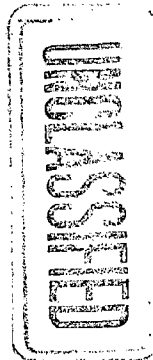

From 1-13 September 1969 the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines participated in search and destroy operations and MSR security in Liberty Bridge area. 13-29 September 1969 participated in search and destroy operations in the Arizona Area. On 301600H September 1969 the Battalion moved to the Alamo.

PART III

SEQUENTIAL LISTINGS OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTSA. TOPICS1. PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

a. Strength. The Battalion's strength at the beginning of the month was 32 officers and 1053 enlisted. On 15 September, the strength had changed to 30 officers and 1053 enlisted. By the end of September, the strength was 31 officers and 1143 enlisted. At this time, there are no officers and 36 enlisted hospitalized. Joinings during the month were no officers and 256 enlisted.

b. Discipline, Law and Legal. 2 Summary Courts-Martial and 2 Special Courts-Martial were convened during September. There are 2 Summary Courts-Martial and 7 Special Courts-Martial still to be processed. During September, 7 informal investigations were completed. There are 4 informal investigations pending.

c. POW/Detainees. There were 17 detainees processed during this month. They were classed as follows:

d. Morale. Morale and fighting spirit continued to be excellent.

e. Postal. Postal service continued at the same degree of excellence.

f. Awards. During September, there were 4 Bronze Stars, 17 Navy Achievements, and 2 Navy Commendations submitted for heroism and meritorious service.

g. Interior Management. Administrative procedures and proficiency continued to be excellent.

2. ENEMY, WEATHER AND TERRAIN

a. Enemy. Enemy contact has been light and sporadic throughout the AO. The enemy engagements have been mostly probes, light attacks and occasional sniper fire while units are on the move. There has been a noticeable drop in SFD's in this reporting period as to last month although a significant rise in the incidents of SFD's was experienced in the Arizona. The enemy as a whole is obtaining food supplies and avoiding large scale contact.

b. Weather. The precipitation during this reporting period was at a high in the middle of the month, thus hindering visibility and movements. The remainder of the reporting period was hot and humid.

c. Terrain. Active rice paddies, intermediate high ground and tree-lines throughout the area. Also there are numerous streams and rivers which one may obtain water from.

3. ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

a. Organization. The organization of the Battalion consisted of the following units being detached from the 1st Battalion and other units under the operational control of the 1st Battalion during the following periods:

(1) Company A, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 5th Marines from 130800H to 291200H September 1969.

(2) Company B, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines from 121830H to 131630H September 1969.

(3) Company K, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 131630H to 141200H September 1969.

b. Operations. 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 1-13 September 1969, participated in unnamed operations in the Liberty Bridge area to seek out and destroy and capture enemy forces, weapons, materials and positions as well as search and protect the area for US and ARVN installations. Security was also provided for convoys between An Hoa and Liberty Bridge. 13-29 September 1969, the Battalion moved to the Arizona Area. The Battalion participated in unnamed search and destroy operations. On 301600H September the Battalion moved out to the Alamo and assumed a new AO East of Liberty Road.

c. Supporting Arms

(1) Air. The Battalion continued its policy of maximum employment of all available air power. The resultant increased fire power and flexibility contributed to the success enjoyed by the Battalion in both its fluid and static operations. A breakdown of all air employed during the month follows in detail:

(a) Fixed Wing. Fixed wing support can best be described by dividing it into its four basic categories, i.e., tactical jets, AC-47's, and TAC (A)'s. Twenty-one (21) tactical air controllers (airborne) provided the Battalion with 21.7 hours on station in their missions of visual reconnaissance and fixed wing controllers. Night operations were enhanced by 3.9 hours of suppressive fire delivered by five "Spooky" AC-47 gunships. Ninety-four (94) jets, in their missions as tactical air strikes, "Night Owl" flights, and A-6 "Beacon" strikes dropped 249.0 tons of ordnance. The bomb damage assessment from those dropped is reflected in the following chart:

(b) Rotary Wing. In addition to one Battalion sized heli-lift which was conducted in one day, the Battalion employed helicopters daily for re-supply and visual reconnaissance missions. Thirty-six (36) med-evacs were completed.

(c) Significant Development. The Battalion moved to the Arizona Area on 14 September and one company went OPCON to Regiment. Maximum employment of air was utilized during this period.

(2) Artillery. During the period of 13-29 September the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, received support from F Battery 2/11 and D Battery 2/11. There were 250 fire missions of which 123 were S-2 targets. During this period 1st Battalion, 5th Marines had 18 contact fire missions. The majority of the fire missions were fired at unobserved targets. Included in total fire missions were the normal amount of registration and orientation missions. In firing the above mentioned targets, 5084 HE were expended on fire missions, 2596 HE on H&I's for a total of 7680 HE, 283 WP and 263 Illumination.

