


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


# PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. The Battalion's officer shortages are one (1) Lt 0130, one (1) Lt 0202, one (1) Capt 0302, eight (8) Lt 0302, one (1) Capt 0402, and (1) Capt 2502. The Battalion's enlisted shortages are six (6) SSgts 0369 and forty five (45) 03 Sgts. The major area of shortages are in platoon leadership billets in the 03 field. The Battalion has 66% of its M/L strength of Lt's 03, 81% of its M/L strength in Staff NCO's 0369, and 50% of its M/L strength of Sgts 03.
- 2. Intelligence operations were conducted in support of Operation MAMELUKE THRUST in the Quan Duc Duc District (Arizona Area) Quang Nam Province. The enemy moved in small units, using harassing and doldying tactics in order to avoid contact with major friendly forces.
- 3. The Battalion terminated its participation in Operation ALLEN BROOK and was in division reserve during the first week of June. The remainder of the month the Battalion was engaged in Operation MAMELUKE THRUST. The Battalion conducted search and destroy operations deep in the Quan Duc Duc District with emphasis on locating and destroying enemy personnel, caches, and base camps.
- 4. All newly joined personnel attended a Regimental Indoctrination School. While in division reserve training was conducted in the following subjects: Weapons Safety, Radio Procedures, Spot Reports, FO and FAC Procedures, Field Communication Expedients, and fam firing of all individual and crew served weapons.

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## PART III SEQUENTIAL LISTINGS OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

## 1. Topics

#### a. Personnel and Administration

- (1) The battalion began the month of June with an on board strength of 30 Marine Officers, 1057 Marine Enlisted, 4 Navy Officers, and 32 Navy Enlisted. The current on board strength is 31 Marine Officer, 1001 Marine Enlisted, 4 Navy Officers, and 49 Navy Enlisted.
- (2) The current effective strength of the Battalian is 26 Marine Officers, and 866 Marine Enlisted.
- (3) Three Marine Corps Officers, and 44 Marine Enlisted are scheduled for rotation during July 1968.

#### b. Intelligence


#### (1) Personnel

- (a) During the month of June 1968 the Battalion Intellignece Section gained one (1) LCpl 0331, one (1) LCpl 0311, one (1) PFC 0311 and lost one (1) Cpl 0311.
- (b) During the reporting period Scout Dog Teams and Armed Propaganda Teams were not used, however, Scout Sniper were effectively employed. The Battalian is augmented by three (3) Scout Sniper Teams.
- (2) <u>Collection</u> The main collection efforts during the reporting period have been on operation MAMELUKE THRUST and have been as follows:
  - (a) Map corrections
  - (b) Trail and water point locations
  - (c) Enemy order of battle
  - (d) Enemy infrastructure
  - (e) New landing zones
  - (f) Terrain
- (3) Reporting The Battalion S-2 Section conducted daily Commander and Staff briefings during June 1968.

## (4) Enemy Activity

enemy activity took the form of limited attacks by fire, sniping, small scale ambushes, and explosive devices spread widely throughout the Battalian AO. Many of the enemy's food caches were found and destroyed. With a few small exceptions, the enemy has been moving in small units (5-20) and has been trying to evade contact with major Allied Forces. Terrorism has been displayed on several occasions.





- (3) Although it is has been reported that all enemy casualties have already been replaced by at least a one-to-ene ratio, . the disposition of enemy forces does not lend itself to the immediate accomplishment of widespread success against major friendly installations.
- (b) Capabilities Continued harrassing actions to include:

a Sniping

- b Small scale attacks and ambushes
- C Use of mines and explosive devices
- d Propaganda
- e Terrorism
- Attacks by fire
- g Mortar attacks

## (5) Vietnamese Attachments

- (a) <u>Interpreters</u>. The Battalion continues to employ five ARVN interpreters. Efforts are continually being made to ensure that each of the rifle companies and the S-5 have at least one qualified ARVN interpreter each.
- (b) <u>Kit Carson Scouts</u>. The Battalion does not have any Kit Carson Scouts.






- (8) Terrain. Sparse to thick vegetation, hedgerows, rice paddies, small villages, and mountainous areas.

#### d. Operations

- (1) 030630H June 68 3rd Bn. 5th Marines participation in Operation ALLEN BROOK terminated
- (2) 030630H June 68 3rd Bn. 5th Mar. chopped to CG, 1st MarDiv as division reserve.
- (3) 090600H June 68 3rd Bn. 5th Mar. chopped from CG, 1st MarDiv to OPCON Seventh Marines for Operation MAMELUKE THRUST.
- (4) 161600H Lima Company chopped from 3rd Bn. 5th Mar. to OPCON 1st Bn. 5th Marines.
- (5) 231000H June 68 assumed OPCON of A Co. 1st Bn. 7th Marines.

#### e. Artillery Support

- (1) During the month of June 3/5 was supported by a number of direct support, reinforcing, and general support batteries. Foxtrot 2/11, the assigned direct support battery for 3/5 took on other roles of support, both direct support and reinforcing for other infantry Battalian's in the An Hoi area of operations. The following is a break down of the artillery support: From 1 to 7 June Alpha 1/13, from 8 to 13 June-India 3/11, from 14 to 17 June-Charlie 1/13, from 18 to 23 June-India 3/11, from 24 to 28 June Fox 2/11, from 28 to 30 June-Kilo 4/11, and Tango 4/11.
- (2) The direct support batteries fired 5801 rounds and the general support batteries fired 724 rounds. There were 434 rounds fired on 120 harrassing and interdiction targets. There were 148 observed missions and 29 unobserved



missions. There were 212 rounds fired with fuze variable time, 53 with fuze delay, 5981 with fuze quick, 282 white phosorous, 13 smoke and 14 illuminations

## g. Communications

- (1) The Communication Platoon supported the Battalion operations without pronounced communication difficulties.
- (2) Courier service was established with Division Message center when the Battalion wasindivision reserve.
- (3) Especially noteworthy was the support given by the 7th Marines Regimental Communication Platoon. Only with their assistance was it possible to complete necessary 2nd Echelon L.T.I. of equipment.
- (4) The communications with the 3rd Battalion 5th Marines rear at Phu Bai was marginal because of the interference of stations on or near our assigned frequency.
- (5) Support by Electronica Maintenance of FSR has been outstanding during the entire month.

## h. Logistics

(1) General. The overall logistical status of the Battalion is satisfactory.

## (2) Supply.

- (a) During the month of June Battalion Supply maintained an armorer and supply man in the field to expedite repairs and requisitions.
- (b) On 14 June Battalion supply received a grade of satisfactory on a quarterly fiscal inspection. Battalion supply was able to pick up \$8,640.00 from canceled requisitions.

## (3) Motor Transport

- (a) Quarterly and annual preventive maintenance is up to date on all vehicles.
- (b) Approximately seventy five percent of the M274A2's have broken starters.
- (c) The motor transport chief billet is presently being filled by a corporal because of the lack of a 3500 Staff NCO.

## i. Civic Action

- (1) Medcaps. There were 963 civilians treated by the Battalion Medcap Team.
- (2) Psyops. 1,500 leaflets, 300 Chieu Hoi balls and 600 Chieu Hoi pens were distributed in the Phu Long area.
- (3) Civic Action Assistance. Two TEETER-TOTTERS were installed in the refugee camp at Phu Luong.
  - (4) Problems. There were no significant problems.
- (5) <u>Serious Incident Reports</u>. There were no serious incidents.
