derived from POW enemy documents recovered and the nature of enemy contacts encountered during this period enemy strength was estimated one Regiment plus Company size separate units within the Battalions TAOR.

(b) A total of fifty contacts were recorded during this period, thirty two were friendly initiated by ambushes and patrols. The enemy contacts were characterized by harassment/sniping incidents of friendly isolated outposts and patrols. Mining incidents were on an increase in the last 5 days of the reporting period within Company B, A0. Two anti-tank mine and two box mines were detected or detonated. The enemy executed attacks by fire utilizing 82mm and 60mm mortars on five occasions during this reporting period. The enemy effected a major effort during the attack of 10 May 1968 against the Troui Bridge.

(c) The local rice harvest continued throughout this reporting period. The enemy continued his effort to resupply by sending columns of rice bearers by night, escorted by armed NVA security elements, to the lowlands and across highway # 1 to the rice fields of Phu Loc, Huong Thuy and Phu Vang Districts.

c. NVA/VC Unit identified

(1) Interrogation of enemy POW/CHIEU HOI/DETAINEES revealed the following:

(a) Subject, a rice carrier who rallied to village chief on 010700H May 68 identified his unit as the "Correder Co," which is subordinate to the K-10 Bn. The company has a strength estimated at 44 men.

(b) DO HUU HUNG, NGUYEN VAN DANH, TRUONG VAN BUI, TRAN NGOC TRUNG, HUYNH VAN CHANH, all riflemen who rallied to Company D, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on 040630H May 68 identified their unit as the "Capitol Ranger Co", which is normally assigned a reinforcement mission. The Capitol Ranger Co consists of 150 men, which carry 3 B-40's, 1 B-41 and numerous individual weapons. Other units identified were the K-2, K-4 and K-6 whose locations were unknown to sources.

(c) HUYNH VAN CHANH, a squad leader who rallied to Company D, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on 051610H May 68 identified his unit as the "CO AN Co" (Capitol Rangers). Source was formerly a member of VC 1st Defense Platoon which operates regularly in hamlet Thon Vy Da (YD 780235). Location of the CO AN Co is unknown.

(d) TRAN CU, a rice carrier who deserted from the ARVN Paratroopers and rallied to CAG H-3 on 171930H May 68. His unit designation was unknown to source as he claimed he was solely utilized as a rice carrier. Source was forced to act as a rice carrier for hamlet VC organization. Subject identified the following infrastructure as active in his hamlet: LE THANH, DIST COMMITTEE, TRUONG DAT, (VC VILLAGE CHIEF), LE DU, (FEMALE GUERRILLA), TRAN HIECH, (AUTONOMOUS CHAIR), LE DOI, (AUTONOMOUS COMMITTEE), LE CHINH, (GUERRILLA), LE DUC (GUERRILLA).

(e) LE THAN TUNG, a squad leader for the "CO BINH Co", 2nd squad. Source indicated the strength of the 2nd squad was 11 men with 10 AK-47's, 1 B-40. His company strength was 39 men, and 4 officers. This particular unit was formerly designated "CO BEE Bn" and "MAICHI Bn". Subject could not specify what the respective units former designation had been. Other units were not identified.

(f) NGUYEN VAN THIET, a rice carrier who rallied to village chief on 091045H May 68 identified his unit as being the "PHAN DOI Co", "BIET DONG Bn" (Transportation Bn), he was in the 2nd squad, 3rd platoon. This unit reportedly was to provide replacements for the K-10 K-4 and other unidentified Battalions. Subject claims no specific knowledge of the location of any units he identified. When he rallied, subject was a member of a enemy resupply party of 40 men. The composition of source's unit was as follows: 2 squads to each platoon; 1 squad had 17 men. The squad leaders are all NVA and are armed with AK-47's. The remainder of men carried no weapons. Each company consists of 4 platoons. An unknown number of companies comprised a battalion whose T/O strength was (150) men. Source's unit has operated with K-10 and K-4 Bn's. K-10 and K-4 elements provided security screen for resupply parties. Point elements comprised a ten man group armed with seven carbines, two AK-47's and one B-40 Rocket Launcher.