Recently a directive from 2/11 came out stating that in all fire missions the first round will be a WP high burst. The reason for this is to increase the safety factor in fire missions. However, it has eliminated any immediate fire for effect on suspected enemy locations, prep fires, etc., whether they are observed or unobserved with a danger element as far out as 2500 to 3000 meters. As a result the enemy is forewarned of any impending artillery strike by a WP high burst. Thus it might be more effective to use 81mm mortars in prep fires, suspected enemy locations etc., where the Commanding Officer feels it essential to have an immediate fire for effect with HE instead of a high burst WP. Later artillery can be used effectively to follow up on the 81mm mortar mission.

(3) Engineers. Excellent support was again provided by Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion; however, closer coordination is necessary in many areas. Engineers were employed primarily to destroy duds, SFD's, captured enemy ammunition, enemy bunkers and fortifications. Loss of lives, wheeled and tracked equipment was considerably reduced by the detailed searching efforts employed by the engineers.

(4) Shore Party (HST). HST's were provided by Company B, 1st Shore Party Battalion. These teams provided outstanding support in coordinating and effecting helicopter resupply and Med-Evacs.

(5) Antrac. A light section of the 4th Platoon, Company A, 3rd Antrac Battalion was in direct support of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines. The LVT's provided excellent support in transporting troops and providing security for convoys between An Hoa and Liberty Bridge from 1-13 September 1969.

(6) Tanks. A light section of the 2nd Platoon, Company B, 1st Tank Battalion was in direct support of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines. Excellent results were achieved by using tanks to support the daily MSR mine sweeps, providing direct fire support to the daytime OP's and were also used extensively as convoy security between An Hoa and Liberty Bridge, and at night were employed in the defensive networks of Liberty Bridge from 1-13 September 1969.

(7) Scout Snipers. Detachment Scout Sniper Platoon, Headquarters Company, 5th Marines continued to provide outstanding support for the Battalion, which resulted in 5 enemy kills during the month.

b. All companies during their period of bridge defense continued to have instructions and familiarization firing of all individual and crew served weapons, including the M-72 LAAW, hand grenades and claymore mines.

c. Replacement personnel received five (5) days training at 5th Marines Headquarters prior to being committed to the field.

d. The Battalion continued to utilize schools provided by higher headquarters in the DaNang area and Okinawa. During the month, 87 members of the Battalion attended schools in DaNang area and Okinawa. The value of the schools is recognized; however, this had an adverse effect on the rifle company in the field strength.

5. LOGISTICS. From 1-13 September, while the Battalion was deployed at Liberty Bridge and along the MSR, resupply was accomplished from An Hoa daily by convoy. Convoys were composed of trucks from 11th Motors, which were returning to DaNang after off-loading supplies brought to An Hoa from DaNang.

When the Battalion moved to Arizona Area where it remained from 14-29 September, resupply was accomplished daily from An Hoa, utilizing helicopters.

Food, ammunition, and POL requirements were met by LSU # 1, An Hoa.

When the Battalion returned from Arizona Area, on 29 September, tentage was erected for all personnel. Over 1,000 steaks were provided for outdoor cook-outs on the evening the Battalion returned. Each man was given a shower and provided clean clothing, weapons, and equipment.

When the Battalion departed An Hoa for the AO East of Liberty Road on 30 September, trucks from the 1st Motor Transport Battalion were utilized to move the Battalion North, up the MSR, to a point near My Loc (4). Here the Battalion dismounted, commencing its foot march eastward.

6. CIVIC ACTION. During the reporting period the Battalion worked with the village officials of Xuyen Hoa/Loc area. On 15 September, S-5 personnel were attached (OPCON) to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines at Liberty Bridge. Duc Duc District officials visited the Phu Lac area and are proceeding to annex Xuyen Hoa/Loc into Duc Duc District. Visual Recon and ground teams from Duc Duc Headquarters and 5th Marines approved the original site for the New Life Village. A total of 14 Vietnamese civilians were treated by medical personnel for sores and abrasions.

A total of four (4) Med-Caps were held while the Battalion was operating in the Arizona Area. Approximately 200 villagers were treated during this time. General medication was given and minor illnesses were treated. In addition over 200 meals were provided for these villagers. As a result of conducting same 2 VCI were apprehended.

During this reporting period six (6) communicators from the Battalion rear, worked on an Orphanage in Duc Duc. They built roofs, screened a porch and a kitchen; some Marines from this section are contributing money for the Orphanage.

7. PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS. During the reporting period little intelligence information has been received from the elders. All intelligence information has been passed on to Battalion S-2 and counter intelligence. A personal response team from G-5 held two lectures on 21 and 22 September for I, K, and L Companies with approximately 300 men attending. At this particular time the Battalion S-5 was OPCON to the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines.

8. COMMUNICATIONS. During September the "Wheel Code" was tested up to and including the 15th, with very favorable results, and a recommendation was submitted that the system be adopted, with minor changes. The move back to Arizona Area had no ill effect on communications.
