



PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. The Battalion's Officer shortages are one Capt 0202,.11)
 Capt, (7) Lts 0302, (1) 1 Capt 0402, (1) 1 Capt 2502. The
 Battalion enlisted shortages are (2) 2 GySc+ 0369 and (24)
 Sgts 03's. The Battalion has 70% of its M/L strength of Lts:03's
 93% of its M/L strength in Staff NCO's 0369 and 44% of its
 M/L strength of Sgts 03's.
- 2. Operation MAMELUKE THRUST, in which this Battalien participated, terminated on 23 October 1968. The Battalien participated in Operation MAUI PEAK from 6 to 19 October 1968 under the operational control of the 7th Marines. The Battalien is presently engaged in Operation HENDERSON HILL which commenced on 23 October 1968.
- 3. Regimental Indoctrination School was attended by all newly joined personnel. After Operation MAUI PEAK the Battalion spent six days of rehabilitation and training at AN HOA. Training consisted of firing individual weapons, instructions in enemy mines and booby traps, patrolling, ambushes, FO and FAC procedures, and establishment of defensive positions. Additionally, all radio operators attended an intensive three day course in communication techniques and procedures conducted by the Battalion Communications Chief.

1. Topics

a. Personnel and Administration

- (1) The Battalion began the month of October with an on board strength of 33 Marine Officers, 1155 Marine Enlisted, 2 Navy Officers, and 55 Navy Enlisted. The current on board strength is 28 Marine Officers, 1209 Marine Enlisted, 3 Navy Officers, and 60 Navy Enlisted.
- (2) The current effective strength of the Battalion is 23 Marine Officers, and 946 Marine Enlisted.
- (3) Five Marine Officers, and 46 Marine Enlisted rotated during October 1968.



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(1) Personnel

- (a) During the month of October 1968, the Battalion Intelligence Section lost one Sgt/0311, one Cp1/0341 and one Cpl/0311. During the same period, one Sgt/0311 and LCpl/0331 were joined.
- (b) During the reporting period, one Interrogator Translator Team was effectively employed.

(4)Enemy Activity

- (a) Synopsis. During the reporting period enemy activity consisted of food gathering, political indoctrination, recruiting, terrorism, and small scale attacks against US/ARVN military installations.
- (b) Capabilities. Continued harrassing actions includo:

(7) Weather

- (a) Rainfall: Moderate to Heavy

- (8) Terrain. The terrain through which the Battalion moved, during the reporting period, varied from low agricultural areas, to high dense canopy. The lowlands were a series of rice paddies, hamlets and treelines. The high terrain consisted of thick overgrowth punctuated by a series of trail networks. Approach routes in both areas were usually enemy fortified.
- (9) Captured Weapons. The following is the total of weapons and equipment captured by the Battalion during October 1968:
- (a) <u>Weapons</u>. 1 SKS rifle, 1 M-1 carbine, 10 AK-47 rifles, 29 ChiCom grenades, 1 M-26 grenade, 1 M-14 rifle, 7 82mm mortar rounds, 627 AK-47 rounds, 8 B-40 rocket rounds, 1 57mm RR round, 75 7.62 red tracer rounds, 85 .50 cal. tracer rounds, 30 12.7 HMG rounds, 4 AK-47 magazines, 50 75mm RR canisters.
- (b) Equipment. 1 short wave radio, 1 NVA helmet, 1 transister radio.
 - (c) 782 Gear. 5 pounds
 - (d) <u>Documents</u>. 18 pounds

d. Operations

- (1) 051830H Oct 1968 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines assumed OPCON Charlie 1/1.
- (2) 060800H Oct 1968 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines chopped from Fifth Marines to Seventh Marines. Operation MAMELUKE THRUST temporarily terminated for this battalion and MAUI PEAK commenced.
- (3) 191800H Oct 1968 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines reports OPCON to Fifth Marines and simultaneously chopped Charlie 1/1 to First Marines. Operation MAUI PEAK terminated.
- (4) 211505H Oct 1968 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines assumed OPCON Kilo company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines.
- (5) 231200H Oct 1968 Operation MAMELUKE THRUST terminated, and Operation HENDERSON HILL commenced.

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Addition Support

the 11th Marines. E 2/11 provided support from 6 to 19 October. General and direct support was provided and little Marines for the remaining part of the month. Through the use of a centralized battalion fire direction center, any battery in the battalion could be in our support at any given time.

- (2) There were 27 observed missions and 19 unobserved missions, 26 white phosphorous, 2853 HE and 81 illumination. A total of 3106 rounds were fired in the month of October.
- (3) From 6 to 19 October 90% of the missions utilized fuze delay which had very effective results of enemy fortifications and bunkers accounting for the majority of targets. Fuze quick reacted similarly to that of VT fuse resulting in an air burst when detonated by the 20 foot canopy.

g. Communications

- (1) Supported Battalion operations with primary use of FM radio communications (AN/PRC-25)
- (2) This command was supported by normal FM communications during the month of October. No major problems were experienced.
- (3) AN/PPS-6 was used extensively in the defense posture of the An Hoa combat base.





h. <u>Logistics</u> The overall logistics status of the battalion is satisfactory. Battalion S-4 has supported the battalion while in the field with resupplies on a daily basis.

i. Civic Action

(1) MEDCAPS: 720 Vietnamese Nationals were treated during the period covered. Medcaps were held at the Battalion C.F. area as well as the An Hose area.