(g) LE THAN TUNG, a squad leader for VC unit "CO BINH" (Separate action unit) rallied to village chief on 191030H May 68. Source revealed that a VC assistant District Chief had made a liaison trip from Hue to subject unit "CO BINH" on 9 May 68. The purpose of TUNG's trip was to coordinate Hue VC Cadre participation in NVA planned attack against Hue. Subject indicated that TUNG has contact with at least seven other VC Cadre which subject identified as follows: Dieu, Gai, Lanh, Bo, Ti, Mai, and Ong-Sau. Subject had knowledge of at least 5 other armed VC who are currently waiting orders and living in Hue City.

(h) PFC NGUYEN DINH LACH, PFC HONG VAN TRUNG, PFC LE VAN DUNG, all riflemen, PHAM PHU NGOC, an infantry squad leader, PFC NGUYEN VAN DUNG, and Pvt NGUYEN TRONG KHANH, rice carriers, indicated they were members of the respective following units: 5th Co, K-4 Bn; 1st Co, K-4 Bn; 1st Co, K-4 Bn; 2nd Co, K-4 Bn; 2nd Co, K-4 Bn; 2nd Co, K-4 Bn. All were captured by Company B, 1st Battalion 5th Marines on 29 May 68. Strength and equipment; 1st and

2nd Co have 90 men each, 5th Co has 150 men, 1st and 2nd Co have unknown number of small arms, 3xB-40's per Co, two 60mm Mortars per Co, 5th Co has 4 82mm Mortars, three 60mm Mortars, six B-40's, three B-41's and unknown number of small arms (SKS and AK-47). Composition of 1st and 2nd Co's as follows: three squads of seven men each, per platoon, three platoons per company, 5th Co has four squads of ten men each platoon, three platoons per company. The composition of the battalion is unknown.

(i) NGUYEN VAN HAM, Pvt, riflemen, and HUU TRUNG, Pvt, B-41 Rocket man revealed they were members of the K-8 Bn, and K-85 Bn respectively. They were captured by Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on 291800H May 68. TRUNG stated that he had been in the army since 25 August 67. He stated that the subordination of the unit was as follows: the 9th Rgt., K-85 Bn., 5th Co, 2nd platoon, 5th squad. There was only one B-41 in his company, no B-40s. HAM stated that K-8 Bn has an unknown number of men and equipment. 6th Co, had 120 men and unknown equipment. 3rd platoon had 30 men and unknown equipment. 2nd squad had ten men divided into two five-man sections. 1st Section had five men with SKS. 2nd section had five men with two AK-44, two submachineguns and one AR. The 2nd platoon has a fourth squad. First platoon has one 60mm Mortar. Subject indicated he had no knowledge of other companies in the battalion. Sixth Co has four platoons numbered one, two, three, four. Third platoon has three squads numbered one, two, three. Source had no knowledge of other units.

(j) PHAN VAN DONG, PFC assigned to the K-15 Bn, was captured by Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on 291300H May 68. He is an assistant radio operator. Strength and equipment of the C-1: the company has 60 men with nine 60mm Mortars, two I.M.G., nine B-41, eighteen B-40. C-2 company has 70 men with nine 60mm Mortars, one I.M.G., nine B-41, eighteen B-40. C-3 Company has 200 men with nine 60mm Mortars. Battalion headquarters is comprised of approximately 44 men. The headquarters reportedly utilizes 15 watt hand generator radio. Each company has three platoons numbered one, two, three. Each platoon has three squads numbered 1, 2, 3. There are 6-7 men per squad and most armed with AK-47. Each squad has two B-40 and one B-41.

**SECRET****d. Significant Intelligence Gained.**

(1) Order of Battle. The following additional information was obtained concerning units identified in paragraph 8.c.

(a) The "Corredor Company", a newly formed unit with strength estimated at 44 men was identified by a Chiou Hoi with the mission to provide security for rice resupply mission of the K-10 Bn. It is believed that the Corredor Company is subordinate to the K-10 Bn. When employed, the company provides scouts/reconnaissance personnel for rice carrying groups of 200-300 men. Approximately half of the rice carriers are youth volunteers. Many of the youth volunteers are females. Source asserted that only half of the K-10 carry weapons on rice missions. Rice runs are made nightly and the entire group crosses the highway # 1, at (YD 919112), a trail junction with highway # 1. An alternate crossing is in the vicinity of (YD 932090) (path leading through graveyard). Time of crossing is approximately 2200H everynight. The return crossing is done regularly at 0100H. One platoon from Corredor company normally provides security.

(b) The "Capitol Ranger Company" having an estimated strength of 150 men is 50% NVA and 50% VC. When encountered by elements of this Battalion, the enemy was enroute to resupply another unit with weapons and possible replacements for VC units operating Phu Vang District. This company has worked in conjunction with the K-10 Bn. Other units similarly identified were the K-2, K-4 and K-6 Bn.

(c) The "CO BINH Company" with strength of 4 officers and 39 men of unknown subordination operates in the vicinity of (YD 8502), this unit has mission to establish military government after occupation of area by combat forces. This unit was reported receiving training in mountains. During this training, emphasis reportedly was being placed on street fighting. This unit was last on a rice run to An Nong (hamlet) on 16 May 68. It arrived vicinity this hamlet 2200H. After a 30 minute layover outside hamlet, rice supply was delivered by hamlet residents to waiting resupply column. Return trip to mountain was made same night.

(d) The "BIET BONG Bn" (Transportation Bn) whose location reportedly is: Upper left (YD 8402), Lower right (YD 8501). Mission of unit to provide replacements for K-4, K-10 and other units.

(e) The K-10 Battalion has been reported to have been reinforced with a estimated strength of 500 men. Present location of subordinate units of this Bn, as follows: (YD 970130), (YD 950150), and (YD 935140). This Bn has primary mission of rice procurement within 1st Battalion, 5th Marines TAOR. (For tactic see Oporation Houston Phase I report concorning rice mission subparagraph d.(1)(a).

(f) The K-4 Bn has a base area 10-15 kilometers west southwest of Troui Bridge, (YD 967063) in area of DOI LE HILL. The K-4's mission is to collect rice in the Troui River lowlands area. The K-4 has no permanent base camp at present, moving at least every 3-4 days within the canopy.

(g) The K-8 Bn reportedly subordinate to ninth regiment was idontified as operating in 1st Battalion 5th Marines TAOR when a member was captured in an attempted rice resupply mission.

(h) The K-85 (now unit unknown AKA) was identified in the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines TAOR when a member was captured. Mission of the K-85 is reportedly to attack unknown position.

(i) The K-15 Bn (new unit), letter box number 4416FH has an accumulative strength of an estimated 374 men. Unit subordination is unknown and was identified through interrogation of captured POW. The K-15 mission reportedly is to engage reinforcements from Phu Bai base area in event of action in Hue, and further to reinforce VC/NVC units in connection with any Hue/Phu Bai area operation. Secondary mission while in Phu Vang (D) vicinity (YD 8521), is to conduct rice collections, protect rice caches and instruct the people in rice concealment. People have been instructed to bury rice in nylon plastic bags around homes and under beds. This units area of operations vicinity (YD 8521). Base of operations is general area south southwest of Hue in mountains. Logistics and supply of unit is adequate with the exception of food. One and a half cans of rice per day per man are allocated. The morale is low for new men in the unit. These men are mostly students and Catholics. Their morale is reportedly attributed in part to low food supply.

(j) Results of Search and Cordon Operation conducted 11 May 68 vicinity AN NONG I, II and III by Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines units supported by PRUS and AP Teams were as follows:

(1) Nine (9) detainees were apprehended by search force after having discovered canned foods, bandages, rice and a bulk supply of manifold paper-stationary items hidden within homes or its vicinity. Upon interrogation all detainees revealed that these items were purchased by them, on the request of a VC cadre which operates in their respective hamlets. Information derived from field interrogation of those detainees further indicates VC cadre are considerably active in these areas acting in a support role in assisting Main Force NVA/VC forces deployed to the North and South of Highway # 1. Details of this activity are as follows:

a Hamlet VC cadre reportedly plan for and requisition needed supplies for enemy operational units in the following manner:

1 Contact is usually made by a VC hamlet cadre with a member of a local household usually during hours of darkness. A shopping list is provided for items needed which are then purchased on the open market by the local resident.

2 Funding is usually in any one of the three ways: Funds are provided by VC; Partial funds are provided with stipulation that the amount be matched by local residents as part of his tax; no funds are provided and entire expense is borne by local resident.

3 Pick up is usually made during hours of darkness by the same individual within 3-5 days later.

4 Females are used extensively as purchasing agents. In one instance recorded a teenager was also utilized.

[REDACTED] Hamlet guerrillas operating as "go between" for NVA/VC operational forces normally harbor during daylight hours in the vicinity of their respective hamlets. When conditions are particularly favorable they sometimes stay in the hamlet itself resting at the home of relatives in area. Hamlet guerrillas make extensive use of the banks of the SONG NONG River (VC name "LA NGA") as harbor sites both during day light and hours of darkness.

(2) A team of PRU were attached between 20-28 May 68 to gather information concerning areas of interest within the Battalion TAOR. The following intelligence information was ascertained which proved to be accurate, and resulted in a significant contact by Company D, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines on 29 May 68 which resulted in 55 confirmed KIA, and 9 POW's, and over 30 weapons captured. The PRUs reported that in Loc Son Village on 22 May 68 two companies of the K-4 Bn moved through the area to Bao Vinh An Hamlet. The route indicated was identified as the "14th National Highway". Their mission was to carry rice. The PRUs also turned names of local guerrillas and VC supporters which were forwarded to CI for further exploitation.

Other information received indicated that the VC moved by boat from Ha Trung Va Hamlet (YD 023112) to Cong Quan Bridge (YD 970105) and normally proceed to the mountains to the southeast. The VC reportedly stay at Hac Hau hamlet (YD 955099) during the day light hours. After dark one platoon size unit moves toward mountains, and follow the general trace from (YD 955099) to (YD 959081) to (YD 935065) then along route 545. PRU information also revealed rice caches at Thon An Nong I (YD 918097) and Xon An Cu (YD 907086). Based on this information a Search and Cordon operation was conducted on 28 May 68 vicinity An Nong I and Xon An Cu by S-2 personnel, PRUs, and Company A, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines elements. Three detainees were apprehended and classified as VC supporters. Later the detainees were released to the custody of village chief. No rice was recovered.

e. Terrain. No Change

f. Weather. Throughout the operation the weather was warm to hot during day light hours and mild to cool at nights. The moon was in its last quarter. Illumination was reduced from 24% on 22 May 68 to 00% on 27 May 68. It hampered, to a limited degree night movement. During 23 May to 31 May there occurred several thunder storms and high winds. Air operations were slightly hampered during this period.

9. Mission. 1st Battalion, 5th Marines provides security for vital bridges along MSR and observation posts in TAOR.

Conduct Search and Destroy operations in TAOR to fix and destroy the enemy, his weapons, supplies and fortifications. Assume Bald Eagle/Sparrowhawk commitment and other missions as directed.

10. Concept. 1st Battalion, 5th Marines conducts operation to accomplish assigned mission with companies operating in assigned areas of operation along and adjacent to route # 1, to deny enemy access to MSR and to provide bridge security. Units conduct limited deep operations to seek out and destroy the enemy, his weapons, equipment and fortifications in the Battalion and Regimental AO. Units conduct saturation ambushes and combat patrols by night, patrols and offensive operations by day.

D-Day 1 May 1968.

(1) 010001H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines (-) (Rein) commenced Operation "HOUSTON" Phase II.

(2) 010700H 5th Marines Frag Order 32-68 received. (See Reference b).

(3) 010800H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 65-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (1).

(4) 010830H A Viet Cong turned himself in to CAP 3-2-1 under the Chieu Hoi program. He brought an AK-47 rifle with him.

(5) 012000H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 66-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (2).

(6) 012055H Company C, squad ambush at (YD 923092) spotted 9 VC in 2 groups of 3 and 6. Ambush opened fire with M-79 rounds and small arms fire. Called 81mm mission of 4 rounds HE and 2 rounds 60mm HE. Checked area at first light with negative results.

(7) 012220H Company C, squad ambush at (YD 912094) was fired upon by 3 VC. Ambush returned small arms fire and 6xM-79 rounds. Enemy fled to south. Results: 2 USMC WIAE.

(8) 012245H Company B, squad ambush at (YD 930091) observed enemy moving in direction of CAP 3-2-2. Called artillery mission, used illumination to search area with negative results.

D+1 2 May 1968.

(1) 020115H Company B, squad bridge security at (YD 914118) received 200 rounds small arms fire, 8xE-41 rockets and 15x60mm mortar rounds. Returned fire with 40 rounds 60mm HE and 5000 rounds small arms fire. Called artillery mission. Checked area at first light, negative results.

(2) 021355H Company D platoon combat patrol at (YD 902022) received approximately 10 rounds small arms fire from 2 NVA. Returned small arms fire and called artillery mission. Enemy fled area.

(3) 022230H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 67-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (3)

(4) 022345H Point-man of Company B, squad ambush, walked into enemy machine gun position, while moving to set in night position. Point shot and killed 2 enemy. An estimated 25 enemy opened fire from the flank. Enemy fired 2000 rounds small arms fire. The squad returned 3000 rounds small arms fire, 42XM-79 rounds, 21 frag grenades and 81 artillery HE rounds. A reaction force was sent out. Friendly casualties taken to company CP. An ambush was set up at 0200 of 2 enemy bodies. Checked out area at first light. Results: 2 USMC KIA and 2 VC KIA and 1 Chi-Com drum-fed machine gun captured (RPD).

D+2 3 May 1968.

(1) 031625H Company B, patrol found about 10 booby traps at (YD 903037). Returned without incident.

(2) 031710H Results of Company C, cordon and search operations vicinity of Phu Bai I and VI. Recovered 4,200 lbs. rice (All turned over to village chief). Recovered 1 82mm mortar round and 1 RPG-7 round vicinity (YD 899111) excellent condition. Discovered 3 holes 5x3x3 vicinity (YD 897107) with estimated 50 to 70 mortar safety pins per hole. Discovered 1 hole 5x4 same area rigged with detonation cord. Appeared to have been used to blow duds. S-2, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines: The aforementioned holes probably those utilized, recent mortar attack Phu Bai vital area.

D+3 4 May 1968.

(1) 041025H Company A spotted 4 VC, with packs, moving in a northerly direction, vicinity of (YD 800050). Took enemy under immediate fire. Fired 100 rounds small arms fire, 9 rounds 60mm HE and 6 rounds 105mm HE. Enemy fled to south in heavy underbrush. Searched immediate area with negative results.

(2) 041300H Company A at (YD 876054) received 100 to 150 rounds small arms and 8 to 10xB-40 rocket rounds from estimated 20 VC to the south. Returned 200 rounds M-60 machine gun fire, 150 rounds M-16, 9x105mm HE rounds and 2x105mm WP rounds. The enemy broke contact at this time. Searched area with negative results.

(3) 041445H Company D saw 3 VC come out of the canopy, pursued by fire, killing one VC and pursuing the other 2 physically. Results: 1 VC KIA, and 1 SKS rifle captured.

(4) 042145H Company D received incoming artillery at (YD 942045) from Phu Bai. 4 rounds detonated and 2 were dud rounds. Asked for immediate check fire, will locate duds for crater analysis at first light.

D+4 5 May 1968.

(1) 050135H Company B, received approximately 6x155mm artillery rounds from the north. Called for check fire, found Phu Bai was in check fire already and Beachnut Delta was not firing. 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Beachnut 22 investigating.

(2) 050400H Company M, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines estimated 14 VC entered market place at coordinates (YD 974064). VC entered the home of an ARVN Sergeant assassinated him. Villagers indicated 4 of the VC were women; armed with AK-47's, 1xM-16, 1x.45 caliber pistol and 1xSKS. CAP H-8 sent a patrol into the area and returned with negative results.

(3) 050800H Company B reported 2 artillery rounds landed close to their platoon on bridge security at coordinates (YD 904116). The rounds were estimated to be 155mm from Phu Bai area. Sent a patrol to investigate impact area for evidence. Area to be searched by crater analysis team.

(4) 051145H A farmer turned in 1xSKS rifle to S-2, which he reported he found near his home. S-2 paid farmer 1,000 piasters as a reward. The SKS rifle serial number is 113003696. The farmer then led a patrol from Bridge #4 to vicinity of coordinates (YD 944068) and pointed out a cartridge belt with 60 rounds 7.62 short and a bamboo ring used for camouflage.

(5) 052300H Company A outpost spotted movement at (YD 899078). Estimated 15 VC moving in Northeast direction and disappeared into the brush, observed for 15 seconds. No friendly units in the immediate area. Friendly unit in path of enemy notified.

(6) 052300H Received 5th Marines Frag Order 35-68. Soc Reference (c).

(1) 061000H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 68-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (4).

(2) 061400H Chopped Company M, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines.

(3) 062325H Company B, squad ambush at (YD 922116) observed 12 VC approaching from North at (YD 922117). Sprung ambush firing small arms and using 6 grenades. Called for and received artillery mission of 30x105mm HE and 16x105mm illumination rounds. Enemy fired 10 rounds small arms fire and threw 4 frag grenades. Results: 9 USMC WIAE and 2 VC KIA, 1xAK-47, and 1 SES rifle captured.

D+6 07 May 1968.

(1) 071130H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 69-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (5).

(2) 071145H Company A while searching hamlet at (YD 937062) found 2x3-40 rocket rounds. Marine tripped booby trap. Results: 1 USMC WIAE.

(3) 071955H Company C, squad ambush, with Armed Propaganda Team, encountered 3 NVA enroute to ambush site. Ambush opened fire with small arms, killing the 3 NVA. 1xAK-47, 1xM-1 carbine, 4 lbs. of C-4, blasting caps and 782 gear were captured.

(4) 072105H Company C, squad ambush received sniper fire from (YD 975075). Returned fire with small arms, called for and received 60mm mission of 3 rounds. Checked area at first light with negative results.

D+7 8 May 1968.

(1) 081005H Company A on a company operation found 3 rocket sites at (YD 837057) and 3 covered positions. Made sketches of general area, before destroying them. All the bunkers found were well constructed and approximately 3 ft. to 5 ft. away from rocket sites.

(2) 081520H point-man of Company C patrol detonated a booby trap on trail at coordinates (YD 975067). Results: 1 USMC WIAE.

(3) 082255H - Company B unit at Bridge # 4 spotted movement 400 meters west trying to cross Highway # 1 from south to north. Opened fire with small arms and fired an 81mm mission. Negative results.

D+8 9 May 1968.

(1) 092030H - Company D observed 1 VC moving north. On contact the enemy fled east, pursued enemy physically, fired 3x60mm HE rounds, and 7x105mm HE rounds, lost contact.

(2) 092100H - Company B squad at (YD 920105) ambushed approximately 10 enemy. On contact enemy fired 15-20 rounds small arms, returned fire with approximately 600 rounds small arms; 2xM-79; 2x72 LAAM's; 1xClaymore; 13x81mm HE and 8x illumination. Results: Negative.

D+9 10 May 1968.

(1) 100350H - Company C position at Bridge # 5 coordinates (YD 967063) received an attack by fire, including 40-60x 81mm Mortar rounds and approximately 1500 rounds small arms from an estimated enemy company. A second enemy company was reported in the area but was not encountered. Enemy fire generally received from the west and northwest for approximately 3 hours. Returned fire with 1700 rounds small arms; 50xM-79; 4x106; 290x81mm HE; 110x81mm illumination; 44x105mm illumination; 348x105mm HE; 52x155mm HE. A flareship was in support for approximately 3 hours. 3 platoons were maneuvered to contact the enemy and prevent withdrawal, but resulted in negative contact. Results: 1 USMC WIAE; 2 VC KIA; 2xChiCom concussion grenades and 2xcartridge belts captured. 1 round of 81mm mortar (Lot no. MA-1-32) hit bridge causing slight damage.

(2) 100350H - Company C sentry dog was accidentally shot by an ARVN sentry. Results: Dog evac.

D+10 11 May 1968.

(1) 110700H - 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 70-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (6).

(2) 112000H - Company B, squad ambush at (YD 910122) opened fire on estimated 6 VC. Enemy returned approximately 10-15 rounds small arms fire. Squad assaulted enemy position. Enemy fled to north. Called 81mm and artillery mission on enemy routes of egress consisting of 3x81mm illumination, and 6x105mm WP rounds. Checked out area with negative results.

(3) 112309H Company B, squad ambush at (YD 941126) observed 8 VC at (YD 941128). Fired small arms and M-79 rounds. Enemy fled. Called 81mm and artillery illumination mission consisting of 9x105mm illumination; and 30x81mm illumination rounds. Checked out area with negative results.

D+11 12 May 1968.

(1) No contacts on this date.

D+12 13 May 1968.

(1) 130235H Company D, squad ambush at (YD 949049) opened fire on 3 VC/NVA. Enemy returned fire with small arms fire and 1 ChiCom grenade. Enemy fled to southwest. Checked out area with negative results.

(2) 131700H 1st Battalion, 5th Marines Frag Order 71-68 promulgated. See Enclosure (7)

(3) 131955H Company D, squad ambush at (YD 928024) observed 4 VC moving into the killing zone. Ambush opened fire with small arms killing 1 VC. Enemy fled. Fired artillery mission of 16x105mm HE and 2x105mm WP rounds on enemy routes of egress. Checked area with following results: 1 VC KIA; 1 AK-47 (Ser # 10083113) and documents.

(4) 132030H Company C, squad ambush at (YD 981073) observed 3 VC leave a boat and enter a house at (YD 981073). Ambush opened fire with small arms. Results: 1 VC KIA.

D+13 14 May 1968.

(1) No contacts on this date.

D+14 15 May 1968.

(1) 151840H Company A, squad patrol at (YD 903093) engaged 28 VC. Enemy returned small arms and threw 2 grenades. Friendly fire included small arms; 5x105mm WP; 70x105mm HE; 11x105mm Illumination; 3x81mm Illumination; 57x81mm HE. A Huey gunship and a flareship were also used in support. Results: 2 USMC KIA; 1 VC KIA and 1 AK-47 and 3 magazines captured.

(2) 152045H Company D, squad ambush made contact with 3 NVA at (YD 915069). Ambush fired small arms. Enemy fled. Called artillery mission of 12 rounds HE on enemy routes of egress. Checked area with negative results.

(1) 172005H Company C, squad ambush at (YD 982076) observed 5 boats moving north on river showing lights. Called 105mm artillery illumination and VT mission on boats. Checked area at first light with negative results.

(1) 182030H Company B, listening post at (ZD 081986) observed 4 VC with weapons at (ZD 082987). Called fire mission of 4x60mm illumination; 9x60mm HE rounds. Checked area at first light with negative results.

D+18 19 May 1968.

(1) 192100H Company B, squad ambush at (ZD 075977) observed movement and lights to their southwest. Fired 8x81mm HE. Lights disappeared. Checked area at first light with negative results.

D+19 20 May 1968.

(1) 200307H Company A, squad ambush at (YD 917107) observed 6 VC moving to their position. Ambush opened fire at 50 meters with small arms. One man's rifle jammed due to ruptured cartridge. Enemy returned fire with small arms and fled in southwest direction. Fired 10x60mm HE; 3x60mm illumination; 10x81mm HE; 12x81mm illumination; 5x105mm illumination. Results: 1 USMC KIA; 1 USMC WIAE and 1 VC KIA. While searching area at first light found one VC hiding in bunker and detained him. VC reclassified as Hoi Chan.

(2) 200830H Minesweep team swooping road at (YD 081986) found 1 20 lb. box mine in road. Mine was blown in place.

(3) 202205H Company A, squad ambush at (YD 900083) observed 25 VC moving in wedge followed by 100 VC. First group of enemy allowed to pass, ambush was sprung on larger group by firing 400x1-60 machine gun rounds; 600x5.56mm; 7x1-26 grenades; 48x1-79 rounds. Enemy returned fire with 600 rounds small arms and 10 frag grenades. Supporting arms fired 52x105HE; 1x105mm WP; 14x105mm illumination; 59x81mm HE. Results: 2 USMC WIAE and 3 VC KIA.

Checked out area at first light with following results: 5 USMC WIAE; 4 NVA KIA; 7 VC KIA; 2 carbines, 1 AK-47, 1 SNS-44, 1 pistol, 4 cartridge belts, two packs containing medical supplies and demolitions captured.

(2) 210220H Company A, bridge security at (YD 913117) received 60-80 rounds 82mm B-40 rocket rounds and 150 rounds small arms fire from estimated 30 NVA/VC at (YD 908118), (YD 912116) and (YD 914114). Fired counter-mortar fire of 24x81mm HE rounds and 600 rounds small arms fire. Enemy broke contact. No damage to bridge or friendly casualties incurred. Checked area at first light with negative results.

(3) 210630H Company D, squad searching area of earlier contact observed one VC. Fired 3 rounds and pursued enemy. Enemy returned fire. Results: 3 USMC WIAE.

13. Administrative Matters.

a. Supply. Resupply of food and water was accomplished by wheeled vehicle except in a few cases for which air was used. All resupplies obtained during this operation have originated either from the Phu Loc LSA or Phu Bai. An administrative run has been established with Bravo Company CP located at the Phu Loc LSA. No serious problems have occurred during this operation to impair the logistical support to the battalion.

b. Maintenance. No maintenance problems were encountered with weapons or equipment during the operation.

c. Treatment of Casualties and Evacuation and Hospitalization. During Operation "HOUSTON" Phase II medical capabilities included the complement of company corpsmen, the forward BAS at the battalion jump CP, and the rear BAS in Phu Bai. Casualties in the field were treated and evacuated by helicopter for hospitalization. Some minor casualties and several cases of heat exhaustion were evacuated through the forward BAS to the rear BAS for appropriate treatment and disposition. It is noted that the number of heat casualties markedly increased during the month of May.

A minor diarrhoea epidemic occurred on 24 May which involved 60 people in the forward CP and battalion rear areas. Symptoms were self-limiting and cleared rapidly with treatment. The Preventive Medicine Unit inspected the battalion rear mess hall and determined the infection to be caused by Clostridium Perfringens (Contamination of Food). It is noted that this infection is carried by dust, and the medical recommendation for relocation of the helicopter landing zone adjacent to the mess hall still stand.

d. Transportation. Wheeled vehicles were the primary means of transportation during the operation.

e. Communications. Normal established communications were successfully maintained at both Phu Bai Rear and Bao Vinh CP. The installation of a generator, PU-239, at the latter location considerably improved the light and power capability. Training during the month included 24 field radio operators and 8 radar, PFS-6, operators.

f. Medical Evaluation. Medical treatment has been provided in a satisfactory manner during this period.

14. Special Equipment and Techniques. (None).15. Commanders Analysis:

a. During Phase II of Operation "HOUSTON", 1st Battalion remained in the Phu Bai AO with the primary mission of keeping National Route # 1 open. On 16 May, the Phu Bai AO was expanded to the south to include Phu Loc District Headquarters, adding 11 kilometers of road to the 18 kilometers previously included. Because of the expansion, it was necessary to assign all four companies to road and bridge security missions. Each company retained operational flexibility within its AO through use of swing platoons which operated continuously in the field, resupplied by helicopter, boat or vehicle. The present disposition of forces permits the temporary employment of one company outside the Battalion AO. Such employment eliminates internal flexibility and requires the assumption of a posture of limited offensive and static defensive operations localized around National Route # 1, bridges, and other vital positions.

b. In addition to the mission of keeping Highway # 1 open, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines had the mission of preventing enemy movement through the AO. In order to accomplish this with the forces available it was necessary to define the major routes used by the enemy for rice resupply and tactical troop movement, and concentrate the operational effort against these routes. With the aid of experience and information gained from intelligence agencies, POW's and Hoi Chan, three major routes were targeted and successfully interdicted by patrols, ambushes and artillery. Of the one-hundred and two enemy killed during Phase II, ninety-one were killed along one of these three routes. All nine POW's were captured on one of these routes.

c. The enemy's efforts during Phase II were directed at rice resupply. Rice denial operations were conducted in conjunction with Vietnamese forces and officials to concentrate the processed rice crop in areas under GVN control. Such operations were found to be most successful when controlled by GVN officials, and supported by Marines. Armed Propaganda Teams were useful in preparing the people

for Rice Denial Operations and in following up such operations to determine their effects on the attitudes of the people.
